COMING OUT OF the ETHER

Most interesting job in radio these days is that of the news editor. His is not only the most interesting, but probably one of the most important jobs among the army of persons working behind the scenes of the broadcasting industry.

Proving that the American system of broadcasting is the best, there has been no censorship of radio so far, and it would appear from all indications that there will be none officially. The radio industry itself, however, has sort of a self-imposed censorship which is maintained for the best interests of the nation.

The news editor is responsible for all news which goes on the air. His keen eye must be able to quickly grasp the ramifications of an innocent looking line, which if heard by the enemy, might contribute to the ultimate detriment of our defense system. For example, an innocent sounding sentence which may come over the news wire concerning the movement of a transport or troop ship may lead to the eventual sinking of that ship and the loss of many lives. The newspapers of the country have a great deal more freedom than radio and can publish more detailed accounts of battles, troop movements, etc. Newspapers, as well as all other mail, are not so likely to get out of this country. Whereas radio, which knows no bounds, can be picked up as easily in Tokyo, Japan as it can be in Tokyo, Minn.

what might happen is pointed out by the War Dept. A "Man-on-the-street" broadcast was taking place in a certain Atlantic seaboard town. The jolly master-of-ceremonies, while quizzing the "man-on-the-street", selected from the crowd a small girl not yet in her teens. He asked her name, where she was going, how old she was, etc. She answered that she was going to the store with her mother to buy some presents for her brother who was in the navy. She said she had to hurry because her brother was going away. The announcer, not thinking, asked where he was going. She replied that he and others of his fellow sailors were going to Iceland.

The news we are receiving over the air now is, for the most part, fact, not fiction. In these anxious times we must realize the importance of secrecy surrounding military affairs for the full protection of us all. The enemy broadcasters are frequently heard, and sometimes even quoted, as making strong claims of victory.

My suggestion to those of you who follow the news avidly is this:

Listen to the news and accept it at face value.

Be happy that we are able to get as much TRUE information as we do.

Freedom Salesman No. 1

Before Japanese treachery had crystallized U. S. opinion, simplified U. S. politics, galvanized U. S. into action,—two and one-half billions of dollars in U. S. Defense Bonds had the U. S. Treasury sold—and for most of this selling was credit given to Radio.

In the first week of the war did the U. S. Treasury Dept. now really get down to business, prepare to make Radio U. S. Freedom Salesman No. 1—with plans for a U. S. bond-selling campaign by Radio that will liken previous efforts to tactics of Elmer Blurt.

New super-salesmanship will involve use of many new programs. Such is the soon forthcoming "On Guard America" to be scripted by such literary and radio-writing greats as Robert E. Sherwood, William Saroyan, Gertrude Berg, Stewart Cloete, Margaret Sangster.

It will involve new slogans: suggested this week was to change 'Defense Bonds' to 'Slap-the-Japs' Bonds.

It will involve new promotions by Radio master-minds. Already in Texas has Radio effected widespread bond-giving for Christmas, in Vermont is Radio credited with starting a "Bond-a-Month Club," in Philadelphia has it introduced Defense Stamps as prizes for "street" and audience-participation broadcasts, in Alabama is the Defense Bond reminder incorporated into every station break, and from producers of the transcribed "Superman" program came word that the reminder will be incorporated into and recorded in every transcription.

Wherever the People of the United States turned, wherever they listened (and they listened much) this second

week of World War II, they found U. S. Freedom Salesman No. 1 doing a typical No. 1 job of aiding financing of the war.

The alternative to a successful Bond campaign would be bitterly severe taxation. It was up to Radio to avoid that possibility,—squarely, finally, irrevocably up to Radio to help the U. S. do voluntarily what must otherwise be accomplished at whatever cost—even by compulsion.

Peace Without Passion

It was just four weeks ago (RL Nov. 23) that Radio faced virtual paralysis of network broadcasting by strike threatened by Federation of Long Lines Telephone Workers,—fifty members of which hold all-important monitoring posts at which network programs are relayed from point-to-point cross-country. Then was the war just "pending," and yet no one, executive nor union head, expected the grim threat to become grim reality.

In war-time, radio workers' position this week was proved no less unselfish than in peace-time—and much more definite. From every department of Radio's many-faceted activities did unions pledge unequivocal willingness either to delay indefinitely any strike action in case of disagreement with employers or to abandon strikes as practice altogether.

Astutely, however, did union leaders leave themselves this one "out": the non-strike pledges were off, they said, if employers "tried to take advantage of the situation." But unmiffed by back-handed warning were employers. With nation girding for war and Radio preparing to do its man-size job of helping nation's war effort, union and management alike, they knew, were most likely to be too busy to take advantage,—either one of the other.

Reconciliation?

With Radio tightening its belt and throwing out its chest this week for the biggest job of its career, from the nation's capital came reports that "problems of the industry with which the FCC had been concerned prior to the outbreak of the war" would be side-tracked indefinitely. Most important "problem" was the FCC's anti-monopoly suit against the networks.

