So You Think It's a Cinch?

Herewith Some of the Trials and Tribulations Encountered in Setting Up Just One of the Many Football Classics Arranged for New Year's Day

JANUARY 1 . . . New Year's Day . . . the day that the year's football salad is placed in many bowls . . . five of them broadcast over nationwide networks. Two of the five, the Cotton Bowl and the East-West Shrine games, are heard on 390-plus stations of the Mutual Broadcasting System. The Cotton Bowl from Dallas, Texas, and the East-West Shrine game out of San Francisco, California. But wait, I was asked to write a story on the setting up of a broadcast of these football games, and here I'm going into a report.

Well, I've an idea that most everyone knows how a game is broadcast — but just in case there are a few who are not acquainted with the art of arranging for such a broadcast, suppose I permit you to eavesdrop in my office at 1440 Broadway, New York, 18, New York.

It is Tuesday, September 10, about 11:00 a.m. — yours truly is sitting quietly at his desk doing nothing, absolutely nothing, (if the prexy sees this, I'm only kidding), when without warning my secretary, Stella S., calls to advise me Mr. So-and-so from Dallas, Texas, is on the phone.

Well — that could mean only one thing — the Cotton Bowl. In the few seconds that elapsed before I spoke to Dallas, hundreds of little gremlins jumped onto my shoulder warning me of what I would have to go through if I should say just the few words, "Okay, Charlie, we'll take the Cotton Bowl game." And without thinking, that's just what I said.

"How much," I asked, "for the rights? How much?? Oh, all right, we'll offer it to that sponsor." At this point we hang up with Dallas and immediately call the agency that handles said sponsor's advertising business — "Hello, is this Ed? This is Paul. What about the Cotton Bowl on January 1? Do you want it? That's right. Yes, they want zeen-teen dollars this year — Say, is that the same as last year? No, that's one zeen more. Yes, okay, I'll wait."

After a week of calling back and forth, the sponsor gives the agency the okay. I, in turn, tell Charlie it's okay. He informs the Cotton Bowl Association it's okay, and there you have it.

Time Cleared

The Cotton Bowl is now set to be broadcast over the entire Mutual Network, and is to be sponsored by a

Boston business firm. Now we start — first I must notify the Station Relations Department of the network and tell it that the sponsor wants to use the full network. The Station Relations Department must contact each and every radio station on Mutual to ascertain and confirm if it will clear two and one-half hours of time on the afternoon of January 1. Three more days elapse. We are informed that all stations have cleared.

During this period of time clearance, your correspondent isn't sitting still . . . no, he is working with the Engineering Department of Mutual to make sure that broadcast lines are ordered and set up. These lines are bought from the American Telephone Company, and are run from the broadcast booth in the Cotton Bowl to the telephone test room in Dallas. From this point, this special facility runs to the telephone test room in St. Louis, Missouri. That's a long haul, isn't it? Now the question arises — where do we go from here? Ah, that's easy, from the test room in St. Louis we run via a local line to Mutual's network control point in Radio Station KWK, St. Louis, and from there we bring the entire nation the play-by-play story of the Cotton Bowl game.

Let's jump ahead a bit. Weeks have gone by — contracts signed — stations cleared — lines ordered — our publicity department sends out pictures and stories. What else? Oh, yes — the announcers — let's see, who shall they be? Oh well, we really have no special choice, just as long as they know football . . . have good voices . . . wear the right color necktie . . . use creosote for their teeth and bug oil for their hair . . . and please the majority of listeners.

But wait — here's January 1 — the game is on — Wolfton vs. Cowpatch . . . last minute and a half of play . . . the score 0-0 . . . Zimbromwixz of Cowpatch has the ball. He is on the five-yard line . . . he is tackled . . . no, he breaks away . . . he is running . . . five yards . . . ten yards . . . he is now on the fifty-yard line . . . three men on his neck, but they can't pull ole Shamus down. He gets rid of one

Are Two Words We Like to Apply to One Of Our Favorite "Swell People" — Stu!

MY HOBBY is people," says tall and spare Stu Wilson. "Wait a minute, now . . . I don't mean that to be as corny as it sounds."

For Stu, who has chatted, chortled and charmed his way through radio since 1934 (when he took over KHJ's old "Rise and Shine" from the "Alka Seltzer Newspaper of the Air" man, Glenn Hardy) continues that "everybody has a story," and that "trying to find out what it is" can be the most rewarding pastime possible.

Watching Stu at "sleuthing" is proof of the pudding. While he effervesces with mike-participants in the prescribed emcee manner, Stu also *thinks, thinks*, every minute of a radio interview. His genuine interest in conversations is no more assumed than it is "professional."

Stu can develop a great friendship

out of a few minutes' meeting with almost anyone. At the corner where he stops for gas, he talks the "fill'er up" and "okay mister" provincialities into a fifteen-or-twenty-minute resume of: the price of high octane, the high cost of living, the prospect of another depression, what the country's coming to . . . through sheer force of habit. At the corned-beef sandwich stand between Hope and Flower on Eighth, where he stops for a meal after each week's "Dr. Hiss Clinic" broadcast, he gets a spontaneous and unsolicited "hello" from proprietors and customers alike . . . is apt to spend the next hour or so enlarging the greetings into lifelong comradeships.

