**F**IVE YEARS ago, when Al Petker came out of the army and began running a contest outfit, he had no inkling that by 1951 he would have succeeded in giving away more than one million dollars worth of gifts!

Nor did he imagine at the time he started this service that the dilemmas he would dream up and the "loot" he would give away would afford him a sizable education in human nature and the wiles of would-be winners.

Disc jockeys from coast to coast were quick to seize upon his original contest "gimmicks" as a means of tabulating their listeners, and manufacturers contributed quantities of good-will prizes. Local "djs" like George Sanders, Bill Anson and Maurice Hart, and Easterners Bea Wain, Andre Baruch, Dave Garroway and many others laud the "contest man's" unusual ideas and prizes, which have definitely sparked interest in their shows.

### Name the Singer

A name-the-singer contest promoted by Petker and conducted by Mobile, Alabama, platter spinner Ross Smitherton caused a near-riot among the populace as the "mystery voice" remained unidentified for weeks. Most laughable incident fostered by any contest he has conducted resulted from participants' attempts to see how far they could go on a shoestring, parlaying the shoelace into unusually valuable items.

Worthwhile projects are behind many of the contests Petker conducts, although he's hesitant to talk about the good intent in the "angles" he dreams up. His acquaintance with a six-year-old who was deaf resulted in a contest conducted via the Hart and Anson shows, through which hundreds of hard-of-hearing persons received free aids. Through the "Stop Me If You've Heard This One" program, Petker was instrumental in giving away needed artificial limbs. When Alaska-stationed soldiers wrote Jay Stewart, of "Surprise Package," that they "hankered" for some doughnuts, a dozen doughnut makers and mix were soon on their way, in a triple play from Stewart to Petker to the Yukon.

### Women Winners

Petker has discovered that women

are the biggest contest entrants. "The thrill of winning, no matter how small the prize, is a great incentive. Some women will spend many dollars in phone calls for a prize worth fifty cents," he explains. "Contestants are selective in strange ways. When offered a choice between a valuable record album and a novelty gadget, for instance, they'll invariably choose the gadget."

Women admirers of particular entertainers often use contest entries as a convenient way of forwarding keys and phone numbers.

Gratifying to Petker, his business manager Ed Spitz, and their clients is the fact that many of the products they have introduced as giveaway-program premiums have proved exceptionally successful. They gave

away the first creme nail polish on the market. Everyone entering a Petker-conducted contest automatically becomes a member of the prize-of-the-month club, through which he receives, gratis, novel gifts ranging from pottery to perfume.

The latest "wrinkle" Petker has worked out, with the aid of radio stations, airlines and hotels, is an offer of a trip to Hollywood and pertinent job interviews, for any contestant writing the best letter on why he would like to live and work here.

Petker, who at thirty has given away more merchandise than most salesmen sell in a lifetime, has been tagged the "Crown Prince of Contest Gimmicks," probably because he admits to getting a bigger thrill out of giving than his winners do out of receiving.

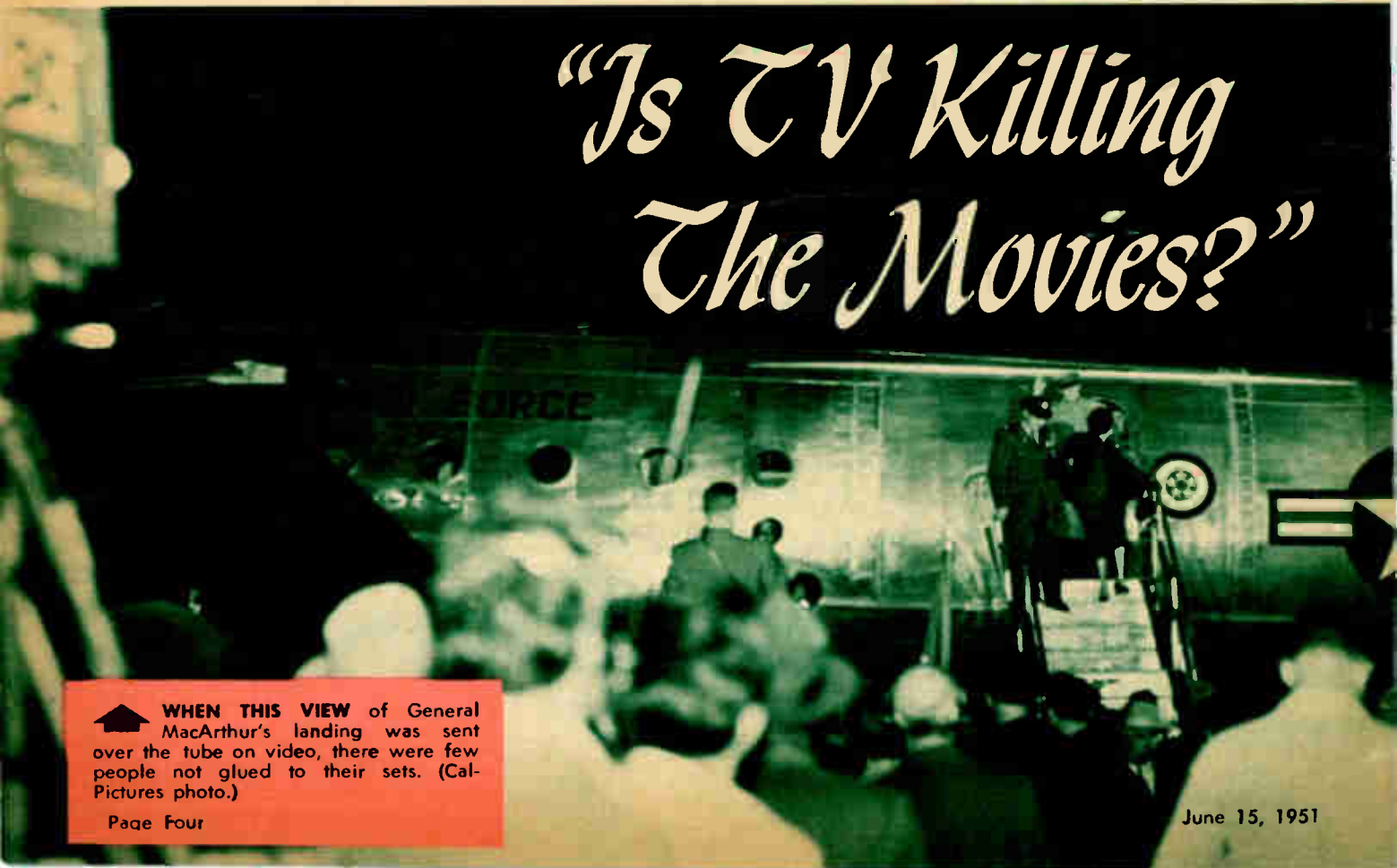
↓ **D** ID YOU know that every fourth family in the U.S. now owns a TV set, with the average set being on for five hours and twenty-five minutes a day? And that in ten major cities, the figure is one set to every two families? With television so securely rooted now, it is time to see if it is stepping on the toes of its celluloid rival . . . movies.

