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## The Editors' Note:

HOLLYWOOD PATRIOT number one is Jimmy Stewart, whose portrait by Jack Albin appears on this week's cover. So significant is the speech he made recently at the United Service Organization Conference in May that Movie-Radio Guide's editors take a vacation from editorial writing, reproduce Corporal James Stewart's speech below as an inspiration to all young Americans.



LADIES and gentlemen! In a month and a half of military service, one of the first things I learned was that an enlisted man in the United States Army should at all times listen very attentively, obey orders and, above all, do very little talking. So that as I get up here to attempt to make a speech I not only have stage fright to contend with [a thing which I will remember from my former profession] but also there is the new possibility of kitchen police for talking too much. However, I have been detailed to appear before you at the request of your committee to present the viewpoint of an enlisted man. I am well aware that there are many soldiers of much longer service than I who would be better qualified to give you this viewpoint. However, I do believe that I can tell you something about what the men of the new Army feel.

During my first week in the service, the first sergeant of my outfit came into the barracks, called all the rookies around him and gave us a little talk on military discipline, military courtesy and soldiering in general. This sergeant was a young fellow . . . He was as straight as a ramrod, and when he talked to you he looked you straight in the eye, and when he told us in a very simple and direct way about what was expected of us as soldiers and about our duty to our country and our flag, you knew that he meant what he said with all his might and heart and soul, and none of us will ever forget it . . .

This new Army is "Young America." It is right and just that they should be the ones selected to serve in the armed forces. The men of the new Army have made sacrifices to come into the service of their country. But these sacrifices are happily made. We have come to love the service and as a whole find it pleasant. We appreciate the effort on your part, United Service Organizations, to make our service more pleasant.

Every individual in this new Army has turned his face from his normal civil pursuits, his shop or farm or office, business or profession, whatever it may have been, and his eyes are now lifted toward an ideal—an ideal of service to his country. His heritage as an American has made him conscious of his sacred duty to his flag. And the instructions of the splendid staff of officers of the Army have made him conscious of what is expected of him as a soldier. So that in this new United States Army there exists a unity of purpose and thought and action which cannot and will not be broken. The men of the new Army are confident that this same unity will come to exist among other men and women of America whose service is just as necessary for defense as ours. We have a right to expect this. We need ships, airplanes, guns, munitions and coal with which to defend our country and our way of life.

Every American has a job to do—let's get on with it.

That sounded like a scoop, and I faded in a hurry. At the Mocambo, the boys on the lot warned me, "Hutton and Grant are inside, but don't think you can shoot them." So I took the camera out, got it ready and walked into the main dining-room, hoping to grab a shot before anyone would have a chance to say no pictures. Got about two yards inside the main room when the manager, Charlie Morrisou, stopped me, said they didn't want any pics—meaning G and H. He said they'd driven up and told him they'd come in if no one was allowed to take pictures. Naturally Charlie had to protect his guests, much as he would have liked to see the picture and publicity go out, as it would have been good publicity for the Mocambo.

After that I picked up my camera and took it out in front, and hid myself inside to take a close look at the Woolworth millions and Cary. They were on

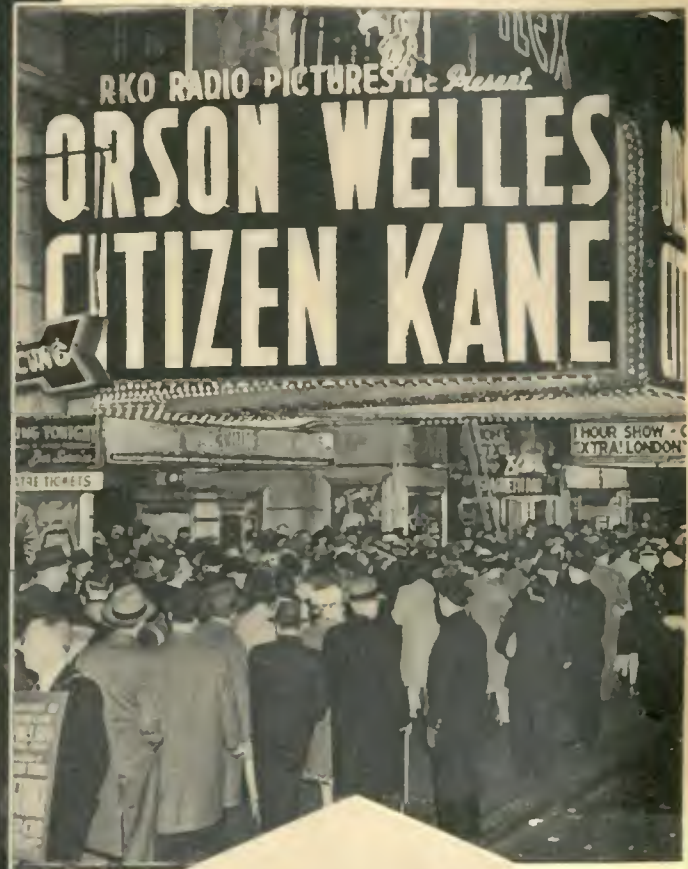
the floor dancing, and as they passed by I looked at her. She doesn't know me, so did not recognize me, but as they danced around, Cary suddenly saw me grinning broadly. He clutched her tightly, got a sickly grin on his face in return for mine. Guess he didn't want her to think he knew me well enough to be friendly. As they danced, they didn't talk much. Once in a while he'd push her a bit from him and both would look into the other's eyes—and smile. Returning to the tables, they sat down with their party, which included Mr. and Mrs. David O. Selznick plus an unidentified man and woman. Later they were joined by Johnny Farrow and Maureen O'Sullivan, who'd been at Ciro's.

