Sirs: The timely criticism of Knox Manning by Charles Fletcher, of Ventura, in your May 24-30 issue of Radio Life, applies with equal force to other radio announcers, who roar their commercials, repeat two or three times in a 15-minute program, and seldom vary from day to day. If commercials were given in a tone lower than the rest of the program, none would need to turn the radio down to avoid disturbing the neighbors, something which apartment house dwellers must think of. When compelled to turn the commercial down, we turn it off for the "duration." Unvarying repetition is treated in like manner, as Mr. Fletcher says. Most people these days understand something of modern salesmanship, but loud, repetitious, parrot-like radio announcers must be ignorant of the very principles. Too much repetition may well be the fault of some sponsors. When a certain 9 a. m. sponsor gives an inventory of his stock more than once he should inquire what his listeners think of it. The time could be better used. Sponsors who choke 15-minute programs

with too much advertising must think the Fords were boobs, and wasted their money on the Sunday Evening Hour.

Exit, John Barrymore

Barrymore: Yes, this is my farewell appearance. I'm retiring.

Vallee: You mean — you are leaving acting flat?

Barrymore: Why not? That's how it left me!

Little did those who listened to John Barrymore and Rudy Vallee read the above lines from the script of the Vallee show over the Blue Network May 14 realize how prophetic were these words that brought forth laughter from a coast-to-coast air audience.

For five days later—on May 19 in a Radio City dressing room here in Hollywood—a pain-wracked John Barrymore collapsed during rehearsals of the Sealtest Time program on which during the past 15 months he had scored a spectacular success with Rudy Vallee and Joan Davis.

And 10 days later, at 10:20 p. m. last Friday (May 29), the most widely-publicized and most fabulous figure of his time answered his final "cue" from the Grim Reaper in the Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital where for more than a week he had battled valiantly but unsuccessfully against the ravages of a number of grave ailments.

Perhaps only the Great Profile, who during his laugh-studded radio series with Vallee won himself millions of new fans as a roguish butt of comedy, had a premonition on that May 14 when he talked about "my farewell appearance."

Perhaps that was the reason why, when one of Vallee's writers questioned the "good taste" of the sequence, Barrymore insisted that the lines be left in the script. "That's bosh," Barrymore exclaimed. "It's only a gag. Leave it in."

Only Vallee, who mourned Barrymore's death not only as a severe loss to the radio world but as a personal friend, and a few intimates of the famous actor knew how ill he had been for the past several months. Many times when Barrymore was too ill to get through rehearsals and then appear on the half-hour broadcast, his loyal brother Lionel stepped in at a moment's notice to take his place. At his bedside, too, when the brilliant actor made his exit from this life was brother Lionel.

As the 60-year-old actor went to his final resting place last Tuesday in

quiet, private rites attended only by those few close friends and members of the immediate family, there was much speculation in radio circles as to the possibility that Lionel might be approached with the idea of "carrying on" in John's place on the Vallee program.

Off With Wraps

Radio programs dealing in the war theme this last fortnight began to display some genuine thunder and an attitude of "off with the wraps—let's tell 'em the facts" after weeks of panty-waist antics on the nation's air-planes.

You will recall how as recently as May 17th Radio Life reported within these columns the statements made by both Arch Oboler and Norman Corwin at the 13th Institute for Education by Radio at Ohio State University . . . Oboler: "Make the people angry; we must use radio as a blunt weapon of war to arouse the American people to the tasks which lie ahead." And Corwin: "We must name names. We are playing 'patty-cake' on the edge of Vesuvius!"

Well, the creators of dramatic air scripts have started to fall in step with this hard-hitting technique advocated by Messrs. Oboler and Corwin.

• The Big Town series, starring Edward G. Robinson, is an example of the change in trend. Several weeks ago, as reported in Radio Life, the Big Town show revamped its format to enable "Steve Wilson" (Robinson's radio character) to hunt down his news scoops in Europe against a Nazi-infested backdrop. And the Rinso scripts are "naming names" and "calling a spade a spade."

• Now, Charles Vanda, whose series, "They Live Forever," was adjudged the most outstanding propaganda program of the year by the National Women's Press Club, has been given the go-ahead nod by Washington on his new 13-week series to be inaugurated by CBS June 16 under the title of "N ature of the Enemy."

• Vanda's new show, a half-hour production originating in New York after the former West Coast press agent winds up his current "Forever" series June 7 at the West Coast Air Force Training Center in Santa Ana, will revolve around the only phase of the Government's radio propaganda

campaign still untouched—that of the type of leaders in the Axis camp.

• That no punches will be pulled on the Vanda-produced "Enemy" broadcasts was made clear this week when the network and capitol officials agreed on the use of certain terms and phrases heretofore blue-pencilled from the airplanes.

• Vanda, who arrived in town a week ago, told Radio Life's reporter that the program will deal with personalities and they will be depicted in their true colors through information and data supplied by responsible sources here and abroad.

• "The main idea," declared Vanda, "will be to get across to the American people the type of villainy the Axis bigshots represent."

Noah Webster Says

After a 10-week "break-in" period over a Pacific Coast network of stations, Hollywood's NBC Radio City began sending its newest audience participation show, Noah Webster SAYS, across the country—with its broadcast of last Saturday.

Noah Webster SAYS, scripted from an original idea by Haven MacQuarrie who also acts as master of ceremonies for the show, revolves around Mr. Webster's famous book, and when it passed Radio Life's reviewing stand last, had plenty of appeal.

MacQuarrie, no stranger to NBC dialers who used to hear him on "Do You Want to Be An Actor?" and "The Marriage Club," corrals a group of contestants from the studio audience and invites them to sit on the stage during the program. Each of these contestants is given an opportunity to define five words. Answers are checked with a huge Webster edition which lies on a table at which sits the "Judge" of Noah Webster SAYS—Prof. Charles Frederick Lindsley, chairman of the Department of Speech at nearby Occidental College and veteran of many radio shows.

Correct definition for first word is one dollar. The second brings the total to three, the third, six, and the fourth to 10, which can be matched against \$50.00 for the fifth word.

Pearce to Noo Yawk

The cigarette which claims to "travel the smoke further" apparently is very happy about the job Al Pearce has been doing for it on his NBC series, for word reached Radio Life's desk over the weekend that the I hope-I hope-I hope star is being "drafted" for bigger and better assignments.

Pearce's sponsor will conclude the current Pearce program as of July 2 and fly the onetime San Francisco pride and joy to New York where he will take over the emceeing duties of a pretentious new hour-long variety show over a yet-to-be-named major network. (Probably NBC).

Although no details have been officially announced, the new Al Pearce

master-of-ceremonied broadcast is slated to feature one of the top-ranking dance orchestras in the country as well as an array of outstanding individual stars.

Whether or not Pearce will retain the services of long-time regulars of the famous Gang now appearing on his show is problematical. KFI, 7 p.m. Thurs.

Tomorrow's Stars

"Just think, now daddy and mama won't have to work any more. You can do the broadcasting and mama and daddy will stay home."

George Burns was talking to 7-year-old Sandra Burns outside Studio C at Studio City Saturday after the Blue Network had aired a special Red Ryder Victory Patrol broadcast with Sandra, Ronnie Burns and Beverly Wills, Joan Davis' 8-year-old daughter, as guest performers.

