summer and has been on KTLA since last September 8. When he was on radio, it was all old hat. He could think out a script on his way to the office and dictate it practically word-perfect to his secretary. When time came to go on the air, he sat down at his desk at Barker Brothers, where he is head of the Home Advisory Bureau, closed the door, timed the script with the announcer and engineer sent from the studio, and gave the show. That was that.

screen as it does on the demonstration sofa?"

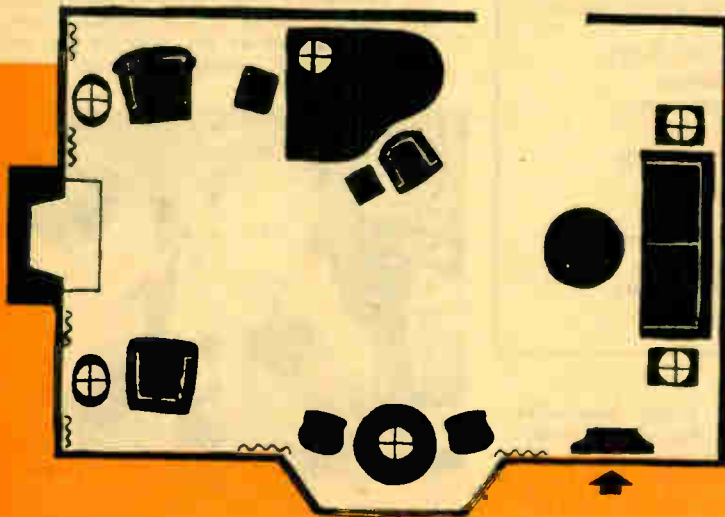
Until he has to worry about his reds and yellows, however, Mr. Wileman is pretty busy lining up his TV program, which ran on KFI-TV last

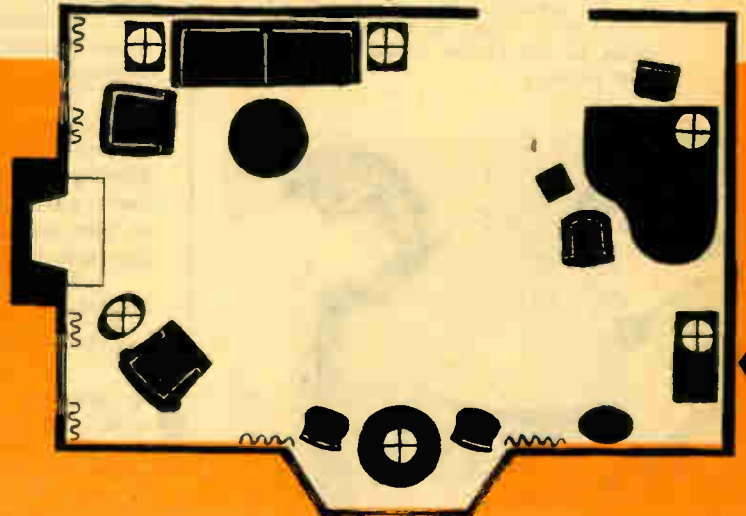

THE FIRST time we met Fulton Lewis jr. was on a rainy day at the Farmer's Market. The commentator was taking an afternoon off from a lecture tour that left him little time for chit-chat. Recently, we met the man again—this time in his hotel suite at the Ambassador. It was another lecture tour, a week crammed full of speaking engagements. It was also at the height of the investigation by the House Un-American Activities Committee of the reported shipment to Russia during World War II of an unauthorized amount of uranium oxide and nitrate, an investigation started by Lewis's news broadcast on Mutual.

We expected fireworks—Walter Winchell and Time and Life magazines had stated that the same story had been offered to them and that they had turned it down because of lack of corroboration. We expected to walk into a room full of tension and sharp looks.

Informal Gathering

What we walked into was more

like an "at home" with the visiting Fulton Lewis jr., of Washington, D.C. Whatever his detractors call him, they can but admit that he's a personable guy with much charm. Alice, his attractive wife, smartly dressed, seemed equally in her element with the crowd of reporters.

Lewis, a former newspaperman himself, has an understanding and an affection for the press that are apparent as he submits to their questioning. This very understanding turned out to be his explanation of the opposite views taken by Time and Life on his coverage of the uranium-shipment story. "They muffed a good story and they covered up," he smiles. "I was a newspaperman myself—though edi-

tors had a different view of it—and I know how it is."

