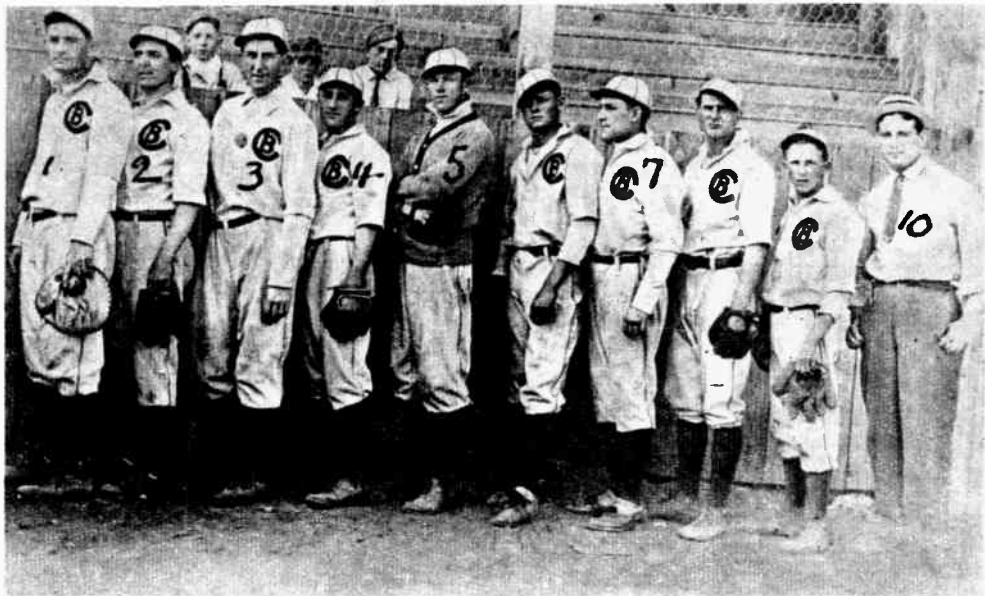
Donald R. Collins, wife of a Nevada baseball player.

*Horace Murphy, "Buckskin" on "Red Ryder," Gives Us an Advance Peek Into His Book About Showboat Days*

Exciting days of the river showboats with their awesome scenery, live steam effects and flashing stars in canvas heavens are caught in fresh and vigorous stories by Horace Murphy, who is writing a book on his early experiences between current appearances on Tuesdays and Thursdays as "Buckskin" on the Don Lee Network's "Red Ryder" show. Radio and TV Life is privileged to bring to its readers one of the lively chapters of "Buckskin's" histrionic nostalgia.

CAPTAIN EMERSON and I decided to "burn up" the river by staging the greatest production the river folks ever dreamed of.

We put on a knock-'em-dead, knock-down drag-out Lincoln J. Carter scenic production of "Remember the Maine." It was by far the most stupendous, gigantic, super-colossal offering ever conceived by the master minds of the showboat world—I hope.

The first act showed, among other striking scenic effects, the U. S. War-

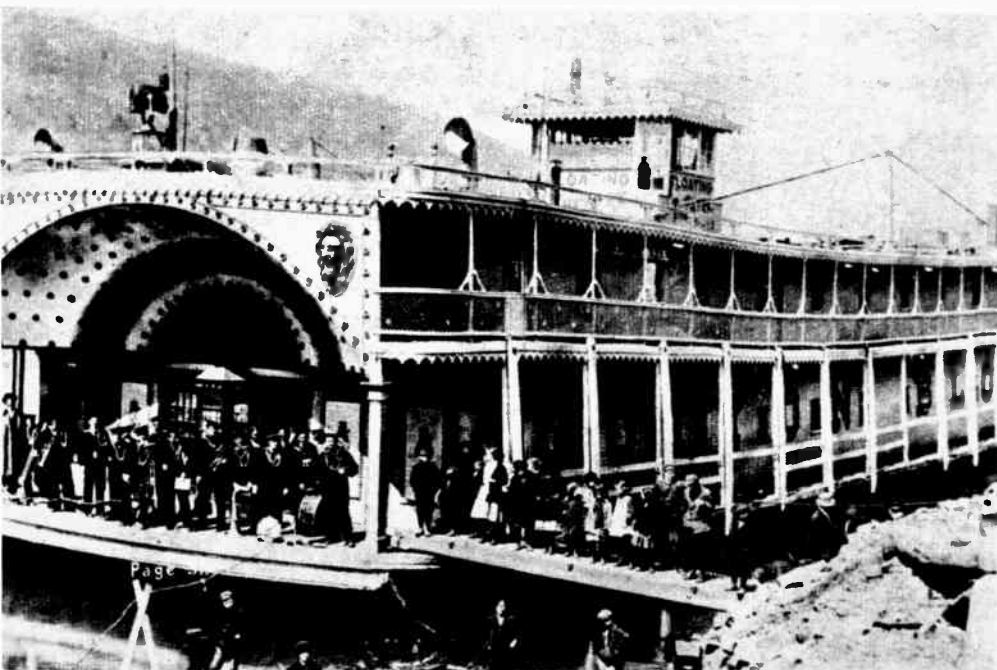
ship "Maine" steaming past Morro Castle entering Havana harbor. It was there the "meanies" hatched the plot to blow her up. The second act showed her, by this time much larger and closer, anchored in Havana harbor. It was dusk at the beginning of the act, and as the actors and dialogue progressed, the stars began to appear in the canvas heavens, the lights of the city in the background began to light up, the big bright moon slowly arose over the metropolis, throwing a soft silvery sheen across the gently rippling water; all timed perfectly with the aid of several electrical devices.

