PICTURE an athletic-physi-
siqued man, six foot five,
with salt-and-pepper
curly hair, bouncing down
Hollywood Boulevard in a jeep and
you catch a glimpse of Bob Purcell
in one of his natural poses.

If he stepped out of the jeep and
walked over to greet a friend, you
would be literally bowled over by
the deep rich voice. He speaks as
though his words were arising from
the very tips of his toes. And with
a man like Purcell, that's a long
way to come. The profound tones
that any orator would gladly give
a lung for are familiar to listeners
who dial ABC's "California Caravan"
Sunday afternoons.

His radio credits travel back to
Chicago, where, on station WFL, he
spent eight years disc-jockeying a
make-believe dance session three
hours daily. Bob remembers that it
was before platter papas took the
country by storm. When the rage hit,
he laughs, "I was one of the boys
who were on the outside looking in."

When Pearl Harbor Day shook the
country, Bob was set for a commis-
sion in the U. S. Marines. As fate
would have it, he injured his
shoulder in a bicycle accident, thus
canceling his 1-A status. Soon after
the accident, rejected Bob left Chi-
cago for Hollywood.

WHEN the frosted pitchers of lemonade, rolled-up sleeves and busily purring electric fans are in order this summer, radios country-wide will be pouring out a brand of entertainment in keeping with the light and airy. Music is one of the main orders of the day.

As the vacationing teams, comics, dramatic casts and audience-participation shows take themselves thither, a series of faces and voices both old and new are seen and heard on stage. And the planning of summer shows this year has followed a somewhat different tack, born of necessity.

The day when radio crawled into

its shell for a month or two and the networks stocked listening time with fly-by-night talent is gone. The "trading" of shows by the networks has been responsible, in part, for the care in choosing summer fare. For artists new to the network or to listeners, the two- or three-month period provides time to prove themselves and their entertainment value.

Television is also partially responsible. With an eye to this coming

TELEVISION and working wives have added new minor irritations to the roster that send a spouse home to mother, according to John J. Anthony, the famed human-relations counselor.

Television is the new thorn in the path of the wife who wants to get out at night after a day of household tasks, Anthony said. But while the working wife complains that her husband doesn't help enough with the household chores, the number of complaints about money has lessened considerably with the post-war rise of financially independent wives, Anthony disclosed. Anthony says wives complain about: (1) his roving eye; (2) that one drink too many; (3) digs at in-laws; (4) he doesn't notice the new dress, hairdo or hat; (5) he doesn't remember birthdays or anniversaries; (6) he leaves the disciplining of the children to her; (7) he says he'll be home for dinner at six and expects it to be edible



at ten; (8) the dozen times he tells each joke or story; (9) his clothes left around for her to pick up; (10) he never thinks she needs a new dress; (11) he's always reading a newspaper when she wants to talk;

(12) the endless diet of sports he watches on television; (13) he doesn't tell her anything about his business; (14) he never helps with the dishes; (15) he's always too tired to go out.

Husbands, he says, complain about: (1) slipshod housekeeping; (2) if he mentions a food once, she serves it until he hates the stuff; (3) digs at in-laws; (4) she doesn't think he can select his own clothes; (5) she's always talking about the men she could have married; (6) too much attention to the children; (7) she's never on time for appointments; (8) she doesn't appreciate his abilities; (9) she litters the bathroom with beauty preparations and underclothes; (10) no matter how many clothes she has, she never has a thing to wear; (11) she never knows what's going on in the world; (12) she insists that he turn off the light when she's finished reading and wants to go to sleep; (13) he can never get into the bathroom because she's primping; (14) she's always changing the furniture around; (15) she always has to break in a pair of shoes for weeks because she never buys them to fit.

Anthony's advice to persons seeking help is heard every week from WMGM, N. Y., and is rebroadcast in many parts of the country, including KHJ, Los Angeles (Sunday, 10 to 11 p.m.)

Studio Guidance

Anthony never coaches the persons he interviews and there are no scripts. He invites people to come to the studio on the basis of letters he receives from them and he has a brief pre-airtime chat with each.

"Myrt and Marge" Return to TV

Famous Show Returns Under Guidance of Myrtle Vail, Original "Myrt," Only This Time It's a Pioneer in TV-1949 as It Was for Radio-1931

I WAS tired of doing nothing," says Myrtle Vail, famed creator of "Myrt and Marge." This popular air serial had started in 1931 and continued till 1942 when Miss Vail decided that she'd like a rest. Television, brightening up the entertainment scene, is bringing "Myrt and Marge" back to the fans.

