A Trouble-Maker Exposed!

The Bunglings of "Jingles" Have Many Times Landed "Wild Bill Hickok" in Seven Kinds of Hot Water. But Off-Screen It's Another Story

A COUPLE OF years ago a lavishly budgeted motion picture was being filmed out on the desert. The huge cast were in constant proximity, and tempers frayed. Rumors drifted back to Hollywood of a real feud going on out there.

Hollywood Feud

And the rumors were true. Production was literally at a halt because the harried director and the picture's producer were not even speaking. The infuriated director was about to leave for Hollywood. As he sat at lunch in a big commissary tent one day, he glowered across the aisles at the producer, who glowered right back. Then from the open end of the tent there shambled into the room a huge figure with a growth of beard and large squeaky boots that telegraphed his entrance. It was Andy Devine.

Immediately the two scowling men broke into smiles and almost simultaneously hailed the popular actor. Devine looked from one to the other, then crowed in the voice millions of moviegoers have recognized for twenty years, "Nothin' doing. I'm not sitting with either of you guys till I find out who's coming out on top!"

Tension was broken. Not only did the eating crew break up, the producer and director for the first time experienced having their Hollywood feud made light of. They grinned at each other from opposite sides of the room. Later they were seen talking. Next day picture shooting was resumed, the director stayed on instead of bearing his tales of working woe back to the front office, and Andy Devine lumbered happily around, oblivious of the fact that his unerring right words and good nature had battered down an impasse of some magnitude.

TV Trouble-Maker

That's practically the story of Andy Devine's life. He is oil on troubled waters wherever he goes. Except TV. On KTLA's "Wild Bill Hickok" series the man whose voice made "Hi-yah, Buck" a national saying plays a laughable, lovable character whose bumbling ways always land him, and usually "Wild Bill," in hot water up to their Stetsons. His emergence or rescue is always to the tune of a remorseful, shamed "Aw-w-w-w, Bill."

In no attempt to minimize Devine the popular man, it might be sus-

pected that a movie actor with less of this world's goods and a greater insecurity of family, finances and career might not be able to spread cheer and pleasure with the same ease he spreads his 235 pounds over chairs wherever he lands. But Andy Devine built these things himself. He was around and working when Hollywood was splashing money and champagne around at such a rate that today some former movie greats are destitute.

The Old Days

He can enthusiastically recall these days. "I used to play a butler in the early movies," he crows. "I'd march into a room with tons of cable dragging from my pants legs, and a huge, old-fashioned microphone strapped to my shoulders. That was to pick up the voices of the principals who followed me." Among those voices were Doris Kenyon's, Milton Sills's, even Billie Dove's.

For twenty years and through "several hundred" pictures, Andy Devine lent his voice and comedic talents, saving his money as he went. No breath of scandal has ever touched him because none exists in his life. He is popular, respected and so talented that he has become a nationally known figure.

He lives quietly, raising two sons, one of whom is a champion swimmer and of college age. Fourteen years ago he built a small ranch home in Van Nuys, a town of which he has been named honorary mayor for every year since. His hobbies range harmlessly from photography to orchid growing, and he reads continually. His main interest, aside from his family and a beloved old Labrador retriever whom he considers part of that family, is people. He can dig right into what the other fellow is thinking and saying in a way that makes it almost extrasensory. It arises actually from a real interest.