The whole George Racey Jordan story is too well known by Lewis listeners and too complex for others to reprise here, beyond the fact that Lewis averred at the time we met him that he believes Jordan's statements "one hundred per cent."

Both torridly pro- and anti-Lewisites would be totally unprepared for the calm good humor of the commentator, even when challenged by reporters with such queries as: "If Jordan saw these shipments in 1944 and reported them to you in 1950, why did it take him all that time to decide to tell it?" None of the dynamics of the Lewis broadcasts were evident in this informal gather-

ing. The newscaster is persuasive, eloquent, speaks directly and well, smiles continually and laughs a good deal.

Mail reaches a peak on the Lewis programs during provocative broadcasts like the Jordan series, he reveals. Fifteen hundred letters a day must be handled. Though the quantity is so heavy, all letters are acknowledged. There's a small percentage of antis and "some nuts" in Lewis's words, but occasionally a bona-fide tip-off on a news story comes through. The newsman writes his broadcasts himself. He once tried dictating them, but gave it up as unsatisfactory.

Time Out

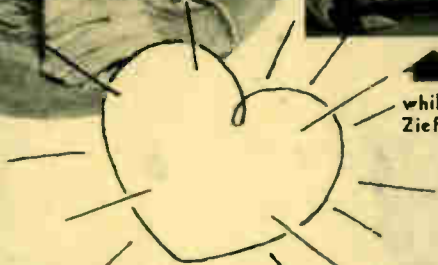
In the midst of the Ambassador press conference, Mrs. Lewis, stationed on the outside of the group, suddenly suggested coffee and Cokes and "something stronger for those with head-colds." Turned out that several of the boys had been stricken with them. Throughout the questions and answers, the phone kept up a steady ringing, often in all three rooms of the suite. "Could Mr. Lewis be a guest on a rival network's broadcast?" "Could Mr. So-and-So have a moment with Mr. Lewis? . . ." The ringing seldom stopped. "How do you stand it?" someone asked piteously of Alice Lewis. "Oh, you get used to it and you don't even notice it," she smiled. "More coffee?"

While Fulton translated uranium oxide and nitrate into terms of usable

Radio Pamphlets in Library

For those interested in radio, the public library remains one of the best places to find out about it. Last week we went through the pamphlet file in the Hollywood Branch Library and found many useful items. Radio communications during the war, work in aircraft radio, a handbook of radio servicing, radio stations of the U. S. (out) were some of the subjects available in pamphlet form. The U. S. office of education has a Radio Manual for amateurs who wish to put on school broadcasts and the U. S. department

of labor has a booklet on women in radio. An NBC informational pamphlet is entitled Behind Your Radio Dial. Publications for students include a student manual called Projects for Radio Speech. Harvard is represented by a case study, Small Station Management and the Control of Radio Broadcasting, a research project. There is also a booklet on how to become a radio amateur operator.

The radio talks of the late Will Rogers are also available in the pamphlet file, and inexplicably, so is the souvenir program from the opening of Roxy's Radio City Music Hall in New York.

"Family Theater"

More entertaining and worthwhile than ever is the Mutual-Don Lee program "Family Theater," KHJ, 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, we decided after a recent hearing. With J. Carrol Naish as host, the program presented a dramatization of the life of Phineas Taylor Barnum, America's greatest showman. The story included all the excitement of the rise of the Bethel storekeeper, his inspired humbuggery, his presentation of Jenny Lind to this country and the formation of the Greatest Show on Earth (still

is!) As Barnum, radio-actor-circus-lover Parley Baer was perfect, with good support from Mary Shipp as Mrs. Barnum and Inge Jollis as Jenny Lind. The rendition of a Swedish folk song as part of the Jenny Lind concert was beautifully sung by Thora Matheson. Music on the program ranged from simple mood background through brassy circus music to concert accompaniment, all to the credit of versatile Harry Zimmerman and orchestra.

Most appealing was the voicing of the program's "message," the family that prays together stays together. It was unobtrusively pointed out that this blustering showman and pioneer considered his family life the happiest part of a happy existence, and in all the excitement of his career, found time to be a religious and pious man. It made the character of P. T. Barnum more appealing than ever before for this listener.

