Sirs: I wonder if you could not suggest to one of the broadcasting stations the use of a half hour of time for a course in conversational Spanish, at least twice a week? If the English equivalent is given with the Spanish, it should interest Mexican students of English as well as persons studying Spanish. Of course, there is no real substitute for personal instruction in a language, but phonograph records have done fairly well and both are expensive.

Certain types of sponsors might be found to consider this instruction as good a medium for their commercials as some of the alleged music that comes over the air. Instructors in Spanish in one of the local colleges might find this a means of making contact with private pupils, and too, it might be a good subject for a public service feature on some stations.

It is going to be a desirable thing to know conversational Spanish after the war and though one can learn to read it from a book, conversational language can not be so learned.

If you could refer this to one or

more stations likely to be interested, it perhaps would be helpful all around.

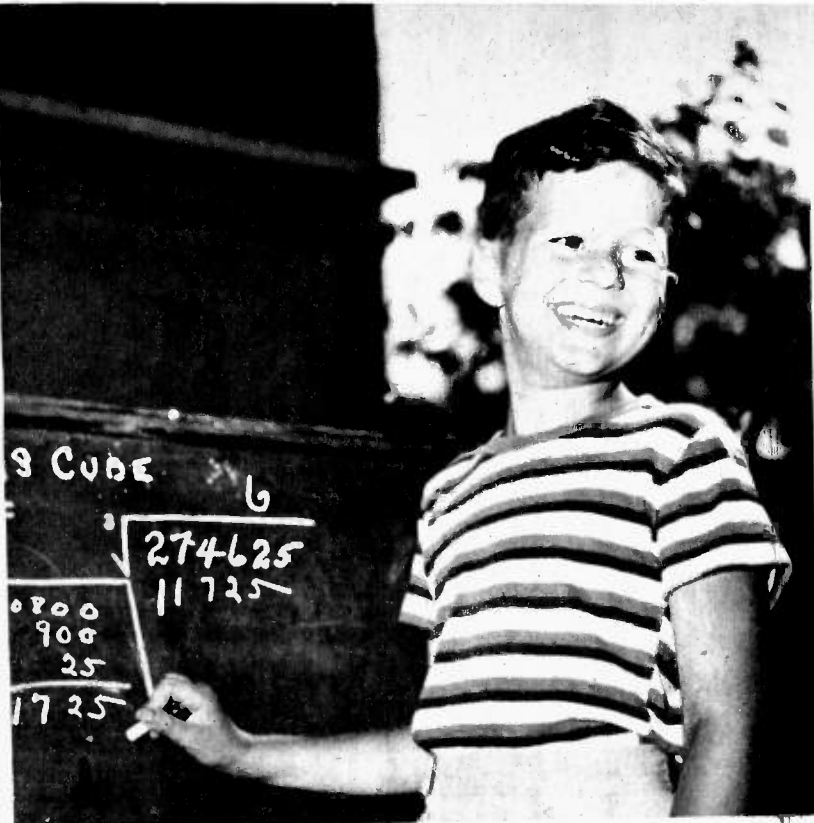

JHAT 13 and 13 make 26 was the astonishing discovery of Joel Kupperman when he was four years old.

To hear him pronounce this mathematical fact pleased Papa and Mama Kupperman immensely. Whenever company came, Joel showed off by adding 13 and 13.

The Kuppermans didn't suspect they had a future Quiz Kid in their family—not even when Joel formed the habit of putting himself to sleep by multiplying by 2.

One thing which would make the Kuppermans oblivious to their child's mathematical propensity is

the fact that Joel's father was, as a lad, quite nimble with figures. There is no doubt he would have been a Quiz Kid if there had been such a phenomenon some thirty years ago.

"Joel's sister, Harriet, is a year older than Joel," Mr. Kupperman informed us one day shortly after the Kupperman family came to Hollywood to fulfill Joel's picture contract.

"Joel used to sit down at the little table opposite Harriet when she copied figures and words. We were obliged to teach him numbers early because he was learning them upside down from looking at her work across the table."

When Joel was finally old enough to go to school, he continually pestered the teacher with mathematical queries. One day, somewhat facetiously, she said: "Why don't you become a Quiz Kid?"

Joel hustled home and wrote the following letter:

"I want to be a Quiz Kid. I can add faster than the man at

the store and get the right answers, too. . .

Love and kisses,
Joel."

"P. S.: My grandfather has teeth he takes out at night, but he is smart."

This after-thought paragraph was provoked by the cracks that Jack Benny had made about Fred Allen's false teeth and accompanying low mentality and meant to infer that not all persons using other than their own grinders were dumb.

That was two years ago. Since that time, Joel Kupperman has been on the "Quiz Kid" radio program 36 times. He is now seven years old, is in the third grade.

"He didn't speak a word until he was a year and a half old," confided Joel's father. "Harriet talked when she was nine months old."

Joel is making up for his infant taciturnity. The other day, when he was honor guest at a press luncheon at Hollywood Athletic Club, he staged a one-boy Quiz Kid show, all the while squirming and putting himself through fascinating acrobatics.

His parents say that his mind works faster than his power of expression, hence Joel's incessant wriggling and his generous use of "um-a" as a filler between words.

With an admittedly high I. Q. (more than 200), Joel didn't bat an eyelash as he was asked to give the cube root of 6859 and 3375, to add (mentally) 12, 45, 26, 63, and 97, or to translate 102 degrees Fahrenheit into centigrade.

In fact, it took the press considerable time and effort to figure out a few questions for Joel. Asked the

formula for finding the area of a circle, he replied: "Well" (sidewise wiggle) "um-a" (hiking up left knee) "pie R square" (head bobbing under table).

Queried about the plot of "The Tempest," Joel sorted into a comprehensive summary which he prefaced by "Well, I fink . . ."

