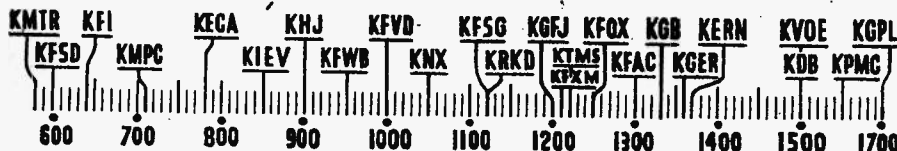

Sirs: Without handing out any "soft-soap" and a lot of "bull" I want to say,

that I have been a steady and consistent reader of Radio Life, since last summer. Since the Metropolitan dailies got into their scrap with the broadcasters, we of the listening public, have had to go without having answered many questions that arise in our minds.

Radio Life has come to the rescue—and how!

With a small five-tube RCA set I often pick up northern and eastern stations, particularly at night.

Often I have felt the need to identify them as to their connection with the major chains.

May I suggest that some time, in the very near future, you compile a list of all of the coast and west slope stations that are outlets for any of the major chains—and identify such stations with such chains.

I doubt that there are 100 stations all told on the coast that are so identified, therefore, it should not be a heavy task.

I do know that such stations as KFSF (San Diego), KPO (San Francisco), and KOA (Denver) are National Broadcasting outlets. Also KFRC (San Francisco) and KHSL (Chico, Calif.) are Mutual outlets but this represents only a small proportion of the total.

I intend, if and when you should publish this information, to cut the same out of the magazine and paste it in my log book. (i.e. "Log Book" means to me, general station information).

'Mrs. Lawrence'

The radio adaptation of this international best-seller is broadcast as a feature of the Wheatena Playhouse each Monday through Friday over station KXX.

RADIO SHOW STANDINGS: Resultfully potent among radio poll-takers and analysts is CAB (Comparative Analysis of Broadcasting), a department of radio's weekly trade journal, "Broadcasting."

Last week CAB had reported ten shows as leading the radio parade at the close of 1940, had made an analysis of evening show position standings for the whole year month by month, and thus gave radio, its time buyers and advertising agencies succinct information with which to key 1941's air efforts.

As they wound up the year, the ten shows and their standings were:

- Place 1, Jack Benny; 2) Edgar Bergen; 3) Fibber McGee and Molly; 4) Lux Radio Theatre; 5) Bob Hope; 6) The Aldrich Family; 7) Kate Smith Hour; 8) Major Bowes; 9) Kay Kyser; and 10) One Man's Family.

As December rolled to its own and the old year's end, CAB positioned daytime shows as follows: 1) Ma Perkins; 2) Pepper Young's Family; 3) Vic and Sade; 4) Life Can Be Beautiful; 5) The Woman in White; 6) Mary Marlin; 7) Right to Happiness; 8) Stella Dallas; 9) Our Gal Sunday; and 10) Road of Life.

Significant in CAB's findings was fact that but three shows—not among first ten in December 1939—had broken into the charmed column. These were the Aldrich Family, Kay Kyser and One Man's Family.

Favorites of 1939, Kraft Music Hall, Fitch Band Wagon, and Pot o' Gold, were dismally gone, Kraft falling from fifth to twelfth place, the Band Wagon from

eighth to eleventh, and the Pot from 11th to 57th.

In its lengthy digest by A. W. Lehman (Jan. 13, 1941) Broadcasting ascribed many reasons for shifts in popularity, most of which were of trade interest, but which, like all reasons, gave way to best reason of all: Public preferred certain shows more than others, tuned to these shows, raised their popularity levels.

Unable to undertake an adequate survey of the year's best shows, Radio Life editors at year's end waded through mail to cross-section December reader-listener preferences, found:

- For evening shows: 1) Fibber and Molly; 2) Edgar Bergen; 3) One Man's Family; 4) Jack Benny; 5) Major Bowes; 6) Kay Kyser; 7) The Aldrich Family; 8) Bob Hope; 9) Lux Radio; and 10) Kate Smith Hour.

Radio Life's reader-listener positioning for daytime shows: 1) Vic and Sade; 2) Life Can Be Beautiful; 3) The Woman in White; 4) Ma Perkins; 5) Pepper Young's Family; 6) Mary Marlin; 7) Right to Happiness; 8) Stella Dallas; 9) Our Gal Sunday; and 10) Second Wife.

- Of newscasters and commentators, national, local and coastal Radio Life readers positioned: 1) Fulton Lewis; 2) Jose Rodriguez and Sid Sutherland; 3) John B. Hughes; 4) Gabriel Heatter; 5) Knox Manning; 6) Sam Hayes; 7) Ybarra; 8) Al Warner; 9) Elmer Davis; and 10) Fleetwood Lawton.

Of shows originating independently of nets or restricted to coastal area, Radio Life readers' mail analysis revealed: 1) Bachelor's Children; 2) Orphans of Di-

vorce; 3) Family Doctor; 4) I Want a Divorce; 5) Great Plays; 6) Confessions of a Corsair; 7) Friendly Neighbors; 8) Reported Missing; 9) Shafter Parker; and 10) Hiway Romances.

BEAT ME, PROPAGANDA, 'SIG' TO THE SONG: The length to which ASCAP is willing to go in carrying on its fight with radio networks was demonstrated last Saturday night, much, we think, to the chagrin of California's leading newspaper publishers.

In annual convention was California Newspaper Publishers Association at ultra-swank Del Monte Hotel, on Monterey's rain-drenched peninsula. Traditionally the fourth-estates wind up their convention on Saturday night with an evening of stage entertainment, hilarity, dancing.

Announced weeks in advance was appearance, as principal entertainer, of Sigmund ("Sig") Romberg, ace composer, from whom publisher-guests expected sweet songs, certainly no proselytizing.

Interested enough were the publishers, then, in Romberg's playing of his "Song of Love," "When I Grow Too Old to Dream," and "One Alone." Amazed, however, and irate were some when Romberg said:

"Too bad we can't have these songs any more—they're ASCAP."

And, after two more melodies from "Desert Song": "If you want these tunes,

write the sponsors—not the radio stations." Other and repeated references to ASCAP were made throughout Romberg's performance. The next morning as editors were rubbing weary eyes, following their night of merrymaking, they were asking themselves why their supposed "entertainment" should have been dished up as over-ripe ASCAP propaganda, wondered, too, perhaps, whether newspapers, even though self-admitted enemies of radio, haven't been already too ASCAP-gullible in news covering of current tune-tumult.

NOT ONLY ELEPHANTS HAVE MEMORIES: The year is 1911 and the invasion of Manhattan by the boy from Van Buren, Arkansas, has come to a temporary halt on the 11th Avenue waterfront and a second-rate motion picture studio advertising for extras. A few weeks before he had been working a minstrel circuit through Dixie's cotton-bolled, pre-

cinets, had lost his job, had bent tired footsteps northward to where the Big City sprawled seductively across its ocean-wind-spanked area.

Back thus far does Bob (Bazooka) Burns go to explain a trait that causes much radio director hair-clutching, a habit many regard as a professional inhibition: an unwillingness to rehearse.

