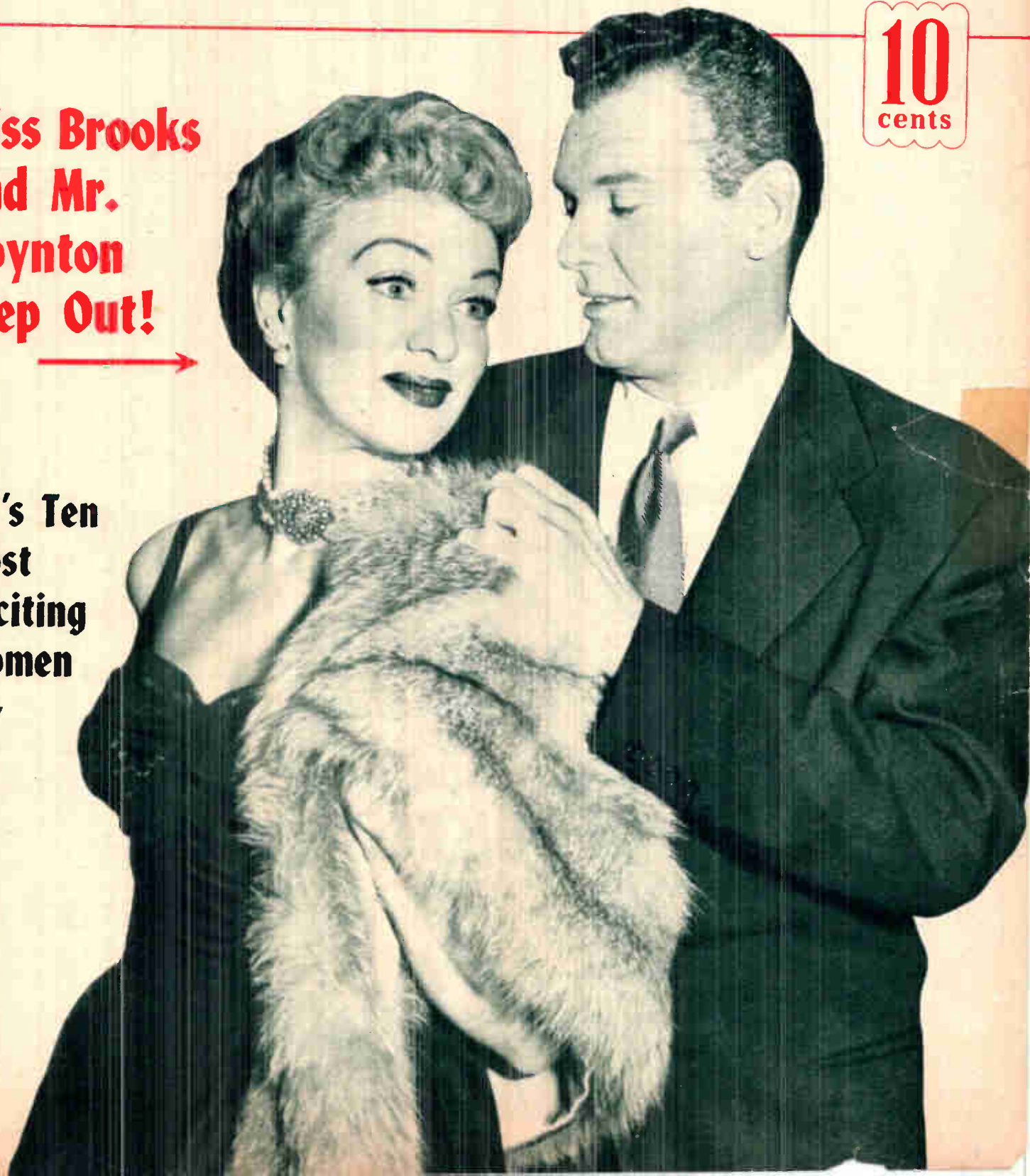

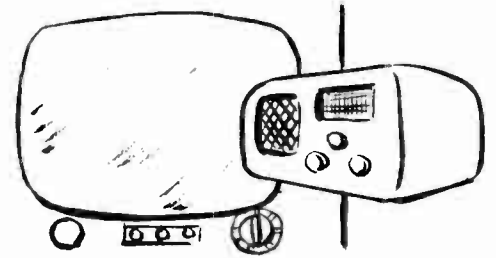

Upside-Down Day

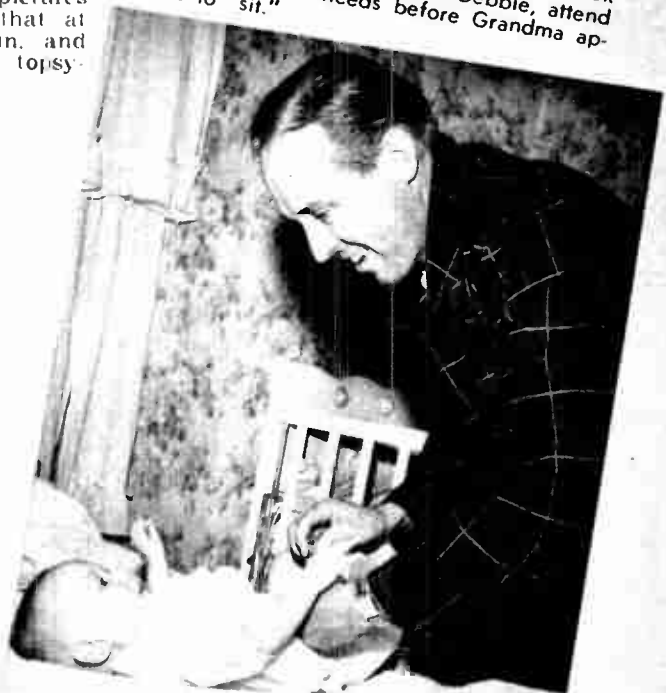

TV's Ten Most Exciting Women



I'VE ALWAYS said I'd never be put in a spot where I had to choose the ten most exciting women in television or in anything else, so here I am doing it. All of which proves that I must like to be in the middle of a hot controversy.

1. DINAH SHORE. To be brief and to the point, Dinah is the kind of person with whom I—or any man—would like to settle down on an island. Few women have such a warm personality, such real gentility, and sincere humility. And her voice! Well, Dinah has just about everything.

2. MARTHA RAYE. I've known Martha for years—ever since 1933. I met her when she was singing at the Chez Paree Restaurant in Chicago and we've been good friends from that day to this. Martha is a great

performer. She can sing a straight song and tear your heart out and then turn right around and have you howling with laughter at a comedy number. She is also an expert dramatic actress, something few people realize. Martha can do anything—period. Not many women have her terrific vitality—and few women have legs as beautiful as hers. Martha is what the word "exciting" means.

3. EVE ARDEN. Eve and I were stars together in a "Ziegfeld Follies" on Broadway some years back. As a performer, she is one of the most dependable actresses I know. She has a wonderful way of timing a joke, and the careful way she builds to a big laugh is something to see. As a person Eve has always kept her head and has never been flighty. She has something else that is intriguing to all men—a very real sophistication. In addition, she wears clothes beautifully, so with all those qualities it's no wonder Eve is a striking personality.