To spike FCC guns, just before war's outbreak had NBC planned to divorce its Red network from its Blue (RL, Dec. 21), to be effective Jan. 1, the Blue to become the United Broadcasting System.

This week, under government's more benign gaze, NBC directors held special session in which, it is reported but not confirmed, they voted to post-

pone the divorce of the Red and Blue indefinitely.

Music Unanimous

Girding for war the second week, the nation found labor and management mending their differences, Republicans and Democrats erasing party lines, rich and poor, young and old, clamoring to get at the enemy. It also found one thing on which ASCAP and BMI could agree: that now the nation needed fighting songs. U. S. citizen armies have always been singing armies, was dictum of ASCAP's Gene Buck, predicting that some of the tunes they took to the battlefields in 1917 will be heard again: "Over There," "Keep the Home Fires Burning," "Pack Up Your Troubles,"—(all ASCAP tunes).

Not lagging either was BMI's Sidney Kaye, announcing that already 750 to 800 radio stations are being supplied with new patriotic song material.

From both camps came predictions of larger repertoires, more tunes to be written by the respective tunesmiths of each, more to be published by the publishers of each. While both agreed the nation needed martial music, no one expected either to concede that the other's was as good as theirs. Undertone of rivalry between two groups in vying for making of best fight-songs will likely be rather martial, militant itself.

turbulent centuries past of All Men Seeking Freedom, this Final Throne of Man's Dignity and Worth that we call the United States of America—are many people speaking many tongues. Fifteen millions of them can be reached most effectively by foreign language broadcasts. Throughout the land are some 200 radio stations which have, in peace-time, regularly scheduled such programs.

They will continue to schedule them. To do otherwise, stated a bulletin this week from the National Association of Broadcasters, would be to demoralize large sections of the population. America intends to care, in war-time, for the needs, of all its people—of every race, of every creed, of every tongue.

Precautions will be taken: writers and announcers of foreign language programs will be thoroughly verified as persons of unquestionable integrity and loyalty. Either the script or a recording of each broadcast will be checked in advance, then filed for future reference in case of suspicions to come. To all listeners is this assurance given: neither will this great nation bely its greatness by being ungenerous to a large part of its people, nor will it bely its greatness by acting without due fore-arming and sagacity.

Calmness Preferred

Clear to Radio newscasters at War's outset was that if they said nothing censorable, censorship when it did come—as come it must—would be mild. Clear it was, too, that if they couldn't stay within the straight-and-narrow the government would shut them in. At first glance, not all newscasters seemed completely able to find for themselves just where the straight-and-narrow was. For example:

Warned, comes report on good authority, was Walter Winchell—to forego customary broadcasting technique of raising his voice to emphasize a point.

Criticized in some circles locally were Bill Henry and the Sutherland-Rodriguez team for speculating over possibility of Russia's swinging back to alliance with Nazis. The facts, said critics, had listeners jittery enough; such private opinions could only make 'em more so.

Actually, all the theories by which newscasters should govern themselves were far from clear,—thus newscasters could hardly be held to blame. Still, Radio was, at week's end, going to make a still more determined effort to make as few mistakes as possible. Best advice was forthcoming from National Association of Broadcasters' prexy Neville Miller:

"It is . . . important that you report news calmly, slowly, and deliberately so as to avoid horror, suspense and undue excitement . . ."

With these sentiments, it is certain, will U. S. public be heartily in accord. Blood-and-thunder catharsis, stock-in-trade of dictator governments, has no par value among free people of a free nation. Only stock in which freedom's people have ever put much

trust is Action, Common . . . and Calmness, Preferred.

2nd Helpings Note

Unknown to local listeners is Ford Sunday Evening Hour's policy of asking guest artists to stay half-hour after broadcast to play or sing some more for the 4,500 members of the studio audience in Detroit's Orchestra Hall. But much noticed this week was this policy by concert brokers and impresarios in Detroit—clamoring in accents of travail that such free second helpings for studio audiences would soon reduce said brokers and impresarios to having no helpings at all. Shrewdly, the clamorers point out the practice is unfair to the artists too; soloists such as Josef Hoffman get mere \$5000 for Ford radio work, a fair price in radio circles; for the after-radio work, say offended ones, they should get more. Artists themselves have raised no objections . . .

Significant is the controversy because Ford's policy, if duplicated elsewhere throughout country, might be galvanic and upsetting policy indeed. Significant, too, is the fact that at week's end settlement of the controversy was turned over to American Guild of Musical Artists,—who thus far have expressed no dissatisfaction with Ford's policy. If artists themselves consent to the after-school chores, what will become of personal-concert tours? Has Radio indeed replaced concert stage to even this extent? K.N.N., 6 p.m. Sun.

FM Front and Center!

Only few weeks ago was first FM commercial network hookup completed (RL, Dec. 21), a network which, due to FM's independence of telephone wires for relaying of programs, can grow fast, grow at much less expense than do standard networks. This week came word that such FM networks may be used by U. S. Army and Navy for emergency announcements.