Last week Bob Burns remembered: "I rode a hoss in them pictures, was all dressed up like a Swiss guard in cocked hat, white uniform and oil-cloth leggings that came darn near to my waist. I was supposed to be knocked off my hoss and trampled on. Before shooting, we had eight rehearsals. I was trampled on eight times."

Since then Bob Burns hasn't had much use for rehearsals. On current Music Hall boires with Bing Crosby each Thursday over NBC's KFI at 6 p. m., he gives practice sessions a quick brush-off, merely jotting down notes like "Aunt Boo's mouse trap" or "Snazzy's automobile" to cover his script on an Ozark story. NBC producers, accustomed to timing their broadcasts with split-second precision, find Burns' rambling technique a problem. Bob recalled his first show on KMH:

"They gave me a six-minute spot on that show. I told 'em it warn't enough. I ought to have at least seven. We argued back and forth and finally they give in and let me have seven minutes. Helen Jepson was to sing right after me. I began to gab and rambled on for 13 minutes and 10 seconds. Helen didn't get to go on at all. For all I know she may be settin' there yet."

No sitter, Helen Jepson has become a prime radioist.

LOVE-STRUCK LILY: The love-struck Lily of "Meet Mister Meek" is Ann Thomas, a veteran of radio, though still a young girl. Unlike most actors who were carried on stage at early ages, Ann was individualistic. She crawled on at age of four to delight a Metropolitan Opera audience watching a production of "The Bluebird." The crawl was her debut, although she thought nothing of it at the time.

Like a pipe-dream reads her development since then. Names of persons she has worked with are a potential bluebook of the theater.

Her first dramatic work (at 7) was with David Warfield in David Belasco's production of "The Merchant of Venice." She got the part, not because of her talent, but because the costume they had for the role fit her.

"The dress," explained Ann, "had been brought over from Italy, especially to be used in the show. Mr. Belasco interviewed dozens of little girls and when he discovered it fit me perfectly, I got the job."

On opening night of "The Merchant of Venice" in New York, Mistress Ann Thomas made her first appearance in the dress and fell flat on her face, in that lovely dress, too—an omen of good luck for the bad beginning has steadily worked towards a good ending.

She continued stage work while attending New York Professional Children's School, appeared with Florenz Ziegfeld, Morris Gest, Charles Dillingham. She has worked in 35 Broadway shows, starting with the "Merchant of Venice," con-

tinuing on up to the more recent "Two on an Island" and "Having a Wonderful Time."

WITH CHISEL AND PALETTE:

Lovely is Irene Rich, star of radio program, "Dear John," but no more or less lovely than is her charming daughter, Frances, sculptress. To both women a fortnight ago journeyed Diego Rivera, Mexico's corpulent artist-liberal. His mission? To paint a fresco portrait of Frances.

Rivera found Santa Barbara dampish, grew discouraged at long delays between drying of fresco's various stages. Neither Rivera or La Rich's Frances saw in heatless days reason for fraying tempers. How Frances solved situation: Between fresco-drying intervals she settled portly Rivera on a dais in her studio, went ahead with a terra-cotta bust of him. Restive-handed, Rivera began a self-portrait, finished it while Frances sculpted him.

National

COALS TO AIRY NEWCASTLE: On a day last fortnight to makers of Wings cigarettes there happened that which is often a nightmare to honest contest conductors when contests have as first prizes that which is singularly costly: Two men tied for first place in Wings' contest on program, "Wings of Destiny," prize for which weekly is a Piper Cub airplane. The men, Henry T. Miller, Tulsa, Okla., and Lieut. Wyan E. Thiessen, Davenport, Iowa.

Being honest contest conductors, as all radio contest stagers are, makers of Wings to both men gave spankingly new airplanes.

In Miller's case, the award of a plane

was a mild case of carrying coals to Newcastle, feathers to a bird. He is a young aviation enthusiast employed by Sparton School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, has 40 flying hours credited. Lieut. Thiessen is a reserve cavalry officer, employed by the Iowa State Employment Service.

Four judges, Max Karant, editor, "Flying and Popular Aviation"; Ed Peacock, "Aero Digest"; Janet Mayhercey, a director of Chicago Girls Flying Club, and Miss Lorene Nystrum, radio editor of Chicago Herald-American, made their individual selections without reference to other members. The final result: two first for Miller, two for Thiessen.

TEN MILLIONS FOR EARS: Most prodigal of all who buy air-time is the giant industrial empire of Procter and Gamble. Toilet-soaping, shortening-vending, teeth-cleaning, and laundry-soap-tubing American millions, P&G last year in behalf of eight products they make and distribute chucked into radio treasuries some ten million dollars to account for nearly one-sixteenth of the 167 million dollars radio got to seduce American ears to the dramatized messages of industry.

Nothing is known of amounts P&G pays for its radio talents. It has, however, some 25 programs pounding their way through sets into drawing, living and bedrooms of genus domesticus Americanus Homo. Its writers are high-paid, among them Gertrude Berg (Goldbergs), \$5,000 per week; Irna Phillips (Guiding Light, Right to Happiness, Road of Life, Woman in White), \$4,000; Elaine S. Carrington (Pepper Young's Family) and Jane West (The O'Neills), \$1,000 each.

JUVENILE BRAIN-TRUSTER: When Van Dyke Tiers was 3 years old, he knew names of planets in order from the sun, geography of every country in the world, states and capitals; when 4, could spell "psychology," "Czechoslovakia" and "Cincinnati."

Today, at 13, the Harvey, Ill., boy has become Quiz Kids' authority on spelling, geography and astronomy. He made his debut with the program last summer, has been most frequent contender on Wednesday broadcasts from 8 to 8:30 p. m., over NBC's KECA-KFSD.

Interested educators attribute his store of knowledge to insatiable curiosity, evident since he first talked, and a striking ability to memorize data. Recalled last week by his mother, Mrs. H. W. Tiers, was his early querying of his father about geography.

A junior now in the Thornton Township High School in Harvey, Chicago suburb, young Tiers' ability as an orthographer was demonstrated in a recent broadcast when he spelled correctly all the words in this sentence: "It is disagreeable to witness the embarrassment of the harassed peddler."

His hobby is chemistry. He was pleased to receive a set of chemicals for Christmas, is now engaged in investigating thoroughly properties of phosphorus.

Despite mental gymnastics, Van lives a normal life. He is a good baseball player and an excellent ice-skater.

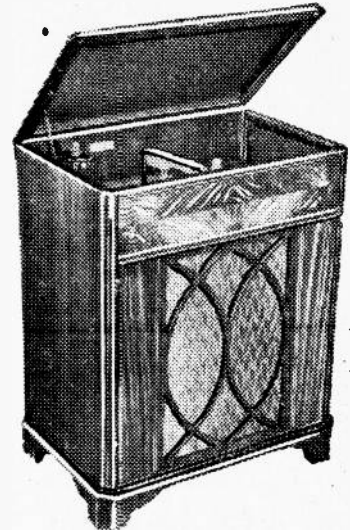
"These are days of grave emergency. Faced with momentous decisions, we have embarked upon a program of national defense, mobilizing all resources to combat the challenge of aggression."