4. LUCILLE BALL. Where Eve is dependable, Lucy, God love her, is undependable—as far as knowing how she's going to react when you meet her. She's something of a hearty pixie and always a delight,

but how she can confuse you! Once, some years ago, I made a joke about her red hair. At the time she laughed at the crack, but six months later I saw her again and the first thing she said was, "That was a mean thing you said." "What are you talking about?" I asked her. "Don't act like you don't know," she went on. "A fine joke—that was." After going around and around for a long time she finally said, "You know what I mean—that crack you made about my hair!" I reminded her that that was six months ago, but it made little difference. This is her way of carrying on a joke and it certainly keeps you on your toes. But Lucy will always be, to me, one of the most provocative and completely natural women I've ever met. No wonder millions of Americans love her, too.

5. ROSALIND RUSSELL. All right, so Roz has only done two TV shows—but she was great on those. And she should be on television more. She has one of the biggest talents in show business. She can write, direct, act—oh, you name it. She's also a wonderful friend, with all the qualities that make a woman exciting. I worked with Roz in many pictures and she has the least "ham"

in her of anyone I've ever known. She never tries to take a scene from an actor. In fact, even if she's told to play it in such a way that she will get the most attention, she'll say, "No, that's his scene. It's not mine." Believe me, this is a rare thing. No one could be happier over her success on Broadway in "Wonderful Town" than I am. Roz deserves the best that can come to anyone.