The "Hiss Clinic" program itself is Specimen A of the great Wilson "gabbing" ability. While the Doctor sits in a small pit, surrounded by a treatment circle of chairs, Stu talks to the patients and makes a delightful participation show out of foot trouble and fallen arches. Before he goes on the air he warns: "Now you just watch. I'm bound to make like an expert on case histories. Terrible thing about it is, I've actually got myself spoofed into thinking I am." (For this assumption he appears to be forgiven. One of the doctors at the clinic actually liked the Wilson "bedside manner" so well that he offered to send Stu to medical school if the

A Day in the Life of a Man of Disc-tinction

*Or, Around the Clock with Bill
Leyden, KMPC Platter Spinner*



7:45¼ A.M.—**DIPPING** a bare and shapely elbow in my tropical fish tank to see that the temperature is right, I cram a crumpet into my mouth and leave for KMPC.

7:59¼ a.m.—Dipping a bare and shapely elbow in my tropical fish tank to see the temperature is right, I cram a crumpet in my mouth and leave for KMPC.

8:07 a.m.—Arrive at station, reeking of costly face lotion, and snarl good morning to the other sleepy radio-ites. Look over outline of morning's program prepared the previous afternoon. Make final check with commercial dept. to see if lucky new sponsors have been permitted to hawk their wares on my program.

8:15 a.m.—Chain the engineer to

the control panel. Gather my props for the show, including records, commercials, candy bars, electric razors and my swiccolo. (A swiccolo is a tenor bassoon with a soul.) As you may have noticed, I occasionally join forces with the performing artists for a chorus or two. This practice is in response to absolutely no requests—and is extremely annoying to some people.

8:29 a.m. — Final scramble for studio. Check with engineer to be sure microphone will be turned on when I make with the charm. Nod to the engineer to start the theme at —

8:30 a.m.—The start of my favorite two and a half hours of radio. The "Music Hall" strains each of the 50,000 watts of KMPC's power to the utmost. Kilocycles burst at the seams. The program is carefully timed and planned to sound untimed and unplanned. The chatter

is ad-lib, free-for-all (except for the sponsors) and as unrehearsed as a barroom brawl. Set jewel-like in the tasty mortar of my introductions are records by the finest artists, exactly chosen to appeal to the greatest number of listeners. While the records are playing, I listen, sometimes I shave, sometimes I dine luxuriously upon dried pemmican and mare's milk. But most of the time I try to keep up with incoming phone calls so I won't be swamped when I'm off the air. Sign-off time at eleven finds me still fresh and debonair, looking forward to the next day's broadcast.

11:00 a.m.—Back to the office to answer phone calls. Callers range from the station's officials to listeners who like me and those who don't. There are calls from musicians whose music I played and from those I ignored. There are calls from song pluggers, music publishers, film

hours a day are devoted to answering mail. I get so little fan mail—I can't afford to ignore it. As a result, I have inaugurated a wonderful plan whereby I send five self-addressed envelopes with every letter I mail . . . with the request that the person distribute the envelopes to five friends. Some day I hope to have the only chain fan club in existence.

3:00 p.m.—To the KMPC music library of approximately 25,000 records to make my selection for the next day's show. Often I include discs from my private collection. Records are chosen with regard for balance, pace, variety and appropriate chatter. I try to avoid the cardinal sin of disc jockeys—catering to one type of music rather than a cross-section of musical tastes.

4:00 p.m.—Time for my visit to the KMPC commercial department. I stroll in on my knees to check the announcement and sponsor schedule for the next day. I take the copy for new commercials and re-write it for my — if you will pardon the expression — "style." On the transcribed spots, I play them a couple of times to find a slightly different twist to introduce the commercial. It's my opinion that a sponsor's message will be absorbed more thoroughly by the listener if a humorous touch is given it. On the

studios, recording companies, and a man named Bjornstrom who insists that I sound like his younger brother who disappeared from a clam dredge off Cohasset, Massachusetts, in 1902.

12:00 noon.—Although a gourmet at heart, I can spare only an hour for lunch. Some recording company representative usually buys my chicken sandwich—except on Thursdays, when I gorge on crisp palm fronds between two Decca records.

1:00 p.m.—By the time I dab a trace of eclair from my moustache, my secretary has all the mail sorted into classifications—legible, illegible and duns from creditors. About two

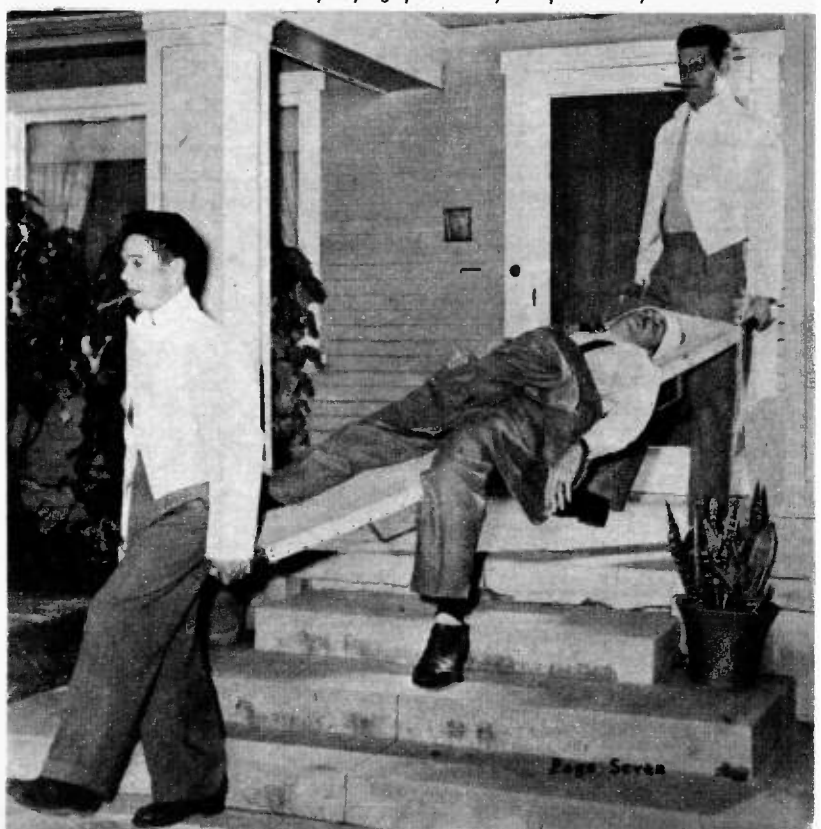
other hand, I do try to present the commercial as convincingly as possible, familiarizing myself with the product or place we're advertising.