LADY UPPINGTON

A Trouper at 6, Isabel Randolph Started Her Career as a Cry-Baby

ISABEL RANDOLPH, "Fibber McGee and Molly's" famous Mrs. Uppington, started to learn how to become a trouper at the ripe old age of 6 months. That was a thoroughly natural consequence for any daughter of Alex and May Randolph. They were stage folks, and when May was cast in a mother role during an appearance in a Chicago theater, the most natural thing in the world was to pick the new little Randolph kid out of her basket back stage and walk on.

Miss Randolph has been a trouper ever since. Today she is rated by fellow artists as one of the best actresses in radio. But, like fine tool steel, it took the fire of adversity to develop the metal in this actress.

During her stage career, Miss Randolph was starred with Blanche Ring, Richard Bennett, Walter Connolly, Lenore Ulric, Barbara Stanwyck and many other stage celebrities. She was a leading woman with repertory companies in Rochester, Cleveland, Detroit, St. Paul, Des Moines, Milwaukee and Chicago. And she turned

a life of stage romance into a life of real romance when she got married in 1917 to J. C. Ryan, a Chicago newspaperman.

Lenore Ryan and Isabel Mary Ryan were born to the pair, and life until the latter part of 1929 was a happy affair. Isabel managed to find time out of her home career to carry on with her stage career. But 1929 was a bitter year for the family—leaving financial ruin in its wake, and the head of the family broken in health.

By the time 1939 arrived, the entire burden of the future was on her shoulders. The head of the house was dead.

The stage of her earlier days had reached the doldrums, and in the extreme necessity of providing for her two children and herself, she at last turned to one other outlet for dramatic talent—radio. There was one jittery July day for Miss Randolph in 1932 when she came up to face old man microphone for the first time in her life—and came out of the battle on top, with a script clutched tightly in her hand and a job appearing with Harvey

Hays in the Miniature Theater program produced in Chicago's NBC studios.

Once started in this new dramatic medium, Isabel never faltered. Assigned a dramatic role on the Thurston broadcast, she headed for New York and Radio City where she went to work on any number of dramatic sustainers. She also worked with Joe Penner and Eddie Lowry before coming back to Chicago to go to work on Lights Out, Welcome Valley, Princess Pat, Eyes of Youth, Forest Rangers, Girl Alone, Mary Marlin, and many other broadcasts. Then they cast her in the role of Mrs. Uppington on the Fibber McGee and Molly program. When the McGees moved to Hollywood in 1937, Isabel, along with all the other members of the cast, came west too.

If asked about her success, Miss Randolph says: "When you have two youngsters to think about, you've just naturally got to make good, and that's all there is to that," is her own way of putting it.

Today, Lenore and Isabel Mary are turning into grown-up young ladies who help their mother indulge a penchant she has for rescuing stray cats. And if Isabel ever makes a million dollars, that million will be devoted to helping others. It's a part of her code to give a helping hand whenever she finds a friend nearing the end of the rope—even if that friend is only a bewildered old alley cat.

Radio Side Show

TO AUSTRALIA recently went NBC's slow-voiced, harmonica-playing Herb Shriner, stopping on the way at Fiji. There, remembering that islanders were naive adorers of silks and gaudy apparel, decided he would briefly essay a radio Trader Horn, trade a few harmonicas for island handcraft.

Into his trunk dug Shriner for old harmonicas, came up with several, left the ship and joined passengers streaming toward a native market-place.

He came upon one lone native, bushy of hair, flat of nose, unintelligent in look. On the ground in front of him were bows and arrows, spears, and objects made of pounded bark. Shriner paused, looked over the collection of souvenirs, decided here was a victim for his trade.

"Trade stuff?" said Herb.

"Ha," replied the native, affirmatively smiling.

Kate Smith Is Given the Works by U.S.C. Students, But Holds Up

Editor's Note: Recently Kate Smith was a guest of Journalism students at USC. Keen-minded, the students gave Miss Katie a thorough 'eyeing' and stiff interrogation. What proved to be a consensus of student reactions to the beloved singer is the following article by Sam Roeca, USC sophomore.

I WASN'T really listening. The familiarity of her friendly voice reminded me of winter nights and firesides; listening to the radio and singing "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain," eating popcorn balls and apples.

It was Kate Smith all right. The reportorial staff of the Daily Trojan was seated about the long table in the senate chamber of the Student Union, and there at the head sat Kate, her eyes effecting individual introductions as they wove their way down the long row of attentive journalism students.

It was an interview, and we were supposed to ask questions. "Why are you here?" "How long will you stay?" "Can you cook?" "What is your favorite song?" Those are questions of interest to all, I am sure; but they fail to convey the intrinsic value and meaning of an interview with a person like Kate Smith. They are superficial.

Have you wondered why Kate is a favorite with so many radio listeners? I found the answer to that question the moment I met her. She is an American "with all the trimmings." Her genial informality, her jolliness, sincerity, and charm are fused with an attractive self-

confidence that typifies the American. She seemed more like "cousin Kate" than a radio celebrity.

She loves to sing. And the songs she loves to sing are American—"The Woodpecker Song," "God Bless America," "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain," "Indian Summer," and countless others.

A student asked:

"Why did you choose radio as a career, Miss Smith?"

"I didn't choose the radio. I chose singing, and radio work followed. However, I didn't study singing, and it isn't really work with me, it's what I love to do."

Those who sing are gay of spirit and are generous because they love to give of themselves. In recent years Kate has raised sums totaling \$4,000,000 singing at charity performances for the Red Cross. But that is material. The sums of joy that she has raised in the hearts of thousands cannot be estimated in terms of money.

She has given herself to the American people and does not bemoan the loss of privacy. When at length she desires the solace and companionship of her family and personal friends, she boards a train for Washington, D. C. There she has access to the private station entrance of the President and may enter the city unsighted and unseen. She considers the privilege a very special one.

Called the "undisputed first lady of

radio" by Time magazine, she certainly justifies the compliment. Radio polls have selected her as first among feminine radio entertainers four times in the last ten years, and she has never been voted to a position lower than second.

For me the meeting was not so much an interview as an affirmation. Kate was not other than I had imagined nor less than I had expected. Had someone told me I was listening to the radio, only the reality of the interview could have disproved the statement. Her voice held the same distinguishing qualities that I had noticed in her radio speech.

I liked the way she drafted us into her sphere of personal friends. She answered questions—serious, silly, odd, or unrelated—with the prompt casualness of unrestrained frankness.

"What was your greatest thrill, Miss Smith?"

"Singing for the king and queen of England at a command performance in the White House during their visit to this country."

"Were you nervous? What did you sing?"

"I'll say I was nervous! I had never received such an honor before. I sang a varied repertoire that included several English favorites like 'Danny Boy' and one or two American songs. Of course I couldn't forget my favorite, 'When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain.'"

"Didn't you sing 'God Bless America'?"

"I wanted to because I love that song very much, but I don't think it would have been appropriate, do you?"

General tones of agreement followed Kate's counter-question.