6. JULIE BISHOP. You may think I put Julie on my list because she's with me on "My Hero," but that is not the reason. Julie has never been given the chance in show business she really deserves, considering her talent and her physical attributes. She has one of the most terrific figures on the screen. In addition, she's an excellent actress. She's what is known as a "one-take" artist in that she never makes a mistake in a scene. She keeps me hopping on the set! Yet, for all her glamour, she is at heart a homebody. You should see her run home and take care of her three children, and how she can cook! Any woman who is that domestic and yet has the face and figure of a real glamour girl is really exciting! Not to mention how very loyal she is as a friend. Julie is a woman you can trust at all times. I'm proud she's my friend.

7. ROSEMARY CLOONEY. I've been meaning to write a letter to this vibrant young lady to tell her how great she is, but since I've never gotten around to it this will have to do. As a singer, Rosemary has sensational diction plus a warm—even torrid—personality. She is also, as far as I'm concerned, one of the sexiest singers in the business. Rosemary seems to epitomize the vitality and enthusiasm of youth.

8. GRACIE ALLEN. I've known Gracie for a long time and consider her just about the most wonderful mixture of a female you can get—a nice figure, a beautiful face, a vital, warm and lovable human being. Gracie has a couple of rare traits—I've never heard her say a

cutting word against anyone, not even for a joke, and she is always interested in *you*. She hardly ever says anything about herself, and yet she is one of the best conversationalists I've ever known. Don't let the nitwit character she plays fool you. Gracie is a brilliant woman—and an exciting one.

9. HARRIET NELSON. Harriet seems to typify the wonderful and patient type of glamorous mother every mother would like to be. She's the understanding mate to her husband, the tolerant mother to her boys. All women want to have glamour to go along with their domestic roles, and Harriet has managed to retain a very real femininity both on her TV show and at home. This alone makes her a stand-out.

10. JOAN DAVIS. Joan is a woman who manages to be both sexy and funny. She is not just a comedienne, for she can sing and dance, and can do dramatic roles with ease. She's also a deeply religious woman. Probably her outstanding trait is her serious approach to her work. She'll do anything for her job. And yet she had a hard time getting started. I'll never forget her first part in a picture since I happened to be in that one brief scene with her. Ray McCarey was directing this picture and he had wanted to use Joan in a small part, but no one would listen to him. So one day he smuggled her into the studio, brought her on the set as a visitor, and then had make-up hurriedly put on her. He shut the scene quickly and got her off the set the minute it was over. No one at the studio caught on until the rushes were seen. Joan was so good in that one bit that she was left in the picture. And that's how Joan's career was launched. Some day this town will recognize her as more than just a comedienne.

Now you may start throwing your brickbats. I've named the ten women—and I'm glad.

Moments That Changed My Life

I HERE HAVE been several moments that have changed my life—and the first was the day the doctor told me I'd never walk again.

I had gone to New York to try to get in a show. I managed to land a spot in the chorus of a musical but it wasn't long before I was out again and with no job in sight. After haunting agents and managers I finally decided to forget show business and concentrate on modeling. This proved to be the right move at the time and before long I was doing rather well as a model.

Then one night I was in a very bad automobile accident. In the hospital the doctor told me he doubted if I'd ever walk again. I can still remember lying there in that bed, thinking despondently of the trick Fate had played on me. For a while I was ready to give up, but my mother immediately began goading me on, telling me over and over that I could walk again if I wanted to. It took some time, but eventually I readjusted my mental processes to the point where I was determined to prove that doctor wrong. I was *not* going to be defeated.

This was the moment when I faced a few facts and found that in every-one there are vast quantities of courage if they are sufficiently tapped.

The next change in my life came when I was chosen to be one of the Goldwyn Girls. One girl got cold feet as she was ready to leave for Hollywood to appear with the girls in Eddie Cantor's "Roman Scandals" and a friend advised me to apply immediately for the vacancy. I did and got the part.

It was while working on this picture that I began to realize I could perhaps be a comedienne. A girl was needed to put on blackface for a short scene and I agreed to do it. Eddie Cantor, the star, seemed impressed by the fact I wasn't afraid to get my face dirty, or was it because I could scream real loud?

Probably the most significant moment was the day I met Desi. I was making the picture "Too Many Girls," and Desi was the star. George Abbott, the producer, introduced us on the set and at the time I remem-

ber thinking, "This is the kind of man I'd want to marry." After a few days, Desi did ask me for a date—and added casually he wanted to teach me to rumba.

He took me to a Spanish restaurant on our first date and we didn't dance at all. We just sat and talked for hours. It wasn't until some time later we got around to the dancing.