We finally caught up with the Midwest's most popular columnist, Cedric Adams, who is hitchhiked on the end of the Art Linkletter "House Party" program, KNX, 12:55 p.m., Monday through Friday. And we're glad that we did.

In case you're from Minneapolis, you know all about Adams, and if you're a New Yorker reader, you may see his advertising column each week. For those who don't, his little five-minute chatter show should serve as an introduction. In the brief time, he covers enough subjects to keep listeners thinking for the rest of the day. Recently we tried to take some of them down and came up with this list. It barely covers half of his items: Why is the top button-hole on men's shirts horizontal while the rest of them are vertical? In Norway you can get divorced on Monday and be on your next honeymoon by the week end. In Wyoming they leave wrecked cars on the highway where the accident occurred as a warning to other drivers. Tests show that inhaling on thirty-six cigarettes gives a smoker the same amount of nicotine he'd get from not inhaling on six cigars. The average stenographer covers from twelve to twenty miles a day with her flying fingers on a typewriter. If you wake up with your head hanging out of bed, it means that you're working so

hard at your job that you're too tired to keep your head up, even in your sleep.

You can see that the pleasant-voiced Adams covers a lot of territory. Not only that, he's good at the commercials, too.

We especially enjoyed Jay Novello as "Banjo," Betty Lou Gerson as the actress, "Lorraine," Nelson Welch as "Beverly Carlton" and Margaret Brayton as the unfortunate nurse, "Miss Preen."

To the lovely mood music on "Broadway Is My Beat." It's an early Rodgers and Hart tune called "Manhattan," and we hope some night they play it all the way through. Wish they could work a singer into the plot to give us the lyrics, too.

To "The Railroad Hour" for the lovely score of "Sunny," including the title tune, "Who," "Two Little Bluebirds" and "D'ya Love Me?" Here's one program where listeners can expect to hear music that isn't being done to death.

We View With Alarm

The taped interview we recently heard from the East with a screen star who had obviously had a few drinks beforehand. The star, a perfectly nice guy who leads a model off-stage life, deserved better handling by the air reporter. After all, a taped show is supposed to be a protection against this sort of thing. The actor, like any other businessman on a trip away from home, working hard (he had been doing personal appearances and charity benefits) may have let down a little. No one with any understanding should blame him.

... The cases of stage fright ram-

pant on Academy Award night. We thought the show was one of the most exciting we've ever heard, but the nervous singers nearly scared us to death. Only Gene Autry and Betty Garrett seemed at ease. Maude Adams Mystery

The great actress Maude Adams is still the most mysterious figure in the American theater, though she has been retired many years. Now an instructor at Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri, Miss Adams still has not been interviewed or made statements

to the press about herself and her career. In her Broadway stardom days, she was the least accessible of stage luminaries.

Recently the actress wrote a radio play, "The Saviour," which she described as her life's work, her sole statement on the presentation. Miss Adams was to direct her students in the drama to be broadcast on Easter Sunday.

Last week the performance was canceled because of "production difficulties." An epidemic of influenza at the college had ruined rehearsal schedules, according to a statement sent through NBC. Miss Adams, it was said, hopes to present her broadcast next year on Easter Sunday. And she remains the least-known, best-known star of the American theater.

Radio Scholarship

Marylee Robb, who portrays "Marjorie" on NBC's "Great Gildersleeve" series, is being honored by her alma mater, Geller Theatre Workshop. The drama school is establishing a "Marylee Robb Radio Scholarship" to be awarded to some talented girl each year.

A graduate of University High School, Miss Robb was attending UCLA when she entered a contest at Geller which resulted in her winning an eight-month scholarship. "Lum and Abner" called her to CBS for her first professional job. Before long she was a regular member of several large network broadcasts including "Junior Miss" and the "Burns and Allen Show" as well as "Gildersleeve." An attractive teen-ager, she was featured on our cover twice last year.

Judges for the scholarship award will include Jack Bailey of Mutual's "Queen for a Day" and "Comedy of Errors."