Seeing there was no way to get them inside, I figured and figured how we could get pics of them as they left. There are only three exits from the Mocambo—the back door, the small door behind the bandstand and the front door. I saw the chauffeur, who had recognized me as a cameraman, go up and tip off the party. About that time Jules Buck, another photog, came by. I made a deal with Jules whereby if no other photographers showed up

we would cover separate exits and wait for them to come out, then split the pictures in case one of us was left at the wrong place. I figured it'd still be a scoop for MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE, because Jules' book doesn't compete with us. So we split up—and waited. Meanwhile, Barbara's chauffeur had taken the car around to the back entrance, covered the front door with Cary's coat. Hours of waiting in the cold and nothing happened. Bruce Bailey, my colleague, arrived and took over the front door, so we had all avenues of escape covered. Suddenly Barbara ran out with her two unidentified friends, got into their car and left, without Cary. We snapped her in the car. Cary stayed, had ham and eggs, then about an hour later left alone in another car—headed in the same direction Hutton had gone. We shot him as he got into the car. He didn't seem upset, just didn't pay any attention to us.—J. A.

# Citizen Welles: *What About His Private Life?*



## While Mobs Throng to See His Picture a Story Remains Untold

HOLLYWOOD PREDICTED Orson Welles would be a "flop" in producing "Citizen Kane," but now the film is showing everywhere and the public can see for itself whether there is, as rumor alleges, a comparison possible between Kane and the life of William Randolph Hearst, famed publisher. Movie-Radio Guide, considering Welles' own life, suspects he may have pulled a hoax equal to that of his famous "Martian War" broadcast. For reasons why that suspicion arises and may be justified, read the story below:

SO CERTAIN was Hollywood that "Citizen Kane" was in some particulars closely similar to the life of Hearst, a great American newspaper publisher, that the subject of whether Orson Welles would "dare" to release it was the cause of months of discussion. Yet the picture has been released and now the suspicion grows that if the story was about anybody at all, it could readily be about Orson Welles' favorite topic, Orson Welles. Like the character in his film, Orson's well-to-do father left an estate in trust to him. Orson at an early age was cheated of childhood by living with adults, and he did have a fondness for sleds, which is the first and last impression of the picture. It is said that Orson Welles often works as much as thirty-six hours at a stretch; so did Citizen Kane. Welles wrote his own opera critiques for a neighborhood paper at the age of nine. Welles was married to an actress, Virginia Nicholson, who played Trilby to his Svengali. Welles has a daughter named Christopher; his character Kane had a son named Charles. Like Kane, Welles clings to his friends, has men constantly around him who have been his associates for years. In Hollywood Welles has lived in fantastic mountainside homes. If anyone should force him to answer the truth about the basic idea of his picture he could readily say, "This is as much my life as it is yours!"

Considering the current personal side of Welles' life, there is no question but that he intends to wed Dolores Del Rio the moment her divorce decree from Cedric Gibbons becomes final on Jan. 17, 1942. Although Orson once dated Paulette Goddard and Norma Shearer, he has had eyes for no one but Del Rio since their romance first began several months ago.—C. S.

**P**UZZLE to both Hollywood producers and young players is the answer to the question: Just when can a boy or girl be seriously romantic without injuring their careers? It may be a good thing for Mickey that his movie roles have kept him a youngster, because he is impulsive, and if not wisely guided might have wed any one of a number of girls he has known simply by eloping to a state in which age requirements are not rigid.

