

THIS WEEK: No alarmists, the editors of Movie-Radio Guide have not been given to raving and ranting about the Fifth Column in America. We believe that the American character is a bulwark too strong to be cracked by foreign influence.

Yet a curious situation arises in that one of the Nazi-made films, "Sieg im Westen" ("Victory in the West"), is at this writing in the United States and already has been shown in Yorkville, heavily populated German section of New York City. American films cannot be shown in Germany. What kind of game is this?

Do readers of Movie-Radio Guide know how these films are imported? Weekly "Variety" has this to say: "Nazis now have a new route for getting their films across and are said to be having more success than formerly. Prints are sent to Lisbon, then to Dakar in Africa, then to South America, and then to United States, all by air."

The Nazis are resourceful, but it is quite obvious that this trickle of propaganda will not affect the American mind to a serious degree. Yet how is it that these pictures can get into this country at all? It is to the everlasting credit of the Independent Theater Owners of America that they have demanded that these Nazi films be kept out of the country, but the problem does not stop here. In South America, Nazi-made films are shown freely in many places, and it is reported on good authority that officers of the

army in Chile have been forbidden to visit theaters showing anti-Nazi pictures while in uniform.

On the basis of this information revealed in weekly "Variety," Movie-Radio Guide urges that the government seriously consider immediate and more concentrated effort to offset propaganda pictures in South America. Hollywood's producer association can help immeasurably by taking popular stars on junkets similar to the recent Mexican trip—only extending these trips as far into South America as possible.

NEXT WEEK: It took a long time, but we did it. Bashful Jimmy Stewart wouldn't be photographed when he finally landed in the Army. At long last he emerged long enough to make a speech in Los Angeles. After the luncheon, Movie-Radio Guide's Jack Albin cornered Jimmy, secured the only color photo taken of Hollywood's No. 1 selectee. You'll see it on the cover of next week's issue and want to save it.

On the radio front, too, things will be humming next week. There'll be an intriguing page of radio-star fathers and their children; more about the "Quiz Kids," and a picture story of Bob Hawk's CBS quiz broadcast, "Take It or Leave It." Plus the usual complete program listings, tips on high-light programs and short waves. All in all, something to watch for!

HOLLYWOOD glamour girls' babies cost their mothers from fifty thousand to one hundred thousand dollars apiece—and sometimes more than that! But despite the high tariff on infants, during the past year six prominent screen actresses have taken their valuable time off and risked their careers for the sake of His Majesty, the Baby. What's more, they all say that the result has been more than worth it!

The high cost of Hollywood babies is caused by the time "off salary" their mothers must take before and after their arrival. Generally speaking, this is four months before and six weeks after the baby is born. Under the normal studio contract, an actress would make two pictures during that length of time. Hence, the loss in salary to an actress is from \$50,000 to \$100,000 or more, the figure varying with her earning capacity.

Among those who have this year shelved their careers momentarily to pay the price of having a family are Margaret Sullavan, Anne Shirley, Jane Wyman, Geraldine Fitzgerald, Andrea Leeds, and the latest mother, Shirley Ross. Before them marched the good examples of Joan Blondell, Irene Hervey, Frances Dee, Dixie Lee Crosby, Joan Davis, Maureen O'Sullivan, Connie and Joan Bennett, Marlene Dietrich, Sally Eilers, Virginia Bruce, Fay Wray, Dolores Costello, Mary Astor, Penny Singleton, Claire Dodd, Helen Hayes and Norma Shearer. But to Margaret Sullavan, this year's arrival was nothing new. Her baby son is her third child.

Arresting one's film activities for even the short span of five months is a risky business to a young actress whose career is budding. Yet if she were to wait until her earning capacity had reached the \$300,000-a-year mark, like Carole Lombard, she

might find that she couldn't afford to have a baby! Sounds funny, but it's true. The reason: Income taxes and other fixed charges of being a star. The taxes would be collectable from the year previous and might not have been set aside. The fixed charges—mostly the business of "keeping up a front"—would roll along merrily during her necessary lay-off. So what could a poor girl do?

Specifically, here is what John Kenneth Dolan, age six weeks as you read this, cost Shirley Ross: The turning-down of four offered pictures (she could have made two or possibly three of them); loss, \$50,000. Paid out by husband Ken Dolan to doctors and hospital, \$2,000. Furnishing and fitting nursery, plus nurse salary, \$500. Paid to masseurs, dentists and trainers to bring Shirley's figure, face and smile back to the normal perfection demanded by the movie camera, \$500. Total cost, \$53,000. Despite the cost, mother Shirley says Kenneth Junior may be a movie actor if he wishes!