A friend had informed her that the Jack Benny show was auditioning for a little girl. She tried out, along with professionals, and sums up the outcome by remembering modestly, "Mr. Benny seemed to like me, and I got the part!" Until recently, Jeanine was under exclusive contract to Harris-Faye (she plays "Baby Alice") but is now freelancing. Her repertoire includes character roles on several "Lux Theater" shows, "Sherlock Holmes," and the Dennis Day program. She was also in the motion picture "It's a Wonderful Life," in which she portrayed Gloria Graham as a child.

### School

Jeanine is in the B-7 at Audubon Junior High School and classifies herself as a "scrub." Her favorite subjects are gym and English (she loves to read) and she has had all "A's" in spelling. Her instructors have frequently mentioned to Mrs. Roose that Jeanine is as natural as the other students.

Could be that being part of such a nice family has a lot to do with

Jeanine's sweet personality. Her mother and dad are two of the nicest people you would ever want to meet. There are two big brothers whom Jeanine fondly describes as "handsome," Ronald, sixteen, and Douglas, fourteen. The Roose offspring are often typified by friends as "morning, noon and night."

Mrs. Roose, we discovered, never tells Jeanine how she should enact her roles. In fact, her mother firmly believes in *not* prodding Jeanine to do anything which she feels she cannot do. It is stimulating to find fresh talent, such as Jeanine possesses, not driven by maternal "what I could have beens."

Extra-curricular time is spent with lessons in tap dancing and piano. She has been practicing piano for more than five years and at the moment is deep in the efforts of mastering "Malagueña" on the keyboard.

Many carefree hours are taken up with ice-skating, and she can cut a perfect figure eight with the blades. Jeanine recently appeared on a television show which featured ice skaters. For this she wore a crisply Dutch costume, and as she glided before the camera she looked as if she had been imported straight from Holland.

A fascination for stamps finds Jeanine's collection full of treasures amounting to 500. She is particularly fond of her Ecuador stamp on which is imprinted a picture of George and Martha Washington. When we mentioned dolls, Jeanine described her seventy-four-year-old doll from Holland, which has been handed down in the family and is now in the proud possession of the youngest member of the Roose clan.

Vacation time, a favorite season of all children, always means fun time to the big and little Rooses. They are all fishing enthusiasts, and Jeanine laughingly told of the rod-and-reel adventure they had one summer at Lake Irvin in Orange County. "I was trying to cast," she explained with great motioning of the hands and arms, "and I accidentally knocked my dad's pole into the water!" She said that she felt so terrible about the loss that tears came. But this wasn't the end of the tale, for Jeanine goes on, "I felt *something* on the end of my line and started to reel it in." You guessed it . . . there, hooked on Jeanine's line, was the pole that belonged to her dad!

. . . To that yummy recipe for Hungarian coffee cake that KHJ's Norma Young had in her Easter Breakfast layout in Radio-TV Life last week. We made it at home and established (undeservedly) a reputation as a fancy cook!

. . . To KHJ for making the delightful Kenny Baker available with his transcribed series on Sunday at 6:45 p.m.

. . . To KFWB for its furtherance of the cause of good music locally with broadcasts of the California Junior Symphony Orchestra (2:30 p.m. Sunday) and "Contemporary Chamber Music" program (3:00 p.m. Sunday).

#### We View With Alarm

. . . The "Hollywood" touch supplied on "Romance of Helen Trent," by

writers well ensconced in New York. The fanciful talk of dress designers, directors, columnists, stars and the "studio merger" sounds as if it comes straight from Schrafft's.

. . . The light touch that seems to elude with such ease the grasp of most soap-opera authors. We're weary of the character (usually male) heralded in the script as a very humorous fellow whose quips leave the impressionable ladies of the cast laughing (on cue) helplessly. Those same remarks in real life would be tabbed as mere boring non sequitur.

. . . The role of announcer as monomaniac as far as the sponsor's product is concerned. Can't someone think up a better way of dragging in the spiel than of having the announcer pretend to be crazy on the subject of soap, shortening, wax or cigarettes? It gives the impression that the sponsor's product rests in the hands of a weird subnormal who lies in wait for even the most far-fetched word that will lead him into his subject.

. . . The important time listings that are announced at the eleventh hour. Herbert Hoover's unusual appearance on the five-a-week "You and . . ." program, was announced several days too late for print.

. . . The equally important time changes and corrections that are made with such careless abandon after we have printed the original announcement. "The Terrible Meek," eagerly awaited Easter broadcast, was changed from Tuesday to Friday on the day our last-minute log was on the stands. Fanny Brice's first television performance, originally pegged on Easter Sunday, was postponed after we had carried the first listing. (If you have tuned in a logged program and found it missing, a complaint and call to the station may be of some aid. Call Radio and TV Life, too, to check if in doubt.