"He knows more about it than we do," muttered one of the press representatives.

Quizzed about Magellan, Joel replied: "He died in the Philippines because he did'nt mind his own biz-ness."

When he could not name the explorer who discovered San Diego bay, Joel did a slow-motion revolution, stated pointedly: "I-a only know—um-a—certain things!"

The one-lad quiz over, Joel was sent out of the room while his parents braved a fistful of questions.

"He's a perfectly normal child," they insisted in unison, "and we want to keep him that way."

The Kuppermans live five blocks from Joel's school, maintain a seven room duplex. "With a swimming pool in back," added Mrs. Kupperman.

"Not a swimming pool like the ones you Californians have," corrected Mr. Kupperman. "Ours is only a five by 11 wading pool."

Apparently, Joel enjoys his third grade work, helps his teacher correct the others' arithmetic papers, and quietly does algebra when he has whizzed through his third grade problems.

The neighborhood children take Joel for granted. Mr. and Mrs. Kupperman hope and pray it will stay that way. His mother is compiling a scrap book of her son's publicity

and magazine stories, but, as yet, Joel has not seen it.

A feature article in a recent issue of Coronet concerned Joel and was entitled "Superman Kupperman." Children in Joel's grade had their attention drawn to the story and started calling Joel "superman."

Ignorant of the source of their epithet, Joel calmly announced: "I am not superman because I don't have hair on my chest and I am not eight feet tall."

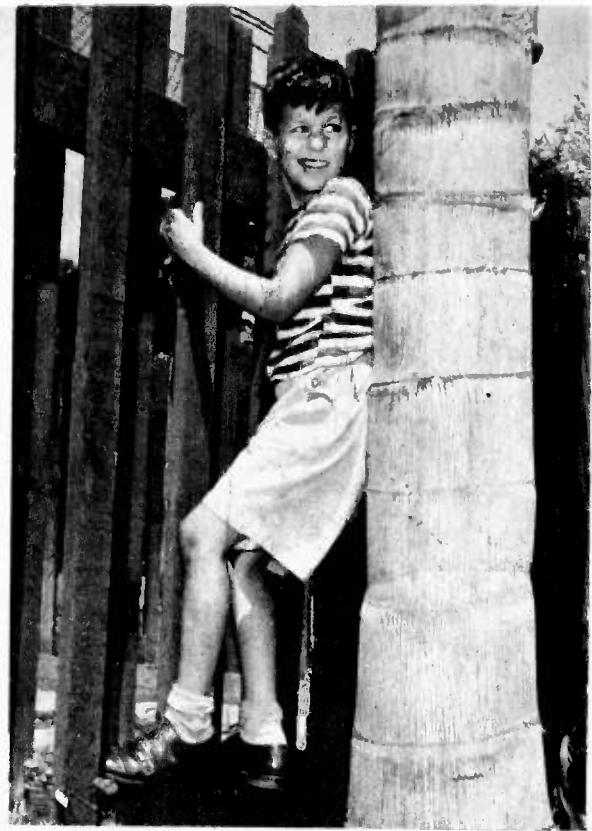
He goes home for lunch, tears into the house as soon as school is out and chokes down a big sandwich before joining the gang. Just now, playing soldier is the thing. Joel and his gang have hide-outs and keep the air ringing with "bang-bang!"

By five o'clock, he must come inside, for there's a bath to be administered before supper, and then an early bedtime at 6:30, for Joel gets up next morning at six. When he was in Hollywood, he was bundled early into bed notwithstanding the fact that "Quiz Kids" aired at 8:30.

Joel appears to lead an ordinary, middle-class life. His parents are in moderate circumstances and Joel's only remuneration for appearing on the Quiz Kid show is a \$100 war bond. His father is an engineer employed by the city of Chicago.

"Joel and Harriet both do eighth grade reading," stated Mr. Kupperman. His first book was Christopher Columbus. He likes movies—Westerns and slap-stick, also newsreels, but we don't let him attend very often because his eyes are weak. And absolutely no comic books."

Little Gaynor's REAL

"Seventh Heaven"

As Adrian's Wife, Robin's Mother and Guiding Star of New Radio Twinklers, Janet Is Enviably Happy Person

A STAR Is Born. Janet Gaynor's last film play. Many rate that picture and "Seventh Heaven" as her two greatest. They gave the actress her own favorite roles.

Today when new stars are "born" in Hollywood, often that first chance to twinkle is on Janet Gaynor's Columbia network radio show. Miss Gaynor, herself, attained radio stardom last summer as new hostess-essence of the program, Columbia's six o'clock Friday nighter, "Hollywood Showcase." She stepped into that role when Mary Astor took over the "Roma Show."

As the name suggests, the program serves to "showcase" new professional talent. It has fulfilled that purpose with phenomenal success these last few months. The program has turned the spotlight of attention upon an impressive array of young screen and radio aspirants.

Fourteen-year-old Suzanne Burse, sensational coloratura soprano, came down from Portland, sang on "Hollywood Showcase," won the judges' favor and a long-time contract for a star build-up with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios. Elois Bright, Hollywood piano marvel, was a September winner who played herself into a screen role in Columbia Pictures' "Cowboy Canteen." Jimmy Cook, another recent winner, went into Tommy Dorsey's band as featured vocalist.

That she can aid in "discovering" these struggling young artists and start them up the ladder to stardom is a source of much personal satisfaction to Miss Gaynor.

Thrills are mutual for the star and the capacity audience which attends each broadcast of the show. To her, the talent program brings back memories of her own early days in Hollywood. To many in her studio audiences, it recalls the days of her numerous screen hits, when she was the idol of millions, a type which had a national vogue. First it was Mary Pickford who became "America's Sweetheart." Ethereal Lillian Gish next won the fans' worship. Then along came doll-like, demure little Gaynor. Theater-goers had a shrine in their hearts all ready for someone about like her, so she just walked in and stayed.