4:30 p.m.—Now I attempt to tie together the loose ends of next day's program in a neatly wrapped package to keep the listener from mentally tagging it "Opened by Mistake." I time the various elements, trying to guard against dead spots

It's All in the Family

And the Family Includes a Doll That Suggested a New Show To Lovely Paula, Second Daughter of the Fabulous Stones

THOSE THREE crown princesses, Paula, Dorothy and Carol, from one of the most distinguished theatrical families in America . . . the Stones, have crossed professional paths repeatedly since the days when the Stone family as a unit was capturing the imagination of a nation.

Sister Dorothy, featured in "The Red Mill," was first to suggest stage production to Paula when Paula visited the Coast on a much-needed vacation from her nine weekly radio appearances. And what better show than "The Red Mill" itself, written thirty-five years ago by Victor Herbert for the girl's father, Fred Stone?

It had everything the public had been waiting for—music, color, charm, absence of the brittle crack,

and a sweet nostalgia. New York applauded Paula's first effort into a year-and-a-half run. The second production the lovely radio star and her husband attempted was "Sweethearts." It's now in its second successful year.

After her establishment as a producer, Paula returned to California because she wanted her fourteen-month-old son, Michael Sloan, Jr., to grow up here. She and her husband, Michael Sr., still co-producing shows, share a commuters' schedule between here and New York, attending to the thousand details of theatrical production.

Doll Background

The latest story concerning the blonde, vivacious Paula, who turned her talents radio-ward, begins with the old familiar "once upon a time," and again hinges on a family affair. When the incomparable Fred Stone and his troupe were capturing the imagination of a nation with one of the traditional Stone successes, called "Stepping Stones," Paula's sister, Dorothy, played the part of a "Raggedy Ann" doll. Johnny Gruelle, writer of the "Raggedy Ann and Andy" books, sent Dorothy an autographed "Raggedy Ann" doll. With the continuance of this tremendously popular hit, these comical dolls with candy hearts became favorite and standard equipment in every little girl's playroom, country-wide. Paula still has today the original tousy-haired "Ann" of the beloved painted

face which writer Gruelle presented to Dorothy.

"It was because of this same doll and in the most roundabout fashion that my new show came into being," Paula explains.

"On a recent trip to New York, Michael and I were invited to attend a performance of 'Brigadoon.' Always happy at the prospect of a night at the theater, away we went, not dreaming what would come of it.

"I was sitting next to a man in the theater party whose name I hadn't caught in the myriad introductions. During intermission, we started talking about children . . . naturally," Paula laughed. Michael Sloan Jr.'s adoring mother and father make no bones about him being their favorite subject.

"As we talked, we were deploring the lack of real children's shows on the air. Most of the serials are devoted to the development of the atom bomb or a fast chase by horse across the plains. That's pretty stimulating fare for just before bedtime. This gentleman and I were in hearty agreement that there should be a musical show, with stories, on the air for the tots. I mentioned that I'd love to do a show of just that sort . . . never dreaming the man I was talking with was the vice-president of the Victor Record Company. I had no faint idea, either, that he was in the market for a children's hour. That's how this show was born . . . out of a casual theater meeting.

"After I'd returned to the Coast, we all met at my home one day to discuss a format and choose a child's character around which to lay the show. It was then my eyes lit on that dear little 'Raggedy Ann' doll of

Alternating soloists Eleanor Steber of the Metropolitan Opera Company and Christopher Lynch, heralded as successor to Irish tenor John McCormack, are the possessors of two of the most entrancing voices on the air.

The orchestra, under the direction of conductor Howard Barlow, specializes in presenting popular selections and old favorites as well as classical and concert numbers with equal verve. Composers represented range from Richard Rodgers and Victor Herbert to Puccini and Verdi. Sentimental Irish ballads are dusted off for the Lynch appearances, though his style is not limited to these.

Commercials are restrained and sensible, and Hugh James' announcing fits the character of the program.

On Stage, America

Like most of the talent shows, Paul Whiteman's National Guard-sponsored "On Stage, America," KECA, 7:30 p.m., Monday, stands or falls with the quality of talent exhibited by the professional unknowns who take part.

"Pops" Whiteman continues to be the genial, quick-thinking, personality-plus emcee that radio has known for many years. His well-publicized decades in show business have you believing what he says almost before he says it. As far as Whiteman goes,

his part of the show is always top-notch.

