That can't go on. So—

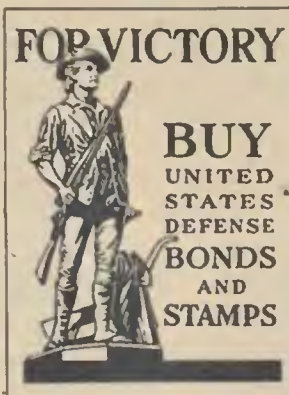
Mary Martin, the Paramount thrush, already has moved into Hollywood from stylish Bel-Air to be nearer studio. She has taken a simple two-bedroom house.

## WALTER WINCHELL He's in the Navy Now!

**C**RITICS of Walter Winchell are after him again. As usual, the chant is why doesn't Winchell do this? Why doesn't the Navy do that? How come this? How come that? And why? The idea, as usual, seems to be to try to get him off the air.

As broadcasting's stormiest petrel, two-fisted and rapier-tongued Winchell does a pretty good job of defending himself, and this publication is not one to take sides in a personal controversy.

The only difficulty is that the current controversy raging about Winchell (whether he's in the Navy or isn't, on active duty or not, and what he, Winchell, as well as the United States Navy, is doing or not doing) has ceased pretty much to be a personal thing and has become an issue.

Here are a few facts:

Walter Winchell is a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve.

Walter Winchell, by his own statement, has applied for active duty. It's no secret in the radio world that he has advised his sponsor to have a substitute ready to take over his broadcast on practically a moment's notice. The Navy Department will make no

official announcement as to its future plans for Winchell. Since this is war, Winchell knows no more about its plans for him than anyone else.

Meantime:

Winchell was the spark-plug for the Navy relief benefit held in Madison Square Garden on March 10. That benefit raised \$160,000, which will be used to aid Navy men's families which may find themselves in need.

On Saturday, March 28, another benefit was held in Miami. Winchell was again on deck.

Following Miami, there is talk of another gigantic Navy relief benefit to be held in Chicago. Should this event be staged, Winchell undoubtedly will have a hand in it. Another may be held in San Francisco.

As a result, hundreds of thousands of dollars will accrue to Navy relief.

This is war. Each man must serve the best he can. Walter Winchell, on active or inactive duty, in uniform or out of uniform, on the radio or off, is in the Navy!

Let's leave personal opinions out of this. Should a man's throat be cut by red tape for doing the job he's best fitted to do—to help us win this war?

## The BARBOUR FAMILY As Seen by Neighbor Mrs. Carlton E. Morse — Part 2

This is the second instalment of Mrs. Carlton Morse's fictionalized version of the radio serial "One Man's Family," heard every Sunday night at 8:30 EWT over NBC, under the sponsorship of Tender Leaf Tea.

In last week's instalment, "Neighbor" Mrs. Morse introduced readers to the Barbour family: Eldest son Paul, suave, charming veteran of the last World War, who will carry a can as a result of that war all his life; Hazel, a beautiful girl, obviously her dad's favorite; Clifford and Claudia, the twins; Jack, aged fourteen, and Father and Mother Barbour, who are gravely concerned about Claudia, left a rich widow with one child, Joan. Although the family never aired their problems to the neighbors, it was plainly evident that there was trouble at the Barbour home after Claudia took her daughter and went off to Europe in a huff, accompanied by Paul's old friend and confidante, Beth Holly. When news-

papers began to print gossip gleaned from Claudia's letters to friends about a Captain Nicholas Lacey, British nobleman, Mr. and Mrs. Barbour decided on a bold step. Now go on with the story.—The Editors.

NOT many weeks of Claudia's absence went by until Father and Mother Barbour went to Europe with no other purpose in mind than to persuade her to return home. Her absence, her estrangement from the family, was one of the deepest wounds her father had ever had to bear.

The months went on, with Claudia making no effort to reach an understanding with the family, and every week brought greater despair to Father Barbour. Then he, and Mother Barbour decided that the main thing was Claudia. Claudia with money if she insisted on keeping her fortune! Claudia with her foolish restlessness too, if that was necessary. They were willing to accept anything if only peace could be made between them all once more. Perhaps if they went to their daughter and with love asked her to return, she might do so. It was well worth trying! And so the trip to Europe.

The elder Barbours saw Europe and found their daughter! The generous, loving gesture of her father and mother in coming to her melted the last bit of uncertainty and revolt. Once she had seen them and talked with them she was fired with eagerness to return home. Claudia, too, made her offering toward peace of mind for her parents. She had found

her love. He was Captain Nicholas Lacey, a young Englishman on leave from his duties in the Indian army. He was fine and steady, and Father and Mother Barbour approved of him, and waited eagerly for their marriage. He would follow them to America shortly! It was three happy and expectant people who stood against the railing of the great liner as she hove slowly through the Golden Gate and home again. All the Barbours were there to meet them, including Hazel's young twin sons, Hank and Pinky, who were wild to tell Aunt Claudia about their ranch and all its wonders.

Hazel and Bill and their sons had settled at the Herbert ranch down the peninsula and they were busy building a home and a fine dairy herd. Such a place was sheer heaven, of course, for two small boys. Life was interesting and full of happiness for the young and growing family until suddenly something terrible happened. Bill Herbert, the steady, salt-of-the-earth husband, remained away from home all night twice in six weeks. He told Hazel "business," but his eyes told her that wasn't true.

No one knew but Paul. Desperately, Hazel turned to him for help. The whole thing was so strange, so shocking. She needed someone to reassure her, to make her know her suspicions and fears could not possibly be true. Paul did what he could to comfort and help his sister, but Bill's actions grew more puzzling as time went on. Bill's sudden drawing into himself hit Paul so hard he could find nothing to offer as explanation. He was only able to

say, "Wait, Hazel. There is something we don't understand here. This is not Bill's way of doing things."