Reticence on the part of journalism students disappeared almost as soon as she began to speak. One by one their pencils and pens were laid aside, and they seemed to settle in their chairs. Elbows on the table and chins in hand, they leaned forward, forgetting the routine of detail and losing themselves in pleasant generalities. The interview had reverted to a well-stimulated conversation.

That is what I mean when I say she is an American. So few of the many who attain any degree of fame, whether they be doctors, diplomats, actors or musicians, retain that friendly atmosphere of the "next-door neighbor."

Oddly enough, Kate finds her greatest relaxation in listening to the radio. She diplomatically refused to limit her personal favoritism to any one program, but inferred that the "lighter and humorous" varieties attracted her more than others.

"I sort of handle the humorous brand of copy here at S. C., Kate—I mean Miss Smith—and I'd like to know what particular style of humor you prefer," queried a senior.

"That's rather difficult to answer. I enjoy a laugh any time, anywhere, and it doesn't take too much to make me laugh. In fact I can listen to our program jokes all week at rehearsals and then laugh at them again when we are on the air."

Kate always used the term "we" when speaking of her radio program. Each division of the program is handled by the performers of that particular division; that is, the comedians arrange their portion, the dramatists theirs, and Kate's group selects the songs she will sing. At

Kate graduated from Washington and Lee college. Although singing has been her "love" and her "vocation" she never studied it in school. To this day she cannot read a note of music and says she never intends to learn.

"Fortunately I have a perfect ear for harmony and tones, and I thank God for it."

Students were glad to hear her say that she attributed her success to a college education, even though she never studied the vocation she chose in later life. But "later life" might be a poor term because she was singing most of the time in college, taking parts in choruses, musicals, and glee clubs.

Kate said that from the time her regular programs discontinued in June until their beginning in September she doesn't sing a note. I'll be blunt and say that I doubt that statement. I do not see how any one so cheerful with her every gesticulation could repress such a desire for expression. It is too much a part of Kate, and she can't conceal it.

The next time you listen to Kate's program do not try to fashion an intricate personality. Just remember the person singing those songs is having a swell time. Remember that she is a plain American, likes plain things, and that singing the songs you particularly enjoy is more a pleasure to her than a duty.

It is with a note of satisfaction that I bring this "impression" to a close. I have enjoyed describing Kate Smith, and have enjoyed the reconsideration of our round-table conversation. It's five minutes 'til, and she'll be on the air in a moment. Yes—the Songbird of the South has left her habitat and flown on the wings of melody into the heart of every American.

material as the dress. Although the coat was fitted, it was far from plainly tailored. WORLD ON YOUR DIAL

By Earl G. De Haven

IT IS DOUBTFUL if any short wave station broadcasting today operates under as great a handicap with respect to interference as does FO8AA in Papeete, Tahiti. Utilizing a frequency right in the midst of the 40 Meter amateur C.W. band, reception, even when conditions are ideal, is rarely satisfactory. Ample proof of this was evidenced again last Tuesday evening when, with the best signal in months, the station's modulated carrier was literally "chopped up" by C. W. stations. Enough could be heard however, to determine that "The Voice of Tahiti" can rebroadcast London quite as successfully as "Radio Saigon" formerly did. Reader-listeners who would like to possess a verification card from this station should listen between 8 and 9 p. m. on Tuesdays and Fridays, describe as best they may the program continuity, noting changes in this continuity and the time at which they are made. The frequency of the Tahiti station is 7.1 Mc. and the transmitter is low-powered. Patience will win, so "have at it."

Excellent reception was enjoyed last Wednesday night from VLQ-7 in Sydney, Australia, and if like signals were shown four or five nights each week the station would command a large Pacific coast audience. This station operates on 11.88 Mc. and comes on at 9:55 p. m., with a full news broadcast featured at 10 p. m. Another interesting feature presented several times each week is: "The War—through Australian Eyes," a review of critical comment on the international conflict as mirrored in the Australian press. Selections in "record series" make

up the musical portion of this broadcast.

The Italian Broadcasting System has just inaugurated a transmission that is directed particularly to the Pacific coast of North America, which is aired from 9 to 10:10 p. m., and to Edgar Cook of Los Angeles we give credit for supplying us with this interesting "scoop." At present the programs are in the nature of a test and the reports from listeners in this area will determine whether or not this period will become a permanent part of Rome's short wave service. The transmission is carried only by 2RO-3 on 9.63 Mc. and a check at press time reveals that the signal level on this period is considerably below that of 2RO-3 on the regular "American Hour from Rome" program. Tests made some time ago on this same frequency, but at 11 p. m. rather than 9, were well received here.

In closing, a few words on reception conditions seem apropos. The 25 and 31 meter bands have improved considerably during the past week for the night hours. The Tokyo stations and likewise Manchoukuo, are still below normal however. 73's and lots of DX!

Don't let the fact that she gets air credit under the name Beatrice Henning Shaw (it's her own, anyway) throw you off. Any similarity between Beatrice Henning Shaw and Beatrice Henshaw is purposely and entirely coincidental!

These half-hour historical dramas are sponsored by the Adult Education division of the California State Department of Education, with the assistance of the Work Projects Administration, and have long been endorsed by school authorities, women's clubs and the Parent-Teacher association.

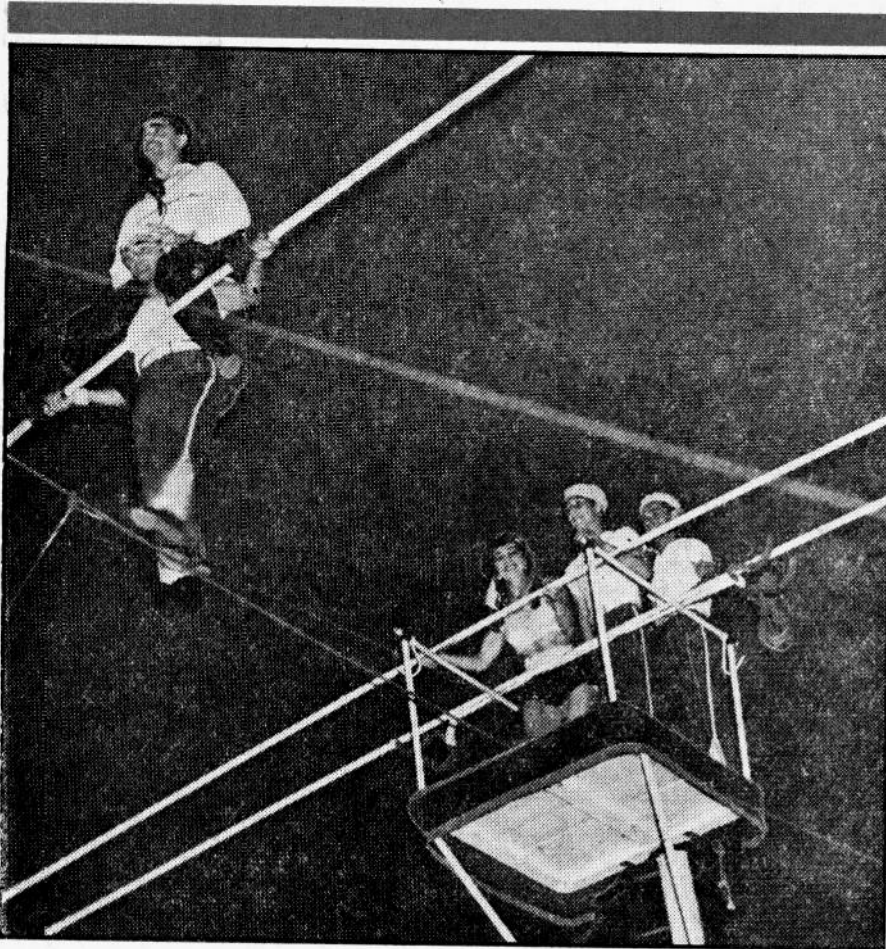

ONCE ORDERED to broadcast an aerial-acrobatic circus, Louis (Bill) Kelso —(Hank, the Night Watchman), filled his assignment with characteristic thoroughness. With a portable transmitter he got aback one of the performers, held his breath, started talking and broadcast the first (and perhaps, last) account of a trip through tent-top space with a slackwire walker.

