*A Statement of Policy*

With the entrance of the United States into the war holocaust a new and more than ever significant responsibility devolves upon this publication.

In all cases, RADIO LIFE is prepared to render its readers a more completely detailed and vital service than ever before. ### Propaganda Calendar

Ingenuity of Axis propaganda machines in distilling the poison which it is hoped will vitiate the war efforts of its enemies is well known to the U. S. government through the FCC's world-wide monitoring system, but too little known to the U. S. people.

This week, in line with its announced policy of rendering maximum aid to listeners that they may make most constructive use of Radio's facilities for public information, Radio Life presents a new feature. On Page 10 appears the first of a series of special columns by Short Wave Editor Earl De Haven, which will be devoted to analysis of Axis propaganda heard by him at his powerful standard and short-wave receiving station in Los Angeles.

As major news events of the week are recorded by U. S. authorities, De Haven will report in Radio Life's pages Axis propaganda versions of same events. In the lines reported, readers will learn much,—between the lines, even more. Readers will watch each week the parade of covert fears, false hopes, false victories, which are fed to Axis peoples fighting a war not by free consent but by command.

In sharp contrast will seem U. S. version of events—admittal of losses when true, claims of victories only when definitely confirmed. To the free people of the U. S. nothing could be more heartening than the repeated evidence that will appear in De Haven's columns that to themselves their leaders give no other moral support than the moral support of truth.

### Things to Come

At press time this week the nature of future U. S. radio broadcasting under war-time conditions could not yet be determined. For the first two days of America's war with the tri-partite Axis, Radio, struggling to meet every emergency in the interests of public information and national defense, struggled, too, to find for itself sound policies consistent with both interests. On the third day, Wednesday, Dec. 11, the President of the U. S. signed a bill placing all radio broadcasting under direct command of the U. S. Army's General Staff.

Yet, while details of the Army's power over Radio were not yet evident, this much could be surmised—that Radio will be left to operate "as usual" as much as possible. Not only has Radio's self-imposed censorship proven Radio's ability to be prudent, but too, Radio advertising, like all

advertising, will continue to serve essential needs of both consumer and producer, needs which in many cases the war crisis will rather intensify than slacken.

Censorship to be enforced by Army, believed local Network chiefs, would represent, in part, stricter degree of same type of censorship Radio has pretty well managed to enforce upon itself: banning hysteria in reporting the news, banning reporting of unconfirmed rumors as news. Beyond that censorship, Radio executives could make no guesses at week's end,—Army's public relations experts were making no statements.

### Good Neighbor Note

Truth is, all South Americans have ever wanted is their place in Hemisphere affairs—a place denied them until Cordell Hull came along to write

his distinguished chapter in annals of U. S. statesmanship.

At war now, people of the U. S. can well be comforted—witnessing quick alliances springing up throughout Western Hemisphere — that "Cord" Hull did such a good job of making neighbors better in South America. Well, too, might they accord great credit to U. S. radio advertisers, who have been helping Cord Hull and will be helping him more than ever before in 1942.

For many years have two great Pan-American networks operated by NBC and CBS diligently explained American ways to U. S. Hemispheric cousins, diligently spent U. S. sponsors' advertising dollars to sell U. S. goods. Last week on eve of U. S. entrance into war came word that North American sponsors including Sterling Products, Camel cigarettes, RCA-Victor, Texaco and Standard Oil, will spend more than \$5,000,000 in South American Radio during 1942.

New trend will be for sponsors themselves to hire radio-trained Spanish and Portuguese-speaking experts to go to South America, write and produce special programs stressing U. S. understanding of South American viewpoint. With solid front of Latin-American allies in World War II, U. S. people have in last week been given best insight into Latin-American "viewpoint" of all.

Latin-Americans apparently are freedom-loving people too. To Radio goes credit in speeding the mutual discovery.

### Two Out of One

One of the unwarmed left-overs of pre-war days this week was the indefinitely pending FCC anti-monopoly action against nation's big Radio networks. But just before war's outbreak, NBC had near perfection a plan which would pretty well take most of the powder out of pre-war FCC's guns. The plan: formal separation of Blue and Red Networks of NBC, the latter to remain NBC, the former to become United Broadcasting System.

At week's end NBC continued to move in direction of its bifurcation, promised that divorce of its Red and Blue members would be legalized and solemnized by Jan. 1. For most part, the parting of the Red and the Blue will mean merely setting up two sales organizations where before there was one. Otherwise—program direction and management will remain virtually unchanged, NBC's — and the new UBS's—coverage of war news will not be affected.

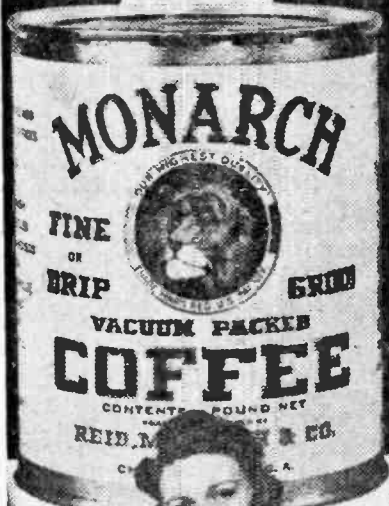

war "declaration" came word from CBS that its new correspondent in Vichy, France would be well-trained, experienced, competent man named Clinton Winant, brother of John Winant, U. S. Ambassador to Court of St. James, London.

This week, until and unless some happier word comes of Vichy's perilously Axis-veering position, fate of the CBS correspondent who is the brother of second-ranking (2nd to Secretary of State) member of U. S. diplomatic corps, cannot be determined.