The famous comedian was as pleased as punch over his young daughter's radio debut as the guest of Reed Hadley, who plays the role of Red Ryder on the serial program of the same name, and Tommy (Little Beaver) Cook.

Also much in evidence at the special broadcast was another daughter of a famous star, young Beverly Wills, daughter of Joan Davis of the Rudy Vallee show.

Beverly proved to be a "chip off the old block," and her take-off on "Mom" was so good that many of the persons who watched rehearsals for the show and didn't know who the young lady was immediately identified her.

Work and More Work

When a fellow like Jack Benny mutes his program for a 17-week period during the summer like the bard of Waukegan did last Sunday, what happens to the members of the Jell-O cast? What happens? Well, here's what happens.

Phil Harris timed his closing nights on the bandstand of the Biltmore Bowl to coincide with the Benny show finale, and immediately hied out to Encino to kiss wife Alice and their newborn child "good-bye" before training out for the Great Northwest on the first few stops of a country-wide swing of one-night stands with his music-makers. These one-night stands which the "name" bands like Phil's do each year are tough on the constitution but very complimentary to the bankroll.

That takes care of wavy-maned Philip and his 16 musically-inclined lads in the Benny program orchestra. That is, with the exception of three fiddlers, who only work with Phil on the Benny show to help give tenor Dennis Day the right background for his solos. These violinists won't want for work, however, as they play in two or three orchestras on other programs every week anyway.

Probably the most excited about the summer months ahead is Dennis Day, the likeable young Irish tenor. Day pulled out his June and July working schedule between rehearsals Sunday so that Radio Life's editor could re-

port on his summer activities in this week's issue.

Dennis embarks upon a personal appearance tour in theatres across the nation starting June 5 at the Chicago (Ill.) theatre. He'll do four and five shows a day on a seven-day-a-week schedule there as well as in Cleveland, June 12; the New York Strand, June 19; the Earle in Philadelphia, July 3; and the Earle in Washington, July 10. While in the Big Town, Day will do a guest spot with Andre Kostelanetz on the Pause That Refreshes on the Air program of June 21.

If memory serves us correctly, Dennis hasn't made a personal appearance in New York since he was "discovered" through a recording Mary Livingstone heard and placed on the Benny show.

Eddie (Rochester) Anderson, as reported in Radio Life last week, has a part-interest in a San Diego factory which manufactures parachutes. And the chocolate-coated comic plans to spend most of his time working in the border city plant, as well as making appearances at various army and navy posts with other entertainers.

At this writing, Don Wilson's plans involve the planting of several acres of Victory garden near his San Fernando Valley rancho.

As for Jack Benny he goes into immediate makeup tests for his next starring film at Warner Bros. After his picture he will take Mary and a group of other Hollywood stars on a tour of army camps in nearby states.

The Lim Family

Radio listeners who have read and heard of the brilliant exploits on Bataan of the Filipino warrior, General Vicente Lim, were more than casually interested the last fortnight when, first, Gen. Lim's wife appeared on KHJ's Tune Up America as a guest of Betty Rhodes and then last week when Lieut. Roberto Lim, 22-year-old son of the Filipino general, was interviewed by Hank McCune on NBC's It Happened in the Service.

Lieut. Lim, now of the first Filipino Infantry Battalion, San Luis Obispo, was attending the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis when the war broke out last year. He joined the armed forces immediately after graduating last December.

The well-educated, husky Filipino youth who spoke in clear-cut English over the air, claims the unique distinction of being the only third lieutenant in the U. S. as well as being an army officer who graduated not from West Point but from Annapolis.

Lieut. Lim explained his rank to McCune by saying that when he was in the Philippines he had an ambition to command a torpedo boat, and inasmuch as a torpedo boat squadron (called an off shore patrol in the Islands) is under the army while here it is under the navy, he had to enter the naval academy. He said that in the Philippine Army the first commission is that of a third lieutenant rather than a second lieutenant such as in the American Army.

Asked about his hopes and fears

concerning the safety of his father who everyone has taken for granted is a captive of the Japs, Lieut. Lim expressed the belief that his father is not a prisoner of war.

"My father knows that country like a book," explained Lieut. Lim, "and I think that he may have slipped through the Jap lines if such a thing was humanly possible."

Accompanying Gen. Lim's son to the McCune air interview was his mother, his eight-year-old sister, Eulalia; a 10-year-old sister, Pat; and a brother, Luis, 23. They posed for their first group picture following the broadcast. Members of the Lim family, in addition to Gen. Lim, who were not present for the picture Radio Life features on this page were Maria Pilar, 4, and Vicente, Jr., 19, a plebe at West Point.

Air for Canteen?

Many of Radio Life's readers are no doubt aware of the widely-publicized Stage Door Canteen in New York City, which in the past few months as a recreation spot for servicemen has become literally world famous.

Probably few readers know, however, about the new radio deal now being closed for a weekly program to originate in the 44th Street theatre in Manhattan, in the basement of which the Canteen is located.

The Canteen airshow may provide the vehicle for the radio return of one Al Jolson, who is said to have the "inside track" for the master of ceremonies berth.

The Stage Door Canteen, which is maintained by the American Theatre Wing of New York, features free entertainment and refreshment nightly for some 1,500 United Nations servicemen who tax the spot to capacity nightly. America's greatest stars from radio, screen and stage wait on the tables and perform for the men.

It is reported that Jolson, if he is signed, will be supported by top name entertainers who will appear on the broadcasts either free of or for nominal sums in order to give the Canteen fund the largest possible profit.

Last week a Hollywood film producer, Sol Lesser, paid the sum of \$25,000 plus a percentage for the motion picture rights to the Stage Door Canteen title.

Radio Life Lines

If you crave a show that packs a wallop, tune in NBC on Sunday, 12:30 p.m., for **The Army Hour**, "a military operation" of the U. S. War Department. People we know of, who've listened, admit to goose-flesh, tears, and thrills of patriotism while hearing the exciting pick-ups which are dramatic moments on this series. How stirring it was, after **Brig. Gen. James H. Doolittle's** speech, to hear his son, **John**, come in immediately from the University of Michigan! Program producers had arranged a third pick-up from the Doolittle family—**Lieut. Jimmie**, a flying officer in the southwest part of the United States. Between the time that the program was mapped and executed, **Lieut. Jimmie** was delegated to an undesigned spot. Any way it's figured, in the air or on, it's all thrilling!

Visited Harry Saz, Chief Sound Effects Man at Radio City, the other day. We asked him: "If you had not been in contact with the outside world for the past six months, could you know, by the sound effect requirements made on you by the radio programs, that a war is in process?" "That wouldn't be hard to guess", **Harry** said. "A year ago we'd get about two calls a week for the sound of a plane. Now we have one every day. The same goes for machine-gun fire, torpedoes, and explosions." During pre-war rehearsals, sound effects men used to fire as many shots as the script demanded, or break as many panes of glass as indicated. Now, rehearsal sound effects are limited to one glass-break and one shot. As they go about the studios, the sound effects men keep an eagle eye on salvageable materials. In boxes attached to the sides of their units, they collect empty cartridge cases, rubber bands, and paper clips.

