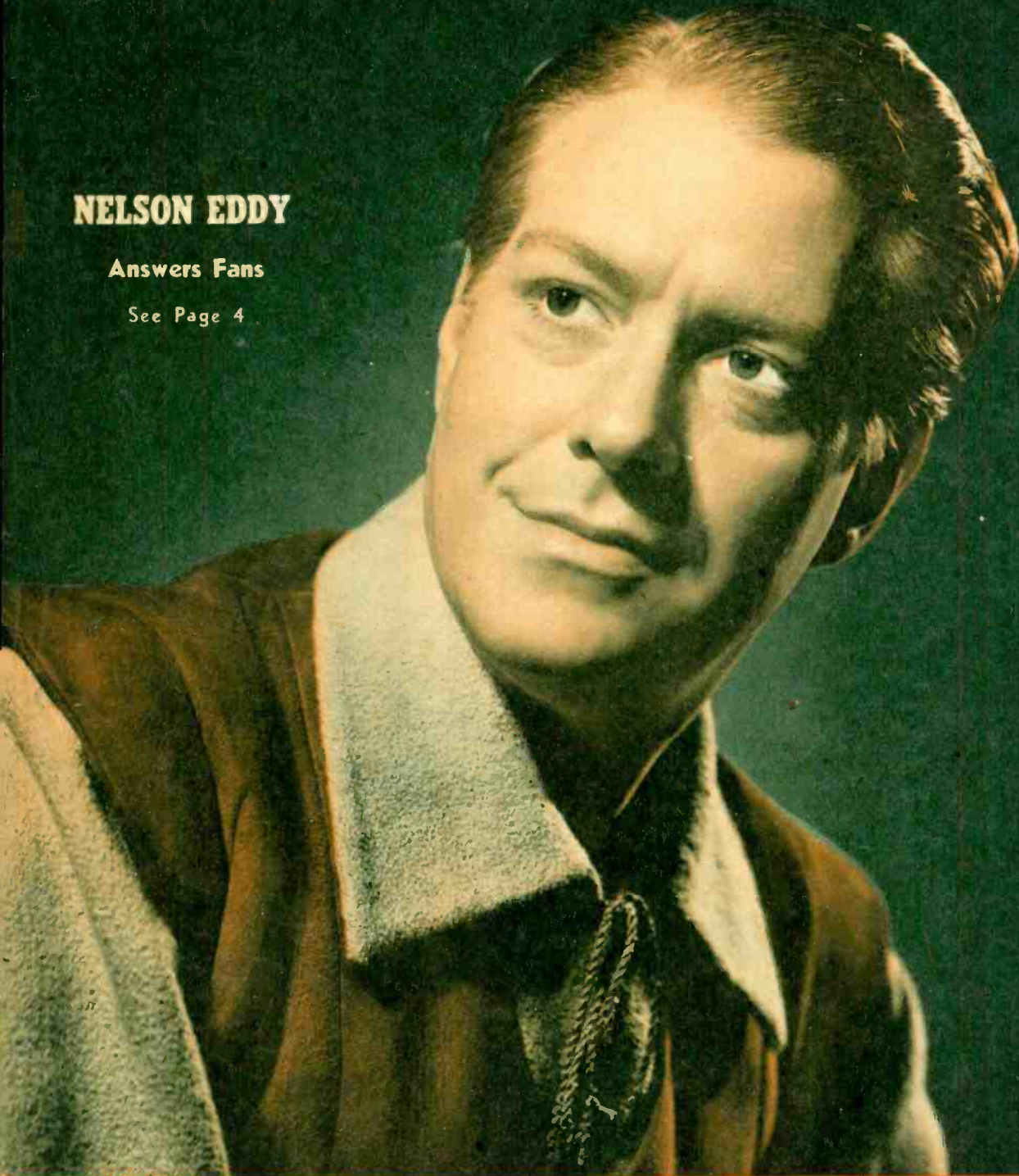

**T**HOSE who hold that screen and radio fame is fun but fleeting have never met a fan club president! The so-called fickle public is not only not fickle, it's almost overwhelming when it organizes itself into a club for the purpose of displaying its sincere affection for "the Star."

For example, take Mr. Nelson Eddy. Nelson's amazing fans belong to two well-organized groups, The Nelson Eddy International Club and The Nelson Eddy Music Club. Nelson gives his fullest cooperation to his clubs, and their two journals, "Golden Notes" and "Shooting Star," abound in many delightful personal notes and comments from the star that are hard to capture in the usual newspaper or magazine interview. A page of questions submitted by the fans is answered in Nelson's own handwriting and contains such interesting and sometimes surprising replies as the following:

Q. What do you consider your most valuable possession?

A. "Happiness."

Q. If you could live your life over would you choose the same career?

A. "I probably wouldn't choose—but let it come and get me!"

Q. What radio programs do you enjoy most?

A. "Symphony and symphonic recordings."

Q. Have you read much of Shakespeare?

A. "Yes—all."

Q. Is it true that you have one of the largest privately-owned musical libraries in the country?

A. "I doubt it."

Q. Is it true you have the largest pewter collection in California and one of the largest in the country?

A. "I doubt it."

Q. What things do you enjoy collecting?

A. "I've gotten over 'collecting'!"

Q. Who composed the excerpt from "Mephistopheles" in "Make Mine Music"?

A. "N. Eddy."

Q. Did you write the words and music for the "Pagliacci" excerpt?

A. "Yes."

Nelson gives his personal attention to all other letters from his audience. Questions asking about his future movie and radio plans, his advice about a singing career, information on his recordings are all carefully noted and answered. Many of the letters reveal that the writer was first inspired toward a successful career in singing by hearing Nelson in a movie or on the air, and many others aver that listening to the Eddy voice started them toward an appreciation of classical music. His fan clubs have sponsored the Nelson Eddy Club's Scholarship at the Juilliard School of Musical Art in his honor.