According to a nation-wide survey conducted by the agency of Batten, Barton, Durstine and Osborne, movie attendance drops one third when television comes into the home. This survey stated that on an ordinary day, eighteen per cent of the persons in non-television homes attended movies, while in video homes the figure was twelve per cent. Other spare-time activities such as radio listening and magazine and newspaper reading are also affected by TV, but to a lesser degree. The survey was made last November among 5657 persons in city homes in the forty-eight states. Most of the TV set owners had bought their sets during the preceding six months.

Another survey tells the story behind the viewing habits of teenagers. It was conducted by Dr. Paul Witty, Northwestern University professor of education, and shows that teen-age youths are reading less and skipping more movies . . . all because of television. The professor found that forty-four per cent of the teen-

agers now attend movies less frequently than before video's advent.

### MacArthur Night

After keeping one eye on the statistical students and the survey slaves, it is noted that the recent landing of General Douglas MacArthur in San Francisco chipped from ten to twenty-five per cent off the regular movie attendance record in Los Angeles the night of his arrival. Exception to this was the movie house which had a large-screen televising of the General's arrival, plus an exceptionally attractive double-bill on that night. This house re-

Here is this week's winner: Louis Lund, 1921 N. Rowan Ave., Los Angeles 32, Calif.

The hint is:

**THIS IS A HINT FOR YOUR FIRE-PLACE DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS.** Make a screen of plywood, three-eighths or half-inch, mount it on blocks, to hold it firmly and flush with the fireplace. Paint it to match your color scheme of the room, add a design in the center. You can draw it or you can cut a floral design from wallpaper and paste it on. Then shellac the screen.

**DON'T DISCARD OLD POWDER PUFFS.** They make excellent applicators for wax-type shoe polish. The puff will not become stiff with dried-out polish if it is small enough to keep inside the container.

**IF YOU CARRY SMALL TOOLS IN THE GLOVE COMPARTMENT OF YOUR CAR,** you'll find that if you insert them in the fingers of an old leather glove they will never rattle.

**YOU CAN MAKE YOUR OWN FLOWER HOLDERS OR FROGS** by simply pouring melted paraffin into a sauce dish; then before it sets, make holes with either a large nail or a pencil.

**HERE IS ANOTHER USE FOR A SOUP LADLE.** Paint it to match your kitchen and plant a leafy plant in it and then hang it on the wall. It makes an attractive planter and a most unusual one.

**DON'T THROW AWAY YOUR EMPTY SALT BOXES** until you have removed the tops with the metal spouts. Fit these carefully into a jar ring, they make pouring tops for pint or quart jars. They are fine for keeping rice, dried bread crumbs, ground coffee, etc.

