THERE is talk in radio circles that Carnation Milk Company has under consideration for sponsorship Walter White's program, "Nobody's Children."

It has been a source of editorial astonishment to us that this program had not long ago attracted the attention of a sponsor, particularly in view of the selfish consideration that upwards of 100,000 persons are almost certain to be counted upon as consistent purchasers of such a sponsor's products.

Whether or not it is true that Carnation is to sponsor "Nobody's Children," it is encouraging to note that this Mutual program, long conceded by listeners, radio officials and important persons in allied entertainment fields to be the finest in sociological effort, has the vital interest of those who make radio.

As a matter of fact we don't think that Carnation Company, identified with the health of at least two generations of Americans, is interested in pecuniary gains as a result of sponsorship. It does not have to be. It is doing well enough as it is. It is refreshing to find, however, that there is a company considering sponsorship, for the sake of the good it is doing, of a program such as Mr. White's. And, we believe that Mr. White, a credit to radio, deserves this recognition of his unswerving loyalty to underprivileged kids.

of the radio city, and the transmission seven days a week from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. of commercially-sponsored FM broadcasts.

Frequency modulation, or "staticless radio" reproduces the full scale of sound with crisp realism, hence offers music lovers new fields of exceptional listening pleasure.

FM is receivable only on FM receivers or on present amplitude modulation receivers fitted with auxiliary FM adapters. Because signals travel on short waves they must originate from altitudes like Mt. Lee, 1700 feet high.

To accommodate demand for FM receivers, most important radio and department stores have stocked FM models made by 17 licensed manufacturers.

Frequency modulation has been perfected by Major Edwin H. Armstrong, professor of electrical engineering at Columbia University.

K45LA indicates the western station in Los Angeles will operate on 44.5 megacycles. Signals will be broadcast from a 1000-watt transmitter until arrival of a 50,000 watt transmitter now under construction in the east.



THE BRITISH AND WAR:—Britons, who in 1920 caricatured the Government of the United States as "Uncle Shylock" when the American people, through their Government, requested honorable payment on loans extended Great Britain during its war of 1914-18, last week were reported by Raymond Gram Swing, MBS news commentator.

"Don't think the British are ungrateful to the United States or that President Roosevelt is not appreciated . . . the gratitude is for something dimly understood and not quite believed."

The reason is that America has failed to tell the British the complete story of American aid to Britain. Said Swing:

"The American policy has not been dramatized for the British. They have not had it in their daily lives to give them still more faith in the future. At first I thought this was the lost opportunity of British journalism and broadcasting. Then when Harry Hopkins came to London and told what America is doing, one could feel the element of astonishment and happy surprise."

Back from 3 weeks stay in London where he interviewed Englishmen prominent in their country's war effort with their Communistic ally, Russia, Swing had noted:

" . . . British morale is strong . . . in the most convincing sense. It is not strident or exclamatory; individuals are not fervent about it."

Doubted by no Britisher, Swing said, was eventual outcome of war.

International

SONG FOR CHINA: Last week China went on into another of its interminable years of warfare with Japan. While Japan bombs raked Chungking, struck an American river gunboat to make more precarious this country's relations with the Nipponese, American songwriters raised a new note of hope for beleaguered Chinese striving to complete a \$5,000,000 drive for funds under auspices of United China Relief.

Pooling talents, Ira Gershwin and E. W. Harburg, with Arthur Schwartz, had earlier introduced on the air a haunting melodied song, "Honorable Moon." The song, presented to radio listeners by NBC-singer Connie Boswell, has taken well. What made news was that the composers and writers agreed to turn over all royalties to United China Relief.

The song, published by Chappell and Company:

TWENTY-YEAR DREAM: For twenty years have radio engineers labored and pursued through a thousand inter-mazed mazes of figures, physical facts and obstacles to bring radio transmission to point where it would compare with effortless perfection of human voice, true repetition of basic music tones and overtones—in a word, to fulfill the mission implied in radio's discovery.

Answer to the twenty-year search is conceded to be frequency modulation, a broadcast device to eliminate cross-talk, heterodynes, static and echoes.

Last week Don Lee network officials announced, for August 11 at 8 p. m., the formal opening of Don Lee's frequency modulation station atop Mount Lee in sky-sloped Hollywood Hills to the north

National

PRIMER FOR AMERICA: Critics of stage, screen and radio are notorious for fact they tell actors, directors, producers what to do, but rarely practice what they preach.

Thirty-two weeks ago, B'nai B'rith, fraternal organization, of Irving Briskin, producer at Columbia Pictures, requested a writer to turn out scripts for an Americanism program at KFWE, Los Angeles. Among writers he knew, Mr. Briskin remembered one, Nat Tanchuck, who had casually mentioned an interest in radio and television production. Tanchuck was called, asked if he could write a B'nai B'rith series. Reluctantly, Tanchuck agreed.

Uphshot of conversations was "American Sketches" debut 32 weeks ago, without fanfare, under directional and production guidance of Tanchuck, motion picture reviewer for motion picture trade papers.

People began to take notice. The program had nothing commercial to sell, was based on the simple theme of Americanism. People wrote in, asked about the writer-producer-director.

Quiet, unassuming, Nat Tanchuck takes radio work in a serious, enthusiastic manner. He is rated as a man who knows what he is doing. Last year, when television was being broadcast regularly, he produced, directed and wrote dramas for Tom Lee's television station atop San-Fernando-Valley-commanding Mt. Lee. He was first man to bring Ann Miller, Dick Powell, Joan Blondell, Robert Armstrong, other film luminaries to television, was also originator of the Los Angeles Civic Theatre idea which boomed a short while ago, faded when he left. At Screen and Radio Writers Convention held at University of Los Angeles at California, Tanchuck spoke briefly from the audience on boxoffice values of motion pictures, drawing from his experience as public relations director for the Pacific Coast Conference of Independent Theatre Owners for actual proof of what he was saying.

