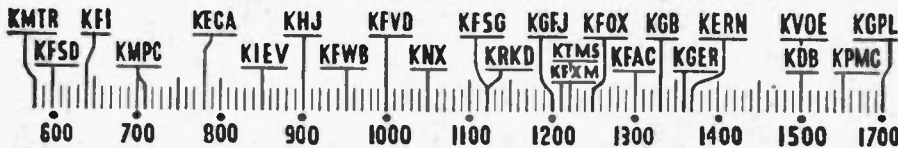

Mice in Your Set

Things we didn't know about radio set operation until radio service experts told us:

That the size of your cabinet is the final answer to tone quality.

That 60 per cent of the disturbing static is caused right in your own home—loose connections in lamps and appliances, razors, refrigerators, and sometimes a loose wire dangling over a pipe.

That tubes may be bad even though they light up and the radio will work. Testing your tubes every six months will save you money on other parts.

That nine-tenths of trouble develops because a part just plain wears out, and not because Junior turns the volume too loud or dad listens to the ball game all afternoon.

That a radio will cost you less to keep in repair if you play it two hours or more every day, than if you play it once a week. This is because the heat thus created drives condensed moisture away from vital parts.

That tubes are manufactured to average 2000 hours of actual playing time, which should be figured as two and a half to three years of ordinary use.

INCREDIBLE OBOLER: Arch Oboler is radio's incredible playwright.

An author who delights in astounding listeners with weird plots, eerily realistic sound effects, who dictates his brain children to a dictaphone, prefers a shabby turtle-neck sweater and sneakers to conventional attire, he has given X-ray quality to music that accompanies his dramas on "Everyman's Theater."

Only Oboler, "tuneful as a factory whistle," could conceive this use of the international language, praised his musical director Gordon Jenkins this week.

"Wonder why it is so easy to follow the fast action and interplay of ideas in Oboler dramas despite the fact that his plots are frequently complicated and his settings unusual?" Jenkins asked.

"The reason is simple. Each thought and emotion expressed in dialogue during a play has its own accompanying musical theme, designed to accelerate its impact upon the listener to remind him of past happenings and suggest future developments."

Themes in Oboler plays vary according to circumstances. In "This Precious Freedom," starring Raymond Massey, the thoughts in the latter's mind were represented by harmonious melodies at the beginning of the play. These themes became discordant, staccato, shifted to minor keys as Massey's mind began to crack

before realization he was living in a dictatorship."

Oboler enthusiast is Jenkins who insists Oboler has the "finest sense of musical values" despite ignorance of music.

Jenkins offered a simpler example of the fourth-dimensional qualities of playwright's technique:

"Mr. Smith is sitting on the edge of a cliff. We don't use a 'Mr. Smith theme' as Wagner would have done to introduce him, but we play something to indicate that Smith is thinking about his wife, let us say.

"During the course of the mythical drama Mr. Smith loses his footing and starts to fall. We avoid spectacular Valkyrie motifs as well as the 'Wheeee' theme common in animated cartoons and play a selection to indicate that Smith, after the first instant of shock, is still thinking about his wife—or, perhaps, reviewing his past life as dying men are supposed to do.

"The result is amazingly graphic and convincing to the listener who has already become acquainted with the meaning of the themes earlier in the program."

MISTRESS OF EARLYBIRDS: Large in numbers is that section of society which sleepily reaches for shut-off levers on jangling alarms, sighs, yawns, or groans, and blinks in momentary dullness at early morning struggle of sun to flood the breaking bowl of night.

For many of these many, Pauline Hold-

en (KFAC, 6 to 7 a. m. every weekday morning) has become a goddess whose religion sums to a "Smile in the Morning."

Pauline sings western ditties; talks things of interest to housewives; presents stories of her food sponsors; features guests on each of her daily shows—an official of a woman's organization or civic group. Guests are given opportunity to tell of work their organizations do in respective communities for betterment of living. Popular is this feature of "Smile in the Morning" program through which service clubs find way of telling their activities.

NEW CALL LETTERS: That many station call letters in Southern California will be changed as Frequency Modulation increases importance in sound broadcasting seemed indicated this week as Federal authorities moved to adopt a new system of self-explanatory call letters.

Example, "K35LA" may be used to designate a Los Angeles FM station, said Lewis Allen Weiss, general manager of up and coming Don Lee network which

plans to use License Number One for the net's Frequency Modulation station on Mt. Lee. A company, organized by Herbert L. Petty, former Federal Communications Commission secretary, has plans for an FM transmitter west of Laurel canyon.

Thus, Los Angeles will become first western city to originate static-free and high-fidelity technique of sound broadcasting.

New call letters will combine symbols of the alphabet and numerals in a system designed to show listeners whether station is east or west of the Mississippi, where to look for it on the tuning dial. . . . W in the east, K in the west.

Varying from standard broadcast procedure will be second and third characters indicating on which of 40 channels in FM band station operates.

At end of the call sign is another letter, or letters, arbitrarily assigned or indicating in abbreviated form city or area in which the station is located.

Using the FCC example, W41B indicating a station operating on a channel of 44.1 megacycles in Boston, a Los Angeles call letter could be K35LA, if operated on 43.5 megacycles, since the numerals are obtained by taking the last two numbers of the assigned frequency. All educational non-commercial stations will use the letter "E" on the end.

The system is adapted from the method used by Chile to designate standard broadcast transmitters, at the same time itemizing vital data about the station. Calls will not exceed five characters.

on a substitute. If Clinton's band failed, Bea might return.