Plan is for FM networks to serve as emergency auxiliary to radio stations in case telephone lines should be down due to raid or sabotage. Should normal relaying of standard broadcasts by telephone network be impossible, radio stations may relay FM transmitted programs in their local vicinity. Being considered too by government officials is plan to use FM-network idea even before emergencies,

thus discouraging telephone wire sabotage in advance.

Since such FM relay stations could also serve as television relay stations, both NBC and CBS this week are placing added emphasis on defense training in the television programs now being ethered in the New York area where already are some 40,000 viewers.

Though official wartime position of both FM and television at week's end were yet undecided from government's point of view, Radio industry leaders, confident that both FM and television would prove important in whatever capacities they were assigned, continued to push plans for expanded technical facilities and expanded program schedules. Radio industry's leaders seldom guess wrong.

Business as Usual

Untold millions of dollars worth of air-time were the great radio networks expanding even at end of war's second week in order to flash news bulletins to listeners as quickly as possible,—and much of this time had been bought and paid for by sponsors,—but sponsors had no regrets.

Rather they had realization that Radio was fulfilling its primary function, a function which no other medium could fulfill, and that it was doing so magnificently. Not a sponsor, not an agency had cancelled one minute of contracted-for air-time. On the contrary, air-time, with "whatever interruptions might be necessary in the public interest" was more in demand than ever before. Sponsors themselves were quick to assure networks that interruptions would not be in any way resented.

Business was pretty much business as usual. War clauses, giving sponsors the right to cancel contracts with big "name" artists, had not been invoked in a single case,—nor was it likely they will be. The Fred Allens, the Jack Bennys, the Bing Crosbys are to remain valuable properties, sponsor-businessmen agreed,—and none would release such property to see it immediately snapped up by a competitor.

Formerly, the slightest short measure in network time was immediately protested. Today, with U. S. people listening to their radios as they've never listened before, the time lost for bulletin announcements only

serves to increase the extent and interest of Radio's audience.

Brilliant is Radio as a vehicle for public service. Unique is Radio as a business,—an enterprise in which its increasing public benefits enable it in giving shorter measure to give still greater value.

Programs of Future?

As yet, broadcasters are concerned with war-time censorship only rather nominally. Some bureaucratic abuses there may be, but Radio knows that Washington must justify itself as the seat of democracy and is likely to be even more sensitive than Radio about excessive restrictions. Thus the censorship to come, such as it will be, might well be predicted from the on-the-spot censorship enforced by Radio itself during the first week of the emergency. A few examples:

On Mutual's Keep 'Em Rolling, Elmer Rice's "Flight to the West" was revised so that the clipper took off from Hongkong, not Lisbon. Lines were interpolated to refer to the Japs and bring the tale of aggression up to date.

Clifton Fadiman revised the speech of Donald Leon Henderson, who hurried back to Washington and could not appear as the "defense personality of the week."

Victor Herbert's "Toyland" was junked as too frivolous and Rise Stevens sang the National Anthem instead.

In Irving Berlin's "Army for the Love of America" on the Treasury hour the lyric was changed to omit U. S. woe for the plight of Czechs, Poles, etc., substituting lines about the Japs. Added too were excerpts from a Winston Churchill speech and a more direct plug for the Red Cross was introduced into another Berlin tune, "Angels of Mercy."

At large and in general, this much was certain about radio programs to come: they would enjoy open season with regard to Japanese villains and villainy; the "other side's" reaction will no longer matter. There is no "other side" after the surprise party at Pearl Harbor except the gnomes from Nippon and their partners.

Path of Sound

Best evidence of opinion in Radio circles that blackouts will be few (—if ever again) is word this week of organization of new company to turn out an improved form of sound-on-film for radio broadcast purposes.

Now in use for recording of programs are two variations of the same basic system: (1) recording on flat discs, (2) recording on tubular discs

24-Hour Duty

The four official radio stations for defense warnings serving the Los Angeles area this week were ordered by the Fourth Interceptor Command and the Federal Communications Commission to go on a 24-hour broadcasting schedule. The four are: KFI, KNX, KHJ and KFAC.

similar to the early Ediphone or current-day Dictaphone discs. Of the two, the latter provide greater tone range, tone fidelity. Such is the system used, for example, by World Wide Transcription Co.

For the new process, called Radiofilm, it is predicted that it will render greater tone fidelity than any ever before possible for radio transcriptions. The sound track on the film, literally describing the path of sound vibrations, is passed before a photoelectric eye and in turn transformed into audible sound by an amplifying system. As the new system goes into use locally Radio Life will keep readers informed on its progress.

Dental Danger

Many protections has modern science provided for modern blackout dwellers, pointed out radiosavant Dr. Orestes Caldwell on his Dec. 19 program,—and many comforts. For comfort during blackouts embattled Americans may now purchase rugs, draperies, table cloths, other articles, impregnated with chemical which gives off consoling glow when struck by invisible rays from an ultra-violet quartz electron tube.

Disconcerting, though, is fact that, with all these marvels, teeth of people in scientificomfortable room will continue to glow—if they are natural teeth. Man-made dentures will preserve their inky anonymity. Perhaps, however, disconcerting glow from nature's handiworks would be mitigated

by cultivating special blackout speaking habits,—lips stiff—to cover teeth utterly . . . ! Or what does science suggest? KFSB, 6:15 p.m. PM.