At present Nelson is heard on the air on the "Telephone Hour," distinguished program of classical music. Together with violinist Jascha Heifetz, Eddy is the only artist who is scheduled for four regular broadcasts a year on this fine orchestral program. His next two appearances are set for November 4th and February 17th.

Heifetz appears exclusively on "Telephone Hour" as does Maggie Teyte, famed English soprano. Fritz Kreisler made his first radio appearances on this program. Pianist Josef Hofmann, seldom heard on the air, is scheduled for a return broadcast in January. Bing Crosby sang his first program of serious music as a "Telephone Hour" guest artist. On December 2nd, Artur Rubenstein makes his first appearance on the show.

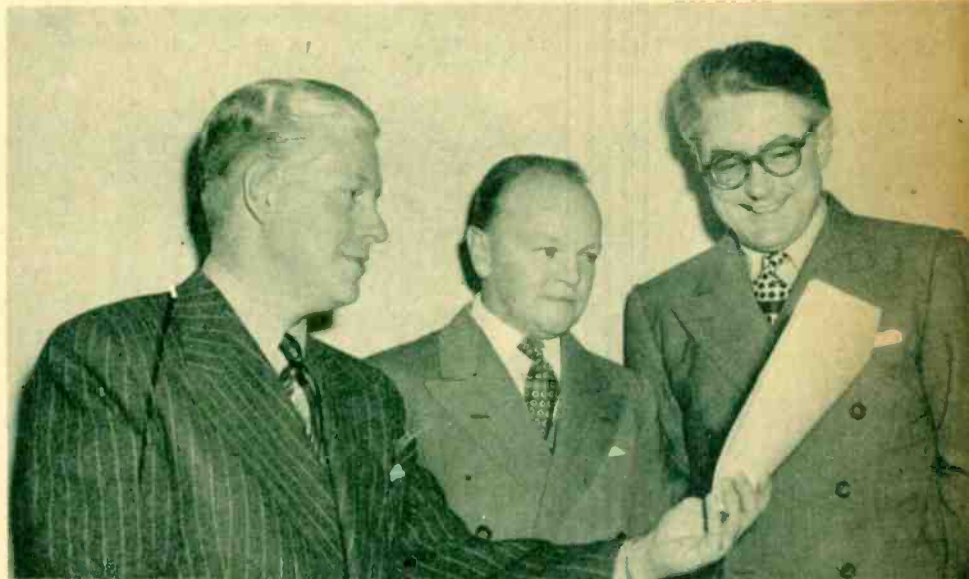

### What the Man Said

Radio Life's recent article "Let's Give Radio Back to the Listeners" is still bringing letters into the editorial office. Producer Bill Lawrence certainly pegged a sore situation with numberless at-home fans when he advocated a re-emphasis of objectives in broadcasting. For too long a time, he asserted, radio shows have been slanted toward the small studio audience and have ignored the huge, outside dialing audience, by far more important.

The reason we're mentioning this subject again is the return of the old guard shows to the air lines. Several times in the past few days we know that you have, like us, heard riotous laughing in the studio audience — laughter that had no logical foundation in the lines which had been spoken and which, therefore, must have been instigated by antics and facial expressions of the performers, oftentimes resorting to mugging to put over a weak joke.

We though Bob Hope was guilty of this procedure the other night. He's a great performer, a master showman, but we wondered if all those strenuous years in which he gave so liberally of his time and talents to personal appearances before the Armed Forces hadn't affected his mike outlook. He can wring a laugh from any audience and squeeze a gag dry by visual clowning, but when he does, it's the studio audience which benefits and what do the millions at home get? A lot of laughing and yelling they're at a loss to understand.

Someone kiddingly remarked that he hoped a new listening technique wasn't in order to get the most out of some comedy programs when you're sitting at home. This person said he was going to get a large picture of Bob Hope and prop it up on top his radio. Then, as the program went on the air, he was going to recall all he could about "Monsieur Beaucaire," "Road to Utopia," etc., summon all the powers of his imagination and concentrate on Bob's magically comical face. "Put it all together," he observed, "and it'll spell the kind of laughter for you at home that it does for the lucky ones present at the broadcast. Thus you make up the unfair difference."