Saz is substituting wood for articles which were formerly made of brass and aluminum. He's using iron pipes in the rain machine and plans on employing plastics when iron becomes scarce. His rubber situation isn't bad. "I'm well fixed for horse-hoofs", **Harry** laughed. "I bought two dozen a year and a half ago. In addition, I've been using coconut shells to save rubber, except where a horse is supposed to be on a dirt road—then we have to use rubber." Recordings are going to be a problem. They're being handled with deference. **Saz** has one, taken in Berlin, which is in incessant demand. It's of a parade of Hitler's goose-stepping soldiers!

One of the nicest radio mothers we've met is **Bob Garred's**, who is visiting her newscaster son and whose home is in Walla Walla, Wash. She chatted with us about **Bob's** interest in planes, both now and when he was eight or nine years old, his delight in fishing, football, and golf. She believes **Bob's** success is due to his voice, diction, and dramatic ability. "Do you listen to him?", we inquired naively. "I'm his mother", the youthfully white-haired matron responded simply.

● **Never cared much for the singing we get from neighbors at home but we certainly strain our ears these days to catch the robust tones that seep through the windows above Radio Life's editorial offices in the Otto K. Olesen Bldg. at Vine and Selma.**

Well, although we have admired the singing of The Sportsmen, one of radio's finest quartets, for some time, and have chatted a few times with one of its members we never knew anything about them personally until the other day when we took the trouble to inquire.

Thurl Ravenscroft, who hails from Norfolk, Nebr., and Bill Days, a St. Louis, Mo. product, are the two high-flying members of The Sportsmen. Both have pilot's licenses and both shoot a good game of golf.

Max Smith, from Des Moines, and John Rarig, who came to California from Seattle, are the quiet members of the foursome when they're not on the air. Max is an expert mechanic and also spends much of his time designing cabinets in his workshop. John is quite a composer, and has had his symphonies played by the Seattle Symphony Orchestra.

● **Some radio comedians would give their kingdom for a good gag.** George Burns and the sponsors of the NBC comedy series co-starring George and Gracie just put out a cool \$2,500 for a good gag.

We're speaking of Gracie's widely-heralded piano concerto played the last fortnight by Paul Whiteman's orchestra.

The cost of \$2,500 probably makes it the most expensive single gag in radio annals—at least our research department hasn't been able to uncover one which ran into more money. And the \$2,500 does not include the cost of building up the gag on four weeks of preceding aircasts.

It represents merely the cost of making the necessary arrangements, the hiring of extra musicians to augment Whiteman's regular orchestra, and a fancy stipend to Conductor-Composer Felix Mills (of Silver Theatre renown) for writing the orchestrations.

So you can readily see that it costs money to make America laugh. And you did laugh, didn't you? We have to confess that we did . . . and even George Burns told us that he thought it was worth the price.

● **Easy on the Ears Dept: Any tune played by Freddy Martin's ork.** And anything spoken by Freddy Martin. His is also the most pleasant voice to listen to among the maestros . . . Lurene Tuttle's acting on I Was There, Dr. Christian, Great Gildersleeve, etc. . . . Andy and Virginia's "it's wonderful to be alive" mood via KMPC airplanes in early ayem . . . Earl Ross' Judge Hooker role on Great Gildersleeve . . . Sterling Young's new rhythm crew via KHJ of a midnight hour . . . Mel Ruick's announcing on Lux any Monday . . . And Robert Taylor's swell acting in "Test Pilot" a week ago on the same Lux show . . . Those hour-long platter parades nightly over KFWB titled "Dance Tonite." Their announcers don't bore you with conversation; they let the music seep through your loudspeaker, which is a welcome change . . . Wally Maher's acting on "I Love a Mystery."

● **We turned into an amateur J. Edgar Hoover the other Saturday night** to "investigate" the method used by Actor Gale Gordon to give his dialogue as "The Whistler" that eerie quality on the popular CBSaturday night mystery chiller-diller. Now it can be told! Gordon, playing the role of The Whistler, reads his lines to a microphone inside an "isolation chamber" in the corner of the

studio. The actor wears earphones to pick up "line cues" from his fellow actors who speak into microphones in the center of the stage. For his "cues" from Producer J. Donald Wilson, Gordon peeks through a small slit in one side of his "isolation chamber" which is a complete walled in booth. No, nothing complicated about being a radio actor!

INSIDE CUZZIN' ARCHIE

How the Major Domo of KMPC's "Fun House" Manages to Retain Nightly Insanity with His Talented Pets

CUZZIN' ARCHIE and I first met on a bridle path in Griffith Park. He was riding in a deck chair atop a giant Galapagos turtle which refused to give way to my foaming velocipede.

In the ensuing battle trees were torn down, vegetation uprooted, and calamitous landslides wrought havoc with the terrain.

Cuzzin' Archie and I sat on a park bench and watched the fracas. A fight between a giant turtle and a thoroughly aroused velocipede is something to behold.

It was only when Archie removed his beard from his inside pocket that I recognized the Major Domo of KMPC's Fun House, radio's maddest half-hour.

How Cuzzin' Archie manages to be devastatingly insane night after night is a secret he shares with people who play pin-ball machines and put ketchup on their eggs.

The Fun House has been kicked around the clock like a Nazi parachutist landing on Big Ben. It is now heard Monday through Friday from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m.—a time its fans voted most convenient.

The type of comedy peculiar to the Fun House cannot be described. Like a tooth-ache, it is a thrill that must be experienced to be appreciated.

Twenty frantic years of scientific and artistic progress in radio are knocked into a coon-skin cap each evening by Archie's fatuous and self-satisfied pronouncement, "Stand by! We're going on the wireless." The very phrase is a custard pie thrown at Mr. Sarnoff's top hat. It reminds us that

despite 50-story skyscrapers, 40-cent tours, \$6000-a-week comedians, and ushers dressed like admirals—despite the magic name Radio itself—the industry is still an elaboration of some old coils and condensers once assembled by Marconi.

Cuzzin' Archie's comedy is unique, both as to delivery and material.

Those fortunate beings who have heard him make the most implausible statements in his clear, confident melliflence, will understand what we mean. He states a patent absurdity in a tone Euclid might have used in laying down a law of geometry.

With imperturbable mien he copes with the maddest and most incongruous interruptions that ever plagued a radio emcee.

He remains serene in the face of open mutiny on the part of his musical director, "Arturo"; calm when beset by the annoying intrusions of Bigelow, his little silk worm; placid during the garbled double-talk of Enoch.

With all his aloofness, Cuzzin' Archie has the common touch. He talks with silk-worms and senators; interviews badgers and business men. Contemptuous of the mighty, his voice is tender as he proudly introduces his orchestra of talented little animals, all accomplished musicians.

The master-mind behind the Fun House is KMPC's good-looking announcer, William Hall, whose 195 pounds are well-distributed over a super-structure that towers 6 feet 2 inches above the studio floor. Quiet, soft-spoken, and serious, Hall manages to conceal the pixie that is Cuzzin' Archie except for that one half-

hour between 7:30 and 8:00 o'clock each week-day evening.

Still under 30, Hall has been a cowhand, rodeo rider, salesman, western movie "heavy", writer, and artist before turning his talents to radio.

