Here Are a Handful of Happy Ether Offerings Which We Wish Were Still On the Air—Don't You Wish So Too?

IN THE previous articles under this title, we have singled out personalities who, we think, should be on the air. Some of them have been voices formerly heard regularly at the microphone, others were performers whose talents are too seldom aired. In this article, we are making note of airshows which were once on our radio menu and which we want to see reinstated. We think you will agree that all of them were entertaining ether fare which you'd like to be able to dial again. We'll also be interested in your ideas of additions for the list.

"VIC AND SADE." There seems to us to be no reason in the world why a show as expertly scripted and portrayed as this one should ever go off the air. We were so overjoyed when it was reborn recently, only to have

our happiness immediately erased with its sudden discontinuance. When it returns — and it certainly

should—we have our fingers crossed that nothing will be changed—which means we want Art Van Harvey as "Vic," Bernadine Flynn as "Sade," Billy Idleson as "Rush," Clarence Hartzell as "Uncle Fletcher," and its creator, Paul Rhymer, of course, as scripter. And, although this is no absolute stipulation, we'd be more pleased if it were done without a studio audience, whether it be a fifteen-minute offering as initially, or the weekly half-hour more recently formatted.

"THOSE WE LOVE." The title aptly expresses our fondness for this engaging weekly serial. Its cast was an amazing assemblage of good performers with wonderful voices whose roles fit them like tailor-made suits. Nan Grey was "Cathy"; Richard Cromwell was her twin brother, "Kit"; Donald Woods was "Doctor Foster"; Francis X. Bushman was "John Marshall"; Alma Kruger was "Aunt Emily"; Victor Rodman, "Uncle Jerry"; Virginia Sale, "Martha"; and Ann Todd, "Amy." Remember?

"CLAUDIA." Rose Franken's lovable, laughable heroine was a delightful microphone personality. Patricia Ryan was perfectly cast in the title role, with Richard Kollmar as the likable David. Their madcap adventures would be welcome again as a weekly treat.

JACK KIRKWOOD. Sure, it was sheer "corn." But that was what it was presented to be, and listeners loved it. We want Kirkwood and company cavorting on our radio dials once more. We liked escaping from a hard day's work to race at a fast pace through Jack's hand-picked harvest of kernels. It was one of the

merriest, most light-hearted pieces of entertainment on the air.

"THE FIGHTING SENATOR." This was an excellent idea for a radio dramatic series, and won a nod from us in our recent lineup of Radio Life Distinguished Achievement Awards. We hope we will be hearing it as an established network offering in the near future.

"MR. AND MRS. NORTH." If you like—or at least, don't mind—your bloody microphone fare brightened by light banter, and your clue-detecting done in a slightly nonsensical vein, "Pam" and "Jerry" are the sleuths for you. We'd favor a return of this cheerful pair of Sherlocks, personably portrayed by Alice Frost and Joseph Curtin.

Frances Langford Can Look with Satisfaction on Her Present Air Assignment, Film Career, Those Citrus Groves in Florida, and Her Two Profitable Hobbies, Flying and Boating—They Add Up to a Secure Future

WE WERE sitting amid the varying shades of beige in the living room of the large white house that has been the California home of Frances Langford and Jon Hall ever since their marriage nine years ago. Frances, in a soft blue sweater and slacks, was curled up opposite us on the sofa. She was talking in a reminiscent mood of her beginning in show business, while we observed silently that this soft-voiced, unobtrusive young girl had indeed come a long way and done very well for herself since those high school days in a Florida small town, when, she confessed, she had sat by her radio listening to Rudy Vallee and Ruth Etting and spun wistful daydreams

backstage at a theater, and never seen a celebrity," found herself in Miami for a scheduled audition for Rudy Vallee. "My mother went with me," related Frances, "and together we found our way to Mr. Vallee's dressing room, where we discovered Rudy rushing around in his shirt-tail! That I'd never seen before! It was an amazing new kind of life."

A Promise

"Eventually, Rudy settled himself down to listen to me sing, but I had barely uttered eight bars of the tune when he abruptly interrupted. My heart sank, and I thought, 'Well, there goes my career.' Then Vallee rendered his verdict. 'Sorry, I won't be able to use you,' he apologized, but quickly added, 'That is, this week. But I'll send for you.'

"I went home and waited. Weeks went by, and I enrolled in college, almost ready to dismiss my theatrical ambitions. Three months passed and then it came—a wire to join the Vallee show in New Orleans! To me, that seemed like the other side of the world. I'd never been away from Florida."

That telegram merely marked the beginning of the travels Frances Langford was to take. Since then, she has journeyed *literally* to the other side of the world, on Army hospital and camp entertainment tours

Tommy Bernard Is a Down-to-Earth Young Man When It Comes to Radio, But He Waxes Poetic About Horses

IF THE BOY next door or your youngest son or maybe your kid brother became a radio actor, he'd probably be very much like Master Tommy Bernard. Tommy's a regular fellow, a down-to-earth young man who views his radio success as "David" on the "Ozzie and Harriet" show in much the same spirit as a boy who has just played a rousing game of football.