The fluctuating talent presented determines audience enjoyment. Some weeks, the voices and entertainment have been joyous, fresh and original. Other times, the performers are merely carbon copies of a better-known star they obviously admire to the point of flattery. For instance, a recent broadcast presented a girl's trio so enamored of the Andrews Sisters' style that they merely imitated the Andrews record of "Civilization." A young baritone endeavored to sound as much like the late Russ Columbo as possible. An instrumental and vocal trio sounded very much under the influence of the Page Cavanaugh troupe.

Production of the show is notable, as each act is cut in on the network from a different (and usually distant) city. A fast reprise of the participants repeats the operation at the end of the program—all done so quickly and efficiently that we can't understand how it works.

Added interest is given the work of entertainers when "Pops" informs the audience that key men in the recording, radio or musical comedy business are listening with an ear toward exploiting the discovered talent. And when you consider the imposing list of star discoveries credited to Whiteman, it's entirely possible that a good many of these young people are what they're touted to be—the stars of tomorrow.

Opie Cates Show

Tucking away his well-known clarinet for the nonce, band leader Opie Cates is essaying the field of situation comedy with surprisingly good results. Heard Monday nights on KECA at 8:30, Opie's comedy series is built around the familiar premise of boy-loves-the-girl-next-door-but-her-father-hates-him. Francis X. Bushman as the father, Barbara Fuller as the girl friend, and Opie, himself, do standout jobs with these not particularly original characters. Cates' natural Arkansas accent gives his bashful beau role the stamp of authenticity.

Music isn't entirely forsaken in the musician-actor's switch to another field. Buzz Adlam conducts the melodic interludes which are written and arranged by Cates. The clarinet introduction to the show is also the work of the former maestro.

The scripting of the show by Rozwell Rogers, also associated with "Lum and Abner," is particularly fresh and ingenious. The characters may be radio familiars, but the acting plus the writing definitely gives the Opie Cates show that "new look."

Jan August Show

The piano technique of Jan August, who is heard with singer Monica Lewis, on KHJ, Saturdays at 5:45 p.m.,

can best be described as *lush*. With the sweep of a Carmen Cavallaro, Jan covers the eighty-eight keys in the melodic grand style. The pianist, who is also well known through his phonograph recordings, sets the pace of the show with his theme, "Misirlou." His best numbers are those in a similar vein, the exotic-sophisticated school of "Begin the Beguine," "I Get a Kick Out of You," etc. Monica Lewis, who shines in the same sort of song, is an excellent choice of lyric interpreter for the August keyboard impressions.

Because the pair are touring in a series of personal appearances, the quality of announcers introducing the show varies from place to place. Best of those encountered so far was Budd Hulick, formerly of "Stoopnagle and Budd," who announced the show several weeks ago when it was heard from New Jersey.

The only disappointment in this series is that the short fifteen minutes allotted leaves the listener ready for more of the same.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Big Town"

CBS's "Big Town," heard Tuesday nights at 9:00, occasionally parades an episode that bubbles up from the usual dismal stream and shows there is, after all, life under the week-in and week-out flow of pretty trite stuff.

Such was a recent story. Crusading editor "Steve Wilson" of the "Big Town Express," and his adventuresome gal reporter, "Lorelei Kilbournn," following a tip that a hit-and-run driver was taking his victim for a last ride, fixed up a ruse to lure the ruthless motorist into the hands of the police.

No attempt was made at moralizing. The actual hit-and-run incident was graphically portrayed, and "Steve" read a few statistics from the files in his office, telling why each accident had happened. The "it could happen to you if you're careless" came across all right.

It's amazing that an impact of any sort was left after the dialogue took up half the show time with rehashing the plot for late tuners. The rehash was indulged in with a frequency usually used only by comic strip writers who want the Sunday readers to know all that has happened during the week they missed. It's just as annoying a trick on the air.

Evidently "Steve" drags "Lorelei, his lovely," along with him solely for the purpose of having her not very stimulating dialogue serve this rehashing purpose.

Edward Pawley and Fran Carlon co-star as "Wilson" and "Lorelei" respectively, with Jerry McGill scripting. Mystery show lovers, who remain legion and loyal, will like the show in spite of any dragging explanations, for most of the plots are lively and hold a few last suspenseful moments.

Woman Bites Emcee

It's always big news when a radio quizmaster admits he's wrong. Last week Bob Hawk did better than that—he invited a contestant back to the program and paid her the \$2000 he conceded that she had won justly on the preceding week when he had called her answer incorrect.

The contestant, Mrs. Frieda D'Amato, had been asked to name five cities in the United States with over 100,000 population, the initial letter of each name to coincide with the letters L, E, M, A, C in the "Lemac" pay-off. Possible answers were Los Angeles, Erie, Memphis, Atlanta and Chicago. For the letter "M," Mrs. D'Amato named Montgomery, Alabama. Hawk's records from the last census report published in 1940 revealed that the population of Montgomery was less than 100,000, so the contestant was disqualified.

During the week, the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce called the quizmaster and verified the disqualified contestant's answer, declaring that the population had increased during the war and now stands at approximately 110,000.

Hawk immediately called the fortunate Mrs. D'Amato and invited her back to collect her Christmas \$2000.

Dog Advice

On each Sunday noon Lassie show on KECA, Rudd Weatherwax, owner and trainer of the canine star, Lassie, follows the day's dog story with a few tips on dog training and care.

Rudd recently donned his Yuletide whiskers and gave the radio audience some timely information on how to shop for Christmas puppies. And can you think of a nicer gift?