In his Fun House, Hall conducts a fabulous burlesque of stuffed-shirt individuals in all walks of life, with special emphasis on radio that takes itself too seriously. He parodies the self-impressed commentator and satirizes the more blatant forms of advertising.

Yes, behind Cuzzin' Archie's apparently senseless buffoonery is a healthy honesty and an appealing freshness.

Hall instills a piquant and often hilarious charm in the very names he gives to the strange assortment of characters on his program. What a delicious flavor there is to such names as H. V. Pettigrew, Muldoon Globule Schwartz, Lionel Partridge Brew, Otis Kurch Pettigrew, Gilchrist Fobb, and Heinrich Fudge!

He has originated such catch-phrases as "What's buzzin', cuzzin'?" and has enjoyed the sincere but unremunerative flattery of seeing many of his creations calmly pirated by movie and radio writers, whose salaries

VOICE 2: Who cares! We got a job (FADE) we got a job . . .

MARION: Fun at first . . .

MUSIC OUT

FADE IN SOUND OF TYPEWRITERS CONTINUING BEHIND.

VERA: Gee, all these cards!

MARION: Yeah! Enough filling for a month!

VERA: Everybody that registered yesterday, huh?

MARION: That's it!

VERA: Sure feels swell, working again.

MARION: I never thought it would—but it does!

VERA: Swell lunch they gave us—brought it right in—I think I'm going to like this—how about you?

MARION: It's all right with me!

VERA: Me, too! (FADE) Me, too!

SOUND FADE OUT WITH ABOVE FADE.

MUSIC BEHIND:

MARION: Fun . . . at first . . .

MUSIC OUT

FADE IN SOUND OF BUSY OFFICE, AS BEFORE, BACK BEHIND:

VERA: Gee, I'm gettin' awful tired . . .

MARION: (OBVIOUSLY VERY WEARY) He said to keep going. Give us those cards . . .

VERA: But—but how long? Gosh—I've been here since eight this morning!

MARION: All of us have.

VERA: I—I just can't anymore, no matter what they're paying! (UP) Please—Mr.—Mr.—uh . . .

OFFICIAL: (FADE IN) Yes, yes, what is it?

VERA: Isn't it time we change shifts—or punch the clock or something?

OFFICIAL: What?

VERA: I mean we've all been working since 8 this morning and—it's almost 8 at night now and—well, don't you think we ought to call it quits until tomorrow morning?

OFFICIAL: (QUIETLY—SHARPLY) Go back to your work!

VERA: But I thought—

OFFICIAL: Your function here is not to think—it is to work! These vital statistics must be completed before the civil authority can function! If you are tired, be grateful! You are now working for the glories of the New German Reich. You are working for Germany! Chicago, Germany! (FADE) Now go back to your work and no more protests.

At this point in the play, Marion tells how, finally, after a week's work, they are permitted to go home. Outside the city hall, her sister Ann is waiting with the terrible news that food cards are being issued only to people with German blood; since the blood of Marion's family is a good American mixture of Irish and Scotch and Polish and Czech, the authorities are uninterested—they can live or die.

MARION: I called you crazy, Ann. The city—it looked just the same—everything was just the same—you were just excited, I thought, as you always got excited! If we had to have food cards—well, I'd get 'em!

OFFICIAL: (FADE IN) Young woman, I warn you, you are putting yourself in grave jeopardy. My orders are very clear—absolutely no food cards can be issued to non-citizens at the present time . . . No! You are not and cannot be a citizen. Your racial origins—your blood—very inferior! At best you will be classified as a second-rate citizen! Until such arrangements are made, you and your family must get along whatever way you can. I warn you not to annoy me further. I have more important work to do. (FADE) Go to your home . . .

MARION: You and your family . . . get along whatever way you can . . .

MUSIC OUT

MOTHER: (FADE IN) Now there's no reason to get angry, Ann—the Schultzes are our neighbors and they've got a full ration card and when I told them how things were, Mrs. Schultz went right in to the pantry (FADE) and got this bread and cheese and she said as they'd let her help us, she'd do what she could . . .

ANN: (CROSS-FADE) I don't care! I don't care what you tell me, Marion—I'll say what I want to say! It's been over two weeks—what're they trying to do—starve us to death? Black bread and a piece of meat and you stand in line all day to get that—stop giving me that Pollyanna stuff that it's going to be all right! When is it going to be all right and how do you know it's going to be all right?

MARION: It's just a matter of their getting things organized! Everything will be all right!

ANN: Organized for whom? For us? They're eating! The Germans are eating! But how about us? Ma's sick—I can't stand it any more! You can wait for them to throw you a piece of bread—I won't! I—

RADIO ANNOUNCER: (BACK)—THRU ABOVE) Achtung! Attention!

MARION: (INTERRUPTING ANN) Wait! Listen!

ANNOUNCER: (BRING UP) Communique Number 15 from the headquarters of General von Brauchigg! Attention all non-citizens within the Chicago area! The vital statistics of the Chicago area are now in order! All non-Germanic peoples are hereby ordered to remain within their homes until called upon by the military authorities! Heil Hitler!

(FADE FAST—Repeat previous announcement)

MARION: Did you hear that! It's all settled!

MOTHER: (BACK) Marion, what is it?

MARION: The radio—I was right! All we had to do was wait!

MOTHER: (BACK) But what—

MARION: The police—they're coming around with our ration cards! All the records are complete—(FADE) everything is going to be all right!

MUSIC

MARION: Right! Remember how right, Ann?

MUSIC OUT

Fade in murmur of voices

VOICE: Fall in line! All of you! Verdammten Catholics! Jews! Yankees! All of you! In line! We are going to clean the city of American lice!

RADIO ANNOUNCER: (FADE IN) Effective at once the area between 12th and 47th Streets and Wabash Avenue and State Street is strictly verboten! This area is to be the imprisonment grounds for enemies of the Greater German Reich. (FADE) All families living within this area will be evacuated at once!

SOLDIER: (FADE IN) Do you know what this place used to be—it used to be a ball park—they had an American sport here! Well, now is the time for our sport, eh, Eric?

(UP) Line them up! Line them up! Fire!

MACHINE GUN FIRING. FADE BACK

JUNE 7, 1942

SLOWLY AND CONTINUE INTERMITTENTLY BEHIND:

MUSIC.
MARION: Terrible—yes—but we were safe, weren't we, Ann—and when a thing is terrible enough and lasts long enough, soon you don't pay much attention to it, do you? . . . But you did. Ann—I didn't.

VOICE: (WHISPERS) As long as you're alive, that's all that matters. (CONTINUING BEHIND:)

MARION: Yes, I said it over and over thru all that began to happen . . .

VOICES: (RADIO FILTER) Achtung! Second rate citizens and non Aryans are forbidden to appear on the public streets after sundown!

MARION: As long as you're alive, that's all that matters.

VOICE: (FILTER) Achtung! Effective at once all persons, including second rate citizens and non Aryans are required to learn the German language!

MARION: As long as you're alive, that's all that matters!

VOICE: (FILTER) Achtung! Second rate citizens and non Aryans are subject to the wishes of any German citizen under penalty of immediate arrest!