They waited, doing what they could to keep their secret from the family. Then, when that could no longer be done, Doctor Thompson was consulted. Doctor Thompson had brought all the Barbour children into the world and loved them as his own. Hazel's grief was a painful thing for him. Medically he sought a solution to the mystery. And thanks to his efforts it wasn't long until the weeks of anxiety and doubt were dispelled. At last the Barbour family knew the truth, which was that Bill had brought his share of ugliness home from the war. Amnesia! The kind of amnesia that would come and go. One day a normal mind, the next blankness.

From then on this was to be a shadow over Hazel's bright happiness. Never would she feel completely secure, though there was always the hope, the prayer, that this frightening thing would not return to steal Bill again from the wife and children he cherished so greatly. Hazel's good sense, her courage and the long and restful trip prescribed by Doctor Thompson were the greatest factors in what promised to be a complete recovery for Bill. Slowly life at the ranch resumed its even way and went on to a new contentment, and in 1937 a daughter, Margaret, was born to Hazel and Bill.

Clifford's various girls had not been getting the usual share of family attention during these months. There had been innumerable girls in Clif-

ford's life, a seeming unending stream of them. The ones in whom he had lost interest, the ones just looming on the horizon and, most important, the one of the moment. The Barbours could not keep track of them, and it was not until Marian Galloway came into the picture that they really concentrated on this side of Clifford's life. This was serious. Clifford was in love.

His romance with Marian was a tender one and would have culminated in marriage had Clifford had his way. The girl was wise beyond her years, and as the engagement wore on she saw Clifford for what he still was—too young for marriage and responsibilities, too fond of every girl to concentrate for long on one. She knew that this marriage would never be successful and so sent Clifford away. This decision of Marian's was the first really sobering moment Clifford had ever known and either on the rebound or because he felt it was the best answer to the problem of earning a living, he entered his father's stock-and-bond house as a junior working partner.

HE ACCEPTED the daily routine and to all appearances had found his future. Clifford's interest in the business pleased Father Barbour. He had begun to fear that not one of his sons would care to be a part of the Barbour Stock and Bond House. Jack, of course, was really too young to be sure about yet, but it was evident beyond all doubt that Paul would never be a stockbroker. Paul got further away from

hard-headed business every day of his life, and the success of his book, which had been recently published, made it plainer than ever that it would have to be Clifford who would carry on.

His membership in the firm was a splendid thing for both Clifford and his father. It widened Clifford's interests immeasurably and brought about a new and close companionship between the two. There were times, of course, when Clifford's high spirits and his ready response to all things feminine enlivened the dignified offices more than necessary, but the legend on the door, "Henry Barbour and Son," compensated Henry Barbour for much.

Preparation for Claudia's coming marriage to Captain Nicholas Lacey were hardly under way when the news about little Teddy Lawton electrified the neighborhood. Paul was going to adopt her! Betty Carter and Jack Barbour had been constant companions since cradle days and Teddy was now the always painfully evident junior member of their adolescent group. She and Father Barbour had formed a strangely warm friendship, as she frequently swung on the gate while he worked in the garden. She was under foot a good

deal, but such a little girl and so hungry for a home and family ties of her own. She loved Paul at first sight and he found his interest in her growing into the deepest affection.

Lindy's decision to return east to marry brought adoption to Paul's mind. Teddy had gotten a firm grip on his heart. ## America Musses Up Mons. JEAN GABIN

No Hand-Kissing Lover, the Matinee Idol of France Makes His Hollywood Debut in a Rough-and-Tumble, Highly Dramatic Film of the Waterfront!

**A**CCLAIMED for his superb work in such foreign pictures as "Pepe le Moko" and "Grand Illusion," one-time foundry worker Jean Gabin, who became the movie idol of the Old World, is beginning a new career in America. "Moontide," for 20th Century-Fox, marks its opening.

One reason for Monsieur Gabin's outstanding success is his love for "muss-em-up" parts, and the fact that he believes in living his roles before he actually begins to enact them. To absorb realism for character of Bobo in "Moontide," he spent weeks along the San Pedro waterfront in California, hobnobbing with barkeepers, junk-shop men and tenders of bait-barges.

Too, when he arrived in America's movietown, Gabin refused pointblank to be put through the glamorizing mill. His hair had become streaked with gray during the year he worked aboard a mine-sweeper in the English Channel, but he balked at having it touched up.

When a scene in the script of "Moontide" called for him to kiss Ida Lupino's hand, he said no—and definitely. To him that was just Hollywood's idea of a Frenchman making love which existed only in America. It wasn't true to life.

Archie Mayo, who directed picture, likens Gabin's love-making technique to that of Rudolph Valentino. He talks quietly, can do more acting with a

glance than many actors with pages of dialog.

Born of stage parents, Gabin as a boy hated the theater. In protest, he got a job in a foundry at fourteen, worked there for six years, and then joined the marines. Desperate need of a job, after his term of service was up, drove him to become a song-and-dance man in Paris cafes. That led to role of leading man with Elsie Janis, and one in a movie. Soon he was Europe's greatest romantic star.

Granted the privilege of selecting his own stories at 20th Century-Fox, Gabin chose the role of Bobo in "Moontide," gloried in the realism of the part, in the opportunities it gave him to portray two-fisted action!

**L**EW "DR. KILDARE" AYRES has been sent to an Oregon camp as a conscientious objector to war. He had appeared before his draft board after having been classified 1-A and had told of his earnest conviction that war and participation in war is wrong. Movie-goers remember Ayres

### "The Jungle Book"

Cast: Sabu as Mowgli, Joseph Calleia, John Qualen, Frank Puglia, Rosemary De Camp, Patricia O'Rourke, Ralph Byrd, John Mather. An Alexander Korda production in Technicolor; Zoltan Korda, director; screen play by Laurence Stallings, from Rudyard Kipling's "Jungle Book."

