"Washington Spotlight"

Controversial Political Issues Provide Provocative Viewing With Marquis Childs at the Helm

THE SPOTLIGHT has been on Washington more acutely of late than it has been for a long time. Undoubtedly, with the coming elections, it will continue to be a focal point. Television's role in national affairs is becoming increasingly important, and CBS's "Washington Spotlight" is on the scene, bringing news and views on controversial issues to video audiences.

Veteran newsman Marquis Childs is its competent moderator. Each week a new topic is discussed by the man on the street and by prominent public officials. Childs briefly interviews passersby in front of the nation's Capitol. Their frank, unrehearsed replies to such questions as "What do you think of the graft in our government?" "Are Congressional investigations being overdone?" and "What are the chances for peace?" reflect a cross-section of opinions on timely topics. Leaving the man on the street, a far from common practice, the program continues in CBS's television studios, where Mr. Childs discusses the issue at hand with two prominent figures, each representing opposing views. Senators, Congressmen, Pentagon bigwigs and other Washington Top Brass are on "Spotlight's" agenda. The uninitiated will make their TV bow, but for "seasoned performers" such as Senators Kefauver and Taft the camera will have that old familiar look.

After watching a few "Washington Spotlight" shows you may stop and ask yourself the same incredulous question we did. "Are those the men we voted into office . . . without 'real' knowledge of their capabilities?" Indubitably the majority of yeas would be overwhelming. After seeing some of our none-too-impressive elected officials on TV we begin to realize that we are paying for our negligence, and wonder whether we are not guiltier than they. This is the season

for ineffectual campaign promises; let's not be misled by these promises.

Marquis Childs has a difficult task keeping his program moving along at a smooth clip when he's confronted by bullheaded opposition on political issues, but that's what makes his program so interesting.

From the time Childs was thirteen years old his number-one ambition in life was to be a newspaper man. He claims it couldn't have been parental influence because his father was a lawyer and all his forebears from his grandfather back had been farmers. Marquis Childs was born in the Mississippi River town of Clinton, Iowa, but as a newspaper man he has made seven fruitful Atlantic crossings.

Childs was an English professor,

worked for the wire services and wrote for the St. Louis Dispatch and other papers before beginning his syndicated column, "Washington Calling." In between times this brilliant reporter wrote several non-fiction best-sellers. After careful personal observations and study, Marquis Childs wrote a series of articles critically appraising Mexico's social and economic workings. His articles, accenting oil expropriations, led to Senatorial investigations of several prominent Senators. Childs was roundly denounced on the Senate floor by the affected legislators. However, he sued for and won a full apology from all concerned.

Childs's modest demeanor and soft speech shield a tower of intellect, so necessary to objectively moderate the highly controversial "Washington Spotlight."

JUST BEFORE Christmas of 1951, Johnny Grant liberated himself from three weeks of lucrative work at both the Hollywood Palladium and radio station KMPC, and boarded an Air Force Constellation which carried him over thirty-six hours and thousands of miles. Johnny was Korea-bound, with twenty other stars and entertainers, on a tour arranged by Irving Lande and Stan Richardson of the Hollywood Coordinating Committee for the USO.

Different Entertainment

Upon his return, more than one of his turkey-stuffed and present-laden Hollywood friends asked the busy disc jockey-emcee, "What can a disc jockey possibly do to entertain in Korea?"

Johnny's offhand answer was usually, "Oh, just talk to the fellows."

There are a couple of other things a disc jockey can do to bring Christmas to the Korean combatants that this visitor to the war front *did* do. He can lug with him enough tape, at his own expense, to record more than two hundred personal interviews with the fellows. These tapes Johnny brought home and played on the air, careful always to give advance notice of the day and hour to the families of the interviewees.

He can also, when his particular entertainment bit is over, go down into the snow and bitter cold off-stage, and get the names and home addresses of as many fellows as time allows before a jeep, ambulance,

helicopter or L-5 whisks him on to the next performance point. These, too, he can bring home and use to make it Christmas all over again for the servicemen's families.

In the month and a half after his return, Grant called more than 700 delighted families with messages from their sons, husbands or fathers. He explained how the fellows looked, what they ate and how they felt—all things tremendously important to a mother or wife.

