Anything You Can Do (She Can Do Better)

It Takes a Woman to Write About "Death Valley"

ANYTHING YOU can do, Ruth Woodman can do better. At least she can when it comes to scripting stories about the West.

It may come as a surprise to many of you, but a woman (Mrs. Ruth Woodman) is the author of the "Death Valley Days" teleseries, which is viewed locally over KTTV. Furthermore, she is perhaps the foremost historical authority in the country on Death Valley.

An audition script in 1930 won her the chance to write the radio series. The former copywriter found her time fully occupied when the Pacific Coast Borax Company decided that the petite New Englander would be the one to script "Death Valley Days."

"Prospecting"

To give her the "feel of the Valley," Ruth Woodman was assigned to visit Death Valley at least once each year to "prospect" for stories which could be used on the air.

Her experiences in gathering story material, under the guidance of W. W. (Wash) Cahill, an old-line employee of the Pacific Coast Borax Company, are in themselves an adventure story which some day she hopes to chronicle.

Her travels with Cahill in search of script material took her into all sections of Death Valley and the surrounding area. Some of her close friends and acquaintances in Death Valley are governors, desert rats, bartenders, mining engineers, bank presidents, gamblers, mule-skippers, clergymen, men and women in every walk of life who helped or whose an-

cestors helped to write the history of the West.

While in search of stories she has "packed in" to the desolate Panamint Mountains on horseback, gambled with prospectors and miners, visited every "ghost town" in California and Nevada and explored deserted mines. The charming widowed Mrs. Woodman even had several marriage proposals from Death Valley citizens.

Transition

For fourteen years Ruth Woodman did the writing chores on radio. However, not all of the old radio scripts can be used on TV. For example there was a radio script about a white hearse which made an unusual tale over the airplanes, but it certainly would be in poor taste to have a video count-part.

Mrs. Woodman is a pleasant middle-aged woman who speaks in crisp New England tones. She has an air of self-assurance and there's determination in her stance. Despite the fact that she has been exposed to the wide open spaces periodically since 1930, she will always be an Easterner. She hasn't absorbed any of our mañana tendencies. She's a wonderful storyteller and can spin a yarn with the best of them.

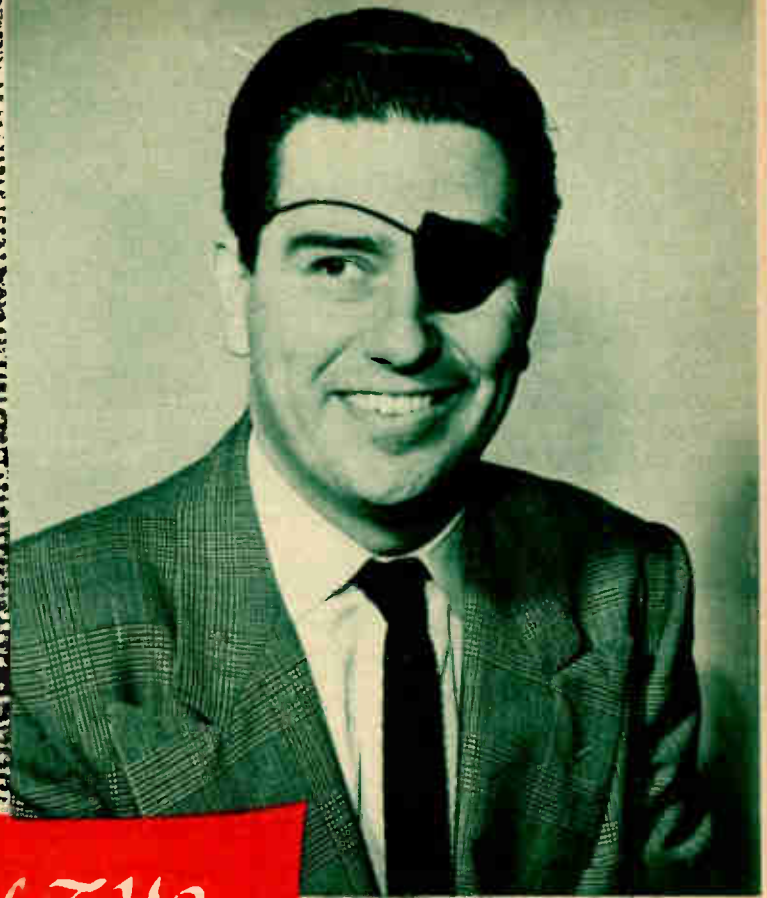
Ruth Woodman makes her permanent home in Rye, New York. Her two children Bill and Winnie are very

proud of their mother. Bill is very active in his college dramatic club. He hopes to enter the entertainment field in some production phase of show business. Sixteen-year-old Winnie can't quite make up her mind about a career except that she wants to attend Vassar, just as her mother did.

The Floyd Gibbons of TV?