Jalopies vs. Juveniles

What does a radio author do when confronted with a script impasse? Witness Harlan Ware, creator of "The Bartons." He does no nip-ups, fumes into no frenzy. Quite simply, he dumps the problem directly into laps of his listener-audience.

Written into recent Barton script was episode in which 13-year-old Bud fell heir to an antediluvian automobile. Firmly slotted in Author Ware's mind was decision that Bud was not to keep the car. Violently dislodged was idea when script plans were revealed to Dick Holland, adolescent playing Bud's part. Dubiously mulled Ware: "I may have missed the juvenile viewpoint in denying a 13-year-old permission to own and drive an automobile."

From appealed-to air audience came diversity of opinions. Cautious parents, already brooding over jalopy-juvenile dilemma, counseled strongly against youthful operation of motor vehicles. Suggested was Bud's keeping of the car until old enough to qualify for a regular license, meantime satisfying his mechanical yen by tinkering with "the crate."

From straining-at-leash youngsters emanated proposition that Bud be given student license entitling him to drive car to classes; that Bud be allowed to drive car when accompanied by mother or father.

Entering discussion to date have been municipal traffic judges, child psychologists. Meanwhile relieved of decision burden, Author Ware awaits public's decree, a wise man who senses this responsibility to American youth, defers to society's opinions in charting his script.

And you may not agree with him all the time, which is always a good thing, folks,—but the more you disagree with him the more you'll begin to see how broadminded he is.

You say . . . you say he's like Will was. Well, I guess there ain't none of us but seem to git the same idea in our haid's every once in a while,—gettin' pretty often now, too. And we-all'd like to come right out like and say what we think. But Cal, he don't like that notion. He says he don't think he ought to be compared to such a great man as Will Rogers. And, you know, that's kinda great in a way itself, ain't it? And mebbe if Cal keeps gittin' more and more inside that haid of his and keeps on keepin' it down to size like he does, why mebbe we will be sayin' what we think about him someday . . .