### On Mike (About Studio Happenings)

#### "Effie's" Sister in Debut

When radio actress Lurene Tuttle was confined to St. Joseph's Hospital before the Sunday, April 10, broadcast of "Sam Spade," producer William Spier was stuck for a replacement for "Effie Perrine," the role Lurene plays each week. He looked no farther than Lurene's own family and put in an emergency call to her pretty teen-age daughter, Barbara Ruick, a student at North Hollywood High. With Lurene listening to a portable radio at her hospital bedside, young Barbara, making her very first appearance in front of a microphone, scored a resounding success playing the role of "Effie's" sister.

#### Prized Fan Letter

" . . . I am an old woman of ninety-one years, who can't sleep, and can't use her eyes, and to have such a procession of the very best music in the world pass by me has been a very wonderful thing. You have such an enormous collection of records and of the finest quality. Thanking you with

all my heart. . . .” The preceding fan letter, received by Robert Shepherd, Don Lee Network music librarian who conducts the midnightly KHJ “Rhapsody in Wax,” provided a thrill to musically-minded staff members. It was from Mrs. Edward MacDowell, widow of one of America’s greatest composers. MacDowell, composer of “To a Water Lily,” “To a Wild Rose” and “Two Indian Suites,” did much during his lifetime to further the cause of American music and composers with the establishment of a foundation at Peterborough, New Hampshire.

# VIDEO In Review

## In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

### Looks Like

Radio set sales will be off almost fifty per cent in this current year, with TV set sales making up the deficit. If the manufacturers attain their objective of producing 2,000,000 video sets this year, the cash income from these may well exceed the retail value of radio sets. . . . NBC and Arch Oboler are thinking of pacting a video deal, which would cement Oboler exclusively to that network as writer-producer. . . . The Lucky Strike “Hit Parade” won’t be telecast for a while, due to the fact that American Tobacco lost the time desired to Crosley’s simultaneous AM-TV-ing of “Who Said That?” . . . Motorola canceling sponsorship of Ripley’s “Believe It or Not.” . . . Don Lee will have to completely rebuild its studio three for KTSL, the video outlet, because of bad television planning when the million-dollar Vine Street studios were built. New blueprints bring the estimate to \$25,000. . . . Eddie Cantor is the first of the big radio names to announce a definite TV show for next fall. Sponsor of the video deal is same beer company which underwrites his radio show. The telecast will be a half-hour show twice monthly starting on NBC in October. . . . Otto Kruger, film actor and one of the few to pioneer in television in England in 1937, is now rehearsing and preparing a dramatic series for video in New York. . . . Ed Wynn may make his television debut soon, in a Hollywood-originated show. Comic has been spurning TV offers that would take him East.

Telecasting of the Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey big top is still awaiting the word from prexy John Ringling North. . . . Hal Roach Jr. has started a third video film outfit, called Matterhorn Pictures, Inc. . . . Val Raset, stage and motion-picture choreographer, will handle dance direction on three KTSL programs. Raset will direct on “Dance Modernettes,” “Piano Portraits” and “Don Lee Music Hall.” . . . It was reported recently that the major film studios are now experimenting with kinescope recording equipment for production purposes. . . . The out-of-work (at least between-pictures) movie folk are flocking to the television studios for stints before the cameras. Nice way to make the time go by. . . . Phonevision will be tested on a commercial basis in Chicago this fall when 300 homes will be equipped with “PV” receivers for the first public demonstration. Zenith stages the stunt. . . . An Eastern demonstration proved conclusively that there is considerable improvement in the quality of RCA’s theater television. It was almost equal to very good 16-

mm. projection, ’tis said. . . . George Pal is getting into the swim of kid TV fare with a series featuring “The Scarecrow” and his rascals.

The Chamber of Commerce, heads of local TV stations, representatives of set manufacturers, and retailers are banding together to lay the groundwork that will make Hollywood the TV capital. . . . The Union Oil Company favors video as a means of getting its annual report across to all the people. . . . Eddy Howard, when he begins his four-week date at the New York Statler this month, will do a video remote for either NBC or CBS. . . . Plans are in the offing for Peggy Webber’s television production, “Treasures of Literature,” to be released on film. . . . A “slave,” which will enable newspaper-size television screens to work off one set, will be marketed this month by the Sampson Electric Company of Los Angeles. A set of “slaves” working off one master can put TV in every room of the home, apartment or hotel, and can be used on any ordinary TV set regardless of size.

When Jerry Fairbanks’s “Paradise Island,” a series of twenty-six fifteen-minute musicals, hits the channels, it will have the largest potential audience of any TV show. Pix are to be booked by a total of thirty-five stations. Until this week fifteen outlets had been the greatest number played by any one program.

### T’aint Easy

The performers who have been flying from the stage of a radio show to the lighted set of a video show, and loving every minute of each, are finding the going a little tough. TV is a full-time job.

Arthur Godfrey, booked into the Capitol Theater in New York, soon found he couldn’t do radio, TV and theater work, so he bowed off the Capitol stage. Milton Berle, flying between radio and video, was forced to vacation for several weeks in order to avert a breakdown. Ventriloquist Paul Winchell had been working the Bigelow television show, the Jane Pickens radio show and the Radio City Music Hall. He and “Jerry Mahoney” vacated the Music Hall.

