A Dummy Makes Good

By This Name Paul Relegates His Partner To a Brutally Normal Place in Their Scheme of Nationally Entertaining Fun

WHEN BRIGHT-FACED ventriloquist's doll "Jerry Mahoney" isn't actually on stage trading badinage with Paul Winchell, he is locked in an aluminum case with no air holes! As Paul says: "He's only a dummy—what's he need air for?"

Paul is not only one of America's finest ventriloquists, he is probably the most individual. He refuses to play second fiddle to his dummy or to find "his real personality" in "Jerry."

Make-Believe for Children

When the famous duo entertain children, Paul is careful to point out to the moppets, lest they be frightened of the forward little "Jerry": "Look, kids, he's only a big doll. See, I made him move by my hand inside his back. He can't talk to you unless I do it for him. Come on over here and watch."

Some of Winchell's fellow-ventriloquists must blanch at this seeming treason.

And yet Paul Winchell has more reason than some of his contemporaries to regard his dummy as an infallible, indispensable other self. He built "Jerry." He mends "Jerry" when small ills of paint and wood arise. He made "Jerry's" other bodies, which on quick-change shows are decked in various costumes. This way "Jerry" gets his bright little noggin switched from one garbed body to another and seems to be the quick-change artist of all time.

Indomitable

What saves the grown-up half of the NBC-TV team from losing himself in the proclivities of his dummy is Winchell's own positive personality. Nothing stops him. A polio victim at six, Paul some years later discovered the efficacy of weight-lifting and has thereby built himself into a perfect physical specimen. His aquatic abilities of today have no bearing on his career, but the feat demonstrates the manner in which Winchell approaches and handles all his accomplishments.

For instance, Paul, without ever having had a lesson, is today just as interested and proficient in dra-

tics as he is in ventriloquism. His weekly sketches, illustrated here, are one of the nation's laughs. Paul himself makes them always good enough to draw the big sock "laffs."

Plays the Principal

"Jerry" is kept in his role of an average twelve-year-old and quick-witted stooge-persecutor for Paul. Paul adopts the roles of William Tell, Cyrano de Bergerac, Jacques LaFitte, or Dr. Frankenstein. And he does them well enough so that a leading talent agency requested bits of kinescope as capsule screen tests to show to a studio interested in Paul as an actor, not a ventriloquist. In this medium he will stand absolutely alone, unaided by his dummy. Can you think of one other ventriloquist who has dared this departure?

A First

"Jerry Mahoney," in the meantime, is planning his own show, also a single. He will stick to TV, according to Paul, who actually does have a children's show for this fall in mind for "Jerry." Just how it will be done Paul doesn't say, but you'll be safe in offering ten to one on

Paul enthuses, "I guess this would be the first time a ventriloquist and his dummy ever split up, and each got ahead." Most voice-throwers would refuse to entertain the thought.

But irrespective of the heights to which Paul may go in motion pictures or to what extent of juvenile popularity the flip "Jerry" might succeed with his single on TV, the millions nationwide who happily follow the duo's marvelous Sunday night whimsey can relax. NBC-TV has the boys tied up, together, for television with a five-year contract.

COMBINE CLIFFIE STONE and Tennessee Ernie and you are set for rhythm aplenty. Cliffie discovered Tennessee less than two years ago, and under his able management his "find" has risen to national popularity in the entertainment world. Going from "Hometown Jamboree" aired over KXLA, Pasadena, to the Copacabana Club in New York City is quite a jump.

The hillbilly singer, "Tennessee Ernie," was born Ernest Ford in Bristol, Tennessee. Ernie can render ballads, hillbilly, Western and pop tunes with equal appeal. The chief form of diversion on the Fords' farm was community singing and square-dancing. Raised in such a self-entertaining environment, Ernie de-

veloped resources . . . stage presence, poise and country humor . . . to enhance his singing talents.

Ernie sang in his high-school glee club and church choir. He studied voice at the Cincinnati Conservatory, but circumstances forced him to leave school before his studies were completed. Ernie then worked on several Tennessee stations as an announcer. After his release from the army, Ernie joined the staff of KFXM in San Bernardino. A last-minute cancellation gave him an opportunity to fill in as a hillbilly disc jockey.

Country Music

"Ernie's singing is a composite of a new music trend," advises Cliffie Stone. "Country music is the high-brow level of hillbilly music. And Ernie's forte is country music, which appeals to the night-club crowd as well as the barn-dance goers. "Ernie's voice," he continued, "is clear and pleasant to the ear. No Western

twang or Southern accent to mark his style provincial."

Almost every record Ernie has waxed has made the top ten in Billboard polls. "Shotgun Boogie," "Mule Train," "Mr. and Mississippi," and "Cry of the Wild Goose" are but a few of his successes. Ernie is under contract to Capitol Records. His neighbors in Monterey Park have caught his singing mood and even the youngsters can be heard humming his "Shotgun Boogie." In addition to Ernie's "Hometown Jamboree" radio and TV chores, he's a frequent guest on the "Grand Ole Opry" program.

Hometown Jamboree

Ernie's significant debut on "Hometown Jamboree" was under the capable guidance of Cliffie Stone, who's been a Western radio personality for seventeen years. "Hometown Jamboree," a Western variety show, aired live Monday through Friday on KXLA, has its television counterpart, from the El Monte ballroom, over KLAC-TV. Here Cliffie's eight-piece band and cast entertain a family audience. The telecast features a waltzing contest. One viewer, recognizing a winner as his concentration-camp buddy, lost no time in effecting a reunion.