The years have skipped lightly over that small, proudly-held head with the reddish-gold locks. She still is more like a lovely, showcased dolly than a real girl—the trim petite, titian-haired star with the great dark eyes and wistful, heart-shaped face. A tricky, Victory coiffure, with crisp curls about the face, accentuates her intriguing "widow's peak" and dainty, clear-cut features. Now the wife of Adrian, one of Hollywood's foremost designers, Janet is ranked among America's best-dressed women.

As your Radio Life reporter saw her, in her dressing room at Columbia Square, she had a crisp self-assurance quite foreign to her screen and radio ingenue roles. In the presence of the off-stage Gaynor, there was, to us, a constant awareness of Gaynor, the actress—the polished professional's careful, close-clipped diction, poised carriage, alertness to lines and cues. Meeting her brought realization that her film portrayals projected an assumed personality to a much greater degree than we had thought.

Many of Janet Gaynor's screen roles are fraught with pathos and timidity. Do you remember her as "Kathie" in "The Return of Peter Grimm"? Her part required an effect of inwardly weeping, while she smiled. So beautifully performed was this difficult acting feat of smiling through tears that all such emotional expressions were thenceforth described as "pulling a Gaynor." Her real life personality today offers complete contrast to her tragic screen self.

A beautiful home, an adoring husband and a shy, dark-eyed little boy have made "Seventh Heaven" a reality. She radiates happiness.

It took only one question to bring Radio Life up to date on the current bright star of her life. The "half-pint" radio emcee's reply was prompt. "Robin. That's my three-year-old son."

Tells About Son

His full name is Robin Gaynor Adrian. He's a brown-haired, brown-eyed laddie, with an olive skin, who bears some resemblance to both parents. "I'm glad he doesn't have my freckles," his mother remarked.

On the day Radio Life talked to her, Janet was experiencing her first pangs of separation from her child. She had enrolled him in a Toluca

Lake nursery school only the day before.

Radio Life requested a picture of Robin, but his parents have always shielded him from publicity and preferred that our story illustrations include no photograph of him.

Home, for the Adrians, is a large, tile-roofed stucco, of Mediterranean design, so close to the Lakeside Country Club that they're constantly picking golf balls out of the garden. Palm, eucalyptus and fruit trees almost completely hide the house, which stands on level ground. Small neighbor boys frequently drop in to help themselves to the fruit.

Invitation to lolling is the patio, surrounded on three sides by the house, on the third by a garden of tropical plants the Adrians call "the jungle." All three of the Adrians love the huge old pepper tree which shades the patio.

Cool blues and greens predominate in the interior color scheme. Venetian furniture and paintings lend an effect of richness.

Adrian designed the house and its furnishings, had an addition built when he and Janet were married. "But we have many tastes in common and I love the house and the things he chose for it," she says.

The square entrance hall has mirrored walls and brings the outdoors in by means of many growing plants. The full length of the balustrade has a recessed section in which grow small shrubs and trailing vines.

Opening off one side of the hall is the large, long living room, whose high ceiling and rich appointments give it a drawing room air. Two couches, covered with a rough green silk, flank the fireplace. Between them is a table about six feet square, which holds a cactus garden. In an anteroom between living and dining rooms and up a few steps from each is a smaller room in which stands a grand piano, dramatized by a massive crystal candelabra.

French provincial furniture in natural oak has been used with gay chintzes and gleaming damasks in the master bedroom, whose French doors on two sides open onto terraces, overlooking the patio and the side garden. All four walls of the adjoining bathroom are mirrored.

A peek into Robin's nursery reveals a large, sunny room, gay with pastels, its furniture scaled to its small occupant's size. He has scores of books, including the "Oz" series and all of Disney's many toys, too, but not the bewildering array one often finds in such homes. Like youngsters in many less luxurious residences, Robin displays amusing preferences in his playthings. "His favorite is the top of an old bird cage!" laughs Miss Gaynor. "Maybe because he loved the bird so much. And he constantly carries around a couple of dilapidated old dolls."

"I can't say I enjoy housekeeping very much, although I know we're expected to be able to take over all household duties in these war times,"

she confesses. "But I do enjoy staying home."

Can't Cook

She promptly scotched a screen columnist's story that publicists have clung to for years. "NO! I can NOT make wonderful shortbread — or shortbread of any description," she said, with her tinkling laugh. "You may say, if you wish, I can scramble eggs!"

"I enjoy food, all kinds; Russian and French dishes, for variety, as well as plain American cooking. My sweets I like in candy rather than dessert."

Janet's clothes run mostly to suits and tailored or semi-tailored frocks, cut on the smartly simple lines that distinguish Adrian creations but kept feminine with softening touches. She has a strong leaning to wine and

Burgundy tones, can't wear black, popular with so many redheads, perks up most of her costumes with a pin or flower on her left shoulder, seldom wears hats but usually chooses ultra-feminine posy-trimmed "bonnets" when she does.

The star's all-absorbing ambition is to duplicate her film success in radio. We asked her if she thought actresses were born, not made. "I think they are both born and made", she replied. "I don't think it's possible to make *any* girl into an actress. With good training and direction, one *can* vastly improve an innate talent. But the girl must have the spark—that something which is within and finds outward expression. And for a girl with exceptional talent, I believe there's always a place, no matter how tightly closed the doors may seem."

So far, we learned, both the secretary and the elevator service have come through nobly, and the producers still have their hair intact. But will there come a day?

Poll on War

Defeat of Germany by autumn of 1944 and of Japan one year later or approximately Christmas, 1945, is the general concensus of a recent poll, conducted by KNX-CBS news analyst, Harry W. Flannery. The commentator announced the results of the poll on his October 6 broadcast.