# Radio Lifelines



By Evelyn Bigsby

**ONE GAL'S TWO-BITS WORTH:** We don't own a halo, so any criticism of the blue-ish lines which have been tossed out over the ether the past week is meant only as a constructive suggestion to radio and its performers. Phil Harris was responsible for a couple of off-color "gags" on his first show. So was Rudy Vallee on his previous Tuesday night's airing. They are just two of several recent offenders. We think the censors should have blue-pencilled these lines. We know it's often difficult for continuity acceptance editors to spot suggestive lines—sometimes, as in the case of one line of Eddie Cantor's script the other night, we thought it wasn't the words but his timing that made them significant. We have high hopes for Phil and Alice Faye... we want to see them succeed glowingly with their own program. But there's a doubt in our mind about combining a home situation-type comedy and Phil's well-known, brash character he's built up on the Benny show. Personally, we'd rather stick to Ozzie and Harriet's dial. They've tapped the formula for being amusing without being risqué and we'll set their script and performance of Sunday, September 29, (the hall tree-lamp merry-go-round) against any other family type comedy scripts aired this season.

If performers only knew that their resort to blue gags to get laughs hurts not only themselves, but all radio and its listeners, they'd probably reconsider. One well-known comedienne who's had double-entendre lines put in her mouth for many years, made an observation to Radio Life the other day. She said she had never thought much about it until she recently traveled across the United States. When she saw the millions of little American homes dotting the country and realized that in these homes millions of families gathered around their radios, she automatically became a convert to clean scripts and clean delivery.

**REGULAR EPIDEMIC:** This comment, too, is meant constructively rather than critically. We wonder how many of you listeners have had the same reaction as we've had since the fall shows have been flooding back, bringing with them the torrents of guest stars. We hear a show on Sunday and the star does his stuff. Tuesday night we flick the dial and there he is again, "guesting" on someone else's show. His material sounds as if it were written by writers other than his own, hence falls short of usual expectations. We catch another show on that same Sunday. Before the week is out, the star is guesting on another program. Why bother to tune in to a favorite star's regular show if you can hear him any old time? It's too much and we think the old law of supply and demand will become, if it has not already, operative as regards radio talent. Same as meat and sheets and kleenex and any other commodities.

**WHEN A GIRL MARRIES:** In the "Gildersleeve" script, "Leila Ransome" was getting married this week and in real life the girl who portrays "Widow Ransome" was preparing to do likewise. For on Thursday, Oct. 11, all her radio parts written out or taken by other actresses, blonde Shirley Mitchell boards the train for Toledo, where she will be married on November 23 to Dr. Julian Harold Frieden of New York City. Shirley met him on a blind date last summer in Toledo. He's a specialist in stomach surgery and spent two and a half years in the Navy as a lieutenant-commander. We chatted with Shirley in her NBC dressing room last Wednesday during a break in rehearsal and she excitedly told us of plans for her wedding (400 guests at Toledo's Commodore Perry Hotel, harp music, Anita Ellis and Kitty Kallen flying back to sing, six bridesmaids in blue and the maid of honor in fuchsia, Shirley in ivory satin and rose point lace). But we knew, too, that she was sad about leaving radio, temporarily, at least.

We remember when she first came to Hollywood five years ago. Shirley couldn't reach first base landing a radio role here until some big star suddenly took sick and Shirley was rushed in to substitute at the last minute. She delivered a terrific part, got her break. During the past five years she has steadily made her way to the top bracket of supporting players—"Alice Darling" on the "McGee" show, "Barbara Wetherby" on Joan Davis, "Phoebe Peabody" on Jack Carson, "Shirley Ann" on Vallee, "Cindy Lou" on Groucho Marx, "Scarlett O'Harrigan" on the Davis-Haley, "Maggie" on the Skelton

The Mutual program is in addition to these other Gospel broadcasts.

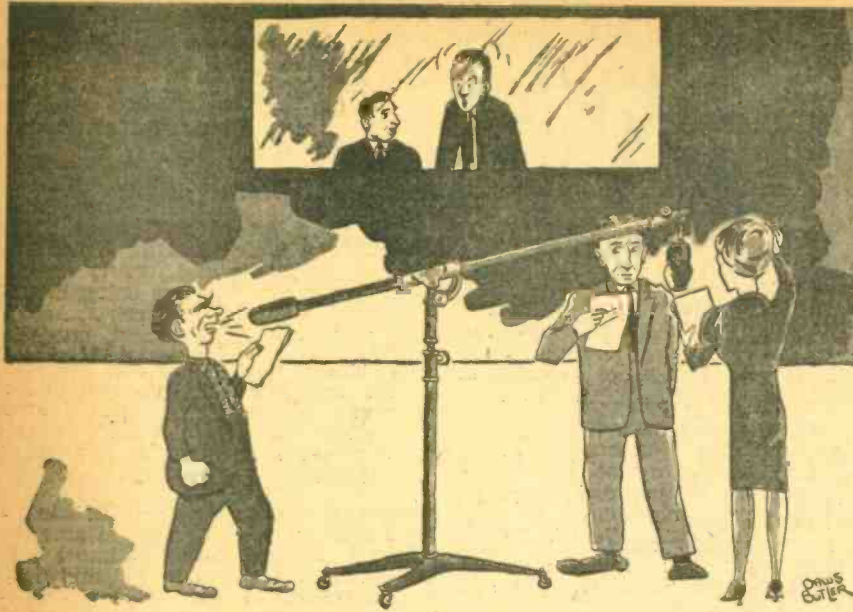
### Write a Song

greats, Nelson rates high honors. In the third annual Musical America poll, which includes five hundred foremost critics and music editors of the nation's press, Eddy captured first place in the classification Man Singer Regularly Heard. "Telephone Hour" was chosen as Number One in the division of "Orchestra with Featured Soloists" and Don Voorhees, the program director, won the nod in that division for the second consecutive year.