HANDSOME, six-foot-tall Cleve Hermann, KNBH personality, who sports an eye patch and looms as a likely successor to the dynamic Floyd Gibbons of the thirties, does one thing best. He employs great singleness of purpose.

Start Early

When Los Angeles-born Cleve was fourteen he decided sports writing was for him, so he covered his school's (Poly High) athletic events for the Los Angeles Examiner. Then when he attended USC he went into journalism and couldn't miss being editor of the Daily Trojan. But he got a little off the track and went with another newspaper as general reporter. He graduated to help organize a Valley paper, on which he served as managing editor, but he got back on keel and piled up five years in the Daily News sports department before TV beckoned.

Now his ambition is to handle sportscasts for a big-league ball club. And TV should benefit from the manner in which he goes about this.

Leave Viewers Alone

Cleve has great faith in the viewer's ability to see what is going

on on a baseball diamond, in a wrestling ring or during a ten-rounder.

"The cameras are concentrating on the play-by-play. That means you can see what's going on, so the sportscaster should deal more with information on the guy that's doing it. It doesn't distract from the sports event, and I think many times all the talk about the game or match does."

Right now Herman's "Trophy Room" on Channel 4, each of the five week nights, follows a string of children's shows, so Cleve must necessarily make his interviews with top figures in the sports world of interest to youngsters too. His idea is to point up the value of team work. This item he believes to be the major factor in all athletics.

His glibness has Hermann a little concerned. He can't quite understand why he doesn't talk as fast as he writes. We have an idea only his prototype, Floyd Gibbons, could.

In addition to his sports writing for the daily newspaper, Cleve writes his own show. He is also writing a weekly NBC radio series, "Jason and the Golden Fleece," with his partner, Herb Ellis. That brings his total of tapping the keys into many thousands every day. Cleve feels he

should be able to rip out his sports news just as fast verbally. With his singleness of purpose, he'll master that in short order.

Game vs. Oath

Cleve says his most successful telecast to date was the night he told viewers about Eisenhower playing baseball. A young viewer's mother wrote to Cleve and suggested he watch his rating. It seems that her boy had gone to school next day and participated in the class discussion of the Inaugural. Most of the children had just watched KNBH's kinescope of the morning event, run during the dinner hour for school children who missed the live telecast. And most of them had done just that—watched the kinnie, then boom! off to some children's show.

But not Cleve's fan. He had heard Hermann tell about Eisenhower in sports, and the small teller distinguished himself with this sparkling addition to the Inaugural class reports.

Cleve and his wife Frances are themselves the proud parents of three children: Steve, three, and twins Larry and Laurie, seven months old.

We can scarcely credit Cleve Hermann's determination with his twins, but he does smilingly admit "I've always liked twins."

Mark Scott:

He Did The Impossible

IT HAPPENS to every American boy. At one time or another every kid who has any love for athletics gets the notion he would like to be a sports announcer.

Needless to say, many are called but few are chosen. This is particularly true in Los Angeles, which for many reasons is the toughest town in the country to crack in the sports-casting field. Because of the extreme competition it is almost impossible for a newcomer, especially one without a "name," to get the choice announcing jobs.

Back in January, 1951, Mark Scott was fully aware of this, but he still took his chances.

The story really begins in the winter of 1950. After a season of broadcasting baseball games at Norfolk, Virginia, the KFWB announcer had a vacation coming up.

The Chicago-born broadcaster figured he'd take a trip to his hometown. One morning Mark picked up the local newspaper. On the front page was a picture of the Windy City, showing snow drifts up to your neck.

Cuba-Bound

"Hey, honey, let's forget about Chicago this year." Mark yelled to his wife, Dorothy. "What about Cuba? Lots of sunshine, and I can take in the winter baseball season while I'm there."

The Scotts were off to Cuba. While there, Mark ran into J. Taylor Spink, publisher of *The Sporting News*.

It was Spink who first told Scott that the Hollywood baseball club was looking for an announcer.

Back in the States again in January, 1951, Scott wasted little time. He didn't know a soul on the Pacific

Coast, but he got up enough nerve to call Bob Cobb at the Brown Derby and told him he was interested in the Hollywood job.

Off for Hollywood

Cobb told him to send a recording of his work. Scott did it. More than that, in February, the former Illinois three-letter man took a trip—at his own expense—to the West Coast.

After meeting all the "wheels-that-be" connected with the Hollywood operation, Scott returned to Virginia without a definite reply.

Several weeks later they wired Scott that the job was his. At once Mark hauled his gear as quickly as possible from Virginia to California, and did his first game on March 8, 1951.

During the year, Scott kept plenty busy: He announced each and every inning of every Hollywood game. He became the sports chief at KFWB, with hourly reports and his own fifteen-minute show. He handled the Saturday night fights for Hank Weaver on Channel 7 during Hank's illness. He appeared in TV films as a sports announcer and emceed a talent show. His first coast-to-coast break came when NBC-TV requested him to do the color for the All-Pro Bowl game.

