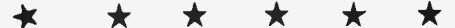
Thanks for the picture of Bill Davidson of KHJ's "Music Depreciation" and "Rise and Shine"—see—that's what I mean!

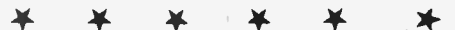

The Radio Week

Significant developments by radio as an industry and through its personnel were in evidence last week as the first attack by an enemy power on continental U. S. was carried out off the shore of Santa Barbara where a submarine emerged to lob shells at an oil refinery.

Summarized, they were:

1) Baby chain of the major networks, the new Blue Net, hustled its special events director, moustached, debonair Cleve Roberts to the edge of precipitous cliffs overlooking the scene of action at Santa Barbara to provide listeners with the first eyewitness accounts of the shelling of coastline oil properties by a hostile seacraft. Transcription of Roberts' "in person" description of the damage which he described as "extremely slight" and his interviews of Santa Barbarans who were "amazingly calm" was played coast to coast the following morning.

2) KHJ-Mutual's newscaster John B. Hughes fired a verbal, critical broadside on his coast-to-coast airing of "News and Views" Feb. 25 following Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox's statement that "the air raid alarm over Los Angeles Tuesday night was a false alarm." Hughes pulled no punches in reprimanding Knox for his poo-pooing of the Southern California air raid alarm. Said he: "The Army said 'unidentified aircraft were reported' and we who saw the object in the sky and experienced the barrage of fire are taking the Army's word for it."

3) Ben Gage, Bob Hope's announcer (NBC-KFI), and Frank Goss, mike-man on Mary Astor's Hollywood Showcase (CBS-KNX), were off to take orders from Uncle Sam. Day before Goss got his summons his Doberman pinscher was drafted by the Army's canine command composed of Shepherds and Dobermans to be used for auxiliary guard service. Dog's name: Wotan.

4) Thurl Ravenscroft, 6-ft. 6-in. bass member of The Sportsmen (Vallee Show), underwent delicate operation on his left eye in the hope that surgery would restore orb to normal vision and thereby enable him to enlist in the U. S. Army Air Corps which refused to induct him last week because of deficiency of vision in one eye. Operation, which took 90 minutes to perform, was watched by 20 prominent West Coast eye specialists. Doctors will know how successful their efforts were when they examine the singer's eye next week.

\$10,000 Richer

Back at her West Los Angeles home this week—and \$10,000 richer—was a woman who was declared legally dead by a New York court two years ago and who is the 156th and latest heir located by the CBS program, "Are You A Missing Heir?"

She is Mrs. Elinor Paull, widow and mother of two young girls, who does housework for a living in Westwood near the U.C.L.A. campus.

Mrs. Paull's case is one of the strangest in the history of the Missing Heir program. When Verona Moritz, Mrs. Paull's sister, died intestate in New York late in 1939 she had been separated from her

younger sister, Elinor, for more than 24 years. Unable to locate the younger sister, who, reports had it, was murdered, a New York court, in 1940, declared Elinor legally dead and awarded the Moritz estate to a half-brother, Gabriel Moritz, who was living in Hungary.

However, war prevented the courts from sending the Moritz estate to the half-brother, and when the Missing Heir investigators came across the case and broadcast the facts last January 27 a Detroit friend of the former Elinor Moritz heard the program and wired Elinor, now Mrs. Paull, and the local woman immediately came west by train to claim the cash assets of the estate which totaled \$10,000.

U. C. L. A. Gets Bergen

Edgar Bergen is going back to school, but this time in the dual role of instructor and student. The man who made a household word and pet out of Charlie McCarthy has completed arrangements with the University of California at Los Angeles to do a limited seminar on the technique of writing and delivering radio comedy.

In the role of instructor Bergen will lecture a selected group of U.C.L.A. students on broadcast banter as exemplified by his NBC broadcasts. His first chalk talk is scheduled for March 5. Afterward Bergen will ask his students to submit any number of situations and gags that could be used by Charlie McCarthy. He plans to study this material while enroute to and from New York where he will do the Navy Relief Show on March 10 for Walter Winchell.