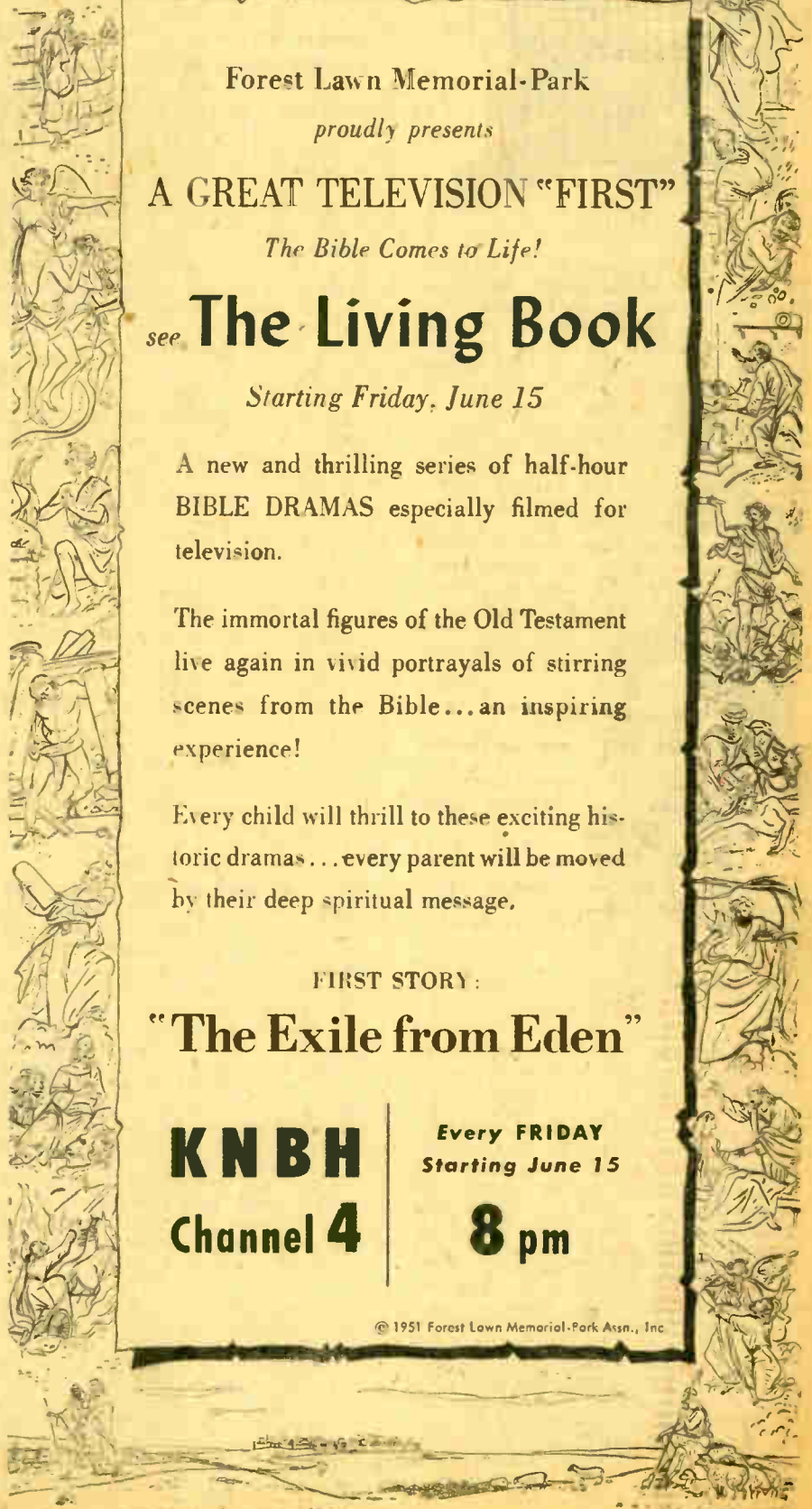

I SUPPOSE "THEY'LL" BLAME TV BECAUSE that ten-year-old boy hit and bit a baby next door while its parents were out shopping. According to the newspapers, the boy's mother agreed to keep an eye on the infant. She looked in on it and then sent her son next door several times to check. When the shopping parents returned, seems their baby was marred by marks of human teeth and blows. It was thought "a vampire type" marauder was loose until the small boy admitted he bit and slugged the baby in a fit of rage because the constant checking on the child interrupted his looking at TV. I don't think any ten-year-old should be allowed to sit hours on end watching TV, and for one, I'd blame this factor largely and quickly before some anti-TV'er starts using this as a horrible example of the medium's effect.

ANOTHER STRANGE ITEM IN THE NEWS this past week concerned the plight of Tschaikowski, Steve Cochran's piano-playing dog. The pooch was all set to perform his version of "Kitten on the Keys" at the Paramount in San Francisco when union regulations intervened. If Tschaikowski played, the theater would have to hire a standby (human being, we presume) and put a band in the pit. So old Tsch. came back home without displaying his talents in the Bay City. Hope he doesn't feel frustrated.

"THE MERRY WIDOW" PROVED MOST enjoyable one night at Philharmonic. "Handsomely mounted," I believe, is the terminology usually applied to a production like this. But beyond the usual, the performance held more than a little interest for me because the second romantic lead was played by Jeanne Fenn.

WHEN I FIRST INTERVIEWED HER THREE (or was it four?) years ago Jean (not yet Jeanne) was a plain, unassuming, friendly girl of twenty, with good clear blue eyes, a little too much weight, ash-blond hair, admittedly no flair for clothes, a gorgeous voice. Jean had just had a Cinderella experience—a while back, Sigmund Romberg had heard her winning number on an Atwater Kent Auditions program and had remembered her voice when casting his musical summer replacement for the Red Skelton show. Romberg did not have Jean's name but did remember the number she had sung, and through this bit of information she was traced and given the femme-vocalist spot on his upcoming airer. This had just happened when I did my interview.

Before my story was in type, Jean caught cold—such a bad one that she couldn't sing on the first show. Finally her stand-in took over, and a lot of us were disappointed that Dorothy Jean Fenn of Independence, Missouri, had lost out on a great opportunity.

ORDINARILY I SUPPOSE I WOULD HAVE tossed my story into the wastebasket, but I had a feeling about Jean and told the staff, "That girl is going

to amount to something and I'm saving my yarn." It has reposed in the depths of my lower right-hand desk drawer all this time.

I FISHED IT OUT THE MORNING after I had seen "The Merry Widow." It was such a thrill to have seen Jeanne's name on the program and to look twice at her as she made her stage entrance. For today, Jeanne Fenn is a beautiful, slim, poised actress and more gloriously voiced than ever. As she gracefully moved around the stage in her finery and manipulated her train like a princess, I couldn't help remembering how she had told me a few years ago that her one suppressed desire was an emerald-green dress and had remarked, "I've always wanted one ever since I saw the green stage curtains at the Philharmonic in Peoria."

I THINK JEANNE FENN is a natural for TV and that some day it will be a proud and happy moment for me when I can dig down in that desk drawer again and pull out that story I've been saving.

# This Week in TV

## In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

### Rumors Are Flying

That a name from the televised Kefauver hearings has cropped up again as potential key figure of a TV show. **Rudolph Halley** is the man, and he was former counsel. Show would be a panel crime quiz or documentary crime show. . . . That **Steve Allen**, CBS-TV's fair-haired one, is not only to be put into a weekly half-hour nighttimer (in addition to his daytime show) but that he may be given the emceeship of "Sing It Again." . . . "The Aldrich Family's" young son, "Homer," who is in real life **Jackie Kelk**, may have a TV show of his own next fall, continuing meanwhile with "The Aldriches." . . . A TV show for **Dinah Shore** is, we read in an Eastern publication, the big idea in the minds of both CBS-TV and NBC-TV. . . . Real, big-time pro football may be seen next fall. It is rumored that **DuMont** has purchased the TV rights to the **National Football League** championship games for the next few years. A look or two at this brand of football by the majority of the populace and the collegians may find themselves pleading for the TV cameras to focus on them. There is a big, big difference between pro and college ball—and it's a difference you don't dig until you get a look at the pro teams in action.

That **Tennessee Ernie**, whose fans don't need to be told he appears with **Cliffie Stone** on **KLAC-TV's** "Hometown Jamboree," is going to work in a movie show, a technicolor extravaganza entitled "Man in the Saddle." . . . **Milton Berle** will do a few of his video shows from here in Hollywood next season. . . . Mexican bullfights are to be filmed, edited, and shown on United States TV. Doesn't that defeat the very legislation that bans that particular "sport" (a debatable terminology, in our book), from this country? . . . That **Robert Montgomery's Lucky Strike Theater**, one of the East's biggest TV offerings, may be moved to this Coast next fall. The series is a half-hour dramatic series using adaptations of movies, and we haven't been seeing it here for two good reasons: (a) no cable; (b) no kinescopes, because movie rights for the series preclude any further filming. . . . An inquiry on the televising of inquiries is on the Congressional agenda. That's the first step toward opening the doors to the TV camera which would bring the public action pictures of the men they sent to Congress.