This season Scott is back again doing the Stars ball games. He is also now a stockholder in the Hollywood ball club.

And all this for a guy who was never heard, or even heard of, on the Pacific Coast a little more than a year ago. Not a bad record for a "rookie."

LIBERACE is TV's number-one bachelor. There's many a gal who would like to get her marital hooks into the famed pianist.

"Naturally, I can't be too definite about this," Liberace explained at his Valley home one afternoon. "It could happen to me tomorrow. I could meet the right girl and get married immediately. However, under my present circumstances, it doesn't seem too likely."

Career First

The KLAC-TV star makes no bones about the fact that his career comes

first. "I've worked a lifetime to get where I am now," said Liberace, "and I believe I am at a very crucial point and just on the surface of doing something worthwhile."

"My career is so complex that it is almost impossible for me to go steady with a girl, and still be fair to her and to myself."

Liberace is not speaking from just theory when he says this. He has been engaged three times. None of them worked out.

When we interviewed him, he had just broken up with a girl with whom he had gone steady for a year and a half.

"Most of the girls I go out with usually want to go night-clubbing and be seen in public places. There is nothing wrong with this and I enjoy it occasionally myself. But I have spent so many nights actually working in these places that when I get a night off I would just as soon sit around the house, have a few sociable drinks, talk, and watch television."

Women Too Jealous

After thirty-two years of independence, it is only natural that Liberace loves his freedom. And he thinks most women tend to be too possessive and too jealous.

"I sincerely love people. Also, in

my position, I have to be cordial to all types of people who come up to me. If I happen to be with a date, and then I am grateful and gracious to another girl because she happens to like my playing, immediately I can feel two eyes glaring at me."

Another important factor which has made Liberace overly cautious concerning marriage is that there have been several unfortunate instances of divorce in his own family.

"With both my friends and family I have seen people very close to me become despondent because of their marital problems. I can't afford to have this happen to me."

But don't get the wrong idea about Liberace. He does have definite marriage plans.

"I really think that when my career becomes more stable, I'll be able to think of settling down."

So don't give up, gals. The way Liberace has skyrocketed in popularity during the past year that "stable" point—or the right girl—could come along at any time.

Commercials followed the usual ecstatic approach given to appliance products but were at least palatable.—J.H.

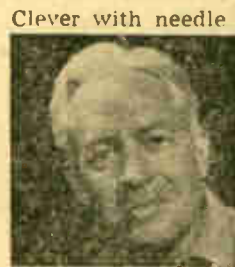
We View With Alarm

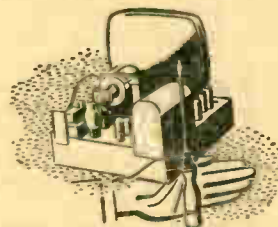

Lifelines

ADJACENT ITEMS: ON SAME PAGE of a Hollywood trade paper carrying a story that AFTRA was planning to take action against its members who proved "uncooperative" at the House Un-American Activities Committee hearings ran a very small ad, "Have Nothing—Will Travel" and signed Jody Gilbert (the former "Luigi" actress who put on such a show during the hearings). As for the "Have Nothing," she's telling us? And as for the travel, wish she would—far! It irks my soul that people who don't believe in our American system still stick around to accept "capitalistic" dollars.

RADIO AND TELEVISION NEWS CLUB of Southern California, through George Martin, president, has registered a protest with the Committee over the barring of voice transmission in instances where the TV picture is forbidden. "It is our feeling," went the protest, "that if such voice transmission is barred on television, radio broadcasts, newsreel photographs, still pictures and the presence of newspaper reporters during testimony by such witnesses should also be prohibited." The letter suggested that at such times as the TV cameras could not be trained on the witnesses, they might be aimed at other parts of the hearing room while the audio remained on. Sounds reasonable.

PONDERING RADIO ONE RECENT DAY, I decided to conduct a personal poll on how it was doing. For one of my answers I went over to KLAC-KLAC-TV to chat with Mr. Mortimer Hall, son of the owner. He has no complaints about radio; in fact he feels that KLAC, with its disc jockeys, has worked out a highly satisfactory radio schedule. Mr. Hall didn't mention it, but I'd heard that KLAC-Radio's profits had been something like \$300,000 in 1952, so I'd be the first to agree that the station was healthy.

KLAC-TV, ON THE OTHER HAND, presents a problem in that it, a local station, can't afford to compete with lavish coast-to-coast telecasts spending \$25,000 for talent and production alone. Against these supershows, a \$5000 local program usually suffers by comparison. According to Mr. Hall, his station's answer is informal fare during the daytime and TV filmed series using big names like Charles Laughton and George Raft for nighttime. This circumvents the expense of live TV production which seems to be the main drain on TV's grosses, which, though huge, aren't so big they can stand the tremendous outlays for fancy live telecasts.