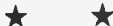

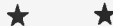
Radio Lifelines

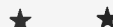

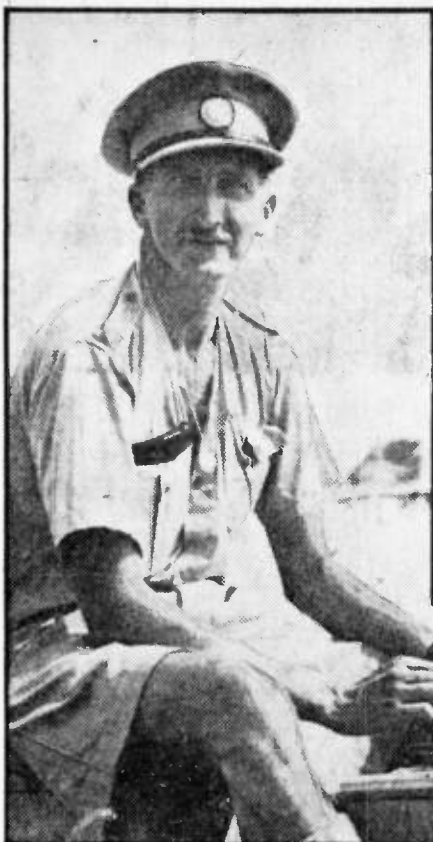

Radio's TWO FRONT WAR EFFORT

The Problem—How to Get the
News—Then How to Tell It

By Mark Franklin II

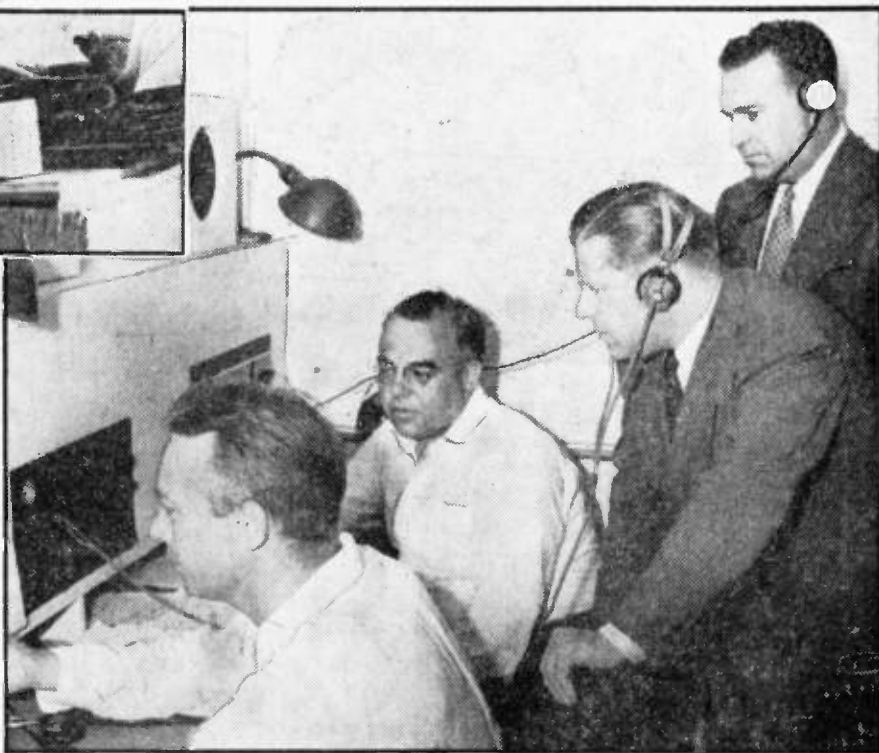


(Mr. Franklin's graphic report of Radio's war-time duties is concluded from last week.—Ed.).

INCREASING the power of the nation's war effort by its brilliant, instantaneous, authentic coverage of the news,—thus adding enormously to national morale,—Radio has two separate fronts on which to fight: the actual war front and the "home front".

In discharge of their duty on the actual war front, Radio's correspondents assume all the risks and dangers of their countrymen in the uniforms of the nation's armed forces. CBS correspondent Cecil Brown was on the ill-fated British dreadnought, Prince of Wales, sunk off Singapore, Tuesday, Dec. 11, and was reported lost, together with his colleague, O'Dowd Gallagher. The cable written by Brown before boarding ship, and received by Columbia in New York Monday morning, was first thought to be his epitaph: "Outowning (out-on-my-own-ing) four days. Swell story." (When the next day Brown and Gallagher were reported among survivors of the sinking, news of their rescue was released in Los Angeles over KNX by none other than their old comrade and fellow-correspondent, Bill Henry).

Whereabouts of Columbia's Far East news chief, William J. Dunn, was still unknown this week. Although his regular post was Manila, he had been making a tour of Rangoon and has not been reported since

being seen there. Nor has fate of W. R. Willis, CBS expert for Tokyo, yet been determined. He was believed on duty at his post at the outbreak of war and at best it is hoped that together with other U. S. newsmen in all Axis countries, he has only been interned for the duration.

But the fight goes on. Hanking for a Far East post and very likely to get one is Leigh White, former Athens, Greece correspondent, now in New York recovering from machine-gun wounds received when a German plane at-

tacked his train during the invasion of Greece. In Honolulu CBS already has Webley Edwards, a veteran of Radio and of life in the Islands since 1927. George Folster will bring news of developments from Sydney, Australia, and NBC's vast staff of correspondents is already on duty in Honolulu, Shanghai, Hongkong, Chungking, Batavia, Singapore, and Sydney.

Within a week or two both networks will probably be staging reg-

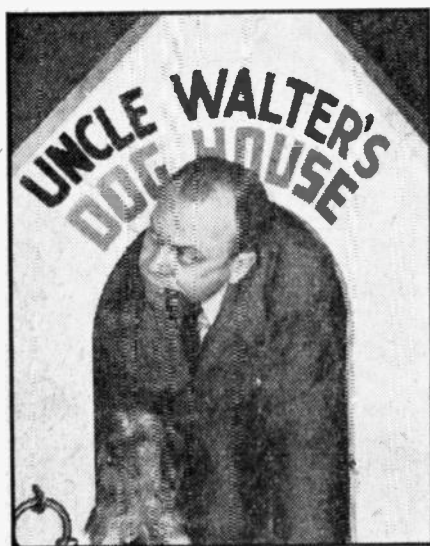

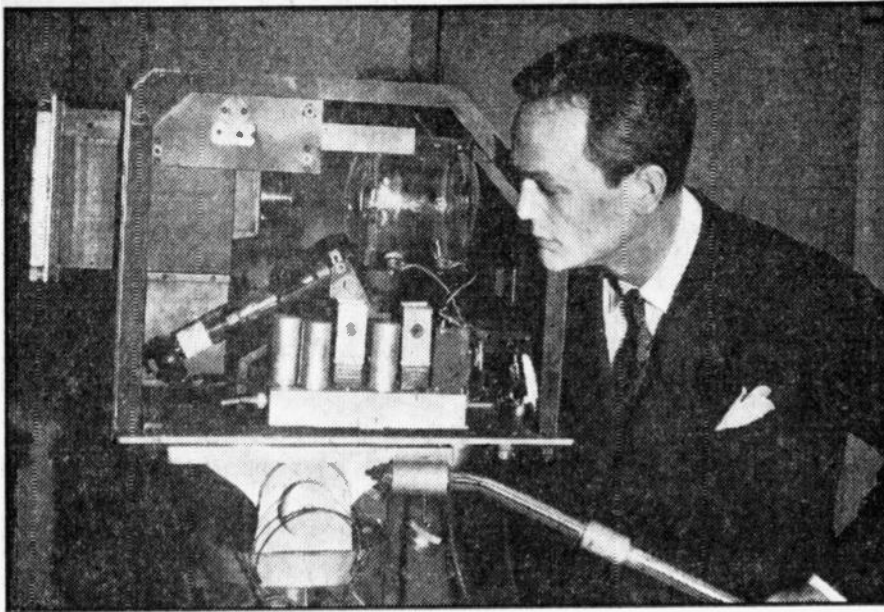

TELEVISION MILESTONE

High above Hollywood, atop 1700-foot Mt. Lee is the first structure in the world erected exclusively for television, and there in its new \$250,000 studio W6XAO, the Don Lee Television Station, and the only one in Western United States, this month observed its tenth birthday.