Jokes in Church

Or the disc jockey in Korea can go with the chaplain to the front lines, where a whole troupe wouldn't be allowed. Here he can entertain them in a church, using the same jokes that have fallen from his lips while he was on the Palladium bandstand or in front of a studio mike. And from the chaplain, Mason E. Bondurant, who realized that a word of cheer, a bit about home and a laugh or two is as important as a message of faith, came a complete blessing and thanks for the light-hearted fun.

Johnny says the sight of a group

of bearded, tired, front-line combatants lined up in a tent-church passing out hymn books so they could sing the old songs spoiled a lot of other music for him.

Too, if a disc jockey travels far enough in fifteen- and twenty-below-zero cold, visits enough hospitals, units and camps, and adds what he can to a morale he describes as "already pretty terrific," he can win for his unit of entertainers a Field Citation from General James A. Van Fleet.

Would If He Could

It isn't easy to get Grant to tell these things. When we, too, first asked about the Christmas tour that brought Christmas back to the States for a huge number of families, Johnny just glanced at his plate of Brown Derby food and evaded us: "Well, I want everyone to know the boys in Korea are eating well. The show's great—better than we have right now—and this is some eating!"

But it isn't the food in Korea that prompts Johnny Grant to add . . . "I'd give up everything I've worked for twelve years to get if somehow I could make enough money to just support myself, so that I could go back to Korea and stay there, entertaining."

Does TV Make Better Family Relations?

Dr. Popenoe Says Yes and Tells Why

problems viewed on TV are duplicated by numerous families watching at home. "On one occasion," said Dr. Popenoe, "while dining in a restaurant I was greeted by a stranger who informed me that I had indirectly helped solve his family's problems. He said, 'Hello, Dr. Popenoe, so glad to meet you. You have no idea how much your television program has helped us at home. You see, our teen-ager daughters were resentful because they felt they were over-disciplined. But after watching some unfortunate teen-age problems on your telecast they changed their opinions and admitted that they haven't been treated so badly.'"

Dr. Popenoe's sunny office reflected his sunny disposition as he answered endless questions in his delightfully loquacious manner. His mind is like an active filing system. Ask one question and cases and examples spill like a waterfall. The doctor knows whereof he speaks, for in addition to his professional training he has had a happy family life for thirty-two years, and has four well-adjusted grown sons.

During our interview he cited a rather amazing statistic. For every 100 marriage licenses issued in this county there are 90 divorce and annulment suits filed. The fact that lots of people on the divorce side of the equation are repeaters doesn't seem to lessen the seriousness of this problem. Dr. Popenoe and the Institute of Family Relations (a non-profit national organization) are willing to help those with marital and domestic problems if the individuals are willing to try re-education and to grow emotionally mature.

THERE'S NO DOUBT about it—better family relations are aided and abetted by television. Dr. Paul Popenoe, moderator of KECA-TV's "Institute of Family Relations," candidly remarks, "The response to my local TV program is proportionately greater than it is to my nationally syndicated newspaper column. The sincerity of our endeavors to resolve marital problems inspires confidence in our viewers.

"The individuals appearing on our telecast are selected on only one basis . . . their self-control. They willingly submit to the Johnson Temperament Test, and after careful screening those with the highest degree of emotional control are selected to appear. This procedure enables us to keep the telecasts free from hysteria." Following are some sample questions gleaned from the 184 questions which appear on the Johnson Test.

1. Do you often feel sad because of some inferiority characteristics?
2. Can you get along with children of various ages without becoming irritated by them?
3. Are you opposed to the parole system for criminals?

Dr. Popenoe produced two TV case histories for our perusal. Both of them had happy endings. One couple had agreed to a childless marriage. All was fine until the wife learned that she was anticipating. Her husband remained firm in his resolution, regardless of his role in the expected parenthood. Their marriage was at the breaking point when the couple appeared on the telecast. Initial counseling on the program was the beginning of a better understanding, leading to eventual reconciliation. Today, they are both proud parents of a bouncing boy.

The other case involved a jealous husband. This trait, usually identified with the weaker sex, is characteristic of emotional immaturity. The wife flirted; the husband created scenes. As in most maladjustments there was more than one cause for their friction. After careful probing and re-education the couple mended their ways, and peace and harmony now reigns. (Of course problems aren't solved by a single TV appearance before a panel of counselors. The average case requires at least four weekly consultations at the Institute of Family Relations headquarters.

It is not uncommon to find that

2000 New TV Stations

This week may see the long-planned lifting of the TV "freeze" which has lasted three and a half years. During these years the FCC (Federal Communications Commission), that body in charge of all communications mediums and their allocation to companies and individuals, has been combing reports and applications in an effort to most fairly distribute the channels not already in use.