"The Telephone Hour" was also the recipient of a Peabody Award, administered by the University of

Georgia and considered the Pulitzer prize of radio. The award was given, to quote the committee, "because of the excellent standard it sets in presenting the greatest living artists performing the best music. Special appreciation is extended for the broadcasts by Fritz Kreisler (his first on the air.)" This year, Phi Beta, a professional fraternity of women who are studying in the fields of music and speech in leading American universities and music schools, selected "Telephone Hour" for its musical award.

An Eddy appearance on the program starts the ticket lines forming hours before the actual broadcast. People who haven't met since a previous Eddy broadcast meet and greet each other before the show, dash to the stage door after the broadcast to watch Nelson Eddy depart, grab a quick bit of dinner and rush back in line for the western broadcast when the whole routine is again repeated. That's Nelson's "fickle public!"

home can mean to you after having been on the road for years. I love it so much, I hate to leave it for a minute."

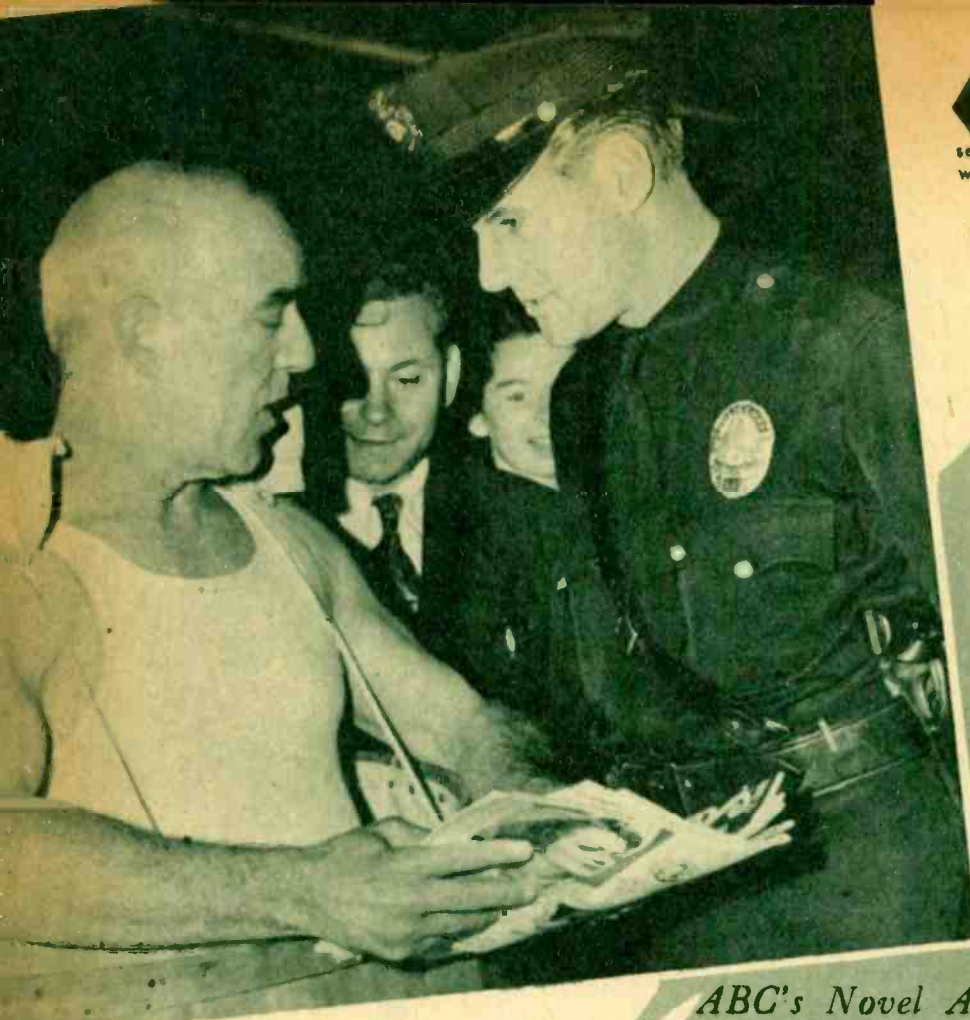
### Learning to Cook

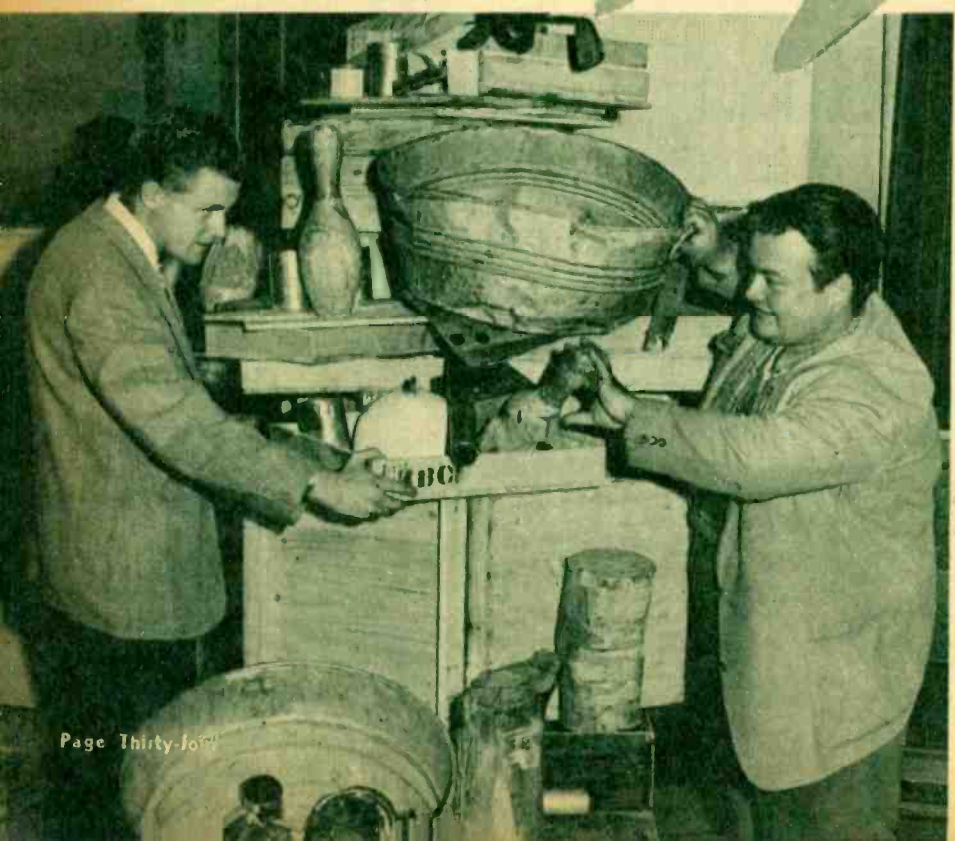

*ABC's Novel Audience Participation Show Offers YOU a Chance to Display Quick Thinking and Fast Ad-libbing*