For Real

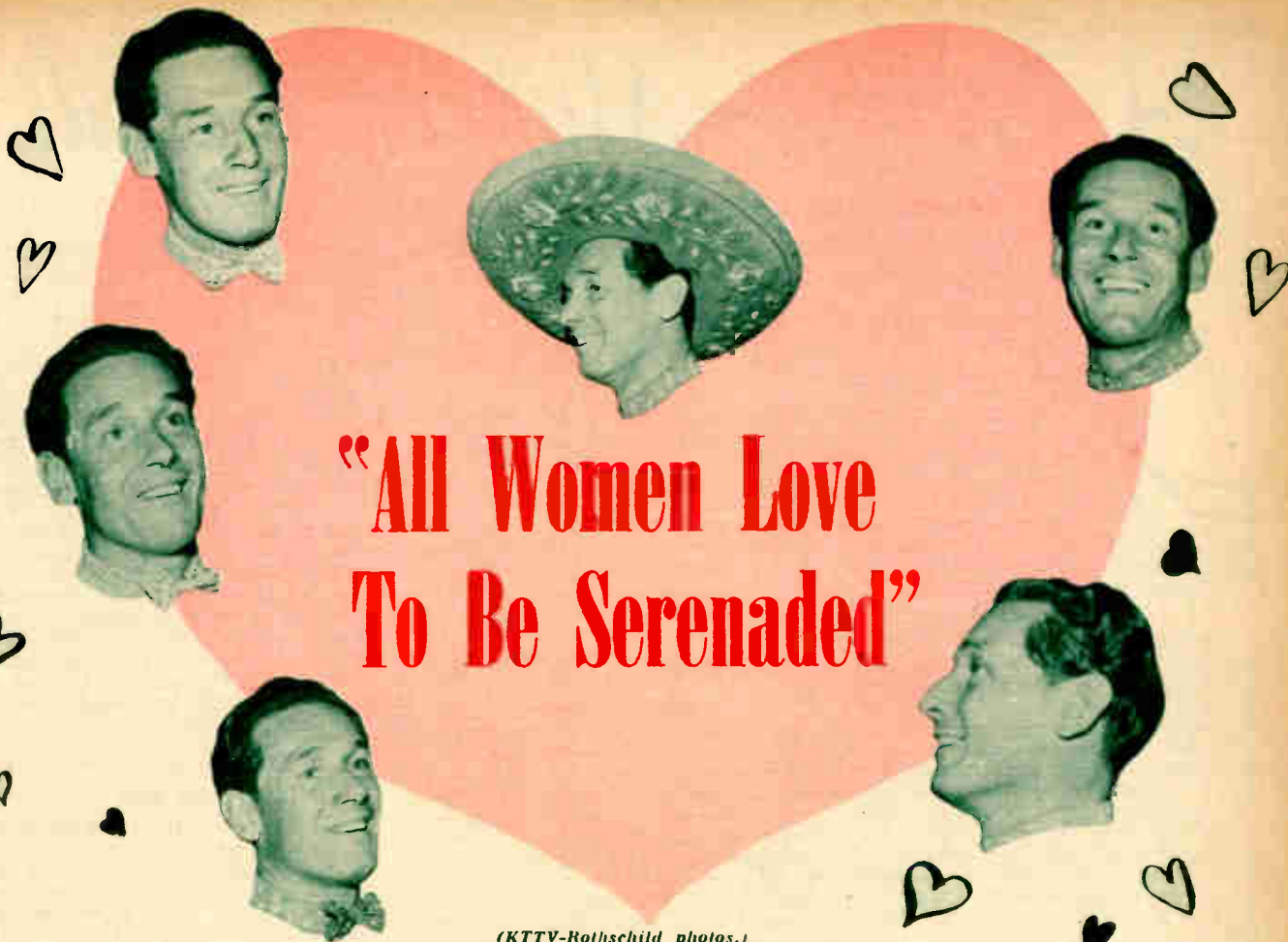
If a banker unburdens himself to Andy, Devine is fascinated to find that a financier has the same problems he has. A neighbor's garden as a conversation piece is as appealing to him as a history of Lloyds of London. On an interview with the press the great jolly man with the gentle manner and gravel voice is as interested in giving helpful answers as he is in the fact a story is being done on him. These things you can't pretend.

He's wild about TV. Ask him for a comparison of TV and making

"All Women Love To Be Serenaded"

ONCE HE GOT started on TV, it didn't take Tito Guizar very long to become an outstanding and much-talked-about personality—especially in his effect upon the opposite sex. His voice and mannerisms have now become familiar in thousands of Southern California homes.

