RIGHT now this nation's business is war. Communiques, battle headlines and last-minute flashes of spectacular activity are the order of the day. That is as it should be. This is an honor which should be treasured by its recipients because it reflects so clearly how gracious "big people" can, if they choose, help "littler people" do their jobs. There's a heart-warming humaneness in the making of such a gesture—and in the deserving of it—which all of us must appreciate in times like these.

We liked particularly the closing of Hedda Hopper's editorial the day after the attack. Said sincere, flag-waving

Hedda:

"Maybe we WERE taken by surprise. Maybe we DID trust people too much. But now we've rolled up our sleeves and put on our fighting-pants. And when Uncle Sam really pulls up his suspenders, the snap will be heard clear 'round the world!"

Two days later, Miss Hopper said something else we like. "The worst treachery to our flag," observed Hedda, "is hysteria and fear. Let's continue to play golf, go to the movies, go on with our music. In other words, let's have complete confidence that our country will come out victorious. In this way we'll keep up morale, and morale as well as preparedness will fight off the enemy . . . For a nation that keeps on laughing is absolutely invincible—and that is Hollywood's job from now on."

There you are. Work hard, laugh hard, play hard and fight, fight, fight. Trust your leaders. Believe no second-

hand rumors or "information." Get your news direct from OFFICIAL sources over the radio. Not from AUTHORITATIVE quarters but from OFFICIAL SOURCES.

Remember that.

THERE'S ROMANCE to stir the most sentimental movie-goer in "H. M. Pulham, Esq." Hedy Lamarr and Robert Young make the story vibrant with emotion. But in addition, both enchanting Hedy and handsome Bob take long steps up the dramatic ladder with their characterizations

HEDY LAMARR becomes a great actress in "H. M. Pulham, Esq.," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's filming of the best-selling novel of the same title by J. P. Marquand. That's what she wants to be, of course. It was lucky for Hedy and her American-screen future that she has a face so bewitching that it makes men grip the arms of the theater seat and lean forward, and even induces women to grudgingly admit her beauty. But, however gratifying such a reputation may be, Hedy doesn't want to be simply the romantic adventuress who excited Charles Boyer and the male movie-goers in "Algiers," or simply the glamorous comedienne who scrapped with another girl and with Clark Gable in "Comrade X," or simply the glorified Ziegfeld girl in "Ziegfeld Girl"—any more than Dorothy Lamour wants to always sing in a sarong or Lana Turner wanted to perpetuate herself as a sweater model or Ann Sheridan is satisfied to be forever Annie the Oomph Girl.

In "H. M. Pulham, Esq." Hedy DOES take her longest step upward from the nautilus-shell of sheer feminine glamour. She loosens up more than ever before and turns in a grand performance. Naturally, it is primarily Robert Young's picture, since the main character is a man, and it marks an important milestone in Young's achievement. But Hedy, too, as the career girl of post-World War I years, does a convincing job that keeps pace with this great story. And the more credit to her that it's a wholly different type of role from anything she has done yet. Movie-goers may expect to be a little startled—but not at all disappointed—with the sight of beautiful Hedy wearing, but charmingly, the clothes and coiffures of twenty-five years ago. Her role may not win her an Oscar. But it will undoubtedly go a long way toward establishing her as the outstanding actress she yearns to be.

Expert Teaches LARAINE DAY

EACH Christmas some two million puppy dogs are given away to children and adults. But that is only the start of such a gift. To enjoy a dog companion it must be trained, and the owner must learn to be a good master.

Laraine Day, long famous on the screen as Dr. Kildare's nurse, Mary Lamont, and now making "China Caravan" for M-G-M, is a dog-lover, and as such she thought something should be done this holiday season to insure a good beginning for gift

puppies and their owners. To no less an authority than Carl Spitz, noted Hollywood dog-trainer for eighteen years, she went and explained her idea. The accompanying pictures demonstrate what Mr. Spitz and his Hollywood Dog Training School accomplish with a dog enrolled for its "grammar" and "high school" courses. However, Spitz calls it his "companionship training-course."