Phil Silvers, appearing in the stage production “High Button Shoes,” forsook his Arrow telecast for stage work only.

Part of the frenzy which workers in both media experience comes from the fact that all the television shows, big or little, are still in “the experimental stage.” Format changes can occur any time. Long rehearsals are necessary, with everyone concerned going at it with a fervor usually found only in novice little-theater groups.

### Punch With Buddy Rogers

America's gray-haired Boy Friend, Buddy Rogers, is appearing each Monday night at 9:00 over KLAC-TV's Channel 13 in "Punch With Buddy Rogers."

The show's format finds Buddy and his beauteous helpers (there seem to be millions of them around the studio) picking four telephone numbers from the stack of mail the show weekly receives. Phone calls are made, and the lucky ones called choose digits to be "punched" from the big studio number board. Each punched-out number holds a question and a contestant number. The question is asked, by Buddy, of the person on the phone. Whether the at-home viewer answers correctly or incorrectly, he still wins a nice prize.

The number accompanying his question is used in designating which of the aspiring young talents lurking off-stage is called to perform. Junior-type drummer boys, girl vocalists, male vocalists, dancers, piano players . . . the regular parade of amateur talent is on tap. But whoever singles out the wheat from the applying chaff on this Boyd-Cowan production does a good job. Almost without exception the amateurs are really talented, and

the entertainment provided by them worth seeing.

Also, each Monday appears a movie star from the era during which Mr. Rogers established himself for once and all as the number-one idol of those days' bobby soxers. He or she re-introduces the four luckily-numbered contestants of the evening to the audience. Audience applause, checked on an applause meter, designates the winner. The evening's win benefits two people. The person who "punched" the number of the winner, thereby giving that winner a chance to perform in the first place, also wins a watch, electric household utensil of some kind, or an equally valuable prize.

Each evening's winner is brought back on the following Monday to try again. Anyone emerging victorious from these trials for six weeks in a row wins for himself a \$500 government bond.

The game of the day is the usual interesting sort . . . the emcee of the day unusually interesting and charming. Charles "Buddy" Rogers's talents, good looks and poise lend themselves perfectly to this medium he never dreamed of when Buddy himself started out in show business.

If you don't like talent shows, irrespective of the emcee's charm or the fact that the business is turned into a game, you might find a drawing card in the list of guest names who visit Mr. Rogers. Gloria Swanson and Mae Murray have appeared . . . Pola Negri and Mary Pickford (Mrs. Charles Rogers) are to make appearances.

## Second Glances (Critical Comment)

### Slice of Life

KFI-TV's "A Slice of Life," (Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 3:00 p.m.) is a Carlton E. Morse production, slightly reminiscent of early "One Man's Family" goings-on. That comparison refers to all the jolly little intimacies Mr. Morse parades under the good name of family relations.

Bill Idelson, Ada Friedman, Eddie Firestone Jr., and Rhoda Williams, paired into the roles of "Ada and Bill Abbott" and "Eddie and Elaine Coleman," respectively, live in adjacent apartments on a nice street some place in a nice city.

Morse's direction and production, the camera work, and the acting are all excellent. The story line, which follows involvements of and by the two couples, is strong enough to command day-to-day viewing, provided you aren't of the unschooled lot who prefer your footlights and greasepaint separating you and the participants of household gambolings. If you like the feeling of being right in the casts' pajama-clad midst, this is the show for you.

For instance, one chapter we watched found "Eddie" and "Bill" locked in mortal combat over a point of issue typical of old bedroom farces. But the four rapidly straightened out matters among themselves, all sat around in night dress discussing top-

ics of the day, and the story line for Monday ended well. A detective skulking around after "Elaine" adds a note of mystery to the serial.

Each Wednesday, and for that day only, scripts are abandoned, and the four young thespians handle the dialogue with strictly ad-lib comments. Here they prove themselves, for it wasn't until the end of that afternoon's fifteen minutes that we realized no script had been memorized.

If Mr. Morse doesn't let his "Slice of Life" become just too cozy, it looks as though he has the same sort of winner for TV that his radio "One Man's Family" proved.

### Becky Wasn't Sharp

The Philco Television Playhouse's (NBC-KNBH, Channel 4, Sundays at 9:00 p.m.) presentation of "Becky Sharp" turned out to be a clinker, comparing the fare with other excellent Philco Sunday nighters we have enjoyed.

There is a story around that Claire Luce stepped into the Victorian story at the last moment to . . . and we quote . . . "save the day" when a couple of lasses formerly taking turns at the lead dropped out. Miss Luce didn't exactly do anything for the day, save wear the décolleté gowns nicely enough. She minced through the Samuel Carter adaptation of the Langdon Mitchell play based on W. M. Thackeray's "Vanity Fair."

The story of the femme fatale in the days when fops were fashionable was perkily done and uncomfortable to watch. The jerkiness lay in production and acting . . . not camera work, however.

But for all that the attempt at a period play didn't come off as well as most Philco presentations, it was playing, by live people, and all for free. The pleasure of that is something any bumbling can never quite destroy.

