Unimpeachable sources known only to me indicate that this is the end of 1941 and the beginning of another year. This is unconfirmed but I have every reason to believe it is so.

The past twelve months have been the most interesting in the entire history of radio, both from a technical, as well as popular viewpoint. There have been many changes, innovations, and major developments in the industry itself. And from the listeners' viewpoint it has been the most generous year of all.

We have seen a united radio industry bring about the fall of the ASCAP monopoly; we have seen considerable activity on the part of the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, activity which has definitely changed the broadcasting picture; We have seen new stars born and old ones die. And we have seen the largest listening audience in history, . . . 70-million people, grouped around loudspeakers for a single broadcast! . . . the President's request for a Declaration of War against Japan.

Up to this point, radio has successfully entered its first war; a war that is bound to bring about many changes in the broadcasting industry itself. No one knows just what these developments will be, but I look forward to many major ones.

For example, it is now possible for a radio transmitter such as that of KFI or KNX or most of the others, to transmit a very low tone that will not pass through the average home receiver. This low tone is capable of throwing switches in industry, in the home or any place where an electric motor is available. One of the contemplated uses for this new broadcasting development is in the turning off of electric billboard signs. For example, at the beginning of an urgent blackout, a station can broadcast this low frequency tone which would throw a switch on every electric billboard in town and automatically turn them off. At the lifting of the blackout, the same tone which switched them off would turn them on again.

The science of radio is barely in the swaddling stage. Engineers are only

scratching the surface of the possibilities of wireless. In the not-too-distant future it is possible that radio waves may be used to great advantage in medicine, in chemistry, in physics and other forms of applied science. It may be used in industry, commerce and modern warfare; radio waves now principally used in a commercial sense to bring entertainment to millions, in all probability will eventually turn out to be carriers of a variety of forms of life to hundreds of thousands of us.

Various forms of sound waves, and rays, that we know now are grouped together in a space three inches in length on the spectrum or wave band. This includes cosmic rays, X-rays, television, broadcasting, F. M. short wave, speech and light. All these, remember, fill a space only three inches long. Science has reason to believe that the actual length of this potential wave band is something over 900 miles.

Think what marvels may lie undiscovered in the 800-odd miles remaining!

Re-broadcasts Going?

With local listeners keen to seize on signs which may indicate broadcasting conditions of the future, the change of policy this week by which March of Time was to clear the whole country simultaneously instead of presenting a delayed re-broadcast for the West Coast provokes a significant query. Local listeners were to hear the show at 5:00 p.m. PST, which is 8:00 p.m. EST, when the show originated for eastern audiences.

Since a Radio blackout is extremely unlikely in late afternoon, March of Time will be certain to have some sure audience on the West Coast under its new arrangement, even though a late afternoon audience will be much smaller than the evening audience it had formerly with its re-broadcast. But the argument behind the change is that it is better to have some small but certain audience than none at all, which would be the case in a blackout at night-time.

Virtually every top show in Radio has at one time used or is now using either the delayed transcription idea or the re-broadcast idea. This week several sponsors and agencies were considering following March of Time's precedent. Should such a general movement occur toward simultaneous cross-country scheduling, this would be the first drastic readjustment of commercial broadcasting to result from America's participation in the War.

Biggest Audience

Radio listeners don't need to be told this program or that program is a big thing. They sense it for themselves. When they hear a show like the recent Bill of Rights program, they know they've been doing some important listening.

Strictly on the statistical side, then, but interesting, is the fact that the Bill of Rights opus happened to break all audience records for shows using regular radio technique, that is, shows other than a speech by a President of the U. S., etc. Even at that, the show nearly equalled the President's audience for his War message to Congress. F.D.R.'s Crossley rating was 67%, the Bill of Rights Crossley was 63.3%.

Signs of the Times

With some considerable head start over U. S. Radio in the matter of educational programs for civilian defense, recent announcement by the British Broadcasting Company that it will make such programs available gratis to U. S. stations as a public service

comes as a not unexpected, still gracious gesture.