One of Mickey's earliest dates was Judy (now Lana) Turner, whom he met while leading an orchestra at the Hollywood Knickerbocker Hotel. ## "UNDERGROUND" RESHOT TO REVEAL WILD LIGHT OF NAZI

WAR plopped itself right in the middle of Warners' "Underground." Now parts of it are being reshot to admit scenes of Rudolph Hess and his "desertion" of the Nazi cause. Originally "Underground" depicted desperate opposition of the Nazi regime based on activities of secret radio stations that told Germans the truth in spite of the Gestapo. The film tells how a returned soldier is fooled by his brother, who pretends to be a loyal Hitlerite yet fights Nazism. Rushing newsreels of Hess to Hollywood, putting writers on the story for long hours, Warner Bros. quickly completed a new twist involving Hess as a member of the cast. Unlike "Man Hunt," similarity to the most astounding news story of the year is deliberate. The pictures will reach the public not ten days apart.

# The Truth About Hollywood Stars and the Draft

To News Desk:

LEARNING the truth about Hollywood stars and the draft was easy. I thought I'd have a hard time getting it, but I was wrong. On receiving the assignment, I sought out Col. John Robenson, of the U. S. Army Eighth Corps Area. I convinced him I didn't want to write hokey, but facts, and that MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE wished to report the draft situation faithfully. He said:

"I'm proud of Hollywood. I say that because forty percent of all the boys called up for the draft are physically incapable of becoming soldiers. Four out of ten can't make the team! Yet from the ranks of movie stars, Hollywood chalks up only one deferment, Richard Fiske, because of a wife, or on the dotted line a dependent. Not because of health, mind you!"

## Stars Healthiest Men

So it seems that Hollywood movie actors are the healthiest men in the world! The Colonel explained the tail. It makes no exceptions for the Tyrone Powers, Errol Flynns, Orson Welleses or Robert Taylors. They are abiding by the same rules of the game. What many citizens fail to remember is that the call resolves itself into four distinct operations. First, a registrant's number comes up and he is sent a questionnaire. Second, a week or two later, he is given a physical examination. Third, based on questionnaire and examination, he is rated. If he is given Class 1A, then fourth, he will be inducted to camp at the next mobilization.

When their numbers came up, four actors went through this routine, received their 1A's, and are now in the Army. They are Jimmy Stewart, Jackie Coogan, Douglas Walton and Keith Douglas.

## What About Others?

British stars David Niven, Richard Greene and Laurence Olivier joined the British forces—infantry, tank corps and air force, respectively. Other American actors (among them Ronald Reagan and Bob Cummings) hold officers' commissions in the reserve forces of the Army, the Marines or the Navy.

Honorary mentions are deserved by Charles Boyer and Norman Kerry, who served in France till discharged, and Robert Montgomery who drove an American ambulance until France was defeated.

Burgess Meredith, Jimmy Stewart's pal, told me, "If it's got to be done, it's got to be done. But it ought to be done faster. If they want men for actual combat, I'm probably best for the cavalry."

## Orson Welles Will Go

Some press comments have chided that Orson Welles is a draft-dodger. I went into that carefully. It isn't true. Only now has he received his questionnaire. His physical examination is next. "If they want me," he said, "of course, I'll go."

Elsewhere on this page is a list of the better-known actors who fall within the age limits, together with their probable draft classifications. This is the record.

I'm glad to report there are no shirkers.—K. D.

THE United States Army isn't finicky about whom it lets fight, but it does have rigid standards of health. All selectees must pass strict physical examinations. Two ideal soldiers were pointed out at recruiting headquarters for the Eighth Corps Area, Los Angeles, Calif. One, Corporal Paul Armand Kary, is pictured at right. He isn't a Hollywood actor nor does he wish to be. He's just a good, average American boy whose characteristics make him what the U. S. Army considers the "ideal soldier." Corporal Kary is a blond with blue eyes (wears glasses for close work), stands five feet eleven inches, weighs 160 pounds and is twenty-three years old. He joined up January 3, 1941, is single, but has a girl. He is a high-school graduate and has had a year in junior college and another at business school. Close upon the heels of Martha Raye's marriage in May to Neal Lang came the announcement of Judy Garland's engagement to Dave Rose, ex of Miss Raye, but the statement was released by Judy's mother—not Judy—nor was the "surprise" held up till Judy's joint birthday party June 15 with Dave Rose as had been planned. WE ASKED for it and you certainly responded! As a result of the many letters received we have selected **MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE** readers' Pet Movie Peeve of the Week, and this is it—the subject of **DIVORCE** in pictures.

Whether movie writers and producers know it or not, divorce is not as common in most sections of the country as it is in the larger cities, particularly Hollywood. Because divorce is a common thing where movies are made, it is only natural that writers should think of it frequently as a basis for screen love-stories.

As readers of this column point out, the divorce theme is "cleaned up" at the end of the picture by bringing the couples happily together again. **BUD ABBOTT'S** and Lou Costello's new service epic, "In the Navy," is strictly corn, but we love corn. Like their "Buck Privates," it has all the rollicksome, streamlined Keystone cop tricks that make the movie-goer very, very happy and the exhibitor rich.