### Looks Like

**KLAC-TV** is forming its own research department as an aid to sponsors, prospective sponsors and the television industry as a whole, marking the first time an independent outlet has moved into the research field. In addition, one of **Tele-Que's** owners and founders, **Joe Coffin**, resigns from that survey service to take charge of the station's research department. . . . **ABC-TV's** "Pulitzer Prize Playhouse" will be no more after this summer. Plays produced by the same fine staff and sponsored by **Mr. Schlitz** and his brewers will continue, but on **CBS-TV**, under another title. The full-hour-long weekly television dramatizations will be announced at a later date. . . . **Edmund Lowe**, in the role of "Front Page Detective" over **KTTV's Channel 11**, will be with us for another thirteen weeks, having pleased his sponsor **Guild Wines** into a reoption for this period. He departs for a couple of weeks' vacation only.

"**Superman, Inc.**" is seeking a young man, six feet tall, to play the lead in the new "Superman" TV series. . . . When **Al Jarvis** tacked another hour on his **KLAC-TV** schedule last week, it brought the camera hours per week up to twenty-six! The new period (Saturdays, 8:30 p.m.) is to be an amateur and little-known-talent hour, plus a

about to get the acid test. Circuit houses operated by Fabian, Loew's, RKO and United Paramount Theaters will telecast the Louis-Savold fight being held at the Polo Grounds this week. The theaters have exclusive rights, and the contest will not be sent via cable or micro to home sets.

This tie-up provides the first opportunity to determine the box-office potential of major sports events aired exclusively in theaters, and in order to get the fight exclusively, theater-TV scratched up \$100,000 for the fight rights.

Another test is being run concurrently. In an effort to see if the gate on big events can be protected, the fight won't be shown in New York and in adjacent areas. The folks there who want to see it will have to turn out to the Polo Grounds—or revert to radio and imagine the action. Theaters in Washington, Baltimore, Albany, Cleveland and Chicago have signed, with other theaters' signa-tures depending upon coaxial availabilities.

(Right now we don't care whether Louis or Savold emerges victorious—but we are mighty interested in the success of theater television. Its complete success and good box-office "take" might well rob televiewers of heretofore "free" (free to them; it was a sponsor who anted up) entertainment.

## Second Glances (Critical Comment)

### We Point With Pride

... To the week-in-and-week-out performance of Jackie Gleason on "Cavalcade of Stars." Never dull, always with a new gag and the uncanny ability to adapt himself to all guests and all situations, Gleason seems to us badly overlooked in the roster of entertainment "greats." Just for the record and for your convenience in watching, the DuMont offering is seen Monday nights at 7:30 on KTTV.

... To the appearance of Dr. Elta Pfister on KECA-TV's "Meet Your Children" on June 7. After the Patty Hull case, so many people wrote and phoned asking that Dr. Pfister advise them on how to teach their children to avoid being victimized that Pfister gave the whole program over to this subject.

... To the show featuring garden expert Joe Littlefield each Sunday afternoon on KTTV. Active in gardening, lecturing, writing, radio-ing and organizing clubs, Joe Littlefield has still managed to maintain a close relationship with the soil. When he introduces a shrub, sprig or posy to his audience, that's just what he does—introduces it. Those real dirt-under-the-fingernails demonstrations are the ones that teach.

### We View With Alarm

... The ridiculous antics of a duo of girls acting as hostess-moderators on a long, long afternoon show. The casual, friendly attitude is a desirable feature on any live offering, but when the goings-on err by becoming mere rehash of local jokes, and long pauses punctuated by bursts of helpless laughter, viewer interest (this viewer's, at least!) flees.

... The repetitious yuk indulged in by two of the biggest names in television—Milton Berle and Fred Allen. Berle relieves his yammerings with antics and off-the-cuff didoes, but Allen just goes on talking. During Allen's latest appearance with Jimmy Durante, Allen's spot found him rigging a TV station in the Maine woods. Durante was to stumble on the set-up and perform unknowingly. We thought if Allen said "Maine woods," "Here we are in the Maine woods," or "up here in the Maine woods" once more as he fumbled around the set we would discontinue watching. (He did say it again, and again—but we did go right on watching. Jimmy was "on" by that time.)

... The recent pitch to lure the viewing madame into purchasing a sewing machine. Into a break between portions of a movie an announcer pushed his wares. All to the good—and the wares were fine. But certainly not the statement: "The first twenty-five of you ladies to pick up your phones and dial (such and such a number) get absolutely free all these fine pinking shears and at-

showcase spot for artists, sculptors and the like. . . . "Hollywood Newareel," a weekly fifteen-minute clip started originally for theatrical release, and designed as a motion-picture-fan and news magazine on film, will have a regular weekly TV schedule with national sponsorship. . . . Horace Heidt and his show have been renewed for television—and radio—by sponsor Philip Morris, and will continue through the summer on CBS-TV. . . . Louis D. Snader, former fiddler who has parlayed pleasing people and film clips for TV into a huge enterprise called "Tele-criptions," has been appointed president of the National Society of Television Producers, to fill the office previously held by Walter Wanger.

Negotiations are under way for CBS-TV to present Jo Stafford in a daily TV hour of her own, acting as both singer and femcee. Come to think of it, Jo is the only major-network singer we know of who has completely bypassed TV to date. . . . The Academy of Television Arts and Sciences is currently spearheading a Television Academy Week under the chairmanship of Mal Boyd. The promotion is designed primarily to educate everyone active in TV to the Academy's work and structure.

There seems to be something deep inside most people that invariably responds to the idea of "home." Witness the hordes who swarm over model houses or who weekly tramp through "Open House" when they haven't the slightest idea of buying. Maybe it's just curiosity to see how the other half lives. Anyway, on this assumption, KFI-TV probably expects to attract lookers to a week-end video program.

We won't label this an uninteresting show, for it may well be worth your attention if you are sincerely in the mood to buy a house and want to take the time while Alan Lane literally covers the field "from the mountains, to the valleys, to the ocean white with foam." One night recently he pitched everything from an unassuming beach abode to a \$22,950 place in Tarzana. As most seekers have fairly fixed notions as to where they want to live, much of the show dealing with sections they do *not* want to live is sheer boredom, except in some cases where price differentials are shown up.