MY POLL SHOWS RADIO ISN'T doing badly from another angle—the listener. While its true radio ratings can't hold a candle to TV's, there does seem to be a growing rumble that TV takes up too much time. People, it seems, want an evening to read, a few hours to follow hobbies, opportunity to visit with friends or a chance to sit and meditate. Some people are able to accomplish some or all of these objectives and also bend an ear to the

radio. In other words, the drive of these individuals is for some sort of activity combined with listening, rather than the passivity of simply sitting and looking. The desire does not seem to stop at physical activity such as hobbies, animated conversation, or washing dishes. It goes so far as to assert a preference for the kind of radio show which allows an individual to exercise his imagination (dream up his own images of play settings or characters), weave his own thoughts (against a musical background devoid of performers' activity) and hear his news without being distracted by a chap's mannerisms, airy gestures or obvious play for the cameras. (In the matter of being unobtrusive, KNXT's Lee Wood and Tom Harmon have been mentioned by some of our readers as examples other "performers" might well follow.)

NOT FOR A MINUTE SHOULD WE minimize TV's importance. But not for a second should we underestimate radio's value. I am still convinced that for some things like news, music and even some drama, radio is superior to TV. Right now, TV's biggest challenge is to come up with more programs which will stimulate the listener to do something for himself rather than sit like a sponge absorbing whatever is dribbled out to him. Let's not get atrophied muscles and minds as well!

AM GLAD THAT PETER POTTER didn't cut off his nose to spite his face with Columbia Records and that he'll go along asking no special favors for pre-releases for "Juke-Box Jury." We like Pete, we think he has a good show (we gave it a 1952 local panel Award) but it's overdoing it to fuss over which platter impresario throws the biscuit first on the turntable. I know this is a matter of extreme sensitivity and rivalry among some of the wax whippers, but after all, the line between saving "This is a pre-release" and "This is a brand-new record" is too thin for most of the listeners and lookers to note or care.

JUST LEARNED THAT CBS SOUND-MAN Berne Surrey (who won one of our Awards a few years ago for "Suspense" effects) has only two more years to go at U.S.C. before putting an M.D. after his name. Weekdays he's busy at General Hospital and Saturday mornings he attends symposiums. Saturday afternoons, Sundays and three nights a week he does sound for "Johnny Dollar" and Gene Autry. In short, Berne is either checking sound effects with his earphones or patients with his stethoscope.

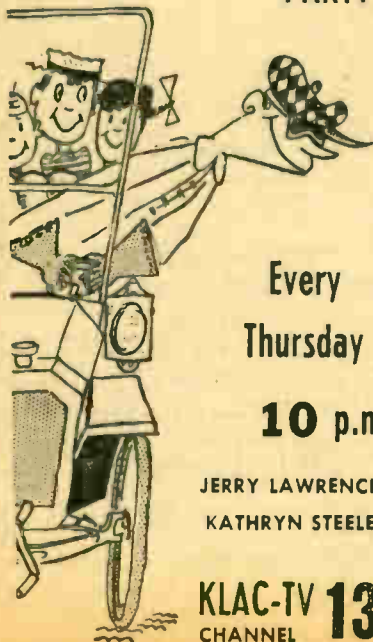

HOW LUCKY CAN YOU BE?

At a recent home-building show, the writer registered for prize drawings at seven different exhibit booths by signing of name and address on the ticket stubs. If I had won all the contests, they would have netted me the following items: 1—Water softener. 2—Free house painting. 3—Free vacuum cleaner. 4—Another free water softener. 5—Still another water softener. 6—Free roofing job. 7—Fur coat. Instead of any of the above items, I won (?) the following: 1—\$50 certificate, good for 30 days only, on purchase of a new water softener. 2—Letter of credit good for \$35.00 on painting of my house. 3—Badly mimeographed letter offering "highest trade-in allowance" toward new vacuum cleaner, and enclosing certificate worth \$10.00 if used in twelve days from date of letter. 4—Another \$50.00 certificate on water softener. 5—Honest! another \$50.00 certificate. 6—Nothing. 7—Printed form letter worth \$40.00 on purchase of fur coat selling for \$150 or more.

Now you and I are fully aware that there are honest firms and salesmen interested in selling water softeners. My comments are not directed toward these companies or their representatives. I am referring to those whose tactics follow certain lines. For instance, on the "prize awards" from the show, I found most of these were good for thirty days only. One water softener firm telephoned to remind me of this fact, was quite insistent that I "couldn't afford" to pass up the opportunity to save the money. (I didn't

give in.) The second water softener firm called, gave up quickly when I explained we had just sold our house and had no use for it. We didn't hear from the third company.

Subsequent investigation revealed that prices quoted by two of the three water softener companies were almost double the price of the same capacity tank at a local retail store.

A few weeks later, as my wife and I sat in the living room watching television, the doorbell rang. I answered. The man standing on our front porch was a water softener salesman. I invited him in, not because of any interest in water softeners, but to hear his "pitch."