Buying a dog for the forthcoming holiday, Weatherwax made clear, is not the simple matter many pet-seekers are likely to believe.

"With more than one hundred breeds recognized by the American Kennel Club," Weatherwax pointed out, "I can see where selecting a puppy would be confusing."

To keep this confusion at a minimum, he recommended smaller breeds for apartment dwellers, a large or small dog for people with suburban homes and plenty of outdoor romping space for their pets. Advice for those who have decided on a breed is "look at the mother and father of the litter."

"Then," he said, "if they display any weaknesses conflicting with standards of the breed, hereditary weakness in the chosen puppy can be recognized."

Weatherwax went on to eschew popular theories which hold, in one case, that it is wisest to select the largest in the litter, and in the other, that it is smartest to pick the runt of the litter.

"We always feel," declared Lassie's master, "that a sturdy, strong, medium size of the litter is more apt to

mature to the correct size in the majority of breeds."

Mr. Weatherwax failed to solve only one problem for puppy shoppers. After you've boiled your choice down to nine or ten highly desirable pups, Mr. Weatherwax, how do you finally choose just one?

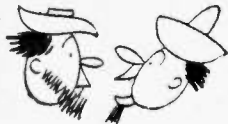

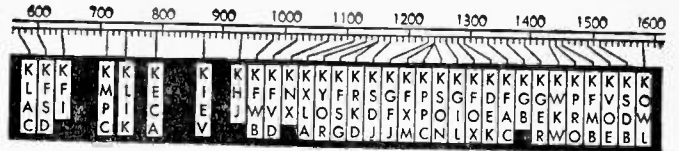

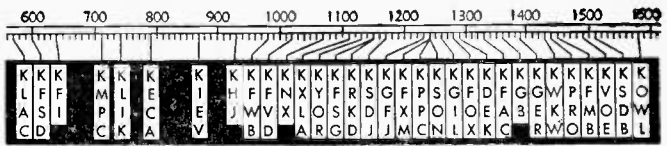

emcee ever wanted to give up radio.)

Full Schedule

Stu has done the "Clinic" programs for five years, "Quiz of Two Cities" (off briefly but now back) since 1940. In addition to these two all-timers on his schedule, he presently handles two hours of classical music and non-classical musings over KFAC daily from six to eight a.m. . . . a show which is building into a big favorite on the morning dial. His past big ones have included "Surprise Party," "Pay Day Quiz," "Saturday Night Party," and the popular Broadway-sponsored shows, "Time Out" and "Teen-Timers Coke Sesh." He has broadcast from every possible place: the Coliseum, planes, ships, mine tunnels, a bucket hanging out over Parker Dam, and jumping out of a third-story window into a fireman's net.

All this rocketing around would slim down anyone, and Stu is unusually lanky anyway, but the most frequent opinion expressed by fans meeting him after hearing him on the air: "Oh! And I thought you'd be a short fat man."

In Stu's hodge-podge desk, which he still maintains at KHJ, is a cherished clutter of pictures, letters and souvenirs from many of those folks he's met through his programs. He used to have picnics for his old "Rise and Shine" listeners, and he still has an active interest in . . . Johnny, "who was twelve ten years ago, and now has a wife and two kids"; the Brown family, "who moved back east in 1943 and certainly miss sunny California"; in Jack or Josephine, who fondly keep him supplied with first editions of stamps or books they "thought he'd like to read." His correspondents are apt to send him anything. Stu made a big thing out of putting "The Beer Barrel Polka" on the turntable recently and leaving the studio to take a walk. A pair of ear-plugs thoughtfully arrived in succeeding mail. Stu rambles through the drawers of his miscellaneous catch-all from time to time, but he's opposed to putting any of it into a scrapbook or file folders. "Systems! Can't ever find anything with a system."

He has two radio peeves. The emcee who insults contestants for purposes of a laugh. "Or for any other reason." The emcee who asks a question and repeats the answer. "You know . . ."

"What's your name?"

"Mrs. Smith."

"Mrs. Smith!"

"Where are you from, Mrs. Smith?"

"Cleveland, Ohio."

Stu hastily adds that he hopes he

doesn't do the latter himself. "If I do, I put myself on the list. Talking down to people is the *worst mistake.*"

For other hobbies, Stu is something of a photography enthusiast. He was joyful as a cricketer when asked to preside at the recent Southern California Photographer's Convention at the Armory. And he likes to read. He belongs to the Book of the Month, Literary Guild and Detective Book Clubs. And reads them all? He takes a deep breath . . . "I do my best!" The mysteries are the easiest, since he's tried Fibber McGee's system . . . reading the first seven pages to find out what's done, and the last seven to find out who done it.

Of his past shows, Stu most misses reading the funny papers over the air. He loves children. "They're the most gratifying audience you can have." Stu particularly remembers a little boy, seven years old, whom the doctors had given only a few weeks to live. The "Surprise Party" program had sent both the youngster and his mother on an all-expense-paid trip to the Grand Canyon. On "Quiz of Two Cities" only a few weeks ago, Stu was again approached by the boy's mother. Before he could get alarmed about any bad news she might be bringing, she said "Tommy's down in the audience. Would you like to see him?"

Stu followed her down the steps, listening to her account of how the boy had suddenly started to recover, how he was now going to school and almost back in perfect health. "Hi!" cried Tommy. "Remember when mom and me went to the Grand Canyon? . . . Hey!" he added, "when are you going to start reading the funnies again?"

that mark a record program as a poorly produced show. The engineer will have a complete copy of the program, and an injection of novocain. The success of any radio show depends upon the engineer's ability and cooperation. A disc jockey show is no exception. Just ask any engineer.