Night Workers, the Lonely of Heart and Roisterers, the City of Darkness Hails the Hero of This Article!

left the revitalization of the exhausted community to workers of the night.

It is for these workers more than for anybody else that Hank, the Night Watchman, answering the insistently continual jangle of telephones, ad libbing good humor and choosing and spinning his records, does his own work by night. And these are the battalions of milkmen who blitzkrieg the early morning with the tinkle of millions of milk bottles, can and garbage collectors who raise an artillery-like noise barrage with indelicate handling of malodorous tag-ends of millions of meals; corps of seamy-handed scrubbers and cleaners in office buildings, taxi drivers chilled in gray mornings at cab stands; power plant engineers "juicing" the town; panzer divisions of truckmen tooling their snorting mechanical monsters out of the city to the open roads; shouting wholesale district and market workers; cops coming off and going on duty; all-night restaurant staffs; these, and scores of other classifications from life-weary jades to late-working executives, from aircraft factory workers to bedridden listening to the night radio as a buffer against dragging pain; from out of all the strange symphony of life and human beings who for their own reasons, circumstantial and fateful, ordered and disordered, elect to or have to, stay awake during the long night hours, the Watchman tends his records, issues his racy patter of comment and humor, as much a part

Watchmen! What of the Night?

ON ANY NIGHT in the week in those hours when the erstwhile stridor of the metropolis has given way to the first soft sibilances of a city too big and varied in activity to ever sleep, Hank, the Night Watchman, is at his record-spinning post in the announcer's booth of station KFVD.

Outside, Western avenue, in uptown Los Angeles, is a long, narrow ribbon of asphalt rolling down from the Los Feliz hills to the sandpapered grate of the sea smashing with eternal monotony against a 20-mile distant shoreline. The lights on Western avenue, as they are all over the half-somnolent city, re dim. Neons wink or glare at long-spaced intervals, harbingers of chili, hamburgers and hot coffee for early morning drunkards and late motorists speeding home from protracted parties; callow striplings, fugitive from high school and lower college classes occasionally roar past behind "gunned" motors of stripped Fords and Chevies. White and black radio police cars whisk silently around corners, or cruise with seeming aimlessness down to

the intersection of Wilshire and Western, where shivering clusters of humans wait wearily for the owl busses, north and south. A few lights come on in apartment windows. Figures are silhouetted briefly before shades are drawn. Radios are heard, muted down from some of the apartments, from houses set back on residential streets, from occasional cars parked at curbsides or in driveways, whose occupants rest heads on shoulders, young and old loves, perhaps, loath to say good-night.

Into the quiet, which never is real quiet, but seems so only because the city of the day, noisy, big, complex and bustling, has fallen into partial sleep. Part of its great body, however, stirs like nervous limbs of a giant not completely reposed.

Hank, the Night Watchman, lives and spins his records for that wide-awake part of the giant. That part is the tens of thousands who do their work at night, when the multi-millions of Los Angeles have done their work by day and have

of the unseen drama of the Night City as those who contribute in their ways to its drama.

HANK, THE NIGHT WATCHMAN, is Louis (Bill) Kelso, a brown-eyed Latin. For Victor Clothing Company, downtown merchants who for years have served well the economy-minded, but value-wise, community, Hank goes on the air at 10 p. m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays, at 11 p. m. on remaining weekdays, to play as many requests as time and almost endless library of records will permit him.

And, in his time on the air, little has happened in life that he has not been privy to. For the city by night is drawn together in an ineffable comradeship. And the voice of Hank, the Night Watchman, his cheery comradeship of down-to-earth wit, is an oral beacon fingering the night, his melodies a flood of "light" in the city's stumblingly busy dark.

And what happens? A disconsolate woman calls in on one of three trunk lines. She says she is going to commit suicide.

Will Hank play "It's a Long Way to Tipperary?" That was weeks ago. Hank kidded the woman along, breaking into other requests during the program, kidding her by microphone to think it over another day. She is through thinking about it. Every night now she calls, mysteriously, thanks him for what he did on a hopeless morning, asks for a record, thanks him again and retires to silence for another 24 hours.

A distracted mother calls in. Will he please broadcast for Lulu to come home. It's way past bedtime. She's probably on a party somewhere. Hank complies. The mother calls again to tell him Lulu heard him, that she didn't know it was so late. They were just having fun.

Truck drivers starting out on the lonely highways leading in all directions from the city are habitual requestees. Understandably enough, most of them ask for "She'll Be Coming Round the Mountain," which, perhaps, they leather-lung out over the wastelands and farms on their route.

Girls will call and ask that a song be dedicated to Pete, or Joe, Jim or Bill from "The Girl on the Hill," from "Your Dream at Ocean Park," in memory of Esther and a "Night of Romance," and, again, understandingly, "from June," who asks for "You Made Me Love You."

Most often asked for recordings are "hot" ones, with Will Bradley's "Beat Me, Daddy, Eight to the Bar," currently the most popular. Tommy Dorsey is a favorite of the Watchman's night-working world, with Wayne King in third place in numbers of requests. The classics are seldom asked for, waltzes rarely, although there are times when the temper of the city's stay-uppers falls into nostalgic

moods and many will phone in for songs of sweet old sentiments.

Once a woman called and, after asking Hank to play "In My Merry Oldsmobile," insisted on telling him of a romance with one "Albert" who used to take her riding back in the early 1900's. "It was when 'My Merry Oldsmobile' was popular," she explains wistfully. "I shall never forget how handsome and strong he looked in his moustache."

There was a night when an academic male voice called, apologized for a condition that was not obvious over telephone, save for the slightest of hiccoughs, and asked for any number played andante. Hank spun "Andante Cantabile" and was somewhat taken aback when the man phoned again and said: "Andante, my friend. Andante, not adantino." Hank looked the word up and merely spun the record a bit faster.

As radio's night watchman, Hank will get on an average, 580 requests nightly. He is able to play but a fifth of them, averaging 110 during his tour of nocturnal musical stewardship. Somewhat of a sentimentalist, he dedicates the program to "Their Majesties of the Night, the Working Man and Girl," thus neatly giving masculine, mature stature to stripplings and oldsters, and pleasing, besides the beauteous who take it for granted, the charwomen for whom the appellation is a pickup from a vista of hallways and mops.