### Creole Fish Fillets

(Once made, always enjoyed)

- 4 fish fillets, any kind preferred
- 4 small whole carrots, cooked
- 3 T. margarine or butter
- 1 medium sized onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1/2 t. dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf, crushed
- 3 cans tomato sauce
- 4 T. lemon juice
- 1/2 c. water
- salt and pepper
- 2 T. flour
- parsley for garnishing.

Wipe the fish fillets with a damp cloth, season with salt and pepper. Place the whole cooked carrot on each fillet, roll up and secure with a toothpick.

Into the skillet put half of the butter or margarine, and when hot add all ingredients except flour. Now place the fish curls in the sauce, bring to a full boil, then turn down heat and simmer gently with skillet tightly covered for about 15 minutes. Remove fish curls to a hot serving plate, boil remaining liquid for a few minutes, then make a roue out of balance of butter or margarine and flour, add to boiling mixture. Cook about 2 minutes, stirring constantly, taste for seasoning, then pour over fish curls and garnish with lemon slices and parsley.

### More Ad-Libs

One night, to show their command of perfect Spanish, two of the meanies tossed in "enchiladas" and "tortillas" with their "carambas."

I told them we would stand for those two words, but the first guy who said "chili and beans" would get his pesos cut off. The goodies finally handcuff the badly beaten meanies and march them off stage, leaving the leading lady, a pretty little Cuban gal, and her Cuban patriot sweetheart alone to tell each other of their undying love and devotion.

Then it happened!

The leader of the meanies, the unscrupulous beast in human form, who is also in love with the gal, has escaped and returns for revenge.

The young fellow doing the heroic patriot was Joe Baird, our calliope player, pianist, actor, baseball pitcher and trombone player in the band.

The young fellow doing the rascally leader of the meanies was Gordon Hays, our baritone player in the band, actor and catcher on our ball club. They were indeed two handsome chaps in their early twenties and as strong as a pasture full of bovines.

They took their work seriously. Every night in this scene they put on a fight that had the audience screaming and yelling. They would throw each other over their heads, slamming each other onto the stage with such force it seemed the planking in the stage would surely be smashed. For their finish Joe would smash his right flush on Gordon's chin, a little trick with off-stage sound effect which made it look and sound like the real thing.

Gordon would then land up-stage flat on his back out cold! That would leave Joe down-right stage. The gal rushes into Joe's arms and, woman-like, promptly faints. Joe tries to revive her.

Gordon revives himself and comes to his feet with a revolver in his hand. Joe looks up, takes in the situation and promptly rushes Gordon.

Gordon quickly shoots Joe. Joe promptly falls to the floor.

Gordon grabs the gal up in his

arms and rushes off stage with her.

At this point there is a terrifically heavy but muffled explosion in the vicinity of the Maine.

A blast of live steam from the boilers on our own steamboat, via pipes to the stage and controlled by a valve, pours from the Maine. Strong red and green spotlights are played on the genuine steam. The good ship Maine rises out of the water, breaks almost in half, settles down and sinks beneath a young tidal wave—produced by an electric storm-wave machine. Yes sir, that's melodrama at its mellowest.

On this particular night everything was running at top speed; Joe knocks Gordon flat on his back, up stage; the gal faints.

Joe kneels down to do the resuscitation act; Gordon comes up with his trusty revolver, the audience is yelling, Joe sees Gordon, rushes him, the trusty revolver fails to trust; the hammer comes back but the releasing device fails to function!

Joe's momentum can't wait on the revolver. Joe dives into Gordon's mid-section. The muscle of Joe's left arm comes in contact with the muzzle of the revolver with such force the muzzle is buried in Joe's arm (that's the way they figured it out later). Then the lousy revolver goes off. Being buried in Joe's arm, it made a very faint report. Gordon thought it was only the primer in the shell that exploded and to save a laugh by letting Joe get himself killed from a paper-cap explosion he quickly raised the revolver high in the air to bring it down by Joe's left ear—the side away from the audience. Joe saw it coming and was very prompt. He promptly ducked—right into it.

There wasn't a soul in that whole troupe who told Joe to fall; he took that responsibility upon himself. He hit the deck like the proverbial poled ox.

I have never seen such a dogged example of "the show must go on" as was demonstrated that night. After the sinking of the Maine and the lowering of the curtain, someone was there with a bucket of water and a towel.

Joe grabbed the towel, quickly tied it around his head as he ran down under the stage and out into the orchestra pit, sat down at the piano—which was screened from the audience, because of playing in makeup—and played the vaudeville act with the orchestra, came back, washed the blood off, changed costume and did his two really big scenes in the last act.

No one but Joe knew he had been shot in the arm!

The wadding in the blank shell had gone through his arm and stopped just under the skin on the opposite side, leaving a lump the size of a marble. The doctor from town cut the wadding out, swabbed out the "tunnel," dressed his scalp wound, which looked like a Red River Valley irrigation ditch, and shortly after, we three were uptown in a cafe, eating steaks.

**J**UMP JUMP of Holiday House," who is no feet three, may be just a figment of the imagination, but to the many little boys and girls who listen to his adventures every Saturday morning on KFI, he is as real as you and I. He could be the "little shadow" who follows you around all day, or the "little man who wasn't there," the same cheery imp who has kept moppets happy for a countless number of years, laughing and playing and sharing the secrets of the young.