The substitute is still singing in Straeter's choir, Bea Wain has gone on to be a headline soloist on "Your Hit Parade," on Victor records and on the stage. Last Saturday, on the stage of CBS Playhouse three, to Bea Wain came an honor. She was presented with a plaque from Song Hits magazine as its choice for "Songstress of the Month."

Attractive brunette, sparkingly dressed in a sequin-trimmed evening gown, Bea

reclined in an easy chair in a dressing room backstage. She kept handling the plaque, admitted to being thrilled.

"I've received dozens of such citations," she told Radio Life reporter Don Sabre, "but each new one gives me a big kick. The first time I won a popularity poll I thought I had reached the pinnacle. A week later, all that remained was a stack of newspaper clippings, gathering dust."

Philosophized Bea Wain: "I suppose all of us honored for the first time must have reacted the way I did—disappointed that people didn't continue to talk about it. In time, however, I realized that you just can't get along on yesterday's laurels. There's always another poll and those who cast the ballots consider you in the light of what you're doing today and not what you have done. And that's the way it should be."

TURNING THE TABLE: With same ease with which University of Chicago Round Table discussions follow swift moving world events, a new portable "round table" has been built to follow the NBC program wherever it may travel in the United States. The studio round table—(triangular in shape to equalize the distance of speakers to the mike)—was specially designed for the weekly NBC-KFI broadcast. A lightweight collapsible reproduction of the original round table has been constructed for use in out-of-Chicago broadcasts.

The triangular table has a sloping pyramid in the center for speaker's notes, microphone at top of pyramid, time-warning lights facing speakers. The table is rubber encased, felt covered to avoid acoustical difficulties. It fits into a packing case, weighs less than 100 pounds.

Similar equipment, built from patented Round Table blueprints, is used in many radio studios throughout the country where discussion programs are frequently aired.

The University of Chicago Round Table is heard Sundays at 11:30 a. m., KFI.

HERE ARE THE NEW WESTERN AIR CHANGES

NEW SET CHANGES: Unless they take time to forelock some 8,000,000 American radio set owners will go push-button-punching March 29, 1941, and from their sets get nothing but complete silence or, mayhap, a station other than the one sought. (Radio Life, Dec. 8-14, under "National" "Millions for Dials").

On that day all push-button sets will require adjustment to meet band changes authorized by Federal Communications Commission. In order that California listeners in areas served by Radio Life may be further acquainted with scope of Commission air-wave alterations, the editors, supplementing the article of Dec. 8, now give a table of old and new frequencies, advise early adjustments of sets of the push button type, in order to avoid last minute delays as radio technicians struggle to make adjustments on time.

If It's a Sister You Want

PRONUNCIATION STAGGERS: With-in past year Americans have blinked at names in war news, printed in papers, tossed out on air, seen on screens. To help those who may go into New Year and miss opportunities for learning by discussion through reluctance to betray pronunciation ignorance, Estelle B. Hunter, CBS script author for "Speak Up, America," this week gave following phonetications:

Vichy sounds like "Vee-shee"; Lyons is "Lee-ohn"; Lille is "Leel" and Diepple goes like a hiccough—"Dee-EHP"; It is "Duhn-KAIRK" for Dunkerque.

SWITZERLAND: "Bairn" for Berne; TSEW-rik for Zurich; BAH-zel or BAHl for Basel. The mountains between France and Switzerland are the YOO-rahs, spelled Juras.

GREECE: Argyrokastron is Ahr-gee-ROW-ka-strun; the island, Lemnos, is MEN-nos in classical and modern speech. It is Ee-JEE-an for Aegean and Doh-deck-ah-NEEZ for Dodecanese Islands. The peninsula of Peloponnesus is Peel-oh-pun-NEE-sus.

ALBANIA: Berat, BAY-raht; Durres, DOOR-ess; Elbasan, RLL-bah-sahn; Sarande, Sah-RAHN-day; Shkoder, SHKOH-dur and Tee-RAH-nah for Tirana.

EGYPT: Asyut, Ahs-YO'UT; Cairo is KY-roh, unless you're in Southern Illinois, then it's KAY-ro; Dumyat is DOO-mee-ah; El Mandara, E-MAHN-dah-rah; Fareskur, Far-ess-KOOR; Giza, GEE-zah (hard g); Ismailia, Is-MY-lee-ah; Port Said, Port-SAIL-id; Rasid, RAI-shed; Talas, TAH-lahs; Tire, TEE-ray and-Zifta, ZIFT-ah. The intriguing-looking town, Sidi Barrani is called SEE-dee-bah-RAY-nee.

TURKEY produces vocabulary testers. Constantinople has been changed to Istanbul, pronounced Is-tan-BOOL. A few other towns up the conversational sleeve are Akhisar Golu, which is Ah-kee-zahr-GAY-lee; Ankara is Ahn-KAHrah; Balikesir, Bah-lee-KAY-seer; and Tarsus, TAR-soos.

GENERALITIES: It is MOS-coe for the Russian city; AIR-eh, for Eire, the Irish Free State; the Arabian kingdom is pronounced Ee-RAK, spelled Iraq; and Persia is Iran, or Es-RAN.

The Siamese like to have their country called Thailand, TA-ee-land. There's a choice of pronunciations for the Bahamas, it being correct to say Bah-HAY-maz, although British and islanders call the place Bah-HAH-maz.

The Story of Mother Barbour

ANY list of famous American mothers would be incomplete without the name of radio's most popular mother—Fanny Barbour. Mother Barbour, matriarch of the Barbour clan of NBC's "One Man's Family," is Minetta Ellen, who has portrayed that role since Carleton E. Morse's radio drama first went on the air.