His program is open for police at all times. The gendarmes frequently make use of it in supplementing urgent bulletins to reach audiences other than cruising patrol cars.

Hank has a pet parrot, "Chotsie," whom he is teaching a radio-safe vocabulary to supersede the blast of profanity with which "Chotsie" announced his first microphone appearance. Chotsie has a tiny pearl necklace sent him by a woman who wrote: "You're certainly a bird, Chotsie. Remind me of Jim on the U.S.S. Lexington."

Of an old show family, Hank runs his program with thorough showmanship within its limits. Monday nights are "Star" nights and the program is studded at intervals with name personalities from radio and motion picture studios and with those prominent in civic life. He distinguishes "personalities" from stars; means that a personality "is somebody who can do a turn for the edification of the boys and girls who ride the KFVD night beam with me." On a forthcoming Wednesday night show he will have Frankie Carle, composer, with him. Has had other prominent entertainers.

Hank gets letters from distant Honolulu, Chicago and Kentucky, doesn't know for sure whether the program is heard so distantly, but guesses it must be "or else why would they write in asking, like the girl in Honolulu did, for "Kiss Me Again" to be followed by "Moonlight Bay" Saturday come a week, because it's going to be the night I make him say what I want him to say." Such frank confessions of amorous intent do not startle Hank. His mail is a cross-section of simple folk libidos expressin' themselves, of screwballs with low mental batting averages, lonely women in cheerless apartments, besides the run of hu-

manity at work in the city and to which he dedicates his musical melanges.

Athletic as Errol Flynn, Hank played football for Elgin Academy in Illinois, was a star basketball player, taught swimming and could have made a name for himself in professional baseball had he not elected to turn to radio as a career.

Like all good workmen, he tries to visualize his job in terms of results. Thus he has analyzed the human character in the city by night, what that character does, what he thinks, dreams and plans. He has established a composite of all workers by night, all who live by night, and patterns his talk to respond to this character, the musical program, of course, taking care of itself.

Tonight he will be on the air. When he first goes on the roar of the city will be at its greatest; will dwindle down after midnight, will fall almost silent around 3 a. m. But, there will be men and women abroad in those morning hours, and to them, shadows in the night, Hank, the Night Watchman, will be beacon of fun and diversion, giving an inner glow of satisfaction against the coming dawn.

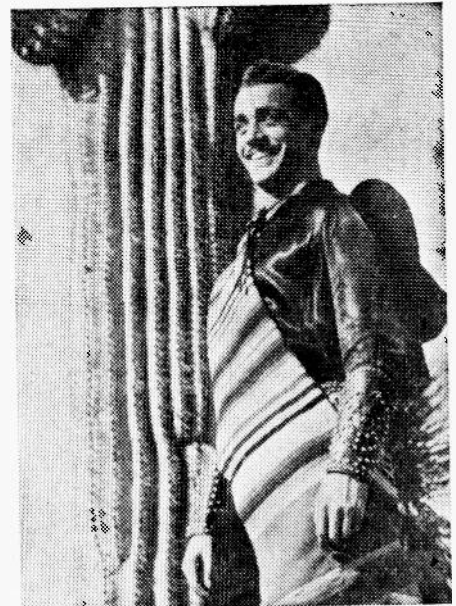
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Cantor Proteges

Inside the News

**Jose Rodriguez and Sid Sutherland
Bring Knowledge to Their Air Task**

"PROPHECY is idle!"

Jose Rodriguez, Thrifty Drug Company's news commentator nightly at 10:30 o'clock from KFI, is speaking. We are in his office, under orders from the corner editorial office to give Radio Life readers a pen picture of Jose and Sid Sutherland, his teammate on "Inside the News." We see a medium height, brown-eyed, well set-up chap in his middle 30's (we guessed), around whose mouth an ironical smile came and went as the interview proceeded. He was talking for Sid Sutherland, besides himself, Sutherland being unable to come down this morning.

We ask him:

-What of world conditions? Had he any prediction about the future course of events in today's world?

He had, but not as predictions or prophecies.

"Years of observation, study and analysis of trends reported through press and radio convince me of certain inescapable facts," he said. "America has become, will long remain, the industrial plant of the world. The United States represents a concept of society to which we owe our way of life. We cannot, therefore, stomach a negated and medieval form of government. England and America are virtually a union today with our country heading it, England looking to us for morale, for leadership and direction of

life for free peoples in the future. The United States has become the vigorous opponent of the New Order launched by the Axis.

"The struggle today is whether the social structure, loosely called democracy, gives in to a system loosely called 'totalitarianism.'

"The United States has obligations it has not met, to society. Our failure, however, is due to methods and not viewpoints and technics. This is no denial of the fact that the major obstacle to United States democracy has been ruthless acquisition that has worked against us and which people, generally, are working against.

"Like other nations, the United States is in social revolt against great wealth, my own opinion holding that great wealth is not a privilege of a democracy, but an obligation. This is to say, wealth should work for the nation and government and not for itself alone."

One hesitates to use the word "intellectual" to describe the mental equipment of Jose Rodriguez. It is quite apparent, as we talk, that he would not like the term. Yet, he is regarded by competent observers throughout the nation as an important critic of conditions and ideologies increasingly affecting our national welfare.

Those thousands who listen to his nightly, informally held discussions of news with Sid Sutherland, may have wondered

at the facility with which both state significances of news events with logic, bullet-like in its directness.

"We try to see around corners of news," Jose explains. "We play no favorites. There are ways to read and not to read news. Years of training enable both of us to smell the perfume of hokum a mile away.

"Our general idea is to ferret out truth. To get at truth is to examine recorded history, assay our intuitions and know enough of the background of a news report to also know if the report makes sense."

RODRIGUEZ is not confused by propaganda. Each piece of selfishly objectivized news has its counterpiece.

"Propaganda betrays itself by its special pleading," he says. "It is as interesting to analyze propaganda as something we know is not.

"Sid and I have no hard and fast rules in interpreting news. Instinct and general knowledge operate together at the same time to read between lines."

Rodriguez and Sutherland make no claim to private sources of information to account for many of the startling turns they call from time to time on their program. There is an explanation for their high and level accuracy in news commentation, for the daily discerned merit of their broadcasts. Both are men of wide and intensive experience in journalism. Both are what might be called specialist practitioners of the Fourth Estate. Sutherland, for example, has worked on virtually every important paper in the nation. He is a contributor to national magazines and one year enjoyed the distinction of being the highest paid magazine writer in America.

Jose, Sid's smoothly-working collaborator, has been a foreign correspondent for International News, United and Associated Press systems; is ranked, with Sid, among America's more cerebral newsmen and editors.

In preparing their daily broadcasts they work with a desultory ease that doesn't reveal itself in the crisp, clinical thoroughness with which they dissect world news events.