When we asked him if he thought there was much similarity between the real David Nelson and the real Tommy Bernard, Tommy laughed, "Gee, I don't know—I guess David is wild like me."

Tommy is a student at the Hollywood Professional Children's School and enjoys most of his studies (especially science, math and languages!) "The only trouble, though," he added, "is that they have no sports." And, sports, next to radio, are the thing nearest and dearest to Tommy's heart. Ice skating, football and horseback riding, with riding pre-eminent, are Tommy's main sport interests. He rides whenever he gets the chance and one of his "horsy" companions is fellow thespian Joel Davis, who was formerly "David" on the "Ozzie and Harriet" show and is now heard as "Bucket Smith" on "One Man's Family," among other roles. Tommy likes theatrical people and professional

"kids" and numbers most of the youngsters in radio as his friends.

Good Rider

About this horse business Tommy says, "I even dream about horses!" He has an uncle who is a trainer and Tommy has been riding since the age of five. For a long time he exercised horses at the track and if he hadn't been such a good radio actor, he might have been a jockey by now. Tommy had grandparents with the circus and Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, so his interest and ability concerning horses is just doin' what comes naturally as far as he is concerned.

Tommy had recently finished making a movie, "Yankee Faker," when we spoke to him. "How did you enjoy picture making?" we asked.

"I got to ride the horses on the set," Tommy exclaimed as if that was the only possible answer.

He thinks he prefers stage and radio work, however, and still recalls with a glow his stage debut at the age of six—"or maybe seven." For one year Tommy appeared in a production called "Eleven Nights in a Bar Room" at the Nutshell Theater

EVEN AT THIS early age, Tommy was practicing up for those radio calls. Tommy's first venture into show business was as a child model. He's loved every bit of it and is proud that he can call himself "a ham."

The story behind "The Beulah Show", which debuted on ABC this Monday (February 24th) is this: the boy who is doing "Beulah", a character originated and played by Marlin Hurt until his untimely death a year ago, is twenty-two-year-old Bob Corley of Macon, Georgia. Corley was a Hurt fan and a competent imitator of Hurt's characterization of the jolly Negress. (Like Marlin, Corley was raised by a colored Mammy). Some time after Marlin's death, the youth wrote to the Ken Dolan agency, which handled the "Beulah" program, to learn the possibilities of carrying on the comedy series. End result was the new "Beulah" program which bowed this week.

Two things should be brought to the attention of any of you who might consider this new show disrespectful of the late Mr. Hurt and his unique talent—1) Ken Dolan, who has engineered the birth of this new "Beulah", was a personal friend of Marlin and declares with real feeling, "I know he'd like this," and 2) Mrs. Marlin Hurt, the radio star's widow, is receiving royalties from the new show.

The principal reason for its freshness lies in the spontaneous nature of the show. As its veteran emcee, Don McNeill, says, "Rehearsals can produce a high polish, but they also can dull the edge of a potentially happy program." Apart from the music and commercials, no feature of the "Breakfast Club" is rehearsed. Its dialogue is ad-lib. Lacking the security of a script, the cast is always on its mettle... Each program is a premiere.

Of his 18 years in radio, McNeill has spent 14 on the ABC show as its ringmaster. Others of the cast who rate the title "oldtimer" include pianist Bill Krenz, orchestra leader Ed Ballantine, Fran Allison, Jack Owens, and Sam Cowling... Below we see Don McNeill and two recent guests, star pitcher of the Chicago White Sox, Orval Grove, and ballad singer, Burl Ives, who kid the emcee about a gay tie.

And besides, we're developing quite a crush on Peter Carver, whoever he might be. If you're wondering too, watch for more information on Laura and her playmates in these pages. We've gotten so fascinated by now that we've contacted NBC, New York, for more data on our morning date.

We guess the thing that keeps us listening day after day is that old debbil, suspense — gotta find out what's happening next. We remember the time we attended one of the lectures of the Writer's Forum at UCLA and author Mary McCarthy, who had gone through the tortures of writing a morning serial, claimed that there was one cardinal rule for creating a successful sudser—Get your heroine into trouble at the end of every show Monday through Thursday, and get her in worse trouble on Friday!

Heaven help us if we ever start listening to a good soap opera!

LATER: It's Friday and something terrible happened this morning on Laura Lawton. Just as the program signed off, Harley died! We'll be glued to the dial Monday again. See how the technique works?

is the sort of show everyone talks about doing—and hardly anyone ever does.

Bandleader Henry Russell presents a bright half-hour of talent (and we include his own orchestra and arrangements in that) with regulars Lucille Norman and the Crew Chiefs. Lucille is a beautiful girl with a voice that sells and the Chiefs are a pleasing vocal group.