Showman Cliffie has some sound opinions on television. "Personality is the magnetic attraction," he says convincingly. "Production heads forget that they are guests in your living room. They clutter up the background with an extravagance of sets, having a tendency to muddle and distract the viewers' attention." Together, Cliffie and Ernie put on a smooth Western show and together they compose and publish music of the range. "Anticipation Blues" and "The Lord's Lariat" are but two of their musical successes.

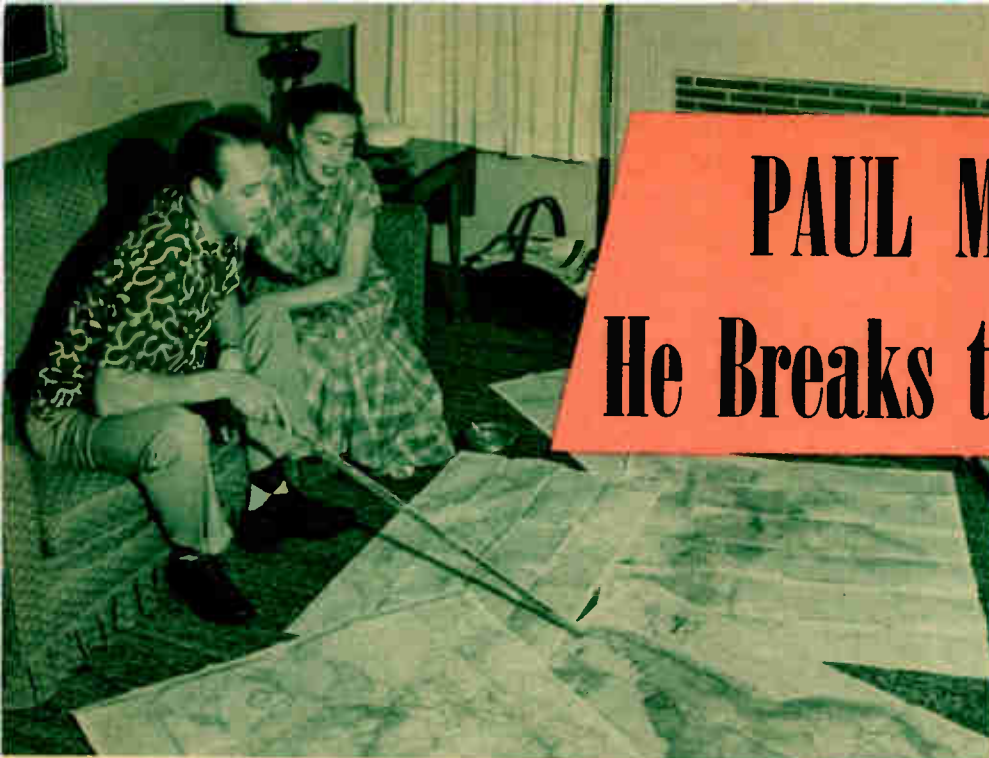

literature. Paul usually decides the course each program will follow, then the two huddle over the details of the trip. They've been around the world many times without leaving their small but inviting Burbank home.

The Mastersons live near the Disney studios in the eastern end of the San Fernando Valley. Quite a few other CBS personalities also live in that neighborhood, which makes for frequent and gay social gatherings at the Masterson home. They love to entertain and have a legion of friends who constantly drop in on them.

Their daughter, Debora, is a year old and is best described as "a doll," in every sense of the word.

World View

While Paul has become a recognized authority on travel and world music, his daily show keeps him so tied down in Hollywood that he actually travels much less than many other people. He hasn't had an extended vacation (except for two weeks this summer spent in Salt Lake City) in two years and is constantly turning down tempting invitations to be a guest at some of the world's finest resorts.

Television and narration on travel films now promise to keep him from traveling far from Hollywood for some time to come. He is currently working on his own TV show. Outside narrating jobs also keep him busy every day.

Because he is in constant touch with the leading hotels around the world, Paul is the frequent recipient of exotic and fabulous gifts from such places as Stockholm, Copenhagen, Mexico City, Cape Town, Milan and Lake Como. As a consequence he has friends all over the face of the earth.

Masterson is responsible for many outstanding singers and orchestras of foreign lands being introduced to American audiences. Known as "The International Disc Jockey," Paul features the recordings of stars who are famous in their own lands but who were unheard of here until he brought them to America's attention.

Music, says Paul, is the international language. He believes it can lead us to a better understanding of our world neighbors and help us to achieve a "One big happy family" of nations.

PAUL MASTERSON is one husband who takes his wife on a world tour almost every day. Oddly enough, they seldom leave home.

The head man of the Paul Masterson Show is an inveterate traveler, loves faraway places and shares his enthusiasm for globe-trotting with his wife. But they do most of their traveling in their living room.

Even in the beginning, Paul Masterson didn't even travel far to get into radio in Hollywood. A native son of Long Beach, he went to school and met his charming and attractive wife there and is a prime example of local boy making good with a childhood hobby.

Wanderlust

Ever since he can remember, Paul

has suffered acute attacks of wanderlust and, as a youth, was constantly poring over books and magazines on travel. He wanted to visit every corner of the earth and become an authority on the customs and peoples of every land.

He has accomplished that goal in a much different manner than he had planned as a boy. Today he is CBS's authority on music around the world. His daily show is devoted to a musical globe-trotting adventure on which he takes his listeners, reporting on the current hit tunes and musical favorites in far-off lands.

Cablegrams from the managers of swank hotels and smart night clubs, in Paris, Rome, London, Cairo, Rio, Tokyo and Berlin arrive at Paul's desk daily, advising him of the tastes in popular songs and who's who among top popular singers and orchestras in those places.