The first "Myrt and Marge" film, made under the supervision of Miss Vail, has been completed at the Hal Roach studios and at this writing is being sold to outlets across the nation.

Coming to Life

Miss Vail cast the roles of the two engaging chorines, wrote the story line from her original scripts, acted as technical adviser and approved the rest of the cast. She knows that many of the millions who took her and her daughter, Donna Damarel, to their hearts in the popular story will demand veracity to the original. She's making sure that the story remains true to itself.

Bernadine Hayes, a show-business veteran, plays "Myrt" in the TV film. "She has a sense of humor, a deep

voice, she looks the part and she knows stage department," says the original "Myrt," Phyllis Coates, who plays "Marge" (the role done by Miss Damarel until her death), looks the role of the sixteen-year-old chorus girl. "It will make a star of her," smiles Miss Vail. Perfect casting places film comedian Franklin Pangborn in the role of designer "Clarence Tiffingtuffer." Popular leading man Lyle Talbot will be seen as "Ray Hunt," the producer, and June Storey plays "Billie," the heavy.

Based on Life

The backstage story, a phenomenon of early-day radio, was written by ex-vaudevillian Myrtle Vail from her own experiences. She went into show business at the age of fifteen. With her husband she toured the big time as "Damarel and Vail." Her daughter Donna was inaugurated into the act at an early age.

"I'd never even seen a mike before," she laughs, recalling her initiation into radio. She had written ten scripts of the serial—"I didn't know what would happen beyond that. . . . When things got dull, we just killed someone off. If any of the current

daytime soap operas sound familiar it's probably because we ran the gamut of *all* the plots there are." One of the first of radio's continued stories, the serial was as popular with children as it was with adults. It supplied adventure long before the "Lone Rangers" and the "Tom Mixes" arrived on the air. First of the shows to cater to more sophisticated listeners, it found a ready-made adult audience. For five years on CBS it played in opposition to "Amos 'n' Andy." "There were some families where two radios were kept going at once so both programs could be heard."

Programs Saved

Miss Vail has all her original scripts—there are a couple of thousand of them—and she calls the early ones "museum pieces." She claims that they're all over the house; one of her closets is filled

"Press Conference"

When Mickey Cohen and author Ben Hecht show up together on a program and allow themselves to be interviewed informally, that's news. And news is what "Press Conference," KECA, 8:00 p.m. Thursday, is on the air for.

Each week a panel of four members of the Los Angeles Metropolitan press, police reporters, city-hall men, human-interest and feature writers, gathers to give the latest slant on a hot news story or a follow-up on a past head-

line. Each man tells his story and then settles back with his fellows to query a newsworthy visitor in true press-conference style. The recent Mickey Cohen interview was particularly interesting, in that we imagine that it was not an easy task to persuade Cohen to face the mike and the reporters. He sounded natural and, to these inexperienced ears, like any other big-town citizen with a gift of gab.

Ben Hecht, rather overwhelmingly famous as co-author of "The Front Page" as well as other best-selling novels and hit plays, was introduced with a reprise of his background as a Chicago police reporter. He related several of his news-gathering experiences and made "The Front Page" sound practically autobiographical.

Hank Weaver handles the master-minding of the panel and the interviewing of guests with great skill. With the only radio-trained voice on the show, plus a news-sense of his own, he overshadows most of the experts.

Summer version of the "Supper Club" is recommended with a big "yes" because of the top singing of Kay Starr, heard on the Tuesday-Thursday spot with Bill Lawrence on KFI at 8:00 p.m. Lawrence, replacing Perry Como, is heard on the other week-day nights with the Fontane Sisters, Mitchell Ayres and his orchestra and Martin Block.

Lawrence, you may recall, is the youngster who stopped the show one night on Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" and who has had a substantial career caroling for the Godfrey show. He has a nice singing voice, but his personality is too indecisive to carry the emceeing of the fifteen-minute musical with the snap of a Bob Crosby or a Jack Smith. The program drags when he speaks and sparks when he sings. On the other hand, Kay Starr proves again that she's a vibrant personality with a wonderful voice and the dash of a showman. Lawrence should learn a lot from co-starring with her. The program still has a mystery-voice contest once a week, a gimmick that gives away loot when a thinly disguised star is unmasked. To the average listener, the stunt just holds up the show.