Letters and postal cards by the hundreds followed Flannery's request that listeners write and give their opinions on when the war with Germany and Japan would cease. He found that, cumulatively, 87 per cent of the total placed the fall of Germany within the next year. Sixty-eight per cent expect Japan's defeat one year later.

Spring, 1944, is picked by the surprisingly large percentage of 24.3 for Germany's end. Seventeen per cent named summer of next year as the time; 23.4 next Fall. Only a small minority thought it would take longer.

Of those who selected dates in 1945 and previously for Japan's defeat, there was a total cumulative percentage of 68 per cent. Predictions that the war would continue into 1947 were made by a fair number and there were a few who estimated the end would come later, at times ranging from 1948 to 1963.

Most Embarrassing

To that already bulging volume titled "My Most Embarrassing Moment", Jack Kelk has an experience to add to that of other notables. The Homer of "The Aldrich Family" met Dorothy Gish on his recent trip to Hollywood.

Abbott and Costello, top comics of the country, arrived at 7:30 because they wanted that much time for rehearsal. Their show, as you may have guessed, was swell.

On the other hand, the Andrews Sisters arrived at 9:28—exactly two minutes before they were scheduled to go on the air. Johnson was limp, the producer was biting his nails, and everybody was on edge.

Virginia Gilmore took off her shoes, couldn't be comfortable otherwise . . . Francis Lederer didn't want to read his script—didn't even look at it, as a matter of fact. And gave Erskine a new experience in before-the-mike ad libbing . . . Paul Whiteman's wife, Margaret, sat on the sidelines and enjoyed her husband's clowning as much as the rest.

April Fool

Perhaps the worst experience Johnson ever had in his broadcasting career happened last April Fool's day. The boys at the station wanted to have a little fun. All the clocks were set ahead 10 minutes, so were all watches. They dubbed in the last few minutes of what was supposed to be the preceding broadcast, and the studio lights showed the "on the air" signal at 9:30.

The "fun" started when announcer Jimmy Barry blew up in the opening commercial. Johnson, wild eyed, couldn't believe his own ears. Finally, shaking and perspiring, he took over, muttered an apology and proceeded with his news. Then producer Sid Goodwin came running out of the sound booth ranting and raving about the so-and-so announcers. Johnson gave him a despairing glance, motioned for silence, indicated that they were on the air, and then, with Sid outscreeching him, gave up the ghost, walked dejectedly to the other side of the room and sat down. By the time all was peaceful again, it really was time to go on the air.

He says he's never gotten over it!

In case you're interested in statistics, here are a few highlights on Erskine Johnson:

Born in Milwaukee, his parents brought him here when he was two years old. That was 30 years ago. He's never lived anyplace else. Married to Isabelle, the little blonde whose books he used to carry when they both attended Manual Arts High School. They've been married ten years and have two children, Kathleen, not quite six, and Ronnie, a cute little two year old rascal. Erskine and Isabelle look like brother and sister.

Gets up around 8:30 in the morning, never eats breakfast, but gets right to his desk. Doesn't pan people now, but did when he first started

formed," the commentator stated. Their morale is high because the people—70 or 80 million of them—are kept in the dark. In Japan, a radio set is a luxury. Most broadcasting is done with loud speakers in department stores or on the streets.

"We must destroy the emperor myth—that force which holds the Japs together," he emphasized. Next to bombing, he thinks cutting Japan's supply lines is the most effective way to win the war. Her weakness is not oil—she has plenty of it now—but in manufacturing of machine tools and in steel. He laid stress on the importance of armament, warned that the Jap army is strong: "For eight or ten years Japan sent raw recruits to China and got back veterans."

When concentrating his remarks on Japan Wells is extremely interesting to Pacific Coasters, but one must remember that he is just as familiar with the rest of the globe. This priceless knowledge is being used as background material for his NBC commentation series, aimed to tell the folks at home about that part of the world in which their boys are fighting. Africa was chosen as the first country to be air-picturized for Wells' listeners because it is our present base of operations and dominantly rich in strategic materials. Other places will come under the analyst's scrutiny as requests from listeners point the way. He realizes that censorship prevents many men from writing home in detail; that it means much to relatives to know of their fighting men's locale. If Radio Lifers would like information about any nook or cranny of the world where their boy may be—they may drop the magazine a line and your

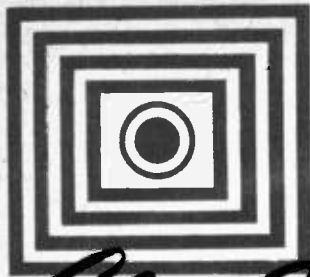
ACT SLEEPY? EASY

THE war with Japan may last a generation!

This was the startling prediction made the other day by NBC's new commentator, world-trotting Carveth Wells. Comfortably ensconced at Radio City, with a world map serving as a significant backdrop, distinguished looking Wells continued: "But if Russia comes to our assistance and gives us bases, the war with Japan could be finished within six months." (Six months after we really begin to concentrate on the Pacific phase of the war.)