It is expected that approximately 530 commercial high-frequency channels, such as we have now, and including the existing 108 stations in operation, will be provided. That means four times as many commercial TV outlets over which the big sponsored shows, movies, and the fare we now enjoy will be in use. Probably the hinterlands will get a good share of these, so the non-viewing populace can have signals in their areas.

There are probably also to be 230 educational stations. The FCC doesn't say just who will maintain or run these—whether it will be government or school. The Commission has a report coming out on this educational-channel set-up, which we in turn will quote to our readers.

Los Angeles is one of the cities that will have educational stations. Los Angeles' new channel is to be an ultra-high-frequency lane which is above the regular channels now in use.

But even such huge TV-less spots as Portland, Oregon, and Denver, Colorado, don't expect a station to go up tomorrow. The freeze is off, but now the applications must be handled on a channel-by-channel basis, permits must be granted, and then the material must be okayed and obtained.

One of the most interesting aspects of the freeze-lift is the fact that the FCC decided to reserve high channels in some fifty cities despite protests by commercial applicants in some areas. This obviously reflects the commission's dissatisfaction with much of the TV programming now on. The hope must be that the educators will, on their educational channels, provide better TV entertainment.

It's going to be equally interesting to see where the educational stations get the money to train people, hire them, and put on good shows with an educational value. Right now the TV stations in operation are devoting two or more hours per week to educational and religious programming—and getting up good shows on free time isn't easy for even the commercial stations with plenty of know-how. Or maybe the Government plans on running these educational stations.

"The Thin Blue Line"

As an opener of this new show, a fine film clip showing dozens of policemen marching to music, with the title superimposed, is run by the viewer's eyes. It's exciting. But following it with academic delineations of police-department duties for fifteen minutes is a letdown.

While the seven gentlemen who head our police force departments, as well as Chief William Parker, handled themselves and the respective outlines of their departments nicely, the public is never as interested in her servants and their capabilities as she is interested in the sock, controversial stuff that goes on. Unfortunate, but true.

And the police department has plenty of sock, controversial stuff on tap right now. The much-articled police-brutality case of last Christmas was finally discussed by Chief Parker himself, who is an alive, interesting man on TV. To us he seemed outspoken and fair, and a chance for the police to have their say-so has a very real place. He touched on the police budget in an equally frank manner.

This new public-service feature,

which is attempting to show that the police force of our city forms a thin blue line between the lawless and the law-abiding, can prove a constructive half hour. The citizen who harbors a fear that any brush with the cops will get him a kick in the face is of no help to the police, to himself in time of danger, nor to his community when there is anything harmful to that community that should be brought to police attention.—J.P.

Alibi and Monica have too much talent on tap for this sort of thing. And the show idea can be a fresh, wholesome thing for under-age watching—if it becomes a show.—J.P.

copies of a long-since-defunct magazine known as "Radio Doings," a Los Angeles publication of a quarter of a century ago. One issue, published twenty-four years ago, has a diagram with instructions on how to build a "complete television receiver," and a news story that asks local owners of TV sets to help station KGFJ in the initial tests of its television transmitter!

The article written by Ormiston, by the way, says: "We are not suggesting that our local experimenters generally attempt this WGY reception, because it takes a lot of expensive apparatus. The complete equipment runs around \$400, so you can readily see that the average enthusiast had better wait for local broadcasting for his first image."

It still costs around \$400, but that isn't the big money today it was then!

Breaking the Ice

Bernard Girard, who is the producer-director of one of TV's most successful film series (ABC-TV's "Rebound," seen Fridays at 9:00 p.m. on Channel 7), cliches the secret to success: "Once you crack the initial ice," the thirty-three-year-old states, "the rest isn't so difficult."

Long ago he sold radio station KGER in Long Beach a free radio show and persuaded all his friends to work on the program with him—this before the days of the radio performer's union.

The show turned out well. He sold a Los Angeles station, this time getting a bit of money. That was the first "ice" cracked.

Today Girard himself writes many of the teleplays seen on the "Rebound" series, each of which features a unique surprise ending, in the famed O. Henry short-story style.

Girard explains other facets of the success of the series, too: "We believe in anti-type-casting, so that the viewer won't guess the outcome of our plots.