White-haired Minetta Ellen raised a family herself, before she ever went on the stage. She uses her experience with her own family to aid her in portraying Fanny Barbour on the air.

Miss Ellen was born in Albion, Iowa. She spent her childhood in Cleveland, Ohio, where her father owned the famous Cataract House. In her teens she decided she wanted to be an actress, but her family vetoed the idea, giving her elocution lessons as a compromise. She was married soon after her graduation from Asheville College for Young Women, and not until her daughter was grown did she renew her attempt to go on the stage.

After appearing in a play or two at the University of California Greek theater Miss Ellen was cast in a play at the Fulton theater in Oakland, California. In that play, J. Anthony Smythe, now her husband in One Man's Family, was featured. Miss Ellen played a mother role, because the stage director, who met her

at the home of a friend, decided she was "just the type."

The role of Fanny Barbour in One Man's Family was Miss Ellen's first important radio assignment, and she has concentrated her efforts on that role since the Barbour Family first came into being. Michael Raffetto, who plays Paul in One Man's Family, aided her to obtain the audition which won the coveted role.

True to her radio character, Miss Ellen mothers the members of One Man's Family cast off the air as well as on. Her apartment in Hollywood is the scene of many "family" gatherings. Musical Showdown

*Here Are Some Facts and Figures
on the ASCAP-BMI Finish Battle!*

WHEN radio's new music organization, Broadcast Music, Inc. ("BMI"), began licensing music on April 1, 1940, a chorus of skepticism was heard from leaders of the music industry.

But four and a half months later, BMI had eight numbers on the list of 20 "most played songs," was turning out weekly 33,000 copies of arrangements and 14,000 piano copies.

BMI was founded by broadcasters with two main objectives: 1) to provide radio stations and other users with an independent supply of music, thus freeing them of their present dependence upon "ASCAP;" and 2) to foster the development of American music by popularizing the works of deserving authors and composers who have hitherto been denied opportunity.

Prior to April, 1940, ASCAP held a strangle-hold on the music business to exclusion of non-ASCAP composers and publishers. The Federal Department of Justice issued sub-

poenas to ASCAP to place its records at disposal of a Federal grand jury.

Current "battle of music" between broadcasters and ASCAP had its origin in the fees ASCAP demanded from radio in 1941 contracts. Since 1923 nets have paid ASCAP \$26,000,000. In 1923 they paid ASCAP \$9750, 2 per cent of its total income; in 1931 the fee had jumped to \$833,490, by 1939 it had risen to \$4,140,000. 1941 contracts demanded an increase of nearly 100 per cent over 1939 fees—a payment of approximately \$9,000,000 per year, for music rental.

Creating BMI, broadcasters struck at oppressive ASCAP monopoly, made, believed many, a significant contribution to advancement of American music culture. Among the many were non-ASCAP writers who without "inside" connections in Tin Pan Alley had slender chance to secure hearings.

Findings of the government:

"ASCAP has prevented non-members from receiving the compensation for the rights of public perform-

ance which they would otherwise receive, and limited and restricted the popular demand of the listening public to musical compositions controlled by ASCAP."

Contrasting ASCAP no pull is needed to gain access to BMI, compositions are carefully examined by BMI's music editorial board, each week reviewing approximately 2600 manuscripts, songs, from 48 states, Cuba, Canada, and Hawaii.

BMI accepts compositions solely on merit, in contrast to publishers who often accept songs because well known band leaders and singers have been "cut-in" as composers. In last few years the practice of "cutting-in" has grown worse.

Last year Variety, leading theatrical trade magazine, reported "the cut-in evil is more widespread today than ever before, and most of the cutting-in is being done by writers with a Class A rating in ASCAP." BMI pays performance fees on merit of music.

Example of ASCAP's method of payment is found in official figures for 1933, year in which ASCAP first and not since then divulged information on payments. One writer with more than 16,000 radio performances received only \$60, as compared to the \$200 paid a composer with no performances. One favored member with only 4573 performances received \$6935, while a prolific ASCAP composer with 45,424 air credits received \$200.

In 1939, Gene Buck, president of ASCAP, testified that the highest ranking 175 composers and authors in ASCAP's membership of 1000, received \$1,890,000—90 per cent of the total dividends, while 175 authors and composers in low payment groups received only \$3000—an average of \$17 each. Many of ASCAP's top ranking composers are no longer active, but still collect large sums for belonging to the society. A break-down of ASCAP's official membership list for 1938, containing 1511 names (including pseudonyms and estates) reveals that only 411 composers were active enough to have one composition copyrighted and published, while only 288 had as many as three numbers published during this year. Over half of ASCAP's total membership was not active enough to have even one number published, but these inactive authors and composers received a substantial part of the millions collected by ASCAP for the use of music by other ASCAP writers, and for the use of music by writers who have not been able to get into ASCAP.

In retrospect the ASCAP-BMI wrangle has given an illusion of importance, whereas, as a matter of fact, ASCAP and BMI are of no importance at all, save as agencies through which music of sorts may be channeled through air to the public. With both serving the public, instead of piggish self interests, there would be no internecine warfare between them, and the government would not now be readying criminal suits on charges of Sherman anti-trust Act violations. Radio Life, candidly, has no use for ASCAP, does not hesitate to say so. No use, either, have social-minded professionalists and educators and an informed public, for ASCAP has been a "freeze-out" racket of a few composers and lyricists who, with aid of some publishing houses, have

More About Musical Showdown

for too long a time flooded the land with second rate musical claptrap. BMI stands best equipped to serve public interest. Should it fail to respond to its responsibilities—which is to encourage and not restrict talent—it, too, will face its sad ending. One thought for the public is that the fight, while only indirectly affecting it, is economic, as preceding paragraphs have shown.