This time Dick Powell and Claire Dodd carry the romance theme.

Abbott and Costello are electrician and pastry cook at a naval base. Finally they get aboard a warship, practically wreck it when Abbott conspires with Costello to make him "captain" to impress the Andrews Sisters.

**VERDICT:** You'll need a good strong belt or foundation to keep from splitting your sides over this one. Warning to the Axis: If you think the U. S. Navy is conducted along these lines, you're as crazy as Abbott and Costello. —D. B. R.

**VERDICT:** All expectant selectees should see this just to learn how not to be a good soldier. Lamour really acts and looks swell in clothes, regardless. For laughs it's a champ. —E. P.

## RADIO VIEWS by Martin Lewis

SOME of you may recall that last September the White House issued a statement which said in effect that Wythe Williams, noted commentator, had been requested to take the initiative in organizing a series of radio broadcasts in which he and other radio commentators would discuss national defense—its effect upon the nation; its week-to-week progress and general necessity, in order that we Americans might maintain our way of life. Aware of Williams' efficient handling of his own radio program, and the nation-wide interest in all phases of national defense, I have often wondered why these broadcasts did not materialize.

After talking recently with practically all who were scheduled to take part in these broadcasts, I am more than ever convinced that it is an idea which should be put into action. I

know that the commentators in question are just as interested in appearing on the program as they were the day it was suggested. Walter Winchell, Lowell Thomas, Gabriel Heatter, Raymond Gram Swing and H. V. Kaltenborn are only a few of the commentators who agreed to participate. As for the three major networks, all of them were and are enthusiastic about the idea.

It has been asserted that the idea was shelved just before the past presidential election because in some quarters (we don't know which) the belief was expressed that it was to be a "political trick" of the Roosevelt administration. Williams himself said that he didn't want to be embroiled in political bickering—which is entirely understandable. However, the election is a thing of the past, yet the defense program radio idea hasn't been revived. Why?

If the time wasn't ripe last fall for this idea, it certainly seems so now. Never before in our history have so many conflicting statements been issued by military authorities, politicians and "prominent citizens." As I recall it, these broadcasts were to present to the people defense reports of

different government departments, during the course of which the nature of our defense work would be clarified. If there is anything the people need today it is a clarification of our defense picture. This radio program idea would have gone a long way toward bringing it about.

I wonder if Mr. Stephen Early, who issued the call for Mr. Williams to organize this program, wouldn't issue another report on the idea's future status. What with everybody willing to give of their time and talent, it seems a shame that nothing has been done. National defense is of vital concern to every American, and the reports which would have been made by Williams and company would certainly have been awaited by the public with eager interest.

### GENERAL

#### F. D. R. Breaks Record

WASHINGTON, D. C.—When President Roosevelt delivered his memorable address proclaiming an unlimited national emergency, he established a new all-time record for the number of listeners at their radios in the United States for any one broadcast. According to a survey made for CBS by a research firm, the audience embraced 65,650,000 persons—half the population of the country. This staggering figure broke the President's own record of 50,000,000 listeners, set when he spoke on national security December 29, 1940.

#### Not Enough Noise!

CAIRO, EGYPT.—When NBC's "Newsroom of the Air" attempted to contact Grant Parr, NBC observer in Cairo, they were told he hadn't showed up at the studio. This remark was heard over the air. Listeners in America were left to wonder and make dire conjecture as to the reason for the reporter's absence. Parr showed up at the studio several hours later and explained: "My alarm failed to awaken me for the first time in my life." Foreign reporters get used to noise.

### DEFENSE

#### Variety Show for U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—"Millions for Defense" is the title of the program to be produced by the Federal Government this summer in the spot donated by Fred Allen's sponsor. It will be a variety show featuring Al Goodman's orchestra and Ray Block's chorus, and will attempt to increase sales of defense bonds.

#### Army Costs Him \$25,000

HOLLYWOOD.—Tom Harmon, Michigan football hero of last season, was all set to make about \$25,000 this next year in motion pictures and on the air with Bing Crosby's aid. But he won't. The selectee army claimed him for a year's service.

#### Benny to Tour Camps

HOLLYWOOD.—Jack Benny, member and entertainer of the U. S. Navy in 1917-18, has requested his writers, Ed Beloin and Bill Morrow, to prepare special material for him to use in a series of appearances he expects to make at army camps and naval bases this summer.

#### "A. & A." Sketch to Hawaii

HOLLYWOOD.—"Amos 'n' Andy" are now heard, via short-wave relay across the Pacific, on Hawaiian CBS stations KGMB, Honolulu, and KHBC, Hilo. The comedy team's network was extended for the benefit of petitioning U. S. sailors and soldiers stationed on and at the islands.