Last year, "Jump Jump" received an award from the Los Angeles Tenth District California Congress of Parents and Teachers. It was made in recognition of "an outstanding radio series of interest to children." Naturally, this honor made Mary and Harry Hickox proud to have been the ones who conceived the idea of the miniature elf whose whole personality centers around good will.

## Birth of "Jump Jump"

During World War II, while Harry Hickox was in the Army, Mary Hickox dreamed up the idea of "Jump Jump." The name characterizes the actions of the pint-sized doll, for he "jumps back and forth and sideways." When Harry returned home, the couple decided to come to Hollywood. On Christmas of 1946, Mary paid a visit to the "Ladies Day" show on KFI and told a story about "Jump Jump." The beginning of the new year found them placed immediately on the same station as a sustaining program. It didn't take long for a sponsor to hear the delightful fantasies and sign them up.

Besides "Jump Jump" there are several other playland characters about whom the stories of "Holiday House" evolve. There is the giddy clown, "Achipagli" (Pagliacci cut

in half), "Sleepy Slim," the skinny lion who is smart because he spends his time sleeping, and the carefree poet who talks in rhyme. Harry does the voices of the make-believe people and writes the lyrics and music which accompany the tales. Mary is "Mary Holiday of Holiday House" (where every day is a holiday), and has the job of writing the scripts. Mary explained that in writing the stories they follow the criteria for children's programs which were composed from a survey of children in the United States, and every story they use is checked against this.

## Talks Fast

"By having 'Jump Jump' talk rapidly," said Harry, "the children who listen to him are able to make him say what they want him to say." Mary added that they have received letters from parents of babies one year old and under, who listen to "Jump Jump" and talk back at him. The age of listeners averages from the very young up to twelve-year-oldsters, who listen to the fantasy with a more sophisticated ear.

However, this doesn't exclude the young in heart who also have been enchanted by the fables of "Holiday House." A close relationship between the listeners and "Jump Jump" has been knit with the exchanging of greeting cards to and from each other. "Mary Holiday" also receives a good share of the letters from fans.

What makes "Jump Jump" so true to life is that he is not just another make-believe person who never does anything wrong. "His problems are interchangeable with children's," said Mary, who went on to elucidate that the idea of the show never becomes so complex that it cannot be grasped by children. "We always illustrate the solution of the problem presented," she continued, "and we often present a situation where 'Jump Jump' learns such everyday habits as hanging up his clothes." Underlying all the stories is the feeling of tolerance.

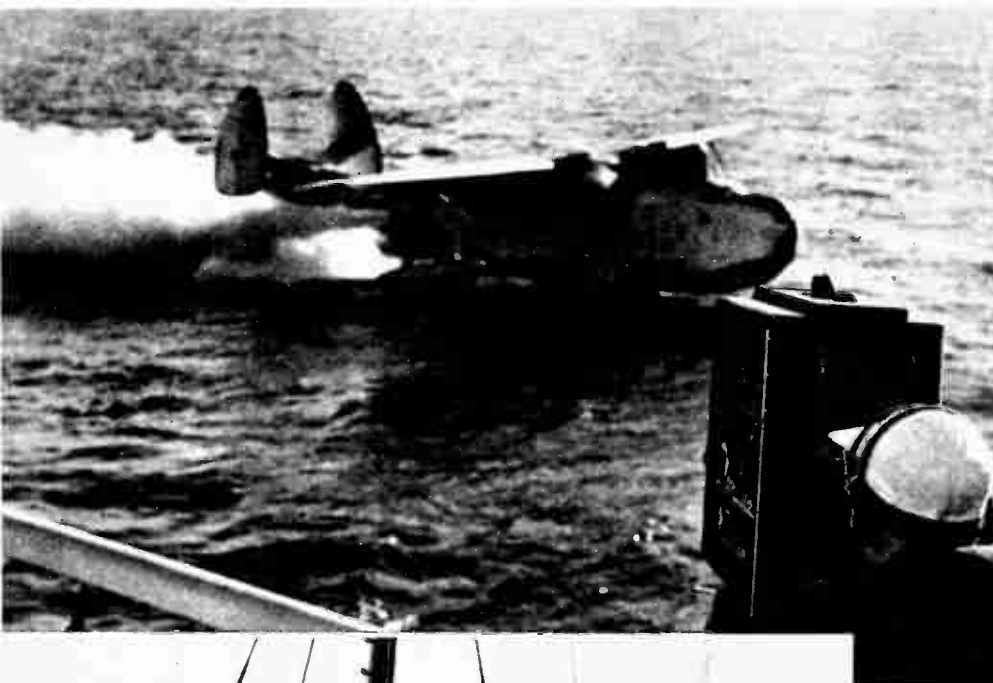
## What He Looks Like

When "Jump Jump" originated, Mary and Harry took their own ideas of him to an artist, who worked with their imaginary conception of what he should look like. The drawings were then taken to a designer who made the doll, and out of some paint and material and pipe stems came a doll with red hair, pointed ears, and bright pixie eyes. Atop his head perches a gay cap with a bouncing pompon. "Jump Jump" can be seen on many types of merchandise, including pajamas, T-shirts, dishes, place mats, paint books, and of course, the popular "Jump Jump" dolls.