His sales talk, I must admit, was interesting insofar as the demonstration of the advantages of using a water softener was concerned. But his "gimmick" was this: The product was being "introduced" in the neighborhood. The parent firm had authorized him to "select" a few individuals who would be interested in the purchase of a water softener. These purchasers would then introduce the salesman to their friends and neighbors, interest them in buying, and the "selected" individuals would get \$50 commissions to apply on their own purchase. The cost of the water softener: \$350. Sell the idea to seven of your neighbors and friends and you had your own for free.

investigating. Every homeowner in my entire area had been solicited with the same sales talk. Nine out of about sixty homes had been sold. All of these people live in the vicinity of a well-known chain store where they could have purchased the water softener for less than \$160. A near-by hardware store asked approximately the same price.

But high-pressure salesmanship and our human desire to get something for nothing had lined the pockets of the house-to-house "pitchmen" with over \$3000 that should have gone to the neighborhood merchants.

I just wonder if everyone who registered for the prize drawings was awarded certificates, good for \$50 on the purchase of a water softener?

This is one of the driest springs in several years, so check the hoses and sprinklers, because you'll put them to extra use in keeping your lawn and gardens green and glamorous. While you're at it--another timely note or two from our . . .

GARDEN CHECK LIST

ONE: Dusty Miller's silver-grey foliage makes it an ideal plant for a dark-green garden. Set out the bedding plants now. It's a long-lived perennial that grows ten to twelve inches tall, with bright yellow blossoms.

TWO: Best air-conditioner for house and yard is a group of well-chosen trees, located to screen out the sun. The cool air beneath them moves away from the house, so they actually create a draft. Don't wait till the budget permits buying big trees, start small this spring and let them grow. Two recommended choices--liquid-amber and evergreen elm. The chinese elm grows too fast.

THREE: you waste your time spraying--unless it's a thorough job. That means a strong spray that covers top and bottom leaves and reaches the inside of the plants. With good chemicals and a top quality sprayer, you can keep the bugs out. Listen to my show Saturday and find how to win a free sprayer--with a question!

NEWS FROM THE HOME FRONT

Plastic patio covers last far longer if they're kept clean. Dust causes them to dry out and crack, so wash dirty ones with detergent and a sponge. Then rinse them off with the hose every week.

Modern electrical convenience for older homes (and save money too!). You can now replace old fuses with up-to-date circuit-breakers . . . which look almost the same. But--when they go out, just push in the center button and the lights come back on. They'll be for sale in most hardware stores soon.

One newly popular way to make garden walks--with soil cement. Pulverize the dirt three to four inches deep . . . mix in a half sack of cement per square yard . . . moisten and tamp it down. Roll it with a lawn roller, cover with burlap so it will harden slowly, and you have a smooth, long-lasting walk with a minimum of work.

Handy gadget for dusty summer driving . . . a water pistol that shoots around the corner! Load it with water, and when the bugs or road film get too bad -- reach out, squirt it on the windshield and turn on the wipers. For best results--keep it away from Junior!

Are you a Smart Shopper? That's not only the title of a contest we feature each day on "Foods for Thought"—it's my theme song.

Any gal attempting to stretch her food dollar in all directions in 1953 is forced to become a Smart Shopper! It's a rare home-maker, grocery cart in hand, who may peruse the aisles as if she had the key to Fort Knox. Anyway, unlimited funds are no guarantee that your family will get body-building and appetite-appealing meals. It's how you buy your food that counts in the budget reckoning.

Smart Shoppers plan in advance, like managers of corporations. They know which foods are plentiful and what current prices should be; they know a good buy when they see one on the shelves. A week of menus written down in advance can mean more money for the piggy-bank. Left-overs become planned-for centers of future meals, rather than accidents. Quantity buying at "Best Buy" prices means extra dollars at the end of the month.

And, knowing how to properly cook the food you buy is another way to save money. Why pay Papa's hard-earned cash for those deep-green outer leaves of romaine if you throw away that precious Vitamin A? Don't buy Grade A peaches for a cobbler, you're wasting money; do spend a few extra cents for them when you're making a salad—it's good showmanship. Why toss vitamin-filled liquid from canned peas down the drain? Vitamins show a "profit" for your shopping.