Then, on March 19, at the second group meeting on the U.C.L.A. campus, Bergen and the students will dissect and discuss the latter's materials. If anything suitable remains Bergen plans on using it as a subsequent comedy vehicle for one of his Sunday NBC programs.

"This seminar," declares Bergen, "is being set up on a mutual basis. Perhaps the students will be able to glean something from my experience, while I am positive I will learn a great deal from them." KFI, 5 p.m. Sun.

called "Virgil, the Sound Man" on the NBC comedy series was good for a boat load of laughs because of the high-pitched voice and hilarious dialogue assigned the new voice. Few Benny fans knew however, that the Jello sound man's name was Virgil Reimer, an expert in dishing up unique effects on radio's top-notch shows for the past 10 years.

Lum and Abner Twist

Probably the smartest display of showmanship in the last fortnight by radio stars was the novel twist injected in the Lum and Abner script Monday night, Feb. 23, by Chester Lauck (Lum) and Norri's Goff (Abner) when the comedy pair tied in with President Roosevelt's address which preceded the Lum and Abner turn and which ran into five minutes of their quarter-hour.

Rather than accept the prerogative of cancelling, Lum and Abner, who write all of their own material and who are among the ether's most prolific ad lib artists, picked up immediately after the FDR signoff in Washington and ad libbed a discussion of the Chief Executive's speech in the vernacular of the Pine Ridge crossroads. Lum and Abner's novel twist made a big impression with listeners and brought them a fat mail-bag of letters the next day in addition to many complimentary telephone calls.

All of which means that Fred must rearrange his entire life, the night he and Portland spend "out" each week, the little tasks which he has performed on certain days for the past nine years and a thousand and one other habits which have occupied definite hours in his weekly schedule—all these must be changed to suit the sponsor.

"And just think," says Fred, "of my 300 panhandlers who have stood outside the studio entrance for years on Wednesday nights. Now these poor fellows will have to completely re-adjust their lives. Now they will have to change from getting nothing on Wednesdays to getting nothing on Sundays." KNX, 6 p.m. Sun.

Ouch! By Barrymore

Rudy Vallee always introduces John Barrymore to his air show studio audience as "one of the greatest entertainers in the world . . . on the legitimate stage, motion pictures, radio, operettas . . ."

Radio's Better Taste

Before training out of Hollywood last week for his New York headquarters, NBC's alert, dynamic director of news and special events, A. A. Schechter, had some pertinent statements he wanted West Coast Fourth Estaters to hear.

Over an informal round-table luncheon in the American Room of the Brown Derby, Schechter shuffled these quotes to Radio Life's editor:

1 Better taste in the reading of commercials on sponsored newscasts will be adhered to by network as well as the smaller stations throughout the country.

2) The commercial announcements on newscasts will be read by an announcer, not the commentator.

3) Portions of newscasts devoted to certain phases of the war will be completed before the program is interrupted by a commercial. In other words, if a news commentator is discussing the war in the East Indies he will complete his entire report on this area before any commercial is presented.

4) There will be less and less use of the words "flash", "good news", "exciting announcement" in reference to announcements of sponsors' products.

Quizzicale a Fizzicale

Blue Network's attempt this past fortnight to install a new quiz show called Cab Calloway's Quizzicale in the public's favor appeared to have missed its mark as badly as the marksmanship of the Jap submarine commander off the shores of Santa Barbara.

Self-styled as a "combination of killer-diller musication and brain-barking with a new twist in the quiz show realm" the Quizzicale turned out to be more of a Fizzicale. The jive talk by the King of Hi De Ho and his "select board of inept experts" was nowhere near the beam.

Lady OF ADVENTURE

New Glamour Girl Sails Seven Seas
To Gain Experience for Radio Role

SHE'S A WOMAN with the wanderlust coursing through her veins and the sights, sounds, and smells of strange places beckoning persistently. She has sailed the seven seas, with the bite of a fresh wind whipping her cheeks and the tang of salty air in her nostrils—and when this war is over, Helga Moray will do it again. Until then, she'll content herself with vicarious thrills on the radio.