Type of Picture: India, with all its mysteries and jungles, is gloriously captured in color in this spectacular tale of an infant boy who is lost to a wolf-pack and reared as a cub to know all the animals and learn their language.

This Is the Story: Who doesn't read Kipling should; but the story, to refresh staled minds, is of the wolf-boy who is driven from his jungle to civilization till he gets his "tooth" (a sharp knife) with which to return and slay his arch-enemy, Shere-Khan, the tiger. In a way, and a very slight way too, "The Jungle Book" resembles its humble predecessor, "Elephant Boy."

In practically every way thinkable, "The Jungle Book" is a poem of color, and, of course, a Kipling story. The latter has been embellished with the intolerance of a group of villagers who do not want the wolf-boy, Mowgli (Sabu), in their midst, and then their greed when one of them learns that Mowgli knows of the location in the jungle of a great deserted city, once a king's stronghold, in which lies a fabulous treasure of gold and jewels.

Notable in the casting are two radio-made names, Rosemary De Camp and John Mather. Rosemary established herself as a radio actress before pictures discovered her, and such is the case, too, of John Mather, who is much in demand at the West Coast broadcasting-plants. They play Mowgli's mother and father well. Another newcomer is young Patricia O'Rourke, who took time off from Hollywood High School to become the Hindu sweetheart of Sabu in the film.

Verdict: This is one of those pictures that no one should miss. It has everything in it, plus remarkable color, wild animals, beautiful jewels, adventure, animal fights, romance and a forest fire. And take the entire family to see it. The youngsters will love it.

# The Radio Front

America Wise to Nazi Short-Wave Propaganda; MacArthur Talk Grabbed Out of the Air; Benny Will Do Special Shows, Not Broadcasts, for Camps

## WASHINGTON

By LT. COL. CURTIS MITCHELL

On Sunday, March 29, Mother Nature almost accomplished what Hitler and Hirohito would like to do. Washington's war slowed, almost came to a stop. Eighteen inches of spring-time snow was the cause. No other March in Washington can equal that record, and those who are engaged in turning the wheels of war production hope that no other month will attempt it.

Sunday is a work day in this town. We know one man living in Virginia who went to work on skis. We know many others who didn't get there at all. We park our cars out of doors here. They sit at the curb through every night. Imagine waking to the sight of more than a foot of snow on top of your chariot. Imagine attempting to pull into a lane knee-high with drifts.

Ordinarily, this would be cherry-blossom time, but the war effort and crowded local hotels have ordered a postponement of the Cherry Blossom Festival until after the emergency. Besides, the prettiest blossoms of all are on the Japanese cherry trees. Or they were the prettiest. Yesterday's snow shriveled a lot of them. I wonder if there is any significance in that simple act of nature.

MacArthur of Bataan is now MacArthur of Australia and he may have some plans in mind which will do for the Japs what the snow did for our Japanese trees. One night several weeks ago, about fifty trees were chopped down by vandals, which was a pity. The Japs gave them to us, of course, but they grew in soil that is older than the 2,600-year-old dynasty that rules Japan. They grew on an island that was there long before Asia was known to civilized man. I seem to remember hearing a poem, written by a soldier of the last war, which said that "Only God can make a tree" . . .

Americans, unlike the citizens of any Axis nation, can still listen as they please. Evidence is the amazing number of short-wave sets in use without restriction. Democracy's defense is not to cut off listening but to inform the listener.

Your government's Office of Facts and Figures has made a special study of the things Hitler and his henchmen would have us believe. Make no mistake about it, every word his short-wave stations broadcast is written for a purpose carefully and diabolically planned.

His intentions can be defined as many different aims, each designed to weaken America. When next you listen to a German station, remember these hard facts. Hitler wants us to believe that—

Democracy is dying.

our American democratic system.

You will hear those sentiments expressed on German stations and then you will find them echoed in our press. You will sometimes be amazed at the prominence of persons who will spread those Axis seeds of disunity and distrust. But you will know them for what they are.

This war will be won. This peace will be won. This nation, under God, shall not perish . . .

That last sentence, I hear, may be the theme of the new Army hour. Abraham Lincoln expressed it during a time as black as or blacker than this. Many men, big people and little people all over this country, are resolving their own private resolutions in support of that sentiment. It is always heartening to find men of courage and humanity.

Such a one is Vick Knight. Listeners should know him for his production of Red Cross and March of Dime programs. Or for his production of all recent Fred Allen programs. Several weeks ago, the Army invited Vick Knight to direct its program called "Command Performance," the short-wave broadcast sent once each week to our soldiers overseas. Presently, it became apparent that Knight's spare time was not enough to devote to the soldier show. He was faced with a choice of giving up his \$600-per-week job with the Fred Allen program or taking the Army work full time as a volunteer director at nothing per week.

He and his wife sat up through one long night working it out. Right now Vick Knight is in Hollywood making bigger and better "Command Performance" broadcasts for the boys at the bases and overseas. He will remain there, he promises, as long as our soldiers in our front lines need the sort of shows he can provide.

## NEW YORK

Grief-stricken was radio's Amos of "Amos 'n' Andy" March 25, just one week following that team's observance of their fourteenth anniversary, when his former wife, Mrs. Leta Schreiber Gosden, thirty-six, died

Hollywood's first radio service flag has been hung and unveiled at the CBS-KNX studios to honor the thirty-six employees, representing more than 25 percent of the man-power of KNX, who have gone to war. Brief talks were made at the proud flag's unveiling by Donald W. Thornburgh, CBS vice president, ex-Berlin CBS correspondent Harry W. Flannery, and officers of the armed services . . .