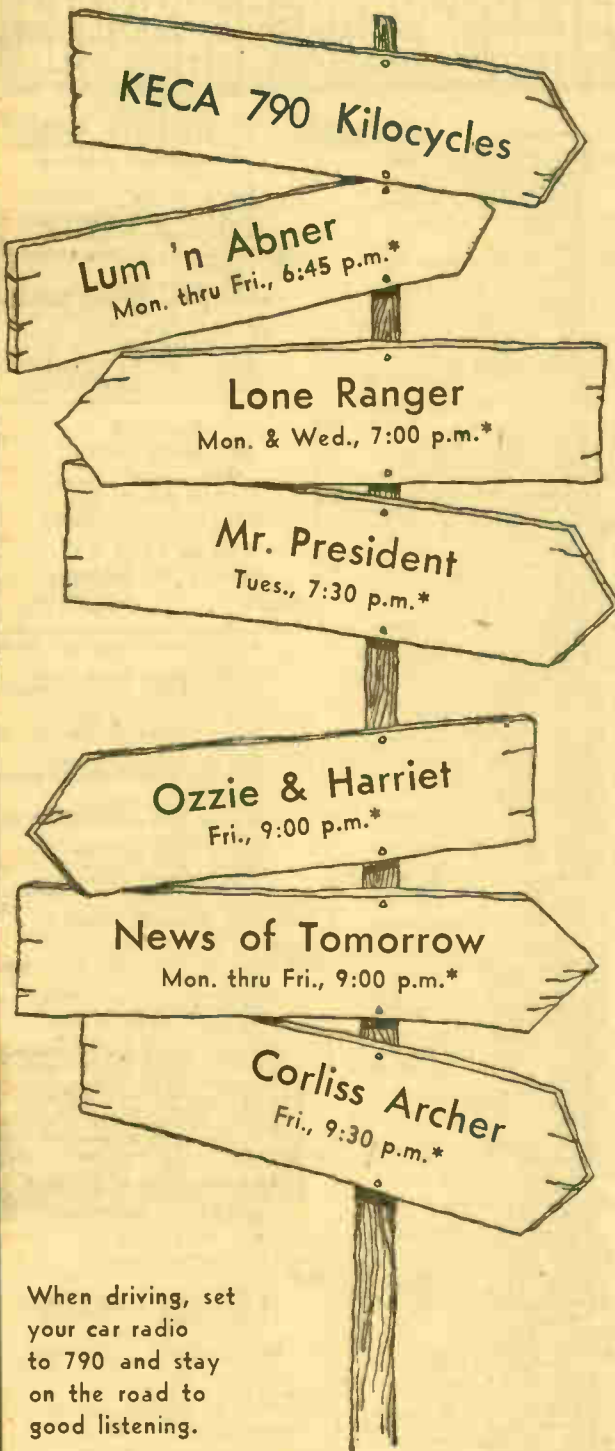

45 EXTENDED PLAY SELECTIONS: New to this space-saving series are two great volumes by Dinah Shore "Singing the Blues" (RCA-Victor). If you like Dinah (and who doesn't?), wait'll you hear her doin' what comes naturally in "Moanin' Low," "Memphis Blues," and others comprising the eight selections in blue mood. . . . **Doris Day** (Columbia) also has a double-header in songs from her new picture, "By the Light of the Silvery Moon." Its title should give you a clue as to the vintage of "Ain't We Got Fun?," "If You Were the Only Girl" and a half dozen more given the usual fine Decca styling. . . . Decca also enters the field with sixteen new EP's featuring its top names. Especially good are those by **Bing Crosby**, **Mills Brothers**, **Tommy Dorsey** and **Victor Young** singing and playing the most popular songs each has ever recorded.



LP ALBUMS: Tops in this series is the recorded version of "Arthur Godfrey's TV Calendar Show" (Columbia). This is the only recording which features his entire cast on one long-playing record: The Mariners, Marlon Marlowe, Frank Parker, Haleloke, The Chordettes, Janette Davis, Julius La Rosa, Lu Ann Simms, Tony Marvin and Arthur Godfrey. If you remember the show, each member of the cast sang a song about a different month—original songs written for this TV program by Joan Edwards and Lyn Duddy. Here is fine entertainment which need not be seen to be appreciated. . . . Again available on LP is Decca's famous "Five Feet of Swing." Featuring the great bands of yesterday, headed by Bob Crosby, Jimmy Dorsey, Glen Gray, Chick Webb, and the Dorsey Brothers, outstanding swing classics like "South Rampart Street Parade," "Weary Blues," "Hallelujah," "I Cried for You," and "Sleepy Time Gal" seem to have mellowed with the years since they were first recorded. Sure, it's dated music—but there's nothing new today that can compare with its beat.

BEST SINGLE RECORDS: Peggy Lee (Decca) turns in her best for this label in a long time on "Sorry Baby, You Let My Love Get Cold." To excellent backing by Dave Barbour's band, Peg shouts the blues in righteous New Orleans fashion like she's never done before. . . . **Les Paul & Mary Ford** (Capitol) could have another winner in "I'm Sitting on Top of the World," for it's a combination of the right tempo, good material and fine performance instrumentally and vocally by The Pauls.—A.M.

AFTER MORE than twenty-two years in broadcasting, the fabulous and almost legendary Arthur Godfrey has become one of the best-known, best-loved and most-listened-to and seen personalities on the air. He is responsible for \$15,000,000 in annual billings for CBS and CBS-TV.