A writer who turned to radio as a hobby, he found director's and producer's jobs turned over to him. Last week, a few minutes before broadcast, an actor rehearsing the part of a German refugee with a heavy accent was ill. Tanchuck stepped into breach three minutes before air time, surprised the KFWE staff, his cast, and himself, with a performance that was air-dramatically sound. Result has

To Celeste Rush and her "Confessions of a Corsair" company on Mutual-KHJ came a sponsor, Nu-Fit, a concern making dental cement to keep dentures in place.

Thus last week was history dental-cemented for British troops who recently fought in Greece, scene of Lord (Corsair) Byron's latter escapades. Astounded, perhaps, were Britishers to learn that friendship of Greece and England had been earlier cemented by the fierce tempered English poet, that the greatest name in Greek independence is George Noel Byron. Byron, fleeing from conventions he abhorred in English society, grew to love romantic Greece, soon devoted talent, money, finally his life to defending down-trodden classes from Turkish oppressors.

That he repeatedly fell in love, enjoyed amatory interludes with fair maidens lent color to his adventures even deeper within the scope of modern interest; his return to England to publish "Childe Harold's Pilgrimage"; his second visit to Greece; exploits of a genius whose life was cut short at 36, constitute amazing air dramatic narratives.

ART SHANK was born on the Bowery . . . his mother was a settlement worker in charge of social work in that teeming section of New York . . . He enlisted at 20 during the first World War . . . was militarily recognized as a singer . . . became an organizer and leader of soldiers' entertainment . . . after the war returned to the states and for ten years toured as a choir leader . . . appeared with evangelists on the sawdust trails to glory . . . Came to California and went broke before getting a job as a lecturer in Forest Lawn, lecturing on art . . . a lecture was heard by a radio official and Art was given a chance at an NBC audition . . . Twenty-five hopefuls pitted their styles, demeanors and voices against Mr. Shank's . . . but he won out . . . began then the radio career that astounded hard-bitten radio realists . . .

His name was changed by the sponsor to "Bob Baker," and later was revised by the NBC star himself to Art Baker. The change was hastened by people who addressed him as "Thank," "Clank," "Chank" and other none-too-pleasant changes on his real name.

Art Baker's "Notebook," heard over KFI, developed into one of the most popular programs on the air. At the same time, Baker announced several coast-to-coast programs. He was "Bubbles Baker" on the Grouch Club, quiz master on a group of audience participation shows, and commercial announcer on Bob Hope's program.

When Art Baker's Notebook is heard over the NBC Blue Network, he is presenting to a wider audience a half-hour of the same type of homey, down-to-earth material he has broadcast so successfully on his local shows, including poetry, anecdotes, human interest stories—all taken from his real note-book. His four children and two grandchildren, Baker admits, provide him with many of his best stories. To obtain material for his notebook, Baker says "I just keep my eyes and ears open."

The Trouble That Got
You Down, May Be One
To Bring You Back Up

IN THE midst of difficulties and trials few of us can find in our hearts or minds to count our blessings. Yet the very thing we curse and hate, that seems to be for us the Frankenstein, of our own or somebody else's making, that seems bent on wrecking us, may be a blessing in disguise.

No! This is no preachment from a journalistic Pollyanna pounding out a two-forefinger epic of sugary sentiment for the sore of heart and pressed of spirit.

Whoever wrote the above black-face two liner in old Persia had a pretty sound idea of life. Other people's good appearances and comforts may seem to emphasize the distress of our own. Yet, they too, perhaps, have their troubles.

In America, for instance, we can count as a blessing the fact that while old World millions are murdering each other wholesale we are still free of blood and power lusts. Our homes have no shadows of oppression over them. Our children may still foregather in schools and playgrounds with no staccato of machine guns or bark of rifles to throw terror into their abandoned child play. No women of ours are dishonored, no men of ours being sacrificed for age-old controversies, flaring into bloody violence with each European generation. As a Nation may we not be thankful for this?

Not many months ago Hal Styles, whose program "Help Thy Neighbor" was for years one of the great humanitarian programs of the air, mulled over the Fifth Verse of the 23rd Chapter of Deuteronomy:

"The Lord, Thy God, turns thy

curse into a blessing because he loveth thee."

To a lot of people the verse is a lot of rubbish, cooked up to sooth restless masses by Biblical times politicians and priests.

To many another it is God's Word inspirationally recorded by some spiritually sensitive soul without benefit of priest or religion.

To Hal Styles, an air-man who seems destined to undertake those programs that deal with intimate aspects of human suffering, the Verse was strangely and significantly linked with the couplet from ancient Persia.

"Believe me," Hal said to us the other day at luncheon, "whoever wrote that said a mouthful. Most everybody agrees that troubles are in large measure the result of wrong thinking, wrong attitudes, wrong approaches to problems of the individual and of the whole society.