Opposite handsome John Wayne, Helga is portraying Joan Lockwood, member of the British Intelligence Service, in the newly-initiated air series, "Three Sheets to the Wind." Current action is aboard the luxury liner, "Empress," westward bound from Southampton on a world cruise. This is the first large-scale radio production of the well-known motion picture director, Tay Garnett, who gleaned flavor for the air show during a 10-months' world cruise. The only woman among 13 men, Miss Moray accompanied the expedition as official cinematographer.

Such an undertaking just suited the Dietrich-like blond, who, as a small child in Capetown, Africa, always climbed the hill to watch the mail boats go out and cried because she couldn't go, too, or who, again, journeyed with her parents to Nairobi, at the fringe of the jungle, where she lay awake nights listening to the lions' roar.

Paradoxically, too, the hazardous cruise appealed to a fastidious woman who spent her adolescence in Paris and "niched" herself a fashion career in that smart center; a woman who became a favorite of English stage and cinema, and who was a sophisticated sojourner in Europe's key cities.

To land-lubbers, a world cruise aboard the 105-foot yacht, Athene, sounds extremely swank and exciting. Often it was fun, Miss Moray admits, but many times it was a matter of combating heat, cold, hunger, insects, and precarious circumstances like the time her disguise fell off.

Dressed as an Arabian, with her faithful camera, "Mattie," concealed in her waist, she went with the men of her own party and 40 Arabians to photograph a Bedouin tribe. As it

was strictly against custom for a white woman to go on such a journey, a friendly dragoman, or guide, provided her with robes and a head-dress to conceal her blond hair and features. All progressed serenely until a clump of tumbleweed became tangled in the legs of Miss Moray's camel. It bolted and threw her, knocking off her disguise.

Immediately the 40 Arabians were infuriated and threatened the entire party. Only when the dragoman interceded did the angry men drop their menacing looks. Two fat bags of coin saved their indignant feelings sufficiently for the caravan to advance. Nobody knows what would have

happened if the camera had been discovered!

Equally thrilling was Miss Moray's experience of being the first white woman setting foot on Laccadive Island in almost half a century. Forty years before, a British gun boat had put in for water. "Natives not unfriendly" was the log comment.

As the Garnett yacht approached the island, it reminded Miss Moray of a flat hairbrush, the coconut trees sticking up like bristles from the white atoll. Native men scurried down to the shore, and waved while the party came ashore in tiny boats holding one person apiece. "The water

turned up the lapel on his coat, revealing a "Willkie for President" button. The photographers went wild flashing their bulbs at this scene.

"And," continued Bob, "just to show you I didn't give up—there's a Hoover button underneath!"

The only reason Hope didn't lay them in the aisles with this crack was the fact that there wasn't enough room in the aisles—the tables in the Bowl were shoved too close together.

Hope's next quip was still being laughed at early Friday morning when the Academy dinner finally broke up. He complimented Willkie, whose dinner companion was Joan Bennett, by saying: "Politics do funny things. Roosevelt won the election and wound up with Madame Perkins. You lose and end up with Joan Bennett."

When it seemed as if he couldn't possibly top himself Bob did the impossible with his explanation of the Wednesday morning anti-aircraft barrage: "That was just John Barry-

around my little canvas was simply black with sharks," says Helga.

"Once on shore," she continues, "the men clustered about me in amazement. They had never seen a white woman and as I am especially fair, they peered into my eyes and rubbed the skin on my arms to see if the 'paint' would come off. One man, an Indian who had come to the island to convert the natives to Brahmanism, knew a little English and asked us where we came from. 'America? Where is that?' he asked. 'Is it a part of England? It must be, because there are only four lands,—Japan, China, India, and England.'"

At the schoolhouse, Miss Moray was greeted by children making profuse salaams. They thought she was Queen Mary, because the only white woman they had ever known was the one pictured with King George in the frame fronting the class.

A feast climaxed the party's visit. The Americans nibbled on two boiled eggs and were offered cocoanut juice. They used their teeth as sieves to drain out the numerous beetles and ants which had found the beverage inviting while it was under process of fermentation in the tree tops.