Arnold Withdrawal Statement

Edward Arnold, ABC's "Mr. President," announced his withdrawal from the United States senatorial race on the Republican ticket in the California June primary election and released the following statement: "Insufficiency of time for proper campaign preparation has caused me to decide against seeking nomination to the United States Senate on the Republican ticket in the June primary election. My interest in the various vital issues has not diminished in the least and whenever the opportunity presents itself I intend to fight for those principles in which I believe. I have become convinced, however, that it would be shortsighted to seek the nomination when my advisers feel that time is too short for efficient organization. Further, I believe completely in the two-party system; the inclusion of too many candidates on the ticket of a single party is likely to create havoc in that party. I am deeply grateful to the many friends who have volunteered their support and sincerely regret that circumstances have dictated this decision. In withdrawing, I wish every success to Richard Nixon (who would have been Arnold's opponent).

Schaum Torte with Fresh Strawberries

(Easter dinner dessert)

6 egg whites
2 c. granulated sugar
1 t. vanilla
1 t. vinegar

Beat egg whites until stiff enough to hold up in peaks, then gradually beat in two tablespoons sugar at a time. Do this three times, then add vanilla and vinegar, folding in the rest of the sugar.

Butter a spring mold, pour in two thirds of this mixture.

With the balance make small meringues, dropped from the tip of the spoon on a greased tin. Bake in slow oven (250 degrees) for fifty to sixty minutes, depending on size of tin. The small meringues will be baked in about thirty minutes. Remove from pan.

When the large cake is done, remove from pan, and when cooled, the center will collapse—but it should, for then it gives you an opportunity of filling center, with either whipped cream to which fresh strawberries have been added, or fresh strawberry ice cream.

Decorate the top of the cake with the small meringues.

Any fruit may be added to the whipped cream.

Make a soft custard with the egg yolks.

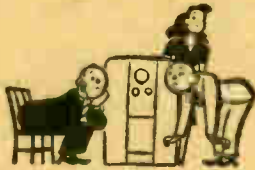

he never took seriously the idea of making a career out of his voice. Instead, he decided to follow after his lawyer-brother (who is now in the Anti-Trust Division of the Department of Justice) and graduated from the Columbus School of Law in 1940. During his second year Joe became a tour leader at the FBI headquarters, and in 1941 he became a G-man, working on sabotage, espionage and criminal cases in Eastern cities.

During his five years as an FBI agent, Graydon became an expert on firearms and was considered one of the best shots in the Bureau. (He laughs that such experience might come in handy, some day.)

While still with the Department, Joe was offered a chance to make a V-disc with a vocalovelv whose agent was promising a great future. An agency heard the record, turned down the girl, and put Joe on the "Hit Parade" as the "mystery singer." (Remember in 1946 when the band would swing into a ballad by saying, "Sing it, Joe.?" That was as close to name credit as Graydon ever came. He stayed with the "Parade" for six months, then left for a theater tour, coming out to California in the summer of '48.

Typically, Hollywood gave the lithe baritone a quick look and listen and handed him a six-month contract with Warner Brothers. Even Paramount execs sat up when they heard Joe, but finally turned him down because one of the powers decided he resembled Bing Crosby too closely. After a short period Joe asked for his release from the studio and picked up a recording offer with Decca. (His first waxing was "Again," and it became the second-best seller in the country.)

Besides his daily two-hour stint, Graydon appears Saturday nights on KLAC-TV with a musical half-hour.

Popularity with morning viewers has brought about his being tagged as "the housewives' heart-throb." An even ninety-nine per cent of the fan

Suggestion for gardeners—spading is made easier on the feet by putting a split length of hose on the spade handle and then pushing it down over the shoulder of the blade.

Here is a hint for the ladies who either forget cake plates or do not want to carry them back and forth when going to clubs or church parties. It consists of two pieces of cardboard, covered with white paper, place doily (paper doily) on top and stick it down with cake frosting to prevent it from slipping. We suggest frosting instead of glue as sometimes glue has an odor . . . of course this is optional.