"Most of us are made aware of our fortunate circumstances in being physically unaffected by wars in Europe and Asia. While two-ton bombs are ripping holes in earth, blasting homes, hospitals, tearing the very guts out of millions of

Innocents, we in America—unemployed, bedridden, the halt and the lame, are in Paradise by comparison. While war planes rake earth from skies above, submersibles the surface of seas from below, here in

WORLD ON YOUR DIAL

By Earl G. De Haven

FEAR EAST—Plenty of short wave activity in the Philippines at this time and good reception may be enjoyed daily in the early morning hours. Two stations, KZRH and KZIB are the best at this writing with KZIB perhaps the most consistent. KZIB operates on 9.5 Mc. and may be heard after 1:30 a. m. and continuing until 4 a. m. or after. Musical fare on KZIB is divided between native Filipino music and popular U. S. A. dance tunes, while frequent commercial "spots" are given between the selections of melody. Although not yet heard by your columnist, KZIB is also reported to have a program on 6.06 Mc. after 10 p. m. Station KZRH is found at 9.54 Mc. and may be heard regularly from 2 to 5 p. m. with program material almost identical to that of KZIB. The third Philippine station (but not so consistent as the others), is KZRM on 9.57 Mc. known as "Radio Manila" with a schedule of broadcasting activity extending from 1 to 4:30 a. m. During the winter and early spring KZRM usually tops the other two stations in strength of signals.

The Siberian stations of the Soviet Union at Khabarovsk are now heard in parallel on 9.56, 6.11, and 4.27 Mc. respectively. The 9.56 Mc. transmission is

by far the best at this season and classical and vocal and instrumental programs constitute the entertainment. Recently several lengthy piano recitals have been enjoyed and except for one or two times when static was somewhat heavy, signals have been loud, well modulated and free from fading. The Khabarovsk stations usually begin their programs at 1 a. m. and sign off at 4 or sometimes 5 a. m.

AUSTRALIA—The Australian Broadcasting Commission operates a large number of short wave stations that now give truly world-wide service and coverage. Of particular interest to Pacific Coast U.S.A. listeners is VLQ-5 on 9.68 Mc. for this station directs a program of entertainment, news, and other features daily from 4:20 a. m. to 5:05 a. m. On the 11.88 Mc. frequency there is another North American broadcast through VLQ-7 from 7:25 to 8:10 a. m.

EUROPE—Station 2RO-18 on 9.67 Mc. continues to be Rome's most powerful short wave voice in America's direction. Time is 5 to 7:30 p. m. and the program, the "American Hour from Rome." 2RO-6 on 15.30 Mc. is sometimes very good on this late afternoon broadcast. The Nazi voices have been rather weak lately—DZD on 10.54 Mc. is the most reliable with

DJB on 15.2 Mc. springing a surprise at times. Lord Haw Haw becomes more vitriolic day by day in his propaganda efforts.

SOUTH AMERICA—For cheer and comfort dial "The Voice of the Andes" radio station HCJB on 12.46 Mc. in Quito, Ecuador daily except Monday 3 to 7 p. m. That's all—Goodbye now!

Joan Blaine In HOW TO BE GAY

FIVE days a week, for three years I have gone on the air at the same time, playing the same part, from the same radio studio!

I leave my home a few minutes before one, and at one p. m. I enter Studio 3-C, in the NBC building around the corner from my dwelling place, and start working; and I mean working!

Because, though our serial is only on the air fifteen minutes a day, we rehearse from the minute I enter the studio till we go on the air.

Yet, I hear girls who work in stores and offices, or enact the housewife's role in real life, tell me, with envy, how dull their lives are, and how much they would like to be a radio actress. The boredom of life, in offices, stores and homes, is explained to me, in some detail, by many of my girl friends.

"You lucky woman," they say, "on the air every day! Getting fan mail. Meeting famous people. Seeing your name in newspapers and magazines. Acting every day. What we wouldn't give to lead such a glamorous life!"

Yet, I am faced, and with greater emphasis, by the same problem that worries these women: getting into a bored attitude to a routine life of the same activity day after day. If anything, my own life and work could be even more boring than the life of an average job or husband-holding gal. How would you like to play the same part every day at the same time? Why, even my name in the radio serial ("Valiant Lady") is Joan—Joan Barrett! And I can't afford to let down, or take it easy. There are no days off for me, not even at Christmas, or New Years. And, tougher than going on air at the same time every day is the never-ending chore of daily rehearsals. I have to put zest and warmth

into my part if I'm to give my job as an actress the extra something that distinguishes the star from the routine worker. And I have to give the part this "extra" something every day, at the same time!

My mental and physical routines are deliberately planned so that I will do my work well. I have conquered the mental part of my job and my life by playing a little game with myself—a game every woman can play if she will only use a little imagination! I am "Joan Barrett," and not Joan Blaine the minute I step into Studio 3-C! Joan of the radio becomes a real person, with a character fuller than just the written and spoken lines.

Well, you say, that's fine, you're an actress, it's easy for you to get into that attitude. What about me? I'm an office-worker. What about me? I'm a housewife.

Well, I reply, you can do this too. Instead of just accepting your occupation as a monotonous succession of similar actions, try this game with yourself. If you're a working gal tackle your job as if you were playing the role of a working girl in a play or a movie. See the difference! Things that seemed annoying will be powerless to harm you when you are clothed in the illusion of this make-believe! If you are a housewife, play a romantic, glamorous role. Have a sense of humor about your husband, your children, the little annoying details of running a home day after day, night after night. You'll soon see what this does for you, and how much less tired you'll be, how much more interesting life will become!

Physically, I also plan a routine very carefully—and sometimes have fun playing hookey from my own rules! You have no idea how thrilling a strawberry sundae can be when strawberry sundaes are strictly off your diet. And when you break a routine and see a movie in the afternoon you'll feel like you did when you cut classes at High School for the first time.