The unseen Sam came into being as the result of a comedy of errors within a comedy . . . a sort of television-type version of one of Mr. Shakespeare's involved plots within plots. It was a joke that played its own joke. Each week his invisible personality develops new no-talents. He is such a natural, uncomplaining fall guy that Skelton is becoming fonder of him as the weeks go by . . . and padding his part.

And Sam Martella, the real prop man, may be the only man in show business who takes second billing to his own alter ego.

Here's a Handy Hint to prevent extension cords from becoming disconnected. Clamp the cords together with wooden blocks; just use a screw to hold the blocks together. INTERESTING NEWS ITEM THIS last week centered around remarks of Dr. Jay B. Nash, Professor of Education at New York University, who lit into TV because he feels it is a passive pleasure. The Professor claimed that a recent survey (I don't believe he said whose or how large) showed that children spend thirty minutes more a week watching TV than they do in school. "They should be learning skills, skills, skills," the Prof said, adding that he was especially concerned with how the rising generation, growing without know-how in skills, would occupy itself in retirement.

THIS WEEK'S NATURAL SEVEN: Louis Armstrong's "Indian Love Call" (Decca), Bob Crosby Bobcats' "Goody Goody" (Capitol), Doris Day-Guy Mitchell's "Little Kiss Goodnight" (Columbia), Connie Haines' "It's So-Long and Good-bye" (Coral), Frankie Laine's "That's How it Goes" (Columbia), Wingy Manone's "Awful Waffle Man" (Coral), and Clyde McCoy's "Hell's Bells" (Capitol).

The Ames Brothers (Coral), not content with being able to handle the hottest and sweetest tunes, this time come up with "Favorite Spirituals," an eight-sided album that should add to the boys' popularity. video screen, is asking for a 25 percent increase in the salary NBC pays him. . . . The rumor is pretty strong that unless Korla Pandit, Roscoe Ates and Nancy Wible grab sponsors, they'll fade from the KECA-TV screen May 2. I can't understand why programs like these can't get bankrollers, especially the limpid-eyed organ player. From the looks of the mail coming into the TV-Radio Life office, Korla's fans, who seem to be legion, would go out and buy baling wire by the ton if he recommended it. . . . While convalescing from a stroke, Haven MacQuarrie is occupying himself with an anecdotal history of Hollywood radio. . . . Welcome back to TV-Radio Row is publicist Carol Davis, working again with Hal Bock (Foladare, Greer and Bock), her former boss in NBC Hollywood Press Dept. . . . See where the Appellate Division of Brooklyn Courts upheld a tenant's right to a TV serial. Hasten the day, however, when no more aerials will be needed to get perfect reception. Radio made the grade in this respect, so why shouldn't TV? The antennaless day not having arrived, however, I'm having to make provisions in the Hollywood Hills home I am building. Scottie Gray, who authored the meaty articles for TV-Radio Life last fall ("You Can Have Perfect TV Reception"), sent one of his men out just before the button-board was put on my walls, so at least, with concealed lead-in wire, my TV paraphernalia won't be too conspicuous.

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

Are You an Average Listener?

The latest survey (and you don't have to pay any attention to it if you don't believe in surveys) has come up with a profile of the average daytime radio listener. How close does it come to being a picture of your family?

After taking 8000 samples the survey found that the average daytime dialer is a married woman between thirty and forty years old who has been wed for eleven years to a factory worker. This typical family's income is between \$3,683 and \$5,542 annually and includes two kids, a boy and a girl, aged eight and five. The family own their own home, which is valued at \$7,500, but they have a mortgage to worry about. The lady is interested mainly in her children and her home, although national and local affairs interest her more often than in the past. She reads a local newspaper, subscribes to one magazine such as a home, garden or fashion publication, and occasionally buys a fiction or picture magazine. She reads but one book a year and her favorite literature is a light romance. She doesn't like stories with a sad ending.

The average daytime feminine listener is a high-school graduate who doesn't speak any foreign language, has visited New York City once, would hate to live there and would like to see the West. She doesn't discuss world affairs very much with her husband, but she is concerned about his health and job. She has three intimate women friends, but isn't a member of a social club. Her health is good, but she's worried about the kids and the future. The family eats well, she buys about four dresses a year, wears little make-up and has one permanent wave a year. If she likes audience-participation shows, chances are she doesn't go for soap operas. She would like to be a participationeer, but is scared, and prefers male emcees who are sympathetic, down-to-earth, rather than smooth. She is not very sophisticated, considers most show people as probably immoral, and objects to swearing and excessive display of sex.