Home Life

At home, life with the Mastersons is one continuous world cruise. His wife, formerly Adell Leonard of Long Beach (she married Paul in 1946), is equally interested in her husband's pet hobby and profession.

They work together on these mythical jaunts, Adell contributing ideas and her own knowledge, gleaned from their large library of travel

"You're Never Too Old"

As the title implies, the show proves in most cases that a person is never too old to entertain the public . . . in one fashion or another. Emcee Harry Koplan has gathered around him a group drawn from every corner of the Los Angeles area. Some have retired from show business, and some are effecting an inverse retirement by leaving home and the business of hiding their light beneath a bushel to kick up their usually talented heels before the TV lens.

Typical were the turns of Joe Horowitz, a Yellow Cab driver, whose fender-scraping exploits haven't at all damaged the nerves it took for a balancing act; Scotty Monroe, a Scotch singer; and Uncle Billy Behan, an eighty-seven-year-old who ripped through "He Walked Right in and Turned Around and Walked Right Out Again." Billy Behan used to do the same turn in vaudeville, forty years ago.

Audience votes bring back favorite acts each week, and a choice couldn't be easy. People of this age who finally turn out to perform have learned not to falter.

Marilyn Hare, lovely daughter of yesterday's famous (Billy Jones and . . .) Ernie Hare, of "The Happiness Boys or Interwoven Pair," is exceptionally appealing as she shares hosting honors with Koplan. She lives up completely to the fact that she was born to the purple of show business.—J.P.

We View With Alarm

The precocious and occasionally really bitter chatter that pours out of the mouths of the children on KTLA's "Fantastick Studios, Ink." To us there seems nothing constructive, and certainly nothing desirable as a pattern, in the sight of a pretty little girl scowling and referring to a playmate as a "jerk," "dummy" or any one of a half dozen other disparagements. We weren't even amused. . . . The trend toward the "folksy" philosopher-type character story that seems to be showing up on the big dramatic hours. Homespun humor is great, but not as a steady diet.

Local Boy Makes Good

That "local boy makes good" theme is one always guaranteed to gladden hearts and steel resolutions.

A half dozen years ago Frederick Lee Street graduated from San Marino High School. Thus armed, he joined KRON-TV, NBC's television affiliate in San Francisco, and worked for a year or more as camera man, audio man and video control and switcher.

Today? Well, Frederick Lee Street is at present working at KRON-TV's transmitter as video and audio control. And if there is one place you can really learn what cooks with television, it is in the transmitter!

SPORTS FIGHT CONTINUES

Upon completion of coast-to-coast TV linking, ninety-five out of each 100 TV homes will be within reach of live television. It is an equally safe bet that this ninety-five per cent of TV homes are looking forward eagerly to all the sports fare they can latch onto.

What, exactly, will they be able to watch? Football, at least for this 1951-52 season, is being partially withheld from TV in a test to see whether or not TV damaged the gate. Boxing currently seems to belong to theater TV. Several factors, however, can change this picture in a hurry.

Given its way, the International Boxing Commission would install a "stadia" form of television linking the United States from one end to

another. Into these "stadia" the IBC would pipe the big fights, with a paid admission and with the IBC raking in the gate receipts.

However, the IBC is bound by contract to furnish a fight each week for "Pabst Blue Ribbon Bouts," and for the "Gillette Cavalcade of Sports" for the 1951-52 season. While Jim Norris, head of IBC, decides what matches are to be given to the cameras of both Pabst and Gillette, he can't live up to the letter of their lucrative contracts and throw only second-rate stuff to these big sponsors.

We also hear that the Anti-Trust Division of the Justice Department is quietly investigating the angles of exclusive theater-TV. Apparently a raft of protests, including several from members of Congress, poured in following the Turpin-Robinson bout, which was carried only on theater-TV, with even radio blacked out of public coverage.

But, if theater-TV constitutes a monopoly, will subscription TV in the home also constitute monopoly? This season's sports may well be over by the time any of these questions are decided.

We will still see baseball, however, at its best, when the World Series telecasts start next week to break up office and home schedules. KNBH was first slated to carry the Series, via NBC-TV countrywide. It has developed that an old Mutual-Gillette clause penned some years ago gives the Don Lee TV net the same right, so KHJ-TV will also beam the national pastime. Check our logs for the hours.