Nevertheless, when you meet and talk to Tito Guizar off camera, three main things impress you, which are not too self-evident on the screen.

(1) Certain women may find it difficult to believe, but this guy is really better looking, full of the kind of sweet Latin talk the women go for, and much more personable than he shows on TV.

(2) Although the former opera singer has been in show business for over twenty years, he admits that he has a great deal to learn yet about TV, and is constantly on the lookout for new approaches and "gimmicks."

A fluent speaker in Italian, French and Spanish, and a guitarist who can sing in six different languages, Tito has recordings made of each of his shows, and then he listens to them by the hour, always seeking to improve himself.

(3) Tito has not shown it to full advantage on camera yet, but actual-

ly he is a very funny fellow gifted with a Latin, slightly Americanized sense of humor. When he speaks he uses his hands, eyes, and various facial expressions in order to add enthusiasm and zest to his dialogue.

An example of his humor (plus his sense of good show business) was illustrated when he explained about the previously mentioned "gimmicks."

"Ever since I been singing for a living, wherever I go, in this country, Latin America, or Europe, I write down in the big book all the ideas I get. I have it home and I show it to you some time. It is big now. Almost 200 pages, filled with notes.

"When I come to the television, they keep telling me: 'Tito we need a gimmick.' Everybody, everywhere I go, keep telling me about they have to have gimmicks. I tell them at first that it is very good, but I do not know what they are talking about. For weeks I do not know what this 'gimmick' business means.

"Then just a few weeks ago, they tell me what it is. It is just an idea that makes for a better show.

"My friends, my friends, I tell them. I have been collecting and writing and studying these 'gimmicks' all my life. I have the big book at home filled with them. I bring it and show it to you. Then

we can get some work done, because I know now what you are talking about."

On the subject of women, a slight, almost imperceptible smile appears on Tito's face, and his eyes, even his hands, remain steadfast.

"All women love to be serenaded. I have discovered that no matter where you go, to the Midwest in America, or South of the Border, or anywhere in the world, everywhere, they love to have someone come with a guitar, sit next to them, and sing a romantic song."

Oddly enough, Tito also explained that he has found out that "teenagers will get restless if they do not hear songs they can understand, while the more mature women prefer to listen to Spanish songs or other foreign numbers, so they can dream while listening."

These are just a few personal facts on the KTTV star. Although he has been a tremendous success wherever he has appeared, and although he is still a relative newcomer to the TV field, we believe they indicate that Tito Guizar has not only found a perfect medium for showing his talent on TV, but that he will continue to improve and will provide better, more varied entertainment for his audience with each successive performance.

Mr. Peepers:

About Two Per Cent Pretend!

A Round Head, Big Glasses, Shy Way and Fall-Guy Role That Took the Public by Its Heart Are All for Real With Wally Cox



▲ **AN APTITUDE TEST** once revealed that Wally Cox had little creative imagination, yet he created a TV personality that captured the public completely. Cox also works as a silversmith, but admits the test was right in one respect. The things he makes in silver after patterns go better than the designs he dreams up himself.

TELEVISION VIEWERS watching Wally Cox, as "Mr. Peepers," go through an Army induction and later be discharged for anything as ridiculous-sounding as "repeated sunstroke" would laugh themselves sick.

Another great bit would be Cox's aptitude reading, wherein he was dealt such crushing news as an *extremely* low inductive-reasoning score, a *particularly* low creative-imagination mark, and a complete lack of originality. Viewers would be convulsed, and would mentally applaud the writers who had provided Cox with such indigenous material.

Sad But True

But both situations are very real to Wally. The drafting and discharge occurred just that way. He spent twenty dollars on the aptitude test and its disheartening results.

Wally Cox is "Mr. Peepers," and

vice versa. He's first to admit that the shy, small soul he seemingly portrays is actually his very real self.