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Looks Like

Garry Moore has pacted for five years with CBS, the signing covering services in both radio and television. The deal entails T. Garrison's moving to New York (sob!) from whence both the AM and TV shows will emanate. . . . Dorothy Taylor, Al Jarvis's office manager, has been elevated to producer of Jarvis's "Hollywood on Television" on KLAC-TV. Who says the day of opportunity is gone? . . . Bob Hope is the red-hot TV property, they all hope, for any one of three TV nets scrambling for him. NBC, CBS and Dumont are all after the comedian. Lever Brothers, his current sponsor, has first refusal rights on any television show now, but rumor keeps at it that this season sees the end of the Hope-Lever tieup. Chesterfield and General Motors are both supposedly ready with a dotted line. At next printing, who knows? . . . Tee-Vee Films will produce the "Oz" series for telecasting, it has developed. The series will be produced in Chicago by Burr Tillstrom, of "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" fame. A more perfect directorial and production hand couldn't have been found for this delightful series of Frank Baum classics. Burr will do it right! . . . Richard Arlen is replacing Alan Mowbray on "Hollywood in Three Dimensions." . . . Our "Rumor" on Brian Donlevy and NBC's "Dangerous Assignment" going TV has changed into a "Looks Like." Date is early next fall. . . . Al Jarvis's three shows, two radio and one TV, are all sold out, grossing a total weekly of \$13,550 for KLAC-TV. The TV show brings in \$8,550 of this sum. Jarvis himself gets a straight percentage of the AM coin, and a guarantee plus percentage of the TV money. Who says there's no dough in video? . . . Sam Herrick, Director of Television at Pasadena Playhouse, doubled his already heavy schedule by adding a two-week span of filling in as guest staff director at KTTV. . . . Easter reports show that usage has television nine to six over radio in New York City, with the top popular shows Berle, Godfrey and "Toast of the Town." . . . Smilin' Ed McConnell cut a TV show for Buster Brown, his radio sponsor of long standing. Format follows the "Squeaky the Mouse" routine, with a hamster standing in for "Squeaky," a real cat playing the part of the real cat, and much, much whimsy and joyous entertainment for the moppets. McConnell is another natural for video, we think, and look forward to next August when we can see the show. . . . KNBH took a closed-circuit camera run of Creesh Hornsby, the comic Bob Hope discovered, who is

currently "entertaining" at Charley Foy's. . . . KTLA is televising one of the oldest Easter Sunrise Services, April 9 at 4:30 a.m. on Channel 5, when they take their remote to Mount Rubidoux at Riverside, California.

Skepticism on G-String

Science has come up with some new and decidedly less enthusiastic data on the single-strand wire named G-String after its inventor, Georg Goubau. The Bell Telephone Laboratories, studying the strand, could foresee no likelihood of practical intercity television use of the string. The Signal Corps announcement, however, touted the possibilities of spiderwebbing the country with G-strings in place of coaxial cables and microwave radio relays, the present methods for networking television.

It was on this possibility that scientists expressed skepticism, and not on the uses which Dr. Goubau himself set forth in a technical paper, introducing his invention, which he read before New York's Institute of Radio Engineers.

Science considers the enamel-coated wire as susceptible to the elements as the present method—and in need of amplifier or repeaters every quarter or half mile to keep up the strength of the signals.

Although terming the G-string "a brilliant study," but qualifying it as best used for military purposes, nowhere in the new report did scientists mention the great number of images it will carry. The coax is still only four each way, isn't it?

Confused?

If the news items concerning CBS-TV and KTTV, their respective shows, new operation sites and various ownerships confuse you into a guarded silence . . . don't worry. The reaction is a perfectly normal one.

First of all, while CBS-TV shows are always seen on KTTV locally, KTTV shows are not necessarily all CBS-TV. For instance, Ed Wynn and Alan Young's shows are CBS-TV properties, seen on KTTV. "Man Against Crime," "Suspense" and others are eastern-packaged CBS-TV shows. CBS-TV shows are always designated as such on the show.

The Los Angeles Times owns fifty-per cent of KTTV, while CBS owns but forty-nine. The joint operation allows for many presentations that have nothing, actually, to do with CBS.

Thus when you read that KTTV is moving all operation to the Nassour Studios, and that CBS is transferring its video operation to Warners Sunset Boulevard studios (the same that now house KFVB), nothing is changed except the operation bases. KTTV has

been operating out of the Bekins Building on Highland, from the El Patio Theater and from the old radio studios on Melrose that first of all housed NBC, later Mutual-Don Lee.

CBS has been putting on shows from its own studios at Columbia Square. The transaction between CBS and Warner Brothers involves the entire square block from Sunset to Fernwood, and from Bronson to Van Ness, and herein the network will concentrate its entire Coast operations.