We all need exercises specially adapted to our physical condition, but I have found the following one that most women can follow without too much trouble:

Lie flat on your back on a mat, arms clasped back of head, feet stretched out. Bend the left knee and bring the right arm slightly forward, touch the kneepoint to the elbow. Return to position. Repeat with right knee and left elbow. Do this five times the first time, and work up to ten. I do this regularly before leaving the house in the morning. Then, there's walking. You must discipline yourself to a regular amount of walking at regular times to get the most out of that exercise. One or two miles a day, walked as rapidly as you know how, are more beneficial than many miles spent meandering and shop-gazing. Work up your speed by degrees, so that you know your own record. Pedometers are very inexpensive, and they record the distance you cover and make a sport out of walking.

There are many things I can recommend to inject interest into your dally life. Visit the local museums and places

Mr. Smith BRINGS UP FATHER JIGGS OF AIR!

"Yes, m'darrlinn . . ."

JHIN AND HIGHLY pitched in tone, this expression of endearment is made abjectly when Jiggs comes on the air, in NBC's KECA-KFSD, 7 p. m. Tuesday fun program.

For Jiggs is the epitome of the harassed husband whose daily life is dominated by a virago of a wife whose face has rarely been known to crumple into a smile, save when she has derived her satisfaction from foiling a well-intentioned plot of Jiggs' to get away for an evening with the "bhoys." . . .

The NBC version of the popular comic strip has as its principal actor Mark Smith, who resembles with amusing fidelity, Jiggs of the cartoons.

He has the nose, the rotund paunch, the rolling eyes and the protruding lip of the comic-page Jiggs. But, more than that, he has the voice that Jiggs fans would expect from their humorous hero. The voice is as Jiggsian as it could possibly be.

As an actor and in real life, Smith, who likes cabbage and rare roast beef, is one of radio's most colorful characters. His weight, no closely guarded secret, is in true Jiggs tradition and proportion. The Jiggsian paunch which Smith sports is the result of Smith-style eating. For breakfast this calls for four eggs, nearly a half-pound of bacon, and toast and coffee 'in proportion.

Often likened to a modern version of Shakespeare's Falstaff, Smith has played so many parts, both on the stage and before the microphone, that he can't possibly remember them all. He has trod the boards of some 70 Broadway theatres, has appeared on more than 2000 radio shows, and once did 24 radio shows in a day.

A mild mannered man, he has probably murdered more people in more ways than any other stage or microphone actor. One of his most frequent roles has been that of sinister-voiced villain. On the other hand, he played Winnie-the-Pooh for three years.

Four generations of the Smith family, spanning 141 years, have been actors. Smith's great-grandfather had a traveling stage coach that toured the old West with a kind of medicine show. His mother and father were both well-known actors in their day. There is no Mark Smith the 4th, but Mark's daughter, oddly enough, has not followed the stage tradition. His

wife was an actress, but she abandoned the footlights when she married.

Smith himself has been an actor for 38 years. His first play was with Henrietta Crossman in "Sweet Kitty Bellairs" when he was 16. His favorite role, characteristically, is Falstaff. There's a role, Smith says, into which he can put his heart, soul, and paunch.

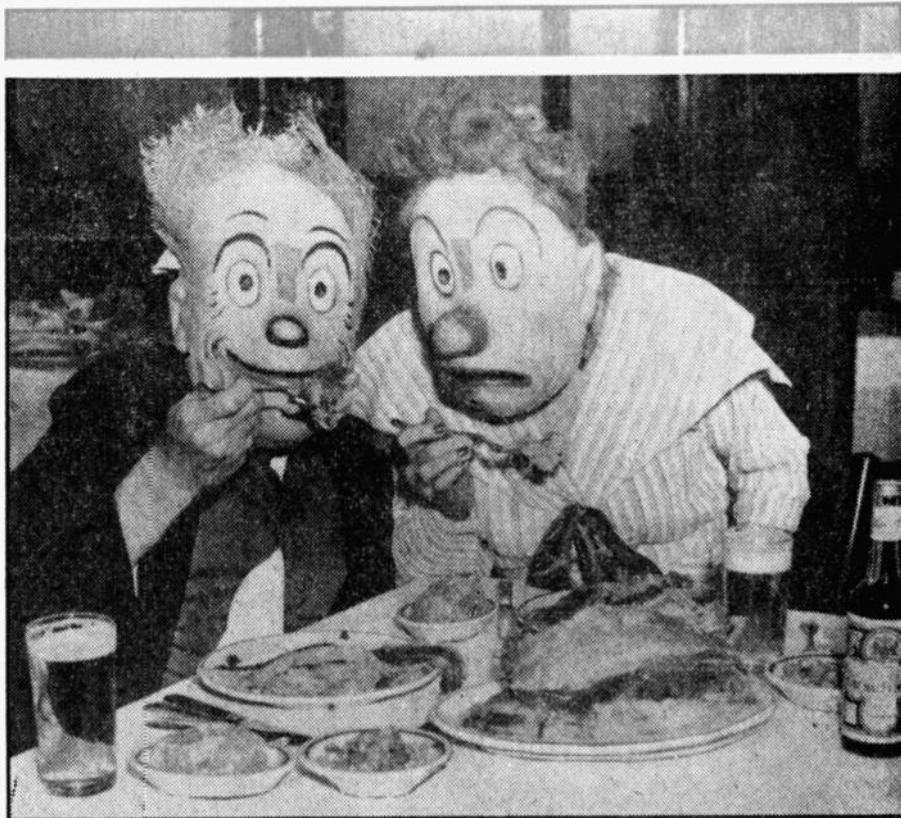

America we walk our streets, sail on our rivers, sleep securely in our homes, have no threats to the loved of our loins."