Radio Budgets Cut

Radio is showing concrete signs of feeling the pinch which started when TV moved in as a full-sized competitive medium. Jack Benny is set to be on radio next season, but with a budget trimmed from the current \$26,000 to \$18,000. Amos 'n' Andy are reported to be scheduled for the airwaves next season, but talks are going on now regarding lower program costs. Benny is reported to have taken a cut in salary for his air show, with similar reports being made for both Hope and Crosby for next season's broadcasts.

Every day these six Western song men blend fun and music in a casual manner that is not equaled by any other such aggregation. They are assisted admirably by vocalist Betty Taylor, accordionist Frank Messina, and announcer George Putnam. It's the kind of show that is as much fun to listen to as it is for the group to put on.

There's Lloyd Perryman, who usually introduces many of the numbers, when he isn't busy singing or strumming his guitar. For comedy, as well as double-bass fiddle and a unique rendering of an otherwise beautiful tune, is Shug Fisher. Two brothers, Hugh and Karl Farr, are also in the Western session with music and song. Those inimitable vocal arrangements are usually done by either Ken Curtis or Tomy Doss on the vocals.

The "Sons of the Pioneers" theme, "Tumbling Tumbleweeds," always opens the air show. Although this tune has been heard hundreds of times by listeners it always sounds great. It is a Western classic created by a member of the original "Sons of the Pioneers."

Each air show features two gifts, an acre of land and a Bible, which are presented to deserving people who write in to the famous "Sons." The acre of land goes to the person doing a good deed.

Don't hesitate to tune in the "Aristocrats of the Range" if you are not a hillbilly fan, because the "Sons" are not a hillbilly group. They are the best of the Western boys, who frequently treat a pop tune just as smoothly as any of the most popular vocalists of today.

"Lucky U Ranch" is the kind of show you enjoy for more than its high caliber of music. It's one of those truly friendly radio shows.—A.G.

Shudt, ex-ace driver and outstanding harness-race caller who handles the meets for the Western Harness Racing Association.

Shudt talks into four mikes. These are attached to a movable platform on which rest his big binoculars. The mount is turnable to allow Roy to follow the races, of course, and the glasses are strapped on the top and can move up or down.

Here's what happens with all those mikes. One is for sound on the patrol camera. The sound on film is used every race night-Tuesday through Saturday-on KHJ-TV after the baseball game. That's the Santa Anita Feature of the day.

The CBS mike is used for Columbia Pacific network coverage of eleven Western states, Saturdays 4:45 to 5:15. Then there is the public-address mike, which Roy must remember to turn on and off at such times as he doesn't want to bother the racing crowd in attendance with a rehash of something they have just seen, but which Roy is re-creating for that evening's listeners.

There is also the KWKW mike, which is always open to record the races for the nightly re-creations heard Tuesday through Saturday at 8:30 p.m., and for the daily "live" race of the day.

Roy calls it "fun."

ABC Completes Radio Centers

Last month the American Broadcasting Company completed its three-million-dollar ultra-modern AM facilities in New York, Los Angeles and Chicago. On April 1 the new million-and-a-quarter-dollar ABC Radio Center in L.A. opened. After this date all operations in Hollywood of ABC and its owned Los Angeles radio outlet, KECA, will be conducted under one roof. All radio engineering facilities, except the transmitter, are now housed at the remodeled ABC building at 1539 North Vine Street. The transmitter will remain at its present site, 2951 South Fairfax. This is the first time since ABC (which was once known as the Blue Network) separated from NBC, that all local operations have been consolidated in one building. Housed in this new plant is one of the largest and most modern tape recording rooms in the country. Other broadcasting equipment installed in the new building incorporates all of the latest advances known. The Vine Street Radio Center will include twelve studios and announcers' booths. Included in this number are three audience studios with an average seating capacity of 321 persons.

Wrestling Is My Business

Well, the wrestling promoters finally woke up to the fact that they were overlooking one of the greatest natural matches of all time. There has been such a hullabaloo and scramble trying to make the Baron Leone-Lou Thesz match it did not occur to them that the hottest contest was right under their noses—the battle between Wild Red Berry and Rito Romero.

This great, colorful match will be held Wednesday, April 16, at the Los Angeles Olympic Auditorium.