Cox is like something Dickens penned. Small, with a round head, myopic eyes and arms like sticks, he epitomizes defenselessness. But rather than be a tragic figure, unable to hold his own in schoolyard fights and games, he turned early in life and school to evoking laughs from the crew of savages who were his contemporaries. Lucky for him. Children can be more cruel than even a studied Tartar.

The Beginning

In later years Cox fell in with an old school chum, as brash and overt a character as Cox is shy and introverted. He lived with Marlon Brando, Brando's pet possum, and Brando's spluttering motorcycle. While it was Marlon Brando who led Cox into doing monologues as a basis for a night-club act which led to TV and a Broadway musical, we suspect it was also Marlon Brando's overpowering company which further reduced his little friend into a head-hanging individual whose muted conversation is about as fey as his appearance.

The Return

But audiences love "Peepers." So much so that when the NBC-TV summer show "Mr. Peepers" went off the cable in the fall, it was columnists and public reaction that put him back on.

Viewers who saw Wally play schoolteacher, pondering over even simple questions, giving bird-call imitations, and dribbling a basketball about a gymnasium, oblivious of heavily prowed, civic-minded dowagers who looked at him aghast, didn't want to give up the wispy figure whom they loved pityingly. Part of it may be the old thing of identification. Anyone who has been beaten down once—and who hasn't—could dig the "Peepers" characterization.

The television sensation, on a rare occasion when he was trapped into

talking about himself, told an Eastern magazine (TV Show) reporter, "I am what people think I play. I don't find myself ridiculous, but other people do. They laugh at my voice pitch, my body carriage, my glasses."

We hope the interviewer suggested to Wally Cox, as he stood with head down and posture uncertain, that people laugh also at Groucho Marx's voice, body carriage and glasses. But let Marx go off the TV cable, and would the press set up a club whose mission was to get him back in view? We wonder.

Second Glances (Critical Comment)

We Point With Pride

... To an enlightening half hour seen Sunday mornings at 10:00 on NBC-TV. Called "Youth Wants to Know," the Granik-created package parades some facts we all like knowing as they fall from the lips of such guests under question as Jackie Robinson or Lewis Gough. The latter is National Commander of the American Legion, a gentleman who must have been set back on his heels by the wise questions that fell from the pretty lips of early teen-agers. Now this is one of our ideas of a real good show.

... To the refreshing ideas and novel execution of "Tales of Tomorrow," seen Friday nights on ABC-TV. The errant camera which picked up a sordid little neighborhood murder as a recent Friday's fare was sensational. Novel, natural, and well cast. We admit this show, which can deal in any sort of unbelievable whimsey, has an edge on its brethren who must adhere to the confines of credulity. But the whimsey is so well carried out.

... To the blending of excellent voices and choice of songs on KNXT's Herman McCoy show Sunday nights. The singers are drawn from the student body at one of the Southland's best, UCLA. A personable bunch, with voices individually and chorally delightful. And don't let the log word "choir" throw you. It's a swing choir, which embellishes good singing with some simply staged but interesting production numbers. We would suggest not quite such harsh lighting, but most of the choir are young enough to take it.

We View With Alarm

... The seeming inability lately of any panelist on Peter Potter's really excellent Saturday night KNXT show to state flatly that he or she thinks a record is *nothin'*! Pete is outspoken. He always has been, and he has built this premise of honesty into an entertaining, much-talked-about show. But a few more movie names being too nicey-nice with a buildup of everyone on the record, its band, singer, label, release date and color, before they weakly intimate that it isn't their cup of tea, and viewers used to Pete and guests laying it on the line are going to be disappointed. Speak up, fellahs. Ya like it or ya don't. It's your nickel.