Based on the World War I story, "What Price Glory," the sketch was felt to be not an up-to-date picture of the current sober situation, so as a good-will gesture the sponsor and agency have given the devil-may-care "captain" and "sergeant" leave for the duration, and a new show will be substituted . . .

# Classical Music

Lucille Manners, Petite Cities Service Star, Offers Good Advice to Ambitious Young Singers; Radio City Music Hall to Air Mahler's "Eighth Symphony" Sunday

**L**UCILLE MANNERS has one stock answer for all those ambitious youngsters who write to her, asking advice. The answer is "Make sure you want to follow the career of a

singer, be prepared to work your head off, get the right teacher and forget about the big city until you've really got something to give." The young and attractive soprano, who fits right in with the latter-day idea of streamlined divas, had to go through the same routine herself.

"What should be determined before all this," she told us, "is whether the prospective Caruso or Melba has a voice. But you know how it is with ambitious kids—(she isn't much over the kid age herself)—somebody says they've got a voice, just anybody, and they go right out after the big prize. If all those young girls and boys would make sure about that, there would be that many less heartaches."

Miss Manners admits that she has had, thus far, considerable success, "but hard, driving relentless work has been part of the scheme," she added. "Why, even now I don't know what a full day of relaxation means. I have to take lessons from three different teachers—a voice specialist, a coach and a dramatic coach, besides a tutor in languages. Day after day it's the same thing, and don't forget that when I get through with my lessons I must skip right back home to practise.

"I am ambitious, too," Miss Man-

ners declared. "There has always been in the back of my mind the sneaking suspicion that I might make a decent opera singer. So I've been experimenting. For several months now I have been making guest appearances with the Columbia Opera Company. Not many, you know, but enough to give me that practical experience I would need should I ever want to do the thing permanently."

We pressed Miss Manners for further details, but all she would say was that she was satisfied with what she had accomplished. "Of course," the soprano continued, "I don't consider myself an opera singer yet. How could I with the little experience I've had. It's all been a series of steps in the right direction, though, and I'm glad of that."

Miss Manners' initial joust with a flesh-and-blood operatic audience came with her performance of Nedda in "Pagliacci." "You know," she confessed, "I wasn't nervous or scared at all. It was like being in a coma. I went through the business of my part and never a thought did I give to anything but the role itself. When I went into the wings, someone, I don't know who it was, congratulated me on my 'Iron nerves.'

"I know he meant well, but he shouldn't have done that. I kept repeating over and over to myself, 'Well, everybody is nervous at a debut. Why not I?' I remembered the stories I had read about the great artists of the past and how some of them had practically fallen through the floor from nervousness. Maybe something was wrong with me. And at this point I collapsed. Anyway, I came to and

finished my job, still without nerves. I guess you can call me unique in that respect."

Radio is her genre, she feels. "There is a mysterious something about singing to countless invisible people that gets me," she said. "Don't think that I wouldn't like to do eight or ten opera performances a year and a few dozen concerts thrown in, though. Things like that help to round out an artist's equipment. If it's to be, naturally I'll follow the operatic and concert star exclusively. From where I'm looking now, however, it's chiefly radio for me."

Her work on the Cities Service program calls for her to sing anything from popular ballads to opera and art songs. As for swing, while she likes to listen to it, she knows that she couldn't interpret it. "You've got to have that certain rhythm. You've got to be born with it, or else it's no go," she confessed.

## "The Symphony of a Thousand"

"Repetition is the mother of learning" is an old saw, and, like old saws, filled with wisdom. All of which is by way of referring to the performance of Mahler's Eighth Symphony—complete—from the stage of the Center Theater in New York. The Radio City Music Hall Orchestra augmented, seven well-known soloists, a separate brass choir, a chorus of 300 voices, which will be made up of the Schola Cantorum (Hugh Ross, director), the Music Hall's Men's Chorus, 150 boy singers from the Paulist Chor-

isters (Edward J. Slattery, director), the St. Patrick's Choristers of St. Patrick's century-old cathedral on New York's East Side (Serafino Boggatto, director), and fifty youngsters selected from the New York City public school by George H. Gartlan, head of the music department of the New York City Board of Education, will be the participants. Erno Rapee, will have the gigantic task of conducting these impressive forces.

For the soloists Mr. Rapee has chosen Selma Kaye and Thelma Ferguson, sopranos; Edwina Eustis and Dorothy Shawn, contraltos; Mario Berini, tenor; John Herrick, baritone, and Lawrence Whisonant, bass. All are American born and trained.

The Eighth Symphony of Mahler was completed in 1907. It was given its first performance in 1910 in Munich, with the composer conducting. The work was introduced to America in 1916 at a concert conducted by Leopold Stokowski. In spite of the success of the piece at that American premiere (instead of the scheduled two, nine, including one in New York, were given) it was not performed again until 1931, when Eugene Goossens conducted it as the climax of the Cincinnati May Festival.

Thus will the Radio City Music Hall bring to a titanic close its Mahler Cycle at its five hundredth broadcast. The whole work will require one and a half hours, being broadcast over the Blue Network and by short wave to Latin America. The audience that will attend in person will, by all the signs, be a huge one, but it will not be as anything to the tremendous membership of the listening fraternity.

(Mahler's "Eighth Symphony"—complete—will be broadcast by the "Radio City Music Hall of the Air" Sunday over the Blue Network. Erno Rapee will conduct.)