Hollywood dog-owners, such as Norma Shearer, Shirley Temple, Jane Withers, Lana Turner, Greer

Garson, Freddie Bartholomew and Jack Oakie—just to name a few of the celebrated patrons—swear by Carl Spitz and his methods.

But back to your gift dog. If Spitz had his way, he'd have you and your living-quarters checked first to see if you should own a dog, and, if so, the best kind for your personality, quarters and needs. He goes into that subject thoroughly in his very complete book, "Training Your Dog" (Marshall Jones Co., Boston, 1938).

How to Train YOUR DOG

Trainer Spitz' suggestions for keeping and caring for the new dog are significant. Keeping a dog on a cement floor will give it rheumatism. He recommends a doghouse and kennel in a convenient dry and shady place. Small dogs should have a "run yard," six by ten feet, surrounded by a five- or six-foot fence, with a twelve-inch board sunken at the base. Larger dogs need a six-by-twenty-foot enclosure. The dog should be taken out daily for two short walks or one long one.

Spend a little time with your dog in its kennel the first few days to make it acquainted with its water-bowl and house. Be sure you have complete equipment, consisting of a water-pan, food-pan, collar and license, leather leash, chain leash with swivel, and comb or pet brush.

Spitz does not believe it possible to "train" a small puppy; the best you can do is "guide" it for the first eight months. He emphasizes children are not good teachers; that children should approach a

sleeping dog cautiously lest the dog's instinct may be to snap on being suddenly awakened.

Always correct puppies gently; praise much whenever they do the right thing.

There you have a few valuable tips for your puppy's "kindergarten" course. When it grows to the ripe age of eight months, start its "grammar school" training. Spend a half-hour daily at training—and Spitz promises next Christmas will be even merrier! —E. P.

If the dog drops the object, he is then ordered to "Get it" and is made to do so until he learns to hold it



MOST DOGS will instinctively "speak" with sharp barks for food, so food is first used in association with command "Speak!" The raised finger, demonstrated by dog-trainer Spitz, is the signal used to coax movie dogs to speak



AN ADVANCED STEP is teaching the dog to jump. Part of the process is illustrated above, with Spitz giving commands and Miss Day helping along by coaxing Big Paw with the leash. Careful, patient teaching is required, but ultimately the dog should learn to leap over obstacles unleashed simply upon the command "Over!"

"HELLZAPOPPIN" STARS ALWAYS LIFE OF THE PARTY

THEY kept the "Hellzapoppin" set closed at Universal most all the time—especially when its stars, Olsen and Johnson, were there. They, meaning the studio executives, knew what they were doing. You see, there's never a dull moment when O. & J. go to "work." The first day on the lot Mischa Auer on a siren-equipped bicycle rolled onto their sound-stage and announced, "As mayor of Universal City, I want to welcome you and be the first to extend you the bird." He thrust at them a giant stuffed goose.

That, folks, was only the beginning. When asked how they intended to work the audience-participation phases of their hit Broadway show in the picture, O. & J. told a friend of the new O. & J. "secret invention." Directed to look through the gadget—which resembled a stereopticon—the friend came out of it richer by a shower bath and two grease-paint black eyes!

That's when Universal decided to lock O. & J. in their stage. The legal department thought it might be easier than settling suits. So then the cast and technical crew were all O. & J. had to work on. A tiny chorine one day suddenly discovered herself to be hurtling through space—and landing smack dab in a six-foot apple pie. The boys had decided to reverse the pie-throwing gag, throw the girl instead!

But everyone said it was swell working with Olsen and Johnson. Never a dull moment. Right after they left Hollywood to open their new Broadway show, "Sons o' Fun"—also a hit—a sudden increase in the reservations at the mental and rest-cure sanatoriums of California was reported to the Board of Health. Peculiar, yes?—E. P.

CRITICS' REPORT

REVIEW

"H. M. Pulham, Esq."

Cast: Robert Young, Hedy Lamarr, Ruth Hussey, Charles Coburn, Van Heflin and Bonita Granville. A Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production; directed by King Vidor. Screen play by Elizabeth Hill and King Vidor from the novel by John P. Marquand.

Type of Picture: This is the story of Harry Pulham's life and tells how fate, first in the form of World War I and next through his father's death, changed and recovered his destiny.