Jane Wyman, off five months from pictures, warned Warner Brothers Studio of her impending and planned blessed event. Consequently, they rushed her through two pictures and held up another, "Badmen of Missouri," for her return. Dorothy Comingore worked in "Citizen Kane" almost to within a month of her baby daughter's arrival, but her return to picture work was postponed until late last month. Time off, five months. Andrea Leeds asked for and obtained an indefinite leave of absence from her Sam Goldwyn contract. She may never return to the screen.

But despite the high cost of Hollywood babies, the glamour girls still want them, even as you and I. Proof: Right now Constance Moore and Mary Martin are expectant; Virginia Bruce is going to try again.—E. P.

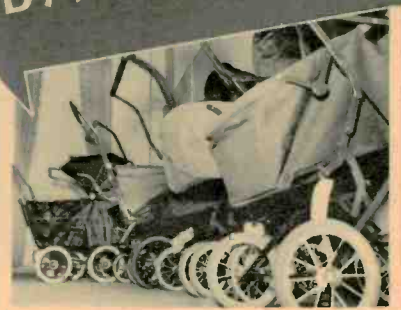

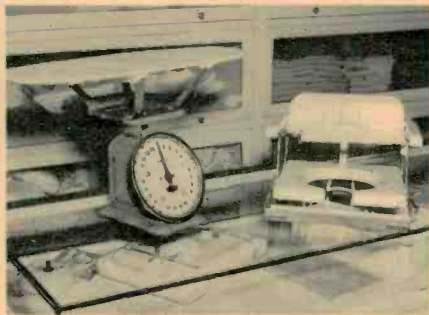

JUNE 16 of this year will mark the fourth happy anniversary of the marriage Hollywood said wouldn't and couldn't last more than a few weeks. The persons involved are Jeanette MacDonald and Gene Raymond, and though Hollywood still hasn't given up sharpshooting at their chances, one real look at them together is to know their happiness is good for another forty years.

In a sense, Jeanette and Gene were pushed into each other's arms and love by strangers. It all started because each proverbially is half an hour late for all appointments. On a spring evening in 1935, late as usual, they arrived simultaneously at a doorstep to which they had been invited as individual guests. Their hostess, Rozika Dolly, opened the door and said: "How sweet of you to come together! I didn't know you knew each other."

They didn't. Each was aware of the other as a screen personality, of course, but their personal paths had never crossed.

A week later they again bumped into each other on a host's doorstep, and again the host said how charming of them to come together. Next day the gossip columns were full of the town's "newest romance"—Jeanette MacDonald and Gene Raymond!

It happened a third time ten days later. Attempting to "crash" the preview of "Les Miserables," they again arrived simultaneously, went into the theater together. Gene bent toward Jeanette.

"The columnists seem pretty insistent about how well we know each other," he whispered. "We really shouldn't make liars of them, so will you have dinner with me?"

In Philadelphia, where Jeanette was reared, nice

girls do not accept invitations from young men until they first have called on her at her home. So Jeanette asked him, and he accepted. And there began a grand comedy of errors.