The real fun, however, will come in Americans' reactions to the staid, formal, sometimes almost drowsy English manner of describing matters of the utmost urgency and gravest consequence.

The bland composure with which British fighting men take the field of battle bears no comparison to the rooting-section antics of U. S. fighting men at their job. Nor does typical British frozen-facedness bear the remotest resemblance to the U. S. public's resultful way of getting steamed up into action.

At best, the release in America of the British programs on Air Raid Precautions, etc., will create a new respect in the Home of the Brave for their Anglo-Saxon cousins' courage and sagacity, a rather much-needed amelioration at present date. As to actual effectiveness of the programs, however, little can be expected. More likely, after a short trial, U. S. an-

nouncers will get into the driver's seat and "put the stuff over" with U. S. version of importance of events in order to rouse U. S. audiences to the all-important precautions.

Hooray for Radio

Great fear and mighty reverence does the Office of Production Management and its power of priorities inspire in every citizen and every non-armament industry in the land. This week, however, comes revelation there's to be one industry in which the OPM will inspire little beyond lip-service.

From Washington it is announced that the materials needs of the Radio Industry are to be prescribed in an "advisory" capacity to the OPM by none other than Radio's own Brain Trust, the Defense Communications Board.

Actually, the situation will amount to nothing less than a system of duly giving the Radio Industry all the materials it may need for whatever ex-

pansion of facilities may be necessary in the interests of public information. Becoming a favored child of the OPM is no mean achievement these days; let's Radio and radio-listeners congratulate each other.

First Casualty

Tea comes from India, at least it used to. But since War has come to the Pacific, by way of which tea used to come from India, chances are that tea is something of which there's going to be a shortage.

Anyway, such are the sentiments of the Lipton Tea Company and their sentiments count because they used to sponsor the Helen Hayes Theater.

Effective Dec. 28, the Helen Hayes Theater went off the air, cancelled off by its shortage-anxious sponsor, becoming the first Radio casualty of the war.

Sidelights: Miss Hayes' option, renewed for 13 weeks just before the Japanese attack, included a war-cancellation clause, just as did Lipton's pact with CBS, and so it is cancelled too. At press-time however, it was rumored but not confirmed that Lipton's might decide to use the can-

celled periods for newscasts. If they decided not to, CBS would have the privilege of selling the periods to another sponsor, which it would have no difficulty doing.

Meanwhile, Lipton's other CBS program, "Bright Horizon", will continue to be heard, but only for Lipton's products other than tea.

Immortality Note

Of sanguine and confraternal inter-

est to wives of non-travelling, non-correspondent husbands is the cable received this week by Mrs. Cecil Brown, who lives in New York City, from Mr. Cecil Brown, who now lives in Singapore:

Unworried, Mrs. Brown reflects, with some plausibility, that Cecil will always take care of himself. He is, she avers, a hardy soul.

Not Smaller

Possible future shortage of paper is interesting to Radio-addicts because should the same shortage occur here as did in Britain (where newspapers have been reduced in size by 50 to 75%) added emphasis would be placed on Radio newscasting. Actually, in the U. S. the shortage would not be in paper itself but in transportation facilities for distributing it throughout the nation and in the chemicals used in treating and bleaching it.

Scared, then, were newspapermen, when the steamer "Rosebank," carrying a cargo of newsprint to the West Coast, was given up as lost last week, —though she turned up in L. A. a few days later. Already, too newsprint manufacturers have felt the pinch of shortages in bleaching chemicals.

Most immediate likelihood, however, is that Radio will continue to do its usual great job of news dissemination and that newspapers, though they may not shrink in size, may be darker gray in color than now, correspondingly more difficult to read. What transportation shortages may occur, with corresponding reductions in the size of newspapers, only the future fortunes of War will determine.