## A Beauty-Conscious Mozart

The Concerto for Two Pianos and Orchestra in E Flat (K. 365) of Mozart was performed for the first time in Vienna on November 24, 1781. The composer and Josephine Aurnhammer played the solo parts. Fraulein Aurnhammer, it develops, was the young woman whom Mozart described in a letter to his father as being "as fat as a peasant girl." She had had, what's more, the temerity to make love to him, a matter that brought the following "encomium" on her head, just to look at her face, "which would have served a painter as a model for the Evil One," was enough, he said, "to make one wretched for the whole day." Obviously Mozart's appreciation of the beautiful ran to worlds and spheres beyond the realm of music.

Of this concerto, which is to be played by Arthur Loesser and Beryl Rubinstein with the Cleveland Orchestra under Artur Rodzinski's direction, it has been said that it is "free and cheerful." Jahn, responsible for those words, also declared that "there is no intention apparent of making the two instruments independent; the players emulate each other in the delivery of the melodies and passages, sometimes together, sometimes in succession, often breaking off in rapid changes and interruptions."

(Mozart's "Concerto for Two Pianos and Orchestra in E Flat" will be played by Arthur Loesser and Beryl Rubinstein with the Cleveland Orchestra when it broadcasts Saturday over CBS. Artur Rodzinski will conduct.)

## The Newest Recordings

The performance of Debussy's Trio Sonata No. 2 by Marcel Myse, flutist, Lily Laskine, harpist, and Alice Merkel, violinist, cannot be praised too highly. The Victor album is also one of the finest we have heard recently in point of the mechanical aspects. The work, one of Debussy's last, is a signal example of a creative technic brought to an amazing finesse. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra, led by Frederick Stock, does nobly by the Paganini "Moto Perpetuo" (in a transcription by Mr. Stock) and the Procession of the Sardar from Ippolitoff-Ivanoff's "Caucasian Sketches." (Columbia).

Bidu Sayao, who graces the Metropolitan Opera roster, sings deliciously the Gavotte from Massenet's "Maçon" and the Waltz from Gounod's "Romeo and Juliet." She is accompanied by an orchestra conducted by Erich Leinsdorf, also of the Metropolitan (Columbia).

Miss Barton says, "You don't just begin with an unusual style. In your early phase of singing, you're probably influenced by somebody you admire and unconsciously echo his or her mannerisms. However," she continues, "if you have an original mind and a well-grounded musical training, you soon outgrow imitation and become an identifiable singing personality."

Vera Barton, one of the surprise successes of the year, began by winning an amateur song contest, prize \$25. She sang at her first broadcast with Barry Winton of the Rainbow Grill, working only occasionally after that. In the meantime she took a modeling course and studied singing. She started all over again, this time with Enoch Light's orchestra, then with Isham Jones and later with Dick Ballou at New York's local station WHN. Last summer she was singing with Duke Daly's band at Rye, N. Y., when a scout heard her and arranged auditions for her, which resulted in the singer's engagement with CBS and Victor records.

## The Late Recordings

Eddy Duchin has made an album of songs by Cole Porter for Columbia. He is given only rhythm accompaniment. The Porter songs, of course, are all well known, but we'll mention a few anyway: "Night and Day," "What Is This Thing Called Love?" "I've Got You Under My Skin," and so on. The set is a honey from any standpoint. Victor, in turn, offers an album of compositions by Sigmund Romberg. These have been sung by the Victor Mixed Chorus, Emil Cote, director. The items include "Liver, Come Back to Me," "One Alone," "Wanting You" and others. The soloists are Margaret Daum, soprano; Frank Parker and Floyd Sherman, tenors; Walter Preston, baritone.

Ray Noble brings us nostalgic memories with his version of "The Very Thought of You" (Columbia 26546), which is coupled with "Goodnight, Sweetheart," another memory-wringer. Well done, too. Hal McIntyre, a new Victor artist, shows off his band in "I'll Pray for You" and "Do You Miss Your Sweetheart?"

# Short Waves

## Caribbean Isle Has New Voice; CBS Hits Back at Axis Propaganda

### A Free India

TOKYO radio is fond of making such statements as the following: "Rangoon is now breathing the life of new Asia under the protection of the Japanese Empire." According to Tokyo it would seem that cities and whole countries magically burst into the full flower and bloom of a new and more vigorous existence the moment the conquering hordes of little brown men take over. Those lands not blessed with the divine example of the supreme being—the Mikado—are on the other hand withering away, corrupted by the influences of arrogant British Imperialism or degraded by grasping American capitalism. Lured on by the fabulous wealth of India, Nippon now seeks to put this country also under its tyrannical yoke. Its slogans, "India for the Indians," "Asia for the Asiatics," do not fool even the most illiterate of India's millions. "We are the liberators of eastern Asia, we only wish to cooperate with India, to free its peoples from British Imperialism. We have no designs upon India commercially," bleats Tokyo radio. To help along the propaganda campaign, Berlin radio, disguising itself as the "Free Indian Station," and Rome Radio, masking itself as "Radio Himalaya," claiming they are actually undercover stations operated by native Indians and thus speaking for the people of India, urge cooperation with Japan, a break with the British Empire.