5:00 p.m.—For the next hour I read the various trade papers and magazines, fan mags, record columns, music store popularity listings, record polls, and comic books. Meantime I listen to new releases that come to the office during the day. Out of the fifty or so new records I receive each week, only about twenty-five percent are ever played on the show. Some are eliminated because the lyrics are not suited for radio, others because they are technically inferior, with scratchy surface and distortion. These I return to the gravel companies that manufacture them.

6:00 p.m.—My day's work nearly

over, I rush out for dinner at an expensive drive-in.

8:00 p.m.—Now begins another phase of my activities. A disc jockey has to keep up on what's going on in the music and entertainment world. So I go up to the nearest service station attendant and ask, "What's going on in the music and entertainment world?"

9:30 p.m.—After getting a report from my informant, I begin to think of sleep. Having been told by my physician that due to my highly keyed-up nervous system I must get myself physically and mentally tired, I case the movie theaters in search of a film featuring Sonny Tufts.

11:20 p.m.—That particular torture accounted for—I begin the business of touring the night clubs and such to listen to singers, musicians and bartenders. In this way, I actually run into some good new acts. Then I get their records, and keep my listeners informed on new talent. This night club business is exhausting and purely academic, so I usually knock off early in time to arrive at —

7:32 a.m.—Back home for a quick shower and a change of clothing.

WHEN ASKED the usual leading question — “How did you happen to get into radio?” — Lou Cook’s answer was different, to say the least.

“Well,” answered Louis Marshall Cook, better known in these parts as Lou or “Cookie,” “my jewelry sales job blew up one fine day in ’42, a year when non-essential jobs were dissolving right and left. You see since graduation from Oregon University in ’39, I had been selling fraternity jewelry for a big eastern manufacturer. First I covered U.C.L.A. and Arizona, then was given a larger territory which included eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana. Anyway, when I went down to the desk to check out of the Pullman, Washington, hotel which had served as my headquarters, the manager asked me if I’d like a job as night clerk.”

“But what had that to do with getting into radio?”

“I’m coming to that part,” said Cook . . . and continued. “I took that night clerk job, worked twelve hours —midnight to noon. In a few months I was manager of the hotel, and that game me more free time to concentrate on golf.

“My golfing partner, Buck Bailey, now line coach and baseball coach at Washington State College, and I entered the Western Amateur Golf Tournament at Spokane that year, and it was in Spokane that I started going with Kay, who’s now Mrs. Cook. You see, Kay and I had gone to Oregon U. together, but ours was a speaking acquaintance only, until that tournament in Spokane.”

By this time your reporter had almost decided to give up the Cook radio career. But Lou continued leisurely: “Kay and I got engaged and had set July 9th as our wedding day. I decided a married man should have

some kind of a good steady job. Now I’d always had radio back in the corner of my brain and had tabbed it as a pretty good thing, so I decided to investigate. On July 8th, I went to see Harvey Wixson, station manager of KGA and KHQ, Spokane. He gave me an audition . . . I read commercial copy, a newscast . . . the usual audition stuff . . . and Wixson hired me then and there. When could I go to work?, he inquired. I told him I was going to be married the following day, so he told me to take two weeks off—sort of a pre-working vacation.

“So Kay and I were married, and left for Portland and Eugene on our honeymoon. However, on arriving in Eugene, I received a wire from Wixson to report for work in Spokane on Saturday, so the honeymoon was cut short.”

Starts Experience

Cook worked as staff announcer on the Washington stations for two years, doing sports shows and special events, in addition to his regular staff announcing. He lists as one of the highlights of that period of his career the time he interviewed Father Flannagan of Boys’ Town. In small places, said Lou, practically every celebrity who comes to town does so for some special “cause,” and so makes public service broadcasting material for the local stations. Father Flannagan brought his Boys’ Town football team to Spokane to play Rogers High School that year in a fund-raising campaign. Lou also interviewed Clyde Beatty, and many famous golfers who came to play in northwestern tournaments. In his “spare time” he organized and emceed many shows for the nearby

army bases, Fort Wright and Gieger Field.

Lou is a native Oregonian, born in Roseburg and educated in Eugene, where he graduated from the University of Oregon. All through his school career, Lou was a golf enthusiast. He was a member of his high school team, and even in junior high he played a little, having caught the bug as a youngster when he caddied to raise spending money. He played on the freshman golf team for Oregon Varsity.

Lou is also interested in and has always participated in many other sports — swimming, basketball and sand lot football. Said Cook, “I was afflicted with infantile paralysis when I was three and my participation in sports has helped me overcome the effects of the disease.”

Cook now plays golf regularly at the San Fernando Valley Country Club, where he has a two handicap. He and his doubles partner recently won the Southern California Public Links Best Ball Tournament.

Hollywood - Bound

After two or three years on the Spokane stations, Lou decided he was ready for bigger things. So when Jack Latham came to Spokane with “Breakfast in Hollywood” in 1945, he had a talk with the “big town announcer.” Latham told him Hollywood was a tough nut to crack, but Cook was ambitious. He sent an audition record to KFI and KECA, stations he heard were looking for a vacation relief announcer. He was hired from that transcription.