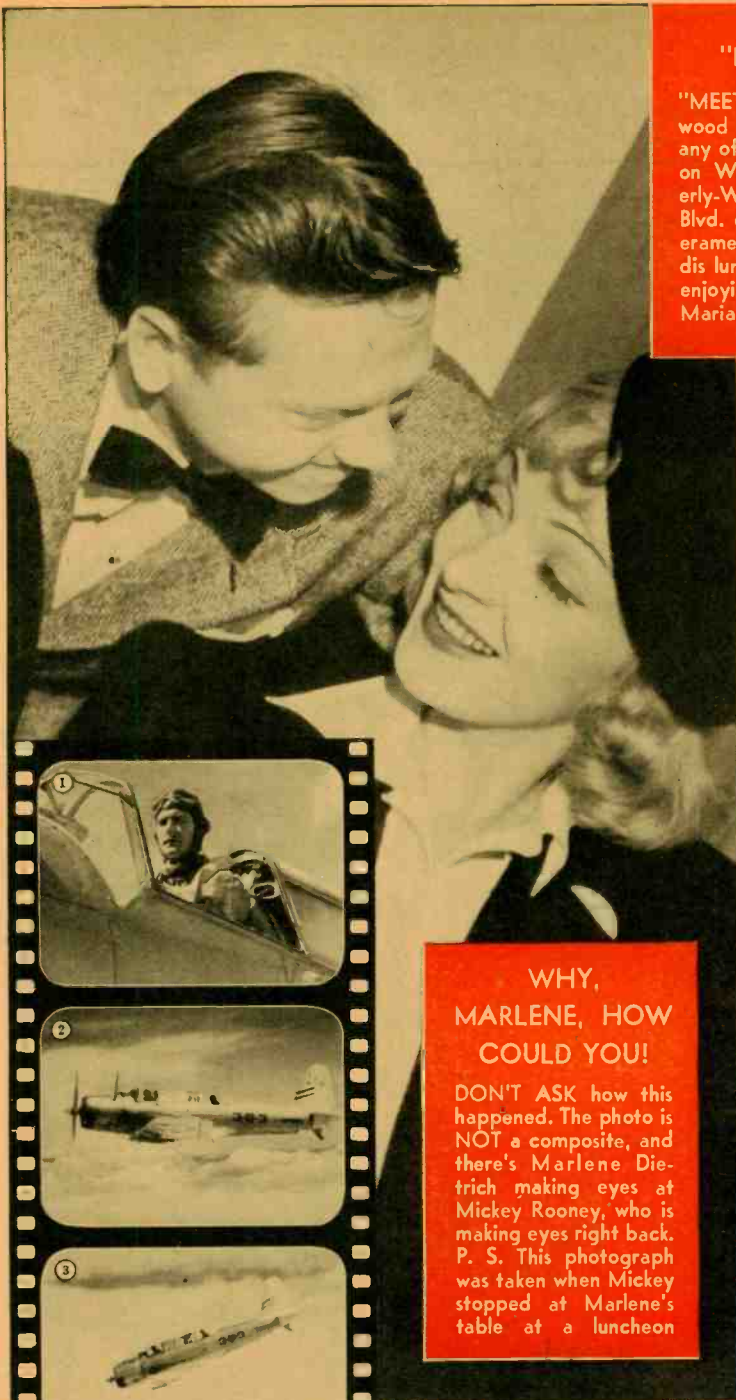
"Valley" Nears Cameras

HOLLYWOOD really is in a dither at the moment. When a certain Mr. Orson Welles left the ranks of radio for movies, he was given an extreme cold shoulder in the land of glamour girls and \$5,000-a-week salaries. After "Citizen Kane" was released, most of Hollywood rushed to offer its apologies, hailed Welles as the New Genius. Now the story gets funnier—the public doesn't seem overly interested in the New Genius or his picture. From the current issue of *Variety* these headlines are culled: "KANE \$7,000, 6 DAY BRODIE IN CHI," "KANE N. G. \$16,500 IN 2 SPOTS, QUILTS ONE HOUSE."

Now the City of Celluloid doesn't know what to think about the situation, probably will not draw the lesson it should from the first experience of Orson Welles with movie-making.

That lesson simply is this: "Citizen Kane," spectacular, startling, full of new ways to tell a movie story, is NOT really entertainment. Today the public wants romance, thrills, laughs.

As a result, while Hollywood talks of Mr. Welles and "Citizen Kane," the public will take to its heart a little

picture called "Million Dollar Baby." This picture, reviewed below, pretends to no message other than the simple one that love has nothing to do with money. In it, Priscilla Lane and Ronald Reagan, with the help of a great collection of troupers, romp merrily through a story that is highly

nonsensical but full of heart-warming laughs. The men behind this surprise epic are Jerry Wald and Richard Macaulay, who have only one idea—to give the public a double dose of amusement.

While we are on this subject of what constitutes genuine entertainment, your columnist wishes to point out that MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE reviews are as honest as its critics can make them and will continue to be just that. Recently a plan has been hatched whereby Hollywood reviewers will not be allowed to see pictures until just before they are sent to theaters. This means that only a very few publications can give the public an honest guide to pictures, because the great majority are printed six weeks in advance of the time they reach the public. This is not the case with MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE. No publication can bring picture news more quickly to its readers. No publication will be more honest in its judgment of movies.

This column wants to know what its readers think of the movies they are seeing. Your reactions will be placed squarely on the doorsteps of those who make movies—so don't be hesitant in saying what you think!

"Blood and Sand"

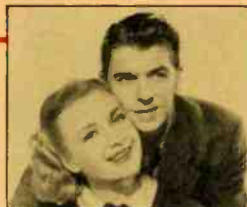

COLOR goes to town in this romantic tragedy of colorful Seville and Madrid, their bullfighters and gay ladies. The color is so good that the acting could be bad and you'd still like it.

But contrariwise, Tyrone Power and Linda Darnell, aided by a stellar supporting-cast, turn in fine acting jobs, perhaps their best to date.