Cornish Carols

To Americans, accustomed to hearing their Christmas songs carolled from oak-panelled choir lofts or carilloned from cloud-piercing spires, CBS' Death Valley Days program on Christmas night was unprecedented. From deep within the earth's bowels rang out chants from the lusty throats of Cornish miners, grouped in a shaft 2000 feet down in Grass Valley mine, Grass Valley, Calif.

A bit of California history, nosed out from gold rush days, made the broadcast more significant. In 1851, two years after gold's discovery at Sutter's Fort, placer mining was the accepted mode of extracting the precious

metal from the ground. That year, a colony of immigrants from Cornwall, England, initiated the practice of Mother Lode mining. Most of the Grass Valley inhabitants are descendants of these pioneers.

In Cornwall it is a Christmas tradition for the miners going off duty to begin singing Yule carols in the shafts. As they come to the surface, their voices gain momentum, their spirits rise, and they sing as they tramp homeward.

Transplanting this custom, the California Cornish miners formed their choral group in 1876. The men chanting on Christmas night, 1941, throatied their traditional airs with inborn vigor; their melodies had a fresh appeal, as the Cornish carols are unpublished gems, reverently bequeathed from father to son.

For the Boys

War's exigencies have wrought modifications in countless radio programs, but there's one, "Tonight's Best Buys," which was metamorphosed over night—from one trying to get rid of things—into one imploring articles.

For three years, "Tonight's Best Buys" has gone on the air twice a week to advertise "for sale" items which listeners called in to CBS. During the 15 minutes Johnnie Nelson rattled off buys at the microphone, six telephone girls worked at fever pitch to tabulate incoming buys. Advertised for sale was everything from a Canadian Island and a million dollars worth of airplane plans to a carton of white rats.

War has changed all this. Cooperating with the U. S. O. and Citizens Committee for the Army and Navy and in complete cooperation with his Folger Coffee sponsor, Nelson is now asking for things for "the boys." After the second appeal, Lyons Van and Storage Company, volunteering pick-up service, delivered to camps 25 pianos, two truckloads of books, and nine additional truckloads of lamps, musical instruments, rugs, and radios. Donations included a \$410 spinet piano, (used only two months) easy chairs, fancy book-ends, and radios running the gamut from crystal sets to newest portables. Recent requests are for slot machines and pin ball games.

Nelson, broadcasting a solicitation for Christmas gifts for service men, asked for anything that would bring a smile. Enough shaving kits to line Hollywood boulevard and thousands of cartons of cigarettes were the answers.

On two other shows, "What's On Your Mind" and "Breakfast at Sardi's", Nelson engaged Lola Lane to ask for sweaters for the boys. Seventy-six thousand came in. Emcee Tom Brene-

Meet Radio's Newest Top Funstress, Also 'Found by Vallee'

FOR 22 of her rubber-legged, posterior-sprawling 28½ years Joan Davis has been diligently proving that one of the rosier paths to success is to take bumps, shoves, pushes, blows, etc., sitting down. She's been spilling into gangling and sedentary floorings since she was the "Toy Comedienne" on the stage at six. She's been doing a terpsichorean "tank" in the movies since she made her first hill-billy short for Mack Sennett in 1936. But, hang on to your hats, folks, now she's doing it—believe it or not—in Radio, and the gal's terrific.

Two months ago Rudy Vallee, yclept the Ziegfeld and Barnum of Radio, and certainly one of the most prolific discoverers of talent in any branch of show business, discovered that Joan Davis was not only funny when she took her customary nose-dive—she was even funnier when she wondered out loud what was going to happen next. Precisely therein lies the tale, Red Skelton excepted, of the most unusual comedy discovery in Radio this season. And it was Rudy Vallee who made it.