Lane does his pitching at a fast clip . . . he has many items to cover . . . but we would like it better if (a) he slowed down to a more casual pace, even if this necessitated omitting two or three "offerings"; (b) his copy were changed to a more intimate style, instead of straight plug; (c) he had better and more pictures (if they have to shoot the front of the house and the living room, why not take a picture of the "delightful breakfast alcove" or "unique barbecue"?). We realize that even one picture may be an adequate teaser, but three or four good ones would no doubt do a better selling job and make the show a "video" program, which is, we deduce, what it is intended to be.

Finally, we think someone should loosen up and take a few feet of movies to supplement or supplant the sparse "stills." It has always been our understanding that there was a difference between a "house" and a "home," and if this is to be a video show called "Homes for Sale," the places should not be empty buildings nor deserted quarters, but dwellings with people and home-like atmosphere. Otherwise, retitling the show honestly to "Houses for Sale."

Even Beatrice Lillie loses her enchantment when too much repetition sets in. Sad, but true, that this ace comedienne doesn't appear to strive for anything new in her TV approach.

We judge from "the Bea's" second stanza on the "Comedy Hour." Her sketch on composers and her maid role became spotty and to us seemed to run too long. The same capricious cavorting and hybrid whimsy were on hand, but evidently can't stand up under wear.

Miss Lillie might conceivably improve her femcee techniques by exchanging solo bits for more engrossing repartee with her guests. A case in point on the recent telecast was the appearance of the really incomparable Victor Moore seen in an aged-in-vaudeville sketch. The formula oozed an aura of mothballs, with Moore searching for New York's 57th Street, and in his search encountering confusions of all sorts as he stood on the corner of 42nd! How much more humorous would have been the whole sketch if Moore and Miss Lillie could have blended witticisms, instead of Moore being met by a series of stock characters ranging from a woman who asked him to hold her baby for a minute, a burglar who planted his bag of tools with him, a lonely-hearts

Perhaps the definite feeling that the program is not a complete unit in itself but merely a set of unconnected sketches is what emphasized the impression of Miss Lillie's own redundancies.

The balance of our hope for things better arose from the performances turned in by Dorothy Ford, the glamour-m menace, Jack Reitzen, and Phillip Van Zant. All followed Keaton through a series of sappings, nappings and falls in a story which found the poker-faced artist being visited at his private-eye office by crooks; traipsing about to deliver a mysterious package; and generally lampooning the busy ways of our radio sleuths.

At one point the puppet-characters of "Jump Jump of Holiday House" were introduced. We aren't sure, even today, whether this was a great advance exploitation for the "Jump Jump" series (also to be filmed by Consolidated) or a ghastly mistake arising from the use of the handiest "props" nearby the day this sequence was shot.

Jackson Rose's photography was great, with that head and feet below the swinging door a stand-out bit. The head went one way, the feet another.

Our main feeling is that the whole half hour should be speeded up, redundancy avoided, and Keaton given more to do, less to suffer at others' hands.

But it was still the Buster Keaton show, and his first. Time heals all wounds, and we look forward to successive, sharper half-hour films built around the old favorite.

*"Ford Festival"*

James Melton's taking over of the Ford show made a big splash in the trade journals—and from the Melton fans we have encountered, even a bigger splash with the public.

At risk of antagonizing a good number of our own best friends, and after putting off the reporting of our own opinion for just one more watching of the Melton-starring hour, we are forced to say the show is failing completely to make use of the talent with which it literally crawls!

The full-hour variety presentation is formatted around salutes, visits to other countries, themes pertinent to the songs rendered, and bits by visiting talent.

Last week saw the salute going the way of the city of Paris in honor of the French capital's 2,000th anniversary celebration. A "fashion show" featured models from both sides of the Atlantic wearing creations by Jacques Fath, Paris fashion king.

The week before the motif was Western, and in addition to Melton's absurd Western get-up, he had a troupe thumping around the stage in an Indian dance and costume, seemingly for hours.

The former guests of the Melton "Ford Festival," three slightly built, slightly wacky Wiere Brothers, have now been signed as permanent members. Their forte is a combination of old-world charm with new-world slapstick, and once upon a time their abilities landed them a command performance before King George VI. But somehow, even they seem badly paced on the Melton show.

The "Ford Festival" is produced under the direction of Charles Friedman. David Broekman directs a thirty-two-piece orchestra and a chorus of twelve voices. Robert Sidney is choreographer and Grey Lockwood is NBC-TV director. All tops in their field.

Some of the greatest potentials in TV are on hand for what should be a bang-up hour of song, dance and general entertainment. It is hard for us to say just what is lacking—we still think it is the slow pacing of the good spots that in turn seems to level the individual turns.

Or are we merely used to watching a lot of frantic stuff that makes up in speed what it lacks in quality, thereby spoiling ourselves for such treats as the "Ford" fare?

They say anticipation is ninety-nine per cent of anything.

The dream sequence, boob-sleuth antics of the Consolidated Television Productions stanza left us hopeful, however. Keaton showed flashes of the rare ability which built him into a comedian whose name two generations respect. A few of the show gimmicks were fresh and stood out like the rose on any forgotten Caesar's grave.

**Off Lens (Personalities)**

*Crime Report*

Last week a series of mimeographed pages, showing the results of a study of crime programs televised by the seven Los Angeles stations during the first week of May, 1951, crossed our desk. The data were gathered for use



in an article to be published in a monthly trade publication.

Briefly: Seventy per cent of the programming televised specifically for children was based on crime. Eighty-two per cent of the major acts of violence viewed by the monitors took place on programs designed for child viewing. Only five and five hundredths per cent of these crimes were televised after 9:00 p.m. Seventy per cent of all the crime programs were televised specifically for the child audience. KECA-TV led in crime programming, followed by KTLA. KNBH had by far the least crime programming of any station.

Then followed a list of the crimes enacted: Murder, justifiable homicides; attempted murder; kidnapping; robbery; non-fatal shootings; jailbreaks; grand larcenies; attempted larcenies; false murder charges; conspiracies to commit murder; non-fatal stabbings; attempted robbery; extortion; mayhem; suicides and arson.

TV is doing pretty well. But it missed the dastardly deed perpetrated in one of Hans Christian Andersen's famous tales about the mermaid who sat on a rock combing her hair and luring fishermen to a watery grave. And it has left out entirely the business of shoving your playmates into fire and watching them melt. That was exemplified in the beloved old tale of the tin soldier and lovely dancing paper doll. "Black Beauty" and "Beautiful Joe," books for children above fairy-tale age, offered classic lessons in animal cruelty. Well, maybe television will get around to this.