Of general implications now that ASCAP is done with for the time being, we have these:

BMI has librated some 250,000 songs, arrangements and orchestrations to date.

The "Hit Parade" will march on without benefit of ASCAP on the reasonable premise that songs are limited in popularity, that outside ASCAP writers will produce songs of sufficient merit to incorporate in the Hit Tunes for successive weeks.

That many songs, now claimed by ASCAP as lost to the public, are songs within the public domain, and will be played as ASCAP played them, in arrangements of them.

That ASCAP will lose, based on tentative flat rate demands on networks for 1941, nearly \$4,000,000. That this sum, or a large part of it, will now find its way into pockets of increasingly larger numbers of writers on a basis of 1 cent

per performance per station, plus royalties for records, sheet music sales, etc.

That sponsors, generally, are sticking with the networks on theory that BMI will "protect" musical phases of their programs.

That music publishing houses which have maintained a profitable liaison with ASCAP will now have to find new ways of marketing songs, or else divide publishing royalties with ASCAP and BMI.

That "name bands" will find new signature themes; may, some indicated, junk ASCAP entirely for ballroom dancing and air-casts.



Telephone surveys made by Radio Life's editorial staff indicate the public but mildly interested in the outcome of a music-war whose last verbal shot is supposed to be fired Jan. 1, when major networks have agreed to rule ASCAP from air, to return only in American competition with lyricists and composers who are beginning to swim in BMI's music-pool. Most held that music is a matter of acceptance on merit, there being no monopoly by ASCAP or BMI on talent, that Americans can write and sing songs, need but a chance to prove it, a chance BMI insists, above considerations of economy, it is providing. It begins to look like there will be music on the air, as usual.

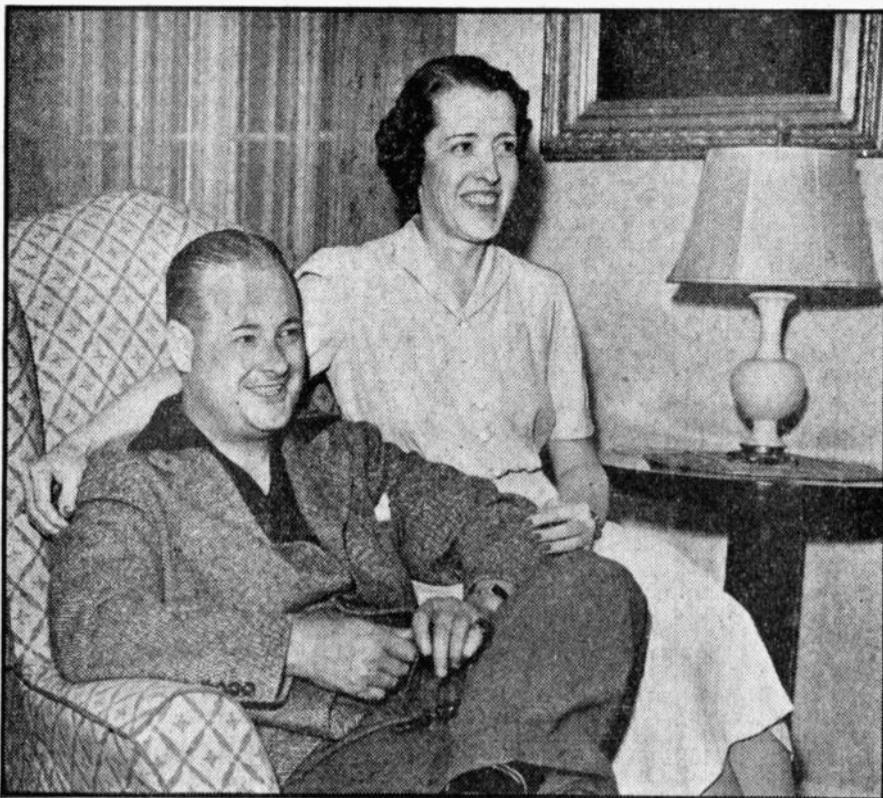

Meet Mr. Quinn

*Fibber and Molly Are Top-Rankers
But Don Is the Man with the Medals*

THE jittery, corridor-pacing lads of the maternity wards have nothing on Don Quinn, writer of the "Fibber McGee and Molly" programs, as he watches—or rather, listens to—his brain children being born each Tuesday night.

Early on Tuesday evenings Don goes to the sponsor's booth, located high above the stage in Studio C of NBC where he can see as well as hear the program. He seats himself in an obscure corner near a loudspeaker. Out of vision range of the stage, he nervously ticks off minutes until airtime. When Fibber, Molly and their supporting players start to warm up the audience with one of radio's funniest pre-broadcast stunts, he relaxes just a trifle, but still is listening intently.

Listening to what? He has heard this pre-air routine scores of times—Fibber and Molly do it every Tuesday. To study Don then is to realize suddenly that he is listening to only one thing—audience reaction.

If an audience is responsive and generous with laughter, Don looks around him with a pleased-with-himself and a pleased-with-the-world-in-general smile.

He knows that such an audience also will be more responsive to the untried material to come when Studio C is "On the Air."

To a stranger, Don Quinn appears to be an unimportant person. But that is true of important people—they seldom flaunt positions, and Don is no exception.

"Surely that quiet, slightly rotund figure straddling a chair over there in the corner can't be important," some may think. Whereas his presence in the booth may not be important to them, their presence there is important to Quinn.