KTTV, incidentally, is abolishing its remotes upon moving to Nassour's. We have no word of what will take the place of the weekly Palladium telecast band show, the Valley Market Town program or the sportscasts. While these shows were for the most part sponsored, KTTV felt it could not make money handling the remotes.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

"Crusade in Europe"

It was a little over a year ago that the first running of ABC-TV's "Crusade in Europe," spectacular war-story film footage based on General Dwight D. Eisenhower's book of the same name, was keeping set-siders glued t'home. ABC-TV, not yet on the air, permitted KTTV to run the series prepared for American by 20th Century-Fox and the March of Time.

Now, each Sunday night at 8:30, Channel 7 (KECA-TV) carries again the memorable episodes that should never be forgotten. Everyone who missed this excellent reportage before, or who was restless during the first running, should note that time carefully.

Utilizing captured film obtained by every U. S. Army, Navy, Intelligence, Air Force and Coast Guard bureau, as well as film from the National Film Board of Canada, the British Ministry of Information and the U. S. Alien Property Custodian (all of which measured a total of 31,060 miles), the film editors boiled their material down to twenty-six chapters encompassing salient points of World War II. Beginning with the pre-Pearl Harbor days of induction and international peace attempts, the chapters go through the whole European campaign.

Episode Ten, last week's chapter, "Rise and Fall of a Dictator," highlighted the political overtones involved in Italy's participation in the war; flashed back to the beginnings of Fascist rule in Italy, the Fascist March on Rome, Hitler and Mussolini meeting at the Brenner Pass, and shots of Italy's belated declaration of war on France. The film concluded with Mussolini's escape from his Italian captors and his arrival in Germany, where he was warmly greeted by Hitler.

Episode Eleven, to be telecast April 9 at 8:30 p.m., is titled "The GI—Hero of the War." It shows why the Italian campaign was regarded by GI's as the toughest campaign of the European war. In this episode General Eisenhower discusses the psychology of the fighting men, the problem of

morale, the loneliness of the battlefield and the qualities of the trained American soldier.

The Life- and Time-sponsored series is narrated by Westbrook Van Voorhees, with General Dwight D. Eisenhower himself introducing each chapter.

"Space Patrol"

A prime example of what can be done with just a few props, a lot of imagination and ingenuity, and a batch of good dialogue is KECA-TV's Monday-through-Friday, 6:45 p.m. "Space Patrol."

This series of high adventures in the vast reaches of space is introduced nightly by a film clip of the sky—clouds merging during the fast few-second glance, the footage cost of which must have been small, but the spectator orientation of which is large.

The actual space ship is suggested to us, and most satisfactorily, by another picture shot. Interior of the "Space Patrol" cruiser is more elaborate, but still not the sort of project that will hang the studio up for tremendous costs. Action takes place principally in the ship's interior, with "Kit Cory, Commander in Chief of the Space Patrol" (Glenn Dunning) and "Happy," the boy from Earth who won a scholarship to the "Space Patrol" (Lynn Osborne) manning the controls and laying into the dialogue that is full of enchanting references to repeller rays, demagnetizers, neutralized hulls, compression chambers, and the paralyzer rays being "out of charge" or in working order.

The dialogue and for the most part the acting constitute the whole show, and represent in an exemplary fashion the possible conversion of other serials to TV.

On Lens (About Studio Happenings)

Easter Telecast

"The Triumphant Hour," called the largest and most impressive television film yet scheduled for the new medium, is currently being filmed at Jerry Fairbanks Productions under the sponsorship of Family Theater and the Catholic Church. The film will be seen by you viewers on Easter Sunday over KNBH's Channel 4 and on Monday and Tuesday over KTSL's Channel 2.

But more important than the fact that the feature includes many of the cinema capital's foremost stars is the fact that stars and camera crews of all denominations are contributing their services, and Fairbanks is providing studio facilities. Wardrobe and props are furnished by major studios.

Stars set to date for the Easter presentation include Rosalind Russell, Maureen O'Sullivan, Don Ameche, Ann Blyth, Pat O'Brien, Jane Wyatt, Jeanne Cagney, Regis Toomey, Christopher Lynch, Ann Jamison, Tudor Owen, Jeanne Bates, John Marshall and Pauline Crell. Basil Tellou was signed to play the role of Christ in "The Triumphant Hour." From New York's Fairbanks studios, sequences featuring

Irish tenor Morton Downey and opera star Nan Merriman are to be sent here to be incorporated.