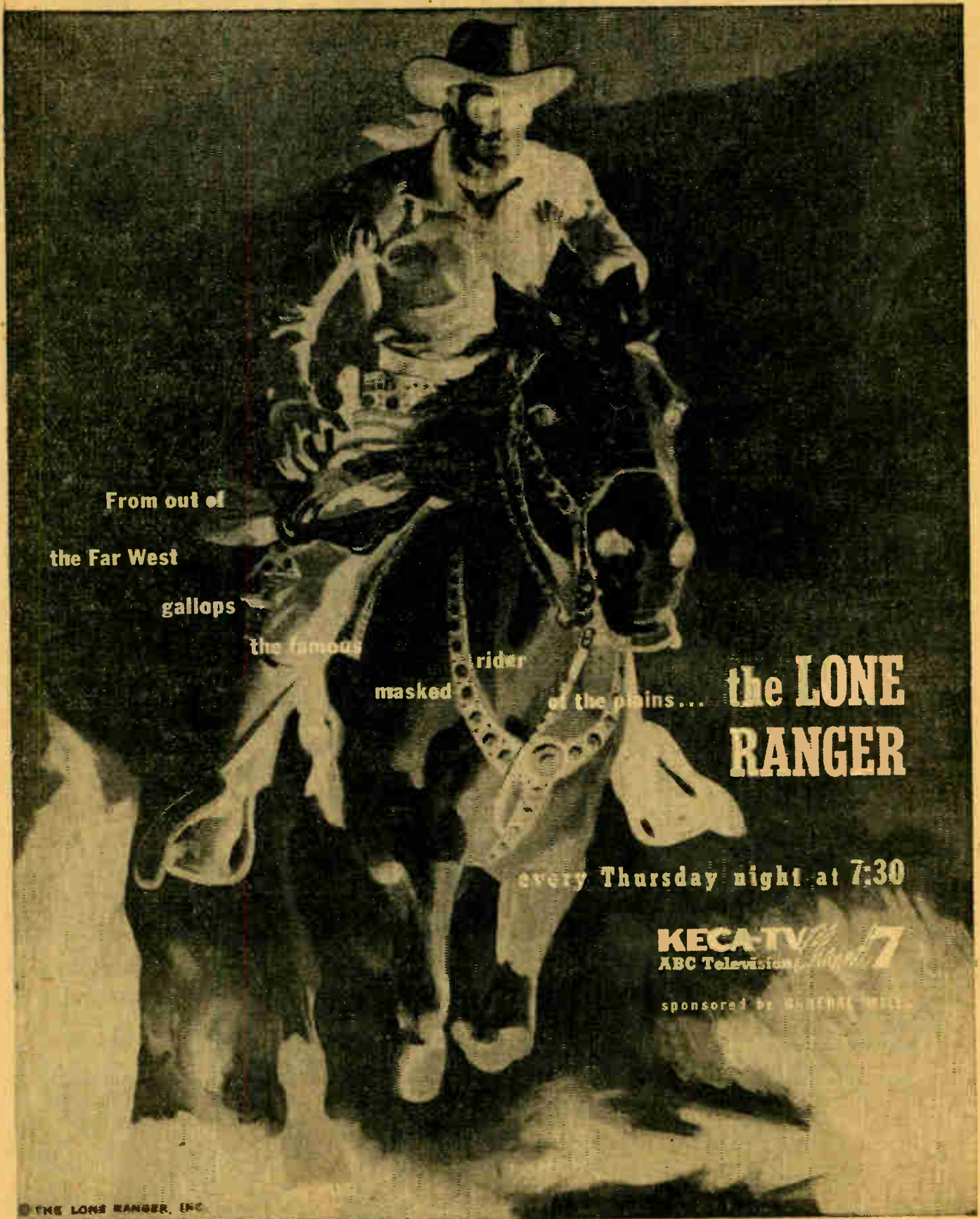

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

Jack Benny

Jack Benny bounced back to radio last week. After bending an ear to his seasonal kickoff, no one could blame him were he to stick indefinitely to radio in preference to TV. Why should he slug himself to death in front of the cameras when he can pull yaks every few seconds on the kilocycles?

Premiere, clocking start of his twentieth year on the air, displayed a beautifully integrated cast; smooth, fast pacing; excellent writing. Latter extended even to lyrics for The Sportsmen with their telling Benny they had missed him "A bushel and a peck, since we didn't get a check."

Laugh lines throughout were closely tied to summer activities of cast members. Delightful suspense was created by spacing out appearances of familiar characters—Dennis Day did not make his comedy entrance until the program was two thirds over and Phil Harris did not break in to greet Jackson with his "Well, my truly, truly fair!" until still later. A gag about Dennis getting to Hawaii without taking either boat or plane was left dangling to pay off at the end.

One of the most amusing spots was built on Jack's Korean junket and the personalities he did (didn't) meet. Another on a hand grenade which Rochester found in The Boss's suitcase drew an explanation from Benny: "It's the safest little bank in the world."

Chuckling with relief, Rochester exclaimed, "Boss, you haven't changed a bit. It's nice to have you home!"

Lots of listeners must have echoed the sentiment.—E.B.

P.S. We would like to add a word about the exhilaration of a "live" show. We had almost forgotten how exciting one can be, especially The Boss's.

"Live Like a Millionaire"

Monday through Friday, 11:30 a.m.

Theoretically, "Live Like a Millionaire" should be a flop. Here's the setup: lads and lasses who have been reared to believe that Mommy and Daddy have great unheralded talents finally get a chance to call their bluff and make them appear in public; all the contestants receive some sort of prize (what, another giveaway!); audience applause determines the winner; and only one of the three kids can return home with an unshattered faith in his parent's ability. Sounds gruesome, doesn't it?—for all concerned.

In actuality, however, this twenty-five-minute week-day program is an amusing, enjoyable, and charming (yes, that's the right word) success.

There are several reasons for this. Number one is Mr. Jack McCoy, the emcee. We are not familiar with Jack's family ties, but over the radio he sounds like an ideal Poppa. His handling of children is the answer to a psychiatrist's dream.

Youngsters, besides being funny (usually without their knowing it), are also unpredictable, to say the least. But Jack has mastered the technique of asking them the right questions, allowing them to ramble on when the audience is reacting right, and finally, and most important, cutting them off when they try to ham up or deaden the show.

The parental contributions, while not awe-inspiring,

are, on the average, listenable and relaxing. It also indicates the presence of some judicious but not too discriminatory back-stage screening.

The musical arrangements and general feeling of hilarity and zest in the studio air add immensely to the program's success.

There are but two minor objections we have to this production: First, the too-juvenile and over-dramatic advertisements (we believe that the grown-ups listen to and enjoy this show as much, if not more, than the kids); and second, the misleading and inappropriate title.