Godfrey, host to diplomats and statesmen, has come a long, hard way since he made his radio debut in 1929 on an amateur program in Baltimore. His penchant for ribbing commercials started with his very first one, a pitch for a pet shop. He was billed as "Red Godfrey, the Warbling Banjoist," and received \$5 a performance.

The man with the freckles was born in 1903 in New York and was reared in Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey. His father was a newspaper and magazine writer. Family reverses sent young Godfrey on his own at the age of fifteen. Following a hit-and-miss career of odd jobs, he enlisted in the Navy. His career in the Navy is a story in itself. He is now in the Naval Reserve and his periodic trips to Pensacola, Florida, for Naval duty are noted by his absence from the airwaves.

Godfrey developed an interest in playing the ukulele and learning how to fly during his early enlistment. Captain Eddie Rickenbacker says: "Arthur has done more to make

the public air-minded than any single person since Lindbergh."

During his more than 4000 flying hours, he has piloted many types of planes, from single-seaters to jets and multi-engine transports. He owns and flies a DC-3 (converted) and a Navion.

Godfrey is married to the former Mary Bourke, has a daughter, Pat, and two sons, Dick and Mike. Farmer Godfrey lives on a 1700-acre farm in Virginia. He is five feet eleven inches tall, weighs 180 pounds, has blue eyes and red hair. In 1931 Godfrey suffered forty-seven fractures in an automobile accident. It took him years to learn to walk again unaided. Today he flies planes, rides horses and even ice-skates.

FRANK PARKER

Anyone who ever listened to a radio remembers the name and glorious voice of Frank Parker. About two years ago, television lured the semi-retired Parker back to New York. His old friend Godfrey opened the TV door to the former singing star. After Parker had made a few guest performances, Godfrey decided that a permanent berth on the show belonged to the tenor.

Brought up on Manhattan's lower West Side, Parker began singing in a neighborhood church choir. His father wanted him to be an engineer, but singing won out. After studying at Italy's famed Milan Conservatory, Parker crashed Broadway as a chorus boy. Subsequent appearances in vaudeville, musical comedy, movies and radio followed.

The handsome, affable tenor can sing operatic arias or sentimental ballads. He's lost none of his golden musical touch. Fan mail attests to that.

MARION MARLOWE

Twenty-three-year-old Marion Marlowe has been performing since she was five. Despite her early start, there was a time when Miss Marlowe thought she would try for a career in medicine.

Latin conjugations in a St. Louis high school proved too much for the aspiring doctor, so she settled on a theatrical career. Light opera, little theater, radio, modeling and exhibition ballroom dancing are all part of her extensive background. The late Atwater Kent was her patron. But her biggest break occurred when Arthur Godfrey caught her one-night engagement at a Florida hotel. It catapulted her to TV fame, and she is making the most of it.

Godfrey was so impressed that he promised the young sailor a job after his discharge from the Navy. Godfrey was as good as his word and today La Rosa is a member of the "court."

Julius was born in Brooklyn, New York, twenty-three years ago. Aside from singing at family social functions, he has had no formal musical training. However, he became an ardent fan of the modern-singing greats, Crosby, Como and Sinatra, and evolved his own style by listening to their records.

His favorite songs are "Don't Take Your Love From Me" and "Embraceable You." That's natural, because those are the numbers he sang for Commander Godfrey in Pensacola.

La Rosa hasn't time for hobbies, but he is an ardent Brooklyn Dodger fan. Romantic interest? Nothing serious so far.

THE MARINERS

The Mariners are four former U. S. Coast Guardsmen... Thomas Lockard, James O. Lewis, Martin Karl and Nathaniel Dickerson.

Thomas Lockard originally planned a career as a pianist, but soon forsook the keyboard for voice lessons, and majored in music at UCLA. He has sung on concert tours, on radio and with the Los Angeles Opera Company. He is married and has two children.

James O. Lewis made his first stage appearance as a vocalist at the age of three. After graduating from Talladega College, he went to New

York for a musical career, appeared with Bill Robinson in "The Hot Mikado," played the Ruban Bleu and Cafe Society night clubs. He is married.

Martin Karl was brought up in the Ozark Mountain region of South Missouri. He studied violin as a child, played leads in high-school musicals. He studied voice and appeared with the Chicago Opera Company. He is married, has had three children.