Berlin radio, however, in speaking to the people of Germany, does not strive to conceal Japan's commercial ambitions; openly claims Japan's aim is to occupy and control enemy bases, to bring under control enemy supplies and raw material. "These raw materials will be taken over by Japanese 'trust' companies," says Berlin. Tokyo radio puts it this way: "Exploitation of tin, bauxite and other raw materials will be increased by corporations, who will give an increased rhythm of production"—a pretty little catch-phrase but one that still means Japan will seize and control all raw materials and industry in India, or any other country they occupy. The futility of trying to impress India with empty promises or high-sounding propaganda phrases, of declarations that Japan has no designs upon the country, was fittingly summed up the other morning by a speaker over the Indian short-wave station at Delhi, who voiced the determination of the nation to prevent Japanese domination by quoting from these famous lines of Sir Walter Scott:

"Breathes there the man with soul  
so dead,  
Who never to himself hath said,  
'This is my own, My Native Land,'"

### "Freedom" Stations on Air

I am indebted to Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., for first news of the new Scandinavian "Freedom" Stations, which with the establishment of the oft-rumored second Allied front in northern Europe may become

important undercover outlets for the freedom-loving peoples of Norway and Finland. "Suomen Vapaus Asema" (the Finnish Freedom Station) is being heard on 11.59 megs. with strong signals, daily from 6:30 to 6:45 a.m. CWT. The man announcer also mentions a transmission from 2:05 to 2:20 p.m. CWT on 6.23 megs, but this broadcast has not been heard in the United States. "Norske Frihets Station" (the Norwegian Freedom Station) operates almost daily from 10:00 a.m. to 1:40 p.m. CWT on 10.07

megs. This station, according to Mr. Skyten, may be heard irregularly with strong signals. I should like to hear from any of our Finnish- or Norwegian-speaking listeners who may be able to tune in these undercover voices for "victory."

The North American transmissions from the regular Finnish short-wave station at Lahti, each of which includes English news and commentaries, are now broadcast as follows: From 1:05 to 2:00 p.m., over OIE (15.19), OFE (11.785), OFD (9.495); from 7:10 to 8:00 p.m. over OFE (11.785), OFD (9.495), and from 10:05 to 11:00 p.m. CWT over OFE (11.785). Do not confuse these Lahti transmissions with those of the undercover Freedom Stations mentioned above, for while not actually dictated by the Axis, these transmissions are strongly Axis-flavored and are stuffed with the usual Axis nonsense.

### New Voice in Caribbean

The Curon short-wave station PJCI, located at Willemstad on the vitally important Dutch West Indies isle of Curacao, has recently increased its power to 3,000 watts and is operating on a new and much better-heard frequency of 9.115 megs. Although its programs, which are on the air daily from 7:00 to 9:20 p.m. CWT, do not include English announcements or newscasts, they can be heard with excellent signal strength and

games of the preceding day and, in addition, from time to time guest speakers on various sporting topics.

### CBS in All-Out Offensive

Instead of resorting to the lies, innuendos and distortions of Dr. Goebbels' Lord Haw Haw breed, American short-wave operators are hitting back hard and true with incontrovertible facts plus appeals to the decent instincts of their audiences within the Nazi regions. Typical are the five German-language feature programs which the CBS short-wave division has just added to its schedule of European transmissions. These programs, conducted by names long associated with the struggle against dictatorship, are as follows (CWT):

Mondays, 9:15 to 9:30 a.m.—Military analysis of war on the Far Eastern front by Horst von Baerensprung, until 1933 head of the Magdeburg, Germany, police, later personal adviser to Chiang Kai-shek.

Wednesdays, 9:15 to 9:30 a.m.—Military analysis of war on Western and Near Eastern fronts by Max Werner, born in Russia but opposed to Communism.

Fridays, 9:15 to 9:30 a.m.—"Gesprache mit Hans," with Dorothy Thompson, noted American columnist and brilliant stumper against Nazism. Violently hated by Hitlerites, she is high on Gestapo blacklist.

Sundays, 6:15 to 6:30 a.m.—Catholic religious program, prepared by Professor Dietrich von Hildebrand, formerly the publisher of an anti-Nazi weekly in Austria, is now a professor at Fordham University . . . 9:15 to 9:30 a.m.—Protestant religious program prepared by Professor Paul Tillich, an outspoken critic of Nazism, compelled to leave Germany in 1933.

All of these programs are broadcast over CBS' twin 50,000-watt short-wave stations, WCBX (15.27) and WCRC (17.83).

### News About the Stations

The Australian broadcast to western North America, heard daily 9:25 to 10:10 a.m. CWT, is now broadcast over a new Sydney frequency, VLQ4 (7.22) . . . The Japanese are gradually reopening all of the former Shanghai short-wave stations. The latest to reappear is former American-controlled XMHA (11.86), which can now be heard daily to 10:00 a.m. CWT. According to our Los Angeles LP, news in English is given at 8:00 and 9:00 a.m. CWT . . . XGOY, Chungking, China, is now broadcasting to North America daily, 9:00 to 10:25 a.m. CWT, on 9.635 megs . . . The Tokyo English news bulletin, broadcast over JZJ (11.80) at the new time of 9:30 a.m. CWT, is usually well heard these mornings . . . VUD3 (9.59), Delhi, India, broadcasts English messages from Singapore refugees almost daily at 6:30 a.m. CWT . . . MTCY (9.545), Hsinking, Manchukuo, now operates daily from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. CWT . . . The program from the Philippines is now broadcast daily from 5:00 to 9:00 a.m. CWT simultaneously on 6.145, 9.64 and 11.89 megs.

# Frequency Modulation

Read How Men Now Molding the Future of FM Turned Fantasies Into Facts  
When They Built an FM Station in the Arctic Eyrie of Mt. Washington!

## Guide to Programs

April 11 through April 17

**A**NYONE who thinks that building a castle in the clouds happens only in dreams should go have a talk with the Yankee Network of New England and learn how its FM station W39B came into existence.

W39B is a fabulous achievement, built in the face of innumerable difficulties and skepticism upon the wind-bald summit of Mount Washington, New Hampshire, 6,300 feet above sea level. Its stubby FM antenna looks down across three great states, over a panorama of hills and towns and people, many of whom today are finding W39B's schedule of FM programs, heard twenty-four hours daily, the only adequate radio reception they've ever known.

Not so many years ago, when frequency modulation was questionably new and even scoffed at, the Yankee Network—which operates a chain of regular AM stations throughout the six New England states—began to look around for an ideal FM transmitter site.