Each line of the broadcast is studied as a scientist does a strange specimen. By their reactions and the laughter from the studio audience, Don pieces together a cross-country picture of a nation seated by its collective radio. Thus he learns, improves and finds answers to the thousand and one questions he has asked himself about script lines and situations, the turning of a phrase, choice of a word, the right spot for a routine.

That is why, when the "Fibber McGee and Molly" scripts roll off the production line of Don Quinn's pen, the McGees

tour the nation's broadcasting band each Tuesday night in a better and smarter model than the week before. Each program is based on knowledge of the previous week.

When the script is ready for airing, Quinn's work is only half done. His task now is to take it into the laboratory of human reaction. Using the airing as a test he gets the answers to prepare him to tackle the next Tuesday's show.

The mechanics of writing the script are something to write about and something on which Quinn has a few things to say.

For over ten years he has been directly associated with the Fibber McGee and Molly stars—Marian and Jim Jordan, who are Mr. and Mrs. Nearly six of those ten years have been devoted to writing Fibber and Molly scripts. Their early years were occupied with a daytime serial known as "Smockout." Not once during this time has Quinn relaxed his vigilance and deep concern over every program.

"When the time comes," declares Don, and the Jordans back him up, "when we have to put a show on the air on which we—and that means every member of the troupe—are not sold 100 per cent, that will be the signal for us to quit this radio business and take up farming."

In all probability the Jordan-Quinn trio will not soon take to serious agricultural pursuits, for the "Fibber McGee and Molly" show stays consistently top-flight, is harvesting a bigger audience with each airing. Figures show the McGees are at the top of all weekday broadcasts.

Quinn avers the secret of this steady success lies in the versatility of the cast. But that is only part of the story.

"After the first draft of the script is written," he explained to this Radio Life reporter, "we have a reading on Friday afternoon, four days before airtime. We go over the lines and kick them around—everyone makes suggestions, and then I go back to work. While revising the script, I try to keep the theme of the program intact and at the same time try to strengthen weak spots and delete bad gags.

"Monday morning the cast rehearses the revised script, picks it to pieces again for possible flaws. Mind you, all of this is scant twenty-four hours before the broadcast. Even then, if it still seems weak, if the cast can not work up the proper enthusiasm, the entire script is junked. We make no further attempt to rewrite it but start on a new script with a new theme.

"This can be done," continued Quinn, "only because each member of the cast, from Marian and Jim Jordan down, is able to play at least three different characters if necessary. Thus, without the necessity of adding to the cast, it is possible to change a script which features Fibber and Molly, Horatio K. Boomer, an English butler and a society woman to one having such characters as the Old Timer, the Little Girl, a stuttering vacuum cleaner salesman, a gangster and a "Grik" dialectician. With these character substitutions we can change the entire theme of the program in a few hours if necessary."

Changing the entire script of a radio program at the eleventh hour is no easy task, no matter how versatile a cast may

Quinn's is the hard way to do it. But it's the way he has worked since the beginning of his association with the Jordans.

There are really two Don Quinns: the serious worker whom we have just described, and a whimsical chap known to his family and friends. In fact, Don is a rarity among humorists—a completely sane and happy man.

The current fashion for humorists—especially radio writers—calls for an upset stomach, a perennial grouch at the world, a preoccupied stare that apparently sees naught but over-ripe eggs lying all over the place. While these men

may succeed from time to time in shaking the world with a belly laugh, pass them by when in search of good company.

An enormous appetite for living keeps Don going year after year with never a lack of material.

He has his hobbies. Several sleek guns in a corner of his study are always invitations to target ranges. He likes golf, but the real love of his life, next to Mrs. Quinn, their 5-year-old daughter, Nancy, is flying. "That's really being in another world," he sums up.

On his desk is a stack of yet-to-be-read books. "Swell hobby for anyone, reading," he smiles. "Photography, too, is something I'd like to find a great deal more time for." There are weekly tap lessons in his crowded week. "It's swell exercise, you know, and that's one way you can have a lot of laughs at yourself without anyone getting hurt."

That last remark about sums up Don Quinn.

If you can laugh at yourself and really enjoy living, you have a better right to ask the world to laugh with you.

Hawthorne House

Pearl King Tanner Turned Winds of Depression into a Lullaby of Success and Entertainment

SINCERITY, Simplicity and Human Interest! Out of these three elements does the air-interest of "Hawthorne House" evolve to captivate west coast thousands Mondays at 9:30 p. m. from KFI.

Whence cometh this show that from Radio Life's readers in recent week has brought letters in hundreds, demanding "When will you publish pictures and story of 'Hawthorne House'?"

The answer is now—and here—but first:

The bleak winds of the 1929 depression in their scurrings over the land and into the affairs of men, toppling men's dreams of substance and futures into debris heaps of wrecked fortunes, homes and happiness—these bleak winds joined with death to bring to life a new kind of air-show.

In Oakland in 1929 lived Pearl King Tanner (Mother Sherwood) and her two youngsters, Marietta and Mel. A few months before, death had taken her husband, a prominent and well to do Bay district real estate operator. The winds of depression gathered force and volume. They blew across the land, left behind them an increasing litter of wrecked lives, and faintly above the windy howl the dismal pound of the footsteps of the unemployed was a staccato beat of despair on the national horizon.

For Pearl King Tanner, husband-bereft, with two children to care for, the Oakland mansion loomed up with all the cheering connotations of a white elephant. But she and the children had to live.

She found a way out of their financial problem by turning the mansion into a home for "paying guests." The group now gathered under its roof presents an interesting reflection of American life as it has developed in the three and a half years since the program first went on the air.