This Is the Story: Harry Pulham (Robert Young), scion of ultra-conservative Back Bay Boston stock, is raised and educated clear through Harvard according to the rote. Then the World War jerks him out of the rut, plunges him into heroism and discharges him in New York City in a new kind of world—progressive, wild and merry. Harry becomes an advertising-copy writer through his friend Bill King (Van Heflin) and meets his first enamorata—Marvin Myles (Hedy Lamarr), also employed by the agency. She falls deeply in love with the unusual, cut-and-dried Pulham; he is just as deeply infatuated with the modern, free-thinking, business female Marvin, whose code is as far removed from his as the two poles. Marvin wants him to give up Boston, stay in New York with her; Harry's father wishes him to return to Boston and take over the business. When Pulham, Sr., dies, the die is cast. Harry stays in Boston; Marvin loses him to Kay Motford (Ruth Hussey). Years later, Marvin meets Harry once more. They try to blow fire into the deadened embers of their romance, but it is no go. And the unhappy Pulham finds new happiness in his wife. (For a photo-story on "H. M. Pulham, Esq.," see pages 2-3.)

Verdict: This is a "One Man's Family" of the screen. It is superbly enacted by all; it is told in an unusual and most fascinating flash-back style. Strictly speaking, its implications are adult, yet there is nothing to offend a youngster.

"Oscars" and awards will still be given, but in some more informal way, to be announced by the board of governors sometime before the original date (February 26) set for the affair.

Film to Glorify DeMille

Cecil B. DeMille, who put the capital C in Colossal a la Hollywood, who invented the glamour girl and glorified the great American bathtub, will himself be glorified in a two-reeler to be made for Paramount's thirtieth anniversary celebration. Following DeMille's career from the day in 1912 when he, with Jesse Lasky and Sam Goldwyn, organized Lasky Feature Play Company, the short will present a cavalcade of DeMille productions.

Pat Morison Shows \$623,000 Pagoda

Between scenes of her currently making picture, "Mr. and Mrs. Cugat," Patricia Morison is arranging guest lists for a series of receptions at which Hollywood folk will view a solid silver scale-model Chinese pagoda smuggled out of China past Jap customs guards. Insured for \$623,000, the gleaming pagoda was shipped in small crates, weighs 1,300 pounds when assembled and is fifteen feet high. The pagoda will be used for benefits throughout the U. S.

Bitsy Ends Career

The Bud Abbotts are mourning the loss of their fox terrier, Bitsy, a male canine that died of old age. Bitsy was a virtual barometer of the Abbott and Costello team's fortunes. The name was Mrs. Betty Abbott's concoction. In burlesque at the time, the boys seemed to be getting nothing but small roles and Mrs. Abbott, casting about for a theatrical name for the dog, thought up "Bitsy" in honor of Bud and Lou's steady diet of bit parts. Bitsy was buried last week at the Los Angeles Pet Cemetery—and Bud and Lou have gone from bits to stardom!

Jane Wyman kissed Eddie Robinson so violently in their first "Larceny, Inc." scene that "Little Caesar" came up with a chipped tooth, had to take time out for a session with the dentist. RADIO BLACKOUT

WHAT IT MEANS

BY

MAJOR CURTIS MITCHELL

America has experienced its first radio blackout. Hurriedly and frantically, many stations were shut down, and there was much excitement, some confusion on the part of many listeners. Again *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* steps to the fore and keeps pace with the times in bringing fact to its readers by publishing this amazing article by Major Curtis Mitchell, former *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* editor now serving with the U. S. Army. In this story, "Radio Blackout—What It Means," Major Mitchell gives listeners first-hand information on what to do and what to expect when a radio blackout comes.

FINALLY, the blackout has come to American radio.

It came first at 6:13 p.m. on December 8, 1941, not long after Jap bombers had attacked Pearl Harbor and taught Americans that "it can happen here."

Today the radio blackout is a weapon of war. It is a weapon of deception. We must learn to use it quickly and expertly and the public must understand just what it means if the enemy is to be defeated. For these are days in which soldiers and civilians are both matched against the wits and striking power of an enemy. The fighting front reaches now from Manila to the chairside of every radio listener.