... The preponderance of dialogue given the loud-mouthed character who plays fellow schoolteacher to one of TV's most delightful, Mr. Peepers." On a recent NBC TV Sunday night show Wally Cox's laughable, heart-tugging reactions were almost smothered by

"Stagecoach." (5) Dec. 7, 7:30. This film, acclaimed as one of the best Westerns of all time, established John Wayne in the front rank of box-office personalities. The story concerns itself with a group of people, made up for the most part of outcasts, and its stagecoach across unfriendly Indian territory. Complicating matters are the pregnancy of one of the passengers, an Indian attack, and the appearance of the outlaw, the Ringo Kid (Wayne), Thomas Mitchell, as a drunken doctor, won the 1939 Academy Award for best supporting performance in this film, while Claire Trevor, as a woman of doubtful morals, and John Carradine, as a courtly gambler, acquit themselves admirably. The noted John Ford directed this extraordinarily entertaining movie.

"Action for Slander." (9) Dec. 9, 9:00. Clive Brook possesses an awfully stiff upper lip in this one, which finds him cashiered from the British Army for cheating at cards. He finally puts a little steel in that old backbone, after

- 1 teaspoon salt
- Pepper to taste
- 9 hamburger buns
- Butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups coarsely grated American cheese

Combine the first six ingredients. Cut off top third of each hamburger bun. Pull out crumb of bottom section, leaving about a half-inch rim and bottom. Spread with butter or margarine and place in a 350° F. oven until a light brown. Fill each hollowed-out toasted bun with the bean mixture. Top with grated cheese. Place on a cookie sheet and heat in a 350° F. oven for 15 to 20 minutes or until cheese is melted. Yield: 9 Boston Burgers.

PUMPKIN BURGERS

Instead of grated cheese, place pumpkin faces cut from American cheese slices on top of the Boston Burgers.

ALBUM OF THE WEEK: Benny Goodman 1937-38 Jazz Concert No. 2 (Columbia): Here is the same all-star Goodman Trio, Quartet, and Orchestra—James, Krupa, Hampton, Wilson, Elman, Stacy and all the other great musicians who comprised this outstanding dance band of the thirties. Whereas Volume One featured the famous Carnegie Hall Concert, Volume Two is a series of air checks recorded while the band was on tour those memorable years—remote broadcasts from the nation's top night spots where the Goodman band was setting them on fire with its type of swing that has never been equaled. Here are four twelve-inch long-playing sides expertly edited to provide nearly two hours of dance music, the like of which you've never heard unless you have a good memory and heard this band which skyrocketed to the top at the old Palomar Ballroom. What a satisfying feeling it would be for any Benny Goodman fan to find this collection in his sock on Christmas morning!



CHRISTMAS NEWIES: Without a doubt, one of this year's most popular will be "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus," with discings already available by **Spike Jones** (RCA-Victor) and **Molly Bee** (Capitol), but don't be surprised to see Columbia's **Jimmy Boyd** walk away with top sales on this platter. . . . **Johnny Desmond** (Coral) has a fine holiday ballad, "Christmas in the Air," on the calmer side in tempo but good potential material. . . . **Eileen Barton** (Coral) puts plenty of personality into "The Night Before Christmas Song" for the best version available to date, while it's the **Ames Brothers** (Coral) harmonizing all the way for a fine swiny treatment of "Sing a Song of Santa Claus."

DISCoverage: With the dance bands, **Ray Anthony** (Capitol) leads the way with a great rhythm instrumental on "Idaho," closely followed by **Les Brown** (Coral) and his solid beat backing for the **Ames Brothers'** vocal on "Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me." . . . With the gal vocalists, **Eileen Barton** (Coral) does a top chore on "Tennessee Tango" and "Don't Let the Stars Get in Your Eyes," while **Pearl Bailey** (Coral) sets a frantic pace for "Toot, Toot, Tootsie" and in calmer tempo, but still with a steady beat, gives a new interpretation to "My Ideal" that listens well. **Frances Faye** (Capitol) is at her best with her intimate styling of "She Looks" (strictly not for radio) and "I Wish I Could Shimmy Like My Sister Kate." . . . **Stan Freberg** (Capitol) runs away from all novelties with his version of the Les Paul-Mary Ford classic, "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise." Here's trick recording at its best and Freberg at his funniest.