The hour-long broadcast doesn't get as heavy as the wintertime Arturo Toscanini segments, but the plums of classical music are there all the same. Arthur Fiedler was first conductor heard on the series and the lovely voice of Dorothy Maynor was in the guest spot. Listed for upcoming engagements are Sigmund Romberg (which should answer the query—is Rommy going to have his show this summer?), Dimitri Mitropoulos, Percy Faith and Wilfred Pelletier. "Theater Guild" staff of Roger Pryor, George Hicks and Norman Brokenshire (celebrating his twenty-fifth year in radio) make an unusually good team for this type of program.

"John Steele, Adventurer"

An unusual adventure series bowing for the summer on Mutual is "John Steele, Adventurer," heard on KHJ, 8:30 p.m. Tuesday. Fans of radio melodrama and mystery are bound to find it entertaining.

As with many shows of this type, the plots are difficult to detail. In this instance, however, the show manages to convey a distinctive style of its own. Don Douglas as "Steele" proves to be an interesting character. Well integrated use of music and sound effects must be credited to Robert Monroe, who writes and directs the program. Allotment of both these chores to one man probably makes the "different" spirit of "John Steele." Sylvan Levin contributes an interesting musical score to the show, making it count much more than just a background to the dramatics.

Barbra Fuller ("Claudia" of "One Man's Family") and the talented Betty Lou Gerson are both making their mark in the current "Red Menace." . . . To KFI and NBC for recording

and playing back "NBC University Theater" at its usual 11:30 a.m. time on Sundays. Now that the show is heard across country on Saturday afternoons, localities thought they had lost it for good last week when it didn't show up at the announced Saturday time.

. . . To the wealth of interesting detail, description and facts that make up the "Quiet Please" scripts by Willis Cooper. His facility for putting sights and sounds into word-pictures stands alone in radio.

. . . To "Sam Spade" for mentioning, during his stroll along the San Francisco waterfront recently, that "the 'Novak' character was sleeping one off." We knew that all the San Francisco detectives and investigators were bound to run into one another sooner or later!

We View With Alarm

. . . The contestants who have guessed that the current "Phantom Voice" on CBS's "Sing It Again" is Aly Khan or ex-King Edward of England—though the voice is distinctly feminine.

. . . The screaming, screeching neurotics, both male and female, in practically every murder mystery and suspense program on the air. The sustained yelling at the denouement of so many of the programs—"Yes, yes . . . I killed her . . . and do you know why? In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Anyone Have an Answer?

We are printing this missive in our Video in Review section primarily to set it aside from the Ear Inspires. We invite you all to read it, and hope that some among you professional video men will see fit to answer the gentleman who penned the question. The writer, incidentally, could easily be a friend of yours. He is well known in radio, and has done a good bit of television and motion-picture work over the past few years.

Dear Radio Life:

This is one of those "please don't use my name" letters. As you read you will understand why the use of my name is not desirable. But first (as our radio announcers say) I want to ask a question:

"Would you, presuming you are an average citizen not connected or associated with radio or television, spend a few hundred dollars for a television receiver, just to view the type of programs as currently presented, or would you use the money for some other form of entertainment or investment?"

I am a television performer. I also have some slight reputation as a radio artist, using the word "artist" purely in a business sense as a member of the American Federation of Radio Artists. You have from time to time used my picture in your very worthy and informative publication in connection with my radio work, and to be so publicized in Radio and Television Life is indeed an honor.

Even with my radio and television background I do not feel qualified to speak for or against our current TV programs. That is why I am asking the question of whether or not the expense of a television receiver is justified for the programs presented.

Allow me to exclude the three major sports of prize fighting, wrestling (so-called) and baseball. These undoubtedly have a great appeal for the barroom trade. But I know many people, male and female, who prefer their entertainment at home instead of in a saloon.

I also know many splendid women who do not consider a television diet of prize fighting, wrestling and baseball as mentally healthful and proper for home consumption.

But with the sports events excluded, may we consider the other programs. It is not my purpose to dissect individual TV shows, particularly those designed for the younger generation. By and large, they are good. The performers are excellent and able and they stay well in their groove of entertaining the small fry.

If you are not an intense sports fan or a small child, what else does television have to offer that would justify the expenditure of the amount neces-

sary to purchase a good television receiver?

If you are not a particular admirer of Milton Berle or Arthur Godfrey the programs are narrowed to a still smaller field. That, of course, is purely my own opinion.

I am told by retail television appliance dealers that the cream has been skimmed from the top of the market and that buyer resistance is as tight as the wire on a bale of hay.