If interned in Vichy with other U. S. newsmen, will Winant's family relationship afford him any special consideration? At best, friends in the U. S. hoped the French would spare themselves the possible embarrassment of a delicate situation, set Clinton Winant at liberty.

### Normalcy Note

While the war goes on, Radio will go on too,—and, all undaunted by it all, radio advertisers continue to devise new ingenuities with which to determine a audience acceptance of various types of radio entertainment.

This week comes announcement that a series of audience reaction tests on actual sponsored programs is being conducted by a New York agency in which the so-called Stanton-Lazarsfeld mechanism is being employed.

Before each member of the studio audience are two buttons to push: a "like" button, a "don't like" button. All correlated on a running tape are the results of the studio audience's button-pushings, likes and dislikes. Suggested use for device would be to check audience reaction to some of nation's "borderline" radio humor. If results of tests are as expected, perhaps movements now afoot among civic, social organizations for formal protest and boycott would not be necessary—to open sponsors' eyes to moral blackout on their programs.

### Milestone?

Soon, perhaps, to make their appearance on the West Coast are the special Transradio news teletypes being installed in eastern seaboard theaters. While feature attraction is showing, ticker will record flash news on specially developed DuPont film. At feature's conclusion, the DuPont film containing three minutes of printed news bulletins, from European and Far Eastern war fronts, will be flashed upon the screen.

Attractive to theatre-operators is the new news wrinkle because sponsors paying for 20-second commercials will defray cost of equipment and of teletype service. Wistfully, some even hope new arrangement may perhaps eliminate such now staple theatre devices as Bingo or dish giveaways. Exploitation, publicity, and advertising will attempt to sell public on idea they need no longer stay at home to hear newscast by radio.

### No Noise Unlimited

Frequency modulation makes it possible to receive a radio signal which

Contrary to an erroneous report appearing in the downtown press last week, there is more than one official radio station for defense warnings in the Los Angeles area. On authority of the Fourth Interceptor Command and the Federal Communications Commission, official stations are: KNX, KFI, KHJ and KFAC.

is no stronger than any interference, static, electrical, or natural, that it encounters en route from transmitter to receiver. In this regard does FM have it all over standard broadcasting, in which the radio signal must be much stronger than the interference to be heard at all. But FM must be broadcast on a special wave-length, requires special transmitters, special receivers.

But here in Los Angeles this week was announced a radio receiver which receives standard band broadcasts, and can receive them despite interference four times as strong as the radio signal. All that was revealed of the new development was that it operated on amplitude modulation (standard broadcasting) rather than FM (frequency modulation), and that it employs several amazing "filter" devices which have uncanny ability to let radio signals through, keep interference out. All that could be authenticated of it, and perhaps all the authentication any such development should require, came from Dr. Lee De Forest, also now located in Los Angeles, inventor of the vacuum tube, considered the "father of radio":

"Mr. Karl E. Pierson has accomplished what no other radio engineer working with amplitude modulation has succeeded in doing. . . . I have witnessed a very startling demonstration of this receiver. . . . It will undoubtedly prove an important factor in military radio communication."

Radio Life will endeavor to keep its readers informed on the development of this new radio instrument as further news is released.

### Network of Future?

Completion of the first Frequency Modulation commercial network broadcast on Nov. 28 probably will become one of Radio's best known

birthdays, should neither be taken for granted nor go unnoted.

Significance: While priorities and labor shortages will continue to impede manufacture of FM (and television) receivers, they will, apparently, not impede fructifying of FM networks that can eventually serve as television networks too.

The Broadcast: A Stromberg-Carlson musical program originating in W2XQR in New York City was carried by a special telephone line to Alpine, New Jersey, where W2XMN, experimental FM station of Major Edwin H. Armstrong, FM's inventor, broadcast the program north and east to be picked up and rebroadcast by W65H, in Hartford, 92 miles distant. Total area covered by the first FM network was some 21,000 square miles, in which area were an estimated 40,000 FM receivers.

Standard broadcast networks now depend upon telephone wires for transmission of programs from station to station, and while in telephone-wire-transit standard broadcasts are given some protection from electrical, other disturbances. FM broadcasts, however, are virtually invulnerable to static or other interference, do not require installation of telephone wires, an installation enormously costly in time and materials. Completion of one part of FM's recent three-part hookup without telephone wires, therefore, presages growth of FM networks free from this expense.

Since FM waves, being very "short," travel in straight line and do not conform to earth's curvature as do standard broadcast or "long" waves, FM's relaying stations will have to be quite close (40 to 100 miles). However, since television waves have same "short" characteristics as FM, FM-relay stations of the future will serve as television-relay stations of the future.

outs last week was never less than 85%, was as high as 98%, reported Fourth Interceptor Command. Problems in New York, however, will be more complicated.

For New York lacks central light switches. Every street light is individually controlled by an astronomical clock, can be doused in emergency only by hand. In Manhattan alone are 25,000 such clock-lights, number in Greater New York defies estimate. For black-outs to come in New York, therefore, much work and enormous expense lies ahead.

## Eminences Storming

Twice within 24 pre-war hours did CBS inform U. S. listeners of planes and the men who fly them, twice powerfully and inimitably keynoting news of super-interest, super-intelligence. Of vaster significance in incidence of the two broadcasts was that it signally emphasized for listening public radio's torrentiously enlarging ability to report not only on the things that are—with dramatic vividity, explicitness, completeness unequalled by any other medium of public communications. For war-time such reports as these will carry added significance:

"Report to the Nation" (Nov. 25) painstakingly concerned duties of unsung, unlonized mechanics, navigators, others, who make feats of better-publicized war pilot possible.