Each week, guest stars who may be short on big names but long on talent appear for their chance at the mike. Since the show has been heard locally, the Red Engles hill-billy group, which can twist the most sophisticated ballad into a tear-jerking mountain whine, has gotten its break. Capitol Records' headman, Johnny Mercer, heard them and signed them to a recording contract. Prexy Mercer also made an unexpected guest appearance on the show and congratulated his new stars.

We hope that "tomorrow never comes" will soon be changed to "tomorrow is here" for the deserving talent presented on this much-needed show.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

Too Good

Recently the first in a series of programs designed and handled by some of the most significant of its purveyors was aired. On Saturday morning, March 15th, from Mutual's eastern outlet, emanated a program called "This Is Jazz." Some of the greatest jazz musicians added their positive assets. Muggsy Spanier, cornetist of contemporary renown; New Orleans-born Albert Nicholas on clarinet, Danny Barker on guitar, Cy St. Clair, bass, percussion expert Baby Dodds on drums; from Chicago the same George Brunies of old Friar's Inn fame and the still popular Joe Sullivan.

This impressive line-up was augmented by that representative back-room professor of piano, "Socks" Wilson, who accompanied "Coots" Grant as she voiced the joys or laments of the era she typified.

The program was designed to bring to the listening audience true early American music. It did. Rudi Blesh, jazz critic of the New York Herald, announced the program and tied it together with thumbnail sketches of the performers and numbers they played. He is the man who a few years ago so ably handled the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art jazz concerts from that city.

To us, only one thing seemed to be overlooked. In this case the cart should have been put before the horse. For a great many of us forming the "uneducated public,"—used to terming anything outside of "The

Gypsy" and "Five Minutes More" on the Dorsey or James records as "jazz,"—the program was just too good, the music too pure and unadulterated. There was no concession whatever to commercialism, just as the producers and artists intended. Good enough. But the dilettante who loves the over-heated nonsense talk about so-and-so's tone being more mellow than the other guy's was left just as startled as the completely untutored listener.

Jazz would be more readily assimilated by us through learning it "backwards," rather than from its original, and to our still not educated ears, unorthodox, beginning. Mr. Blesh should certainly realize this, and in the fight to launch jazz from its springboard into its rightful place as one of America's few and true contributions to art, he should have toned down the introductory chapter in this new series.

The music, as being representative of a couple of decades ago, can't be criticized. The performers are certainly above criticism. But many of us out of the same odd-million people who perhaps listened just aren't ready enough for this music to be assassinated by Clarence Williams and Jelly Roll Morton tunes, played a la 20's.

Jazz has enough hurdles ahead of it, purely because it's jazz, without building more for itself. So, Mr. Blesh, let's dress it down just a little, and expand its appeal to the general public.

The program's a fine idea . . . its performers . . . too good!

And in case you're one of the few people who aren't familiar with the lyrics of "Stardust"—those aren't it.

And in case you're one of the people who don't know who wrote "Stardust"—it's by Hoagy Carmichael, who finally got straightened out on his own lyrics no later than the second chorus.

Crucial Moment

If the customarily glib-tongued John Nelson sounded a little ill at ease during an ABC "Bride and Groom" airing of last week, it was due to an unforeseen unhappy occurrence—his suspender buttons broke!

That recent broadcast of ABC's "Lum 'n' Abner" on which you *didn't* hear the familiar proprietors of the "Jot 'Em Down Store", marked the

first time in some sixteen years that an entire program was aired minus their voices! "Lum 'n' Abner's" creators, Chester Lauck and Norris Goff, were at the microphone as usual—but they were doing the voices of the program's other characters while the show's "starring" personalities were absent from the scene.

Just in Case

NBC's Dennis Day show has had its casting troubles of late. First, Bea Benaderet and Sharon Douglas simultaneously had to take leave of their mother and daughter roles on the program due to impending visits from the stork. Paula Winslowe and Barbara Eiler took over their parts—but they both found themselves too ill to perform on a recent broadcast, so a frantic call was issued for Bea and Sharon to return for a quick one-time stint. The two mothers-to-be agreed, with one stipulation—that Dennis Day's brother be present during the show.

Here are two tunes in lighter vein that were just made for the fella with a laugh in his voice. You might not like "Love" ("Finian's Rainbow") at first, but give it time—you will. With the Clark Sisters and Earl Sheldon's orchestra to complete the cast, it deserves a good 2 notes. (Capitol 364).

"Don't Tell Me That Story"

Very listenable, indeed, are these new waxings by song-selling Eddy. "Catalina" may remind you of "Red Sails", but the tune has possibilities. Lifelines

KILL THE KILLER? During the past four or five years, radio listeners have gradually been inundated by a tidal wave of chiller-thrillers. During the war period, the murder-mystery cycle sunk its roots deeply, probably because people craved escape. As their taste for gore was developed, dialers have wanted bloodier and ghastlier stories. They seem to be getting them, smart radio men realizing that murder does pay—it pulls down a big rating with a comparatively small budget.