"Blood and Sand" will be remembered by old-timers as one of the several Rudy Valentino silent pictures which made Rudy a screen idol man nineteen years ago. But the new version, with Power playing the Valentino part, cannot be compared to the old. Two new techniques, sound and color, have obliterated comparison. Perhaps Power is not as fiery a Gallardo as Valentino, nor Miss Hayworth as vampirish a Dona Sol as Nita Naldi. On the other hand, Power and his costumes are shown off more handsomely, and the Misses Hayworth and Darnell are more beautiful than their predecessors.

VERDICT: The bullfighters look so pretty in their thousand-dollar costumes that American wives will be coaxing their husbands to wear 'em. This picture has everything—love, infidelity, poverty and riches. Take the family.—E. P.

"Million Dollar Baby"

"BET-A-MILLION" GATES had nothing on May Robson when it came to tossing away the money. Miss Robson throws out a million dollars without batting an eye in "Million Dollar Baby."

Miss Robson, though, is not the million-dollar baby; that berth is reserved for Priscilla Lane, the young girl whose grandfather was cleaned of his dough by Miss Robson's father.

Miss Robson comes from Switzerland with her attorney, Jeffrey Lynn, finds that Priscilla, a demonstrator of kitchen gadgets in a department store, is the victim's only heir. The crusty old lady presses money on her. Priscilla loses—temporarily—her sweetheart, Ronald Reagan. Before the film is over, however, Priscilla has thrown away the money, gone back to Ronald Reagan—and Miss Robson knows there are some honest people.

VERDICT: There isn't a poor performance in the picture. Warners' "Million Dollar Baby" should be a three-million-dollar baby before it finishes running at the neighborhood theater. It's a smash hit for entertainment!—C. S.



"Shining Victory"

PEOPLE know that caviar is an expensive delicacy, but most of them figure that it is a bit too rich. "Shining Victory" may be too rich for the appetite of the average movie fan.

The plot concerns a research doctor, James Stephenson, who is a political exile from Hungary. Faced with the necessity of eating, Stephenson takes a small-paying doctor's position in the Scottish hospital of Montagu Love. Asking for an assistant, Stephenson gets one in the person of Geraldine Fitzgerald, whom he considers a silly, incompetent young woman. But Miss Fitzgerald makes herself invaluable to him.

After a year, during which his discoveries are perfected, Stephenson finds himself in love with his assistant. However, a jealous hospital secretary, in love with him, sets fire to Stephenson's laboratory. Miss Fitzgerald rushes into the fire, throws the records through a window, but she is burned to death. Stephenson's justification of her love for him provides an interesting-enough climax to the picture.

VERDICT: It is heavy, but if you like romance-dramas of the medical profession, you'll go for this one.—D. R.

tion, because of radio's great demands upon the Major's time. But with the resignation "Major Bowes' Capitol Family," a Sunday morning musical show heard since 1922, has left the air, leaving the Major even more time to concentrate on his Thursday night "Amateur Hour" and its touring units.

Comedian Moore Emotes

CHICAGO.—When "Club Matinee" comedian Garry Moore appeared as the lead in "The Camel's Back" on "Author's Playhouse" May 21, it was the first time the garrulous Garry had appeared on the networks as a dramatic star. But it was the second time his name had been linked dramatically with that of F. Scott Fitzgerald, who wrote the story from which the play was adapted. In 1935 Moore (then Garry Morfit) quit high school to collaborate with Fitzgerald in authoring a play. The play didn't get to the stage, but it gave Garry the taste of show business that led him into radio.