**I**F YOU were asked to preview a new symphony by substituting a seltzer bottle for cymbals — or find out what happens to a banana in an icebox by climbing in with the banana—or roam the streets of Hollywood in a barrel, could you **TAKE IT FROM THERE?**

ABC producer Harfield Weedin used to wonder about the outcome of such situations and finally decided to give them a try . . . with Mr. Average Radio Dialer as guinea pig. The result was KECA's weekly "Take It From There" which grew from a local program to a transcontinental half-hour.

"We have no regular format or rules by which we abide on our audience participation show," producer Weedin explained, "but, instead, we like to provide a contestant with a situation and let him use his own ingenuity. In that way, everybody has fun."

Weedin, who likes to dream up situations while sunning at his San Fernando Valley home, includes sev-



eral regular gimmicks each week. Literally looking for a needle in a haystack has become the show's trademark and to each of the two "haystack ladies," handsome prizes are awarded upon finding the hidden implements. Weedin also likes guest spots into which he can work a contestant.

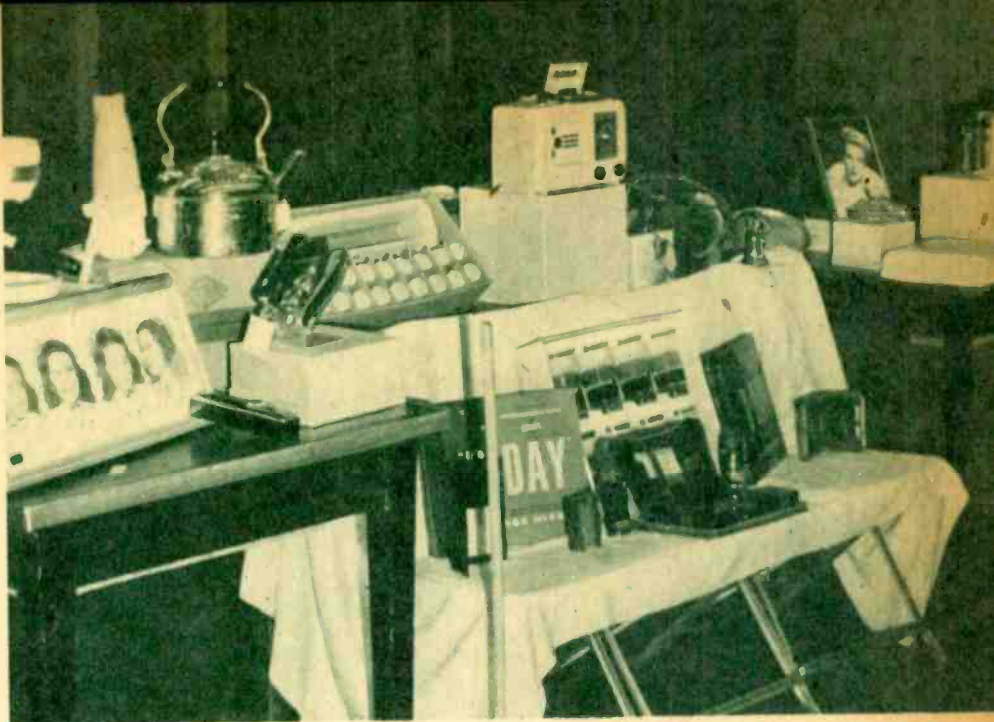
#### "Visual" Stunts Used

A few weeks ago, Al Pearce's "Tizzy Lish" dropped in on the show. She (or rather he) suddenly developed laryngitis, thereby leaving the rest of the spot to a willing contestant who proved an adequate substitute. Other guests have included Richard Long, Frankie Carle, Ollie O'Toole and Candy Candido.