No less important than pilots are bombardiers, observers, photographers, radio-men, machine-gunners. With exquisite and incomparable realism did Report take listeners aloft in flight of a flying fortress bomber, from actual flight narrate complicated operations of flying fortress' crew members, sung and unsung.

For opening of "Keep 'Em Flying" week (Nov. 26) were listeners regaled with dramatization of The Ferry Command,—intricate operation by which U. S. delivers the goods from factory ultimately to English airdrome. At end of Lockheed assembly line listeners heard detailed description of completion of new bomber. From the nation's capitol came words of Col. Robt. C. Olds, Chief of Ferrying Service, describing procedure which checks progress of planes from California to Europe, checks progress of pilots return-

ing from Europe to California to deliver another.

At last, from "somewhere in Canada" came the story of how planes are turned over to civilian flyers for the hazardous flight to embattled Britain.

No listener had any doubt he was now better informed on planes and on the men who fly them than he had been before, better than he was likely to become by other means than radio listening. Total broadcast time of two programs: one hour. Total research time by radio's research specialists: in excess of five hundred hours.

## Mutual Too

No less in Radio's tradition for public service than David Sarnoff's offer to President Roosevelt last week was wire sent to FCC by Mutual's W. E. MacFarlane, president, Lewis Allen Weiss, vice president, and Alfred J. McCosker, Board Chairman: "In the face of this great national emergency the Mutual Broadcasting System offers and pledges to you and through you to the Government of the United States its loyal and whole-hearted cooperation in making its facilities available for whatever may be required in the public interest."

## Mt. Lee Guarded

Like all other broadcasting facilities, the Don Lee FM and Television stations atop Mt. Lee are under heavy police guard and visitors are forbidden to cross the property line under threat of arrest.

## Finley Goes

More friends in Radio here has Mark Finley than many a radio publicity chief better known to the public. Last week 1st Lieut. Mark Finley was granted leave of absence by Mutual vice president and general manager Lewis Allen Weiss so he could volunteer for active duty with the Army, G2, Military Intelligence.

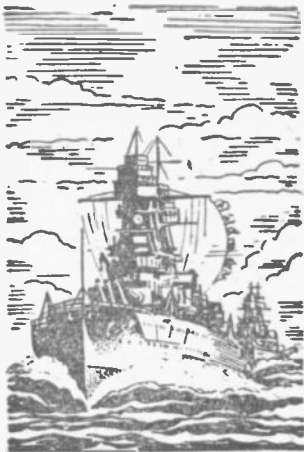

### Bringing the News Of U. S. Fighting Men to the People

WHEN on Monday, December 8, the United States had been stabbed in the back for the second time, the day before with the totally unexpected assault on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and this day with the assault on Manila, Philippine Islands, word of the attack had to be gotten to the American people immediately.

Who was there to do it? Newspapers carrying the story could not have reached the streets until hours later. Radio could provide the answer, but there were no specialists, no split-second-trained special events men, no ex-



pert commentators on the ground in Manila.

How was it done? Just a run-of-the-mill worker of the great Radio industry was in Manila—and that's all that was needed. Bert Silen, manager of Manila's station KZRH, saw the invading Japanese planes in the sky, heard the first challenging, defiant roar of U. S. anti-aircraft guns, and he knew that an attack was on. That was all the preparation Silen needed for the vivid, glowing report to his astounded countrymen which followed. Radio's worldwide facilities, which are adjusted to meet any emergency, did the rest.

Immediately Silen contacted NBC headquarters in New York by trans-oceanic telephone. The message was dramatically, significantly terse: Bert Silen of KZRH, Manila, has a story and wants the air. He began his broadcast immediately, KZRH transmitting simultaneously by both short-wave and standard-wave. On the standard broadcast band Silen was heard by the electrified residents of Manila, with warnings for their safety—and the beginning of his detailed account of the attack.

At the same time, the short-wave broadcast was picked up by RCA's short-wave relay station on the Pacific Coast north of San Francisco and sent on to New York. From New York it was routed to the entire NBC trans-continental network. Within a few minutes of his telephone call Silen was being heard throughout the United States.

Radio had risen to an emergency and had done so with such precision

that the report from Manila reached U. S. listeners within a few minutes of the time it would have taken a regularly scheduled foreign news broadcast to go on the air. In ordinary times, and if he had been a special correspondent, Silen would have been in contact with New York two or three times a day by telephone. He would have stated just what time he would be ready to go on the air, and all network member stations would have been prepared for just that moment. Actually, the only difference in time between Silen's dramatic, utterly unprepared, unexpected broadcast and any regularly scheduled news or even entertainment program was the two or three minutes it took NBC in New York to advise member stations of the broadcast.

From Manila, where American fighting men were defending American soil against its first invasion since 1812, station manager Silen told his story to the American people. No editor stood between the reporter and his audience to organize and edit the report. Everything depended upon Silen's on-the-spot judgment. He