The entire development is a tribute to the pioneering of its present owner, Thomas S. Lee, and his father, the late Don Lee, who first launched the project under direction of Harry R. Lubcke, 36-year-old wizard of electronics and inventor of several important television patents used by Don Lee and other television companies.

The W6XAO studio is entirely shielded with a blanket of one-ounce copper sheeting, including roof and floor, to prevent outside electrical disturbances and intra-building interferences from "blooming" television images. Combining facilities of an ordinary radio station with those of a theater, the plant is complete with performers' dressing rooms, scenery storage docks, telecasting sound stages, adequately equipped machine shop, and a suite of executive offices.

Its 300-foot steel antennae tower gives W6XAO almost 2000 feet of ver-

tical clearance over Los Angeles. Prior to the war, visitors were conducted on regular tours throughout the entire plant, which includes the Don Lee FM station a few hundred feet away. At present a special police guard surrounds the property and visitors are strictly forbidden.

But, subject to blackout restrictions that might affect any other radio station, telecasting will continue occasionally. In the past, regularly scheduled telecasts have been made of a rodeo at the Coliseum, of the Hollywood Bowl Easter Services, auto racing at the Ascot Speedway, baseball games at Hollywood Park, boxing and wrestling matches from the American Legion Stadium, and a pickup of a motion picture company at work.

In a few months the experimental call letters, W6XAO, will be replaced by permanent ones: KTSL. "K" designates a western station, TSL are the initials of the station's owner, Thomas S. Lee.

War-World On Your Dial

Once again playing their "favorite role" of the self-styled "protectors of the oppressed" the Nippon government, through Radio Tokyo this week, pictured Hongkong's populace as anxiously awaiting deliverance from British rule. Nonchalantly, they told listeners of their "reasonable demands" made to British authorities of Hongkong for surrender to the Japanese. They assured the world that "peace and order" would come at last to the island city. Radio Tokyo deplored the thought of having to resort to "force" to gain control of Hongkong in event British authorities rejected their "reasonable demands." Typical "so sorry!" attitude much in evidence here.

News of "black-outs" and "air-raid alerts" in Los Angeles and at other Pacific Coast cities was eagerly seized upon by Japanese propaganda ministry this week and "blown up" in fashion such as this heard on Radio Tokyo: "Fear and hysteria over possibility of Japanese air raids on West Coast cities gripped the people of the United States this week. All this a result of efforts of the U. S. government officials to produce a feeling of war consciousness." Absurdity of these "groundless fears" is shown in the order issued for a complete "black-out" of the entire state of Rhode Island in the belief that Japanese bombers were over that remote area.

Tokyo further claims "successes in Philippines of our landing parties are 'continuing according to plan.'" This is an old Axis axiom. Radio Tokyo becomes holder—blatantly declares "to date we have destroyed 394 enemy aircraft in the Manila area alone," and continues "but not one American

FOOD FOR AN ARMY

Many things go into the building of an army, even so humble an item as food. In the present crisis many of our civilians have volunteered for military service in whatever capacity they felt they were needed. Since they are doing double duty—their regular jobs and defense work as well—they need plenty of energy to withstand the strenuous requirements of their new life. Food is a source of such energy, and therefore of great importance in the work of our new army.

Our own group, the California State Guard is typical of civilian defense. As their mess sergeant, the food problem is ours, and we have endeavored to do as good a job by them as you have.

An average breakfast consists of fruit juice, bacon or ham and eggs, rolls and coffee. The luncheon is built around one main dish, a vegetable, bread, a fruit, and milk or coffee. Our dinners include meat, which varies from day to day, potatoes, a vegetable, rolls, a dessert, and again milk or coffee.

The selection of the food for these menus depends largely on their vitamin content and nutritive value. The pork is rich in vitamin B. Fresh fruit and vegetables for a health-giving diet has always been stressed. And the milk of course is a food in itself.

THE MAIL BAG

Mrs. M. Coombs of 837 1/2 Waterloo St., Los Angeles, has sent us an interesting recipe for Mock Oysters that we think you will like. It's a good way to disguise your egg-plant.

Dice and soak in salted water a

1 1/2 lb. egg-plant for a half an hour. Then add 1/2 cup finely cut celery and 1/4 of an onion and add to diced egg-plant. Boil all for 15 minutes. Add small can of minced clams, 1 cup of milk, 1/4 cup of rolled soda crackers and 2 tablespoons of butter. Season with a little salt and pepper. Put all in buttered casserole with buttered crumbs and bake 1 hour. In boiling the egg-plant, onion, and celery do not use too much water.