He paused as though preparing to rap home a point. It came, in tones vibrant with seriousness:

"But do we ever take time out to say 'Gee! I'm lucky! I certainly have much to be thankful for?' Rarely!"

"And, so?" we asked.

"And, so," he retorted, "I got the idea for a new program—'Count Your Blessings.' On 'Help Thy Neighbor' I played up human suffering, believing that by dramatic programming listeners could be shocked into thinking helpfully of those less fortunate.

"Scouting around for new ideas I reflected on the psychology used in telling jobless people—in an effort to cheer them up—to count their blessings."

We pointed out that to be without a job in a country as great and resourceful as ours was, at best, a pretty tough proposition for any individual.

Hal waved a hand. "Yes, I know. We all have our troubles. We may think that our troubles are worse than another's. But, that is not so always. At this moment you, or any one of us, might be out of a job. Did you ever stop to think of the thousands who can't work because of illness or deformities? Jobless, but physically sound, one can be thankful for health. That is a blessing.

"Have you ever thought of the millions who can't read because they are blind? Have you a home? Think of the hundreds of thousands who have none. Do you have a child? Think of those who want them and are denied them."

"What's all this got to do with your program?" we asked him.

"This: I've an idea that when I can bring persons before the microphone who will honestly admit that an affliction has proved a blessing rather than a curse, we are then making it easier for others to turn misfortune into fortune, suffering into joy, pain into peace."

We must have looked a bit skeptical of such idealism, for Hal raised his voice a trifle in a peremptory: "Just a minute, now. Just a minute. Let me finish."

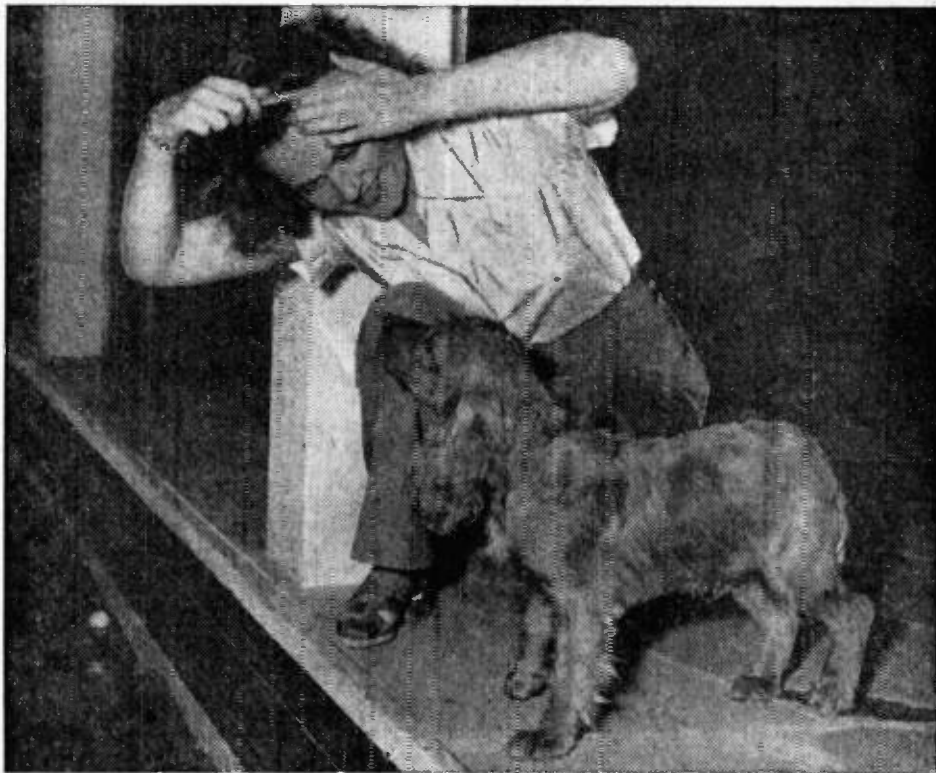
"By all means," we murmured.

"There's a lot more to this 'Count Your Blessing' business than just a lot of bilge from Radio's basements. For example: A girl was on the program recently who had been crippled by infantile paralysis since she was 11. For 3 years prior to the attack she had studied piano. Paralysis prevented use of right leg and arm. With music in her soul and with apparently no way to express it, she learned to compose, making notations with her left hand. In 2 years she wrote 36 compositions, regained full use of her limbs in 3 years. Doctors had said recovery was improbable. At 14 she had sold 11 of her works. On 'Count Your Blessings' she said: 'Had I not lost the use of my right arm and leg, I would never have become pro-

Is Our AIR FREEDOM TO BE ENDED?

By BUCK HATHAWAY

1. Is the United States Government, represented in this instance by James Fly, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, planning to wreck American network broadcasting?

2. If it is, why?

3. Who would be served by such destruction of free American enterprise?

4. Is James Fly politically encouraged by so far unrevealed men to rob Democracy of its precious right—Freedom of Speech?

5. Why doesn't James Fly or other responsible employee of the taxpayer go before the American people via air and state exactly what the Government's case is against Radio—to state it in language that can be understood by the most intelligent and the dumb among us?

6. And what is wrong with the Radio Industry and its officialdom that it does not take immediate steps to help the American people understand what is going on?

7. Or, are there two Denmarks—one in Government and the other in Radio—in which something is rotten?

I believe the American people have a right to have the answers to these questions.

The record to date is fairly clear, but still puzzling. It is not, however, properly documented by either side to the controversy.