#### Hope Stages Four Shows

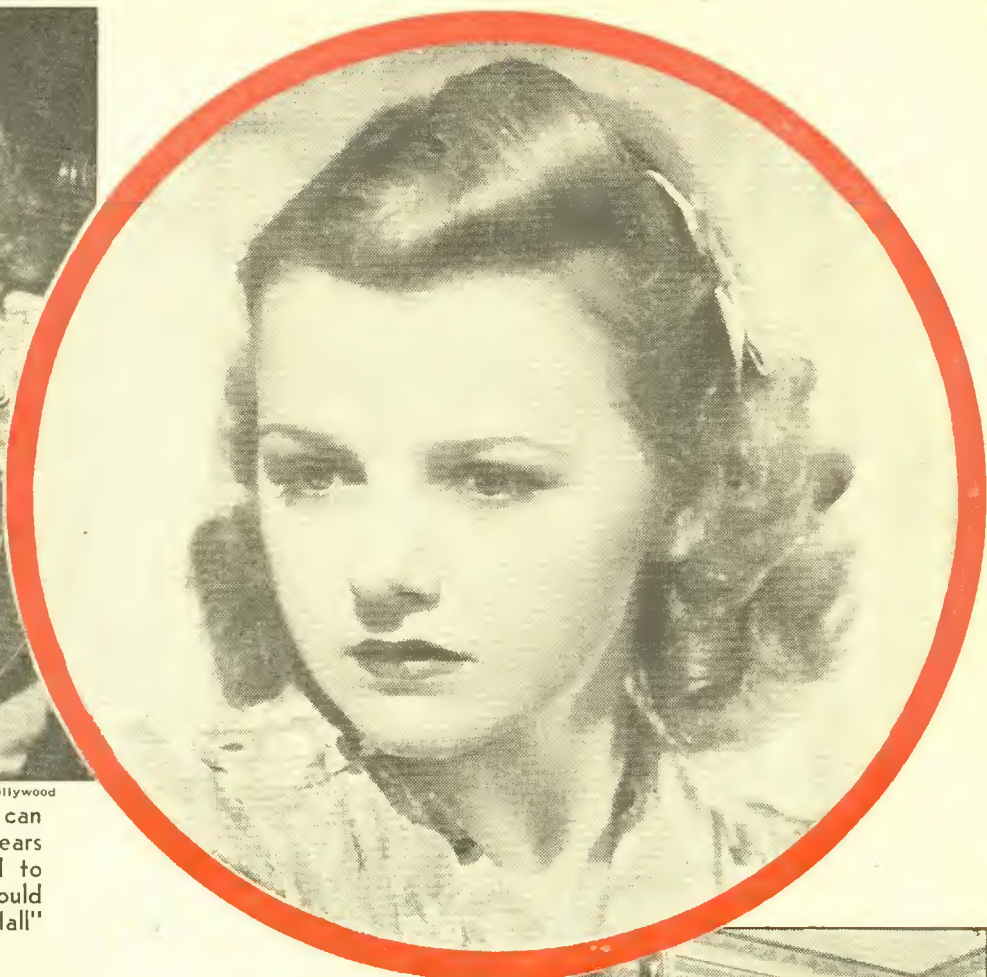

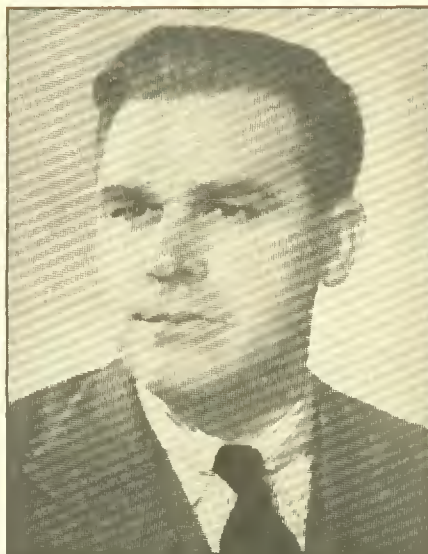
**B**LANKET coverage within all of the United States' twenty neighbor republics is now assured by CBS' new long-wave network to Latin America with the addition of affiliates in Haiti and Honduras. The sixty-six stations in the CBS Latin network will receive by short wave programs especially created for them in New York and in return will transmit programs to the United States for broadcast on the CBS Coast-to-Coast network.