Why must radio stations stop broadcasting in times of danger? Any owner of a portable radio knows the answer. When a battery set with a self-contained aerial or wave magnet is playing, it may be turned about in the hand, north or south or east or west. In order to get the loudest possible signal. When the signal is loudest, the face or the back of the set is at right angles to the direction of the radio station. Thus, every portable radio set is a radio direction-finder. Airplanes, equipped with the most scientific military direction-finders, tune in a broadcasting station and ride the beam straight to the transmitter. Since all transmitters are located only a few miles from the cities they serve, the broadcast beam they put out paints a perfect highway across the heavens.

So stations must go off the air, and in the shortest time possible. Yet, so valuable is radio to civilian authorities, all needed broadcasting must be continued. News, instructions, even entertainment and music have a place in national defense.

A recent meeting in Washington between representatives of the War Department, the telephone services, the Air Force Interceptor Commands and the Federal Communications Commission resulted in a plan of action which has already been secretly transmitted to each station in the United States. Its details are military information and not publishable, but the experimental test on which the new plan was based is known.

That test was made during the military maneuvers on the eastern seacoast early in October. Then a huge net of air-raid watchers was flung along the Atlantic. Army bombers simulated a flight of attacking enemy planes. Watchers discovered them high in the sky approaching a military objective. That started the plan's operation.

First, a phone call went to what was called a filter center, which is simply a switchboard into which all news is brought and sorted. The filter center, having received information that planes are approaching, relayed the news to the military force which was charged with defense. In this case it was the Interceptor Command of the air forces of the United States Army.

At that moment Uncle Sam and his fighting men took charge. Three things happened immediately. First, radio stations were ordered off the air. Second, U. S. planes roared off runways and climbed to find and engage the enemy. Third, all the various forces of the Office of Civilian Defense—fire squads, nurses, demolition crews, blackout wardens—were called to their posts.

In October, with no enemies in the world, our defense maneuvers were sketchy and inconclusive. Since December 7 a lot of things are different, but it is likely that much the same plan is being used.

Of all that precedes a blackout, however, the listener need not be aware. He knows only that his radio no longer makes music or delivers the news.

What is he to do next?
Leave the radio on, and tuned to the same station. It may use up several hours of electricity but it is desirable that it be kept going, ready to receive signals when the raid is over.

WHEN the raid is over, don't expect news of what has happened or how much damage has been done. The enemy wants to know, too. How close did he come to his targets? Did he destroy his objectives? We must not tell him. Radio will not tell him!

Instead of news, information and instructions will probably be the main item of program content. The Office of Civilian Defense takes charge of a community, along with the local police officers and fire department, the moment the first bomb drops. Now fires started by incendiaries may be burning and additional squads of volunteer fire-fighters may be needed. The radio will summon them.

Those first radio blackouts on the West Coast were hurried and frantic affairs. A line north and south through a certain Idaho city had been designated as the blackout-zone limit. West of the line, all radio stations were ordered off the air. East of the line, radio stations were to broadcast their programs as usual.

One result was that a weak one-bulb station just inside the blackout zone went off dutifully and canceled all its programs. But it wasn't at all happy about it, because its rival, whose high-powered transmitter was just in the clear beyond the zone, continued to pump messages into the blue. Obviously, putting a weak station off the air and leaving a near-by powerful one in operation is a situation with which the Defense Communications Board will soon deal.

Another amusing episode occurred when a station manager in the northwest went off the air at the very first order. He remained quiet all that day and all the next. His listeners wondered at his caution, and he wondered at the Government's continued blackout. Finally the station manager became impatient and called headquarters to ask when it would be safe to go back on the air. The Government was forced to admit that he could have been broadcasting for the last forty-eight hours; they had simply forgotten all about him.

THIS blackout menace presents other problems. Suppose Hollywood and Los Angeles are ordered off the air while the Jack Benny program is being produced in Hollywood. Should the studio shut up and everyone run for shelters? The Benny program is sent along telephone wires to more than a hundred radio stations all over America. If the show goes on in Hollywood it will reach all that part of America that is not affected by the radio blackout. If it stops, many Americans will be alarmed and ugly rumors will spread. No one has settled yet just what should be done, but we may possibly borrow the technique of the British, in which musicians and actors play in the faint, blue glare of blackout torches and engineers monitor their instruments with tiny hand flashlights.