Wild Red Berry, the poor man's Socrates, will tangle with Rito Romero, the ladies' choice for Mr. America, Mr. Universe or Mr. Anybody's World, for the junior-heavyweight belt.

These men are tops on everybody's list in the junior-heavyweight class. When you think of this division, instinctively you think of Red and Rito. So why not give the wrestling fans a break and a chance to see just which of these is the better man?

They are the ultimate in opposites. Red, the veteran, came from the bottom of the middleweights to the light-heavyweight championship, then into the junior heavyweights. He has the experience of 4,000 wrestling matches to draw from, while Rito, only twenty-four years old with six years of experience behind him, relies on his tremendous speed and quick application of leverage. Red's attacks are brutal, savage displays of strength. Rito employs cunning, speed and leverage rather than force.

They rate about the same in two ways—in weight, although Red will have about a seven-pound advantage—and in championships held. Both of them are old hands at winning titles. Rito held both the junior and heavyweight title of Mexico, the heavyweight belt of Texas and the junior-heavyweight championship of the world. Red has held the middleweight title, the light-heavyweight belt three times, the heavyweight title of Texas and the junior-heavyweight title of the world. Holding championships is no novelty to either of them—but on the surface Rito's record is more impressive since he accomplished about the same thing in six years that it took Red nineteen years to do.

And the match Wednesday will be one of the most thrilling of all time, I believe. Both men, with fighting hearts, are reaching out for the greatest prize—the diamond-studded solid-gold junior-heavyweight belt.

Fans of Antonino Argentine Rocca are happy these days, because next

week the Amazing One returns and will stay around these parts for several weeks.

Rocca's style of wrestling is so sensational and amazing that he is in a world of his own so far as wrestling is concerned. There is nothing ortho-

Unfortunately, Nature doesn't favor all of us equally. In the case of Rocca, she endowed him richly with certain qualifications that lend a great hand in helping him to perfect his own style of wrestling. He has an innate grace and agility. Jack Webb Answers Evelyn Bigsby's Questions

1. How much more time goes into the TV version of "Dragnet" than the radio?

Conservatively, counting outside work, planning, pre-planning and all, 100 times more.

2. What essential qualities of the radio "Dragnet" have you tried to keep for the TV version?

All of 'em. Why change? The property was proven on radio and should be translated in whole into motion pictures for television.

3. How do the costs compare between the radio and TV "Dragnets"?

The radio runs around \$4,000 a show; the TV, approximately \$30,000. That's an average. It depends a lot on whether we can shoot in three days or have to take up to five.

4. What is the main difference between the radio and TV versions?

None, except the one is visual and that eliminates some of the radio dialogue. Where in radio you say "Let's go through the door," in the TV version the words are unnecessary because you can see the people going through.

5. Do you hope to continue both radio and TV "Dragnets"?

As long as they'll have us. We're working seven days a week now, with

TV "Dragnet" scheduled only alternate weeks. I'd really prefer it every week. You can't build a rating without it.

6. What problems has the TV version created by way of casting?

None especially.

We've used a lot of radio talent. Radio people have proved fantastically successful. We've used two or three who've never been in front of a camera. They've been fine. Lots of times when someone is suggested for a part, the question is raised, "Will he look right?" I'll take the ACTOR and he'll look right!

7. Are there any types of crime you can put on radio that you can't do or find inadvisable to do on TV?

I maintain that if you're going to have this ("Dragnet") go before an adult audience, it should be exactly the same on TV as it is on radio. We've never gone in for gore. We try to get the story point across and let

listeners draw the moral. But several times we've undergone TV censorship for something that passed without a question in radio. Why can't we do it on TV? We've already said it on radio. "TV is different," they tell us. Yet look at the Westerns that get by, with all their stab-bings, fights, and underwater struggles.

8. Is research for TV more meticulous than for radio?

I'd say three and a half lines on radio may be replaced by three and a half days' work in TV. All our pictures for TV are being shot here on the Republic lot. We have four permanent sets—City Hall, cell block, the one we're using now as a hotel room and an exact reproduction of Superior Court No. 41, right down to the last knothole. The City Hall, cell block and courtroom were re-created from detailed photographs. All of this involves a tremendous amount of work.

9. Will you re-create for TV some of your best radio "Dragnets"?

We're trying to pick the cream of the cases.