James Fly, in an early statement imputed to him, declared that NBC through operation of its Blue Network was building a monopoly in radio.

If that were true it would appear that CBS would be one of the first to leap for-

ward in support of Fly to gain an advantage over its great rival in business. As it is only Mutual among the major networks has defended the strangely promulgating communications chairman. Mutual's side is easy to understand.

Mutual owns no stations. Through a cooperative setup with 176 stations, of which, incidentally, 33 are also affiliates of NBC and CBS, it takes programs originated from any one or more of its cooperative members and offers them to the others in the network on a Transcontinental basis. The network, fourth largest in the United States, maintains no vast production staffs, idea departments, musical staffs. It has no staff of writers as such who write programs which a sales department encourages time buyers to take. It owns no great broadcasting plants by itself.

Columbia and NBC on the other hand, own 8 and 10 respectively. These have been purchased through the years since incorporation of the companies, CBS in 1927, NBC in 1926. Mutual did not get into the field as a management group until 1934. It is obvious, then, that whatever advances have been made in American broadcasting have had their foundations in the two other networks. CBS besides its ownership of 8 stations has affiliated with it 118 others, NBC has 220 affiliates.

No brief is made by this writer for or against any of the networks. All are doing a thoroughly American job of broadcasting. None are or have been guilty of activities that are detrimental to public interest. It is here, then, that James Fly and his commission must be analyzed in light of the Commission's order to NBC to dispose of its Blue net.

The Commission has unmistakably implied that ownership or operation

of the Blue network is in way of being monopoly. Monopoly is not a nice word. It connotes much with which Americans are painfully reminded. In simple definition a monopoly is a combination of interests in exclusion of other interests that have an American right to existence and fair competition in a kindred field.

Now, either the Federal Communications Commission is right or it is wrong in such implication. If it is right then CBS and NBC are in joint conspiracy to either break Mutual or keep that network in fourth position commercially, or to so develop control of network broadcasting as to be potentially dangerous to the progress of free democratic processes, particularly of free speech and fluid transmission of ideas, information and education to the public. We will examine this "Either-Or" later. First let us review a set of quite simple facts, facts that are familiar to the average American business man and, because of the Depression temporarily suspended by Defense considerations, also familiar to laymen, you and I and the millions of others like us who listen to Radio. The first fact is that American business history is the dramatic story of vision and enterprise linked to practical probabilities. In 1926 those who organized NBC—in 1927 those who organized CBS—foresaw that Radio, getting steady on its infant feet, was due to become a potent force for good or evil in the modernizing world. Were they to be blamed for guessing also that the baby industry offered opportunities to make money? Making money is a characteristic of American ambition, for small men and large men financially. These men set out to build a great business of broadcasting. They builded on a basis of traditional business idealism: make or deliver a better product or service, offer inducements to clients to encourage them to buy what you have and growth comes naturally. In the normal course of events CBS made enough money to acquire its 8 stations, NBC its 10. Both put their earnings to work to produce still more alluring services, programs and inducements to influence purchase of the one commodity they have to sell—air time. In time again these practical visionaries convinced stations now affiliated with them that it would be good business for such stations to enter into agreements with them regarding sales of time and programs to fill time. Their inducements to the stations must have been practical. The stations also were in business to make money. Enough of them signed to extend the air empires of CBS and NBC across the land. Enough of them signed so that there is no time at any hour of the day when, instantly, NBC or CBS cannot, in times of public emergency or for purely profit making considerations, inform virtually 100% of our population on what's cooking. Naturally the networks made money. As they made money they spent it on projects, both physical and cultural, economic and social, that are credits to the communities in which they air. They employed more and more persons, to date both networks having on salary in routine and administrative work nearly 5,000 persons. KNX, for instance, in Los Angeles is a credit to that city. Moreover it is a station which, like NBC and Mutual stations, are vital factors in American air

supremacy, as key points from which public expression in America is given quick and smooth outlet.

Mutual, organized in 1934 as a cooperative management system, by no stretch of imagination is in business for any other purpose than to make money. Mutual, however, chose another way to make money.

Where CBS and NBC went afield to buy stations, to effect agreements for time and program placements, Mutual decided that the best way was through cooperative arrangement. This meant setting up as a vending organization, not to originate programs so much as to rely on cooperative members to produce programs that could be offered clients and stations with a view to nationairing.

NBC and CBS frankly avowed profit making corporate entities. Thus they differ from Mutual, but there all differences cease, save the one that rises from the order of FCC to NBC to sell its Blue Network. The net effect of such an order on American broadcasting deserves thought by Americans who daily are seeing more and more progress being made toward disintegration of the democratic processes that many concede were only beginning to take on their deserved vitality when the New Deal came into being. Regarded from a competitive basis the sell order gives to Mutual an opportunity

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that it is not entitled to in view of the choice it made to be a cooperative service unit, rather than a group determined to make a private business as successful and far flung as is possible.

Mutual's opportunity translated in terms of advantages comes to this: The network is enabled by such a sale to make capital out of the pioneering spirit and properties of NBC and CBS. This spirit is the one that has made possible the nationwide service programs in music, art, education and information with which we are so familiar now.