If we see that one or a group seem to be winning more than is fair then their entries are used only once a month.

We would like to point out that when an organization goes to the time, trouble and expense of having gifts of any kind on a program, the object is to create good will and loyal fans. . . . we would be destroying the objective if we didn't award prizes, but we do feel it is our prerogative to judge the entries and decide when it has become a "monopoly" for just a certain group.

Wrestling

Is My Business

by Jules StrongBow

"How do people get into wrestling?" is a question frequently asked by fans. It's a good question with many interesting answers. Behind every fellow there is a story, and in almost every case the

one single underlying factor is determination to be a wrestler. The tricks of fate and circumstance that lead to mat careers are as varied as the personalities of the men themselves.

One of the most interesting is the story of George Bollas, The Zebra Kid, who tells his experience this way:

"My coach at Ohio State University, Larry Hicks, upon seeing me for the first time, felt my legs, arms, looked at my big stomach and said to me that I was too big to wrestle when I wanted to try out for the freshman team at school. Practice started and I was green with no previous experience.

"They decided to let me be the dummy for their previous heavyweight wrestler, Russ Thomas, who was second heavyweight Big Ten champion in 1944. He was also an All-American football player, and at that time was still practicing football.

"As for me, I practiced, practiced, practiced wrestling. The coach paid no attention to me during practice but I worked out twice as hard, twice a day, and ran five miles three times a week. For weighing 365 pounds, I was in shape.

"The time came for the showdown to see who would wrestle heavyweight position. I beat Russ in less than 20 seconds. The coach wouldn't believe it. We did it again—and again—and again. The fourth time I broke his

knee. From then on wrestling was my favorite sport."

George went on to win three national amateur championships, the National AAU, the National Collegiate and the Big Ten in 1945 and 1946. By the time he finished college, he went right into the professional ranks.

A form of hero-worship draws a lot of youngsters into grappling—like the popular new Pacific Coast heavyweight champion, Rito Romero. When Rito was in his teens in Guadalajara, he used to admire the well-dressed, well-fed successful-looking matmen and would carry their wrestling bags into the arena just for an opportunity to talk with them and get a close look. He made up his mind that was what he wanted, so began training and got it. That isn't as simple as it sounds—there was a lot of hard work and spunk before he attained his goal.

Then there are the natural fighters—like pugnacious Wild Red Berry. Red, a skinny, steel-muscled kid, wanted to be an athlete. He tried fighting. When he was seventeen he won the Tri-State amateur boxing tournament and received his first cauliflower ear. That year he had eighteen professional fights, and while still seventeen he battled the middleweight champion of Kansas. During that one he broke both his hands and retired. Undaunted, Red then got ahold of Farmer Burns's wrestling book and started practicing the holds on the lawn of his home. He took on all the big-necked boys, took a terrible beating but learned how to wrestle. For his first professional match, he walked eight miles through the snow and was paid fifty cents for his night's work. But he was a professional wrestler! Red's had a long, tough road to the top—and I think that's where he deserves to be.

The majority of the present younger crop of wrestlers found that God had blessed them with strong, powerful bodies and good coordination, and then they just naturally drifted into amateur wrestling during college. A lot of them turned professional to finance their education. Such was the case of Dr. Lee Grable, the wrestling Doctor of Philosophy, Bob Bristol, the Gentleman from Glendale, and many others.

You can readily see that the question "How do people become wrestlers?" opens up an almost endless, fascinating topic. Perhaps, if you like, we will have more.

Is Orson Out of Date?

IN HIS DEEPEST, eeriest voice, the narrator says: "This is Orson Welles, speaking from London." His voice echoes dramatically, sounding as if he were alone in a huge, deserted dungeon.