The retail dealers blame the type of programs offered, excluding the sports and kid shows, for the refusal of many families to lay their cash on the line for a TV set.

Are they right, and if so, where do we go from here?

That, really, is my question. Frankly, I do not consider myself well-enough versed in television to answer.

I only know for sure that my feeble efforts in television certainly would not justify anyone spending several hundred dollars for a receiver to see and hear them, yet I was not ashamed of them considering my limited experience, and the similar lack of experience of my directors and producers.

Please don't misunderstand me. I think television is the biggest thing in electricity since the "What hath God wrought" message was ticked out from Washington to Baltimore.

But I find no justifiable reason to defend the vast majority of current television programs.

An old Texas friend of mine, when confronted with a crisis, used to remark:

"Well, something's got to be did."

But what is to be done? I contend that television is not progressing. It is folly to let it stand still. And it would be a criminal misuse of a blessing from Heaven to let it slip backwards.

Maybe, from among your readers, a television Messiah can be found.

Oliver and Williams, former arrangers for Lunceford, Dorsey, Hampton, Miller and Krupa, have some top-flight instrumentals that are away from the beaten track, and done to a turn by the Glenn Miller of England's bands. . . . **RECORD OF THE WEEK:** Billy Eckstine has two of the best MGM waxings to date in "Crying"—adapted from a poem by Barney Ross, and "Temptation"—both made to order for The Vibrato. . . . Top orchestral backing by Buddy Baker on "Crying" adds immeasurably to the tune's possibilities. . . . "Temptation" has been good for many years, but the Eckstine treatment is always tops on songs like this 'un. . . . **CLIFF EDWARDS** (Mercury): Yes, you read it right—Ukulele Ike is back and Merc's got him. . . . Cliff never sounded better, for he sings, strums and makes those funny sounds on a pair of his biggest all-time hits, "Singin' in the Rain" and "June Night," that'll take you back to the Twenties. . . . **PINKY TOMLIN** (Coral): Here's another item that'll knock the collector's price down to dimes on Pinky's "Object of My Affection." . . . Paired with "Red River Valley," both are re-issues from original Decca masters that were fits when first made and just as good today. . . . **"MISS LIBERTY"** (Columbia): Of the six sides from this new Berlin musicale, Dinah Shore's "Homework" is the topper, with the Sinatra-Day waxing of "Let's Take an Old-Fashioned Walk" and Buddy Clark's "Paris Wakes Up and Smiles" following close on its grooves. . . . It's a little early to forecast, but these Berlin tunes should be as big as any he's ever written. . . . **PETE DAILY'S CHICAGOANS** (Capitol): Guaranteed positively free of a flatted fifth or dis-integrating tenth, here's jazz in the wide-open small-band style as you like it. . . . Now it looks as though **Jack Carson**, with unusual foresight, did the same thing. And Jack was signing contracts when television was pretty much still a gleam in someone's eye. . . . Sterling Drug is to pick up the tab, next fall, for the televised "**Bride and Groom**" show. . . . **Bobby Hughes** will sub for **Dick Haynes** on KLAC-TV when Haynes takes his vacation.

Next Year's "Emmy"?

Last year, at the first Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Annual Award dinner, KTSL came in for one of the coveted "Emmys" by having developed a special sort of thing that facilitates video in some vague and wonderful way. (Our lack of understanding doesn't mean we weren't just

as appreciative as the engineers were.)

Now they have done it again. A device for superimposing motion-picture images on live TV remote scenes was perfected by Harold Jury, Chief Television Engineer of KTSL. The gadget makes possible the cross-fading and superimposition of images from a remote pickup location with those of a studio or other remote operation. Packages of merchandise and other commercial products superimposed on action scenes (the sponsor's beer-bottle label across the baseball field, for instance) are familiar to many lookers, but the Don Lee "syncher" achieves this without the use of the extra camera at the remote location as required in other station operations.

TV Finds Vets Jobs

Worthy of special mention is the KTLA show now establishing a beachhead in Operation Unemployment. Program is titled "Lest We Forget," and its purpose is to find jobs for unemployed veterans by a video showcasing. Produced by KTLA in cooperation with the Veterans Administration, the program was instrumental in finding a job for a veteran with its very first broadcast. "Lest We Forget" is presented every Thursday night at 10.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

"Clear Views of Hollywood"

The translation of the "Hollywood chatter" type of radio show to television seems to be in the process of being effected by "Clear Views of Hollywood," a novelty found on KTTV, 7:25 p.m. Monday. Ira Cook, usually identified with disc-jockeying, is the narrator of the program, which features a still-picture visit to a well-known personality's home (first show had Andy and Della Russell). Like a pictorial magazine story, only much snappier, the program displays stills, one after another, while Cook supplies the text.