The radio blackout is old in Europe. England's families have learned to take it calmly. To us, as yet, the voice of warning is novel and almost unknown.

Its message, in cold type, is not frightening. Read it:

"At this time, ladies and gentlemen, radio station WWZZ is temporarily leaving the air in conformity with the National Defense Program. Keep your radio on so that upon resumption of our service we may bring you the latest information."

In sound, breaking into a symphony or a skit, it need not be much more alarming, for you may be certain that even as its sound dies in your loud-speaker another sound fills the sky in the distance. It will be the sound of our own Interceptor Command planes, manned by the best pilots in the world, roaring headlong into dark skies to find the enemy and defeat him.

BBC's Air-Raid-Precaution Programs to U. S. Stations

AIR-RAID-PRECAUTION programs based on war-time experience in English communities, educational for any civilian population which may face danger from enemy bombing, are being made available to radio stations throughout America for rebroadcast purposes by the BBC in London.

Two broadcasts already made were titled "When Air Raids Came to London" and "Rules for the Blackout." Daily hints on air-raid behavior are being included in "Radio Newsreel," one of the featured half-hour programs broadcast from Britain every evening at 10:30 p.m. EST over GSC (9.58) and GSL (6.11), and listeners throughout America are being invited to send in their questions to BBC, 620 Fifth Ave., New York, or to CBC, Toronto, Canada, on the subject of shelters, first aid, warning systems and other civilian-defense matters. These answers will be broadcast each Sunday at 4:30 p.m. EST over London stations GSC (9.58) and GRH (9.83) in the BBC program, "Answering You."

Mrs. Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, Jr., wife of the U. S. Ambassador to the exiled governments in London, is arranging to bring to the London microphone each week, beginning next Monday, January 5, at 10:45 a.m. EST over GSF (15.14) and GSV (17.81), speakers who will describe the part women are playing in civil defense, production and other branches of Britain's war effort. The programs are scheduled to reach American women at work in their homes.

All-Out War for U. S. Short Wave

United States International broadcasters are feeling acutely the effects of the war as they gear for all-out efforts in this crisis. Twenty-four-hour schedules are being maintained by most of the stations, with news bulletins in various foreign languages filling the hours between 1:00 and 6:00 a.m. EST.

Most of WRUL's news staff was taking a much-needed week-end rest and heard of the first Japanese attacks over their own home radios. Within an hour most of the news and announcing staff had gathered in the studio headquarters and was getting down to work on the most important job that radio has ever been called upon to do. Masses of news reports were streaming into the news room from the news services and more material was coming in from the office of the Coordinator of Information. For a while the staff was almost snowed under, but by careful sifting and editing, order was brought out of the first chaos. WRUL early in the war instituted a special transmission beamed to the Far East, with news, comment, background and music. WRUL has openly offered its services to the President and to the nation for any ser-

vice that it can perform to aid in the victorious prosecution of the war.

Guard International Transmitters

Grim-looking guards patrol the areas surrounding international transmitters. Sabotage will not be easy. Over at CBS in New York the twenty-three-story building that houses its studios and offices are on a full war-time basis with air-raid wardens, with alternates and assistants appointed for each of the twenty-three floors. Each employe has been instructed in procedure during air-raid alarms.

KGEI Reports to Orient

KGEI, out in San Francisco, most vitally important of our international outlets at this time because of its transmissions to the Far East and Australasia, has added several news

bulletins in additional oriental languages, including Mandarin and Cantonese; is serving as our first line of defense in keeping our citizens in Hawaii, the Philippines and Alaska, as well as in more remote points, informed as to latest developments in the Pacific war.

Reception Improving on 41-Meter Band

A couple of years ago a new band, the 41-meter band, including frequencies from 7.2 to 7.3 megs, was opened for international broadcast use. As these frequencies were also in use by phone and c.w. amateurs, satisfactory broadcast reception was out of the question. With the abrupt discontinuance of United States amateur activities as well as ham operations in other American countries, this band suddenly sprang into prominence.