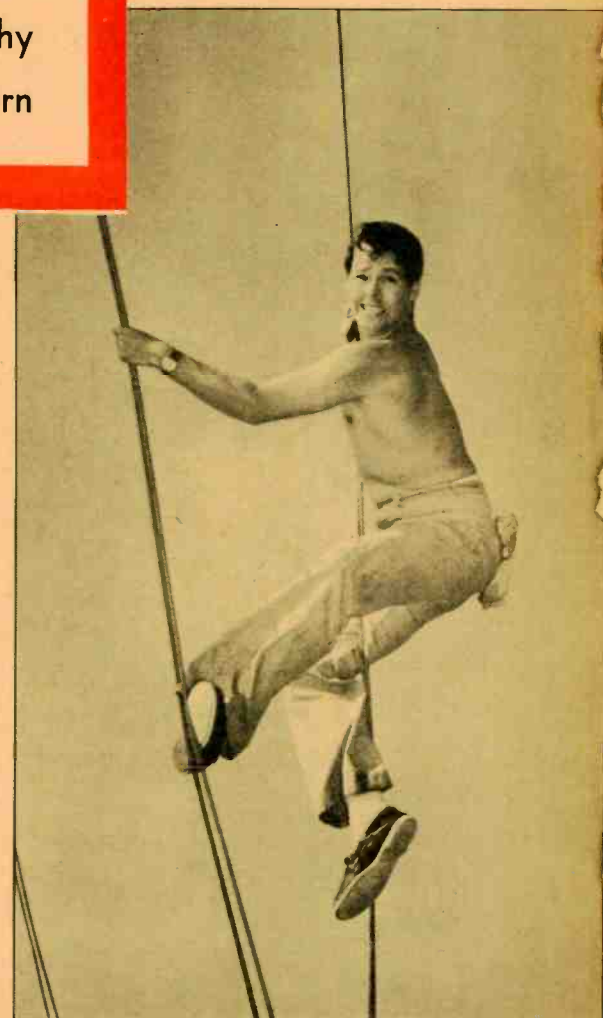

ACCORDING to the mail, many listeners have observed that there is a decided need for improvement in our radio newscasts.

The main cause for complaint is that the news broadcasts by many stations are the same, word for word, that these listeners have heard once or twice before during the day. Since two or more radio stations in direct competition with one another may subscribe to the same news wire service, it easily can be seen that this produces a situation wherein there is a continuous repetition. No listener will sit through a news broadcast which he has heard before. Hence, there is a definite need for the stations to edit, rewrite or inject originality in the news dispatches received from the wire services.

Fortunately for the network listeners, most network news broadcasts are handled more carefully and intelligently. NBC, for example, maintains a staff of twenty-eight men in its New York newsroom, who work in three eight-hour shifts. The news which they receive from the teletypes is rewritten by experts who know how to make it sound

colorful and different, yet have it retain all its accuracy. In preparing each newscast, their objective is to have it appear as a complete news broadcast. Great stress is laid upon the latest happenings. Previously reported events are brought up

to date with added details.

In this rewriting of each news broadcast with its stress upon the latest happenings, NBC is simply following a technique long used by newspapers which publish several editions throughout the day. In newspapers, less important news is deleted to make way for newer, fresher copy, while headline news which was published in an earlier edition is refreshed, further details being added to make the story more complete.

In contrast to the above highly specialized manner of arranging news broadcasts, many independent radio stations do little or no editing. Wire stories are simply torn off the teletype and read as they are by regular staff announcers. We suggest that radio stations and radio news editors examine their current methods of news presentation. Undoubtedly, they will find room for improvement.

Bing's Break

A few days later, but before the broadcast, the officer became a front-page hero when he performed a daring midair rescue of a parachutist whose chute had become tangled in the tail of the plane from which he had attempted to jump. Lowrey was hot news, and the program profited—through a stroke of Crosby luck.

The Draft's Lighter Side

NEW YORK.—When a MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE reporter asked Ezra Stone what was his present status in his local draft board, the young star of the "Aldrich Family" replied, "They're very much interested!" To the question as to when he expected to report for a physical examination, he answered, "I'm expecting to go down next week for an audition!"

McCarthy Wired

HOLLYWOOD.—Instead of seeing his dentist, Charlie McCarthy recently had a visit with a technician, who equipped his jaw with a mechanism that operates on the same principle as the locks of the Panama Canal. Charlie and his boss, Edgar Bergen, are making a movie, and Bergen had a technician install wiring in Charlie's mouth so the dummy could talk by remote control.

Automatic Audition

CHICAGO.—The little girl who appealingly sang "You Talk Too Much" as an extra feature of "Uncle Walter's Dog House" May 30, got that chance in a manner that proved she didn't talk too much! Bandleader Bob Strong was at a sandwich counter picking up his strength with a hamburger after a "Dog House" rehearsal. He dropped a nickel that wasn't working into the slot of one of those centralized record

machines. The operator's voice asked what record he wanted. Recognizing an appealing voice, Bob put in a request for the operator to sing "You Talk Too Much." Rules wouldn't permit that, but Strong looked her up at the record-playing headquarters, and a special audition, arranged with her boss, won a chance to sing on a network program for Virginia Powell, fifteen-year-old junior at Chicago's Sullivan High School.

Blondells Keep Straight

HOLLYWOOD.—Both Joan and her sister, Gloria Blondell, were on the "Lux Radio Theater" recently in "Model Wife." But although the two look alike, no one was confused. Reason: Gloria played a girl named Gloria; Joan played a girl named Joan.

New York.—The red hair of an NBC page-boy raised when, at the conclusion of a "Great Plays" drama, he found under a studio seat a package bearing the label of an ammunition company. He tiptoed with it to a bucket of water. Four days later NBC received a letter from a woman notifying them she had left a package containing an ornamental dog in the studio. "Vox Pop" Won't Pop

NEW YORK.—After its present thirteen-week cycle of programs is finished, "Vox Pop" leaves its current sponsorship, and quizzer Parks Johnson will take his first vacation in six years. Interest in the venerable question-and-answer show has not lagged, apparently, for there are definite bids from other prospective sponsors.