Credit for shooting the "clear views" goes to ace Hollywood photographer Robert Perkins, who has been delving around the movie capital with his camera with notable success. Pictures are shot and lighted especially for the program. Seems to us that the show raises the interesting question—would the major movie studios consider still-picture visits with their stars a violation of their ban on television appearances for contract players?

reported, and the one for which he was made Director of Public Service for television station KTTV, was the Kathy Fiscus tragedy. During the long days of fruitless waiting and hoping he was on a "hot mike" for *twenty-seven hours*. The last day of the coverage was Sunday, and Bob left the scene to come back to Hollywood and "California Caravan," which he narrated in his wrinkled dirty clothes while he was practically asleep on his feet.

In his family background Bob has an impressive third cousin, Baron Robert Baden-Powell, famous British spy of World War I and originator of the Boy Scouts of America. "I'm the only one in the family who was born in this country," he relates. "The rest were all from Britain." His father, a graduate of Oxford, was an Air Force pilot during the first World War. "He taught Captain Eddie Rickenbacker to fly," Bob smiles proudly, "and my very first flight in a plane was piloted by Rickenbacker."

From his father, who once toured the British colonies playing banjo, Bob may have acquired his aptitude for melody. "I was a member of the Westminster Choir at Princeton University," he revealed, "and debuted on radio as a singer of popular tunes." Digging into his memory, Bob gave a tuneful earful of the romantic "My Sin." "That was one I sang a lot," he laughed.

Just about the only bass-baritone in his home town of Leroy, New York, Bob was beckoned to sing at all types of affairs. "It become quite in-

Frankfurter Green Bean Casserole

(Just the thing for Saturday night supper)

- 1 lb. frankfurters sliced 1 inch thick
- 3 T. margarine or butter
- 5 T. flour
- 2 c. milk or bean juice
- 2 c. string beans
- 1/4 c. grated cheese
- 1 t. salt
- 1 t. worcestershire sauce

Cut beans on the bias, and cook in very little water until tender. Reserve any water remaining and use as part of the liquid.

Make white sauce out of margarine, flour and liquid. Add seasonings, cheese and string beans.

Brown the sliced frankfurters slightly, put into a casserole. Add white sauce with string beans. Top with buttered bread crumbs, and bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

That is all. However, every week he spends hours after the broadcast giving further advice to those who need it and helping those who did not have the opportunity to air their problems during the broadcast. Scope of problems is wide, ranging from domestic discord to need for vocational guidance.

When attractive Mrs. Etille Anthony has a problem, to whom does she go?

Why, to Mr. Anthony, of course. "But she sometimes thinks I'm too close to her problems to advise her as wisely as I would a stranger," he explains, "and so she goes elsewhere. She usually finds out I was right about the whole thing."

Apparently the formula works. Because the Anthonys have been married more than eighteen years.

Etille, a vivacious brunette from Montreal, was a modern dancer and shared the stage with Charles Weidman, Doris Humphrey, Martha Graham, and others of that stature. She gave up her dancing when she married and regrets nothing.

"I guess if John had been a businessman or something that didn't interest me, I might have been sorry but his work is so stimulating and so satisfying that I haven't ever felt that I missed anything by deciding to be a housewife," she said.

And then, Mr. Anthony's wife pointed out, Mr. Anthony has so many interests. He has been on the air since 1932.

Aids Legislature

As head of the Marital Relations Institute, which he helped found almost twenty-five years ago, he keeps abreast of the marital laws, always mindful that the efforts of his organization brought about reforms in New York State that set the pattern for many of the state legislatures. Part Writer--Part Fisherman

Harry Kronman of "Screen Guild," One of Radio's Top Writers, Would Rather Talk About Fishing Than Radio Script Writing

WRITING? It's work," says "Screen Guild" scribe Harry Kronman, "and I don't know anybody who enjoys working!" Kronman, whose work on the NBC dramatic program has been of consistently high quality for six years, will admit, however, that he does enjoy his work after it's done.