MARION: As long as you're alive!

VOICE: (RADIO FILTER) Achtung! Second rate citizens and non Aryans are forbidden within the Loop shopping area! This is reserved exclusively for citizens of German blood!

MARION: As long as you're alive . . .

VOICE: (FILTER) Achtung! Second rate citizens and non Aryans are forbidden in the public parks!

MARION: As long as you're alive!

VOICE: (FILTER) Second rate citizens and non-Aryans are forbidden to marry without official permission!

MARION: As long as you're alive!

VOICE: Children of second rate citizens and non-Aryans are forbidden public schools.

MARION: As long as you're alive!

VOICE: (FILTER) Second rate citizens and non-Aryans are not permitted in County Hospital—second rate citizens and non-Aryans are not permitted—it is verboten—it is not permitted—(FADE OUT SLOWLY BEHIND FOLLOWING SPEECH) It is verboten—not permitted—

verboten—not permitted—

MARION: (ON CUE THRU ABOVE) As long as we were alive—that was all that mattered. Ann—as long as we were alive!

ALFRED: (TELEPHONE FILTER) Hello, Marion—Marion listen! I haven't been able to call you before—I've been very busy. No, no, I can't tell you what—but just sit tight and everything'll be all right. Of course I do! It's just that I can't see you for a little while. (FADE) I'll explain it when I see you.

MARION: (FLATLY) When he'd see me.

RADIO ANNOUNCER: Achtung! Attention! By order of the military authority of the City of Chicago effective at once! All marriages between German citizens and second rate citizens are strictly forbidden! (FADE) All marriages between German citizens and second rate citizens are strictly forbidden!

MUSIC
MARION: When he'd see me . . .

MOTHER: (BACK) Why doesn't Marion's boyfriend come over any more?

ANN: Haven't you heard?—we're second rate! (FADE) Just second rate!

MUSIC
MARION: As long as we were alive . . .

MOTHER: (FADE IN) Marion—Marion—you were right—everything's going to work out all right! Ann just phoned me—she's got a job! With one of their officials! (FADE) Isn't that wonderful—wonderful!

MUSIC
MARION: So you worked, Ann—and you brought home food cards . . .

MOTHER: (BACK) Marion: A letter for you!

MARION: Then—my job . . .

MUSIC OUT
MOTHER: (FADE IN—NERVOUSLY)—Look—look at the envelope—it's got swastikas—oh, Marion what can they want of you?

MARION: Wait'll I finish reading the letter . . . (SIGHS) Well!

MOTHER: What is it—what?

MARION: It's a notice to report to the commissioner of employment at the City Hall!

MOTHER: Oh, that's wonderful! (FADE) Maybe you'll get a job as good as Ann's! A job like Ann's!

MUSIC
MARION: A job like Ann's . . .
MUSIC OUT
FADEIN SOUND OF CITY STREET TOGETHER WITH CLICK OF HIGH HEELS OF WOMAN'S SHOES.

MARION: (FADEIN — EXCITEDLY) Ann! Ann!

FOOTSTEPS STOP
MARION: (FADEIN FULL) Ann! Ann, wait!

ANN: Oh—hello, Marion.
MARION: (ALMOST IN AGONY) Oh, Ann!

ANN: (SHARPLY IN DEFENSE) What's the matter with you?

MARION: Ann, oh, Ann!

ANN: (NERVOUSLY) What the devil's the matter with you? I—I got a few hours off—any reason I can't walk around to get a breath of air?

MARION: I—I was walking along—I saw you from a distance—I watched you!

ANN: All right, so you watched me—so what? Can't I talk to people?

MARION: Soldier after soldier—the way they looked at you—laughed—

ANN: I don't know what you're talking about!

MARION: And this was the job we were so elated about!

ANN: (TENSELY) All right—and this is the job that kept you and Ma from starving to death all these weeks!

MARION: Why did I do it?

ANN: Why did I do it? Oh, you little sap, you! Won't you ever wake up?

You should hear those Nazi devils the way I hear them—when they're drunk (IN DISTASTE) and their hands—(QUICKLY) Listen to me, Marion—they say it and they mean it—there's no room on earth for us anymore! This is Chicago, Germany! Chicago, Germany! Everything's Germany! There's no escape this time!

MARION: (FLATLY) You don't understand what I'm saying, do you? Well, I didn't expect you to! Maybe some day—(TENSELY) Beat it! Gestapo guy coming—I know him—(FADE) but you'd better beat it—beat it!

SOUND: FADE WITH ABOVE FADE
MUSIC
MARION: We never saw each other again. That day they gave me a job . . .

MUSIC OUT
OFFICIAL: (FADE IN) Your name—Marion Mason—classification — second rate—yes—your vital statistics card states you are a filing clerk—ah, yes—you are to report at once to the Central Concentration Camp—do not be alarmed—you are to work there—a certain citizen has interceded for you—(FADE) such a position would ordinarily go only to a German citizen, not to such as you . . .

MUSIC
MARION: A certain citizen has interceded for you . . .

FADE IN SOUND OF BUSINESS OFFICE, CONTINUING BACK BEHIND:

GIRL: (FLATLY AS SHE FILES) Lerner—L. B.—death file . . .

MARION: (FLATLY) Lerner—L. B.—death file

GIRL: Orton—K. S.—labor camp . . .

MARION: Orton—K. S.—labor camp . . .

GIRL: Landry—R. J.—death file . . .

MARION: Landry—R. J.—death file . . .

ALFRED: Marion . . .

MARION: Yes . . .

CLOSING DOOR—OFFICE SOUNDS OUT

MARION: Al . . . (QUICKLY—TENSELY) I've only a minute—Marion, believe me when I say I'm terribly unhappy about what's happened. There's nothing we can do—I've done what I can.

MARION: You were the one who—

ALFRED: I knew you'd be safe here.

MARION: Al, all these weeks—

ALFRED: (INTERRUPTING) Marion, I must get back—I don't know when I'll get a chance to talk to you again, so listen closely! Don't fight against what's happening—you or your family! Try to

understand the new order of things, and even if you don't, accept them—without reservation! This is our world—yes, I understand my place now completely, and I've done what I can for you. The rest is up to you. Don't do anything to jeopardize your position here! In this place you're safe—quite safe. I told them of your good record during the war—that you had done nothing and so your record was clear! I say it again, Marion—do your work here and you're safe—you always said that the important thing was to stay alive—(FADE) well, do your work and you're safe—quite safe . . .

GIRL: (BACK—FLATLY AS BEFORE AS SHE SORTS CARDS) Caplan—Isaac J., death file. Orman—T. O.—forced labor—mines; Cary—F. M.—death file—(CONTINUING BACK BEHIND)

MARION: (ON CUE THRU ABOVE) I went back to work . . . Cards in my hand.

GIRL: (BACK—SLIGHTLY) Lester—S., death file; Conlan J.—labor camp (FADING BACK AND CONTINUING BEHIND.)

MARION: File the cards away—just cards—file them all away and I was safe—quite safe . . .