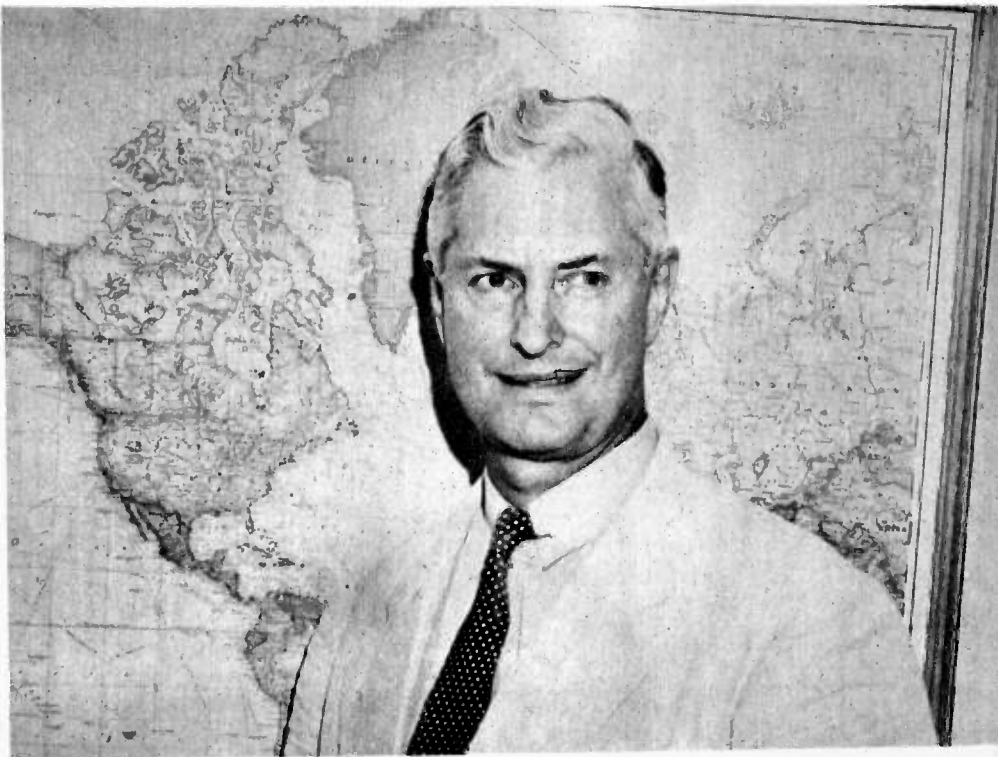
Wells draws his observations first hand. No arm-chair traveller, he has skirted the world four times, has crossed the United States fifty times, has set foot on every country in the world except one.

"I've never been in Australia," he admitted.

He believes that we are doing the right thing by quelling our European enemies first, because Africa is vital to us as a source of strategic raw materials.

"They may call the United States the arsenal of democracy. That is misleading," Wells pointed out, "because there are 14 strategic materials we must import in order to fabricate our weapons."

The analyst rattled off all 14, emphasizing each by counting it off on his fingers: Rubber (from Malaya, Africa) Tin (Malaya, South America) Tungsten (China, Africa) Hemp (Philippines) Quinine (Java) Mica (India) Coconut (Philippines) Antimony (China) Chromium (Africa) Manganese (Africa, India) Mercury (Mexico, Spain) Nickel (Canada) Quartz (Brazil, Madagascar).

As Wells enumerated the list, he explained the uses of some of the materials. We learned that coconut is vital because charred shells are used for gas masks. Antimony goes into tracer bullets. Mercury, into explosives. Nickel, into armor plate. Quartz into electrical equipment.

According to Wells, we should have known that a war with Japan was pending, because up to 1940 that country was importing huge quantities of quartz.

He sizes up the Japanese situation from recent first-hand appraisal un-

der most unusual circumstances. As late as 1939, he was given free rein to travel the length and breadth of Japan when he was engaged to explore some of the empire's lesser known territory. What is more, he was paid for this research by the Imperial government.

After the attack on Pearl Harbor, Wells turned over photographs and information—obtained at Nippon's expense—to the United States.

"The Japanese nation is about the easiest in the world to keep unin-

IT'S a marathon for Erskine Johnson, broadcasting columnist, this week. In addition to his own five air shows and six columns, he appeared on Quiz Kids program, on Tuesday emceed world premiere of "Behind the Rising Sun" in lobby of Pantages Theater, yesterday did stint as radio announcer in W. R. Frank production, "Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, His Life and Loves," and tomorrow will interview Joan Bennett on weekly show, "People are Funny."

The above, which appeared in Daily Variety a few days ago, will give a rough idea of the kind of life Erskine Johnson lives. But he thrives on it, and one thing's certain—he can't say he didn't ask for it. All his life he's had one ambition: to become a newspaper man.

Even as a kid, when his less serious-minded playmates were busy scalping each other and whooping it up in Wild West fashion, Erskine was concocting new and better (he hoped) ways of writing about it. In that respect, he hasn't changed a bit. For, although he's developed his own style of writing, he still digs around for news out of the beaten path. "Human interest stuff" he calls it, and passes up many a good production scoop in favor of a little-known fact in the life of Hollywood's great or near-great.

"The stories that make Hollywood—or any other town—tick," he explains, "are not the screaming headlines, but the little publicized everyday things that could have happened to you or your next-door neighbor. I believe that's what the fans want to hear, and that's what I try to give them." And he does.

It was in 1937 when he was working as a reporter for NEA that Erskine confided to managing editor Lee Payne of the Daily News that he'd like to do a Hollywood column. Payne gave the nod and the boy who had come up the hard way through the lines at the old Record, City News Service and NEA, was launched on a new career.

His column began to catch on and one night, after he'd been in bed and asleep for hours, the phone rang and William Randolph Hearst was offering him a spot on his paper, the Examiner, with a yearly contract. When Erskine accepted, he discovered that the astute Hearst had the contract already drawn up.

A few months before the third year was up, several local columns were juggled around and in the shuffle Erskine was out.

Then he remembered those screwball writers, Gene Towne and Graham Baker, who had offered him a job should he ever need one. As good as their word, they hired him as

press agent for their RKO production, "Little Men."

Definitely inspired, Erskine suggested to Gene that they contact the Borden Milk Company and offer a movie contract to Elsie, the contented cow whose likeness graced the pages of national magazines. It was good for a couple of lines in the papers they figured, so the offer was made.

But the gag backfired, for next day came a wire from the Borden people (who recognized a good publicity stunt when they saw one) accepting the proposition. So they had a cow on their hands! With pomp and ceremony Elsie was shipped to Los Angeles in a deluxe car, with Borden footing expenses of course. She was met at the station by a delegation worthy of any celebrity. A city father even presented her with the key to the city — which she proudly wore on a chain about her plump neck!