Within the past year, the opposition to mystery programs seems to have gained momentum. Some critics have held programs responsible for juvenile delinquency. This is rather difficult to believe when practically every script brings the criminal to justice. Yet the hardened plots of many scripts could, conceivably, influence impressionable youngsters. Another danger is the bloodthirsty show's narcotic effect—the violence and horror have to be increased constantly, like dosages, to produce listener thrill.

Of late, legislative and Parent-Teacher groups have become increasingly aroused by the air whodunits.

We think KFI took neat care of the local matter by refusing to release murder programs until after 9 p.m. But even then, a lot of teen-age kids are twiddling the dial.

If left to themselves, mysteries would probably run their course—just like any other fad. We're afraid that if various groups label the horror shows forbidden fruit, they'll accomplish their unwanted purpose of making youngsters want to listen to them.

There are murder stories and murder stories, just as there are dirty stories and clever stories. When a murder story is based on a provocative, stimulating plot, it's good listening; when it tries to hold an audience by blud-

geoning and dismembering, it's revolting listening. It would appear that radio, itself, should draw the line between one type of show and the other. If it can't or won't, we're for killing off all the whodunits in one rip-roaring, corpuscle-curling finale.

WE HOPE THAT Alec Templeton subs again, as rumored he will, for Charlie McCarthy this coming summer . . . that Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne do a summer radio series . . . that Bill Leyden celebrates his second year at KMPC with as nice a party and as big a cake as he had for his first anniversary . . . that more radio stars would be as generous with their time as Durante and Moore. They recently flew back to Denver to do eight shows in three hours at the Fitzsimmons General Hospital—no name entertainer had been there to cheer up the boys since last August. Then they came home and Jimmy did two shows in consecutive weeks for the Braille folks. Garry volunteered to help the cancer drive before he was half asked. Swell spirit. Yet the Football Club for the Blind went a-begging along radio row a couple weeks ago because nobody could "arrange" to appear at its annual benefit. Durante went year before last. Why couldn't somebody else spare a little time?

KMPC HAD TROUBLE getting started on test of 50,000 watts and had to push inaugural over to February 27 . . . station has big star line-up to celebrate . . . didn't Jane Wyman do a fine substitute performance on "Lux" for ailing Ida Lupino . . . it was Jane's first time on the show . . . 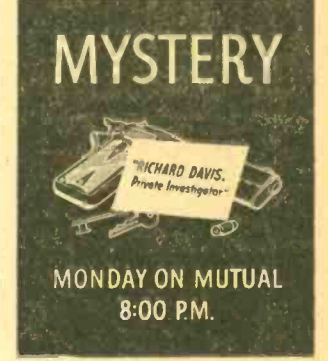

BILLIE BURKE. Speaking of nonsense, this charming, flutter-voiced actress is its most expert dispenser, and her broadcast showcased this inimitable talent to the delight of its every dialer.

"HOLLYWOOD PLAYHOUSE." Light drama-lovers delighted in this series which co-starred Rosemary De Camp and Elliott Lewis in interesting, entertaining microphone skits. Rosemary is now heard, but not enough, as "Judy Price" of the "Dr. Christian" stories, and both hers and Elliott's intriguing voices and long and varied careers in radio qualify them for an airshow all their own.

"POINT SUBLIME." Our "Ear Inspires" department, in itself, has presented enough evidence of the welcome this show would receive, to promote its immediate return—with Cliff Arquette, Mel Blanc and others featured as before. How about it?

"CORLISS ARCHER." These gay, giddy adventures of a typical teenager and her indulgent parents were always enjoyable. F. Hugh Herbert was the scripter, Janet Waldo was a wonderful "Corliss." Irene Tedrow and Fred Shields expertly played her indulgent parents.

THE ANDREWS SISTERS. America's favorite singing trio just naturally should be heard regularly on the air, in a show custom-made for their unique talents. Besides their singing ability, Patty, Maxene and LaVerne are clever with comedy, and presented a happy half-hour with their former "Eight-to-the-Bar Ranch" series. We'd like to hear them in business at the microphone again.

"MAN CALLED X." Suave Herbert Marshall hasn't enough to do in his present role as host of "Hollywood Star Time." He was happier, we think, in his assignment as the adventurous man-of-the-world on "Man Called X"—and so was his audience. So why not make everybody happy about the whole thing with a resumption of that program?

"THE CIRCLE"; "Frank Watanabe and the Honorable Archie"; "Chandu, the Magician." Three "oldies" of highly varied content, this trio of air offerings was each a pleasingly unique program with a high entertainment value. Surely, any listener who can recall the unpredictable pattern of "The Circle's" intellectual gatherings, the satirical comedy of "Watanabe and Archie," and the imaginative thrills of "Chandu" will agree with us that they should be brought back again.