The situation has its suggested analogies and ones which the Government most strangely has apparently not considered. There are in America today several great chains of department stores, of food entrepreneurs, of clothing makers and vendors. What the Government demands that NBC and CBS do with regard to its owned or managed properties is exactly the same as if it told the May Company in Los Angeles that, because it has stores in other cities it must abandon a few of them on the theory that too many of them tend toward monopoly against the interest of other such stores. Or, for example, the Government would order General Foods corporation to cease selling food products to all who ask for them because this tends to prevent other ambitious food producers to sell where General sells. Or, example again, to tell Safeway, Thrifty or Owl they must give up some of their sales outlets because they are selling too much. I am not arguing the democratic aspects of such imagined orders. Readers may judge for themselves whether it is morally right for Government to arbitrarily use political power through individuals to pirate property and throw such property on the open market. Hitler, Stalin, Churchill and Mussolini may be pardoned for such abuse of power (it is expected of them), but this, as far as we know, is still the America of free enterprise within, let us hope, the framework of the Constitution and the Democracy we are trying to work out through it.

NOTE: This is the first of 3 Articles by Mr. Hathaway. In succeeding installments he will discuss the questions earlier asked and will present the public's interest in the controversy raised by the FCC's move against the major American networks.

Peas a la Francaise

Parisian Salad

Coffee (Monarch Brand)

Recipe for Chicken Fricassee

2 chickens, cooked	6 egg yolks.
2 onions	6 tbsps. cream
2 cloves	½ lemon (juice)
2 small diced carrots	2 dozen pickled onions
Some mixed herbs	6 tbsps. butter
Salt and 2 peppercorns	6 tbsps. flour
2 cups Brandywine Mushrooms	

Joint the chickens neatly, put the pieces in a pot with the onions, the diced carrots, the herbs, salt, and ½ gallon hot water. Bring to boil, skim, cover the pot, leaving a small opening and simmer gently for 1½ hours, or until the chickens are tender. Then strain off all the stock and put it in a bowl. In another sauce pan, melt the butter, rub in the flour to a smooth paste over a slow fire, and add the hot stock gradually. Finally, add the yolks and the cream well mixed, and diluted with a little warm stock. Ten minutes before serving, add the onions and mushrooms previously cooked in butter without browning, and the lemon juice. To serve, put the pieces of chicken on a hot dish. Garnish with the onions and the mushrooms and strain sauce over it.

Recipe for Peas a la Francaise

2 pints shelled peas	1 tsp. sugar
The heart of a large lettuce head	Salt and pepper
Few small pickled onions	¼ lb. butter
	2 tbsps. water

Put the peas in a casserole. Add the lettuce, onions, sugar, butter and water. Salt and pepper to taste. Cover. Bring to a boil and simmer for 35 minutes until the peas are quite tender and the liquid is reduced. Serve garnished with the pickled onions.

Recipe for Fritters Souffle

¾ cup cold water	6 small eggs
1½ cups flour	1/8 cup sugar
6 tbsps. butter	Pinch salt
Vanilla	

Put the water in a sauce pan with butter. Divide in small pieces, add a pinch of salt, and the sugar and a little vanilla. Bring to boil on a quick fire, add all the flour, and stir vigorously with a wooden spoon till the paste is perfectly smooth. Replace the saucepan on the fire and turn the paste with the spoon till it begins to dry and no longer clings to the bottom of the pan. Remove the saucepan from the fire and stir in the eggs, one at a time, making sure that each egg is well absorbed before adding the next. The paste should be well stirred and beaten to make it light. Shape into small balls, no bigger than a walnut, either with the hand or with a spoon, and drop in a deep frying pan of boiling fat. Cook till the "helmet" are a golden color, and have swelled to three times their original size. Roll in powdered sugar and serve at once.

THE REAL THING—Many substitutes often appear on the market in place of the real thing and this is true of mayonnaise as well as other foods. Now real mayonnaise, good mayonnaise, mayonnaise that tastes like the French intended it to taste when they first created it, is an honest combination of oil, egg, vinegar and seasoning; but the substitutes—well, they sometimes have no egg, no oil, and for that matter are seldom mayonnaise at all. The usual test for telling the difference between the real thing and substitutes in this instance, is a little iodine. Drop a drop of iodine on the dressing and if it's real mayonnaise like Lady's Choice Mayonnaise it will remain the same color, but if it's a substitute, made with starch filling, it will turn black.



Since we're on the subject, you may be interested also in finding out how to vary real mayonnaise from time to time. Here is a list of modifications: Add a little milk, or some mashed banana, or some peanut butter to it, or mix in any kind of grated or cream cheese. Chili goes well with it too, and so does chopped celery, or cucumbers, or a little tomato juice. Finally, even honey or orange marmalade blends nicely with mayonnaise, and with such variations at your disposal, this is one dressing that should never become monotonous.

HOW OLD ARE YOU?—We don't mean to be personal, but whatever your age, if you take it and divide it by two, you will have the approximate number of tons of food that you have eaten since you were born. That's right—tons! Are you thirty? Then you've eaten about fifteen tons!

That's a lot of food for one little human machine to take care of, isn't it? All the more reason then, for giving more thought and care to what's really good for you when you eat. Not that we want you to carry a fifteen ton weight constantly on your mind; but the next thirty years or fifteen tons of eating for you may be more worthwhile if you balance your meals properly.

THE FOOD THAT DEPENDS ON A CYCLONE—We're giving you some recipes for it this week; it's rice. In some rice growing localities, unless a monsoon or cyclone comes along regularly—well, there just isn't any rice crop, that's all. Rice is one of the foods that is considered amongst the oldest known to mankind, by the way, and there is even evidence that it was grown in the Valley of the Nile centuries before the dawn of recorded history.