The Dionne quintuplets will make their television debut on the program.

Unfolded in retrospect from a modern church setting, the story will feature the Resurrection and the Ascension. The script is by James D. Roche, who is also associate producer to the Rev. Patrick Peyton, CSC, founder of radio's "Family Theater." Frank McDonald, who has guided many Hollywood films, will direct.

"Rasslin's" back—and aren't you glad! KTLA starts to televise the action from Civic Auditorium, at Long Beach, every Thursday; KECA-TV from Ocean Park every Friday night. Each station is getting up \$2000 to cover, with KECA-TV trying for duo sponsorship and KTLA aiming at a single sponsor to make up costs to each.

KTTV, which has been beaming eastern matches via kinnle on Friday night, will shift this film to Tuesday night, opposite Berle.

Tips to Photographers for Getting Best Pictures in the "Shoot Hawthorne" Contest

From Howard Zieff, chief of still photography, Television station KLAC-TV, Hollywood.

- 1—Wait for Hawthorne to hold still before you shoot. Don't try to catch him moving around.
- 2—Be sure your television screen presents a sharp, clear contrast at the time you shoot.
- 3—A gray image on the screen is better than a jet black, muddy one.
- 4—A tripod is essential, as the image tends to vibrate. Hand holding the camera will only add to such movement, causing a blur.
- 5—Best results will be had by shooting at a tenth of a second at f.8, using film that has the speed of 64 tungsten, such as super XX.
- 6—Be sure that your camera is exactly perpendicular with the screen.
- 7—Do NOT use flash or lights of any kind.
- 8—In focusing on the screen, get as large an image in your camera as possible.

Mr. Wileman now says. "It isn't radio. When you're on, you've got to be *doing* something, even if it's only scratching the mohair. Every program is an adventure."

Mr. Wileman works ahead about three weeks on his TV show, and although he does not turn out the ten- or twelve-page scripts he used to for radio, he still has to go through the formality of outlining a script of from three to five pages. Often, however, after the program gets into rehearsal, this verbal guide is tossed aside and Wileman ad-libs the entire program. This is where his years of lecturing and radio are pressed into good service, for he is never at a loss for words and is extremely poised.

Unlike his radio program, the TV show is done from the Hollywood studios of KTLA, where all the tables, chairs, carpets, draperies and other items of decoration have to be taken every week on Thursday. They are carted back to Barkers Friday morning. This makes much more of a production of his program than radio ever did, for Wileman has to go through the enormous store to select each piece he wants to show on the TV program. All this effort is apparently appreciated by lookers, for "Backgrounds for Living" was recently rated at 25.8 and was twenty-first of all locally viewed TV shows.

As far as home furnishings are concerned, Mr. Wileman thinks video is definitely introducing a problem, for his most oft-asked question is, "How can I arrange (or rearrange) my room for television?" Some rooms, so claims the expert, just can't be satisfactorily rearranged for TV, but others lend themselves very nicely to introduction of a set which can be seen from almost any point in the room. Sectional pieces are especially good, he thinks, for they may be fitted into practically any space. Sectional, he points out, does not belong to modern alone. It depends on the fabric with which it is covered, and if done well in the correct fabric, sectional fits into almost any type room.

Another useful piece of furniture finding a place in TV homes is the television ottoman, with four pie-shaped stools that slide under the big piece. These are just the right height from which to view the TV screen.

Ideas for room arrangement are on Mr. Wileman's TV agenda, as well as fireplace and bay-window groupings. His thoughts are bouncing months ahead on what he wants to show TV viewers.

Wileman himself doesn't have much time to look, for his business demands from him a tremendous amount of reading. "Friends who

THE WORLD is full of pretty blondes who know enough piano and song to sit down and entertain with tinklings and ditties. They usually look nice, but they are many times very dull performers.

London Television

While Roberta doesn't care for the one-nighters entailed by band work, nor for night-club singing's rigorous hours, she didn't let the combination of both prevent her, during the war, from going on extensive USO tours. On one of these she met her charming husband, Jack Quinlan, then an executive in an aircraft plant. His business carried him overseas, the new bride in happy tow.