To bear out Rudy's status as a talent snooper-outer and to heap laurels with even more lavish hand on his classic cranium for finding Joan Davis for Radio, it should be here stated and deposed that it was Rudy who



first brought radio audiences such contemporary greats as Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou, Joe Penner, Alice Faye, Bob Burns, and Frances Langford. Among the stars of the entertainment firmament whose brilliance was first disseminated ether-wise under the Vallee sponsorship are such as Grace Moore, Katherine Hepburn, Helen Hayes, Fannie Brice, Lou Holtz, Robert Montgomery, Frank Fay, Joe Cook, Victor Moore, Walter O'Keefe and as many others. As a talent scout, Rudy lost his amateur status even before he abandoned his little megaphone.

Offstage, standing, serious, in real life, Joan is married to Serenus (Si) Wills, with whom she toured vaudeville as the comedy team of Wills and Davis, and has a daughter, Beverly, born August 5, 1933. Joan's advent in Hollywood came only when the Wills and Davis team had reached the top in vaudeville, and were looking for new fields to conquer.

HOUR OF

Emerging After Difficult Hours
—Radio's All-Girl Orchestra

By Evelyn Bigsby

S EVEN years ago a young woman stood on the stage at Carnegie Hall, New York City. With violin nestled under a curvaceous chin, she fingered facilely through an intricate passage. Down in the audience, captivated by the violinist's skill and charm, sat a well-known young orchestra conductor, Phil Spitalny. Nor did he fail to appraise the ovation which followed the final draw of bow over strings.

Literally "born on wings of music" was Spitalny's idea: if one talented young woman can be such a sensation, why not organize two dozen like her into an all-girl orchestra?

"It can't be done", wet-blanketed Spitalny's friends. "Girls are too temperamental, and besides, where can you find the kind you want?"

Time has shown the foreboders were wrong about the temperament. But in a few weeks Spitalny began to believe they were right about discovering musicians. In enthusiasm for the venture, Phil had disbanded his male orchestra

"Evelyn and the magic violin," left, are high spots for Hour of Charm listeners. Evelyn is second in control to the maestro and makes all important musical arrangements for the orchestra. Playing since she was seven, she has been heaped with medals, scholarships, and first prizes; has appeared many times in recital at Town Hall and Carnegie Hall. Her instrument, a rare Berganzi (1756), was an award of honor from the National Arts Society.



Blonde, statuesque Vivien, right, is recognized by her bell-toned soprano voice which ranges from low F to F above high C. She's from Fresno, attended Pomona College, achieving national favor when she emerged winner in a West Coast radio audition contest. Her heart's desire is to become an internationally famous concert songbird.

Newest member of the all-girl orchestra is vivacious Maxine, far right, Indianapolis contralto and former Butler University co-ed. She won her place in the group by popular acclaim when Spitalny conducted a series of auditions to determine the successor to the original singer of same name.

and launched the task of auditioning girl singers and musicians in New York.

Months passed and Spitalny hadn't signed a single member. "The girls I listened to had absolutely nothing to offer as musicians. They were average, but to build the band, I wanted exceptional talent—talent that could successfully vie with male orchestras on even terms."

At a concert given by Julliard School of Music, Spitalny found Evelyn Kaye, brilliant violinist. He signed her as concert-mistress of an orchestra that still didn't exist. Together they auditioned thousands of applicants. Not a one was signed.

Phil tried Detroit, Chicago, and Cleveland with the same disappointing results. To the rescue came his mother with a different suggestion. "Why not try out some of the small communities? The girls there often have more leisure in which to practice."

That was the secret! Spitalny made the rounds of midwest towns, attending school concerts, plays, band concerts. He found a qualified girl in Wellington, Ohio, two more in Scranton, Pa.; on and on he traveled to 2100 communities. Scores of auditions were given. Finally the dream orchestra took shape. He had an all-girl aggregation of 22 pieces.

Followed three weary months of rehearsals. But they were easy work compared with the charge of coaxing some bookings. Finally the orchestra was billed for one week at New York's Strand Theatre. The girls were an instantaneous hit and were held over for three additional weeks.

A typical Spitalny bluff landed the orchestra a radio sponsor. A year after the New York success, he arranged a blind radio audition which was piped into New York from Indianapolis. The prospective sponsor had no way of knowing that the musicians were feminine.