"I write to live and live to fish," he states positively. He's ready to go fishing at almost any time, any place; if he can't do that he'll settle for a round of fish talk. "I have my work week fixed so that I get one call a day from fishing friends," he laughs. This usually breaks up his scripting chores nicely, as he can definitely count on one hour-long conversation from a fellow fisherman every day in the week. But the words "Yellowtail's running" or "Albacore off Catalina" set him restless.

Kronman's radio script chores, however, are never allowed to suffer because of his favorite pastime. He's close to being a perfectionist, and in turning movie scripts into radio entertainment he sets as his standard "writing the best radio story I can."

The scribe started in Hollywood radio in 1935, doing seven-minute dramatic scenes for Louella Parsons's "Hollywood Hotel." As a member of that pioneer program, he helped develop the whole technique of adapting a full-length movie to a radio

program. By the time "Hollywood Hotel" left the air, Kronman's adaptations had grown from the original seven minutes to twenty-four minutes. Other shows with which he's been identified in the past have been "Big Town," "Louella Parsons's Premiere" and Shirley Temple in "Junior Miss" (after the first five broadcasts).

Writer's Room

He averages about three days on a script. "I can do one in a day and a half, or I can laze around and take five days," he adds. He works in an attractive room that he designed for himself. A built-in filing cabinet holds his past scripts, all neatly filed in order of date and cross-indexed. A big, efficient-looking desk is placed so he can look up and glimpse a mounted marlin on the wall, a sight which cheers him immeasurably.

Across the room is a short-wave radio where he can tune in to hear the commercial fishing boats. When news of a big strike comes along, the writer calculates how long it will take the fish to pass a point that he can reach, finishes his work and arranges a fishing trip to head them off. "I never miss," he smiles. Tony, his four-year-old son, considers it a "special vacation" to be allowed into his daddy's office, and the privilege leaves him nearly speechless.

"Everyone went to pieces," Mrs. Spangler reported blandly. She didn't sleep a wink that night. The next day her telephone buzzed constantly and the mailman started bringing her letters and cards. The mailman told Mrs. Spangler that all the other mailmen had gathered around him when he reported for work the morning after she had won the jackpot. They had it figured out that she was on his route.

"Funny thing," he told the dazed winner. "I remember picking up your entry card when you mailed it to the program."

Varying Response

One nice lady in Montebello wrote to tell Mrs. Spangler that she had been sending in contest entries for years and that she was so glad *someone* had won a jackpot. Another woman called to ask if the Spanglers would sell the \$1000 worth of dancing lessons to her real cheap. Her boy tap danced. Still another woman telephoned to ask Mrs. Spangler what they planned to do with the car, a De Soto sedan included in the prizes.

"I imagine we'll keep it and sell our 1935 Ford," Mrs. Spangler answered.

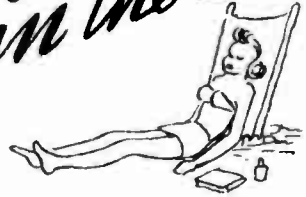

The New Airways Detective, Whose Rates Are One Hundred Dollars a Day Plus Dibs On the Ice Box, Is Played by a Perennial Favorite Who Wants His New Role to Be

Just a Little Bit Different

Thirty-eight

DICK POWELL is a busy, popular motion picture star who suffers the need of added income from a weekly radio show in the same way the rest of us suffer the need of another head.

Yet when NBC had in the works an offering about a smooth private eye with a bundle of muscle, a good tailor and a rich and beautiful girl in weekly pursuit, Dick took over "The Adventures of Richard Diamond" as a special task.

Listener reports on the show follow one of two facks: half the Sunday night dialers happily mutter remembered bits of dialogue to themselves until the following week's show. The other half hum snatches of the song with which Mr. Powell, in his role of "Diamond," winds up each solving and sapping.

All-Out Effort

Studio reports are of another nature. They deal with Powell bending over a script with his cast, writers, producer and sound men for hours each Sunday, taping and retaping, and sometimes not even breaking for lunch.

A post-show session over a cup of coffee with a weary Mr. Powell one Sunday answered some of the questions aroused by the picture of an easy-going fellow like Dick (also currently working six days each week on a picture, "Mrs. Mike," which he both produces and stars in) making such a project of a sleuth role. Powell has played similar parts before. Both "Richard Rogue" and "Front Page" seemed easily done.

"I do the show for two reasons. One, I love radio. It isn't my main business, true, but the second reason I am doing 'Diamond' at all explains why this show proves so interesting to me.