When the two stations separated and KECA moved to its present

WHEN ROY BARGY, one of the top comedy show musical directors in radio circles, was a teen-ager in Toledo, Ohio, his piano study was lent fervor by a childhood ambition to play some day in Carnegie Hall. He realized that dream as the piano soloist with the one and only Paul Whiteman and his orchestra. The occasion was the never-to-be-forgotten premiere of George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

Later, when the members of the Whiteman band used to leave the stand for the night and race to the old Parody Club in New York, it was to listen to the comical trio of Clayton, Jackson and Durante. Today, Roy is still knocking himself out at Durante's antics, but this time from the advantageous spot on the podium fronting the Durante show orchestra.

Roy's comments today on Durante

and company match his reminiscences. Speaking of the old days, he says . . . "They fractured us with their comedy. Everyone in the band who heard them had their routines down pat." Mentioning his musical chores with Durante now he says, "Like everyone else, I think Jimmy

is fine. His comedy fractures me."

The Whiteman band association was the first big-time radio Roy had done. Previously he'd been associated with Isham Jones, and for two years had played at the famous Edgewater Beach Hotel, in the days when radio

meant a single wire pickup out of the big dining room. It was in 1928 that he was introduced to Paul Whiteman in Chicago. The King of Jazz recognized the ability of the converted concert pianist, and asked him to join his aggregation. Roy accepted.

That started the twelve-year association that took Roy from the honky-tonks of Toledo to Carnegie Hall and appearances in the country's leading hotels and night clubs, and gave him an understanding of music for radio.

Late in 1940, "Pops" and Roy amicably parted for Roy to launch a radio career of his own. He wielded the baton for the CBS Chesterfield series, conducted the Lanny Ross and Xavier Cugat programs, and arranged for Andre Kostelanetz. It was in September of 1943 that the entire musical direction of the old Camel show (which developed into the Durante-Moore comedy airer) was handed to Roy.

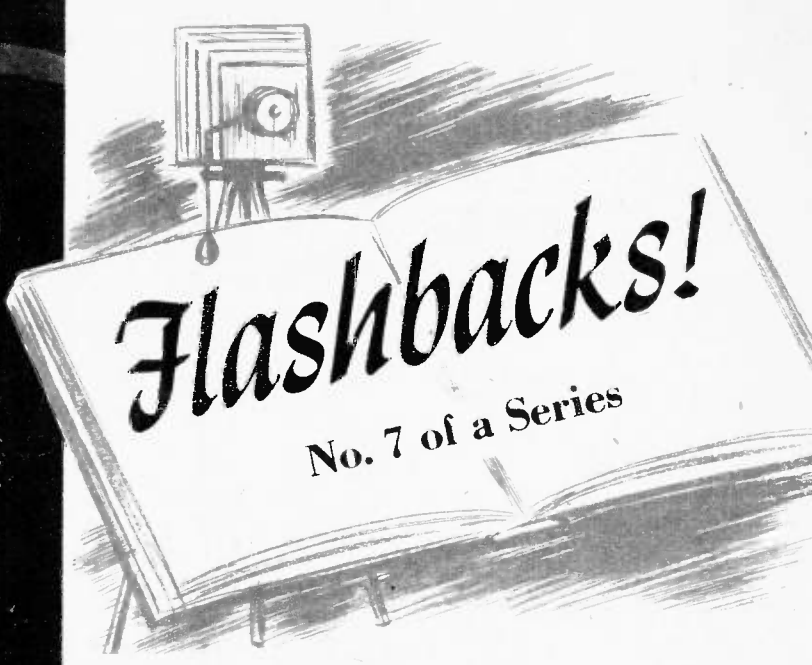
"Before Garry and Jimmy were teamed," Bargy remembers, "a guest policy had been in order. We'd had Jimmy, and Bing, and Hope . . . One day I asked the director if he'd ever heard of this fellow 'Moore', for I was a regular listener to Garry's morning show, and thought he was terrific and really deserved a guest spot on the show . . . You know the rest. After he'd appeared in a single, he was coupled with Durante one week. It was an inevitable combining of talents."

With the new show, Roy had plenty

Tiny GeGe Pearson, long known in West Coast radio circles, does the voice of the shoe-button-eyed "Raggedy Ann," and Don Nessick supplies "Andy's" masculine doll tones.

Addicts of the particular brand of charm Paula exhibited on her "Kreml Show," from the heart of Hollywood, during which she acted as singer, emcee and interviewer of her own fifteen-minute program, back in 1945, and fans of her "Leave It to the Girls" show from New York, will welcome the new radio chore to which Paula brings her lines of gaiety and understanding for children and the world of make-believe.

The lovely young mother, dancer, singer, radio-emcee and show producer, so firmly established right up at the top, modestly says, "I'd always regarded 'Raggedy Ann' as a touchstone of good fortune, and she worked for me again."

of opportunity to put all his training into use. Music and cueing for the fast-moving humor was no cinch. When Rexall replaced Jimmy last summer with the dramatic series starring Pat O'Brien and Lynn Bari, Roy had to dig in to produce the mood music for an entire dramatic half-hour. Having kept his hand in with his serious piano studies stood the maestro in good stead.

You'd assume a musician who can speak of the Dorseys, Mildred Bailey, the Rhythm Boys and Bix Beiderbecke among his first fellow workers would be a reedy, thin-haired man of some age. Not Roy Bargy. The six-foot-one-inch maestro has retained most of his brown hair, and holds a twelve handicap on one of the toughest golf courses on the Coast.