# Radio Lifelines

**Stories of the Week:** **Monday:** Naval Reserve Officer Freeman Lusk, who is the voice of the Examiner's School of the Air broadcast, was impressed into recruiting office service one day A. A. (after the attack), and confronted by a disconsolate aspirant who had been rejected because of poor teeth: "What," bellowed the not-to-be U. S. Tar, "do they want us to do . . . go over there and CHEW the Japs up?" . . . **Tuesday:** William Parker, Thrifty News commentator observes in passing that now for the first time the U. S., which has been a nation of armchair critics and parlor experts for the past year and a half, will have to leave the war to military experts,—which will be okay with the public—so let's go! . . . **Wednesday:** Somewhere in the Hollywood foothills was little but dynamic Knox Manning during part of the blackout. "Halt," snapped a sentry, "who goes there?" Knox reports his voice quavered as he answered, shivering, "Knox Manning, Columbia Broadcasting System,—" then, to make sure, added, "you know, the one Amos and Andy are on . . ." **Thursday:** Newscaster Pat Bishop interrupted the "Arnold Grimm's Daughter" show to read a statement from Mayor Bowron; as the serial returned to the air, the first character said with perfect timing, "Jumping Jupiter!" . . . **Friday:** Heard on the NBC network the phrase: "picked up by the CBS Listening Post"—yes, old rivalries are being submerged in the common cause . . . **Saturday:** War-time broadcasting may sound easy, confides Ed Murrow, home after a year and a half in London—and mighty proud of the way his colleagues here are doing their job—but it isn't. Several men on the European front have had to be replaced because of "shell-shock"; look for thinning out of familiar names among foreign news experts from time to time, says Ed,—but remember, Radio will always have new soldiers in the Fight for Truth to throw into the breach. . . . **Sunday:** Certain local sponsors, after doing the self-effacement gesture about dropping the commercials, turned around and ran plugs about twice as long as usual. Business as usual . . . people were finding their feet again.

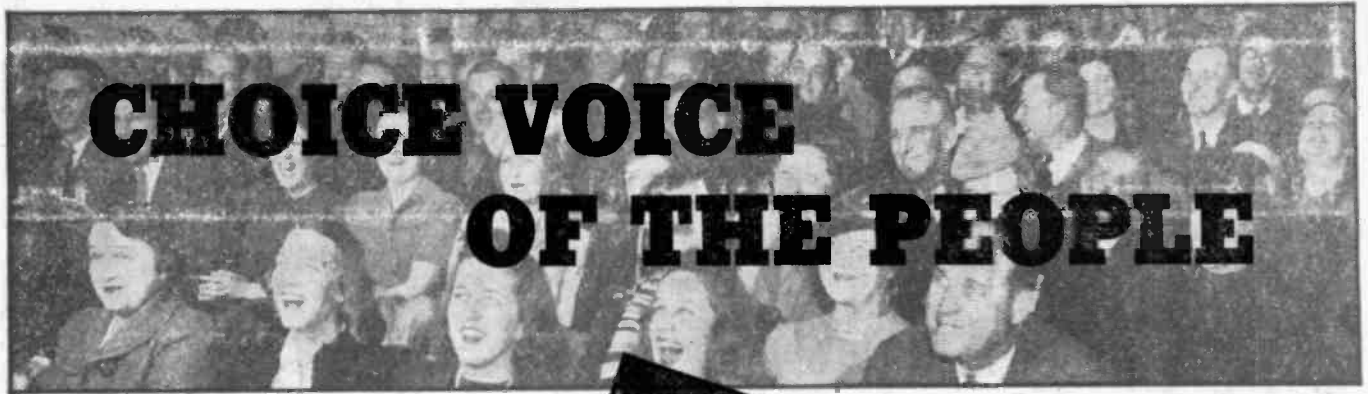

# CHOICE VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

## Revealing Success Secrets of Radio's Oldest Quiz Show

**H**OW MANY times does the human heart beat in a minute?", probed Parks Johnson, quizzing a University of Tennessee co-ed on the Vox Pop program.

"That," she flashed precociously, "depends on two things. Where you are and what you're doing."

"What is the father of all waters?" inquired Parks of Mrs. Vanderbilt, wife of Rhode Island's former governor.

Terse was her answer. "Pluto."

On Dec. 22, when Vox Pop presents its show as a Christmas benefit for Boys Clubs of New York, listeners anticipate youthfully stimulating replies which may rival adult come-backs in their perspicacity.

Vox Pop derives its name from the Latin, vox populi, meaning "voice of the people." Daddy of all quiz shows, it started inauspiciously on a shivery night in 1932, when two shirt-sleeved radio engineers stuck their heads out of a studio window in Houston, Texas, and flung a microphone cord to the sidewalk below, where Parks stood waiting to quiz passersby in front of a popular hotel.

But the night was chill and Houston denizens were not sallying out. Resourceful Johnson snatched the mike: "I'll give \$5 to every person appearing tonight on my program."

In three minutes an eager crowd had congregated and Parks was tossing his questions: "If it's an elevator going up, what is it coming down?" "How many legs must a centipede lose before he will limp?" "Should a gentleman remove his hat before striking a lady?"

Since that frost-bitten nocturnal quizzing nine years ago, more than 5000 Vox Poppers have mumm-



bled their rejoinders into the mike and more than a quarter of a million interrogations have been set up for the man on the street to fell.

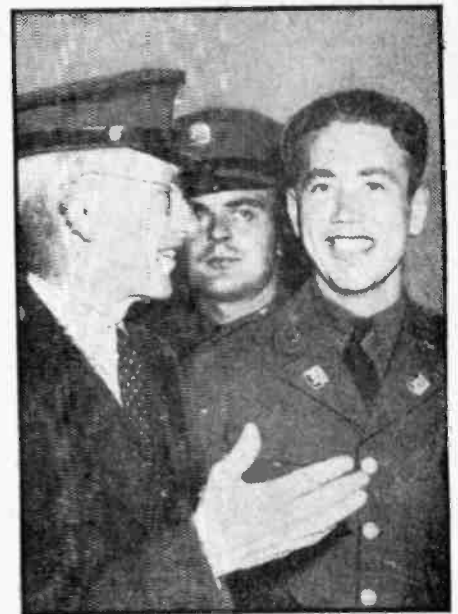
Why such prolonged success for the show?

It is the people's program, a homespun, friendly program in which participants are not ridiculed or embarrassed, in which there are plenty of laughs and an abundance of human interest. It's a show which has been modified through the years to conform to what vox populi indicates it craves.