Another nifty we remember was the series in which "Farmer Brown" chased a frightened little rabbit named "Peter" through a cabbage patch. The chase in all its glory! How kids love it. But other memories summoned from the same time turn this saga pale. There was the man-eating giant in "Jack and the Beanstalk"—"Hansel and Gretel's" stepmother, who lost them in the woods; and the witch who was fattening them for baking—and there was "Snow White's" mean old stepmother. She poisoned her own daughter. But "best" of all, we seem to remember, was a tale contained in an encyclopedia set, in the volume of children's stories. "The Yellow Dwarf" was the name of the story. In it, lions ate people, yellow dwarfs chased them, bewitched them and finally imprisoned them.

Funny thing—we remember the stories vividly, but to date we haven't set lions on any of our friends, killed them, tried to bake them, lose them in the woods or poison them. Nor have we seen any little friends of today, who are getting their kicks watching TV, try any of these tricks on their friends. True, they have capered about the yard shouting "bang" and "whoa!" and of course these hideous practices should be stopped—but somehow they seem to be pulling through the era all right—just as have the children of every other era and every other entertainment medium.

Anyway, who's the big wheel in your house—the parent or the TV set?

"New Frontiers"

Thursday, 9:30 p.m.

Next time some well-meaning citizen tells you that our democracy is doing nothing to promote our way of life, suggest he tune in on the weekly broadcast over KECA entitled "New Frontiers." This dramatic series, part of the "Lest We Forget" series, is sponsored by The Institute for Democratic Education, Inc. Its sole purposes for being are to insure a better understanding of our country's social problems and to bring about less unfair discriminatory practices among the American people in their everyday existence.

Such stars as Faye Emerson, Walter Hampden, Tyrone Power and Ronnie Liss are among those who give their talents to these worthy dramatic messages. A recent broadcast, which starred Ronnie Liss, the juvenile actor, retold the story of how a youth must learn to approach his teammates in school on an equal basis, regardless of their particular race, color or religion. It involved the father's instructions to his son in learning how to make friends and generally get along in the world. A very finely written script, in which the narration and most of the acting was done by young people, told the story very simply, without seeming to be dogmatic. Both children and adults should have comfortably and understandably gotten its message of democratic living. Most of these dramas are built around the events which occur in the average family. Teachers and parents as well as community living are strongly integrated into the scripts. It is a realistic approach to human relations, with an entertainment appeal. By the use of narrative style the story line is able to cover a lot of territory and yet be understandable.

"New Frontiers" ranks high in purpose and production, and certainly is a good listening spot for the entire family. It is the sort of program that can easily lead to stimulating living-room discussions.

"Tapestries of Life"

Something about the lunch hour (for workers) and its attendant hunger and hurry generates an impatience with any gentle philosophy which "droppeth like the gentle rain from heaven" on ears that want most of all to hear a waitress ask, "... and what will yours be?"

It was with that strike against it that we experienced, for the first time in many, many months, the Forest Lawn-sponsored "Tapestries of Life," narrated by Wendell Noble each noontime on KNX. And enjoyed it immensely.

Admittedly, we were first hooked by the Noble voice. Wendell could have been reading a recipe and probably would have stuck around—but when he continued in the vein that "Tapestries" regularly follows, it assured listening. Some of the nicest thoughts in the world, lots of good sense and comfort, and delightful anecdotes are on parade each day at 12:15. Not a one of them is wrapped in the spun sugar which ordinarily and unfortunately attends pleasant thinking. That's a good trick in itself!

The material with which Noble entertains daily is the result of experience, knowledge, a half week of research and a half week of writing on the part of Phyllis Gordon. A former newspaper editor from Minnesota and a Hollywood radio writer for seven years, Phyllis combines a prodigious memory with exemplary taste and awfully good sense.

Her thoughts for the day, suggestions, verses, anecdotes and philosophies are drawn from the research. Therein lies the prodigious memory. Her choice of items which serve as springboards for her own written thoughts illustrates the exemplary taste. Her treatment of the daily scripts leaves no doubt of the awfully good sense.

We can't describe the show—but we can and do suggest Twenty-two

"Echoes and Encores"

Music will probably continue to be one of radio's most appealing and stable offerings, although many forms of entertainment have been threatened by the advent of video. When an airshow is devoted to thirty minutes of continuous musical recordings, its strength lies primarily in the selections which are played. "Echoes and Encores" is a pleasant half hour of listening, night after night, because of its attention to giving the listener seldom-heard numbers, but nonetheless arrangements that have great appeal. There is always variety, contrast, and freshness apparent in the platters aired.

When it comes to symphonic selections, both American and foreign symphonies are played. Some of the world's greatest composers and conductors are featured each week. A sampling of many memorable Broadway musical highlights is often spotlighted on this KFAC music lover's delight. One night the entire selections, not just the familiar lyrics, of "The Man I Love," "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes," and "April Showers" were put on the turntable.

A program such as "Echoes and Encores" is easy to take at the end of a tiring day, and will very often match your mood. There are commercials on the program, but they do not intrude harshly to break the musical atmosphere.

To Jack Benny's traditionally fine gesture of presenting his entire staff on his seasonal sign-off. Even the soundmen came in for recognition, and we shouldn't say "even the soundmen," for Gene Twombly and James Murphy contribute much to the program's success, though many listeners don't take time to be aware of their importance. It was great fun to have the cast parade before the mike and especially to hear Mel Blanc zip through a few of his inimitable greats from "Bugs Bunny" to the coughing "Maxwell." It would be hard to find a more versatile and completely talented actor than Mel and a more generous and appreciative star than Benny. Didn't you like Jack's LS/MFT lyric, "CBS has color now, to show my eyes are blue"?

To the prize-winning "Dr. Christian" script aired recently. "The Homecoming" by Fred McWhorter, an insurance-claim adjuster, who writes for a hobby, is the story of a draft dodger whose release from prison embarrasses his son, a high-school leader. The applied psychology, in the usual kindly "Dr. Christian" manner, provided keen insight on a ticklish problem.

To the vocal treatment given an "oldie." "Speak Low," by Dinah Shore . . . and the song styling Jack Smith gave a new tune, "Sound Off," on a recent airing of "The Tide Show."