Each writes his own scripts after reading the daily journals and applying his extensive knowledge to interpret the news and set up the salient points for report and discussion. During the early evening they will get together and compare scripts, fit the scripts together and, with this simple task out of the way, they are ready to go on the air. This independent method of collating news and striking individual slants gives the broadcast a character not ordinarily achieved by other news programs.

Both believe that their function is to comment freely, but within limits of the news, which is to say they are not opinionated. More often than not the listener has been helped to a point-of-view which is often contrary to their own.

"But this," Jose suggests, "is the way a democracy works its way forward. We need no oracles in a democracy. We need facts, and a people willing to predicate action on facts."

They will be on the air tonight at 10:30 p. m.

You might do well to listen.

IT'S A PLEASURE—It's a pleasure to take this opportunity to thank our pioneer members for the gratifying response they have given our recent letter to them. It's a pleasure to know that their interest is increasing by leaps and bounds and that they are truly eager to participate in the many activities we plan for them. It's a pleasure, a real pleasure to have started something that promises to be a big success, and it's a pleasure again to urge more of you to become members before it's too late. Naturally, we are going to set a limit to the number of members the club can have. But we haven't exactly decided yet, so you still have time to join up. It costs you nothing; so send in your application today. It's a pleasure to have you.

LICKING YOUR CHOPS—We have chops among our recipes this week, so here is some general information that may come in handy when you wish to prepare them:

The outer skin and excess fat should always be removed from chops before you fix them, and it's also a good idea to wipe them off with a damp cloth. Then, the rack in the broiling pan should be greased before you broil them, and the oven itself should be preheated for five or ten minutes. When you go to broil them, the chops should be set about three inches below the flame and both sides should be seared—quickly before you actually start cooking them. If you use a high temperature, it's a good idea to leave the oven door open and to lower either the chops or the flame after searing. If you prefer to use a low temperature, you can figure about 325 degrees for pork, 350 for lamb, and 375 for veal.

In fixing sauces to go with your chops, try something like a Creole for pork, something with lemon for veal, and a horseradish or mint sauce for lamb.

For Eight Persons

- Purce of red beans a la Pancho Villa
- Spring chicken a la Sanford
- Stuffed cauliflower a la Bechamel
- Green peas English style
- Artichoke bottoms a la Villars
- White coffee ice cream
- Assorted cakes
- Demi tasse

Recipe for Purce of Red Beans a la Pancho Villa

1 pound of red beans
 2 quarts of water
 1 carrot
 Sprig of parsley
 2 teaspoons of salt
 1/4 teaspoon of pepper
 1/4 pinch of cloves
 1/4 pound of butter

Soak beans overnight in tepid water. When ready to cook, drain them. Put them in a saucepan with 2 quarts of water, with the carrot, the onion and the sprig of parsley, and let cook for 3 hours. Season with salt and pepper, and a pinch of cloves. When beans are done, strain the liquid and mash the beans well, to form into a paste, then mix beans and liquid and stir well. When ready to serve let come to a boil. Add butter, and when butter is melted, serve.

Recipe for Spring Chicken a la Sanford

4 One-pound-and-a-quarter spring chickens
 Salt and pepper
 Flour
 4 eggs
 2 cups of breadcrumbs
 1/2 pound of butter

Draw and singe the spring chickens, divide them in 4 pieces each, suppressing the legs above the joint. Cut, gin and part of the wings, and cross them so they cook better. Season with salt and pepper and rub them with flour. Dip every part in beaten eggs and bread crumbs. Saute them very slowly in the butter. When they are cooked, serve on a bath of cream sauce, and garnish with chantilly sauce a la Sanford.

Recipe for cream Sauce

4 ounces of butter
 4 ounces of flour
 2 pints of boiling milk

Melt the butter in the flour, when warm add milk and stir well and cook for 10 minutes on a very slow fire, strain through a sieve.

Recipe for Sauce a la Sanford

1 pound of sour apples
 1 ounce of powdered sugar
 1 pint of whipped cream
 2 ounces of grated horseradish

Core apples and place them in a saucepan with 4 tablespoons of water. When apples are cooked, drain them and press them through a fine sieve. Add powdered sugar and horseradish to the pulp. Stir well and beat in whipped cream, when well mixed serve with chicken.

Recipe for Green Peas English Style

1 pound of shelled green peas
 6 mint leaves
 1/4 pound of sweet butter
 1 teaspoon of sugar
 1 teaspoon of salt

Boil green peas and the mint leaves in a sauce pan with just enough water to cover the top of the peas. When peas are done add salt and the sugar, and serve them with sweet butter.

CHECKERED BREAD—Here's an idea for a loaf for spreads that looks like a checkerboard:

You slice some light and dark bread, butter the slices, and then lay them one on top of the other, alternating the colors, until you have a cube beginning with one color and ending with another. Then you press and chill this into a solid loaf and reslice it so that your slices are striped. You now repeat the performance so that the new loaf forms a checker pattern at one end. After pressing and chilling again, your checkerboard is ready, and it makes one of the damndest and most novel refreshments that you could wish to find.

VITAMINOTES—Vitamin D is sometimes called the sunshine vitamin and is contained in ultra-violet rays. It controls calcium and other minerals in the body and you can get it in fish oils, milk, eggs and spinach. Too much of it is dangerous, but without it you are likely to feel rather weak.

Chef Milani's Suggestions for Chops

RECIPE FOR MUTTON CHOPS A LA TAVERNARO

- 4 mutton chops, 1 1/2 inches thick
- 4 mutton kidneys
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 teaspoons of olive oil

Have the butcher cut the chops from the saddle, lengthwise, have them 1 1/2 inches thick and flattened. Pare and garnish each one with a kidney, fastened with a skewer, thrust into the fat part of the chop above the mignon. Sprinkle with salt, brush with oil, and broil until it's a fine color on one side, then turn them over, and finish cooking on the other, 10 to 12 minutes, as they need. Serve hot and garnish with watercress.

RECIPE FOR VEAL CHOPS A LA LIVINGSTON

- 4 nice veal chops
- Salt and pepper
- A pinch of oregano
- 4 green onions
- 1 clove of garlic
- 1 can of peas

Melt 1 tablespoon of butter in a frying pan, brown veal chops on both sides. Then place them in a casserole, fry green onions and garlic chopped very fine, when a golden color, add drained peas, when hot pour on top of chops in casserole, cover casserole and bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

PORK CHOPS A LA TONY WHAN

- 8 pork chops
- 3 tablespoons of lard
- 1 large onion
- 4 slices of O'Fashund bacon
- 1 tablespoon of flour
- 1/2 cup sherry wine
- 1 cup of broth
- 1 teaspoon of mustard
- 2 tablespoons of sliced eberkins
- 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt
- 4 peppercorns

Chop 1 large onion, and fry in a saucepan with 4 slices of chopped bacon, and simmer until onions are tender. Then sprinkle 1 teaspoon of flour and mix thoroughly with a spoon over a slow fire until a golden color. Add gradually 1/2 a cup of salt and 4 pepper corns. Bring to a boil, stirring well, skim and simmer gently for 30 to 40 minutes. Then place 3 tablespoons of lard in a large thick skillet and fry pork chops on a very brisk fire, until brown on both sides. Season with salt and pepper. Place chops in a hot dish, add 1 teaspoon of mustard and 2 teaspoons of chopped eberkins, to the sauce, mix and pour over chops.