In Indo-China, Miss Moray lived for several days on bananas,

boiled water, and chocolate bars. "I just couldn't down monkey-meat," she shivers. "The raw fish in Japan was bad, but monkey-meat was impossible." In the heart of Indo-China, she saw the "tree people," who are said to be the "missing link." Naked animal-humans, their hair matted and their arms grown long from endless branch-swinging, the "tree people" exist in nests among the foliage.

At Saigon, she lived for a month on a sampan (river boat), where the waters were crocodile-infested; in India she rode a "bad" elephant which had run amuck a few days before and had killed 12 natives; in Shanghai, she took "forbidden" pictures in the Chinese section. "Shooting" her scenes from a camouflaged bakery truck with holes cut in a flap-curtain to accommodate the lenses, Miss Moray caught professional beggars tying up their arms and legs and otherwise distorting their figures to elicit sympathy.

A monsoon on the Arabian Gulf was one of the most terrifying experiences of the trip. "It was a very calm day," Miss Moray recalls, "and I was playing the gramophone on deck. I called the captain's attention to the sky. 'See that? It looks like a giant thumb smudge,' I said. He pushed me headlong into the deck house, but he wasn't a bit too soon, for a 40-mile-an-hour gale began howling and the boat was plowing through mountains of water. I clung to the bunk for dear life, until we rode through the mon-

soon. Our steward, caught without anything to hold onto, had his back broken, which gives you some idea of the monsoon's force."

"In the Arabian Gulf also," continued the lovely star, "we came across our most impressive episode. There was a dhow, a very old form of sailing boat, which was becalmed. We heard the native passengers before we saw them, for they had built fires under their drums and were beating out prayers for help. We gave them flour and water, and when we left, they had changed their solemn beat to one of thanks."

The foregoing are just a few of Miss Moray's experiences, but they are sufficient to show how definitely her real-life happenings equip her to enact the feminine lead in an adventure series. Although she has passed through very hazardous moments, she feels no fear while they are transpiring. But when the tension drops, she shakes from head to heels.

Yes, she'll sail again, but until then, content herself with radio, which is better, in one respect at least, than riding the seven seas. For this is the pay-off. She's a terrible sailor and she invariably gets sea-sick!

SINGS AGAIN

By Sally Barrett

Once Named America's No. 1 Tenor, Novis Hits Comeback Trail

THIS IS THE STORY of a fellow who is giving tradition a kick in the pants. This is the story of a singer who lost his voice temporarily but who never lost his courage. This is the story of a boy with a fighting heart and the voice of an angel.

This is the story of Donald Novis, once acclaimed from California to Maine as "the greatest tenor of them all."

This story became news little more than a fortnight ago when a blond-haired Irishman stepped up to a microphone in NBC's Hollywood Radio City for the first time in more than two years to pour his golden gift of song into the radio loudspeakers of a half million western homes.

There had been no fanfare, no advance publicity—just a dramatically simple announcement—"... presenting your old friend, Donald Novis."

But behind those few, simply-spoken words was a story steeped in drama—a story of fame and fortune, of heart-break—a story of courage, of two-fisted grim determination that now promises to have a happy ending.

To refresh your memory and to set the stage for the story behind the radio comeback of Don Novis, the English-born son of a shoemaker, let us go back to the year 1928.

That was the year before the stock market crash, the year that the nation was humming "Star Dust," a new song by Hoagy Carmichael, and the year a new star ascended into the entertainment heavens. For that was the year that Donald Novis, an obscure undergraduate at Whittier College, Calif., walked off with the coveted \$5,000 Atwater Kent Audition in competition with the finest singers in America.

The Atwater Kent award was the first chapter in the success story of Donald Novis. You will recall how radio shows, the nation's theatres, and the Hollywood films clamored for

this spectacular new singing star... and how Don, riding the crest of a wave of meteoric success, climbed higher and higher to a point where he was drawing a weekly salary of over \$5,000.