Nothing happened on the romance score until after the picture. Desi had gone back to New York to do some shows and I later went East on personal appearances. I was met at the plane by a reporter who wanted to interview me and we went to my hotel for what turned out to be a very long interview. I'd been in my room only a short time when Desi called, asking to see me. I told him I was busy so he said he'd come by at eleven that evening after his show—which he did.

The reporter was still there so Desi and I took her home. On the way back to my hotel Desi suddenly said he wanted to marry me. This was music to my ears, but instead of going all gaga I said, "Pull over to the curb and let's talk about this." He was all for getting married right away but I thought we ought to wait a little. So—we went to Byram River near Greenwich, Connecticut, and were married that night.

The justice of the peace was a wonderful person. He insisted we had to have a celebration of some kind so he took us to the Byram

River Country Club for a champagne breakfast.

Marriage definitely gave meaning to my life. There is no life without someone around with whom to share all the joys and sorrows. Both Desi and I regarded our marriage so seriously we were married again later at the Our Lady of the Valley Church in San Fernando.

Our married life, however, was mainly one of separation for several years with my doing pictures in Hollywood and Desi's touring all over the country. We finally decided that our home was more important and that we had to find some way to work and yet be together. Among the ideas we considered was a TV show.

One morning while flying over the Los Angeles Airport after returning from a tour we had made together, we decided that the time had come for us to make the decision. We would not be separated any more, we would do a TV show, and we'd sink or swim from there on in. That was the beginning of a memorable moment in our lives. That was the start of "I Love Lucy."

Naturally, the birth of our babies was something that made our home and our lives *complete*. With them the cycle is complete.

When I think of these moments I am reminded again of the great blessings God has bestowed on me. I am a very grateful—and a very humble—woman.

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Around TV Row

The ink is dry, and the "Colgate Comedy Hour" will be back on NBC next season for thirty-five programs. Newcomer to the lineup is Jimmy Durante, who thus far is the only personality who was "salvaged" from the ill-fated "All-Star Revue." . . . Rex Marshall replaces John Beal as emcee on "Freedom Rings." . . . Walter H. Nelson, a dock foreman, was picked as President's double. He will be seen on an upcoming "Saturday Night Revue" skit over NBC. . . . Picture commitments caused Robert Cummings to cancel his trip to the Coronation. . . . Nick Slavich, owner of Nickodell's restaurant, can tell you more stories about radio and TV personalities in this town than anyone we know. He has watched the rise and fall of many celebrities during his thirty-five years of restaurantering. . . . KTLA has an exclusive for all telecasts from the eighth Annual Los Angeles Home Show at the Pan Pacific Auditorium, June 4-14. Bill Stewart, KMPC, will originate a daily broadcast from the Auditorium. . . . Arthur Godfrey's recuperation is being hastened by "get-well greetings" from another network. Several ABC stations beamed messages to him which said in effect: "We all miss you, Arthur. Hurry up and get well and back on the job." . . . Felix Jackson takes over the CBS-TV "Studio One" producer reins.

Summer replacements are coming fast and furious: "The Goldbergs" are set for the Dennis Day spot, and "Break the Bank" with Bert Parks takes over the Milton Berle time slot. . . . U. S. Steel makes its TV sponsorship debut this fall with a one-hour weekly dramatic program to be pro-

duced by the Theatre Guild, producers of U. S. Steel's radio show for the past eight years. . . . Talent for the Ford Anniversary show grows daily. Inked thus far are Mary Martin, Ethel Merman, Marian Anderson, Edward R. Murrow, Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll (creators of "Amos 'n' Andy"), Oscar Hammerstein II, Lowell Thomas and puppet "Ollie." . . . Academy winner Ray Milland bows on a TV-radio show, "Meet Mr. McNutley" via CBS next September. It's a domestic-comedy format with Ray as an instructor at a girls' school. Cast includes Phyllis Avery, Gordon Jones, Verna Felton (as "Miss Bradley" on the radio version), and Minerva Urecal (as the TV "Miss Bradley").—M.R.

Palladium Veteran

A long-time favorite on radio and TV (especially working with Bob Hope), Les Brown and his orchestra return to the Palladium this week.

The famed Hollywood ballroom is not a strange place to Les and his crew. This is the fourteenth engagement that he has made at the Sunset Boulevard dance hall.

If you don't get a chance to see Les in person, you can watch him on TV, Sunday at 8 p.m. at the "Palladium Party." The ideal solution would be to do both.

Montebello Charity

Despite their heavy film schedule for their TV show, Lucy and Desi Arnaz went to bat last week for Montebello Police Show. They made a special rush film and inserted it in their Monday night program.