"Jump Jump of Holiday House" is not the only program which the Hickoxes do. They also are the "Mr. and Mrs." of KFI's "All Around the Town" (formerly "Downtown and All

# Operation Rescue

Lookers sitting beside their sets at home were able to see the entire "Operation Rescue" better than if they were on the vessel itself, thanks to the great flexibility of the twin orthicons which were switched alternately from one angle to another as the event took place five miles off Hermosa Beach.

It was a maneuver that required delicate timing. The factors included not only the 255-foot vessel itself, but also a big PBM flying boat and a tiny raft with two men aboard it in the open sea.

#### Men Overboard

A lifeboat from the "Minnie" was lowered for the purpose of "planting" the raft and its two-man cargo, Los Angeles County lifeguards Jim Bailey and Fred Kerwin. The "survivors" scattered green dye on the waves to attract air and sea patrols, then radioed for "help."

Soon the great PBM received the SOS and arrived on the scene, circling overhead to pinpoint the raft as it bobbed precariously on the fast-run-

ning ocean swells. Then it landed on the water and the "rescued" men crawled aboard.



Confronted with the possibility of smashing his plane in the rough waters on the takeoff, the pilot, Commander George McDermitt, decided to use his Jet Assist Takeoff (JATO), and after a short run the big craft actually "leaped" out of the water and flew back to its land base.

All of this was picked up by television cameras and the images were beamed to the Don Lee base transmitter in Hollywood, then relayed to home lookers on Channel 2.

One camera, manned by Bob Fonarow, was stationed on the for'ard port wing of the "Minnie's" bridge, while the other, manned by H. I. Smith, was located atop the superstructure forward of the fan'tail. A coaxial cable linked the cameras to audio and video monitors in the captain's cabin, from whence images were beamed by micro-wave to the land transmitter for relay to Southern California home sets.

**B**ACK in 1930, Nila Mack took over a children's program, "The Adventures of Helen and Mary," which featured two children and an adult supporting cast. Nila fired the adults and changed the format. Four years later she changed the title to "Let's Pretend."

In the early days, the "Helen and Mary" period, Nila's difficulties were more mechanical than artistic. The entire sound-effects department consisted of two men. The music had to be performed on the air without a rehearsal because the staff men were too busy playing on successive programs to rehearse between shows. Frequently "Let's Pretend" only pre-

tended that it had a musical ensemble; all you could hear when the show opened was a pianist. The others would get into the studio during the first five minutes, so that the high spots, at least, were played by the full orchestra.

During those 1930 days, listeners were intrigued to hear "The queen mother is played by eight-year-old Gwen Davies" or "The fire-breathing monster is portrayed by ten-year-old Billy Halop." Now many of the actors heard on the show have emerged through childhood and adolescence while retaining the youthful viewpoint that makes the "Pretenders" so popular.

#### Successful Kids

It's interesting to peer into Nila Mack's tattered audition notebook which she has used as a filing system for the youngsters who auditioned in past years.

"Billy Halop . . . ten . . . excellent heavies and toughs . . . use." (Billy became the most famous member of the "Dead End" group of kids and had himself a notable screen career.)

"Jackie Kelk . . . nine . . . acts, plays ukulele, sang 'Would You Like to Take a Walk?' . . . use." (Jackie is now best known as a Broadway actor and "Homer" on "The Aldrich Family.")

"Peter Donald, Jr. . . . excellent . . . dialects, all good . . . remember." (Peter is now Fred Allen's "Ajax Cassidy" and jokemaster on "Can You Top This?")

"Roddy McDowall . . . eleven . . . English kid . . . terrific . . . try to place immediately." (Roddy is another who became a movie moppet.)

"Joan Tetzl . . . fifteen . . . soft voice, quality very good . . . remember and use." (Joan has starred in the Broadway hits, "I Remember Mama" and "Red Gloves" in which she was Charles Boyer's leading lady.)

Nila has helped many youngsters find their dream of stage success, as she helps the children at home on Saturday mornings create their lands of fantasy.

"Fairy tales are the children's Shakespeare," she smiles. All youngsters should grow up knowing these delightful stories by heart . . . we older folks will do well to recognize fairy tales as among the best in literature for young people and a subtle, important teacher of simple, eternal truths." "Let's Pretend" fan mail proves to Miss Mack that fairy tales have a power all their own. Many mothers have written that listening to the program has proved to be the most successful method of keeping their youngsters off the streets on Saturday mornings.

#### Children's Aid

The young "Let's Pretend" actors (some of whom have been with the program since its beginning) are devoted to Miss Mack and feel a close bond among themselves. Like members of a family, they take pride in the success of each other. Miss Mack

# Love at First Job

From "Helen Trent" to "Skippy,"  
The Mitchels Have Shared Radio  
Production and a Happy Marriage

**T**HE romance of "Helen Trent" isn't, as you would naturally suppose, "Helen Trent's." It's the romance of Les and Madelon Mitchel.