In India millions of cattle are used in connection with rice. They tread out the grain on the threshing floors. And in that country also, rice is called dhan, which means the staff of life. The Malayan name for it, however, is padi, or, rice in the husk, and from this we get the term paddy fields, which are rice farms,

especially those checkerboard farms seen in parts of China, where the peasants go around by the light of a pendant paper lantern after dark, brushing insects from the rice plants with a camel-hair brush. Scientifically, meanwhile, rice is known as *Oryza Sativa*, which merely designates a species of grass.

We just thought you might like to know some of these things about rice in order to be able to make a little table conversation the next time it appears on your menu.

RIBOFLAVIN IS GOOD FOR KERATITIS—Explained, this means that a diet rich in vitamin G is good for a disease which sometimes results in dim vision, itching eyelids, bloodshot eyes and oversensitivity to light. If you think you have keratitis, better get yourself some riboflavin right away.

You'll find it in such foods as beet greens, spinach, yeast, heart, kidney, liver, whole milk, buttermilk, cream, eggs, kale and asparagus.

Recipe for Rice with Mushrooms

- 2 cups of rice
- 2 onions, chopped
- 2 cups Brandywine Brand Sliced Mushrooms
- 4 tbsps. butter
- 2 cups grated cheese
- 4 tbsps. beef marrow
- 3 tbsps. white wine
- 3 cups beef stock
- Some saffron
- Salt and pepper

Melt 4 tbsps. of butter and the beef marrow in a deep frying pan, and when hot add the chopped onions and the sliced mushrooms. Cook till it begins to brown. Then add the rice. Stir well, cook for 15 minutes. Add the boiling stock, the white wine, and a good pinch of saffron, salt and pepper, and mix all well. Simmer gently for 20 to 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Just before serving, sprinkle with grated cheese and the rest of the butter.

Recipe for Rice with Shrimps

- 4 slices Wilson's Op' Fashund Bacon
- 3 dozen shrimps
- 2 cups rice
- 2 pints stock made from the shell of the shrimps
- 1 small onion
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 bottle Hauser Sauce

Chop the onion into the finely chopped Op' Fashund Bacon and fry to a golden brown. Add the rice, the stock from the fish, and the Hauser Sauce, season with salt and pepper. Put the rice, which should be well washed, in a buttered dish. Add the milk and the 3 eggs (well beaten), the sugar, the pinch of salt, and 1 tsp. of vanilla. Bake in a slow oven for 1 1/2 to 2 hours, till the top of the pudding is lightly browned.

Hal eyed the headlines soberly.

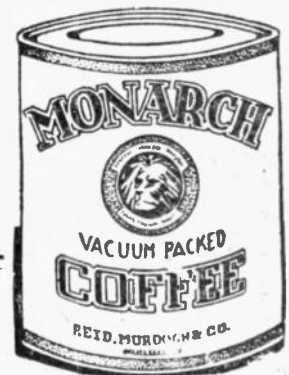
"Look at those," he said. "Now ask, have you any blessings?"

IF YOU'VE stirred your bones down town to see "Jump for Joy," Chocolate Shake is no novelty to you, but to us less fortunate ones, this latest Duke Ellington release for Victor with Ivie Anderson doing the vocal is ready and waiting for your pleasure. It is strictly Duke Ellington, emphasis on the saxophones, but for us the real tune from this show is I Got It Bad and That Ain't Good. It's on the reverse side of Chocolate Shake and its tempo is much slower, prettier, and with better lyrics. With lines like, "Never treats me gentle as he should, I got it bad but that ain't good," Ivie Anderson is really at home and so is Mr. Ellington.

DAWN—(The Dawn of Love). Perhaps we are spoiled, but unless a band

pulls something out of the hat, as it were, most of us are prone to turn the dial on our radio. When Wayne King's music is recorded one is more than likely to forget the leader's intention to play just "sweet music." Dawn, by Wayne King is just slow moving sweet tune with no particular appeal nor charm. Reverse: "Til Reveille" is fast becoming a very popular tune. Perhaps it's needless to say that the reason for its popularity is its timeliness. Wayne King's recording of this tune for Victor is played good and

straight with effective vocalization.

Don't Take Your Love From Me, as recorded by Artie Shaw for Victor, is a pleasant surprise. The full orchestra is notably unlike the Shaw we are used to; however, the solo instruments soon clarify the situation. The Reverse: Love Me a Little Little is a catchy new tune, and the Artie Shaw orchestra "goes to town."

THE GOODMAN CLARINET: On Chicago's Jewish-populated West Side in the summer of 1919 excitement echoed down teeming streets, glanced off building walls, brought many a neighbor of a Jewish Synagogue to windows and doors to listen. The excitement was mostly musical. It came from the Synagogue where a patriarchal rabbi was realizing an old ambition: the formation of a boys' band with loaned instruments.

If Benny Goodman had been 20 pounds heavier and two inches taller in 1919 he probably would have been blowing a tuba or a trombone in 1941 instead of a clarinet. This fact is probably the oddest twist in the life of the musician who is maestro of the House-Warming broadcast, heard on the eastern NBC net.

The elder Goodman took three of his sons, Harry, Freddy and Benny, around to enroll in the band. Harry was biggest, so he was issued a tuba. Freddy was taller, so he was given a trumpet. By the time they got around to Benny, a

little fellow, the only thing left was a clarinet. They gave him that—for which fact all exponents of free-style music have had occasion to give thanks.

SMARTY PARTY BOY: Eleven years ago Bob LeMond was a Long Beach Polytechnic High School student who drove teachers to near distraction with "daffy" antics; teachers who predicted for him sad, bad end.

By last week's end teachers who still remembered the pranking school boy of Long Beach, had they been asked, might have admitted that the boy had become a model of juvenile propriety.