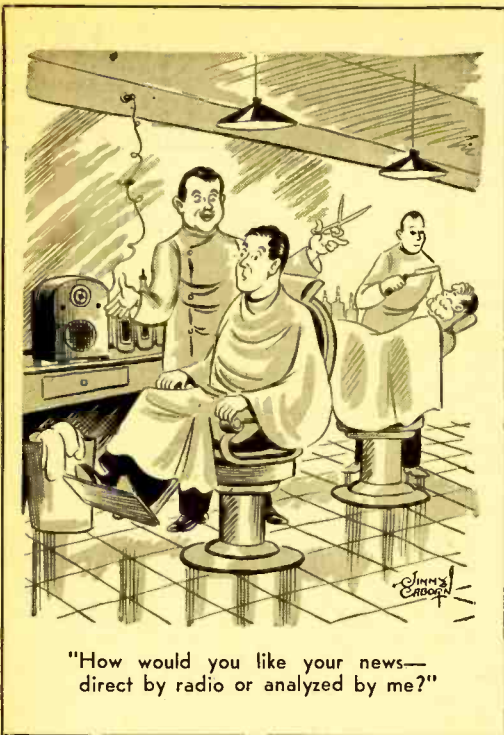



NBC is now providing a twenty-four-hour daily international broadcasting service. Programs to Europe and Latin America go out over the directive antennae of NBC's twin fifty-thousand-watt short-wave stations, WRCA and WNBI. The European service now begins at 11:00 p.m. CST. Eight hours of uninterrupted service is then provided in French, Spanish and Portuguese by section chiefs Fernand Auberjonois, Eli Canel and Fernando de Sa. The program content consists of late news, editorial comment on critical world affairs gathered from late editions of American newspapers, and music. The French portion occupies the first half of each hour. Spanish and Portuguese programs are each fifteen minutes long. At 9:00 a.m., New York time,

nese listeners in the early evening, originate in the San Francisco Chinatown radio studios right in the heart of the largest Chinese colony on the North American continent.

The general director of the programs is Arthur Wong, prominent businessman of Oakland, Calif., who in turn receives the enthusiastic cooperation of the Chinese Six Companies and their president, B. S. Fong, who has just returned to San Francisco from a flying visit to Chungking, China. Chinese operas and music are featured, while unbiased reports of world news are made in both Cantonese and Mandarin dialects. Special events such as the Chinese New Year and Rice Bowl celebrations will be described by roving Chinese-speaking reporters stationed with microphones wherever the crowds are gayest.

On opening night, cablegrams of cordial appreciation were received from Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and Lin Sen, president of the Chinese Republic. Both seemed to feel that the new programs would strengthen the close bond of friendship and goodwill that already prevails between the Chinese and American peoples.

Andorra on the Air

Andorra, tiny republic of picture book and musical comedy fame—a small semi-independent state lying in the Pyrenees Mountains on the Franco-Spanish border, is on the air. Identified as "Ici Radio Andorra," the new station, which has low power, operates on 11.67 megs daily at 5:30 a.m. CST. The language spoken is French.

Peeks at Short-Wave Personalities

Clem McCarthy's rapid-fire reports on the horse races at Belmont Park are now being recorded daily and repeated for racing fans during the American Hour, over international station WRCA (9.67), at 9:00 p.m. CST. Jean Sablon, recently returned from an extended South Amer-

ican tour, is now appearing nightly at New York's Versailles night-club. He can be heard singing the latest popular song hits over NBC station WRCA (9.67), Mondays and Thursdays at 5:15 p.m. CST. CBS' importation from Mexico, popular singing star Juan Arvizu, can now be heard Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 8:30 p.m. CST over New York station WCBX (11.83).