And then at the very height of his career you will recall how the report spread from coast to coast that Don's voice was "breaking", that he could no longer hit the high, spectacular notes that had catapulted him to fame, and how the critics were writing "finis" to one of the most brilliant professional careers in the annals of American radio.

It was in 1936 while Don was starring in Billy Rose's circus extravaganza, "Jumbo," at the New York Hippodrome that the rumors about Novis' voice failing him began to seep into print. Few people realized

what a difficult job Don was tackling when he signed with Billy Rose to perform a singing and acting role in "Jumbo" that called for him to ride a fast horse nightly in a huge sawdust ring that was replete with elephants, bareback riders, trapeze artists and all the circus trimmings. And little did Don realize what his starring role in "Jumbo" was to mean to his career.

Nightly repetitions of singing and riding, inhaling sawdust and smoke, raised havoc with Don's voice; his throat and lungs became irritated and a deep rasping cough became alarmingly frequent. Finally when it was apparent that he could no longer sing his songs with the verve and quality that had marked his previous renditions Don was advised to take a rest.

SUGAR SUBSTITUTE

Sugar is front page news today. The lack of it is causing the housewife to use her ingenuity in finding substitutes. And the clever lady of the house has discovered that honey will do the trick.

Honey in your tea. Honey on your cereals. Yes, honey can be used even for making cake and bread. Of course you have to allow for a difference in the properties of honey when you use it in your recipes. The difference is mainly in the amount used and the time needed for cooking.

Honey is one-fifth water, while cane sugar is dry. Result—when you use honey instead of sugar in a recipe, you must cut down on the liquid. Also in mixing the ingredients mix the honey with the other liquid and add it to the cake or bread, just as you always do.

Just one more point. The cake made with honey needs to be baked in a slower oven, because high heat changes the flavor of honey to caramel. It may take a longer time to bake and consequently more work for

you. But think of the bees. They have to make extra honey for the duration.

THIS AND THAT

Do you like lobsters? If so you will be interested to know that the lobster industry started with the Pilgrims in this country. In colonial times the entire catch was consumed by the villagers around the fishing district, since there were no large cities and no means of rapid transportation. Then about 1840 people started getting ideas about canning lobsters, and at the same time better transportation was developed. By 1892, the lobster catch amounted to 23,724,525 pounds or, for the benefit of the mercenary, \$1,062,392.

Recipe for Chicken and Sweet Bread en Casserole

1/2 lb. mushrooms sliced	1 cup milk
2 tbsps. chopped onions	1 cup light cream
6 tbsps. butter	1/2 cup blanched almonds
1/2 cup flour	2 tsps. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper
2 cups chicken stock	1/2 cup bread crumbs
2 cups cooked diced chicken	
1 cup chopped cooked sweet bread	

Saute mushrooms and onion in butter until lightly browned, stir in flour, add stock and milk gradually, cook and stir until thickened. Add cream, chicken and sweet breads, almonds, salt and pepper, and bring to a boil. Put everything in a buttered hot casserole and sprinkle bread crumbs on top. Bake in hot oven at 400 degrees for about 30 minutes, or until browned.

Baked Pork Tenderloin Ends with Cabbage
Baked Potatoes with Butter Sauce
Sliced Oranges with Oil and Garlic Dressing
Bread and Butter

Recipe for Baked Tenderloin Ends with Cabbage

2 lbs. pork tenderloin
1 medium size cabbage
4 lbs. potatoes
6 tbsps. oil
1 clove garlic, salt and pepper.

Wipe with a damp cloth 2 lbs. of pork tenderloin ends. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and 2 tbsps. oil the tenderloin ends all around. Then put in a baking casserole and let bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. While the tenderloin ends are baking, slice very thin 1 medium size cabbage. Now saute in 4 tbsps. of oil and a clove of garlic minced very fine. When the cabbage gets soft, transfer it to the top of the tenderloin ends. Then season with 1/2 tsp. of salt and cover the baking casserole. Finally, let bake for 30 minutes longer, or until the cabbage is tender.