Programs for rebroadcast in South and Central America are now sent out on an irregular basis over CBS international stations WCBX and WCAB. The CBS Latin chain will swing into full operation next fall when the two powerful new transmitters now under construction at Brentwood, Long Is-

### Brazil Increases Short-Wave Outlets

According to an official list received by Stephen A. Mann of Lakewood, Ohio, the following short-wave stations are at present active in Brazil: PRC5 (4.865), 2,000 watts, Belem, Para; PRF6 (4.895), 100 watts, Manaus, Amazonas; PRA8 (6.01), 5,000 watts, Recife, Pernambuco; PRE9 (6.105, 15.165), 5,000 watts, Fortaleza, Ceara; PRF5 (6.105, 9.500, 9.600, 10.22, 15.19), 12,000 watts, Rio de Janeiro, and PRE8 (9.505, 11.72, 17.85), 50,000 watts, Rio de Janeiro. The 50,000-watt transmitter is not yet in operation. Actually being heard by United States listeners are: PRC5 (4.865), PRA8 (6.01), PRF5 (10.22).

### Norwegian Mystery Station Blasts Hitler

Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., writes that an anti-Nazi station, located somewhere in Norway and operating on 10.07 megs, is blasting away at Hitler every day from 5:30 to 6:10 p.m. EDT. At times the station is almost completely blotted out by deliberately imposed interference. Reception from Norway is ordinarily none too good in this country, but LLH (9.65), located at Oslo, is being heard afternoons with fair signal strength up to the station's sign-off at 6:00 p.m. EDT. All stations in Norway are Nazi-controlled with the exception of this mystery voice.

### General Notes

SBU (9.535), Motala, Sweden, is being heard with strong signals from 5:17 to 5:35 p.m. EDT only, with the news in Italian and French. The station comes on the air with a music-box tune . . . XIRS (11.98), a new Italian-controlled station in Shanghai,

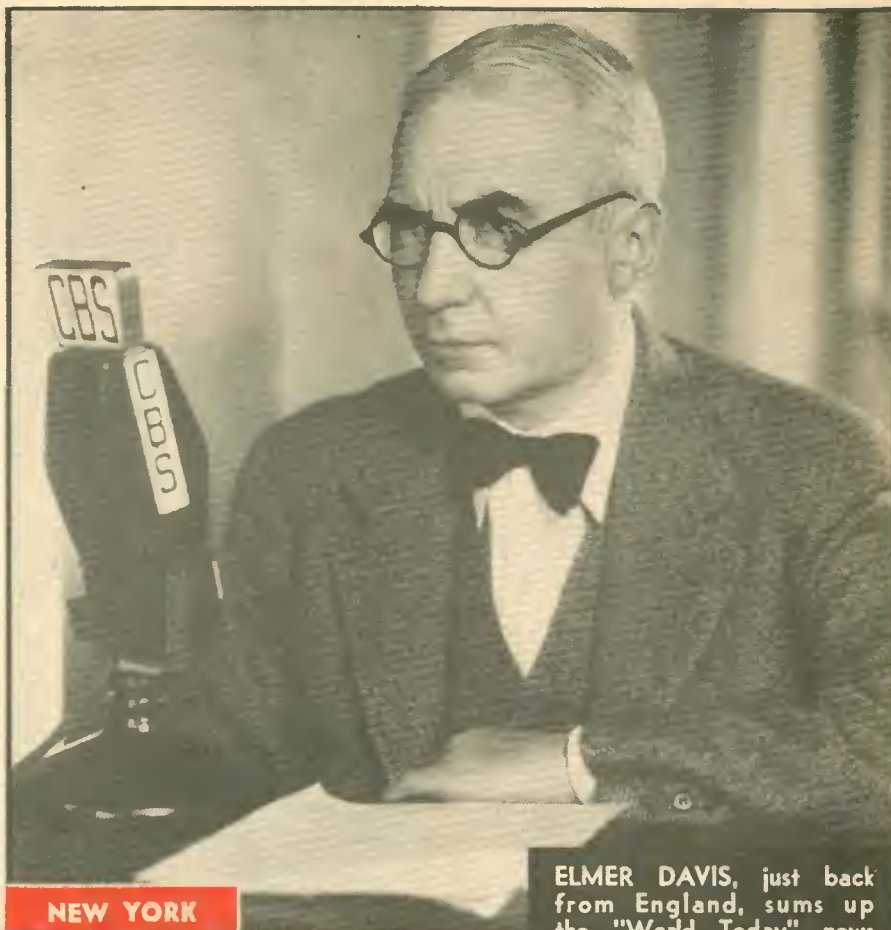
China, broadcasts daily from 8:00 to 8:45 a.m. EDT. The program includes news in Italian and English . . . HH3W, Port-au-Prince, Haiti, has shifted in frequency to 10.13 megs . . . WNBI, New York City, has been authorized to add a new frequency of 15.15 megs. WNBI operates at present on 17.78 and 11.89 megs . . . John F. Wilson of Wilmington, Delaware, reports that the following English news bulletins are now being broadcast from Berlin during the daytime: 8:30 a.m. over DJL (15.11) and DXT (15.23); 10:30 a.m. over DJL; 12:30 p.m. over DJB (15.20), DJA (9.56) and DXJ (7.24); 1:30 p.m. over DJB and DJA; 3:30 p.m. over DJA (9.56); 4:30 and 6:30 p.m. EDT over DZD (10.54) . . . The new Canadian short-wave station at Montreal has been testing evenings on 11.705 megs, using the call CBFY. The broadcaster ordinarily operates on 6.16 megs, using the call CBFW. Other authorized calls and frequencies are: CBFX (9.63) and CBFZ (15.19).