He liked the show immensely, but when sex of the musicians was divulged, the sponsor faltered. He took a gamble and signed for 13 weeks. That was five years ago. General

Chosen as America's outstanding co-ed singer by the Hour of Charm program was Dorothy McVitty, who competed with nine others for the coveted \$4,000 music fellowship. Dorothy is 20, lives on a farm at West Jefferson, Ohio, and commutes daily to Ohio State.



Electric hasn't regretted taking a chance on the "Hour of Charm."

The group now comprises 27 superbly trained girls, half of whom are charter members of the original radio orchestra. There are brunettes, blondes, a redhead or two. Their average age is 21. Each girl sings and plays more than one instrument. Individually they practice three hours

daily; collectively they assemble twice weekly for about eight hours. They govern themselves, making their own disciplinary rules and levying fines for infractions.

With harp, bass fiddle, and fluffy evening gowns the orchestra travels thousands of miles every year. During 1941 it visited training camps and

Through "Radio Saigon" in Nippon-controlled French Indo-China came this "top" news flash on final outcome of heroic defense of tiny isle by gallant U. S. Marines. Domei news agency (Japanese) ADMITS exceptional heroism and bravery of U. S. defenders. Further acknowledges loss of TWO Japanese destroyers in the mid-Pacific battle.

Tokyo, (through "Radio Saigon") comments on victory thus: "Capture of Wake is a '3 Point Victory for Japan"—1. Wake capture breaks an important "key link" in America's Pacific defenses. 2. Again demonstrates Japanese aerial and naval supremacy in Pacific war. 3. And most important—gives the world conclusive proof that Japan is able to back up words or claims with deeds in her avowed intention to create "New co-prosperity sphere in greater East Asia."

Under Japanese control "Radio Saigon" has had no change in station personnel—lady announcer still reads the news—station reports news, (whether pro-Axis or not) most impartially. Even those items with a Vichy date-line have the same impartial tone. Dial for "Radio Saigon" with English news at 7:45 a.m. on 11.77 Mc.

"Speeches of Roosevelt and Churchill from Washington a few days ago revealed nothing new — significant however was absence of vow usually heard in such speeches: 'we will achieve complete destruction of the Axis nations.' The two Dictators confined their appeals to 'the defense of their homelands.'" In these words a "staff commentator" of the Rome Radio "commented" on news from U. S. capital. Continuing, "American people are peace-loving, but Dictator Roosevelt—NO! Churchill is in Washington on his knees, seeking vitally needed U. S. aid if Britain is to hold her Pacific possessions. Dictator Churchill's desire for a few square miles of sand in Libya led him to concentrate his military forces in the Middle East—result: army in Borneo and Malaya is inadequate to meet the force of the new enemy, Japan. Churchill, ever an optimist, is now as always a COMPLETE IGNORAMUS."

Tommy Dorsey, that "Sentimental Gentleman of Swing," having a triumphant return engagement at the Palladium, following the closing of Stan Kenton, the lad who's destined to "go" places in the land of swing. . . . Eddie Dowling, director and master-of-ceremonies of the We, The People airliner, has appointed Dave Levy, his radio producer, as first assistant in charge of radio for the USO Camp Shows, Inc. Dowling is president of Camp Shows. . . . Ever stopped to think how many famous radio personalities you never hear on the airlines? There's: Ed Gardner's "Duffy," Bob Hope's "Yehudi," Portland Hoffa's "Mahma," Gracie Allen's "Poppa," Private Homer Stubbs' "Dear Mom," and quite a few others. . . . It might be an idea to put a "male" into the now all female staff at Mutual's local publicity dept. . . . Quiz Kids are due to originate their airliner here for several weeks this month while making a series of shorts for Paramount. . . . Kraft Music Hall has bolstered its personnel with the addition of Victor Borge, Danish pianist-comedian, who has been signed to a five-year contract.