To many a listener Mrs. Sherwood (Pearl King Tanner) is the mainspring and heart of the serial, as she is of the Hawthorne House circle. The white-haired, sweet-faced actress who plays her, does so with such understanding, many of her friends believe, because, like her radio character, she was swept a few years ago from wealth and security to the position of bread-winner.

The beautiful mansion in Oakland, California, which was the center of innumerable social events was rented. Mrs. Tanner and her husband moved before his death to a tiny home which has been financed ever since by her radio work. Daughter of "Redwood" King, famous in California's history as rancher and horseman, Mrs. Tanner had always wanted to be an actress, but her father, a friend of many famous professional folk, including Sarah Bernhardt who visited the King ranch several times, would not permit her to go on the stage.

He did allow her to study at the Sargent School in New York and other famous dramatic schools. This experience, together with a wide education in languages and classics provided a solid foundation for stage and radio work. She enjoys both kinds of acting but has refused many offers to go on tour with legitimate companies because radio makes it possible for her to spend all her spare time with her husband, of whose ultimate recovery both are certain.

Letters at NBC's San Francisco studios attest to the hold the serial has upon Monday night listeners. Human details make the story of Hawthorne House a fascinating one.

"The greatest romance in the world lies in everyday life," says Dave Drummond, Hawthorne House author. "Place any group of everyday folk together, under one roof, and you have more drama, more clash of personalities, ideas, tastes, and opinions than you can possibly put into one play or one novel. Writing Hawthorne House has been fun from the start. So many different characters, thrown into juxtaposition, just won't stay put. You find them chatting, arguing, joking . . . sometimes almost scrapping . . . right under typewriting fingers. And there's another episode!"

MRS. SHERWOOD'S first "paying guests" were Lois Liston and her grandmother. Lois was worshipped hopelessly when the story started, by the youthful Mel, but now Lois is the wife of Jerry Tremaine, who came to Hawthorne House as a penniless young writer and won both Lois and success. Mel's own love affair with Miriam Bracefield went through many vicissitudes but now the two are happily married.

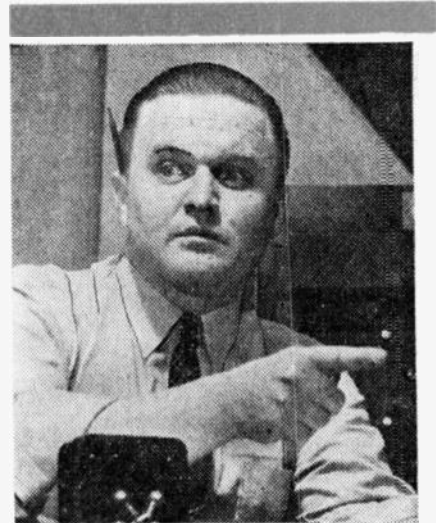
Mel is played by Jack Moyles, young NBC actor of many talents, and pretty young Florida Edwards plays the part of Marietta. Billie Byers, charming blonde young actress, plays Miriam, and Natalie Park, also youthful and blonde, and regarded as one of the most promising dramatic finds in western radio, is Lois.

Ruth Peterson plays Linda Carroll, the singer married to Chick Morgan (unassigned), and Jack Kirkwood plays the part of Uncle Jim.

Other characters in the serial include Billy Sherwood, the lad whom Mrs. Sherwood adopted and who has become as close to Mel and Marietta as if he actually were their own brother; Martha, the colored cook; Duke Calloway, and Alice James, Billy's "girl."

Sam Edwards, clever juvenile member of a famous family of thespians is Billy.

Ruth Sprague is Alice James, and like Sam, Ruth is a radio veteran. She recently was graduated from child roles to parts like her present one, and looks forward eagerly to being "grown-up" on the air. Duke Calloway is portrayed by Bert Horton, well-known character actor and "man of a thousand voices;" Dixie Marsh,

famous as a colored impersonator and singer of darky songs, plays Martha, the cook.

Hawthorne House belongs to the type of program which, throughout changing conditions of the last few years, has pictured the American scene as it really is. Based on the homely, familiar happenings of everyday life, the story of the serial is another indication of the present trend of American radio programs.

Listening to the program one begins to understand the essential significance that sincerity, simplicity and human interest have in the making of wholesome entertainment. The combination of sincerity and simplicity really insures the third element—human interest, for, after all, aren't we all—deep down in our hearts, interested in the human realities of everyday living?

As a philosopher once said: "The simple facts and experiences of life are bread for the soul."

Svengali Waring

'Superman' Was a Cinch to Blow Up Under Fred's Orchestra Making Eyes

SQUEALS of delight from the crush at the window sidetracked Fred Waring's train of thought. How was a guy going to concentrate on an arrangement for 55 musicians and singers with a lot of idiots jabbering over a toy parade in the street below.

Then someone yelled, "It's Superman!" The crowds at the windows of the Waring offices at Broadway and 53rd street, affording a perfect view of an annual department store parade, jammed closer.

"Hey, Fred, come on over and look." Others joined the chorus. Unable to concentrate through all the hubbub and prattling, Waring shoved the manuscripts aside, growled, and joined them.

Waring and Superman reached the window simultaneously. The huge, inflated rubber image of the man of might and miraculous senses paused in front of the Waring windows and turned slowly to face its admirers.

Waring looked Superman right in the eye and scowled. All the pent-up annoyance and resentment aroused by the intrusion on his labors went into that withering glance.

Then it happened.

To the astonishment of the watchers, Superman blew a gasket and collapsed. Without a word they all turned about and went back to their rehearsal for the evening broadcast.