Considerable trepidation attended transfer of Vox Pop to New York in 1935. Parks feared that blase metropolitans would jeer such unsophisticated material and would pitch the broadcast into an ether panic. On the first night he scattered a detachment of detectives through the crowd. Alleged hard-boiled Manhattanites turned out to be yokels at heart. They liked Vox Pop.

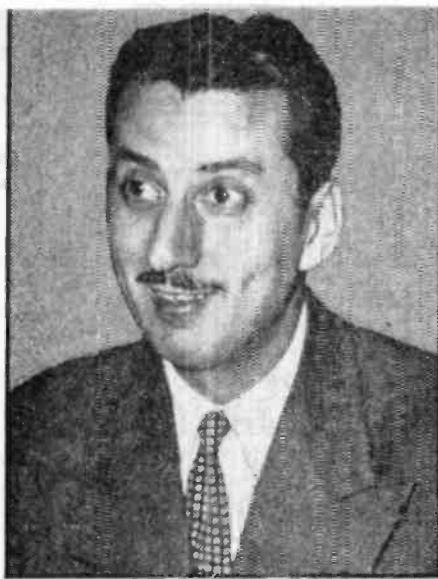
Parks installed his microphone in the doorways of empty stores, in hotel lobbies, and a steady flux of quizzees exposed itself to the fun barrage. Gypsy Rose Lee was among the throng. Parks blindfolded her and told her she was to undergo a "sniff test." Gypsy implored to take off her earrings first, then nosed a vanilla bean, a dash of bay rum, a lump

# War-World On Your Dial

By Earl G. De Haven

Caustic and vitriolic enough to penetrate even a "signal blackout" (had there been one) was the sarcastic pronouncement of Radio Tokyo just before press-time this week to the effect that their enemy is "not China and its people, or even a deposed general (Chiang Kai Shek), no, not even the American people, but Roosevelt, a war-monger of the U. S., and his brother, Churchill of Great Britain." They, explained Tokyo, are the real enemy.

"But 112 million free Japanese will no longer be told what they can or cannot do," asserted Tokyo indignantly. In a lengthy harangue about "interference" on the part of the U. S. over "a long period of time" the broadcast the night after the Pearl Harbor attack was concluded with the reading of a carefully enumerated list of "incidents" from 1937 through 1941—all branded as "aggressive acts" on the part of the U. S.

There was nothing new in Radio Tokyo's pronouncements this week. The technique was the same, the announcer was the regular one,—the inflection of his voice was the same as any other night. Radio Tokyo simply had a new target, and we were it. They've had the "China affair" to talk about for several years now and henceforth they'll have added variety by the reason of the "American incident." The opening word of greeting—a cheerful "Hello, America!"—was as cordial and friendly as ever. . . .

Personally, we believe Japan is not as totally totalitarian as Hitler wants her to be. Reason: criticisms of Nazi policy have slipped into Tokyo's mike on more than one occasion recently, and the announcer who slipped them in is still announcing. Dial Tokyo 11.8 and 9.53.

In marked contrast to the definite rise and fall in optimism as registered in broadcasts from London, Berlin and Rome, I have never heard one word that would betray the slightest indication of fear as to the ultimate outcome of the world holocaust from Radio Center, Moscow. But, you say, with the new Far East development to contend with, and the mighty Red Army at last on the offensive, how is their speech today?

Well, naturally a measure of enthusiasm is always conveyed in an hour of victory, but at Radio Center this is always tempered and controlled: No blatant claims of exaggerated victories are being aired even now,—the psychology being to stick to elements of honesty in thought and action. It's a "business as usual" attitude in the U.-S. S. R.—despite the titanic struggle for which the whole nation has mobilized. Educational

**B**ACK in 1912 when John Florence Sullivan, alias Paul Huckle, alias Fred St. James, alias Fred Allen broke into show business with a deadly and premeditated blitz on half a dozen Boston theatre "amateur nights," the envelope handed the winner was always marked (in huge figures for the audience to see) \$25.

Inside was 50 cents.

Only the audience got fooled; the contestants knew what to expect. You weren't supposed to live on the four bits, but then who expected actors to live anyway?

Now going into his second year on CBS' top-ranking "Texaco Star Theater" variety hour on Wednesday nights with an estimated weekly audience of 20,000,000, Fred Allen has the pathological satisfaction of having a lot to do with changing all this. If kid-talent has to have a break, Allen, strictly a case of split-person-

ality, hugely enjoys being the one to give it. On the campuses of the nation's universities are voted the most talented undergraduates, and the talented ones are flown to New York to be aired under the Allen aegis. They're grateful.

Why Fred Allen would take such delight in finding new talent nobody can figure out. He never got a break in his life, though he's had the distinction of being billed "the World's Worst Juggler" in Australia and has been, in fact and truth, the worst ventriloquist in America. That was 1917. But through the years there have developed so many other depressing contradictions about the man that you wonder how Sainly Fred and Diabolic Allen manage to get along with each other at all. Only thing is, the Saint stuff sticks,—the Diabolic stuff wipes off. See what sticks to you:

Incendiary bombs set a thousand fires raging a maddened hellish glow into the sky from which explosives hurtling earthward in a terrifying screech smashed whole buildings into mute, shapeless heaps, burying dead and dying. . . . The rags, the bones, the guts of London were taking it, and the American newsreel sound-man stuck to his post — where the going was the toughest. For three nights he stuck on the fourth night he got his Concussion ruptured both eyeballs; the surgeons operated and told him he might live if he was quiet, he might see again—if he was lucky. . . .