Those of you who have become acquainted with the fundamentals of FM know that height is fully as important as power when you want a station to serve a wide area. And that was why the Yankee Network saw great possibilities in Mount Washington, highest peak on the whole north-east corner of this continent.

### Harder Than It Looked

On paper, it was all quite simple. But in the wind and the snow and the clammy clouds that lie like wet blankets over the rugged top of Mount Washington, it became another matter entirely. In the first place—to give you an idea—the highest recorded wind velocity in the world was clocked by the Mount Washington weather station during April, 1934, when a gale traveling at 231 miles an hour howled over the summit. Snow can be expected any month of the year, the winds exceed hurricane velocity about sixteen days out of every month, and have an average velocity of fifty-five m.p.h. from December to March.

And so it was here, in this arctic eyrie, that the Yankee Network decided to build an FM station. But a radio transmitter needs electric power, and the men who run it must have food, warmth and water. The first step, therefore, was to erect a special building on the brow of the mountain—a building with its foundation sunk four and a half feet into granite rock, having outer walls built up of two-inch hard-pine planking over two inches of fiber board, backed by an eight-inch brick wall and steel frame. The roof is equally substantial, and the entire structure was designed to buck winds of three hundred miles an hour.

### Miracle on the Mountain

Power for the 5,000-watt FM transmitter comes from two giant electric generators operated by diesel engines, delivering thirty and fifteen kilowatts respectively. All gasoline, fuel oil and water-pumping units were installed in duplicate so that the station will not be forced off the air by breakdowns. Storage tanks holding ten thousand and two thousand five hundred gallons of oil were laboriously hauled up the mountainside and buried underground, far enough down the slope from the summit so that if chance lightning struck them, causing an explosion, the transmitter building would not be endangered.

Heavy steel girders for an antenna tower were dragged skyward in the same painstaking fashion.

In case you're worried, radio performers, artists and announcers don't have to scale the frigid fastnesses of this mountain just to broadcast over W39B. The programs themselves come from FM studios in Boston, many miles to the south. W39B receives these programs via its sister station, W43B, at Paxton, Massachusetts (near Worcester), which, in turn, gets them by a special radio relay, beamed over a forty-three-mile path from Boston.

### An Answer for Everything

Usually the radiating rods of an FM antenna are slender metal arms, but these, of course, would quickly break under the load of rime that the clouds on Mount Washington deposit. So the W39B engineers devised a different kind of FM antenna, husky as a wrestler, built of steel springs such as you'll find on the back axle of a truck. They carry the load, and even though winter ravages W39B with its most arctic ferocity, FM listeners in those three states of New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine still enjoy the pure fidelity of FM broadcasts relayed to them from the lonely peak.

In all the unpredictable history of American broadcasting, there are few achievements to match the construction of W39B for daring and the staunch belief that no obstacle can be too great. Somehow it epitomizes the spirit of progress that has carried FM so far so fast the past year.

You know they say the devil finds things for idle hands to do. Well, the devil is out of luck in an Army camp. Hands, feet and head are pretty busy from reveille to taps."

Washington's Pan-American circles. Viewed as a forward step in the cultivation of Pan-American relations, it is anticipated that the project will seek to acquaint the Americas with each other. The programs will be broadcast over NBC stations in the United States and Canada and will be made available to stations in the Latin-American countries in Spanish and Portuguese script form. ## GENERAL ENTERTAINMENT

It hasn't been definitely established yet where the name "juke box" originated. This much is certain though; May 1 is the date juke-box production must stop. It's the war.

The juke box—referred to by manufacturers as "automatic phonograph machines"—enjoyed a remarkable rise to popularity. On the American scene only a couple years, juke boxes can be found in exclusive clubs, taverns, road-houses, restaurants, stationery stores—almost everywhere.

Juke boxes have been instrumental in making the careers of some band-leaders successful. Song-writers have made millions in royalties, and it has been estimated that the juke-box business grosses about \$150,000,000 annually. Now, by May 1, the entire juke-box industry will have been made over as a war industry . . .

In a 132-page book entitled "The Flickering Torch" (Putnam, \$1.50), William West Tomlinson has presented his understanding of freedom. Although Mr. Tomlinson doesn't dwell on the freedom of entertainment in America, he mentions it in passing, and for a deeper appreciation of entertainment in a democracy, this book is recommended . . .

It does seem that any writings about general entertainment in the United States must be influenced by the war. The war has had a tremendous impact on what we do in our leisure time. Yet for the most part all changes in entertainment have thus far been voluntary. Song-writers have written war songs, and we are singing them because we want to. Books about the war are being read at our will. Certain sports events have been canceled—others encouraged—again as a result of public demand. The war has brought about few changes indeed in our entertainment life, so far. Let's hope a rising tide of victories will continue to make the public the judge of what it can—and will—do to amuse itself.

### Priorities on Your Pennies

**G**ETTING the most out of every penny one spends is the smartest way to practise economy we know of. To do this today is practically a patriotic duty and you can start right in at your dressing-table. You've been told, over and over again, that keeping up your glamour will help keep up our national spirit to win. Do this without waste, for waste is weakness and we'll have none of that!

Cutex has some suggestions for finger-tip economy—how to get the most out of every bottle of nail polish. Follow these religiously and you'll discover that conservation, besides being patriotic, will yield dividends on your glamour.

Here are the suggestions! When applying polish to your nails, drain the brush against the neck of the bottle to guard against waste. The dividend for your glamour is in the fact that your polish will go on more smoothly and evenly if you have just the right amount on the brush—no globs to flow over the edges of your nail, staining the cuticle or encouraging early chipping.

Be sure to wipe the outside of the bottle with tissue before returning the cap when you are finished. If you don't, the cap will never screw on tightly, thus permitting evaporation and the drying-up of your favorite shade long before you've used up the supply.