Let us not bicker though. "Live Like a Millionaire" makes for good radio. And especially because of the ear, rather than the eye-appeal qualities, it is the kind of entertainment that even television would find hard to beat.—T.H.

Although the weather may not indicate that summer is over, the return of radio's fall and winter favorites leaves no doubt that we have come into a new season. Music by the Wittnauer Choraliens has been offered to listeners for more seasons than we can count. It continues to maintain an exceptionally high standard of musical presentations.

This year's program spotlights tenor Nino Ventura in a selection of semi-classical songs and some of the better top tunes. On a recent airing he sang "When Day Is Done" and "Because." In keeping with the reopening of colleges across the country, a musical salute was also given to a group of long-time campus favorites. Commercials on this show, which concern a famous watch manufacturer's product, are given in perhaps the most pleasant and inoffensive manner of any radio commercial aired today. It's almost a pleasure to give attention to them.

NBC's frothy zany comedy starring Walter Brennan as "Gramps Vanderhof" continues to shape up as pleasant listening. Sandwiched between the lighthearted lines are solid chunks of sageness and calm philosophy which add slick impact to "You Can't Take It With You."

Last week's story line dealt with the finagling of the "Kirbys" to lure away the "Sycamore" maid, "Rheba." Though "Rheba" hadn't been paid for years, she decided to remain with the lovable but unpredictable "Sycamores," whereupon "Gramps" promptly gave her a raise. The subsequent maneuvering of the hungry (fed-up-ontuna) "Kirbys" to eke a dinner invitation from the "Sycamores" created an amusing sequence. This was followed by "Tony Kirby's" attempts next day at lunch-time to wheedle a bit of "Alice Sycamore's" meat-loaf sandwich and his resultant bid to dinner, at which "Tony" remarked: "I hope my folks won't smell pot roast on my breath!"

Other bits of crazy business dealing with "Mr. Sycamore's" Fourth of July rocket and "Gramps" trying to teach "Mrs. Kirby" how to cook followed the same pithily amusing trend. Plot resolved when the mess which "Mrs. Kirby" concocted was labeled by "Gramps" "the great American dish, hash."

With the disadvantage of a loosely coordinated script entitled "Neal Cream, Doctor of Poison," Laughton certainly must have disappointed a vast number of fans who believe he can do no wrong dramatically. In comparison with past Laughton performances, we thought his timing was off, his delivery not up to his best and his approach to the role was far less keen than could be expected from a Charles Laughton.

Suspense, drama, and history—that's the triple-threat combination "Mr. President" tries to utilize in order to score a success.

Starring Edward Arnold, these "true human stories about men who have lived in the White House" give clues in the whodunit detective style. At the end of a half hour, Mr. Arnold finally confesses who he is.

For example, here are some of the hints we picked up one night:

As the play opens Mr. Arnold is the vice-president. (Theodore Roosevelt?)

A presidential election has just been completed. Although he has won the popular vote, the electoral college did not reach a majority and the House of Representatives is about to elect a President. (Andrew Jackson, maybe, in 1824?)

His best friends, in the play, are Mr. and Mrs. Smith. (A big help!)

He is having a feud with Aaron Burr. (Alexander Hamilton? No, poor Alex never did become top dog.)

He has a daughter named Martha. (George of cherry-orchard fame? No, that was his wife.)

He is described as a "godless man." (Andrew Johnson?)

Finally, at the end of program when the House elects him, "Mr. President" says he wants to be remembered most as Father of the University of Virginia and the author of the Declaration of Independence. (At last: Thomas Jefferson.)

Actually, the facts were more detailed than this, but the dramatization was nearly as boring as the above reading. Also, many a learned professor must squirm when he hears the minor historical errors of omission and commission which are made on the program.

In all fairness, however, the novelty of the idea and the reputation and ability of Mr. Arnold combine to postpone the radio assassination of "Mr. President" for many terms to come.—T. H.

Eddie Cantor is supposed to kick off the West-to-East transmission from here on Sunday, September 30, when he stars on NBC-TV's "Colgate Comedy Hour."

OUTSIDE, THE THEATER HAS been painted the well-known "NBC green." Inside, close to \$1,000,000 has been spent. Seats have been removed from the left-rear main floor to make way for a huge control room and relay setup. The orchestra pit has been covered and a long runway for cameras has been erected from front-center stage out into the middle of the auditorium. Shorter camera runways extend on both sides of the stage.

YET TO BE PLACED WHEN I MADE my visit were banks of lights, a giant TV monitor set, control board. But when settled, El Capitan will make a wonderful home for Cantor and his colleagues.

HOWARD ROSS, CASTING DIRECTOR, was looking over the situation and graciously stopped to chat about the talent to appear on this series. According to him, there are presently not many variety acts headquartering in Los Angeles. The westward move of Cantor and other personalities may prove a great drawing card for artists. Ross said he had found local agents most cooperative in suggesting variety acts. Having been in the business for many years, he is acquainted with practically every performance, and this is fortunate, for he refuses to put on anything with which he is not fully familiar.

THE THEATER USED to seat about 1150. Due to chunks of space taken for master control and stage enlargement it will now hold 300 fewer. Ticket requests for Cantor's first show have already shown signs of going out of bounds. NBC has also spent much moola on face-lifting radio Studio D for TV. From here Skelton will do his TV show a couple of hours after Banjo Eyes vacates the premiere spot. Yea, verily, the jert will be jumpin'.