SLOW DOWN BUD: Al Span, producer of the Hi Neighbor airliner, has evolved his own system for slowing down his star—Jackie Gleason. Gleason, noted New York night club entertainer and film actor (?), has a tendency to speed up his lines as he goes along in the broadcast. Span from his post in the control room, has a series of huge placards with which he can signal to the stage. The first reads, "slow." The second, "slower." The third, "much slower." Fourth and final card carries, in letters six inches high, the suggestion—"Much, Much, Much Slower."

ATTENTION, HUMANE SOCIETY—A family of Eskimos who were "living" at a Chicago Department Store during the holidays, sent a wire to Jack Benny, beseeching Jack to part with his polar bear, "Carmichael," and send him to Chicago as a free "potlatch" for the northerners. "Potlatch," in Eskimo talk, is a feast. The wire was signed by Chief Tonn-Gla-Daudloon which translated, means "Cries for Polar Bear."

No doubt all you Californians, native daughters and otherwise, know of Death Valley Scotty. Here's an old story on our friend and one we think you will appreciate. It seems that when this favorite son of the Old West arrived for the first time in New York, he headed straight for the finest restaurant in the city. The maitre d'hotel was duly impressed with the gold Scotty tossed around. By way of accommodation he suggested for his dinner a menu fit for royalty. When he finished, Scotty "allowed it sounded right purty, but them 'a la' things had him a bit tangled so he guessed he'd take twenty dollars worth of ham and eggs and a piece of pie!"

True? Why certainly. We knew the man who knew the man who saw it—or maybe he just heard it from another man.

FOOD WASTE

And now let's be serious for a minute. Everybody is talking about patriotism, Americanism and the like. We all want to do our bit. But sometimes in looking at the greater things we forget the little thing that's important too—really important!

Food waste is just such a thing. First of all, American housewives are to be complimented on not stampeding the markets to hoard extra stores of food. That would be foolish and unnecessary. It would make a hardship for everyone. But on the other hand what about the food that is wasted at every meal—those odds and ends that are perfectly good, and yet are almost invariably thrown away?

Here are a few suggestions:

You can use those extra pieces of bread that aren't fresh enough to serve in a bread pudding.

Those beet tops and lettuce leaves will make a nice soup if you add a little chopped up garlic, a little seasoning, and some oil or butter.

And that good old American standby—hash. It can be made of almost anything. The meat left over from last night's dinner, a can of corn, a few tomatoes and some bread crumbs. Add a bit of seasoning to that and you have a really wonderful dish.

All it takes is a little imagination

and your own good will to start a successful campaign against food waste. Remember, in even so slight a thing, a nation depends on you.

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

The potato is America's own gift to Europe. They were first discovered in Peru by the Spanish, who called them "papas." A monk belonging to this particular party of conquistadores took the vegetable back with him to his people.

Later, Sir Walter Raleigh found a kind of yam in the American South which he carried home to his estate in England. His countrymen of that period held it in high regard both as a medicine and a love charm.

A CONSUMER CLUB SUGGESTION

One of our members, Miss Grace Bancroft, sends in a recipe for Imitation Preserved Ginger. Since ginger is difficult to get now, it will solve a shortage problem for your pantry.

Peel 3 lbs. of banana squash, remove seeds, and cut into pieces about 1 inch thick and 2 inches long.

Grate the rinds of 6 lemons, add the juice of two more, 3 lbs. of white sugar, 1 ounce of ground ginger. Then boil until clear, or for about one hour.

Garnish also with a couple of Rissolee potatoes. Serve Mushroom sauce separate, being sure that it is hot, and pour on the tenderloin if desired.