She was feted at Ciro's, had a hat especially designed for her, and gave an ice cream (Borden's of course) party on the lawn of the Ambassador Hotel.

Unfortunately, Elsie stepped from a truck and broke her neck shortly after the picture had been completed. There are those ungracious enough to say that Elsie had finally seen the film, "Little Men" in which she had a featured role. But we doubt if it was that bad.

Today, in his knotty pine den, and close by his typewriter, Erskine has a most cherished photo which beams bovinely down on him. It bears these words: "To Skinny Johnson who has given me more kindness than I deserve, with deep appreciation, Elsie."

Of course, after the Elsie episode, there was nothing left for Erskine but to go back to writing a column. No press agent could top himself on an assignment like that!

Now, in addition to being NEA's Hollywood correspondent with 600 outlets, he has had for the past 18 months, his own radio program over KECA, where he dishes out local gossip and interviews Hollywood song writers, promising newcomers, oldtimers, stars, directors and writers.

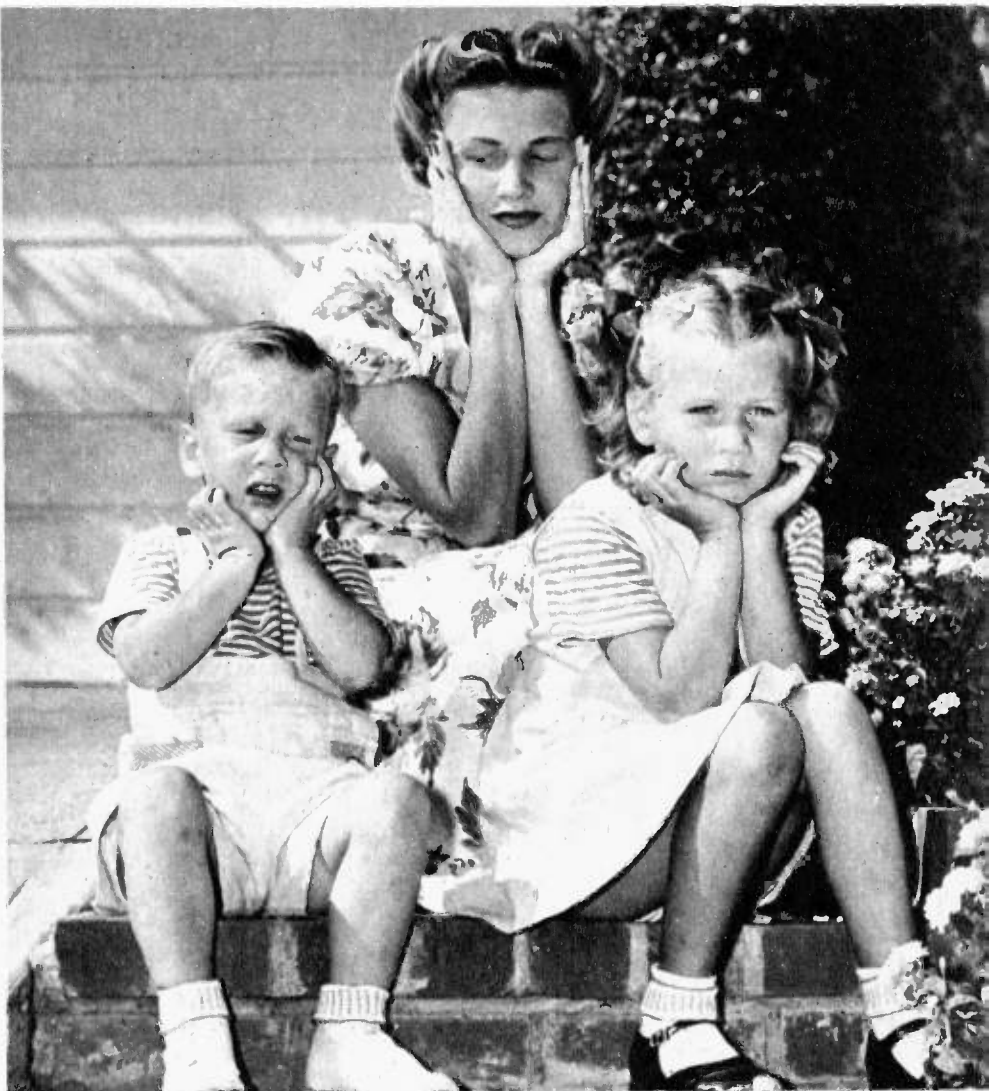
Presents Favorites

He has brought to the mike such oldtime favorites as Clara Kimball Young, Mae Marsh, Betty Blythe, William Farnum, Buster Keaton and Mary Carr. Among the newcomers he thought promising, and who have since fulfilled his prophetic judgment are Maria Montez, Gus Schilling, Jare Farrar, Lon McAllister, Julie Bishop, Cheryl Walker, Belita and Donald O'Connor.

Several songs which have later been heard on the "Hit Parade" had their first airing when he interviewed the songwriter. These include Frank Loesser's "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition," Jimmy McHugh's "Comin' In On A Wing and A Prayer," and Ted Grouya's "In My Arms".

SINATRA was a reporter. That's the job he tossed away the night he heard Bing Crosby sing. "I'd write reams of copy and they'd cut it to an inch and a half, anyway," he remarked ruefully.

He calls the night he heard Bing "The Night of the Great Decision."

So he started to sing. It was in a little New Jersey tavern that his present press agent, George Evans, first heard him as the dance band came on the air by remote control. George, who has handled singers like Russ Colombo, sensed instantly that this new kid was a comer.