We View With Alarm

The continuous similarity of character portrayals apparent to even a casual listener to "Mr. District Attorney." An actress trying to out-Holliday Judy, and an actor whose main task seems to be trying to sound like an elegant "meanie," are among the most constant redundancies. Method:

Combine brown sugar, cocoa, cornstarch and salt in heavy skillet. Stir in water, then cook the mixture until mixture begins to boil and thicken slightly, stirring constantly. Add butter or margarine and mix well. Remove from heat while making the dumplings.

Method:

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and cocoa. Add shortening, egg, milk and vanilla extract. Stir to blend ingredients, then beat thoroughly for one minute.

Return skillet to heat and bring chocolate sauce to boil. Drop dumplings by spoonfuls on chocolate sauce. Reduce heat and simmer gently 20 minutes. Makes about 6 small dumplings.

Best-of-the-week honors in male-vocal, girl-vocal, dance-band and instrumental categories go to **Vic Damone**, **Connie Haines**, **Benny Goodman**, and **Eddie Miller with Gordon Jenkins Orchestra**. Damone's waxing of "My Truly, Truly Fair" (Mercury) is one of his best commercial sides, and the same can be said of Connie's "Too Many Hearts" (Coral). For "Down South Camp Meetin'" and "South of the Border" (Columbia) BG must have dusted off his early Forty book, for they bear the unmistakable Fletcher Henderson trademark of that era when Benny was king. For sheer beauty in arrangement and presentation, Eddie Miller's tenor-saxing on "Ellington Echoes" (Decca) is a must, especially with the velvet backing of Gordon Jenkins orchestra and chorus.

... **Bob Eberly** (Capitol) continues to pack a wallop in his latest vocal release, "You Belong to My Heart" and "My Life's Desire," filled with Bob's personable style, volume and warmth to Harold Mooney backing. ... **Billy Eckstine** (MGM) sings his romanciest on the exotic tango "I'm a Fool to Want You" and "Love Me," both top material and done to a turn by Mr. B.

... **Gertrude Lawrence** (Decca LP Microgroove) and others of the original New York cast lend a Broadway flair to selections from the hit-studded musical "The King and I." Especially effective are "I Whistle a Happy Tune," "Hello Young Lovers" and "We Kiss in a Shadow," decidedly different material from the pens of Rodgers and Hammerstein. ... **Harry James Orchestra** (Columbia) has a pair of instrumentals in moderate tempo that the Horn's fans should really appreciate in "When the Sun Comes Out" and "Tango Blues," both highlighting plenty of the James trumpet. ... **Bing Crosby** (Decca) and lovely-voiced Betty Mullen join voices for a modern wedding song, "With This Ring I Thee Wed," and the wedding song of old Hawaii, "Here Lies the Rainbow"—both easy on the ears and in time for June joinings. ... **Bob Crosby** (Capitol) debuts on this label with many original Bob Cats in the line-up for a swing instrumental version of "That Naughty Waltz" and the style that brought him fame. Reverse "Shanghai" sports plenty rhythm, with vocal handled by the maestro? ... **Mills Brothers** (Decca) have a sweet platter of moderate tempo in "Love Me" and "Who Knows Love" to smooth Victor Young backing. ... **D** ID YOU know that there are twenty-five ways to sleep on a bus? This matter-of-fact statement comes from tall, dark and lovely Ada Leonard, leader of KTTV's "Search for Girls." After extensively touring the country on one-night stands, Ada feels well qualified to make the foregoing statement. She intends, one day, to write a book on the subject.

This lady of rhythm with the unusual coiffure has been in show business since childhood. Her parents were troupers, and Ada made her first solo appearance at the age of two when she sang one of the popular songs of the day. She played an ingenue dramatic role at eleven, when the heroine in one of her father's plays became ill and Ada stepped into her shoes — after the shoes had been stuffed with paper to make them stay on her feet. After the family act broke up, Ada achieved stellar billing as a specialty act, singing, dancing, and playing several musical instruments.

Ten years ago she organized her all-girl orchestra, which proved an excellent background for her diver-

sified talents. Miss Leonard and her band have appeared on such radio shows as the "Fitch Bandwagon" and the Coca-Cola program, and was recently featured in Warner's musical film "My Dream Is Yours."

Is managing and directing a thirteen-piece orchestra entirely composed of women quite a chore? Ada smiled when questioned about this and said, "I must admit it does have its complications. I'm sort of mother confessor, pal and counselor to my staff. Whenever possible I try to have the girls' unanimous approval on matters that concern their welfare. Being a woman myself," she continued, "I have some insight as to how the feminine mind works, and needless to say it is invaluable for anticipating and preventing situations that might arise.

"It's difficult to keep an orchestra of girls intact for long periods. Marriage, boy friends or mamas often intervene, and thus cut short promising careers." This continual flow of information from Ada Leonard seemed quite unusual and delightful, for she is usually reserved.

Ada devotes much of her time to her "Search for Girls" program. Auditions, routines and rehearsals receive her personal attention. The youthful aspiring talent that appears

on her weekly teleshow is encouraged and made to feel at ease. Ada doesn't think that non-professionals, who are tense and nervous in what might well be their television debut, should bear the brunt of misdirected humor.

Ada is a graceful five feet, eight inches tall, and has one pet gripe. She can never purchase theatrical tights long enough. Whenever tights are on Ada's shopping list, she has them made to order by a Chicago costumer. She's the ultra-long-stemmed version of America's traditional "cheesecake" art.

In keeping with her model height is the length of her lustrous straight black hair, reaching her knees. It hasn't been cut, with the exception of trimming and shaping, since she was fifteen. When Ada Leonard lets her hair down she does so literally. Her unusual hair style, parted in the center, sleeked down and waved softly over each ear, is reminiscent of the early señoritas who settled in California. Her daily hair grooming requires three quarters of an hour. Most girls flip a comb through their short, feather-cut bobs in two seconds flat.

**M**ARGARET TRUMAN, who made her radio singing debut a couple of years ago on a Sunday evening musical program, chalked up another premiere on April 26, when she played opposite Jimmy Stewart on NBC's "Screen Directors' Playhouse." Some indication that she might veer into the line-reading end of radio was apparent a few months before when she read lines with Tallulah Bankhead and other members of "The Big Show" cast on which she was guesting. Subsequently, NBC signed her to make appearances on various network programs. Significantly, some think, this contract expires October, 1953. However, her "Screen Directors'" stint was not part of this arrangement.