General Notes

CNR, "Radio Maroc," at Rabat, Morocco, is now broadcasting on a new frequency of 8.03 megs daily from approximately 1:45 to 5:00 p.m. CST. Former frequencies used by this station, namely, 12.83 and 11.94, are not now in use. Dr. Otto Koischwitz, former American professor, now one of Goebbels' stooges at the Berlin short-wave station, has a new stunt that he is pulling on his "College Hour," broadcast over DJD (11.77) and DZD (10.54), Thursdays at 7:45 p.m. CST. Each week now he is aiming his talk at some particular American of prominence. The one on May 22 was, for example, directed specifically to playwright Eugene O'Neill. COK (11.59) is putting on a sprightly two-hour show from the Cabaret Sans Souci in Havana, Cuba, nightly from 9:00 to 11:00 p.m. CST. The English announcer is my old friend Alec Kinghorn. Reports of reception are welcome and should be sent to Alec Kinghorn, Short-Wave Station COK, Sports Palace, Havana, Cuba. August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., writes that he is hearing a new unidentified French station on 11.85 megs daily from 10:10 to 10:30 p.m. CST. The interval signal is a ship's bell and both men and women announcers are utilized. The power of short-wave station VLR, Melbourne, Australia, is being upped to ten thousand watts, eventually to one hundred thousand watts. VLR (9.58) can be heard daily from 2:30 to 7:35 a.m. CST.

broadcasting in English begins over European beams, continuing until 2:00 p.m., at which time the regular afternoon hours in German, Italian and French commence. Broadcasts to Latin America, in Spanish and Portuguese, are sent out daily from 3:00 to 11:00 p.m. CST, with the exception of the American Hour, in English, which is broadcast from 9:00 to 10:00 p.m. CST. WRCA utilizes frequencies of 17.78 or 9.67 megs, while WNBI uses either 17.78 or 11.89 megs.

Slovakia Broadcasts to North America

Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., the first listener in this country to report hearing the new Slovakian short-wave station "Radio Bratislava" (9.525), at Bratislava, informs me that it broadcasts a special program to North America, with all announcements in English and Slovak, Mondays and Fridays from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. CST. According to reports subsequently received from other parts of the United States, "Radio Bratislava" is being heard with loud signals but with considerable interference caused by the German-controlled Paris station Y, which operates on 9.52 megs, or only five kilocycles below the new station in frequency.

"Chinese Good Neighbor Hour" a Hit

Inaugurated on April 19, the "Chinese Good Neighbor Hour" broadcast over General Electric station KGEI (9.67) in San Francisco daily from 11:00 to 3:00 a.m. CST, is already a leader in popularity with listeners in occupied China. 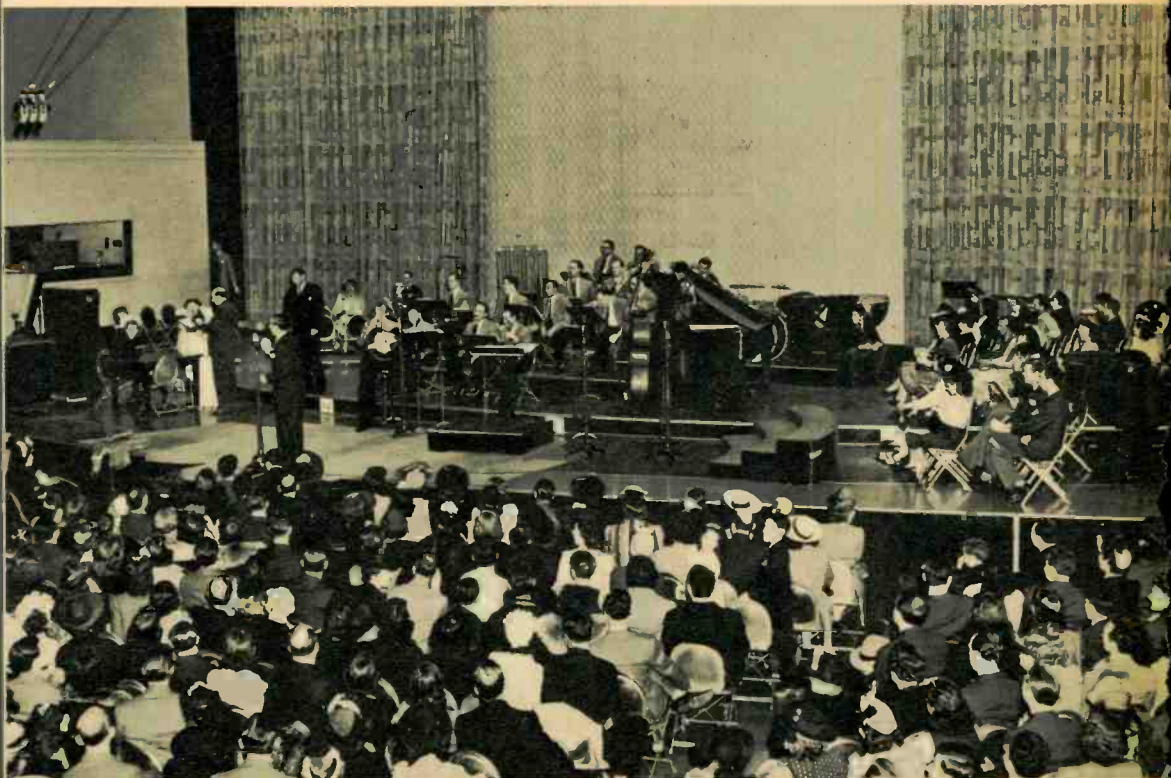
Eddie Cantor's