"When NBC decided to create a new detective show and asked me to play the role, here was a great chance to try and make something a little bit different of a standard vehicle. Not that I'm fooling myself on that. Sure, I can try and inject a light-hearted note into the reading, and I can sing a weekly song to the gal in the story, but it takes the writer, producers and cast to really make it different.

"We have a wonderful writer—Blake Edwards. His stuff is punchy, he doesn't waste any words, and he comes up with some great similes that don't sound like similes at all.

"We have tried, also, to keep the cast from being the same group that is heard on every other show. I think that alone makes a difference to the listeners who particularly enjoy detective stuff and hear 'em all."

Versatile Supporters

Two of the same supporting players appear in the cast each week—the tough but charming new sleuth's girl, "Helen," and of course a cop. Powell's dialogue, as "Diamond," describes "Helen" as "the most wonderful girl in the world—money, looks, but she has one bad fault. She wants to get married." This constant sprite is played by the versatile Virginia Gregg. "Lieutenant Walter Levinson," on the "Diamond" show a fairly sympathetic police officer, is in reality Ed Begley.

Each week after the script is completed, the whole show group get together over coffee in some quiet room at the studio. Producer Don Sharp and NBC producer Carl Gruener, director William Rousseau, soundmen Jack Robinson and Wayne Kenwor-

Before radio, Kronman had been in the furniture business. The crash left him without it, so he became a liquor salesman. Weeks of trudging around New York carrying a sixty-five-pound sample case in each hand broke down his arches, and Kronman left the liquor business. He and songwriter Allie Wrubel teamed to write a five-minute operetta concerning tomatoes and mayonnaise. They sold it to Harry Salter, now of "Stop the Music," and it was used as an early version of the present singing commercial type of message. That put Kronman in radio.

The writer attributes his present meticulous attitude toward his work to his early desire to make good. In those days, he felt that if he couldn't write a script as well as a more experienced writer, he could at least make it *neater* than anyone else's. "I learned from the business world that attractive packaging always helps." Today his scripts are still a miracle of neatness.

Change in Movie

In adapting a hit movie to the confines of a half-hour radio show, Kronman is careful to preserve the original mood and flavor of the story, even though it is impossible to convey the whole story line or all the characters of the original. If the property is a musical or a story wherein the scenes are counterpoint to the dialogue (that is, the lines convey one meaning and the mood another), Kronman goes to a special running of the film. Sometimes he must supply a new story line, combine three characters into one, change the curtain scene and write in many new bridge scenes. "There's more change than people realize," he reveals. Occasionally the radio censorship code will "thumbs down" something that got by in the original movie. Suicides and payment for crime are two of these radio verbotens. Kronman goes along with radio censorship, believes it makes for a much more acceptable show. "Pictures are selective," he says. "Radio comes into your home and should come in as a friend."

Kronman calls his problem the fact that he's *got* to be good. And he is, though the responsibility of *having* to be is considerable. If he wasn't, he could do considerable box office damage to a \$2,000,000 property. That's why he feels that in always striving to write the best half-hour radio show with the best characters he can each week, he's playing safe.

He's seldom satisfied with his own work, but cross-questioning will reveal that he feels his own favorite "Screen Guild" contributions have been Loretta Young, in "The Dark Mirror" for drama, "You Belong to

Me" for light comedy and Red Skelton in "The Fuller Brush Man" for gag comedy. Occupational hazard that bothers him most is that for his favorite actors and actresses he tries too hard. He wants so much to do an especially good job for them that he can't relax. "And you can't write your best until you relax," he adds.

Kronman's beautiful wife, Rosella, and his sons Tony and Michael, one, make delightful subjects for another hobby, photography.

He feels that Alan Ladd handed him one of his favorite compliments concerning his work. When Ladd appeared in a Kronman adaptation on "Screen Guild," he confided to the writer that though he had appeared in the original picture, he was never able to understand the plot until he repeated his role with Kronman's script!

thy . . . the whole cast, including Powell, go over the script. Each is as free as his fellow workers to suggest changes.

At rehearsal time, the business of innovations starts all over again.

It Can Happen to Anyone

"We don't have an audience at the studio, so can't go by their reactions. The only thing you really can go by anyway is your own judgment, and if that doesn't work . . . well, try something else. Of course, not having an audience also means that we can rehearse until thirty minutes *after* show time," Powell laughed.