GIRL: (FADE IN) Carleton—W. A.—death file—White—L. T.—death file—Block—H. S.—death file—(FADE) Dixon—F. C.—death file ETC. FAR BACK, AND CONTINUING BEHIND:)

MUSIC
MARION: File-cards in my hands—Ann, all of a sudden they weren't cards anymore — they were people—people who wanted to live the way I wanted to—and were going to die—because we'd lost . . . And then I was crying, Ann—for the first time in all the weeks—crying.

ALFRED: (WHISPER) Safe—safe—do your work—(FADE)—you'll be quite safe.

MARION: Alfred said that—I was safe—why should I cry? I wanted to know that—why should I suddenly cry? I was alive—I was safe—nothing would happen to me! Why—should I—cry?

ANN: (WHISPERS) Chicago—Germany! Everything's Germany! There's no escape this time!

MARION: Ann—your words—they were in my head—

ALFRED: (WHISPERS) This is our world—yes, I understand my place now completely . . .

MARION: Then Al's words . . .

VOICE: As long as you're alive—(FADE) as long as you're alive . . . as long as you're alive . . .

MARION: Alive? Was I crying because I was alive? That was what I had wanted—I'll shut my eyes and—and my heart to everything to stay alive!

RADIO ANNCR: (FILTER) verboten — forbidden—verboten—(FADE) forbidden—verboten—(CONTINUE FAR BACK BEHIND)

MARION: (ON CUE THRU ABOVE) Ann, all at once I knew why I was crying! What is there in life for somebody just plain ordinary like me? To marry someone you love—

VOICE: (IN CLOSE) Verboten!

MARION: To have children—

VOICE: Verboten!

MARION: To have a home—

VOICE: Verboten!

MARION: To walk in the park with kids—

VOICE: Verboten!

MARION: To—to go shopping on payday—

VOICE: Verboten!

MARION: And if you haven't got the money—window shop—

VOICE: Verboten!

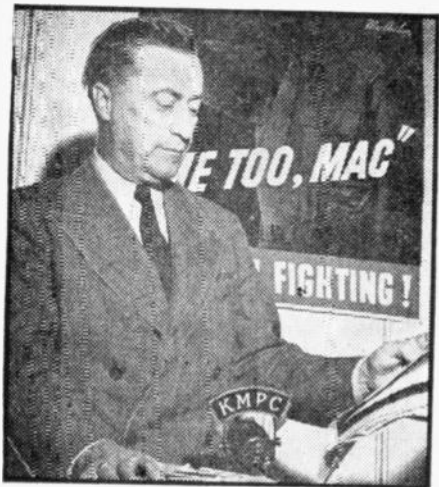
MARION: And see the children growing up and going to school—

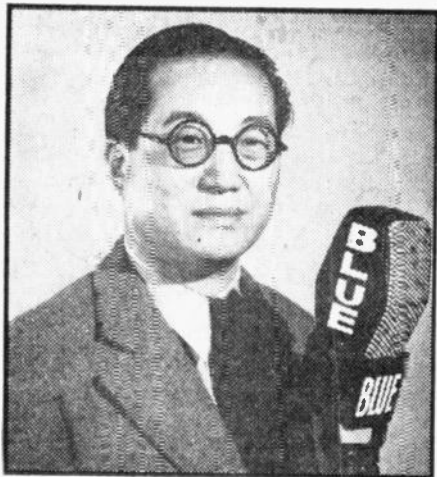

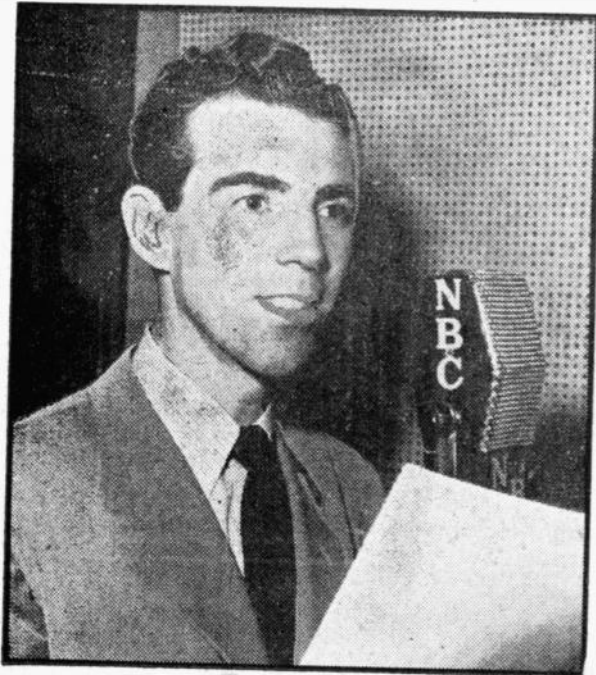

I USED to think a radio announcer was a suave so-and-so who came out on the studio stage just before a show, and by dint of his dapper appearance and so-very-clever remarks lubricated the broadcast into a smooth send-off; that his "work" consisted of delivering commercials in slick style; and that rather than receive plump pay-checks from the broadcasting companies, he should pay them for the privilege of hobnobbing with glamorous stars and for being able to call a big-name "Bing", or "Rudy", or "Jack", or maybe even "Butch".

Now they tell me!

It seems that announcers live a sort of sitting-on-the-edge-of-a-volcano existence and that when they say "It can't happen here", they always have their fingers crossed.

Dresser Dahlstead, chief announcer of the Blue network, considers broadcasts on the construction and opening of San Francisco's two colossal bridges his most thrilling assignments. When the Bay Bridge was halfway finished, NBC did a transcontinental broadcast to describe the spinning of the first cable. Dresser



went a bit dizzy when he first saw the cat-walk he would have to negotiate to reach the first tower where he perched to do his splicing.

After the program, he and his two companions decided to hike over to the central anchorage, where they reached a huge concrete block and discovered a stairway. Flushed with their accomplishments, the trio descended and emerged on a pier right at the water's edge on the base of the anchorage.

They took a few whiffs of saline air, and after looking around the bay a bit, turned the door handle only to find it locked. There they were—

three men on a hunk of concrete, in the middle of San Francisco Bay! You can imagine how stricken they looked as they tried to thumb rides from the busy tug-boats which swished by! One eventually rescued the adventurers.

When the first cable was spun for the Golden Gate Bridge, Dresser remembered his previous exploits and sternly restrained any rugged-individualistic tendencies. He says he'll never forget the 600-foot ascent in a rickety cage which behaved like an incipient earthquake, nor the isolated feeling when he reached the top and saw his mobile unit down below. It looked like a toy auto.

His biggest faux pas took place in the San Francisco studios, where a console was arranged with a chime button which the announcer pressed to give the bong. One morning, Dresser was doing a mild resume of forthcoming programs. It was easy reading, so he leaned his torso on the console.

Immediately, the engineer began to pound on the studio window and make mad gesticulations. Dresser kept on reading, but on the side he made a check-up. Yes, he was on

the air; yes, the mike was open. What the devil was up?

He found out—eventually—that his somewhat stuffy announcements had been enlivened by the steady intonations of the chimes "bong-bong-bong". Studio officials promptly placed a guard on the provoking button.

Albert Tessman, another Blue announcer, attended both bridge openings and stood where the ribbon was cut when Golden Gate bridge was thrown wide for traffic. At such occasions, rivalry between men of the three networks—NBC, CBS, and Mutual—is at acute pitch.