Now, certainly, Superman's ignominious "KO" from a Waring glance was pure coincidence. But Fred's done some wonderful things himself. From the raw material of over half a hundred musicians and singers he has developed a musical stock company with 25 individual vocal

and instrumental combinations.

In the Waring menage no musician merely plays in the 25-piece band; no singer performs only in the Glee Club. Under his expert and encouraging gaze, talent, latent and indicative, has been cultivated and developed.

Waring chest-puffs: "We don't use guest stars on the show. We pull 'em out of the band." And the members serve as bit players on one program and stars on the next.

In illustration of this policy is furnished the performance schedule of Waring's 18-year-old vocalist, Donna Dae. Although only her featured numbers are announced to the NBC-Red network's "Pleasure Time" audiences, she partici-

pates in every glee club and "vocestra" (band and chorus combination) number; sings with Patsy Garrett and Jane Wilson (also soloists in their own right) in trio selections. She also is one-sixth of Waring's Twin Trios; one of the Swingettes, and does dramatic roles in the Push-Button Tuning comedies.

NBC audiences frequently chorus "oh's" when Poley McLintock deserts drums to do his "frog-voice" hog-calling and then rushes pell-mell back into the Glee Club section where he carols second-tenorishly. Tenor Stuart Churchill sings "Ave Maria" and rushes back to the percussion section to "beat the skins" for Eric Siday's rippling fiddle. Stuart also plays the tympani, chimes and triangle on the shows.

Radio-lively, the aggregation does not confine itself to doubling in singing and instrumentation. Ferne, "the lady of the violin," whose solos have highlighted many of Waring's NBC broadcasts, does the entire score herself for her solo despite the fact the group employs five arrangers.

"Svengali" Waring estimates that within the whole there are approximately thirty separate solo units—singles or small groups—who have been introduced as featured performers since the Chesterfield "Pleasure Time" series made its debut over the NBC-Red network a year-and-a-half ago.

He demands that each member of the band personnel be able to sing as well as play, as a minimum of versatility. This basic requirement provides Waring with a kaleidoscopic variety of vocal and instrumental combinations for musical arrangements which are adroitly blended montages of spot solos that interchange from vocals to instrumentation.

Still using the Svengali "eye," Waring surprised four bandsmen who doubled in the Glee Club by asking them to form a quartet for a new arrangement. They did, the "Four Hoarsemen" became another feature of the Waring Workshop.

Deanna Durbin, film star who first gained fame on the radio, will return to the air for one program in February. Miss Durbin, who has refused all radio contracts because she felt they would interfere with her motion picture work, is to appear on a "Screen Guild Theater" program over the Columbia Broadcasting System.

RECIPE FOR CONSOMME SARAH BERNHARDT

1 quart of consomme
 1 cup of tapioca
 The meat of 1 cooked lobster, cut in small cubes
 Salt and pepper to taste
 10 tarragon leaves

Boil consomme and cook tapioca in it. Then add the lobster meat cubes and cook for 5 minutes longer. Salt and pepper to taste. Just before serving boil the tarragon leaves in clear consomme, and strain the liquid into your finished consomme.

RECIPE FOR PORTERHOUSE STEAK BERCY

6 pounds of porterhouse steak
 Some peanut oil
 4 ounces of butter
 4 shallots
 1 tablespoon of parsley chopped very fine
 Pinch of chives
 1 tablespoon of meat extract
 4 lemons
 Watercress

Season the porterhouse steak with salt and pepper, roll in peanut oil and broil. When nearly done place on a large oven proof platter. Then put on a mixture of 4 ounces of butter, 4 shallots chopped very fine, a spoonfull of chopped parsley, the chives sliced very fine, a spoonfull of meat extract and the juice of 2 lemons. Put in oven and let bake for 5 minutes at 400 degrees. Garnish with plenty of watercress well washed, and the other 2 lemons cut in quarters.

RECIPE FOR JULIENNE POTATOES

6 medium size potatoes
 Plenty of shortening or peanut oil
 Salt

Cut potatoes in strips, the size of matches, but full length, fry them in plenty of shortening or peanut oil in a French fryer until crisp. Remove them from French fryer and sprinkle with salt. Service on a napkin.

This Week—Appetizers

CULINARY SIDE-SHOWS—Our recipes this week includes quite a few of these, better known as appetizers, relishes, hors d'oeuvres, antipasto or smorgasbord. The word "appetizer" is rather interesting inasmuch as it looks like an appropriate contraction of appetite-teaser. More correctly, however, it derives from the Latin for "something that makes you seek," presumably, for more, and speaking of more, let's drop the E for a moment and make it MOR.

Wilson's Certified Mor, an all-purpose, cooked, pure pork product, comes in mighty handy when you're thinking of appetizers, and you can make what they call "Ships of Joy" out of it. These consist of ovals of bread covered with a slice of cheese and then topped by half a hard-boiled egg which has a triangle of Mor for a sail. Which leads us to another important consideration regarding appetizers.

Appetizers should always be decorative. They should please the eye as well as the palate. Toothpicks and a paring knife are about all you need to obtain colorful effects, and you can create little masterpieces if you use your ingenuity. Somehow, an attractive hors d'oeuvres is always a sort of compliment to one's guests. Remember, however, that an appetizer should only whet the appetite and never quite satisfy it. It is a leader for the dinner to come and not the dinner itself. It should have flavor, zest, savoriness, piquancy, but never exorbitance.

Among the many things that can serve as appetizers are cold cuts of meat, pickled foods, seafoods, pastes, specially treated eggs and bits of salad, and some of the vegetables that lend themselves most readily to decorative treatment are radishes, carrots, small beets, hearts of artichokes, celery, cucumbers and onions.