HAD A NICE PHONE CALL from singer Bob Graham, who wanted to acknowledge my little squib mentioning his fine performances on this season's "Fiesta." My apologies to producer Les Farber for not making it all summer to the broadcast—had a standing invitation to see the program from the studio, but listened in the car or on the sun deck because I was always too busy or too tired to trek to Columbia Square. Sorry to have the series bow off, for it has been most enjoyable. Bob told me he had signed at Twentieth Century-Fox and will play in the Eva Tanguay film. But his movie contract forbids TV.

RALPH EDWARDS IS STILL in New York trying to clear TV time for his "This Is Your Life." It won't seem like a legitimate year in radio or video if he doesn't connect with a sponsor and time slot. Understand he himself wants to do "Life" and let another emcee take over "Truth or Consequences."

We had a jolly visit over our snacks and I learned that Phil has just polished off an assignment coordinating sixty-five minutes of priceless radio flashbacks to be used as part of the NBC Silver Anniversary celebration coming up soon.

WENT TO MY FIRST MOVIE IN ages and was I mad! At 7:00 p.m. the main feature had already been on an hour! Won't they ever learn—even after the jolt TV has given 'em?

JAZZ keynotes this week's disc parade with some very exciting examples of this much debated art, and heading the list on Brunswick LP is Volume Three of "Red Nichols Classics"—eight reissued waxings of the late Twenties when sidemen like Mole, Teagarden, Miller, Dorsey, Rollini, Krupa, Venuti, Goodman and others were listed as Red's Five Pennies. Included are "Chinatown," "Bugle Call," "Sandman," and others played in the great tradition, remarkable sides of a remarkable era. . . . Same label also features an LP edition of versatile veteran keyboardist **Jess Stacy**. Here are exceptionally fine stylings of "Fascinating Rhythm," "I Want to Be Happy," "Indiana" and others which lend themselves admirably and memorably to Stacy's magic touch. . . . **Bob Crosby** (Coral) features many of his original Bob Cats in the LP collection "St. Louis Blues," which means famous W. C. Handy tunes played in the favorite big-band Dixieland style—"St. Louis," "Memphis," "Yellow Dog," "Beale Street," "Joe Turner," and "Aunt Hagar," in new waxings, but still the fine, happy jazz of the late Thirties when the Bob Cats were younger. . . . **Woody Herman** (MGM) leads his band in a close return to the style that he made famous—a great instrumental with solid beat, "Hollywood Blues," and the novelty vocal featuring the old Woodchopper himself, "Pass the Basket," both down-to-earth dance discings without the fancy trimmings. . . . **Bob Sands** (Capitol) makes his record debut with "Love of a Gypsy" and "When the World Was Young." This new Waring discovery is the possessor of a strong, dramatic voice that offers plenty of promise, if his initial platter is any criterion. . . . **Bing Crosby** (Decca), with beautiful arrangements featuring choral assists, has firsts on tunes "Loneliness of the Evening" and "I Will Remember You." Both represent top non-commercial material in relaxed Crosby manner. **Helen O'Connell** (Capitol) features a solo version of "Green Eyes," one of her best JD-days hits. It's a dual-tempo'd waxing as then, the trade mark of O'Connell with her "cool and limpid" style at its best. . . . **Gordon Jenkins** (Decca) orchestra and choral arrangement of standards "Whispering" and "Song of the Bayou" hits the bell in the usual Finger fashion—lush strings, velvet rhythm and brilliant waxings . . . Lloyd Nolan, "Veteran Detective," Becomes
A Cross-Country Commuter for His Role as

The New "MARTIN KANE"

GHE ART of natural casting was most aptly demonstrated when Lloyd Nolan, one of filmdom's finest actors, inherited the gumshoes and pipe of "Martin Kane, Private Eye" from his good friend Bill Gargan.

Gargan, who is currently devoting most of his energies to the production side of video and radio, could not have given "Martin Kane's" future into more capable hands than Nolan's. If any one actor knows how to portray a detective, it's the personable gray-haired Nolan, who had some twenty-five right-side-of-the-law portrayals to his credit before he set foot in "Martin Kane's" domain.

In fact, Nolan is so closely associated with badge-carrying movie characterizations that his return to the stage this year in the Broadway production of "Courtin' Time" was considered a radical departure. However, it was his theatrical and Broadway background that actually led to Nolan's first film work.

A native of San Francisco, Nolan is among the legion of aspiring actors who have had to leave film-land to crash it. He attended Santa Clara prep school and Stanford University, where he took his first steps in his chosen career. After graduating from college he joined the Pasadena Community Theater, where his first break came through a part in Edward Everett Horton's starring play "The Queen's Husband." From there he went into the road company of "Front Page," filling a minor role and understudying the part of the lead, Roger Pryor.

Stage Starrings

When "Front Page" returned to New York, Nolan went along, to launch his stage career in earnest. His first efforts brought him not only professional success but real-life romance in the bargain. While playing the part of an office boy in the Broadway production "Sweet Stranger," he met and fell in love with Mell Efid, who was cast as the

stenographer. When the show closed they were married.

The following season his career hopes were realized when, as a result of his work in the forty-three-week Broadway run of "One Sunday Afternoon," he was tested by Paramount and brought to Hollywood.

That was in 1934, and since that time Nolan has been one of Hollywood's staunchest character actors. This year, with seventy-five pictures to his credit, Nolan decided to have another fling at the glitter and grease paint of Broadway. The "fling" was his highly successful role in "Courtin' Time."

Detective by Choice

When Bill Gargan asked Nolan to become the new "Martin Kane," Nolan eagerly accepted the opportunity to "branch out." While he has made numerous appearances in both radio and television, the new venture marks his debut as a star of a series in either medium. His reactions to the work are highly unusual.