RECOGNIZING the vastly increased importance of short wave to listeners now that the U. S. is fighting a total war, Movie-Radio Guide last week inaugurated a restyled, enlarged and improved short-wave department. Improvements to make short-wave listening easier, more profitable include:

1. Schedule of all war news broadcasts in English.
2. Guide to all transmissions beamed on North America.
3. More general short-wave program listings.
4. More tips for short-wave tuners-in.
5. More background color and comment.

Don't Waste Postage on Reports to Axis Stations!

With most of the interference now absent, reception ranging from fair to excellent is being afforded by the stations broadcasting on this band. DXJ (7.24), Berlin, for example, is being heard daily from 4:50 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. EST with louder signals than any of the seven other Berlin outlets for the North American service. London radio, which already has more frequencies assigned to its use than any short-wave station in the world, has recently added ten additional. (Several of these have already been put into operation.) The list follows: GRD (15.45), GRE (15.375), GRF (12.095), GRG (11.68), GRH (9.825), GRI (9.415), GRJ (7.32), GRK (7.185), GRM (7.125), GRN (6.195), GRO (6.180), GSU (7.26).

Far Your Notebook

On December 12 the Post Office Department suspended mail service from the United States to Germany, Italy and all lands under their control. So save your postage in sending radio reports to any countries in Europe with the exception of Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey and Russia . . . According to Stephen Mann of Dartmouth, a verification from PZX (11.516), 750 watts, Gouvernements Radio Dienst, Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana (site of new U. S. Army base), states that the station broadcasts Mondays and Thursdays from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. and on Saturdays from 5:40 to 6:40 p.m. EST.

Pacific War Arena

According to August Balbi of Los Angeles, two new Tokyo frequencies are currently in use: 9.605 megs daily to 10:00 a.m., and 6.02 megs irregularly to 10:00 a.m. EST . . . KZRF (6.14), Manila, Philippines, is being heard with much stronger signals now on the West Coast daily to 10:30 a.m. EST.

BLACKOUT STATIONS

As a special war precaution, radio stations in some cities are periodically silenced. At such times you will find it possible to tune in high powered stations in other parts of the country that you ordinarily could not get. These stations will bring you newscasts and special announcements as well as many of the network broadcasts normally carried by stations in your own vicinity. Therefore, when the stations you usually listen to are off the air, try tuning to the nearest 50,000-watt station outside of the precaution zone. Tea scarcity cancels Helen Hayes show; Bill of Rights show has record audience

WAR SIDELIGHTS

Dramatic Casualty

NEW YORK.—"Helen Hayes Theater," one of radio's most popular dramatic programs, has been discontinued because of an expected shortage of tea, the sponsor's product.

Mr. Morgenthau Liked It

HOLLYWOOD.—Immediately after the President finished his war address to the public December 9, announcer Truman Bradley came on the air to introduce the Red Skelton show and delivered a warm appeal to the listening audience in the interests of the national cause. An official of the United States Treasury later called the sponsor to compliment the talk and to say that Secretary Morgenthau himself had been listening. The stirring appeal was written by Tom Wallace, who takes the part of Uncle Walter on the "Dog House" show, sponsored by the same firm that pays for the Skelton program.

The Japs Didn't Need It

NEW YORK.—Because of the war,

radio station WHN decided to expand its news facilities. The Associated Press, however, informed the station that tickers were scarce and it might take some time to locate one. After several days the press service called to tell the station officials a ticker had been found. They had just removed it from the Japanese embassy!

Ace Bond Salesman

NEW YORK.—As the Voice of the Treasury, Larry Elliott delivers personal messages from Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau on the following programs: "Telephone Hour," "Hobby Lobby," "Metropolitan Auditions of the Air" and "Manhattan Merry-Go-Round." He is also announcer of the official Treasury Department programs, "America Preferred," "For America We Sing" and "Treasury Hour."