While there, Roberta had her own

television show on BBC for two years, so when the Quinlans returned to New York and Jack's position as a Macy Company executive, she was all ready for New York video. Almost two years ago, again as the result of a single audition, Roberta

signed a pact with NBC television.

The fact that a large audience has remained faithful three nights a week (KNBH carries the show locally) to the Roberta Quinlan show attests to both her work and her charm. Entertainment value is lent to her own throaty voice and intimate manner by a long roster of top entertainment visitors. The Quinlan charm is enhanced by a smart bit of promotion effect with some of the leading couturiers around New York. For each performance Roberta dons some choice gown lent her by one of these houses. A plug for the manufacturer is too obvious ever to occur. Viewers know what to expect, and if they desire the designer's name, can find out for themselves easily enough.

Ten Years on the Air Have Given Frances Scully An Albumful of Treasured Hollywood Memories

TEN YEARS ago Frances Scully had to make a big decision: to stay on with her NBC publicity job or go on the air unsponsored and try for a mike career. Armed with only her writing experience and knowledge of Hollywood, completely lacking in theatrical background, she took a gamble on the air venture. This week she observes completion of ten successful air years, all but six months of them sponsored. A Musical Baker

Gene Baker Brings Music Listeners Want to Hear With Minimum of Talk

Monday through Saturday, 2:00 p.m. KHJ

HERE'S no business like show business—but sometimes there's no business in show business, and that's how Gene Baker, master of ceremonies for KHJ's "Club 930" (Monday through Saturday, 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.) found his way into radio. Way back in 1926 in Portland, Oregon, Gene took up with a theatrical troupe that had more gall than acting ability. An invitation from a local radio station for the thespians to beam one of their thrilling dramas on the airways made for a terrible radio show; but it created a job for our disc-jockey-to-be. The station management sang the group's swan song, but they liked the Baker mike personality and hence persuaded him to stay on as a staff announcer. Gene's been a radio guy ever since.

Baker spent a long and varied career in Oregon's Queen City. His experience ran the gamut from "sweep-

ing out the joint" to doing the toughest kind of remote broadcasts. He became noted for his ad-lib ability and ere long was called on to do a number of disc shows, man-on-the-street programs, and play-by-play sports-casts. Consequently, when Gene jumped to Hollywood in 1944, he was fully equipped to meet the toughest competition in radio. He hopped from network to network, finally joining the Don Lee organization in 1949. With his newly created "Club 930," Gene is well on the way to becoming one of the town's most popular disc jockeys.

Countrywide Survey

Of his new show Baker says, "We wanted a show just for the listeners, and I don't allow my musical tastes to influence the program at all. We surveyed every station in the country that has had outstanding success with this type of broadcast and found out that listeners want to hear the pop tunes of the day for just as long as they remain popular. Hence we subscribe to all the musical trade magazines and carefully analyze what the people are buying in sheet music and on record, and what they are playing in the juke boxes. These are the records we spin on the "930 Club" every day. Then too, we discovered that listeners are not impressed by pear-shaped, dulcet tones of the announcer. Consequently, I keep the talk to an absolute minimum. That's 'Club 930' in a nutshell."

As for his home life, Gene's a happily married guy who resides with wife and family in North Hollywood. And is he proud of Mrs. Baker! He never stops bragging that she's a Texas Houston, directly descended from the Lone Star State's greatest hero—General Sam Houston. The family, five in all—Jack, 18, Mary Esther, 15, Thomas Lee, 12, Kathryn Louise, 9, and Karen Keith, 2½—occupy most of the deejay's off moments, but he always manages to find a little time for his hobby—training "Wild Wood Woodsmen," an oft-ribboned golden retriever.

Consisting entirely of genuine articles, it is delivered before each show time by the most unobtrusive method. A tissue-paper packet is handed to Roberta. If she is singing, the packet is laid on the piano till the cameras turn off and the song is finished. If Roberta is waiting for a cue or if the guest of the day is rehearsing his number, she immediately opens the paper and dons the approximately \$100,000 worth of jewels that match her gowns.

Script Important

But Roberta is no more concerned with her appearance than she is with her script. She goes over it carefully, changing or adding to it as she sees fit. Success of that formula was attested to when sponsor Mohawk decided to cut their time from five nights each week to three. Morton Downey, a twenty-year success, had