TABLE SUGGESTIONS

If you are doing any entertaining this holiday season, try this for your

table decoration. Place three candles in a straight line down the center of your table. The candle holders should be low so that they can easily be covered. Now place boughs of evergreen around these. If possible the boughs should cover the candle holders, so that the candles look as if they were shooting up from the green boughs. To finish put small bunches of red berries or poinsettias on the boughs. If poinsettias are used, the stems should be cut short allowing just the head of the flower to rest against the evergreen. The color of the candles should match the rest of the centerpiece.

Dinner for Four—Dollar No More

Pea Soup with Bacon
Meat Loaf
Boiled Potatoes

Lettuce with Oil and Lemon
Bread and Butter
Coffee

Recipe for Meat Loaf and Pea Soup

- 1 egg
- 2 tsps. of Gravy Master, salt and pepper
- 2 onions
- 1 lb. of Budget Pack Dry Peas
- 3 slices of Wilson's Ol' Fashund Bacon
- 1 1/2 lbs. of pot roast of beef

First, make the pea soup. Chop 2 slices of Wilson's Ol' Fashund Bacon and put in a soup pot to melt. Then add one onion minced very fine, and saute until the onion gets to a golden color. Now add 1 quart of water, and one pound of Budget Pack Dry Peas. Let come to a boil and reduce fire so as to simmer. Season with 1 tsp. of salt, 1/4 tsp. of pepper and 1 tsp. of Gravy Master. Then let simmer until peas are done.

Now we come to the meat loaf. First mix together 1 1/2 lbs. of chuck beef ground, one egg, and 4 slices of bread soaked in water and squeezed. Then add one onion minced very fine, 1 tsp. of Gravy Master, 1 leveled tsp. of salt, and 1/4 tsp. of pepper. When all mixed, put in a greased baking loaf pan, and bake in an oven of 325 degrees for one hour and fifteen minutes. Serve after the soup.

Recipe for Roast Turkey a la Plymouth Rock

- 1 turkey, 12 lbs. Let butcher prepare for stuffing.
- 1 cup apple juice.
- 2 lbs. chestnuts
- 1 cup cracker crumbs
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 lb. butter
- 1/2 cup heavy cream

Wash turkey inside and out. Shell the chestnuts and boil them until tender; then skin them, and pass them through a strainer. Mix cracker crumbs, 1/4 tsp. pepper and 1 tsp. salt, then mix with 1/4 lb. of butter and the cream. Sew the incision and put the bird in a baking pan with breast up. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and baste with some apple juice and melted butter mixed. Put to bake at 350 degrees F. for 22 minutes to the lb. and baste all the time with the warm apple juice and butter. Thirty minutes before done, turn breast on the bottom of the pan and let bake for the rest of the time.

PUTS RELIGION ON THE AIR

It is said civilization follows the fields pioneered by religious enterprise. The first recorded words of the telegraph, a sister of radio, were "What hath God wrought."

Aimee Semple McPherson, recognized today as the world's greatest exponent of full-gospel religion, is one of the oldest of broadcasters. In 1923 Angelus Temple, with its 5,300 seats, became too small for the crowds attending. Even today thousands are turned away from its seven separate great auditoriums at many services.

Foreseeing this, Aimee Semple McPherson began planning to tell her message to the world by radio. In 1923 there were just two stations in Los Angeles, the entire industry being in its infancy. On February 2, 1924, KFSG, the "Foursquare Gospel" station, was opened. From that day it has never ceased to spread the message of full gospel religion, and today the International Foursquare Church has over 400 branches across the United States and Canada and 265 stations in thirteen foreign lands.

Many of the pastors of these works follow the footsteps of their leader, and they too put their religious endeavors on the air. Throughout America over fifty Foursquare ministers stand daily before the "mike" and tell the Gospel to waiting thousands. In California alone there are twenty

ministers with regularly scheduled broadcasts, emanating either from some studio or directly from their churches by the use of remote control. Many of these programs available to Los Angeles listeners are noted on the opposite page.

This entire radio work is carried on without resort to commercial advertising. KFSG, now broadcasting at 1150 kilocycles with 1,000 watts at night and 2,500 watts in the daytime, is supported entirely by gifts of people who are enthusiastic over telling the Gospel in the quickest manner possible to the greatest number of people.

Despite its religious aspect, the radio activity as organized by Aimee Semple McPherson, is as diversified as that of any secular or business broadcast. The sermons of Angelus Temple, preached by leading evangelists and ministers, form but a part of the actual program schedule—about one-third in all.

Realizing that music is the universal language and that hymns are the same in any language, the best of religious music is presented on the broadcasts. The Angelus Temple Choir, under the direction of the Temple Organist, Esther Fricke Stuart, ranks with any other volunteer singing group in the world. It is heard both during services and in broad-

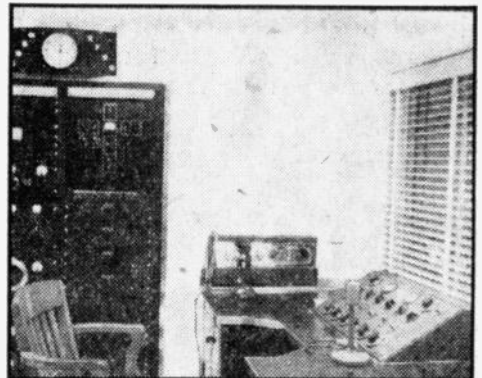
casts of its own. The 45-piece Angelus Temple Silver Band, under the well-known conductor, James Gustave Boersma, also plays for services and on its own radio time.