Blackout Rehearsals

HOLLYWOOD.—West Coast blackouts have upset radio rehearsal-schedules for Hollywood's radio shows. "Screen Guild Theater" and "Silver Theater" are examples. Most film stars work at

film studios in the daytime and confine radio rehearsals to the evening hours. But not when blackouts threaten, for automobile traffic is at a standstill, and stars could be marooned at radio studios all night. Film studios are co-operating, however, and "Screen Guild Theater" and "Silver Theater" rehearsals are now held in the daytime, on Friday morning and Saturday afternoon.

Sailor Nagel

HOLLYWOOD.—Most listeners to the CBS "Silver Theater" program know director Conrad Nagel as a former matinee idol of the screen. But not many know he served as a "gob" in the first World War. He enlisted in the Navy after the United States entered that conflict and he saw active duty as a sailor on the U. S. S. *Seattle*. Later he was assigned to the admiral's staff. Nagel still has his leading-man figure, for he put on his old uniform for a special occasion recently and it fitted him perfectly.

To the Marines

HOLLYWOOD.—Those valiant Marines

who have been holding America's Wake Island against furious Japanese assaults have long been fans of Tom Hanlon's "Midnight Merry-Go-Round." Recently Hanlon received a letter, dated before the war began, requesting their favorite song. The song was featured on the broadcast three days after war was declared, with a special tribute to the gallant little garrison. The song was "Tell It to the Marines."

OFFSTAGE

Bud's Bad Bicycle

CHICAGO.—Young Bud Barton has all sorts of adventures with his automobile in the serial "The Bartons." But Dick Holland, who plays the title role in the sketch, had a recent traffic adventure of his own which didn't involve an automobile. He absently-mindedly ran a red light while riding home on his bicycle in Evanston, Ill., noted for its strict traffic regulations. Dick got a ticket and appeared in court, where he watched an instructive motion picture and got a mild lecture and a set of rules for bicyclists.

A Fight Announcer Works

NEW YORK.—When Joe Louis and Buddy Baer wind up their heavy-weight fight the night of January 9, they won't be the only exhausted persons in or around the ring. Take it from MBS fight announcer Don Dunphy, who has been describing main bouts for Coast-to-Coast listeners the past few months—the announcer takes some punishment, too. For a month before a fight event he is working. There are visits for background material to training-camps, offices of boxing-officials, the rendezvous of sports writers. There are late hours of absorbing background information. There are phone calls and interviews and technical arrangements, all done in addition to other regular broadcasts daily. Then there's the broadcast itself, which must be colorful, accurate and rapid-fire. Yes, indeed, the fight announcer works!

A Line for a Line

HOLLYWOOD.—When the first rehearsal of a recent Burns and Allen program was concluded, Gracie Allen said, "I'm going to make one addition to the script—and it's a 'must.' We mentioned our boy Ronnie in last week's show, and there's been no living with his sister, Sandra, since then. I'm going to write Sandra into the script right now." If you heard the broadcast, you may remember that the absent-minded neighbor, Ethel Wilcox, addressed Gracie as "Sandra." All is quiet in the Burns household.

Abbott-Costello Record

HOLLYWOOD.—Those who have heard the master record of Abbott and Costello's new recording, "Hey, Abbott! Hey, Costello!" are enthusiastic about the novel platter. It is a condensed collection of the team's argumentative routines delivered against the background of a catchy tune, with interpolation by a quartet urging listeners to "Laugh, laugh, laugh! There's lots to be thankful for."

UPTON CLOSE

"THE break with Japan must and will come," said Upton Close, NBC's Far East consultant and commentator. And come it did. Several days before Pearl Harbor, Upton Close was preparing to Clipper to points east to be "up close" to the war he knew would break. ("Up close" is the code identification phrase from which his name derives, his birth name being Josef Washington Hill.) But now Upton Close is doing a job here at home. After twenty years of intimate contact with the Orient, he speaks authoritatively on a subject Americans suddenly have become vitally concerned about. The World War years found him in China serving as U. S. intelligence officer, later as expert observer for U. S. newspapers and magazines. He is a scholar, author of ten books, former professor of Asiatic culture at the University of Washington. In these pictures Upton Close is seen at his orientalish home in Valhalla, N. Y. Soon he may be in the middle of the Far East holocaust—and there he will serve America best. —J. C.