Tessman had a choice spot from which to observe the goings-on. The men from CBS and Mutual thought so, too, because they came wedging in on either side of Albert.

When the thrilling moment approached for the Governor to sever the ribbon, all the notables plunked down right in front of the radio men. They craned and stretched and couldn't see anything. So they ducked and crouched and found that they could observe the momentous ceremonies by peering between the legs of the attending dignitaries. Their excitement naturally accentuated by their uncomfortable positions and visual handicaps, the CBS and MBS fellows vied with Tessman to see who could

outyell the others. Tessman considers that he won the melee. He yelled so loud when he signed off that the Mutual man parroted: "This is the National Broadcasting System!"

It has taken several years for Vic Perrin's face to bleach to a healthy pink from the deep purple color it turned the day he blew off his ideas about members of the Progressive party. Just a brand-new announcer, he was sitting in the foyer of a Madison, Wis., radio station waiting to put a political forum on the air. He made some very pointed cracks about Progressives.

About two minutes before air-time he asked a page boy, in pure facetiousness, to run out on the street and haul in a Progressive, if he could.

Spoke up a woman who had been sitting over in the corner: "I've been waiting here 20 minutes!"

"Your name?" asked Perrin.

"Mrs. Phil La Follette, the governor's wife. Surely you've heard of me!"

Vic says he turned purple. "My heart slipped several notches," he now vows, "and it took all the grace I could muster to show her into the studio. I was so flustered I introduced her as Mrs. Phil Follette. Worst part of it all was that the station was state-owned and operated.

"I put that experience in my pipe and smoked it", reminisces Vic. "I wrote a very humble missive to Mrs. La Follette, received a very generous reply, and since then, have looked before I spoke—if I spoke at all."

Hal Gibney declares that his first horse-race assignment was his last—all because he forgot the name of the Derby winner. Working at Santa Anita with Buddy Twiss and Clem McCarthy, Hal had a minute and a half to close the afternoon's broadcast. He was on transcontinental hook-up.

"I'm standing there with my face hanging out," says Hal, and I rush into a very spectacular resume of the afternoon's meet. "I'm giving the big race the works and finally come to the winner. 'The winner of the Derby', I say, 'that magnificent horse which did a miraculous feat in spurting to victory was—hum—hum—hum—Number 5!'"

"After that", concludes Hal, "I crept quietly home, figuring my career in radio was over. 'Since then I've been strictly an inside man.'"

Now does he know the name of the No. 5 horse? You bet he does! It was Cienega.

Buddy Twiss, NBC's chief announcer once announced the wrong winner for a crew race between the University of California and Washington. "I was stationed on the Fruitvale bridge where it crosses the estuary", relates Buddy, "and was confused by the angle so that California, which was ahead when the crews passed under the bridge, seemed to me to be the winner. I called it that way and finished up the broadcast thinking it

was one of the best jobs I'd ever done. My disillusionment was rapid. Even casual onlookers pounced on me to notify me that Washington had crossed the finish line first.

"Then it was too late. The Associated Press, the United Press, and other news channels picked their dope from me and had already released California as the winner. To top off the incident, Seattle folks wouldn't let me forget and sent some very nasty letters."

One of Buddy's memorable experiences was his ascent to 30,000 feet in the first army supercharged job, the Lockheed Electra. The flight was conducted as a test, with Dr. Lovelace from the Mayo Clinic aboard. He was interested to see how far the plane could go with passengers not wearing oxygen masks and spent the three hours during the ship's climb in tapping the men's chests, taking their pulse, and tabulating reactions.

"The only place my engineer and I could seclude ourselves for a broadcast was the lavatory", relates Buddy. "When we reached 30,000 feet, I was scheduled to go on the air and tell how I felt and what it was like up there. We were huddled together, waiting to climb about 3,000 feet before broadcasting, when in popped the doctor.

"He took our pulse and tapped our chests, then exclaimed: 'It's a wonderful thing we're doing! Only three ships have been made like this. Italy built one. France built one; now we have one. Too bad about the other two. They exploded in mid-air!'"

"Then", says Buddy, "the doctor walked out, leaving us to speculate on our delightful situation and to wonder when we were going to be blown to smithereens. I wasn't terribly coherent when I first went on the air at 30,000 feet. But contact with the ground crew and just hearing myself gab restored my grip.

Not all of Twiss' experiences have been as breathtaking, but we wouldn't catalogue any as dull. There was the time he had to cover a Hollywood canyon fire and persuaded the watchman of a hill-top mansion to let the radio crew use the house-telephone for the release. Buddy went down into the canyon to catch the crackle of the flames and get some real fire into his mike.

Returning later in the evening, Twiss encountered the master of the mansion pacing with austere tread, the living room floor.

"The place looked as if a wrecking crew had just finished with it", Buddy admits, "I started right in to assuage the indignant gentleman. I gave him a wonderful pep talk on radio—the marvels it accomplishes—and told him he should appreciate what radio was doing—scooping the world on hot news like the fire.

"He heard me through, then quietly pulled out his card. The guy was . . .

Just in case there's somebody who hasn't caught on by now, the kid's name is Harry James, of Beaumont, Texas.

Well, when a trumpet tooter from Beaumont can rise from virtual obscurity to national prominence; from 100 bucks a week to 7500, all in the short space of six months, I guess it's time we paused in our perusal of the war news and examined him a little more closely.

He's a slim, good looking and thoroughly personable kid, is Harry James, with a good natured smile and a horn that drips moulten gold.

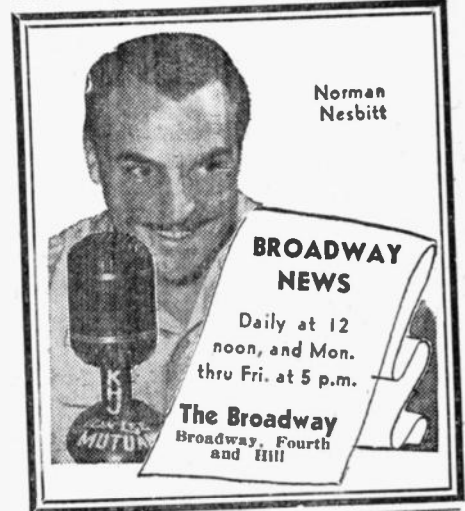

HOW TO CONTROL Magnesium Incendiary Bombs

Readers may wish to clip these instructions and thumb-tack in a convenient place.

1. Have ready for instant use long handle shovel, a hoe, a metal container, bucket or garbage can, a supply of dry sand.
2. Do not approach bomb within 50 ft. until 60 seconds after ignition.
3. Pour sand contents of container on floor beside bomb, leaving, however, 4 inches of sand in container.
4. Take shovel and cover bomb with sand.
5. After bomb is covered with sand slide shovel under bomb, hold on shovel with hoe, and place bomb on pile of sand on floor.
6. Put out fire on floor with more sand.
7. Slide shovel under bomb, using hoe to help, and place bomb in metal container in which 4 inch layer of sand covers bottom.
8. Shovel in balance of sand from floor on top of bomb. Replace lid if garbage can is used.
9. Carry container from house, using shovel as handle.