The Angelus Temple Symphony and Opera Orchestra, fully augmented, shares broadcast time with the Band during services, taking a prominent part in many of the Gospel services. Its range of programs covers the repertoire of better music, both of the masters and contemporary.

The ever popular drama, a favorite to young and old alike, is not forgotten, as Robert L. Bice and many others regularly schedule plays, both spiritual and secular, in light or more serious fashion over the air.

Various other programs—organ programs, string ensembles, Hawaiian groups, poets and music, choirs, glee clubs, negro spirituals, and the trans-

ularly scheduled two and three-way hookups in which commentators in every corner of the globe may compare notes and exchange information on the happenings of the past hour—for U. S. listeners to hear.

The quality,—the ability and integrity, of the men serving the nation by Radio is usually glossed over and taken for granted by the public. Men like Cecil Brown, however, who came so close to being lost, are few and far between,—hard to find, trained only after years of service, and hard to replace. Thirty three, a graduate of Ohio State University, Brown first went to Europe for International News Service, later resigning to take over a CBS post in Rome and was subsequently expelled by the Fascists. He covered the Nazi invasion of Greece and Yugoslavia, and was attached to the British Near East Forces, with headquarters in Cairo, during the early Syrian campaigns. He had only recently been transferred to Singapore.

Getting correspondents to the scenes of action when the action is taking place is one-half the result of elaborate planning by such master-organizers of news coverage as NBC's A. A. Schechter, chief of all NBC news reporting

operations, and one-half the result of sheer pluck and ingenuity on the part of the correspondent himself. Assigned to a given post, if the news is breaking elsewhere and not otherwise being covered, it's up to the correspondent to get to the scene of action as quickly as he can, and any way he can, in an army truck or on horseback. With the whole world now the theater of action, less emphasis is being placed on instructions from New York and more latitude being given to the men actually in the field.

Linking Radio from the war front

to the home front are NBC's and CBS's Far East Listening Posts, both located in the Los Angeles area. Here, at super-powerful receivers which can pick up broadcasts originating in any part of the vast, sprawling Asiatic world, experts in all of the polyglot languages and dialects of the Far East note everything that is said throughout the 24-hour day.

These reports are put to two different uses. Reports of news are broadcast over the networks and also made available to the three great newspaper wire syndicates. But reports of a strictly propagandist nature from dictator nations are carefully assembled and ultimately find their way to key government officials in Washington. Propaganda transcripts from

NBC's European monitoring post in Long Island, N. Y., now represent some fifty mimeographed pages daily.

Both CBS and NBC Listening Posts use the world-wide RCA Communications System, which has increased the capacity of all transmitters in order to take care of the new added requirements of war-time communications.

On the home front, Radio's problem is to serve the best public interest so capably that government censorship will be held to a minimum. Already Radio's self-imposed censorship has forbidden hysteria, mention of unconfirmed reports, and free-and-easy opinionating, and it is planned to al-

low Radio ample time in which to organize its own system of checks and balances before any possible government control might be imperative.

Actual control of Radio is already in the hands of the U. S. Army to this extent, however, that the highest ranking officer in each of the nation's four air defense districts has com-

plete authority to order all stations silent in case of emergency.

Too, all war information is being released directly from the White House and both army and navy press sections are under orders to give out nothing concerning operations, casualties, or damage.

With the White House already established as a central clearance bureau for all military news, reports were current in Washington this week that the Army and Navy Departments were particu-

larly against allowing network broadcasts from the scenes of action without prior approval by themselves. As the situation stands today, the Federal Communications Commission, much more sympathetic to Radio than any other Federal agency, appears to be fighting the Army and Navy's demand for prior clearance rights. How long they can maintain their position, however, should the Army and Navy per-

Throughout the "undeclared war" of China, Radio Tokyo has never mentioned their casualties — Japanese Army is apparently composed of legions of "Invulnerables" identical to

comic strip "box office" favorite Superman. Japanese now engaging United States and Britain are of same caliber. Suggestion to Adolf: "You should import a few of these Asiatic 'supermen' to save shattered Nazis now running before the 'mad Red Russians'."

Anent Axis debacle in Libya: "London calling" covers great British victories in North Africa in briefly worded news items simply reporting that "British continue steady advance with retreating Nazis carrying out a 'rear guard' action."

Rome's ONCE "mighty (?) midnite voice" is feeble in efforts to "work up"

anything of comfort to say for a NOW really "ILL Duce." Most "thunder" from Rome now is confined to editorials of Guida in "Popolo di Italia." No "R. I. P." (Rest in Peace) for Italy, but rather "Ruin in Progress."