The hospital was bombed, so they moved him, as carefully as they could, to unbombed Sussex and operated a second, a third time; then they said they could do no more. He was put on the Clipper, flown to Boston. There they operated a fourth time and in a month he could see again. He couldn't SEE so well, but now he awoke to see MORE than he had seen before, more than the mute, shapeless heaps, more than the rags and bones and . . . guts. He saw the REASON that London could take it—he saw that London knew even better than did he the brutality that was dishing it out—and that to this brutality would free men never bow! . . .

The March of Time was on the air; the story was the tragic death of England's Capt. Barnwell and his three sons in the RAF. The Nazi Lord Haw-Haw was announcing in savage glee the slaying of the Barnwells, but there was a sinister, bitter, realism in his tones that no actor could achieve. . . . Only a man who himself had fought to SEE—and had learned to see that brutality—could devote himself so fiercely to making others see it,—only a man who knew WHY London was taking it could say these depraved words of Haw-Haw's with that numb, stabbing authenticity. . . . It was just such a man, now a staff writer, actor and director for March of Time. He is Roy De Groot, erstwhile newsreel sound-man, and he has devoted himself anew to an immortal cause, the cause of truth and of freedom and of humanity everywhere,—that all free men may meet their true destiny face to face.

Have you ever seen a jack-rabbit try to run across an express highway at night? He runs out half way, stops, runs back, stops, runs forward again and finally winds up a traffic victim.

This week, I am a confused bunny. I have a pretty strong hunch that most of us are confused bunnies. I only hope that we do not become traffic victims.

All this confusion of the past two weeks has been perfectly natural and is no indication of a decadent people. It seems to me, on the other hand, to be quite the reverse; that we are imaginative, alert and willing to chip in and each do his bit.



But things are settling down to routine, even now. And before very much longer we'll be a compact, efficient unit prepared for eventualities. The confusion on the air, the conflicting orders, the wild news bulletins, the blackouts and all the rest of the terrific complications that combined to make grotesque and unbelievable chaos out of sleepy, everyday life, are among the things to be soon forgotten as we roll up our sleeves for a tough job.



All these things I say with complete sincerity. And I say them in spite of the fact that I was directly in the center of the awful, frightening catastrophe that struck Southern California on that fateful Sunday; I was in the headquarters of a major station when the first blackout was ordered, and I've followed the ensuing events very closely. It has been a tragic experience. With my last breath, I'll pray that it doesn't happen again. It was a horrible picture of frightened jack-rabbits trying to cross the road, and none escaping the traffic.



And through it all came radio with flying colors. True, there were wild bulletins. True, some announcers'

voices trembled with excitement. True, official orders got butchered in the process of broadcasting. True that programs and newscasts got thoroughly balled up.

But when you consider the pressure under which radio has been operating these past two weeks, when you realize that radio and radio alone fell heir to the task of mixing some sort of balm for an excited people, then does the fact sink home that radio has done a magnificent job.

I've heard considerable criticism directed toward individual commentators who have shown tendencies of exaggerating facts, and I've heard considerable criticism directed toward isolated cases of questionable judgment. But I forgive the critics. Reason, for the first part of last week, was gone with the wind. I know. I was there.



And having been there and having all the facts before me, I am deeply hurt to see a few individuals in the radio industry arrive at a false understanding of the situation. There has been a mixup among some of the stations in town that I sincerely hope will be corrected by the time this reaches print. This is an hour when radio should, more than ever before, stick together. There is no time for personal feelings. The job is too big; the goal too far.



I realize that this might sound like some sort of radio double-talk to those who know nothing of the situation, and I ask forgiveness. But the importance of the matter and the immediate urgency of a favorable solution, requires such an appeal.

Let's you and him stop fighting, huh?

of camphor, and a dabble of castor oil.

A man named Jim Moran bobbed up to demonstrate his theory that people can lose their inhibitions by throwing eggs into an electric fan. He was attired in a shower cap, rubber gloves, and a raincoat and had a windshield wiper as auxiliary equipment. He commenced his exhibition by heaving an egg into the fan. There was a dull plop. Someone had forgotten to turn the fan on.

One night a particularly inebriated man barged into the program and insisted on barking football signals into the microphone, while at another time a woman, suffering delusions about being robbed constantly, gained the instrument and in enraged screams notified the whole country about her persecution.

Such upsets are unpremeditated. In fact, the entire program is unrehearsed. None of the sane citizens jibing replies to Parks' nonsense has the vaguest conception about questions which are to be popped. Parks and his team-mate, Wally Butterworth, jot down a few notes before the show. "From there on it's a sort of touch and go system," Parks elucidates.

But the questions aren't the only surprises. Recent innovation refreshing the Vox Pop format is award of prizes to all guests. These trophies range from a ton of coal to a suit of resplendent red undies, (vintage of 1890), T-bone steaks, fifty pounds of jelly beans, a pair of stilts, bale of hay, live goat, 200-pound cake of ice, or fur-lined bathtub. Participants always accept their prizes, but sometimes auction them off after the program.

Parks and Wally enjoy shopping for these "gifts." Armed with \$250 to \$300 before each broadcast, they prowl

The budget was most likely a problem in normal times. Today it's a major disaster. Somehow the dollar will stretch just so far, and it leaves

most of us with a worried frown and a soured disposition.

With due regard for all these factors, we have declared an "individual emergency for the duration." The problem before the House (whose Representatives are you mothers and wives) is how to make the dollar serve the family, particularly at meal times.

The price of food is going up and the family appetite is just as hearty as ever. They still want a menu of ample proportions savored with variety. On the other hand, the physical demands of our present situation make a well-balanced diet more necessary than ever.