THE new relationship between the radio industry and ASCAP (remember the "Great Music War"?) has greatly increased the unknown songwriter's chances of getting somewhere with his ditties. Before the formation of Broadcast Music Inc. (maintained by the broadcasters as a competitive stick to hold over ASCAP) the music publishing business was dominated by a handful of big, ASCAP-affiliated publishing companies. They simply put "name" songwriters on contract and didn't even look at the works of new writers.

Today, even the smallest of independent publishing companies and the most unknown of aspiring songwriters have at least a chance of slipping over a successful song.

LOCAL KIDS KLICK

Some of our local townsmen came through from nowhere recently with song hits. Carl Fischer and Bill Carey are cashing in on *Who Wouldn't Love You?* (Kay Kyser's most successful recording at this writing) and Don Swander and June Hershey (Mrs. Swander) did right well for themselves with *Deep in the Heart of Texas*.

Both Swander and Fischer are local pianists, who had been writing songs for years without getting anywhere. They have proven that unknowns can hit the Hit Parade.

And now, just so our little story won't cause some hopeful but untalented person to waste a lot of time or spend a lot of money, here's a tip:

Most people who try and fail pin their hope on one song. They write a song which they think is a world beater (or "just as good as the stuff heard on the air") and spend the rest of their lives trying to get it published.

If you are a songwriter you will write **not one** song but **hundreds** of songs—and you will **keep on writing** them whether you get one published or not. If you've been carrying one song around for years, wailing because the radio orchestra men don't seem to want to play it, our advice is to chuck it in the waste paper salvage bag. It will be more valuable there.

PASSING NOTES

Paul Whiteman and his orchestra will join forces with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra in a Gershwin Memorial Concert here June 18. Guest stars will be Bing Crosby, Harry James, Dinah Shore and the King's Men. PW will also do a Gershwin Memorial broadcast from here before he goes back East . . . Phil Moore, who shares the Bob

Crosby arranging chores with Paul Wetstein, sold two songs to MGM for the picture version of *Panama Hattie*. Phil, one of our top Negro musicians, also directed a recording orchestra for the picture, using white and Negro musicians, the latter including Lee and Lester Young from the Trouville. (Broadcasting nightly via KFVB). A salute to MGM for giving Negro musicians a chance to earn some of that big money in the studios . . . Mary Lee, the former Ted Weems band singer, currently carving out a big name for herself in radio and pictures, came through like the real trouper she is and staged an impromptu show for the radio audience stranded at CBS by the recent black-out. Mary was on the Planters' Peanut program with Tom Breneman and Maurie Amsterdam. Their show started at 9:00 p.m. just about the time the red signal came through.

BITS ABOUT BANDSMEN

Too bad the radio audience missed the show that preceded the Chase & Sanborn broadcast of May 24—we mean Carmen Miranda trying to teach Ray Noble to rhumba (Ray did pretty well at that) and Ray's imitations of Carmen's latinized chatter. . . On one of his "Super Tune" broadcasts (Friday, 3:15, KHJ) Johnny Richards played the official song of Bakersfield High School. Later he got a letter of thanks from the writer of the song, who proved to be a former dance musician who had worked in John's band a few years ago and who is now an instructor at the school Johnny saluted on his broadcast. . . Sterling Young is going strong at the new Louisiana, but he wishes those Mutual broadcasts could go out earlier in the evening. His earliest is 11:00 p. m. BYRD-EALE:

Do you ever wonder where some of our wedding customs come from? Here are just a few of the answers.

The word "bridal" itself comes from "byrd-eale" or bride ale—a special ale that was served at marriage feasts in *ye olde* England.

In Scandinavia it was believed that no marriage would be contracted unless both the bride and bridegroom drank from the same goblet. This act placed a definite seal on their union.

Almost every country seems to have had its wedding cake. As far back as the days of the Anglo-Saxons, it was the custom to give small cakes to each guest.

In Greece the bride's cake was made of sesame seed and honey and part of a quince. This had to be eaten by the bride to show that she was willing to marry for better or for worse, the sweet and bitter food symbolizing the good and bad of married life.

And what wedding guest of the female sex hasn't heard that if she puts a piece of wedding cake under her pillow she will see in a dream the man who is to be her husband!

FROM THE MAIL BAG:

Two of our Consumer Club members have sent in these suggestions, which we know will come in handy one of these days.

Mrs. Mildred Boree writes, "When you do not have a pan that is deep enough for your cake, line the one that you have with heavy wax paper. Let it come up two or more inches above the pan. When you fill the pan, the batter will rise up on the paper as easily as if it were part of the pan."

Mrs. Mary Palm sends in this recipe

for Giblet Sauce as one of her favorites. "Chicken giblets or beef or lamb kidneys may be used. Wash, cut fine and cook in three tablespoons of hot butter about three minutes until tender. Sprinkle with three tablespoons of flour and stir until well browned. Add one and one-half cups of boiling water mixed with two bouillon cubes. Stir until smooth and thick."

STAFF OF LIFE:

Every country has its own kind of bread and so it is, or rather was, with California. When Mexico was first visited by Spaniards, they found the Indians had their own special bread called tortillas. The white men were badly in need of food by this time

and they quickly adopted the tortilla as part of their daily fare.

The colonial period saw many improvements, and of course the tortilla was in for a change. It started out as a rough flat cake made of corn masa which was ground with a metate or Indian stone grinder. - 2 young fryers, 3 1/2 lbs. each
- 8 tbsps. olive oil
- 4 tbsps. minced parsley
- 4 leaves basilico
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1/2 tsp. oregano
- 1/2 lb. of fresh mushrooms
- Salt and pepper

posed of some of John Scott Trotter's best musicians.

Mistress of ceremonies of Your Blind Date is blonde, glamorous Frances Scully who has made a name for herself as an expert commentator on fashions and beauty during the past several years. It was Frances' idea several months ago to build such a program, designed to interest "lonesome soldier boys" in the Southern California sector, and after a five-week trial on the Blue Network's western stations, the chain's biggies decided to give the show a buildup via a transcontinental hookup.

Unique feature of "Your Blind Date" that appeals strongly to the servicemen—as well as the lovely Hollywood and Los Angeles girls who are "drafted" each Monday evening for the occasion—is the after-show entertainment. Immediately following the broadcast, the stage of Studio B is transformed into a huge dance floor with a free juke box blaring forth with the top dance tunes of the hour so that the service-

men can dance with their "Blind Dates."

Two weeks ago when Hostess Scully posted an invitation on the bulletin board at Camp Haan for air cadets to attend the broadcast, more than 800 men posted their names for Blind Date tickets. Straws had to be drawn for the lucky 400 (studio capacity) and into the Radio City parking lot on Vine Street that evening rolled 16 huge U. S. Army trucks laden with servicemen.

The program's sprightly script is created each week by Myron Dutton, Blue Network writer-director, who has demonstrated a happy faculty of being able to coordinate humor, music, drama, and serious notes into a 25-minute spot that is different from anything else on the airlines.

To one lucky mother each week Mistress of Ceremonies Scully gives an opportunity to read her own letter to her own son in the service. This is the "climax" spot of the program, and one of the reasons why the soldiers and sailors who hear the show each week via short wave stations like Your Blind Date.