What's more, once you've learned how to keep polish properly you can afford to branch out with the new shades as they are introduced. A collection of shades to match every mood and every ensemble is not an extravagance if you will keep them always ready for use, well preserved.

Speaking of new shades, by the way, calls for a mention of the two honeys Cutex is offering. They're victory shades and done in the true Yankee spirit. The first, "Alert," is a ringing clear tone of true-blue red. The second is a rich-brown shade titled, as a matter of fact, "Saddle Brown."

Remember to keep your bottles of polish standing upright to prevent leakage and find a cool spot in which to keep them.

Because it smooths the nail polish and helps polish to cling, buff your nails well before you apply polish. Also, always use a colorless polish over your last coat to prolong wear. Even better, give yourself a fine line of white tip at the end of your nail by wiping off a bit of the polish. Then, over this, to the very end of the nail and over the edge to the underside of the tip, apply the "Overcoat" of colorless as a guard against chipping of polish.

If you're the busy woman we think you are these days, you've already found out for yourself the wisdom of wearing your nails "in moderation"—an eighth to a quarter of an inch beyond your finger-tips. File in shallow rather than pointed ovals and practise "nail savers" to keep both nails and polish from splitting. In other words, use your fingers rather than your nails for grasping and lifting. Use a letter-opener on your mail and a pencil for telephone dialing. Wear cotton gloves for housework and rubber gloves when you're taking on the week's wash.

**E**VEN though polish may hide a world of sins, the condition of your nails will eventually catch up with you if you don't give them the proper care. Remember this when, in the rush of your day's activities, you're tempted to put off the daily application of a cuticle oil or cream. Nails that split or are brittle to the breaking-point will cost you dollars and cents in the waste of polish that has to be removed for repairs on a broken nail. Remember, too, that all the time and effort spent on the appearance of your nails is to no avail if you spoil the appearance by neglect of the cuticle. Keep it pushed back, or clipped if you prefer, to give your nails a completely well-groomed appearance.

# WHAT'S COOKING!

By GEORGIA SCOTT

## Broiler Meals

**O**F ALL the ways to prepare foods, broiling is probably the simplest from the standpoint of time and dishes to be washed. More often than not, broiled foods are tastier, too, because there's something about cooking with a direct flame that brings out the full, individual flavor of a particular food. There's nothing better than outdoor-grill cooking, and your kitchen broiler is the nearest thing to that.

Most every cook uses her broiler for steaks, chops and broilers, but unfortunately we can't have those delectables as often as we'd like to nowadays and we have to look to thriftier cuts in the markets. This doesn't mean that your broiler will have to go idle. It should get more use than ever if you're intent on saving time and gas, as well as providing your family with tasty, wholesome meals.

You can plan a whole meal under your broiler, practically, because not only do many meats take well to direct cooking but there are also many vegetables which gain flavor prepared in this way. Meats that broil best, of course, are fatty meats.

And if you broil your vegetables along with the meat, you'll get a pleasant, effortless meal together in no time. Besides potatoes (sweet as well as Irish), other foods which turn out beautifully when broiled are onions, mushrooms, canned asparagus, par-boiled carrots, apple slices, oranges, grapefruit, bananas, peaches, pears and apricots.

Here are a few suggestions for time-saver broiled meals:

1. Frankfurters split and stuffed with sauerkraut, broiled potato slices (parboil) and sliced tomatoes.
2. Beef patties and bacon, potato cakes, carrot slices (parboil) and onion slices.
3. Ham slice, sweet-potato slices broiled with butter, brussels sprouts.
4. Lamb patties, grapefruit slices, bunches of canned asparagus, parsnips (parboil).
5. Lamb or pork kidneys wrapped with bacon, tomato slices, Spanish rice.

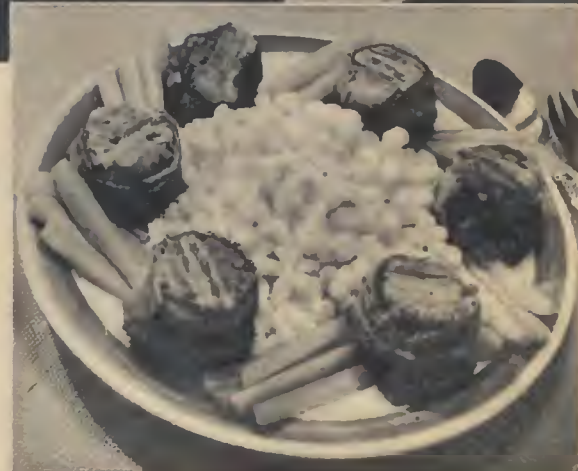
One of the most delicious recipes that's come our way for broiling is the Southern Barbecue supplied by Miss Louise Wilcher, CBS organist, whose picture you see above. Miss Wilcher comes from the South and word got around to the porters at CBS that she was a gourmet of a sort. One of the porters gave her this recipe. The sauce is made as follows:

- 1 can tomato paste
- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1 button garlic
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 lump butter the size of an egg

You place these ingredients in a saucepan and simmer for half an hour. Take two whole spareribs (about four pounds), sprinkle with salt and place under the broiler, brown the ribs quickly on both sides, and then reduce the fire so that they will not dry out. Baste regularly while cooking with barbecue sauce. The spareribs should cook under a moderate flame for about an hour.

This recipe will require a little more care and patience than the other broiler suggestions listed herein, but you'll be rewarded by your family's enthusiastic response. Cole slaw, the old-fashioned kind with sour-cream dressing, would be a nice salad addition to your meal. And if you really want to spread yourself, you might whip up a corn bread to go with it. Fresh fruit, or canned, would be the best complement to this meal, since pork is quite rich.