Here is where your Radio Life Consumers' Club comes in. With your help we have been able to offer you the best food values for the least in cost. Also included in our plan for your budget emergency are menus, which make possible a dinner for four for a dollar, no more. The complete aim of this organization then, is to enable you to give your family a hearty well-balanced meal with as little strain on the pocket book as possible!

### AN EDIBLE CHRISTMAS CARD:

In Poland it is the custom to eat your Christmas card. We know it sounds indigestible. If holiday greetings over there were done up in cellophane, tinsel, and what not as they are over here, this custom would probably have dire effects. However it is really quite harmless.

A few weeks before Christmas Polish monks distribute packages of paper-thin wafers made of flour and water and stamped with special figures. These have been previously blessed by the village priest. Each of the wafers is sent in letters to relations and friends just as we send Christmas cards.

On Christmas Eve when the first star appears, the whole family, beginning with the eldest member, breaks these wafers among themselves exchanging good wishes as they do so. Afterwards the master and mistress proceed to the servants'

quarters where the same ceremony is repeated.

### ESPECIALLY FOR YOU:

Here is a recipe you will like. It sounds like a meal in itself for a holiday dinner. Mrs. George T. Locker, a South Gate Consumer Club member, sent it in, and she calls it "Lynden Creamed Chicken in Potato Boats."

6 large potatoes  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. of salt  
1  $\frac{1}{4}$  cups of milk  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. of mace  
4 tbsp. of butter  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. of sage  
3 tbsp. of shortening 1 cup of diced Lynden chicken  
3 tbsp. of flour Paprika

Bake well scrubbed potatoes in moderately hot oven (400 F) until tender, about one hour. Cut around center of top; scoop out potato, leav-

ing  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch shell. Mash potatoes adding  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup of milk and two tbsp. of butter. Make white sauce. Melt shortening; blend in flour. Now add remaining cup of milk gradually, stirring until smooth. Add seasonings. Cook until thickened (about 15 minutes). Add chicken. Fill potato cups with mixture about  $\frac{3}{4}$  full. Cover with mashed potato. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderately hot oven for 20 minutes, or until potato is heated through and the top is lightly browned. Serves 6.

Mrs. Etta Mateer offers a good suggestion for cutting poinsettias. Fill a can with melted paraffin. Dip the cut end of each flower into this. It will make your poinsettias last much longer.

### Dinner for Four—Dollar No More

Pork Stew with Potatoes and Bacon  
Stewed Cabbage  
Turnip Salad with Oil and Lemon Dressing  
Coffee  
Delicious Apples for Dessert.

#### Recipe for Pork Stew

2 lbs. of pork shoulder  
2 lbs. of potatoes  
4 slices of Wilson's Ol' Fashund Bacon  
1 onion and a sprig of parsley  
1 pepper  
Salt and pepper, and 2 tsps. of Gravy Master

Chop 4 slices of Wilson's Ol' Fashund Bacon. Cut up one onion and saute in bacon. Then cut up 2 lbs. of shoulder pork in two inch pieces. Next, braise the pork with the onion and the bacon. Cook until meat gets brown on all sides. Now add 2 cups of water, 1 pepper cut up into small pieces and a sprig of parsley chopped up. Then simmer until meat is tender, and then add 2 lbs. of potatoes peeled and cut up into inch squares. Next season with one tsp. of salt,  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. of pepper and 2 tsps. of Gravy Master. Now cover pot and let cook slowly until potatoes are tender.

#### Recipe for Chicken Croquettes

Make a hash with six cups of white and dark chicken meat. Two cups of chopped mushrooms, Brandywine Brand, and one onion minced very fine. Simmer in butter. Then add four cups of cream sauce and two tsps. of gravy master. Season with salt and cayenne pepper. Put on fire and reduce until thick. Bind with yolks of four eggs. Allow to become cold, form into pyramid shapes, or in the shape of large corks. Put into bread crumbs, and fry in swimming hot fat until brown. Serve them with cream sauce and peas.

was calm, unhurried, factual. In the background, listeners could hear the anti-aircraft guns and they knew that Silen and his two staff-assistants were exposing themselves as surely as the men in uniform repelling the attack. They knew that war had come to America—and that American Radio was equal to its job.

Typical, too, of Radio's organization for dissemination of news, was the feat of KNX here in Los Angeles in releasing some 50 newscasts and analyses between 12 noon Sunday, Dec. 7, and one o'clock the next morning—as compared with the dozen or so news periods offered usually. With tension over the Japanese reply to America's statement of position mounting the night before, Saturday, Dec. 6, a pre-arranged plan went into effect at 6 p. m. that night. The KNX News Bureau staff was doubled. When news of the Japanese attack came, it

found seven News Bureau writers on duty preparing newscasts and bulletins, with all of KNX's staff of announcers on hand to put the news flashes on the air.

But Radio, which rose so magnificently to the emergency, is just beginning to fight—both in the Far East and on home shores. On the war front, Radio's battle will be to get its special commentators to every scene of action—keep them there—and maintain the safety of Radio's transmission facilities. At home, Radio's fight will be to assure that Radio shall operate for the public good under any and all conditions of crisis that may arise.

For example, when David Sarnoff placed all of NBC's world-wide facilities at the disposal of the nation's Commander in Chief within an hour of the Japanese attack, he was referring not to a remote possibility but to a very literal probability in cases of extreme danger. For at any time, the Army and Navy's own highly skilled technicians and public relations experts can take over the radio stations of the nation and place them under their own operation.

In case of such dire emergency, for example, if it should be necessary during an air raid to cut the City of Los Angeles' power supply, Radio broadcasting will continue, as it did during the flood peril of 1938, by means of portable generators. Since a radio blackout would be in force within the city, the broadcasts will go by short-wave to New York, then be relayed from New York throughout the country wherever a radio blackout is not in force. Thus, the whole nation will be kept informed without divulging conditions in—and location of—the city to enemy flyers.