10. How did you go about casting for the role vacated by Bart Yarborough? ("Ben Romero.")

We haven't RE-CAST for Bart. What a handicap to follow him! But thank God for Barney Phillips. He's still not permanent. It's up to public acceptance and whether he's happy in the part. As for Bart's passing, I've never been so shaken in my life. I was numb.

11. What has been the comment on Barney Phillips?

Ninety-nine per cent of the fans have written wonderful letters.

12. Have any of the TV viewers written in saying members of the cast do not look the way they'd pictured them?

Not so far.

13. Have any criminal experts found inconsistencies in "Dragnet"?

For the radio show we're getting more letters of commendation from detectives than ever before. It's too early to tell on the television show.

14. What help was the police department in launching the TV version?

We couldn't have done it without them.

15. Do they supply technical advisers?

They let us have officers, on their days off. We have one TV adviser for each picture, chosen from the department we're treating, like homicide, robbery, or burglary. We keep the same technical adviser for the radio show all the time.

16. Can you cite an instance in which the advisers helped you for the TV series?

Yes. They showed us things like the technique of breaking a safe; how to hold a gun on a suspect—you have to "sell it to the camera" but you don't want to point it at your partner.

17. Any other problems?

Once you've gone visual you've opened up a whole can of beans!

18. Please be specific.

I guess the chief problem is I don't like the idea of doubling in brass... both directing and acting. I'm not an Orson Welles!

19. Do you listen to police radio or get any ideas from it?

Used to, but don't make it a point any more.

20. With three years of radio "Dragnet" under your belt and eight motion pictures of TV "Dragnet," do you think you could plot the perfect crime?

Nope. There "ain't no such thing!" Any more than there are two things alike in this world. Even your or my two front teeth are different.

Can You Penetrate the Iron Curtain?

Clete Roberts Tried

CLETE ROBERTS, KLAC-TV's newsmen, went about as far as you can go—as far as you can go, that is, in getting inside the Iron Curtain.

Those journalistic films over KLAC's "Clete Roberts Reports," which you view comfortably from your living room, caused Clete Roberts more than a little discomfort and a lot of excitement. Armed with only a cameraman, plus plenty of the old-fashioned type of newspaperman's curiosity, he traveled more than one and a half times around the world to get his shots for viewers.

Almost a year ago he started out with his cameraman for the Philippines, where he captured on film "The Robin Hood of the Philippines." Leaving there, he headed for Japan, Formosa, Korea, Hong Kong and back to the U.S.A., to report on the Mexican-California labor problem. From the West Coast he went on to Alaska to investigate our military defenses there, and then flew to Germany, Italy, Greece, Turkey, Spain, Israel and back to the Orient; then on across the Pacific to California again.

Russia's Back Door

It was a trip many television view-

ers may dream of taking, but perhaps not at the breakneck speed Roberts was forced to use. All during the photo-gathering jaunt, Roberts was knocking, but always unsuccessfully, at Russia's back door. He circled the invincible Iron Curtain, but was able to bring set-siders only what lay on the fringe of it.

We asked this roving TV-journalist, who has covered some of the most critical beats during the war years, whether our "Voice of America" and "Crusade for Freedom" were effective abroad.

"Proof of their effectiveness is the fact that the Russians are spending a lot of money to combat them."

What Europeans Think

As for signs of the cold war getting hot, Roberts said that it didn't look like any hot war in 1952. One of the most significant things he remembered from his world tour was his conversation with a German student from the Eastern zone. Roberts asked

the student, "What do you think of Americans?"

The German student replied, "We don't like what you tell us over the radio. You tell us we are starving, that we have lost our freedom in the Soviet zone, and that our standard of living is low. We know that. What we want you to tell us is what we should do about it. If you tell us to fight, we'll be glad to."

Roberts went on to say that his general impression of what Europeans think of Americans was that often we are not very well liked. He said, "They resent the fact that they think we want to impress our way of life on them."

Getting back to TV reporting as Roberts does it, we asked the newsmen if he thought television was doing a good job in news reporting.

"Yes, it is. You must remember that TV news reporting is still in the formative stage and you can't be critical of the industry's coverage because TV is a very expensive thing. I believe in my technique of using the camera and think that it is going to be the basic system for reporting current and undated video news."

His Plans

His plans for the future include a trip in the next few weeks to Europe, probably Paris, where he will set up headquarters for his own independent news company. This time he will take his wife and two youngsters, Penny, thirteen, and Christopher, four, with him. About that family, Roberts said, "We don't take any member of the family for granted and that way we have gained a great appreciation of one another."