"A SONG IS BORN." Remember this musical show that presented three amateur songs weekly and grand prize winners at the end of each cycle? Stories of how these

songs came to be born plus dramatic backgrounds for such well-known compositions as "Rhapsody in Blue" and "White Cliffs of Dover" made a fully-rounded program filling a decided need in radio.

with the Bob Hope show, which made her one of America's most widely-traveled citizens. Of this World War II period of her career, the songstress commented quietly at our persuasion, "The most poignant moments and thrilling memories of my professional life are contained in those years. They are things I don't want to talk about, but shall never forget."

Today finds Frances a veteran of show business, but still a normal, unassuming person who looks back on the successful path she has trod with both gratitude and honest wonder. "When I joined Rudy, my singing salary jumped from five to seventy-five dollars a week," Frances remembered at one point, and when we asked if there was any one thing she had always dreamed of owning if she ever had money enough, she smilingly answered, "Oh, I had the car bug for a while, but fortunately I got over that. The one thing I really wanted was a citrus grove in Florida. Twelve years ago, I bought it and it's been operating successfully and paying off like a good little annuity ever since."

Although confessing frankly to having sometimes "gone overboard," on the whole Frances Langford can look upon her handling of success with rightful pride. An accounting of her varied, substantial business interests, which are imaginative yet sound, is proof of the songstress' level-headed view of "fame and fortune." "Jonny and I," she remarked with disarming sincerity, "share an honest surprise that our careers have continued as long as they have. Perhaps the caution and foresightedness we have resultantly

employed has been a contributing factor."

At the same time, the Langford-Hall business interests are concerned with pursuits from which they receive much honest enjoyment. In addition to her original citrus grove acquisition in her home state, Frances has added several others, and a large house that is her second home.

The Halls' pet hobbies—flying and boating—have led to their other financial investments. They have a flying organization where they give piloting instruction, sell airplanes and flying equipment (Jon works there from dawn until after dusk; Frances recently designed a flying suit for women). They have an equal interest (for both business and pleasure) in boats, and Jon designed one superior to the PT, which the government has said would have saved many lives in the Philippines during the war if it had been completed earlier. These two pursuits, in addition to the flying and water ski clubs which they have in the process of organization, occupy much of Frances and Jon's time.

Gets Weak

In addition to all of these interests, Mrs. Hall comes into Hollywood each week for her Sunday night radio stint on the NBC Don Ameche show. ("Didn't know there was anyone like Don in this business. He is wonderful!") This air assignment, she confesses, exhausts her completely because of the nervousness it causes her. "I don't know why I'm so nervous about this show," she pondered. "But it leaves me absolutely weak."

As for any more traveling, Frances admits to a hankering after a musical show on Broadway, but has decided against it so far because of her reluctance to leave her home.

"After all," she concluded, "I've been away from it too much already!"

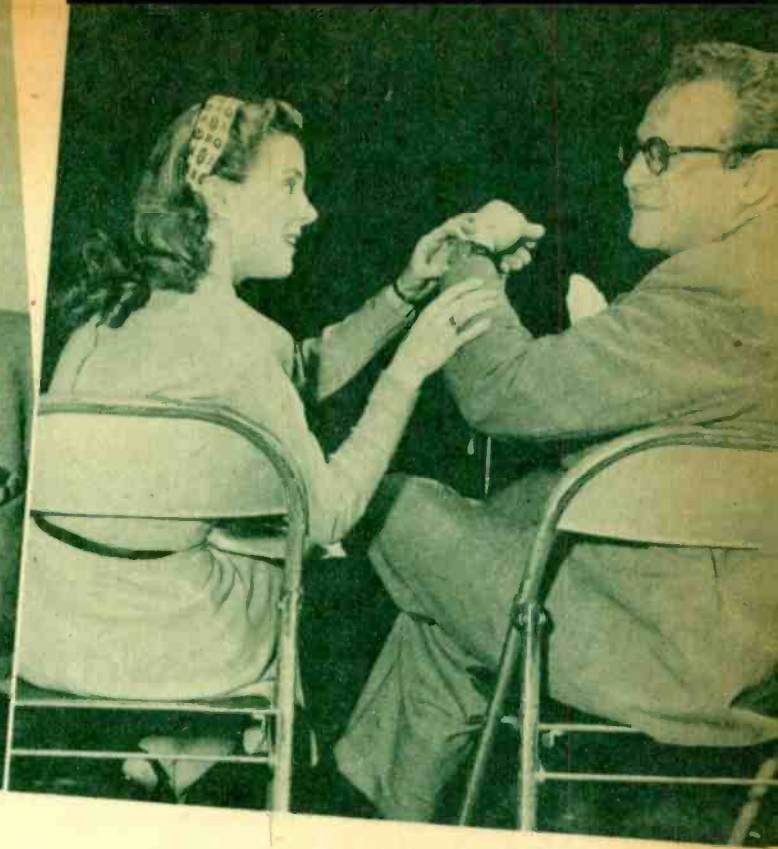

Paging Piper

Comfortable Comedy Starring Twenty-Year-Old Billy Redfield and Jean Gillespie, Features Trivia Rather Than Exaggeration of Living

A SIMPLE human-interest comedy was the aim of the American Broadcasting Company when it signed up veteran writer Samuel Taylor to create a new character for radio. The result is shy, warm-hearted "Willie Piper."