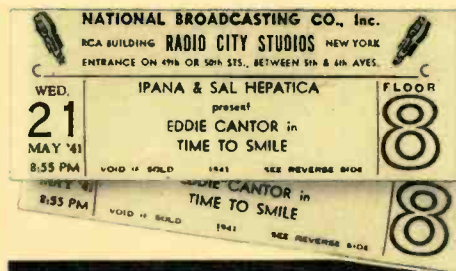

FROM time to time feminine readers have asked us to tell them just what it takes to become a singer with a name orchestra. Because we didn't know we hid ourselves over to Jimmy Dorsey and asked him. Here's what Jimmy thinks, and he ought to know for he's been hiring girl vocalists for almost a decade. A top-flight band-leader, according to Jimmy, takes a long chance with an unknown vocalist. "Way back before every band had a vocalist, brother Tommy and I used to work a lot of recording dates with Connie Boswell and Mildred Bailey. I had a good chance to find out what it took, technically, for a girl to make good with a band. But nowadays a girl really has to have it to break in. You can easily tell whether a girl has a voice, but it's her appeal that's hard to judge. She's not only got to please the men—which isn't so hard as you might imagine—but she has to please the women as well. Usually, when a girl comes out to sing and I hear the women whisper, 'Isn't she cute?' I hire the girl." So says Jimmy Dorsey, who has one of the prettiest and best-liked (by women) of the vocalovelines, Helen O'Connell.

Why Did It Happen?

Another thing that has been puzzling the writer is why the song "Intermezzo" suddenly became one of the top tunes of the day. Nobody in or out of the music industry can give a logical answer, and that includes the author, Heinz Provost, who wrote it for the motion picture by the same name. As you recall, the song created no great interest when the picture was shown in the country's theaters. But now, months later, it is sweeping the country and every band in the business wants to record it. Research shows that Marie Greene is responsible for giving it its start toward popularity. She recorded the tune for Columbia and within a week it was a best-seller. Was it her recording which gave the tune the necessary lift? If you can answer that you are better than I.

Bandata

The instrumental line-up for the Shep Fields band reveals that it is composed of ten saxophones and a rhythm section. This is a rather unorthodox arrangement, but it sounded great when he appeared on the Fitch "Bandwagon" program the other night . . . Benny Goodman is building a

twelve-room house outside Stamford, Conn. The estate will have a swimming-pool, tennis courts and a mountain stream. Talk is that Benny's parents will make their home there . . . Vincent Lopez is getting quite a reputation as a predictor of coming events. According to those who have followed his predictions, they have come true ninety-seven percent of the time . . . The premiere of Glen Gray's picture, "Time Out for Rhythm," will be held on Catalina Island sometime this summer. This is the first time that the island has had a premiere, although it has served as a locale for many motion pictures . . . Bing Crosby's "Birth of the Blues" will present close-ups of nine of America's most popular musicians. Eight of the musicians are Paul Whiteman, Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington, W. C. Handy, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey and Louis Armstrong. The ninth is the late George Gershwin, whose photograph will be used . . . 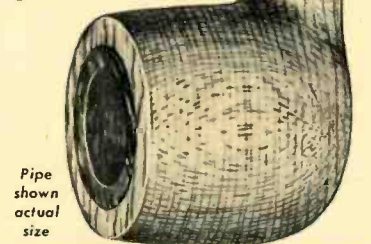

Raymond Gram Swing MBS NEWS COMMENTATOR LEADS A BUSY LIFE

"RAYMOND GRAM, Swing"—that's how some radio listings used to print it. Then came World War II and all America knew it should read Raymond Gram Swing, commentator. One of the world's biggest radio audiences knows the radio voice (Mon., Tues., Wed., Fri., MBS) of this unpretentious but authoritative news analyst. Honors have come by the dozens. Not so well known is his home life.

IN LIBRARY of old-fashioned Connecticut cottage Swing adds research to his news experience

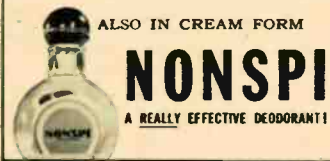

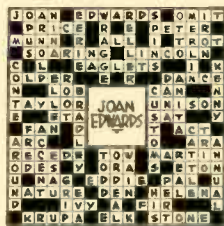