Weedin prefers stunts which he terms "visual." He likes to have the contestants perform for the studio audience as well as those listening. Boxers, dressed in trunks and equipped with gloves, were once asked to box a crate of oranges. One lady released her inhibitions by playing producer and directing soundman Tiny Lamb in what sounded like complete destruction of ABC. Two elderly couples performed an August-pole dance on the stage.

Almost every week finds the presence of a songfest. Traveling emcee Mike Roy thrusts his microphone into a singer's face and he "takes it from there." Such stunts as these don't go unrewarded, for lavish prizes are bestowed upon every contestant.

The previously mentioned "haystack ladies" are armed with a bell and a horn, respectively, and diligently search out eight needles during the half-hour performance. One gold needle is placed in each stack and the first lady to uncover it receives a twenty-five-dollar gift prize. More prizes accompany the

#### Credits Show's Crew

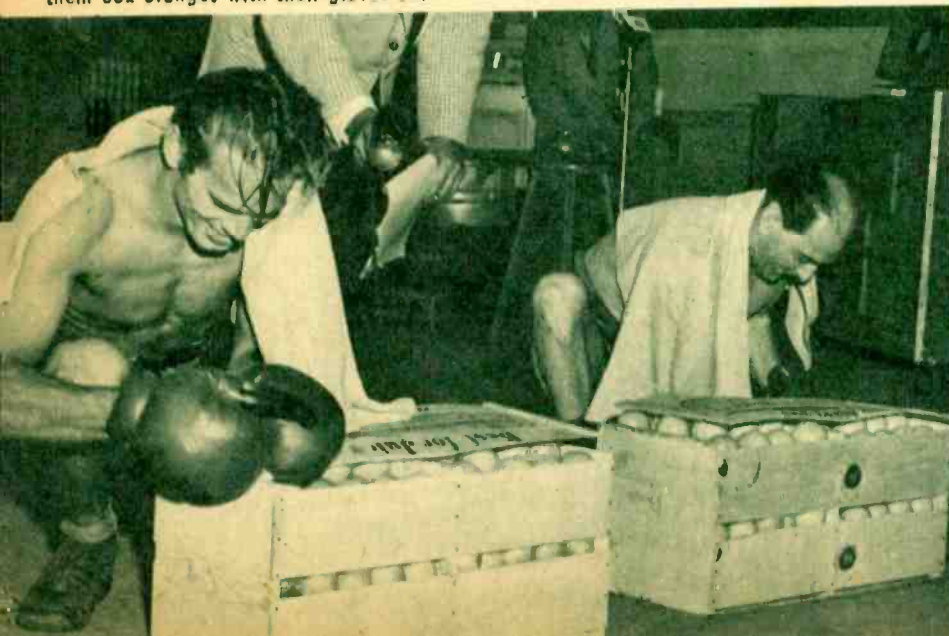
Delving into Weedin's background, we learned that he collaborated with Lee Segall on the original "Dr. I.Q." show in Houston, Texas. During the ensuing years Harfield formed his own agency, entered the Navy, and served as a member of the Armed Forces Radio Service. Upon discharge he joined ABC's Hollywood production staff.

"Take It From There," conceived, written and produced by Weedin, is

the outgrowth of audience participation ideas and surprises garnered during his years in radio business. The producer insists due credit be given to emcee Mike Roy, announcer John M. Kennedy, soundmen Myron McNamara and Tiny Lamb, and organist Dean Fossler.

It's true that a good radio audience participation show is measured by its emcee, it makes one wonder how much "weight" jovial 260-pound Mike Roy carries with his audience. He modestly grins and retorts, "You take it from there."

**S**TEPPING from the plane on her first trip home in two years, honey-haired, hatless Jeannie McKeon, lovely star of KHJ's "Green Light Revue," was greeted by her mother.

"Jean, where's your hat?"

Jean admitted she didn't have a hat and dutifully went with her mother to buy one, but on the plane returning to Hollywood a week later, off it came. Jeannie doesn't like to wear hats and she likes California because she doesn't have to wear hats. Everything is so relaxed here, she says. Yet, except for a brief swim, rain or shine, Jeannie relaxes seldom. Her brief trip to Maine was her first vacation in two years. She dreams of a month of rest—some day! Now she's too busy singing on KHJ's "Green Light Revue."

Taking it easy while moving at high speed is characteristic of the

"Green Light Revue." That quarter-hour of flowing melody and lively tempo is achieved through constant polishing, musically and verbally, by personalities who are tops in their fields. Even genial engineer Ed Walton was a musician for years—he played saxophone and cornet with several of the members of Roy Bary's band—before he became an engineer, through the courtesy of the Army. His enviable combination of musicianship and engineering gives him an extraordinary command of the dials which he deftly turns to regulate the tone.