"Frankly, radio still gives me mike fright, but, I suppose because of my work on both stage and screen, I do feel more at home in front of the video camera. Luckily, I'm aided in both mediums by the fact that 'Martin Kane' is the kind of quiet, calculating character that I genuinely love to play," he said.

Nolan does admit to having a yen

to "just step to the other side of the law and play a real 'heavy.' You never forget a really good heavy."

But he's more than pleased with portraying the novel type of detective that is "Martin Kane," and is emphatically intrigued with the common-sense attributes of the character.

Nolan's new role is a long-distance maneuver. "Martin Kane" solves his "capers" in New York, and the Nolan family is so well rooted in California that Lloyd has become a Broadway-to-Brentwood commuter, and makes the trip home on the average of once every six weeks.

Outdoor Life

The Nolans enjoy the outdoor existence possible in California particularly since they installed their first swimming pool this year, much to the joy of eleven-year-old Melinda Joyce and Jay Benedict, eight. A loyal native son, Lloyd refuses to give up California sunshine, "even if I can only manage a once-in-six-weeks tan."

While he is in the East, Nolan finds that his "Martin Kane" adventuring takes up most of his time, precluding other acting ventures. In his "spare" hours, he catches up on his science-fiction, reading of the genuinely scientific order, and also tries his hand at creative writing.

"And I take an enjoyable busman's holiday, reading mysteries!"

Are Soap Operas Necessary?

a baby we were deluged with gifts, and when 'Papa David' had a heart attack scores of letters admonished us not to let him die. Listeners realize, in one respect, that the characters are just that, and yet, in another sense, the personalities of these fictional people have become so dear to their audience that the actor himself actually comes to represent the embodiment of the character."

Les Tremayne has many an anecdote demonstrating this strange phenomenon. He believes one vital reason for the popularity of soap operas is that they serve to inflate the egos of the women listeners.

"In serials, the long-suffering heroine who is subject to the whims of unfeeling males offers the housewife a kind of vicarious outlet for her own frustrations. When I portrayed 'Bob,' of the early serial 'Betty and Bob,'" Tremayne recalls, "an almost incredible incident occurred, which aptly demonstrates my theory."

"A crowd of angry women visited the NBC studios and demanded that I ('Bob') leave the 'other woman' in the current script and go back to 'Betty,' who was in the hospital having 'our child.' They were actually

IN EVERY part of the country, every week day, harassed housewives lay aside their own troubles to tune in on someone else's problems. As they dial the latest adventures of their radio acquaintances, they dial out the real-life world of woe around them. According to experts on the art of broadcast-type heart-jerking, women will continue to take this form of daily escape just so long as there is nothing else more satisfying.

During their several years of acting in major serials, Alice Reinheart and Les Tremayne, the real-life husband-and-wife team who long

ago were dubbed "king and queen of soap opera," have developed some interesting theories on the lasting qualities of daytime dramas.

As Miss Reinheart explains, "Hearing someone else's troubles lightens the listener's own and also keeps housework from becoming too depressing a task."

Throughout the ten years and four months that she enacted the role of "Chichi" on "Life Can Be Beautiful," Alice was constantly amazed at the paradoxical evidences of how devoted listeners were.

Suspension of Disbelief

"When 'Chichi' was going to have

intelligent people, but they had become so engrossed in living the story that for the time they had suspended reality."

The two stars are in agreement that daytime drama offers one of the most practical ways of learning to know people, and therefore has a really vital part in our American culture.

Homemakers' Help

Patsy Campbell, another veteran of the sudser who has played the title role in "The Second Mrs. Burton" for over seven years, is also emphatic about the place of the serial in the American pattern of life.

"Although these serials do not perform a public service in the popular sense of documentary drama, I believe they make the life of a housewife easier, and the housewife is a pretty important cog in this civilization of ours.

"People belittle our daytime dramas because they have become a standard joke. However, I have met many intelligent people who say that when they have been at home for a week or so and gotten into the habit of listening to daytime radio they frankly admit surprise at the quality of acting, production and writing and willingly agree that serials offer valuable relaxation."

Official surveys convincingly support the theories of these actors. A poll taken among typical groups of listeners in all parts of the country reveals that the two most important reasons women give for listening to serials are: "They are true to life, like me and my family," or "They are like people I know and are lessons in living."

Psychological Approach

Experts behind the presentation of daytime dramas have developed an over-all pattern for successful radio serializing that definitely takes the listener angle into consideration.

Many producers employ psychologists to aid them in developing story lines which will conform to the norm of experience and incident. Ability of women listeners to project themselves into situations that are varied and exciting enough to hold audience interest and yet situations which follow the pattern of an average woman's psychological conditioning are among the criteria making for successful sudser.

Characters in serials are kept to a few so that listeners can become well acquainted with their personalities and be able to pick them up at intervals without losing continuity. Action is always limited to happenings familiar to the consciousness of listeners.

Knowing only these few basic concepts gives but an inkling of the hard work that goes into these "soapers."

Many actors, like Miss Reinheart and Mr. Tremayne, believe that television will never replace the daily dial habit. They point out that one of the sustaining features of the serials is that the housewife can do her dishes and keep in tune with "Nora Drake," or dust the living room and catch up with "Wendy Warren and the News," and cook dinner while finding out what happens "When a Girl Marries."

TV "Sudser"

However, "The First Hundred Years," television's first five-a-week daytime drama, is giving doubters cause for argument. Not yet a year old, it is setting an important and successful precedent in video serial fare.

From all current surveys it can be concluded that daytime serials are as much in vogue as ever and that they are, as one psychologist pointed out, "just about the greatest molders of attitudes, beliefs, ideas, convictions and behavior of women that we have in our society. They are America's most powerful educational institution."