### Peeks at Short-Wave Personalities

Many listeners wondered why Cairo couldn't be raised recently on one of NBC's Sunday evening news round-ups. The answer is contained in the following radiogram received at the NBC newsroom: ALARM FAILED TO AWAKEN ME FOR THE FIRST TIME MY LIFE. WILL NEVER RISK THIS AGAIN. REGRET FULLEST. PARR . . . Among notables at the luncheon on June 2 when William S. Paley, president of CBS, awarded a trophy to Marshall H. Ensor of Olathe, Kansas, the outstanding radio amateur operator for 1940, were Buddy Rogers, Rear Admiral Waesche, Commandant of the U. S. Coast Guard, Rear Admiral Hooper of the U. S. Navy, and officers of the American Radio Relay League . . . Peter Grant, senior announcer over WLW-WLWO, Cincinnati, began his career as a lawyer but did not try his first "case" until he was cast as defense attorney in the "Famous Jury Trials" broadcast over those stations in 1935.

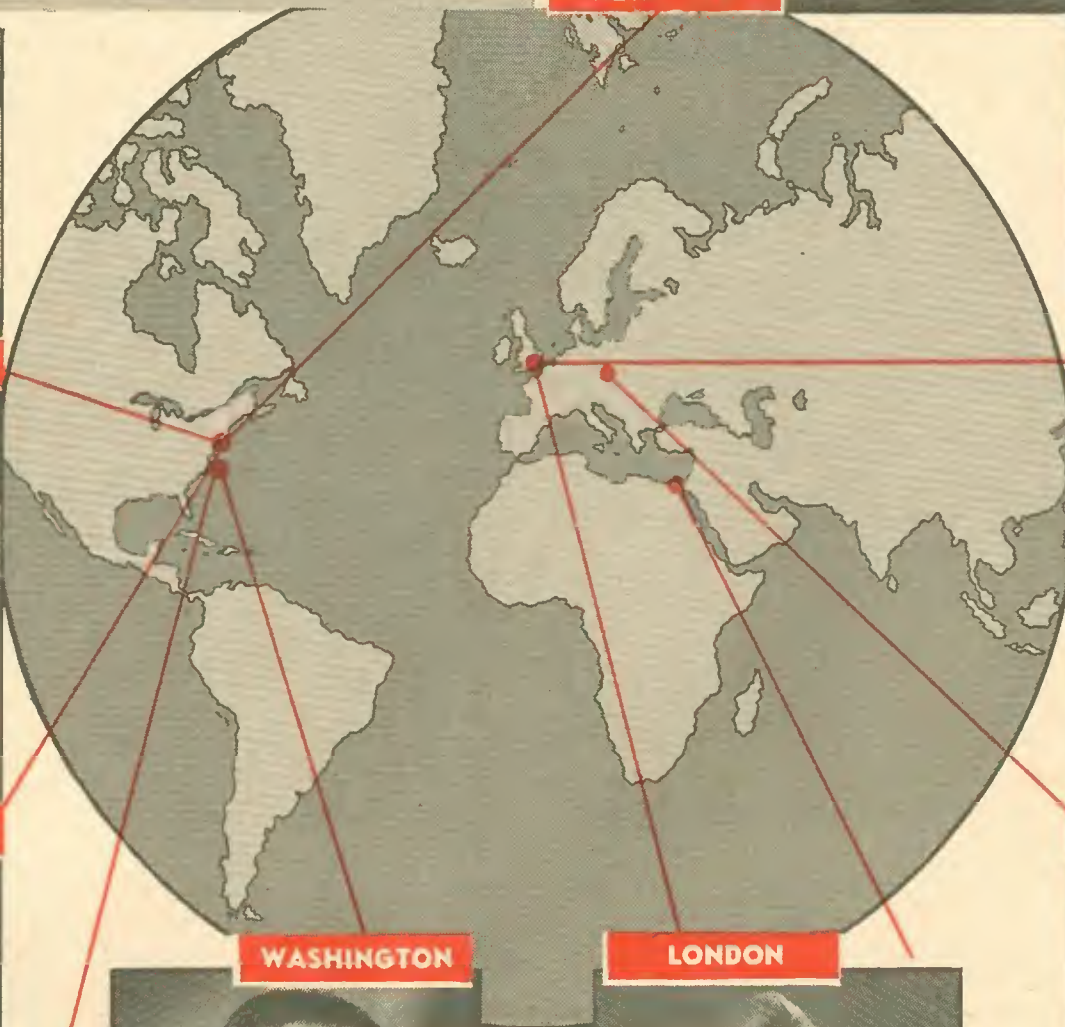

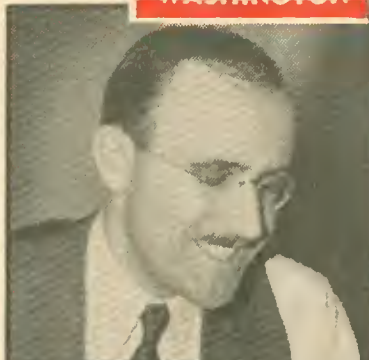

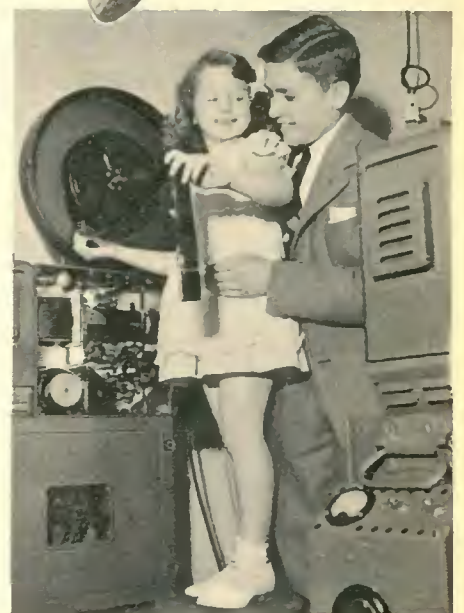