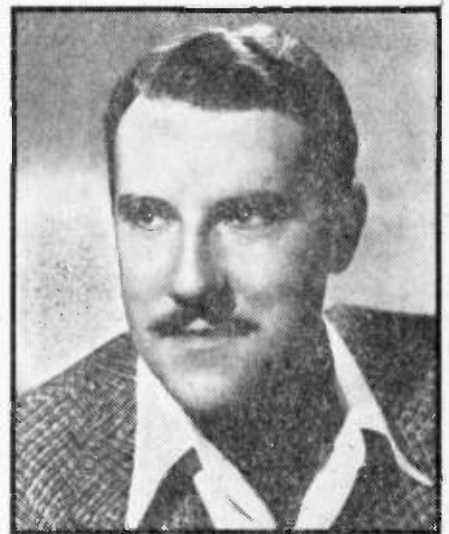

Unable to win any victories of their own, the British this week gave the featured or lead item on their news broadcasts to the Red Army of the Soviet Union. Continuance of brilliant, and now long sustained drive of the Russian forces, made it easy for the London radio to fill in the gaps. From the Burma front, Britain continued to report their army as "fighting a delaying action" against the Japanese forces. Rangoon, the capital, was admittedly doomed and on fire as well,—the result of raiding Nipponese bombers.

Those in authority at U. S. Army headquarters in Southern California engaged War Department officials at Washington in an argument about the 'Mystery Aid Raid' of February 24th. While this controversy raged, "Radio Tokyo" of the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan, made much of shelling by Japanese submarine of oil field at Santa Barbara. "This is the first time in either World War I or World War II that any point in continental United States has been subjected to attack by a naval vessel. Coming just as President Roosevelt was delivering his radio speech, it revealed to the nation the glaring weaknesses of U. S. coastal defenses. President Roosevelt's anxiety over this condition is very great, inasmuch as in previous radio speeches and statements to the press, he has boasted much of efficiency of U. S. Coast Guard and the invulnerability of shore batteries," Radio Tokyo asserted.

Most startling news from "Radio Tokyo" was the twice repeated dispatch of February 25th, asserting that "On February 21st, planes of the air arm of the Imperial Japanese Navy bombed and put out of commission a United States aircraft carrier, several hundred miles northeast of New Guinea. A huge fire was started on the vessel and although our fliers could not remain to make final observations as to its fate, it was apparent the aircraft carrier could not long remain afloat. A transport accompanying the carrier was also bombed and badly damaged."

This report gave rise to widespread speculation as to whether or not the carrier bombed might be the one which reportedly left a Pacific Coast port several weeks ago, accompanied by a transport bearing troops to the war zone in the Southwest Pacific. Greater significance is attached to this report because of the fact that it was repeated after the first reading, being given slowly the second time.

more on his way home from W. C. Fields' house."

Later Bob came back on the podium to pull down the house with his gag presentation to Jack Benny of a "special Oscar"—a statuette with skirts and a cigar in its mouth. Quipped Hope: "For being the best cigar-smoking sweater girl, and the outstanding example of lavender and old lacing." After the belly laughs had died down, Hope continued merrily, "Benny will no longer play any of these female roles because the government's taking his girdle away from

him." Benny's remark as he took the Oscar from Hope was, "I've been waiting around so long for an Oscar that I'm willing to accept anything . . . from anybody!"

Orson Welles, nominated for honors in almost every major division, had to be content to split an Oscar with Herman Mankiewicz, his co-author of "Citizen Kane," voted outstanding among the original screen plays.

CBS dropped its remote wires into the Biltmore Bowl to broadcast Willkie's speech in its entirety, going off the air just a few moments prior to Hope's appearance on the platform. It marked the first time in the history of the banquet that a network had

been given permission to air any of the proceedings. The KNX announcer missed a great bet by not ad libbing some of the scene at the close of the broadcast, when with time on his hands, he merely repeated his opening announcement about the reasons for the awards, etc.

Mary Astor, CBS Showcase star, received deafening applause when Ginger Rogers announced her as winner of the Oscar for the best supporting role by an actress in "The Great Lie."