They donated \$150 for tickets for orphans to attend the Montebello Police Show, June 25-27. The purpose of the program is to raise money for a twenty-two-acre recreational center. Many big-name stars will attend. In-

spector Harry Powell and Lieut. Robert Scott of Montebello are handling the benefit.

Swing-Shift TV

The first regularly scheduled live television show after midnight in the nation, "The Circus Gardens Show," aimed at the more than 400,000 swing-shifters, plus the stay-up-laters, in Los Angeles, began last Saturday on KTTV (11) from midnight until 2:00 a.m. direct from Harry Schooler's fabulous Circus Gardens, Ocean Park.

All the excitement of a circus, complete with clowns, elephants and a circus band; the glamour of an extravaganza on ice; and the smooth sophistication of a Broadway revue are offered in the "Circus Gardens" telecasts. Harry Ranch's orchestra plays for jitterbug dancing.

Harry Schooler, general manager of the ballroom, divides welcoming duties with KTTV's Roy Maypole.

3-D TV

Development of a new television receiving set designed to give viewers an image with a third-dimensional effect was announced recently.

To be called Douglas Tri-D, the set is the culmination of more than twenty-six years work by D. J. Roesch in the electronics field.

The new set has a twenty-nine-inch tube and produces an image unique in depth detail. Roesch realistically indicates that his receiver does not give the feeling of spears hurtling out of screens at viewers.

"True third-dimension television, as in motion pictures, can only be achieved at present with double images and glasses," he said.

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

BY JACK HOLLAND

Subscription TV continues to be the most controversial issue in TV. Among the latest developments was David Sarnoff's claim that television needs no box office. Then came the abrupt cancellation by an NBC station in Memphis of a speech on subscription TV that was to be made by Millard Fought, who is associated with the Phonvision process.

H. C. Bonfig, vice president of Zenith Radio Corporation, answered Sarnoff's charges by stating that TV does need a cash box in the home and made the charge that subscription is the only way for the public to see all the things that television is now technically ready to bring to the home. Bonfig claims that "20,000,000 persons will be without television or will be relegated to the 'fringe areas.'" His reason for this statement is simply that there is not enough advertising money to support TV stations in hundreds of small cities. These stations could, however, Bonfig claims, become paying ventures with subscription-TV revenue supplementing the money earned from advertisers.

Following on the heels of the cancellation of Fought's speech, a charge was made that subscription TV would be too great a threat to motion-picture theatres. He answered this by saying, "Theatres can meet the threat of a home-TV box office by harnessing the very force that is now threatening

their existence—TV—and turning it into a useful asset . . . it is 'free' rather than 'fee' television which is the basic threat . . . the first thing that home box-office TV will do is provide the revenue to assure better product. It will do it by multiplying the total market for movies two to four times. . . . Producers should then be able to produce many more and far better films. These better films will obviously be merchandised in such a manner that they are not competing simultaneously in the same markets in theatres and on subscription TV. The theatres may very well have the first crack at this superior product."

And so the battle wages. Personally, this column rides along with the theories advanced by Bonfig and Fought. How do you feel about Subscription TV?

Boomerang: Understand O. L. Jagers, operator of that religious program, told his audience not to read TV-Radio Life because of an item in this column a few weeks back about those philosophies expounded on his show. Well, O. L., ole boy, thanks for the plug. We've had many commendatory calls from people asking for that particular issue. As for your added charge that this column was appropriately named because I was a Red, as you claim, it's a rather dangerous thing to go around putting tags on

Does' Your Diamond Salesman Have Oily Hair?

By Frederick Orme

A cute trick employed by unscrupulous jewelers and their salespeople is the one referred to as "fogging" a diamond. Let's suppose you order an inexpensive diamond ring and the salesman brings it out to your home. He pulls it out of his briefcase and shows it to you.

You look, the diamond is nice enough, but . . . before he entered the door of your home, chances are the salesman took his fingers and rubbed them first on his oily hair, then rubbed them over the diamond. This cuts down the natural luster of the stone, and when the salesman goes

into his pitch he brings out another diamond that sells for perhaps four or five times as much which hasn't had the treatment, and it shows up by comparison with the "fogged" diamond as being of considerably greater value. He'll tell you that the "fogged" diamond is a commercial type diamond, thus it is an inferior stone not as rare, not as costly.