Reactions to Miss Truman's dramatic performance were mingled, though majority seemed to think that with application and experience she might succeed more fully in acting than in a musical career. Reactions to her personally, however, were unanimous in thinking her a very charming young lady.

Reaction of the President to his daughter's performance on "Screen Directors' Playhouse" was forthcoming immediately after the broadcast when NBC switchboard put through a call to The White House. Miss Truman took the call in a second-floor executive office, talked at length, reported that her father had "enjoyed" her performance.

**Editor's Note:** As our readers are probably aware, Mr. Collingwood is regularly a Washington, D. C., radio newsmen. During a recent visit to Hollywood he headquartered at Columbia Square, and naturally TV-Radio Life seized this opportunity to ask him some interesting questions. He was very gracious in giving us these answers, which we pass on to you.

**1. What phase of your Washington beat do you like the most?**

Well, being a lazy man, I like it best when the President goes to Key West. Then I go along and give myself the vacation-plus treatment. Seriously, I like to be close to the people and events that are shaping the destinies not only of our generation but of subsequent generations. Washington, D. C., is still a small enough town so you can get to know all the key figures very well.

**2. What phase of your Washington beat do you like the least?**

Mechanically, it is a difficult beat, because you can never call your time your own. You may have a dinner planned at home with guests arriving, when a call comes that the President is about to make an off-the-cuff speech, so you have to forget guests and dinner and rush off to hear the President.

**3. Do you attend President Truman's press conferences, and if so describe one, in ten or twelve appropriate adjectives.**

The press conferences are held in the old State Department Building, across the street from Blair House. Usually 100 or so correspondents are gathered in the room, when the President makes a very brisk entrance. All the correspondents are sensitive to the President's mood, if he is friendly, cautious, or relaxed, and we try to act accordingly. All the questioning is very orderly, and the President is very considerate and takes each reporter in turn.

**4. What news topics do you most enjoy handling?**

I like to talk about Washington, D. C., because I'm closely identified with it. I like stories on political or economic subjects . . . and I don't like to cover news on subjects I am not well versed on, such as labor.

because then it gets terribly complicated.

**5. Do you ever have any difficulty in keeping your personal feelings about the news out of the tone of your voice or manner of broadcasting?**

Yes, everybody does, it's just inevitable. I don't suppose there is a human being, let alone a news analyst, who can help that. I try to maintain an Olympian objectivity, but it's very difficult.

**6. How much do you have to read (in number of pages) to cover the day's news?—that is, apart from the teletype, etc. What do you read to assist you in gaining additional background information for your broadcasts?**

I couldn't begin to answer that

one, because you get to a point where you read almost nothing that is not grist to your mill. A news analyst is like a doctor, he has to keep reading everything new in his field.

**7. What have been your most significant news coverages?**

The surrender at Rheims, France, when the Germans surrendered to General Eisenhower. And when I reported as the first CBS correspondent from the U. N. in its formative years. I love political reporting . . . the smoke-filled rooms fascinate me.

**8. Who is the most interesting person in the news that you have met, and why was he interesting?**

W. Averell Harriman, who is now the President's special assistant. Here is a man who has probably been more closely associated with more of the great political events and personalities of our time than any other man alive. He has a tremendous fund of information. He has a unique position in America, of

coming about as close as a man can come to devoting his life to public service.

**9. Who is the most newsworthy person in Washington (excluding Truman, of course).**

*I would guess it would be Bob Taft, since he is the natural rival to the President.*

**10. Would you care to make a prediction about the Korean situation, say about six months from now?**

*Neither side can actually win in Korea, so a military solution is impossible. Therefore a political solution becomes increasingly attractive. I would say that in six months we will have found a political solution in Korea. What form that will take I wouldn't say. I don't know.*

**11. Would you please make a prediction about Russia and the world situation six months from now?**

*I'll say this, that there will not be a war within this year. I base this on the fact that we are developing deterrents against war. A balance of power is being created in which further aggression will be so costly that it will be unthinkable.*

**12. What place in the world have you found most interesting from a newsmen's angle? Why?**

*Washington, D. C. It is the most interesting and most newsworthy place in the world, because all the great issues are decided there.*

**13. Which is your preference about a place to live? L.A. or Washington?**

*I would rather live in the West, as far as sheer living goes. The West is the most vigorous part of the country.*

**14. Which is your preference about working, L.A. or Washington?**

*Washington, as long as I have to depend upon news for my livelihood.*

**15. Do you think most news today on radio is slanted? Is the mere fact that human beings are delivering it apt to make it biased?**

*I would say that most news on radio is pretty clean. I would draw a distinction between reporting and analyzing the news. When speaking of analysis, it is slanted, but that is true because it is an interpretation of the headlines. I interpret the news, but I am honest about it.*

**16. What do you think of the news coverage coming from Korea? Is it complete or is it censored?**

*I haven't been in Korea. I don't know.*

**17. What is your favorite comic strip and why?**

*At present I have a weekly TV program called "People's Platform." We get national figures on the show who take opposing sides on an issue, and I keep them arguing. I'd like to do an ad-lib news analysis.*

**19. What seems to you to be the best format for presenting news on television?**

*You can't fool the camera on video. You need a genuine news man who knows what he is talking about. A man who can talk about the current events extemporaneously, without using visual aids such as maps, charts, etc. I don't think you can be a good analyst unless you are a good reporter.*

**20. We understand your wife, Louise Albritton, is in TV. Are you ever going to do a show together?**

*Yes, we have planned to. There has been a big thing which is still in the mill, for us to do a husband-wife interviewee show from our home, with Washington celebrities as guests. I don't know whether it will jell or not.*

ported proceeds were increased fifty per cent above usual. They stated: "We didn't kill them or anything like that, but it was very good . . . if we hadn't had the telecast it would have fallen 'way off.'" Many theater managers noted in Hollywood that on MacArthur night "Nobody was on the street . . . and there was no foot traffic."

So noticeable is the impact of TV on the cinema that it is known in the trade that "Tuesday night is TV night anyway . . . always a weak movie night," and therefore not a good night to judge the effect of special previews or features on theater attendance. Matter of fact, it was said that all studios held off taking movies out for any audience reaction tests on the Tuesday night of MacArthur's arrival.