SPEAKING OF ONIONS—Do you know the onions are supposed to be good for the liver and kidneys? Diets of onion and

milk were being advocated for dropsy nearly a hundred years ago and they still are believed to relieve mental and physical fatigue besides serving as a splendid tonic for the morning after the night before. However, while it is well recognized that the onion has strong germicidal properties, you have to eat a lot of them for the best results, and unfortunately, this might make one an unwilling hermit.

Nevertheless, if you like them, you might as well know that they contain fat and protein as well as carbohydrates, that they yield as many as 220 calories to the pound, and that they are rich in the big mineral six, namely: iron, potassium, calcium, magnesium, sodium and sulphur.

VITAMINOTES—Animal systems sometimes create their own vitamins, but man has a harder job than most in doing this. He cannot, for instance, manufacture vitamin C, and yet, he needs a new supply of it daily, because the body will not store it; hence, he must get it from green peppers, unpasteurized milk, raw fruits, liver, oranges, sprouted grains and raw cabbage; and when we say he must, we mean just that, because this vitamin is important in stimulating gland activity, in helping us to use the oxygen we breathe, and as an assistant in the work of vitamins B and D.

ANCHOVY DELIGHT (for 4)

¼ cup of anchovy paste
2 hard boiled eggs
¼ cup of chopped sweet gherkins
Canape crackers or biscuits

Mix chopped eggs and anchovy paste well. Spread on crackers and top them with chopped sweet gherkins.

HAM A LA DAHL (for 4)

8 slices of cooked tender made ham sliced very thin
1/8th of a pound of Roquefort cheese
½ a cup of India relish

Roll tender made ham slices. Then fill with mixture of India relish and roquefort.

PRINCE ROMANOFF CANAPES (for 4)

Canape crackers
1/8th ounce jar of caviar
2 hard boiled eggs
Enough mayonnaise to spread on crackers
1 lemon

Spread crackers with mayonnaise, then cover with caviar that has been seasoned with the juice of the lemon. Sprinkle tops with grated hard boiled eggs.

PATE DE FOIE GRAS (for 4)

Canape crackers
1 jar of Pate de foie gras
1 can of anchovies with cappers

Spread crackers with pate de foie gras, then, on each cracker put one anchovy in the middle of each cracker.

RECIPE FOR HALIBUT CURRY A LA FRANCOIS

1 cup of rice
1 pound of halibut steak
¼ pound of butter
2 tablespoons of minced onion
¼ cup of cooked tender made ham
¼ cup of minced celery
1/3 cup of minced green pepper
2 sprigs of thyme
2 cloves
1 green onion
1½ teaspoons of salt
2½ teaspoons of curry powder
1 tablespoon of flour
2 egg yolks
2 tablespoons of cream

Brown 2 tablespoons of minced onion, ¼ cup of minced celery in ¼ pound of melted butter. Add ¼ cup of minced tender made ham to mixture, then season with 2 sprigs of thyme, 2 cloves, and 1 green onion minced very fine, then add 1½ teaspoons of salt, 2½ teaspoons of curry powder and 1 tablespoon of flour. Then add 2 cups of boiling water, stir carefully and cook for 20 minutes, and stir while cooking. Mix 2 egg yolks with 2 tablespoons of cream and stir well into sauce, but do not let boil. Then strain through a fine sieve. Cut 1 pound of halibut into 1 inch squares. Sprinkle with ½ a teaspoon of salt and place carefully in the hot curry sauce. Simmer until fish is tender, and then serve on a ring of steamed rice. Be sure to handle fish with care when you dish it up so that it won't break.

Readers-listeners-workers from whom stem the successes or failures of any man, woman or enterprise that seeks their support. Well, we feel we have your support. We know we have tried hard to earn it. We feel, rightly enough, that all you people would not be in your markets week in and out unless you wanted Radio Life. We feel you've wanted us because we filled one of life's innumerable needs. Well, the answer would be to Mr. Mason that in a democracy no president could do that which invites a nation's people to shed their blood in war. But America is not a democracy, surprising as this information may be to many of us.

A democracy is government directed and administered by the people directly. Nowhere on earth is there a democracy. America is a republic. In a republic, sovereignty resides in the masses through elected officers who, being human, are more apt to be influenced by expediences, since these are more easily observed, than the will of the mass for whose direct expression no provision is made. What we think is the essence of difference between democracy and republicanism inheres in the failure of all effort to bring about national referendums on issues involving the welfare and lives of loved ones—war, for instance. In no nation on earth do the masses have a say-so about their lives when the war drum pounders begin beating out their lethal rhythms. In a democracy the referendum would be the

most obvious and natural recourse to determine the will of the people. Yet, all referendum efforts have been beaten back in the congresses of the republic. Who has stood to gain by this estoppel of popular will? Who has dared not risk trusting the will of the people? Somebody, surely. But, certainly, not the people, ourselves.

The best we can do, we suppose, is to realize that Europe is reaping its harvest of madness, and for us to make ready for our defense, and we are fully capable of that. While doing so, may we not ask American leadership as we ask Mr. Mason, on just what it would precipitate American entry into the war. It would seem somewhat stupid for them to haul out that shabby old propaganda bawd: To make the world safe for democracy. What other reasons would they have?

Radio Terms Book

Eddie Byron, director of "Mr. District Attorney," is preparing a glossary of the specialized terms used by radio directors. He believes the book may be useful to both directors and actors in more or less standardizing directions so that any actor may know immediately what any director wants him to do.