# "Green Light For Jeannie

Although her experience consisted solely of singing in children's plays, one day she was infected with the ambitious talk of geniuses-in-embryo and trotted over to the local radio station. She was given an audition—and a job. Despite family qualms she decided to make music her life. In addition to singing in church during her training at the Conservatory she also sang on the radio, eventually getting a sponsored network show. She came to intersperse more and more popular songs with semi-classical music, until today she is one of the top song-stylists in the country. But in between were weary months of tramping around New York with her records clutched under her arm, trying to get agencies interested in her. She appeared with Lawrence Tibbett and Raymond Paige on "Stage Door Canteen" and won the femme singing spot on the Jack Kirkwood Show. When it moved to Hollywood, Jeannie came along.

Like Jeannie McKeon, conductor Roy Bary studied classical music. His ambition was to play the piano at Carnegie Hall. And he did—in the historical first performance of Gershwin's "Rhapsody In Blue." It was Art Tatum, the Negro pianist, who introduced the Toledo boy to ragtime, and Paul Whiteman who recognized his great ability and added him to his band. Today, Bary is one of the top boogie-woogie pianists in the country, but still keeps up his classical studies, and now and then essays a classical number on "Green Light Revue." In addition to being pianist and conductor, Bary also does the unique arrangements for the KHJ show.

### Unusual Musical Effects

The unusual effect of the vibraphone and electric guitar, as well as the use of the echo chamber to pick up the subtle overtone of the brass, has created a distinctive musical style. A large man with a shy

# A Sound Man Sounds Off

*Concerning the Qualifications of His Trade;  
Its Contribution to Good Radio Production*

**E**VEN your Radio Lifers, who are fairly well acquainted with the inside mechanisms of radio broadcasting, found it almost impossible to digest this astonishing fact. During the much-heralded CBS "Suspense" broadcast of "Sorry, Wrong Number," the frantic workings of the telephone dial and receiver were done by a sound man in amazingly accurate coordination with the emotional variances of actress Agnes Moorehead. In recognition of this remarkable job, the sound man, Berne Surrey, was

presented with a Radio Life Distinguished Achievement Award.

States Surrey: "That show simply pointed out how necessary it is that the sound man be experienced enough not only to follow skillfully the split-second directions of the producer, but also to think and to feel right along with the actor. At the finish of 'Sorry, Wrong Number', I was as emotionally exhausted as Miss Moorehead."

To illustrate this point further, Surrey related one incident among

many in which the sound man has been required to act on his own with a last-minute, second-quick switch in sound effects during the actual airing of a show.

"The actors often change their reading when they get on the air," he explained. "For instance, in a scene of the play called 'Blue Eyes' on 'Suspense', Hume Cronyn as the meek little office worker is discharged by his employer. During rehearsals, Hume played it very angry and in the ensuing action, I made the sound of his crumpling hard the papers in his hand. But on the air, without warning, Cronyn found himself feeling the scene differently. He played it quietly. In that mood of suppressed fury, the man wouldn't crumple the papers fiercely in his hand. So, feeling the scene right along with the actor, I eliminated the sound effect."

large record collection is a strictly classical one. He loves the modern French school of composers and, in a popular vein, goes for the Rose-Kostelanetz-Gould school of radio orchestras.

#### Search for Femme Vocalist

In fact, in Skitch's band he plans to carry the classic touch a step farther. "I'm adding a section of French horns—four or five of them," he explained. "I'm having trouble finding a lead French horn player. It's a very difficult instrument to play." Second difficulty with the upcoming band was, when we talked to him, the impossibility of finding a girl vocalist. "I've auditioned hundreds of 'em and not one was satisfactory. **S**KITCH Henderson's first choice for a career was in the diplomatic corps. "At least," he smiled, "that's what my father intended for me—but at an early age I began to have other ideas." Henderson senior was attached to the British embassy in Birmingham, England, where Skitch was born—at first glance an odd background for a future jazz pianist and bandleader.

Nowadays, Skitch is one of the mainstays of the Bing Crosby show, a recording artist for Capitol and leader of a newly-formed dance band. His first approach, however, was strictly classical. He studied music at the Lords School of Music in London and gave his first concert performance under the auspices of the Birmingham Concert Guild. Next, Skitch studied conducting under Albert Coates, director of the London Philharmonic. He recalls that Coates remembers him as the only student who ever managed to stick himself in the eye with a baton.

At fifteen, Skitch arrived in this country. We interrupted at this point to ask him what had become of his English accent, not a trace of which remains.

"I went to school in Switzerland for a while and learned to speak. . ."

*Skitch Has Never Strayed Too Far from His Early Classical Training for the Concert Field. At Present He's on Crosby's Show.*

"English?" we asked, getting whimsical.

"Well—'Yank'," he replied. "And then when I came to America I got the remaining traces of my accent razzed out of me." That's not the only influence America had on young Skitch—hearing the Duke Ellington orchestra switched his musical talents from classical to popular stylings. Since then, he's been prominently heard in the bands of Tommy Dorsey, Artie Shaw, Dave Rose, Skinnay Ennis and many others. The classic influence is still evident in Skitch's work, however, and his

speak for the artists of the sound effects department is indicated in the line-up of shows to which he is regularly assigned: "Suspense," "Academy Award," "The Whistler," and the Hollywood broadcasts of both Orson Welles and Norman Corwin.

When the latter headed westward for his special victory broadcasts which emanated from Hollywood's CBS studios, he wired ahead to obtain Berne as his sound-effects man: "Have Surrey get his fringe ready—Corwin." Berne's co-workers label the work he does at the "sound" microphone, "Surrey-alism."