World-trotting newsmen seldom have time for much else but chasing headlines. When Roberts is free he loves to fly (of all things) old airplanes. He claims he will pilot anything that has "two wings with wires in between." And he informed us that "old planes never wear out."

Television has offered men like Clete Roberts, who is only forty years old, a new way to cover what might be an old newspaper beat. Camera coverage has forced the typewriter into the background, but has given Roberts a chance to continue reporting world news, only this time on a two-dimensional scale for the benefit of all the people who never have the opportunity to travel out of view of their TV screens.

GROUCHO MARX: "I'll Stoop to Anything"

Comic Tries to Give Straight Answers To Our Twenty Questions, But Fails

1. What preparations, if any, do you make for "You Bet Your Life"? Please give some details.

I bathe, shave, place a dab of cologne behind each ear, change the water in the turtle dish, and drive to the studio. Just before the show I have a bite to eat. Sometimes two or three bites, depending on the whims of the waiters at the Derby. A sound sleep the night before is always a help. As for preparation of material, I don't see or talk to the contestants until I meet them on the show. Sometimes, if I have warning that we'll have a specific type of contestant, I try to think of a few old wheezes about the subject we're expected to discuss. Usually the contestant gives me all the material that's necessary.

2. Do you think that puns make for good or bad humor? Explain.

I don't appreciate puns as well as some, but I'll stoop to anything. I have no conscience.

3. What else are you doing these days besides your radio and TV shows? Pictures, personal appearances, etc.

I finished two pictures for Howard Hughes and have ruled out any more films for the present. I may do some camp and hospital shows this summer, if they'll have me.

4. What are the original Marx Brothers doing now?

Gummo is active as my agent and agent for Harpo and Chico. Harpo recently signed a fat contract for special appearances on NBC-TV. Chico is getting ready for another TV series. Zeppo is interested in finance and is doing some agenting. Fortunately, they're all working. When they're not, I manage to lose touch with them.

5. Do you prefer doing radio or television? Why?

On our show, it's the same thing. We do the radio and TV shows at the same time. There is no question that radio is much less demanding, but television is more like show business.

6. Have you ever had ambitions to be anything else but a comedian? Any other ambitions now?

When I was a boy, I wanted to be a doctor. If I'd followed that ambition, I wouldn't be smoking nickel

cigars today. Of course you can't get a nickel cigar any more. Even the ones I smoke cost seven cents.

7. Do you think you're as funny as other people say you are?

I would like an introduction to the person who said I was, because I've never met the fellow. The only comments I get from the people I know are grunts.

8. Have you ever been stuck for a "comeback"? If so, explain.

The time Max Gordon called me on the telephone in 1929 and told me my stock was worthless. All he said was: "The jig's up!" Frequently my contestants say things that stun me into silence. Just recently we had an elderly man who spoke as follows: "I'm living at South Catalina right now but I don't know how long I'll be there because this morning the water pipe broke and the manager said I'd have to pay for it because it was an act of God and I said 'God doesn't go around breaking water pipes.'" I had no comeback.

9. Do you think the present format of your show is an enduring thing . . . say, good for four or five more years? IF for no longer, do you plan another type of entertainment for TV?

After thirty-five years in show business, I'd be a sucker to make plans for five years ahead. I do think our present format is good for a long time. I only wish I was.

10. Can you remember what was the most violent reaction, and on whose part to your switch in mustache from paint-type to real?

My wife made me shave it off the first week I had it. My producer, John Guedel, made me grow another one. Three months later I had the mustache but I didn't have my wife.

11. Why do you find it necessary to have a full band play the brief bits of song clues on your show? (Speak freely, you're among friends.)

The band (ten pieces) is necessary to the over-all production of the show for curtains, chasers (although I usually prefer plain water for the latter), and musical bridges. They play the song clues only as an added fillip. Lately, I think they've been adding fillip to the payroll.

12. Whom do you consider the top personality you have met on a show.

16. Do you think you were born with your inimitable wit or did you acquire it? Please explain.

Nothing is inimitable, because they can always make a good reproduction in Japan. And much cheaper, too.

17. Have you ever refused to answer a question in your life?

18. What do you do for fun?

19. Do you think you will ever retire? If so, what will you do in your spare time?

Please go back to Number 18.

20. What's the most serious thought you have ever entertained?

I forget.