Taylor, who lives in a northern New England town, draws heavily on his neighbors for material for the new show. The local grocery store, the village gossip, the ups and downs of rural life—all lend a genuine flavor to the fictional "Willie" and "Martha," who are emerging as two of the most realistic, true-to-life young married couples on the air.

One of the chief reasons for the reality of the show is that Taylor, a serious-minded young man and a keen observer, is interested in projecting into the script the little things that go into making a happy marriage, rather than the phony "great" decisions that until now have largely dominated the airwaves.

Thus we have "Willie" bringing the boss home unexpectedly to dinner, which is already pretty slim fare; additional guests being added to the party by an enthusiastic "Willie" and "Martha," suffering the normal anxieties experienced by any young hostess on such an occasion. We have "Martha" utterly baffled by three surprise turkeys on Thanksgiving and the "Piper" icebox bare, when the birds disappear just as suddenly.

Such simple episodes, plus the characters' completely normal and human reactions to them, add up to a charming half-hour of entertainment.

On hand each week to bring alive this whimsical drama are veteran stage, screen and radio performers Jean Gillespie, Billy Redfield, Charles Irving, Stewart MacIntosh, and director Frank Brown.

Stage Experience

Pretty, diminutive Jean Gillespie, already well-known for her stage and movie roles in such successes as "The Damask Cheek," "Susan and God," "Ladies in Retirement," "Kiss for Cinderella" and "Chicken Every

Sunday," gives the role of "Martha" a fresh glowing charm.

Billy Redfield, who plays "Willie," is one of the phenomena that only the entertainment world can produce. At twenty, he already has eleven years of radio and Broadway experience and is considered an accepted star in both fields. On Broadway he has appeared in about ten plays, such as "Our Town," in which he was the newsboy, "Junior Miss," and "Snafu," in which he played the lead until he went into the army in 1945. His radio roles included "The Aldrich Family," "The Kate Smith Show," "March of Time," and many others. He was recently picked for the lead in the new Abbott show, "Barefoot Boy With Cheek," which was scheduled to go into rehearsal in February and which should keep Billy busy running between the main stem and Radio Row.

Charles Irving, who has been winning gales of laughter on "The Henry Morgan Show," plays the irascible father and Stewart MacIntosh plays the ever-enthusiastic and helpful Mr. Bissel, the Western Union messenger.

Frank Brown, well-known Broadway director, is giving the show the same inherent quality of a well-balanced Broadway production.

In fact, both Frank Brown and Jean Gillespie are doing double duty between Broadway and "Willie Piper," now that "Wonderful Journey," which opened Christmas night, is in rehearsal. Brown is directing the show and Jean is playing the feminine lead.



Ersel Twing's Alter Ego

Handsome Pat Patrick Is a Closer Relative to "Ersel Twing" of the Charlie McCarthy Show Than You'd Imagine from His Rugged Appearance

▲ **PERSONABLE PAT PATRICK** is looking forward to television. He's already appeared in circuses, the chautauqua circuit, tent shows, stock company, night clubs—and, oh yes, radio.

HANDSOME Pat Patrick looks like our idea of a movie hero — it's a little amazing to find out that he's "Ersel Twing" of the Charlie McCarthy show! Here we'd been picturing the hesitant "Ersel" as a real life Casper Milque-toast-looking character. To be suddenly confronted by a rugged combination of Peter Lawford and Spencer Tracy when we'd been prepared to urge Ersel with firm, but gentle, questioning, took us rather aback.

"To tell you the truth," said Pat when we told him what a surprise he was to us, "my real name is Ersel—Ersel Kirkpatrick." When we asked him why he changed his name, he laughed, "Well, I certainly wasn't going to call myself Ersel. How I got kidded in school! And people usually thought my last name was Kilpatrick or Fitzpatrick or Fitzgerald. Pat Patrick is a lot simpler."

Pat's a native of Strawberry Point, Iowa, and he's used to people giving with the incredulous look as he reveals this. Stage-struck at an early age, he ran away from home and joined the Al G. Barnes circus as a clown at the age of sixteen. Chautauqua, stock and tent shows made up the rest of Pat's theatrical experience before he launched on an ambitious enterprise of his own.

At twenty-two he wrote, produced and acted in an original production, "The Blackguard," in Los Angeles. Pat played a toothless one-armed henchman of the villain and emceed the after-show. It was here that "Ersel" (the radio character, that is) was born. Like many hit characterizations, "Ersel" was a

combination of accident and gradual development.

As part of the after-show, Pat impersonated a lecturer on African travel, complete with magic lantern slides and pointer. One night the light on the machine burned out and Pat took some small photographs from his vest pocket, held them up to the audience and proceeded with his lecture. "It was much funnier that way," said Pat, "because, of course, the pictures were so small you couldn't see what was on them."