"Here I am in 'The Black Museum,' Scotland Yard's mausoleum of murder!"

Scary music follows. And Mr. Welles continues:

"The Black Museum is a functional place with its shelves and cabinets, its glass-topped exhibit tables and neat white cards identifying time, place and . . . killing!"

More scary music intervenes.

Mr. Welles then explains, in a deeper and eerier voice than before, that The Black Museum has on exhibit various instruments of death, gathered by authorities assigned to actual criminal cases. He focuses his attention on one of these objects—a sash cord, a mallet, a sheath knife, a trunk, or a raincoat—and proceeds to narrate all the gruesome, creepy, deathly details.

Creaks

Within one half hour (with several minutes deducted, natch, for commercials), the instrument is assigned to a definite time, place, and persons (including both the doer and the receiver), the criminal is brought to justice, and the radio audience is brought back to The Black Museum, from whence is heard the still deeper and more than ever eerie voice of one Orson Welles:

"And now, until next week, when I will return to The Black Museum, I remain obediently yours."

Creaking footsteps. A creaking, closing door. And creaking music close the dramatic part of the program.

During the show, Welles is assisted by a capable cast of American and British stars. It is being produced in London (where Welles currently makes his home) by Harry Alan Towers, outstanding British radio producer responsible for some of the most important British Broadcasting Corporation programs during World War II.

Critical Comment

A star of stage, screen, and radio for many years, Orson probably lays greatest claim to fame (besides being Rita Hayworth's former husband) to an occurrence in 1938 when he frightened a nation with his never-to-be-forgotten "The War of the Worlds" broadcast. Chaos reigned for several hours as Welles's "Mercury Theater of the Air" enacted a news-like treatment of a fictitious invasion by strange monsters from Mars.

On a smaller, more mundane scale, of course, "The Black Museum" seems to try to accomplish a similar reaction. Ten, or possibly five years ago, this formula for arousing goose

pimples might have succeeded. Now it seems slightly out of date and overdone.

If you enjoy murder mysteries of any kind on your radio, we recommend tuning in on Mr. Welles.

If you don't enjoy murder mysteries on your radio at all, forget about "The Black Museum."

If you enjoy superior murder mysteries with constructive themes, dramatic dialogue, and realistic, motivated plots, we suggest again that you forget about "The Black Museum."

Orson Welles long ago established himself as one of the world's outstanding actors. He still is. But a deep, eerie voice, especially too much of it, is not enough to carry a good radio program.

Dick Garton: Why I Left KTLA

AROUND THE middle of September "KTLA's Dick Garton" walked into a Western Union office and filed a telegram. That wire informed KTLA that as of September 27 he respectfully submitted his resignation.

Immediately the Garton fans began



calling to find out "What became of Dick Garton?" The station answered, "He's free-lancing."

Literally, free-lancing means working any place and for anyone the artist desires, with no contract either to assure him a weekly check or to bind him to one man or station's services. Euphemistically it refers to the unpleasant state of being totally unemployed, and is used by many an actor who feels it would be bad for his career to say, "I'm out of work right now."

The quickest way to find out what happened to Garton's long association was asking him. Dick's answer? "I wanted to free-lance."

"I started at KTLA as a result of having done the backstage interviews when the Ice Follies were first televised in 1948. I will always be grateful to the station for whatever popularity I enjoy. I learned a lot serving my apprenticeship as staff announcer. I was exposed to TV and was able to learn a lot about it, both technically and otherwise. But there finally arrives a time when a man feels that he has served his apprenticeship, and being at the station all day to do the station identification, give all the station promotion announcements, and do my shows left me no time."

Dick's mention of the "time" spent, rather than any mention of the money involved, is indicative of his philosophy. He says "Socrates put it better than I ever could: 'He is not only idle who does nothing, but he is idle who might be better employed.'

"By employed I don't mean on a payroll. I was on a payroll—a hard thing to give up—while I was waiting at KTLA from station break to

station break or from show to show. Picking up a regular and generous check every week is a hard habit to break."