Sinatra has built his present style from studying hundreds of phonograph records, always looking for a song quality as he listened. That quality he calls Sincerity. When he first sees lyrics, he reads them as if they were poetry. Then when he sings, he endows them with a deep, personal meaning and clear diction. It took him a long time to develop phrasing. Calisthenics, boxing and deep breathing developed his lung capacity so he can take huge hunks of air and sing extended passages on one breath. He started sniffing air and found all he could take was .4 or 15 whiffs. Then he'd have to exhale. Practice increased his lung capacity to 48 whiffs.

"I know my throat expanded," he pointed out, "because I used to wear a 14 collar and now I take a 15."

He doesn't sing "from the diaphragm," has never had a lesson in his life.

Frank's fans, for the most part, fall into the 14-21 age group, although children of eight or nine and older men and women are admirers.

"There is a standing offer which I will make and deposit in any bank for \$1,000 in cash to be donated to any chosen charity, if anyone can prove in any manner that anyone ever was paid or any gift was given to anyone for swooning, screaming, yelling, or putting on any other exhibition for Frank." He added: "The proof doesn't have to be too conclusive, either!"

A glimpse at Frank's fan mail is illuminating. Wrote a Kansas City girl: "I am not a 'breathless babe in bobby socks.' . . . In fact, I don't own a pair. I'm eighteen years old and I admire your singing very much. Really your personality was the thing that won me to Sinatra. You seemed so natural, just like anyone else who doesn't have all the fame you do."

Wrote an Army private: "Keep up the good work and if you get any smoother, you will drive all the fems nuts and I don't blame them much."

Wrote a Massachusetts girl to Mrs. Sinatra: "Lots of love to you and to Mr. Sinatra."

Wrote a Texan, who clipped some Texas "green" grass to the top of her letter: "I admit I'm one of your 'teen-age fans. I'm fifteen, but I don't gap, and howl and swoon. I wish you all the luck in the world . . . you're a swell fellow who deserves it."

Wrote a "government girl" in Washington, D. C.: "For the past two years I have been one of your loyal fans and I intend to go right on being one. I saw you down at the Watergate and I enjoyed the program immensely, although I nearly got my clothes torn from me as I tried to get a closer look at you."

Wrote a "married woman with two small daughters": "This is just a line of gratitude for your wonderful singing and program from one of the 'oldsters.' . . . If the majority of your fans range from 14 to 18, then I guess that makes a 23-year-old sound rather antique."

Wrote a Marine: "We are in Hollywood after four months in the Pacific theater. We had some recordings out there, and Sinatra's were the most popular."

But we're getting ahead of our story. As you recall, Sinatra's big break came when Harry James engaged him as soloist with his band in June, 1939. You may recall, too, that James is an ardent baseballer and heads his bandsmen in an expert team. "First thing he asked me was whether I could play ball," grinned Frank. "It was assumed that I sang. I played short-stop."

"In December, 1939, I went to Dorsey," he continued. "It was a Christmas present."

Meanwhile, on February 4, 1939, Frank married the girl friend, Nancy. "Getting married," commented Sinatra, "brought me everything in the world." "Everything" includes three-year-old Nancy and another baby due in December. "It's

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got to be a boy," the singer emphasized.

After reaching top salary of \$175 a week, Sinatra left Dorsey on October 1, 1942. Dorsey, however, still owned a third of Sinatra, which was recently bought back by Frank, who handed over \$35,000 and Music Corporation of America, which anted \$25,000. Frank will haul in a neat sum this year, estimated at a quarter of a million to half a million. But taxes will eat a pretty big hole in the take.

He wants to become an institution, to build for the future. Contrary to reports printed elsewhere, he does not use the third person in talking of himself—"Sinatra thinks, Sinatra doesn't like it." "I like to use 'we,' he explained ("We" embracing his beloved arranger, Axel, Evans his press representative, Herb, his manager, Gertrude his secretary.)

His first big venture in movies was a kick. He saw the daily rushes and was appalled to discover what the side of his face looked like, how his mouth moved when he sang, how the smile wrinkles gathered around his eyes. "But radio is my first love," he insisted, "and I want a show all my own."

Probing his status with Lucky Strike, we learn that his contract has another year to run.

He hopes to continue in radio, recording, and movies, knows he has a lot to learn before he can turn on the histrionics for the screen.

"Some of the scenes in 'Higher and Higher' called for my acting confused. That wasn't too bad. I go around confused most all the time," he added facetiously.

He is due back here November 1 for another picture and plans to bring Mrs. Sinatra and Nancy with him. They remained home in the 10-room house at Hasbrouck Heights, Jersey, while Frank was here during August and September. He called them frequently on the telephone and experienced an especially huge bang from hearing small Nancy's voice pipe, "Hello, daddy," over the wire. "Then she'd bang down the receiver and run for her mother," Frank chuckled. While in Hollywood, he bought lovely dresses as a gift to take home to small Nancy and purchased exquisite things for the expected newcomer. For Wife Nancy, he secured a gold charm bracelet dangling with miniature musical instruments, each set with a small ruby.

Frank, himself, goes in for casual sportswear, wearing soft shirts, sports jackets, ties only occasionally, but invariably bow ties. "I call fussily dressed men or women 'over arranged,'" he quipped.

"Ties are like pipes," he commented. "I pass by a window display of ties and always have to go in to see if they have something I don't have." He has about 35 pipes in his collection, paid as high as \$22 for one of them, but likes his \$1.50 smoke better than any other.

Sinatra is five foot eight and weighs only 138 pounds, gives a casual onlooker the impression of being frail. On the contrary, he is careful to keep himself in good shape and has fixed up part of his garage as a gym where he spends spare moments in his favorite sport—boxing.

"Frank is so good that a lot of fellows won't put on the gloves with him," a friend whispered.