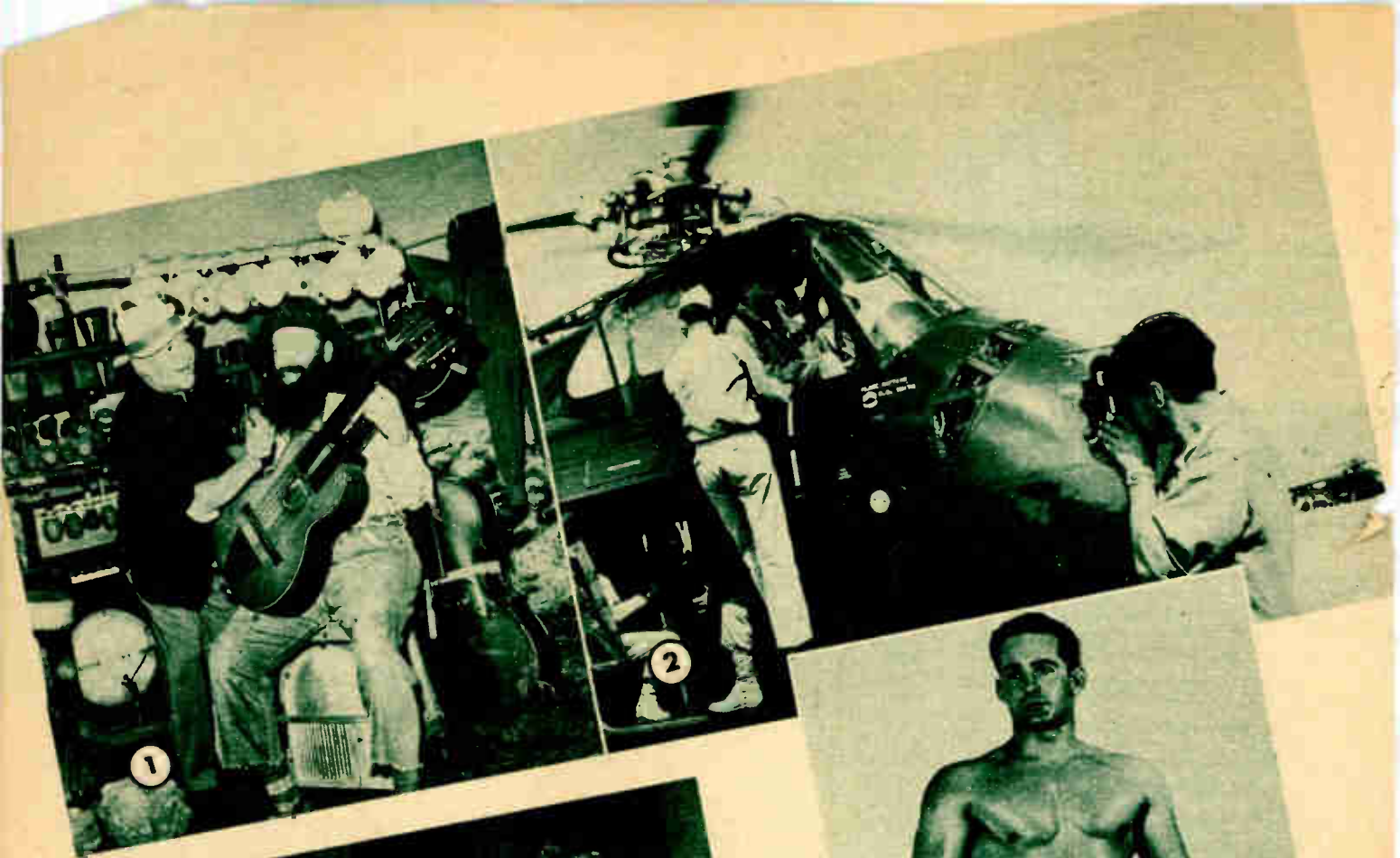

GORDON MacRAE showed his versatility of roles this summer on his NBC show, "The Railroad Hour," when he sang and acted his way through one of the musical show's most successful seasons.

Fans heard him as the Mighty Sultan Shariar, a clown in a circus, a gold miner, the hero of a famous Irish legend, Marco Polo, Rip Van Winkle, W. S. Gilbert of the famous Gilbert and Sullivan team, Mark Twain, and Emperor Norton of San Francisco. Charming young soprano Dorothy Warenskjold was his leading lady in each of these portrayals.

The entire idea was that of two of Hollywood and New York's youngest and most successful writers—Lawrence and Lee. The two have scripted many Railroad Hours before and regularly write for such shows as "The Halls of Ivy."

As Gordon himself explained it, "These two talented writers gave listeners music which had never before been lyricized—and gave me some of the most exciting roles I have ever played."

Story-wise Lawrence and Lee followed another tradition, the tradition of taking a famous story and giving it a musical and lyrical treatment, as Rodgers and Hammerstein have done. But Lawrence and Lee have gone one step farther. For instance, there has always been a "Casey at the Bat" poem, but never a story about Casey, or about *why* Casey struck out. This, in music form, became a new, nostalgic American musical comedy when it was presented on the "Railroad Hour."

FAMED CIRCUS MUSIC was the vehicle for Lawrence and Lee's story "Laughmaker," for which Gordon took his role in a serious vein. Cast as the famous clown "Rocco," the talented baritone faced romantic complications in rivals for his love of "Angelique," a beautiful bareback rider, portrayed by Dorothy Warenskjold.