But "Ersel's" distinctive voice was still missing. One day while cutting an audition record of the characterizations he did, Pat did a few lines in a hesitant, high voice—it was just to test the record. Later, when the audition record was played, everyone thought the voice on the test was hilarious and paid no attention to Pat's other characters.

By the time Edgar Bergen dropped in to see the "Blackguard," Pat had "Ersel Twing" down pat. So that, kiddies, is how you get a job on the Bergen show!

Almost a Jockey

A previous air career for Pat had been nipped in the bud before it had even started. Pat was scheduled to start as a disc jockey on KMPC one Sunday afternoon . . . Sunday afternoon of December 7, 1941. "It took a war to keep me off the air," claims Pat.

After his discovery, Pat was part of the Bergen show until he went into the army. While entertaining the boys in camp, he decided to become a ventriloquist. "I wouldn't have caused Bergen any worries," he laughed. For a dummy, Pat constructed a life-size G.I. doll and during his three-year stint in special services Pat and Co. were kept busy entertaining.

Who Is Webber?

Peggy Webber's Radio Roles Are So Varied That Listeners Think She's Ten Other People

AT sixteen I got my first Hollywood radio job," recalled young Peggy Webber. "All I had to do was stand in the background and ad lib on a 'Sherlock Holmes' broadcast, but I thought, 'I've reached the top! Here I am sitting in the same room with Basil Rathbone!'"

Since that auspicious beginning, Peggy has proven that she has the stuff to get to the top. She has portrayed such a variety of characters during her four years in Hollywood that she found it impossible to recall more than a fraction of them. "In fact," smiled Peggy, "no one can trace me on the air except my mother!"

Peggy calls her mother her "family." "Mother always listens avidly to everything I do on the air," laughed Peggy, "and she always apologizes if she misses a show. She insists that she'll give me criticisms

on my performances, but she never does."

Going back to the beginnings of her career, Peggy recalled that she got into vaudeville at the age of two via the dancing school route and that she can't remember a time when she didn't want to be part of show business. At seven she organized a group of teen-agers and wrote and directed a series of shows with them. She remembers that one of the plays was entitled "For the Sake of the Gypsies" and was inspired by the sight of Ramon Novarro playing the violin in a now-forgotten movie.

"My big worry was getting kids older than I to follow my directions.

THERE'S A TOUCH of Scarlett O'Hara in this portrait of Peggy as a fiery young thing—and a touch of Bergman, too. Peggy's first radio break came when she was chosen to do the Bergman role in the air version of "Casablanca".

I even rehearsed speeches to say to them. Everything turned out pretty successfully, though. We sold ads and charged admission."

At eleven, Peggy made her first professional excursion into radio with a children's show that she wrote and directed. At thirteen she essayed stage show production. When she moved from her home town of San Antonio, Texas, to Tucson, Arizona, to attend high school, she continued

Gordon Jenkins Evaluates the Music Of Today (Including His Own) with Uncompromising Judgment and Taste

I HAD a yen for New York," smiled Gordon Jenkins when we inquired as to the inspiration behind his musical narrative, "Manhattan Tower." Though Gordon's now at home in California (as witness "San Fernando Valley"!) he admits that he was afflicted with homesickness for the Big City for a long time.

"'Tower' was written for the radio show last summer," continued Jenkins, "but I never did do it on the program. The sponsor thought it was too much of a departure." He sighed whimsically.

Jenkins reveals that musical conducting is a very strenuous business. "Of course if you didn't like it, you wouldn't take it so hard," he smiled, "but it is more exhausting than any

other work. It's a different kind of exhaustion, though. I carried a cord and a half of wood down the hill at my place the other day and wasn't nearly so tired as I am after a radio show. Of course just standing up for six or seven hours will make you tired, even if you do nothing. And that's how long I stand during rehearsals. Thursday nights I can't stay awake after dinner!"

Jenkins names Sibelius and Rachmaninoff as the two composers who have influenced him the most. "Like most jazz musicians, I started out worshipping Stravinsky, Ravel, Delius and Debussy, but I think as you learn you outgrow them."

Jenkins has done some scoring for motion pictures, and as movie music

has been receiving so much attention lately, we asked him what his professional viewpoint on it was.

Frank Opinion

"It stinks!" he exclaimed. "Except for Victor Young and Alfred Newman," he amended. "I did like the music for the English picture, 'Brief Encounter,' because they just played the Rachmaninoff concerto all the way through. And 'Wuthering Heights,' though it's an old picture, had a score (Newman) which was a contribution to music."

Jenkins on popular music and bands is equally as forthright. He

likes Woody Herman's recent band because it was "interesting and wild," and he still admires Benny Goodman very much. "Outside of those two, all the bands sound the same. I think they're all in a rut. People are tired of hearing guys reach for notes—and miss 'em!"

Jenkins feels that popular songs, too, have hit a new low. "And don't get me wrong," he laughed, "I include the ones I've written in that statement, otherwise I wouldn't make it."