At such times, the networks will continue to operate, transmitting the programs by telephone wire, as usual, for release by network stations from coast-to-coast, except within the blackout area. KFI, for example, would simply close its transmitting key during the blackout, but programs originating in KFI for network release will still go to New York, and from New York lines will be heard throughout the country as usual. The Great Gildersleeve broadcast on the Sunday of the attack was interrupted two or three times by the program monitor for flash bulletins, but neither the studio audience nor the cast of the show were advised of this. The show just went on.

Just why the first Radio blackout occurred not in the more heavily industrialized Southern California area but in Oregon and Washington Monday night, Dec. 8, no one knows but Chairman James Fly of the Federal Communications Commission and the Army Interceptor Command pro-

tecting that area. When the Radio blackout is determined upon, the Army advises the FCC and the command is dispatched not to the networks but to the individual stations affected. These stations simply stop transmitting their own broadcasts but may continue to operate as part of a network chain.

Even in case of complete cessation of Radio broadcasting, there remain two other means of communication

from coast-to-coast: the transcontinental telephone system and the transcontinental teletype systems. Since the outbreak of war, neither the telephone wires nor the teletypes have been used for routine business by the Radio networks as formerly, the enormous jam of official business in connection with plans for future broadcasting conditions keeping the wires in use on a 24-hour basis.

If conditions of warfare permit, listeners will hear again from capable Bert Silen in Manila, and from KGU in Honolulu, both the regular and Hawaiian stations being regular NBC-affiliates. When—and if—the news

breaks from Alaska, it will be brought to American listeners via a reciprocal program arrangement in force between NBC and the Canadian Broadcasting Company, with programs relayed from American stations in Alaskan territory to Vancouver, B. C., and from there to NBC New York.

diagram of malignance, iniquity and cunning. Behind the mask is a devout Catholic, seldom a drinker, never a smoker, never a gambler, and a guy who has managed—with prodigious cunning—to give away much more money than he spends on himself.

Conceded the greatest ad libber in Radio (it's a release from his two clashing personalities), he pays top salaries to four staff gag-artists, patiently hears all their hopeful suggestions, then writes his script entirely himself. The blow comes when, after writing, editing, revising, rehearsing some eighty hours a week, he scraps huge chunks of his written labors for a spontaneous inspiration at the mike. Later he'll have to console the big-money script-geniuses when they pathetically expostulate against their uselessness.

O. O. McIntyre, who knew him well, described the secret of the Allen success as the fact that Fred sounds like "a man with false teeth chewing on slate pencils." The snarling Allen whine derives, however, from Fred's ability to speak with uncanny musicianship in sounds of sharp "fourths"—the most unpleasant sequence of sound that can smite the human ear. It makes him a Radio Personality. When you're through being cloyed by the usually radioed dulcetries, the Allen vitriol scorches, but clears, the aural palate.

Keeping his split personality a melancholy secret is one of his few but major problems. When a minor Hearst drama-critache wittlessly reproached him for stinginess Allen was paralyzed with unwholesome fear lest some of his beneficiaries, rushing to his defense, expose his dozens of charities. His private roll-call once ran more than thirty names.

Ultimately he found salvation in the New Deal, advises Mrs. Allen (Portland Hoffa, as if you didn't know), with the advent of the WPA, but he still manages to support six families and get off some \$100 a week just to casual panhandlers. When one moocher fell and wrenched a limb while waiting in line for Fred outside the New York studio, the grapevine had it he was going to try to get damages.

Pathological case that he is, when somebody catches him in an act of kindness he dives behind a screen of cynicism which isn't always transparent. A friend was walking with him when a truck bore down on a newsboy in front of them. Fred sprinted out, pulled the boy to safety, snarled:

"What's the matter, kid? Don't you want to grow up and have troubles?" That was the Diabolic Allen in him, sheer lunacy.

The split personality, however, persists even into his program material.

The shows you hear abound with zany names, half-wit situations, merry-andrew people. But the Allen analysis of humor (outside his stout dogma that it's unanalyzable!) is strictly academic; that's the Sainly Fred in him:

"The best form of comedy for Radio is a knowing, satirical approach to the events and foibles of the day." Accordingly he reads nine daily newspapers, four weekly magazines, and any day of the week his pockets will literally bulge with a mass of clippings, notes and pages of the current week's script under revision.

But he's crazy in other ways too. Sitting on top of the world you'd think Fred Allen would diligently have less than nothing to say about "what's wrong with Radio." Benny, Hope, Skelton, the others, are all satisfied. What's Radio ever done to them! But instead of quietly pocketing the net \$4000 a week the Texaco people give him, the Diabolic Mr. Allen side of him has got ideas.

He is opposed (and while most of

the big comedy names say they are . . . they aren't) to studio audiences. Why? Well, it's not because he "likes to be alone." The folks in the parlor are forced to take their laugh hints from the studio audience, aren't they? Well, says Fred, this makes it almost impossible to use "situation" comedy. The "situation" illusion sounds like one thing in the parlor, looks like something else to the folks watching.

The combination of the Sainly Fred modesty and the Diabolic Allen flair for the dramatic came to a super-dramatic culmination last Christmas Eve in what could—Fred Allen being what he is—become an annual event. Coming to the broadcast after a trying conference with his writers, who had only dutifully disagreed with him on the following week's script—but had been over-zealous—, and finding the studio audience restless, Fred suddenly interrupted the program with the announcement that he had a Christmas gift for his listeners of great rarity and value.

Thereupon he gave it to them—a whole minute of dead silence!