Roy explains it nonchalantly. "By learning early, I got started early." Mr. Bargy is a staunch proponent of the school of thought that hard, thorough training for the concert stage prepares a musician for any field. Then once out in the world he can choose among the facets of the musical profession.

Roy's fifth season as d'Schnozz's right-hand music maker has familiarized him so completely with the format that the midnight oils is no longer a necessity.

Home Life

"It's only occasionally I get boxed up and have to put in those before-dawn hours." Those hours were explained by a grinning, indulgent reference to son Michael, seven, and his three younger sisters, Jeanne, Patty and little Susan. "It seems a little less noisy when they're all asleep. Anyway, the minute Susan gets up she wants some more swimming lessons." We learned that Susan is three years old, and determined not to let

down on that twice across the pool daily, winter or no winter.

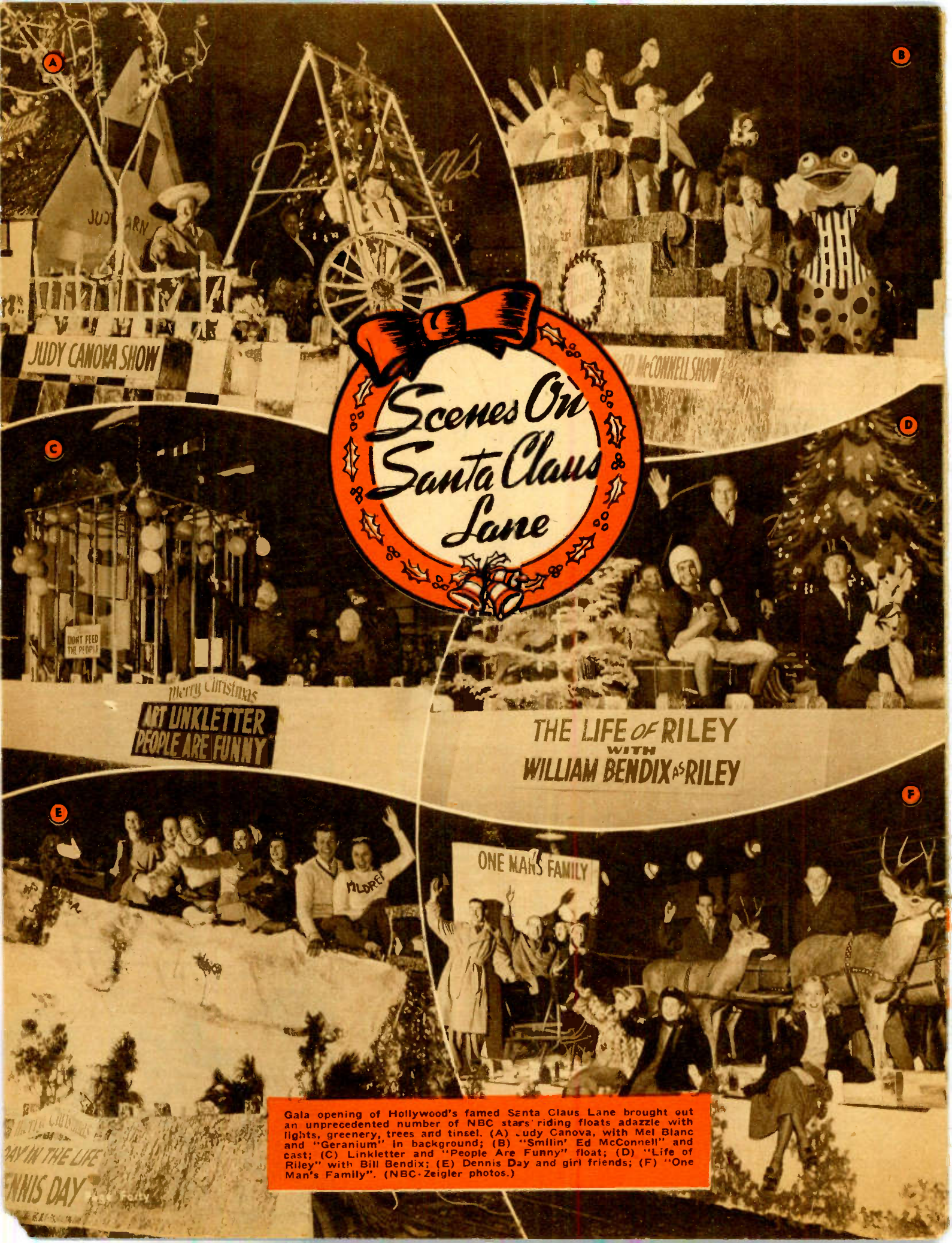
When Roy isn't out beside the pool of his Westwood Village home with the baby, or in his library in session with the scoring sheet, it's a sure bet he's either headed joyfully for Bel-Air and eighteen holes of golf, or enjoying a record session. Music is Roy's biggest hobby, as well as a business with him.

While his preferred taste in music, cultivated in his serious studies, stamps him indelibly as a classicist, Roy's fondest memories of early radio musicianship are supported by an enviable library parading the names legendary among jazz men. Long before these records became collectors' items, Roy Bargy was a fascinated kibitzer at the jam sessions along the by-ways of New York, hearing the music played live. He remains as appreciative of two-beat as he is of the standard three B's—Beethoven, Bach and Brahms.

"It's lucky I like it all . . . whenever guests arrive at a musician's house, he's expected to play anything and everything, all evening long." It's not a lament with Roy Bargy, for he humorously adds . . . "I guess we'd be disappointed if no one wanted to hear us."