And speaking of Gordon Jenkins' composition, two new ones are ready for a public hearing. One is another musical narrative in a form similar to "Manhattan Tower." It's as yet

months ago when she decided to begin her career all over again in New York. The reason for this sudden departure from cinemaland was the best in the world—Shirley married a young doctor whose professional commitments demanded that he stay in Manhattan.

As far as the kilocycles are concerned, Miss Mitchell is no new hand at seeking—and finding—greener fields. Born in Toledo, Ohio, she began her radio career in that city and Cleveland. Comedienne Joan Davis called Shirley one of the best "straight women" in radio, and claims that Shirley has a unique talent of being able to feed lines to a comic with a perfect sense of timing.

her writing and production on station KVOA, in addition to little theater work, high school plays and writing a newspaper feature.

Hard Decision

When Peggy's father died, she and her mother came to Hollywood. "We couldn't decide between going to New York or to Hollywood at the time. Now I'm glad that we finally decided on Hollywood," she smiled.

Peggy's first big break in Hollywood radio was the Ingrid Bergman part in the "Dreft Star Playhouse" presentation of "Casablanca." Since that time, Peggy's versatility has been demonstrated on virtually every big show in Hollywood. You've heard her as "Sarah Demp," the dumb salesgirl on the "Maisie" show; as "Helen Smythe," the stupid teen-ager on "Life of Riley"; as "Ellen," the scheming mix on "One Man's Family"; as "Dolores Dumbrow," the flat-voiced girl on "Those Websters" and as "Dr. Paul's" neurotic, middle-aged wife on the "Dr. Paul" serial. "Anything from little boys to old ladies," laughed Peggy. "I think when they can't find anyone else for a part, someone says, 'Call Peggy!'"

Studies People

Peggy admits that she gains many of her characterizations from just studying the people around her. "I stare at people dreadfully, I'm afraid," she said a little ruefully.

"I guess I'm very rude sometimes. I don't hear what people are saying to me, I'm too busy watching them!"

Peggy still does a great deal of writing, but believes that she needs to gain maturity before she can expect success with it.

She's very interested in movie and television direction and production and has done several television productions locally. Her favorite hobby is reading—anything and everything—and she boasts a large library. She's also interested in re-doing old houses in whatever spare time she can afford. "I'm just starting to get interested in sports too," she added. "As a child, I never had time for them, but now I've taken up horseback riding and I'm learning to ski. And on weekends I'm taking time off and looking at California!"

Queried as to the most difficult role that she has attempted, Peggy laughed, "It's almost unbelievable, but it was a dramatization of a true story that I did on 'Tapestries of Life.' It was the part of an old woman of eighty-five who turned into a man when she was one hundred and married twenty-five women. As if that wasn't difficult enough, the locale of the story was Mexico and I had to do the character in a Mexican accent!"

untitled, but its theme is the American Story and its basis is "America the Beautiful." Dick Haymes will be the narrator.

Second Jenkins entry is a popular song, "Tomorrow," which Gordon calls "Early American or Hillbilly—whichever side you're on. I prefer calling it Early American," he added.

Hard to Get

Though Gordon Jenkins did make the San Fernando Valley his home, he's now happily isolated at Malibu Beach, where he spends every minute he can. "I only come in to town on Wednesdays and Thursdays because I have to," he declared emphatically. Jenkins is another one of these people without a phone. You have to contact the Ranger station at Malibu to get a message through to him. And if you did, you'd probably be interrupting a record session.

"What kind of collection do you have?" we wanted to know.

"A keen one!" he exclaimed. "It's half jazz and half classical—250 blues and jazz recordings—with the best playback system in the world. Strong men cry when they hear it!"

Other Jenkins hobbies are golf and swimming. "The show doesn't give me enough time to play a long game, so golf is out lately. I'm fanatical about swimming, even though I don't do it well," he added. Though Jenkins' one-time hobby of photography gained him several pictures in U. S. Camera, he has given it up lately.

Future plans include a Broadway musical sometime soon. And Jenkins speaking about Broadway musicals is just as salty as on other current musical forms: "The last time I was in New York, I nearly got kicked out of a theater. I went to see a musical, and though I had never heard the score before, the songs were so unoriginal that I could sing them along with the performers. I sang four songs and left!"

Jenkins evaluates his own music with the same strenuous standards. "Manhattan Tower" he calls a "beginning."

Because Gordon Jenkins is a self-taught musician, he seemed the logical person to query on the subject of amateur composers. "Almost without exception their songs are without merit," he exclaimed. "If one came along with an exceptional song, I don't doubt for a minute that he'd have any difficulty in getting his music published. Names and plugs don't mean a thing as far as songs are concerned—if the people don't like them." Jenkins admits that he's been pursued by would-be songwriters ever since he wrote "San Fernando Valley."

"They all want me to put their tune on the air, so I show them a telegram I have from my sponsor refusing me permission to play 'Manhattan Tower' on my program!"