Or so their Chicago friends say, speaking about the way this handsome and successful Mr. and Mrs. team met. It was back in 1942 that it all happened. Madelon, a Detroit socialite in search of a career, knocked on Les's door asking for a radio acting job. The "Skippy Hollywood Theater" producer-director-host was producing "The Romance of Helen Trent" and a number of other radio shows in Chicago in those days. He hired Madelon and it was love at first job. Eight months later they were married.

Virginia Clark, the then "Helen Trent," held a big reception and everyone in radio came to celebrate.

Madelon, who had Les Mitchel to

thank for giving her her radio break, paradoxically forsook radio the moment they were married and became Fashion Coordinator for Marshall Field's, the big Chicago department store. But when they came to Hollywood in 1944 she began in earnest her role of helpmeet and hostess for the busy Mr. Mitchel. Les says that Madelon can take a bow for the fact that "Skippy Hollywood Theater" is among the top fifteen most popular radio shows on the Pacific Coast.

Skippy is now heard on fifty stations around the United States and Hawaii, going stronger than ever after eight years on the air. When it first started out, the show made no great splash in the radio business. Starring a great many of the lesser-known picture players and buying what stories were available at low-budget prices, the program made a valiant attempt at bucking bigger shows. When Les took over a few years ago, he went all-out for big

names and the best writing talent available, and the increase in the program's rating proves that he had the right idea.

Realizing that securing top names for radio is often a matter of personal friendships, Madelon became one of Hollywood's best-known hostesses. Actors, writers and radio personalities throng to the Mitchel ranch in Sunland.

Script ideas are often developed while guests lounge around the pleasant pool. Sometimes a "name," allergic to Hollywood radio dramatic shows because they are over-glamorized, discovers, while munching on a Les Mitchel barbecue, that this is an actor's workshop kind of show that actors like to work in. George Raft, Robert Montgomery, Ginger Rogers, John Payne and Constance Bennett are a few of the topnotchers who have succumbed to the spell because this show gives them a rare chance to act in radio.

## Likes Country Life

Les, ex-Ohio farm boy, was once the proprietor of a swank Beverly Hills office, but he likes doing business from his ranch much better. Cultivating his orange groves, feeding the chickens, and whipping up a tasty barbecue make for better radio fare, he thinks.

The producer-director-host has a record which covers some twenty-five years of theatrical and radio experience. He began his career as juvenile lead in a road company playing "Naughty Marietta." He's been a movie extra, wardrobe worker, prop man, and assistant director. He's directed soap operas, symphony orchestra shows, heavy stage dramas, network comedy programs and children's phonograph records.

Once in a while he stars in a Skippy production. When he does, Madelon throws the cues and gets a producer's credit.

At this writing the next show Les is scheduled to star in is "The Terrible Meek," during Holy Week. He did this program last year. The tremendous amount of fan mail that resulted from its performance last Easter season prompted the decision to repeat it this year.

Whether or not Madelon is throwing cues, she's always at hand at International Recorders every Monday night when the shows are cut. She performs off-the-mike hostess duties while host Mitchel is tending to acting matters and buzzing around with coffee and sandwiches.

Right now, Les and Madelon are working on a new summer series for Skippy, which will star newcomers slated for movie fame in starmaker Les's crystal ball. They had a series like that two years ago, when they turned the spotlight on Barbara Law-

feels that her "Pretenders" are good and useful citizens not only because of the high moral implications of the tales they enact, but also because early in life they were given a goal: success in a profession. "One lesson that parents could learn from our 'Let's Pretenders' is that a child with a purpose in life will keep occupied, and busy youngsters don't have time to wander the streets and become problems to their parents or to society," says Nila. She is well aware that not all children have talent for acting, but she does feel that "nearly every child has a talent of some kind which can and should be developed into an active, healthy interest. Often the very trait which a family tries to discourage could become the means to a happy life and a successful career."

Nila does believe that every child has a basic gift for fantasy that is a normal ingredient of his inner life. Music on her program, she insists, must remain carefree and juvenile in spirit while performing the necessary function of establishing the mood and character of the fantasy. Maurice Brown creates the joyful numbers heard on the series. Another helpful adult is "Uncle Bill" Adams, who announces the program and accompanies the "Let's Pretenders" on their magic ride each week. This magic ride may be taken on the backs of giant birds, magic carpets, fire engines, rockets to the moon, fish, dragons or a B-29. It's all very easy when it's "Let's Pretend."

### Band Leader

Before his radio days, Harry had one of the two-beatin'est Dixieland bands in the South. The band, "Harry Hickox and his Orchestra," dissolved in 1939 and many of the boys are now members of popular dance bands. Harry claims that Dixieland is "strictly American music" and loves it dearly.

A blind date brought Mary and Harry together in New Mexico in 1931, and two and a half years later they heard the wedding bells chime at Fort Sumner. Their first radio show together, called "Early Morning Sunrise," was in Amarillo, Texas, and featured the band (that is, the members who could make it to the broadcast at such an early hour). It usually began with one or two of the musicians (with Harry holding the fort) and ended with the rest of the gang playing together after they had finally awakened. Mary played, of all things, a friendly old woman who brought the boys coffee and cheery greetings.

Both have acted in stock shows. Mary is a stage actress who has played roles from the ingenue to the lead, and Harry remembers the time