Dinner for Four—A Dollar, No More

- Endive Salad with Oil and Lemon Dressing
- Baked Macaroni with Meat and Cheese
- Fried Eggplant

- Butterscotch Pudding for Dessert

Baked Macaroni with Meat and Cheese

- 1 No. 2 1/2 can of solid pack tomatoes
- 2 slices of Wilson's Oil' Fashund Bacon
- 1 lb. of chuck beef meat
- 1 lb. of elbow macaroni
- 2 onions
- 2 tsps. of Gravy Master
- Salt and pepper
- 1/4 lb. of American cheese

Grind 1 lb. of beef and braize with 2 slices of Wilson's Oil' Fashund Bacon chopped up. Now mince 2 small onions and braize with the meat and bacon. As soon as the meat and onions get brown, open a No. 2 1/2 can of solid pack tomatoes. Pour the tomatoes in the pot and cook with the meat. Now season with 2 tsps. of Gravy Master, 2 tsps. of salt, and 1/4 tsp. of pepper. Let simmer for one-half hour. While simmering, boil in two qts. of salt water 1 lb. of elbow macaroni until tender. Next, drain and place the macaroni in casserole. Then pour 1/2 of the sauce with meat and mix well. Now pour the rest of the sauce and meat to cover the top. Finally, sprinkle 1/4 lb. of grated American Cheese on top. The last touch is to cover the casserole and bake at 325 degrees for thirty minutes.

boasted for weeks of the "great victory" in the occupation of British Somaliland shortly after Italy's entrance into the conflict. Actually the evacuation, (a clever bit of British military strategy), became finally a "spring-board" for General Wavell's sweep which stripped Axis Italy of her African colonies.

Claim that General Wavell said Libya would be conquered "in a few days", is obviously the "straw" Italy is grabbing frantically in attempt to "cover" complete collapse of Axis forces defending Libya. Strong (?) resistance and bravery of Italians is hailed as actually contributing to British reverses in Borneo, Malaya, and Burma.

Final "pealing" from Rome's "common tater" (commentator) was this: "Radio Moscow's pious reference to 'Peace on Earth, good-will toward men' is ironical, coming from a Godless nation where Stalin has had 12 MILLION Christians executed. If we next hear of him sending messages of greeting to the Archbishop of Canterbury that will still not restore life to the 12 MILLION slain Christians," Radio Rome concluded. Be that as it may we still prefer "Joe of the Kremlin" to ILL Duce, for at least Joe studied to be a priest in the Greek Catholic Church when a boy, whereas "ILL Duce" believes in NO GOD AT ALL and is the author of one of the most blasphemous papers on atheism ever written. tentions are sought not only by "Vagabond Lover" Vallee but also by his fire-breathing rival, "Great Profile" John Barrymore, recently returned to the show after a serious intestinal illness to give the best performances of his career.

"That man," gasped Rudy after John's first return performance, "is astounding!" After the show, John was returned to the hospital via wheel-chair for another week's treatment.

Now a comedy star, Barrymore's first crashing of Radio was by way of a "Streamlined Shakespeare" series back in 1937. Publicity released heralding his acquisition for the Vallee show facetiously dubbed him "a youngster with a distinct flair for comedy and an ideal radio voice." Actually, "young Johnny" Barrymore has done so many things in so many fields of entertainment, nothing he does is any longer surprising. He always gives an excellent performance; it's all that counts with his audience, and it's all that counts with John.

Known as one of the most incorrigible ad libbers in Radio, John is also an authority on how to keep other ad libbers in line with the script. Discussing with writer-producer Dick Mack a guest

comedian about to go on the air, John remarked casually:

"I," he admitted, "am a heckuva guy to be saying that about anyone else. But," he continued sagely, "if you really want to keep him from ad libbing, just tell him Barrymore can't be trusted. He'll watch me and forget to ad lib."

Producer Mack tried John's advice. It worked. The guest star tried so hard to keep John from making a break he forgot to make one himself.

Since that time, Mack has been trying to use the same treatment on John but so far no one has been able to fool him. Now that Joan Davis has become a regular on the show, the challenge is squarely up to her. If you should notice John sticking pretty close to the script in the next thirteen weeks you'll know that it's because Joan has scared him into it. And you'll also know that the advice originated with John himself!