- Brisket of Beef Florentine
- Boiled potatoes
- Bread and Butter
- Butterscotch pudding

Recipe for Brisket of Beef Florentine

2 pounds of brisket of beef
1 1/2 of a pound of butter
1/2 pound of tender-made ham
1 slice of O'Fashund bacon
1 onion
1 celery (cut in small pieces)
1 small can tomatoes
Put 1-8th of a pound of butter in a sauce pan and when melted add 1 pound of ham cut in quarter-inch squares and brown cut a few browned and 1 onion, cut into small squares. Take the beef and bone if cut into 1 inch squares, then add a sprig of parsley, a pinch of thyme, 1 bay leaf, 1 clove of garlic, 2 cloves, 1 celery cut in small pieces, and the can of tomatoes. Cover with water, cook for 2 1/2 hours, add a little more water at times if needed. Serve with boiled potatoes.

- Ground beef steak and egg noodle Switzerland
- Buttered string beans
- Lettuce salad with mayonnaise
- Bread and butter

Recipe for Ground Beef Steak and Egg Noodle Switzerland

1 pound of ground beef
1 egg
1/2 of bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon of salt
1/4 six-ounce package
1 can of number 2 1/2 solid pack tomatoes
1 onion
1 clove of garlic
2 slices of O'Fashund bacon
1 tablespoon of pepper
1 tablespoon of butter
1 egg noodles
Mix ground beef, egg and bread crumbs with 1 teaspoon of salt. When well mixed, pat in oval shapes about 1/2 inch thick, and then cook both sides. Then mix 1 small onion, 1 tablespoon of butter, fry onion and garlic on slow fire for about a minute. Then add tomatoes and put in 1 teaspoon of salt and 1 teaspoon of pepper. Simmer for 2 hours, 15 minutes before serving, boil noodles in salted boiling water until tender, drain, and then place noodles on one side of plate, steak on the other, and pour sauce over noodles.

- Chicken rice en casserole
- Broccoli with lemon sauce

Recipe for Chicken Rice en Casserole

1 two-and-a-half-pound stewing hen
1/4 pound of rice
1 green pepper
1 clove of garlic
1 small onion
1 sprig of parsley
2 slices of O'Fashund bacon
1 can of No. 2 1/2 tomatoes
1 teaspoon of salt
1/2 teaspoon of pepper
Wash rice three or four times in cold water, and cook in 2 quarts of water for 10 minutes and drain. Place 1 green pepper, 1 clove of garlic, 2 slices of onion, and parsley in thick skillet, then brown chicken quarters on both sides. Then take chicken from skillet, fry in bacon fat, minced green peppers, minced onion, minced garlic and parsley until nice and golden. Fry tomatoes in and let come to a boil, add 1 teaspoon of salt and 4 teaspoon of pepper. Place chicken quarters in a large casserole, place in a pre-heated oven at 400 degrees and let bake until chicken is tender.

Seven p. m. Sundays from KNX the program is on the air. David Ross, the announcer, and Bob Hawk, are as cool as cucumbers. The master of ceremonies rattles off details of the show, much as he has done since April, last year. Contestants can "take or leave" a question and draw down money won up to that point.

The 10 contestants are seated to the audience's left. Near them is a blackboard on which are written various categories of questions from which the candidates may choose.

A man "takes" a seventh question. There are cries from the audience of "Take it" and "You'll be sorry." There is a round of applause when he gives the correct answer, for the final question is usually a stiff one.

A blushing girl elects to answer queries about Broadway. She knows that Tallulah Bankhead was the stellar performer in the play "The Little Foxes." He knows Buffalo is the second city in point of population in New York state, that Los Angeles is largest west of the Mississippi. He stumbles over a query, but Hawk allows him a quick correction. He finally answers the seventh question. He is excited as he returns to his chair with \$64.00. At first he stuffs the money in the top pocket of his coat with a handkerchief. Then, hand trembling, he takes out his wallet and puts the bills in it.

Interest in the program is sustained.

The Choice Is Up to You, with Handsome Rewards if You Have Courage and Wit

After individual queries are finished there is a jackpot question. The correct answer to this gives fortunate ones a chance to share in the money of those who have flunked, plus \$25.00 added. Some of these questions have been, "What is the state in this country that reaches farthest north?" (Minnesota); "Give a common word of six letters or more without a vowel in it." (Rhythm); "Who was the only vice-president who resigned from office?" (John C. Calhoun); "Give the most common family name in the United States, next to Smith?" (Johnson); "Give a common English word with three sets of double letters in sequence?" (Bookkeeping or Bookkeeper); "In what year were dollar bills reduced to their present size?" (July, 1929); "What is the largest body of fresh water in the world?" (Lake Superior); "What is the largest state completely east of the Mississippi?" (Georgia); "What letter of the alphabet starts more English words than any other?" (S); "In what state was Abraham Lincoln born?" (Kentucky).

After one program, several months ago, many listeners were as certain as they could be that Bob Hawk had made a mistake. It was after he asked how many times does the number 8 appear between 1 to 100. The answer is twenty times and most of the listeners had omitted to remember the 8's that come in a row of the eighties.

Many of the comments and replies of candidates have been humorous. There was the case of a Mrs. O'Leary, who, not being at her ease, said that she was related to the cow that kicked over the lantern in a Chicago barn.

Imagine the embarrassment of the policeman on one program who flunked when asked, "What do runners jump over in a hurdle race?" A hurdle never occurred to him. All he could think of were ditches and bushes.

Should a mistake be made by Mr. Hawk, he is quick to remedy. Recently a contestant was asked, "What state is second to New York in sending most representatives to congress?" At the moment, Mr.

Hawk thought it was Illinois. He discovered his error in time to reward the contestant, who had said "Pennsylvania."

Name the states of which given cities are capitals? It has so far been tried five times on the program and no candidate has passed the examination.

The answers to questions are never a case of opinions. They must be factual. The idea of the "Take It Or Leave It" program was thought up by a school teacher in Atlanta, Ga., but has been improved by Hawk. The largest audience at the broadcast was recently in the ballroom of the Astor hotel. Four thousand were present.

An expert woman researcher collects information for some 20 or 25 lists of questions. Then Hawk and his secretary and representatives of the sponsors decide which lists are to be used at the broadcast. It is interesting to note that the average amount of cash paid out on a broadcast to the contestants is \$150.00.

Hawk was born in Creston, Ia., and is now 33. He spent a good deal of his youth in Oklahoma City. He has been through the gamut of radio work, having been an actor, announcer and master of ceremonies of several programs.

The present program has proved so popular that Hawk is considering playing a theater with "Take It Or Leave It." The sponsors have signed an agreement to continue the broadcast for a year from a recent date.

Bob Hawk lives on the 16th floor of an apartment building at 74th street and Fifth avenue in New York, and on the eighth floor of the same building dwells another well-known radio authority. The two met in the elevator one day and Hawk introduced himself to the other broadcaster, who was Clifton Fadiman, conductor of "Information Please."