The singer also likes to swim, plays tennis, and is an ardent fight, baseball, and professional football fan. Talking about the World Series, he said: "Of course I always root for Brooklyn."

Appearing in Hollywood Bowl was the biggest moment of his short career. "I've never been so thrilled," he stated. Those who were backstage that night saw tears trickle down his cheeks after he had finished his numbers. Instead of accepting all the fabulous invitations thrust at him, Frankie stole away to his apartment at the Garden of Allah, changed from his evening clothes, and sat around with a few close friends while some records were spun.

Although his fans crowded around him everywhere Sinatra was to be spied in Hollywood, he was in apparent control at all times. During his radio broadcasts when commotion arose, all he had to do was hold up one of his slim, pale hands to bring immediate respect. He admitted, however, that at the preview of "Behind the Rising Sun" where he appeared for an air premiere, fans mistook a young man in bow tie and checked coat for Frank.

"There goes Sinatra!" howled the fans, who mobbed the singer's unfortunate "double," and tore his coat to shreds.

It is to be doubted that the so-called "swooner-crooner" will "go high hat." "I've been hungry too many times," he explained, "I can't forget when James' band was stranded here in Los Angeles. We didn't get any pay for three weeks. And me with a wife who had a baby on the way!" "My father was still sore at me," he continued, "so we couldn't ask him to help us out."

How does Frank's father react now? Well, he doesn't say much while his boy is around, but as soon as the singer leaves his parents' home, Father S. opens up with a barrage of paternal praise.

Last spring, Frank travelled over to Hoboken to take his dad some tickets for the "Hit Parade."

"Father drives a fire truck," he explained, "and I went to the station. He had a clock that he wanted to give me for our new home, but it was upstairs in his locker. So we went up. Before he knew what he was doing, he had thrown the locker door open. It was plastered with pictures of me, clipped from magazines and newspapers."

He was awfully embarrassed.

"You don't want to see that stuff,"

he said quick-like, and slammed the door.

Frank's mother has amassed a ponderous scrap book, is equally proud of her son.

Of course, all the publicity is not favorable. There have been caustic articles in several national magazines. Many persons are inclined to believe anything they read about someone who suddenly (or seemingly so) comes into the money. We admit we were intrigued by these "candid" articles—until we talked face to face with Frank.

He isn't good looking, but there is a certain wistful, sweet quality about him which is attractive. "Boyish" is used most frequently to describe it. Others have said he looks as if he needed "mothering."

He has been criticized for being conceited. "Being conceited" is an indefinite quality, or the lack of it. Frank may have had on company manners when we saw him, but he didn't show any more conceit than any one else in his place would have. He spoke gratefully and lovingly of his wife, adoringly of his baby daughter, appreciatively of his co-workers, tolerantly of his critics. "They have a right to their opinions," he granted. "When the critic dies down, so does a guy's popularity."

He has been called "dumb." We were delighted to hear him talk business and to voice substantial opinions. "When I get tired of singing for the public or when the public gets tired of hearing me sing, I want to be a recording or radio executive," he glowed.

A few months ago, he was called to the offices of William Paley, president of Columbia Broadcasting System. Ushered into the executive's suite, Sinatra, by his own admission, gaped admiringly at the smart, business-like appurtenances of big enterprise.

Then and there, he coupled his wagon to his star. Grasping Paley's hand, Sinatra nodded in the direction of the elaborate set-up and exclaimed: "That's for me!"

HOW TO COOK AN ONION:

Or did you know there was an art to so simple a thing as cooking onions properly—so that you keep them good to look at and good to eat? And don't ever let anyone tell you that it doesn't matter how they look. The appetite lives or dies on account of just such things.

Now take Monsieur Onion . . . here's what you do:

Peel off the thin outside skin that covers the first moist layer of the onion. If they are small enough, cook them whole in one inch of boiling water for 30 minutes. Cut larger ones in halves, and use the same process for cooking, but shorten the time. Boil until just tender, which should take about twenty minutes.

This semi-steam-cooking will

keep onions crisp and sweet as well as preserve their nutritive value.

THE BREAKFAST SERIAL:

The "breakfast serial," Dear Reader, is something that you eat, more commonly (and correctly) spelled "cereal." But besides being a wonderful opportunity for a pun, our modern cereals have so many and varied uses that it would take at least a half-a-dozen chapters of a book to really do them justice.

So just consider this little item as chapter one—to be continued.

Try cereals for more than a breakfast food. They are one of our best sources of energy, to say nothing of their vitamin and mineral content, and they can be combined with almost all of our protein foods. Cereals can be

used with eggs, fish, meat and cheese, to name a few.

For example, add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup rolled oats (for every pound of oxtails) in your favorite oxtail soup. Add the oats right after you put the vegetables in, and allow the concoction to simmer for about 30 minutes.

Serve creamed tuna on crisped rice cereals. These may also be used deliciously as soup croutons.

By all means, use enriched flour, one of our newer cereal combinations, whenever possible. It can round out the nutritive value of many a meal. Another flour that is especially rich in protein is soy flour. Use it to add to the nutritive value of such dishes as griddle cakes, etc.

These are just a few of the ways you can use cereals, and we'll add to your list as time goes on.

Recipe for Victory Meat Loaf

| 1 pound of beef from the
chuck. | 1 small onion |
| $\frac{1}{4}$ pound lamb | 2 cloves garlic |
| $\frac{1}{4}$ pound pork | 1 sprig parsley |
| 4 tablespoons of peanut oil | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 2 eggs | $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon pepper |

First grind the beef, the pork and the lamb. Then mix with the eggs. Add six slices of day old bread which have been previously soaked and squeezed. Then mince very fine the onion, the garlic and the parsley, and mix with the meat, eggs, and bread, and $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons of peanut oil. Season with salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and put in a baking pan. Bake at 325 Deg. F. for 1 hour and 15 minutes.