Surrey himself credits "chance" for some of the steps he has taken in his career, but firmly cites experience as a necessary qualification of every good sound man.

His own venture into the theatrical field began in 1937, when he left City College in New York to become stage manager for Broadway productions on the road — among them, "Stage Door" starring Madge Evans; Bert Lytell in "The Amazing Dr. Clitterhouse"; Jane Cowl in "The Road to Rome"; and Phil Baker in "Idiot's Delight."

During the latter's run, Berne recalled that when he was still assistant stage manager, Baker's final scene was once concluded prematurely when the stage manager rang down the curtain too soon. In a fury, Phil came backstage to vent his wrath upon the man, who, seeing his plight, quickly pulled the curtain up again so that Mr. B. had to remain on-stage and smile sweetly at the audience. This went on eight times in succession, but even the ingenious stage manager knew it would have to stop sooner or later. His fate was sealed.

"That's how I became stage manager," smiled Surrey.

Then he recalled another unfortunate incident when Norma Terris was doing a still-life scene from Noel Coward's "Tonight at 8:30." It was a serious one-act drama in which Norma, as the heroine, was to indicate, after a tragic farewell to her lover, that she had committed suicide by throwing herself in the path of a passing freight train. This action took place off-stage, conveyed to the audience only by the sound of the train. In the next minute, Norma was surprisingly to re-appear, weeping but all in one piece, having obviously decided that it is better to have loved and lost—and stay alive anyway.

This dramatic episode, however, was completely spoiled one night by the production's sound effects man, who somehow spun the recording of the passing freight train too early for the action, leaving Norma to exit and re-enter with no apparent

cause for either. The actress, naturally enough, was enraged.

"That's when I started doing sound-effects," smiled Berne.

From stage managing, Surrey came to radio as a member of the sound-effects department of Chicago's CBS studios in 1940. Two years later, when he felt that the center of ether activity was switching to the West coast, he came to Hollywood's Columbia studios. He first handled sound effects for Norman Corwin when the writer-producer came West to do his "Trilogy of American Poets."

### Cites "Doctor Fights"

"Working with Norm on his special broadcasts has, of course, been my greatest pleasure and satisfaction," Surrey remarked, "and of the regular programs I do, I most enjoy 'Suspense' and 'Academy Award.' I've learned a great deal working with such producers as Corwin, Bill Spler and Dee Engelbach."

He names "The Doctor Fights" (produced by Engelbach) as the most memorable series of broadcasts on which he has worked. "Everybody who works with Engelbach," Berne commented admiringly, "can't help but form a sort of devotion to the guy, because they realize what he is trying to do. I think he does a terrific job with his shows."

As his most difficult sound effects assignment, Berne cites the weird effect required for the "Suspense" airing of a thriller entitled "Donovan's Brain," in which he had to produce what sounded like a human brain being kept "alive" and "thinking" in a glass jar. "I had nothing to go by," grinned Surrey. "I had to work completely in the dark on that one, but the result we reached was effective, according to the listening audience's response. It scared the day-lights out of them."

Berne Surrey's eventual ambition is to be a radio director in active charge of a broadcast ("no stopwatch man, that is," he specified). "Sound effects is a very vital contribution to every radio production," he repeated, "but it remains only one facet of it. I hope some day to have the opportunity to apply what I have learned, and am learning, to a show's all-over presentation."

### Busy Schedule

During his rare hours away from the sound microphone, Berne's interests run to the theater and classical music. He and his wife, Rita, attend almost all the concerts held locally, and take great pleasure in their extensive record collection. They have two children—four-year-old Brianne and 17-months-old Ellen.

"My favorite sport is *relaxing*," Berne smiled, "and that's no easy trick for a sound man."

Surrey has handled sound for as many as four shows in one day, ten within a week's time, which is a steep schedule when one realizes how many grueling hours of rehearsal go

into the preparation of every broadcast.

"Speaking not of myself, but for all experienced sound effects artists," Surrey concluded, "it is a great satisfaction to us that the industry is at last beginning to realize the necessity of a sound man's being fully qualified not only to handle expertly the mechanisms of sound, but to feel and act with quick precision according to the fluctuating emotions of the performer. Anybody with a minimum of training can act on cue to supply sounds for a broadcast, but only a veteran sound man of skill and intelligence can supply the sound with the varying degrees of subtlety and emphasis to match the mood of the program every minute it is on the air. That's why a producer is as fussy about the sound man who is assigned to him as he is about the performers he casts for his show."

smile and sly sense of humor, Bargo conducts from the piano with a nod, a smile, and an occasional gesture. The number finished, he turns to the glassed-in control booth, and consults with producer Jack Rourke about timing and the volume of the various instruments.

Low-voiced, handsome Rourke, who is also the writer and announcer, has mastered every phase of radio from announcing to account executive. He has produced "The Feeling Is Mutual" and "California Melodies" for MBS. Under his pleasant, non-frenzied direction, the mood is set for the program. The numbers are recorded separately, as are the announcements and commercials. No merely adequate performance gets by; no fluffs, no wrong notes, no jerkiness in tempo. The program is then assembled—and Rourke gives the "go" signal for the "Green Light Revue!"