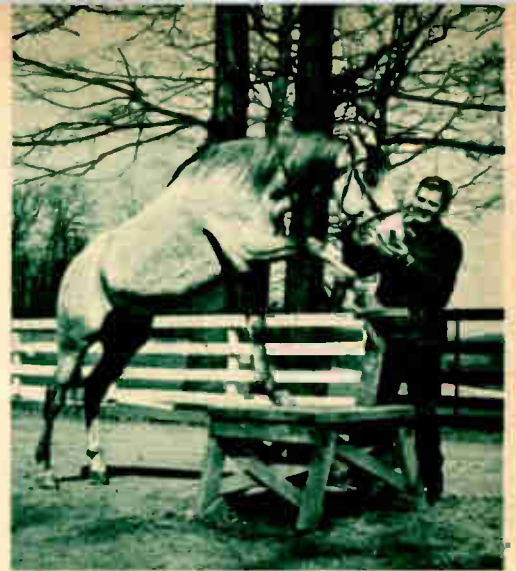

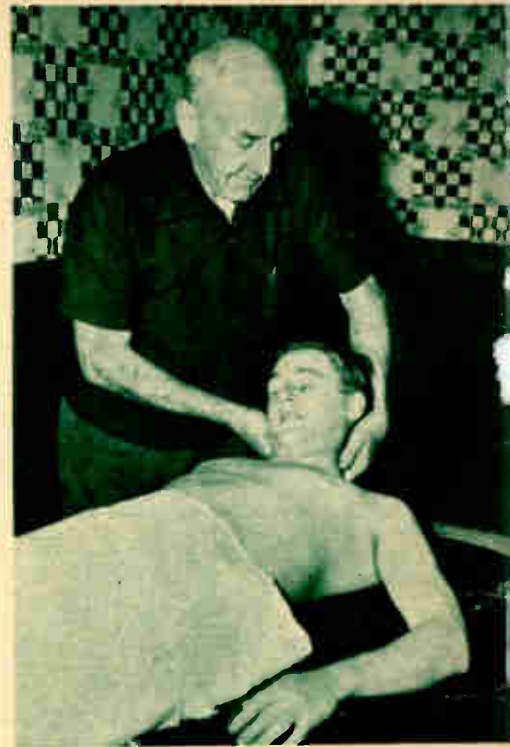

He Won't Let TV Get Him Down!

Alan Young Has Formulated a Mental and Physical Regimen For Keeping Himself Healthy

▲ **ALAN YOUNG**, worn to a frazzle when concluding his last TV series, has vowed not to let his new "Time to Smile" teleshow take its toll. Daily workouts are topped with a relaxing massage.

DOES TV take ten years off a performer's life? Alan Young says yes: it can literally take ten physical years if the performer is pushing himself too hard and it can, through its voracious appetite, devour and debilitate material which in other mediums like vaudeville or radio could roll on merrily for many years. In fact, regular appearances on TV can seriously impair the movie career of a performer working in both expressions.

Until affable Alan started his new series on CBS-TV, alternating Sundays with Ken Murray, he had not been viewed on TV screens for almost two years. As you may recall, the young Canadian's amusing tele-show a few seasons back came to a rather sad finale with Alan near collapse.

"I'll never again try to do TV and make movies at the same time," he emphasized recently. "I was getting on the set every morning, seven days a week, at 6 o'clock and had to be made up by 6:30. Usually I got to bed the next morning at 1:00. A half hour for dinner was no good. On top of being tired out, I had two falls while working on a picture." No wonder he almost cracked up!

Regimen

To bring himself back physically, Alan started working out a minimum of three days every week at the Hollywood Athletic Club. It was usually oftener than this and a minimum of an hour and a half a day. Lots of swimming and sunning helped, too.

Just before he began his new TV series, Alan had the family doctor look him over. "I'm in perfect shape," he reported. What's more, he doesn't have to do a show every week. The first one was filmed, but from there

on out the situation comedy will be done live so that any wrinkles in the format can be smoothed out at once. (If several shows were filmed in advance, Alan points out, it would take weeks before correction could be made.)

What he will do after the end of this season's short nine-week cycle is yet undetermined. Sponsor Bristol-Myers bought him so fast Alan didn't even have a format worked out, so it's to be assumed the company was sold on Alan Young regardless. But aside from sponsor ties, Alan has a five-year contract with CBS-TV, so we may expect to see a lot of him. If he has his way, it will be every week. "I don't think you can build an audience any other way," he said positively. But he also believes that the best way to do a

weekly teleshow is on film. Time required for filming or doing a show live is about the same, but there's a big difference in the strain and consequent effect on a star's health.

"What's happened to Red Skelton shouldn't happen to anyone," Young observed with distress. "I just don't believe in weekly live TV shows. The only way I'd do them would be if I was really hungry. So if you ever see me on that way, you'll know why."

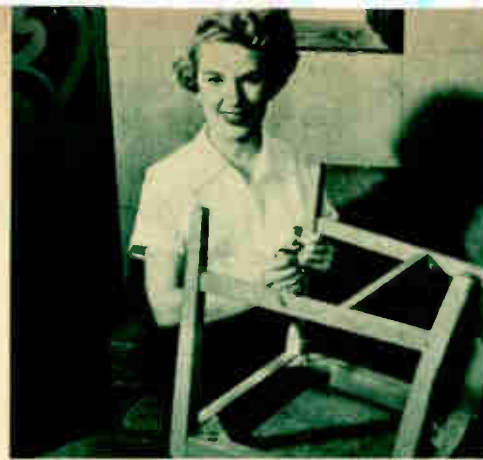