**L**ADIES, do you realize the hours spent in your aprons can be well put toward improving your glamour? You've probably hated those apron hours, when you make the beds and "wrestle" the dishes. You've probably said a hundred times, "When can I find time to pamper myself with personal care—when every minute has its duty?" Cheer up! Many a career girl would envy you the time you really have to devote to your appearance! Here's a program for you—and one which will keep you young and attractive while you putter about the house or listen to your favorite radio serial. So tie on your apron and go to work—ON YOURSELF. You've got the whole day!

Kiss the boys good-bye at the door, then upstairs you go to scrub off every trace of the lipstick and rouge you hurriedly applied this morning so you'd look awake and bright at the breakfast-table. A good scrubbing with a mild soap, Lux for instance, shouldn't take a fraction more than four minutes, and you'll gladly spare them before you start to make the beds. 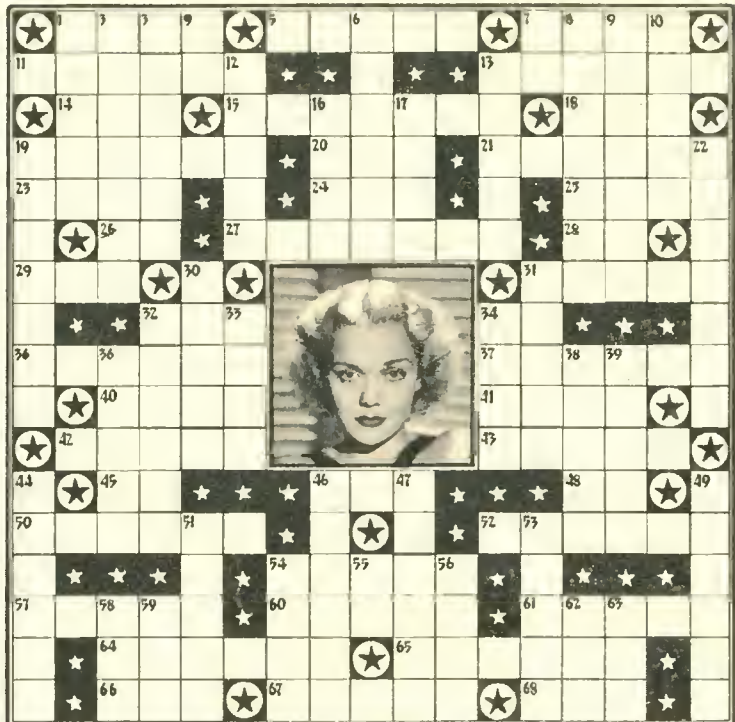

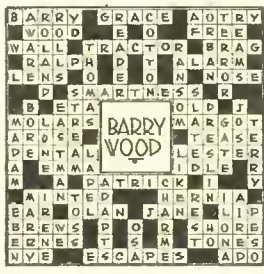