"Anyone who heard the fluff I made last Sunday probably thought a mistake had been made and it was a rehearsal they were hearing," he

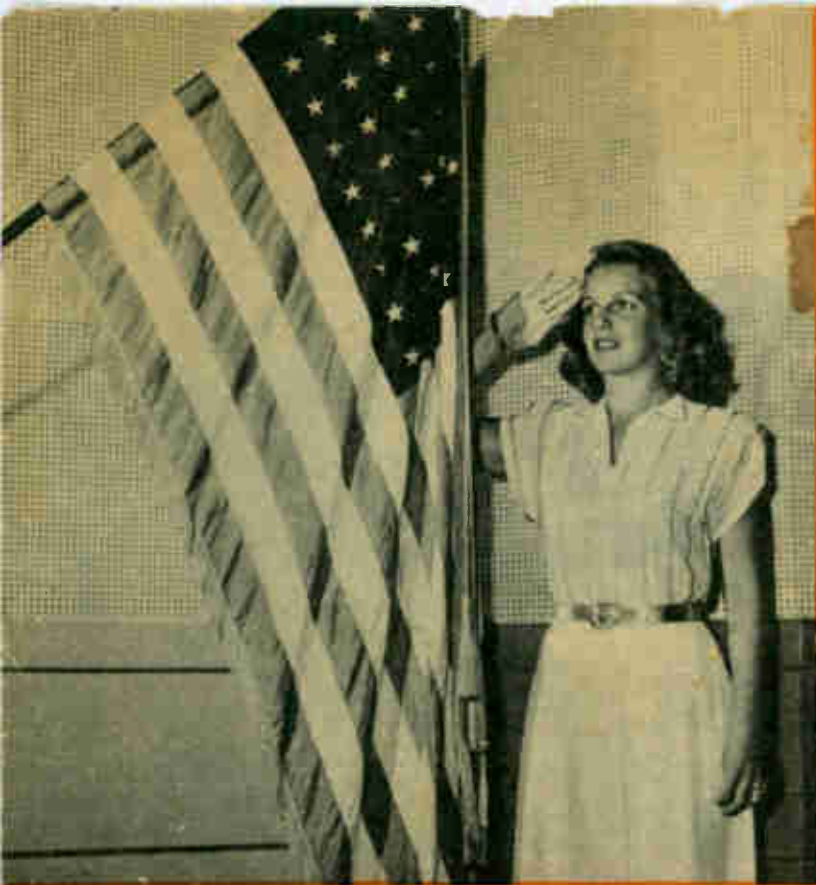

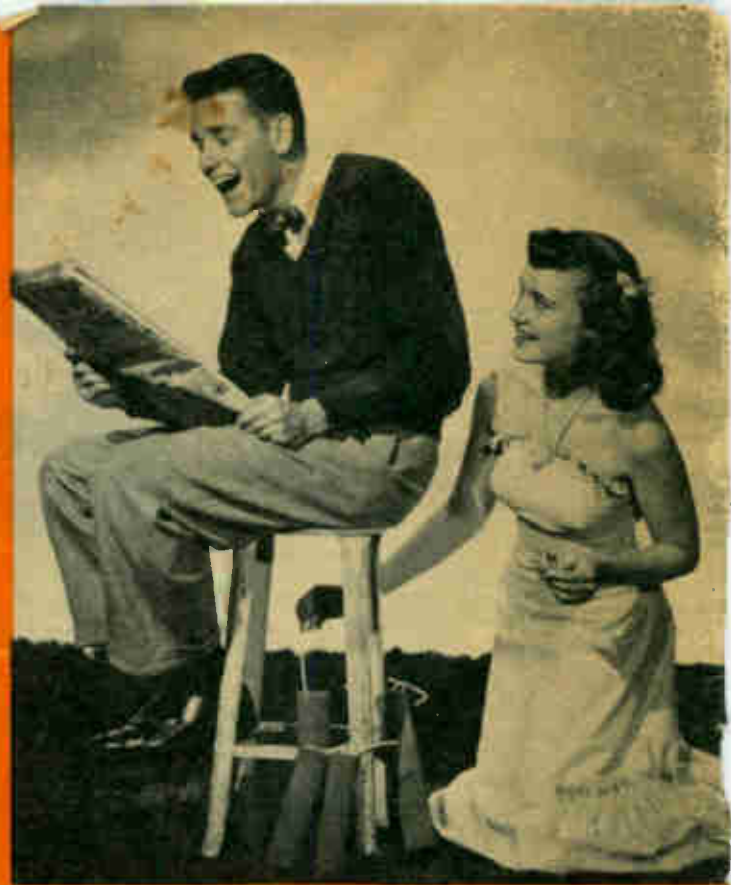