Dick's departure from the familiar camera lenses didn't plunge him into an employment office by any means. He has a regular spot on Harry Owens's Monday night KNXT show, a very desirable spot on anybody's viewing list. The sponsor wanted Garton to continue with the Central Chevrolet blurbs on Lawrence Welk's immensely popular show. So he continues. More recently Dick has been on Betty White and Del Moore's KLAC-TV show. In radio Garton is in his eleventh season doing the football games for Tidewater Associated Oil. This same outfit is to sponsor the winter's basketball games, and Garton, who has always enjoyed and hung around sports of all kinds, hopes to do these for listeners.

Asked if he misses an absolutely assured weekly pay check, Dick is merely surprised. "I have two of them. Right now I also have two or three more days a week which can be converted into pay checks." He grinned. "I hope."

"There's one more thing that sewed up my resolutions," Dick finishes. "I'd been going along with that Socrates bit for quite a while, but I encountered one even more to the point. It is written by our old friend 'Anon,' and says 'Killing time is not murder—it is suicide.' Well, I've never had any tendencies in that direction."



DICK WAS A FAMILIAR SIGHT for a long time on just one station. Now the Garton voice and nice smile will be showing up clear around the dial, with the Harry Owens Hawaiian hoedown on Channel 2 claiming him immediately after his departure from KTLA; and a sponsor who parades his product behind the Lawrence Welk show hiring Dick right back onto Channel 5! So Lionel Barrymore, who asked a member of our staff, "Whatever happened to that Garton fellow—?" can still see Dick. All Barrymore has to do is switch the dial on his TV set.

Bob McLaughlin

AN UNFORTUNATE accident with a happy ending explains Bob McLaughlin's entree into the disc-jockey business. Bob was a Beverly Hills motorcycle officer when he was badly injured while chasing a speeding auto. Two years of mending fifty-eight broken bones didn't dampen this Irishman's spirits.

As a result of the accident, Bob was disqualified for active army service, so he took a job in a defense plant where he received his radio training. Transferring from the technical to the commercial aspects of radio, Bob found himself at KLAC in 1945 as a staff announcer and disc jockey.

A native Angeleno, Bob doubles in brass. He not only spins records, but is a lyric writer as well, preferring ballads and verses with a religious theme. Bob's favorite color is green . . . he likes filet steaks . . . is an amateur gardener and golfer.

Bob introduced the integration of voice tracks of prominent vocalists with their platters. These tracks are a series of brief recordings tailored to fit Bob's show. He has perfected this method to the extent of being able to converse back and forth with the recording stars he has on wax.

Frank Sinatra gave Bob his break. He was the first top vocalist to make a sound track for a disc jockey. McLaughlin professes that he has no "favorites." The diplomat admits that many of the top vocalists are his San Fernando Valley neighbors. And who wants to start arguing with his neighbors? However, he does prefer music that's "easy to take."

Bob lives with his family in Encino. His sixteen-year-old son Chuck attends military school and at the moment can't quite decide whether he wants to pursue a military career or become a vocalist.

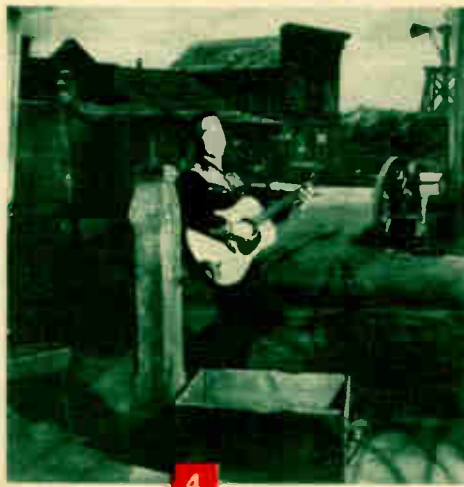