One moment though . . . In many cases, that "fogged" diamond is every bit as valuable as the other one. As a matter of fact, in the cases we investigated, the "fogged" diamond was a pretty good buy for the price. Obviously, the trick is to get you to pay more for the same stone. Does your jeweler have oily hair?

While on the subject of jewelry, we ask you to not fall for the "mystery" tune gimmick wherein you get a free diamond for naming the tune. The "free diamonds" are chip diamonds that cost the jeweler as little as 40c each and the charge he makes for setting that chip diamond in a ring is usually far above the price a reliable jeweler would get for the same merchandise. "Free" merchandise is free only when there are no strings or additional costs of any kind attached.

SCIENTIFIC EXPEDITIONS: The lure of the unknown can mean your downfall if you fall for the "expedition" gag. Watch out for the promoter who promises a trip to foreign lands to search for fabulous treasure, or who is organizing an expedition to make a motion picture of a strange tribe of people never before seen by the white race, or who intends to write a book about his adventures for publication. Treasure maps can be faked, the strange tribes are usually non-existent, and you'd better be sure the publisher has an interest too before you invest your money.

MAGAZINES: If we ever run across a magazine salesman who comes right out and states that he is selling magazine subscriptions for a living, we'll certainly patronize him. But we have a violent dislike for the so-called "salesman" who tries to get your order by manufacturing the saddest story he can think of to get your order. The "working my way through college" gag, the "supporting my invalid child" routine, and other distasteful methods employed by these characters make it hard on legitimate salespeople who try to sell on a basis of merit and quality of merchandise offered.

GARDEN CHECK LIST

ONE: Plan for better fall flowers by cutting back chrysanthemums now. They get scraggly without care, and occasional trimming makes sturdy bushes. Come August, remove half or more of the buds to insure the biggest and best flowers. Feed them once a month with an all-round plant food, and keep them moist.

TWO: Ants are bothersome—but now you can control them with a high-powered chlordane spray, that also eliminates pesky lawn moths and prevents germination of crabgrass seed—all in one application. One or two treatments of C-45 and the lawn is neat, clean and trouble-free.

THREE: Extra space in back? How about small watermelons like the nine-pound Baby Klondike or the two-and-a-half-pound New Hampshire Midget? They need a hot climate. Plant in hills, eight feet apart.

NOTES FROM THE HOME FRONT

It's mosquito-breeding time in swampland . . . unless you do something about stagnant water. Stock ponds with tiny gambusia affinis, the insect-eating fish the L.A. Health Department offers free!

Look for a big jump in sales of both air conditioners and evaporative coolers. Actually, the lower-priced evaporative coolers do an excellent job in dry southland areas. An attic installation is a week-end job for the average handyman, and can mean new summer comfort.

Barbecues can be dangerous! Accidents have been reported recently, when fire-starting liquids exploded when being lighted. Accidents at home are nearly as numerous as on the highways—make yours a happy summer!

Wood outdoors is subject to rot unless it is protected with more than paint. Creosote isn't used because you can't paint over it. Instead, a "penta" or "copper naphthenate" solution is in favor. It preserves and makes a good paint base. Use it on fences, outdoor furniture, ladders, steps and any spot where wood touches the ground or is exposed.

Record Notes to You

NOTHING BUT GOOD, MAN! . . . Yes, I said it and I'm glad, for Columbia's contribution to Benny's discophiles is just that! All this commotion on platters started out with the issuing of Benny Goodman's **Carnegie Hall Jazz Concert of 1938**. So great was the demand for this complete concert by the King of Swing's greatest band that initial orders kept the shelves empty for months. And Benny's fans of yesterday were not disappointed with the product when it appeared.



With a lineup that included James, Elman, Krupa, Stacy, Hampton, Basie, Wilson and umpteen more jazz greats who participated, how could they be? The success of that first album prompted the release of **Jazz Concert No. 2** by Columbia. These selections were gleaned from a

treasure of 1937-38 remote dance broadcasts that had been privately recorded by a Goodman fan of that era and feature Benny's great organization "that couldn't get anywhere because they never played waltzes!" Once more the rush was on and this second edition took its rightful place along with the first in popularity. Many thought the Benny Goodman story on records was now complete, until the third item appeared—the famous **Goodman Trio**. Benny, Teddy Wilson and Gene Krupa hadn't played

together for thirteen years, but in 1951 they heard that one of the arrangers responsible for Goodman's success was ill and without funds. Once more this great trio got together in a jazz concert and played as they did of old for the **Fletcher Henderson Fund**. . . . Fortunately it was recorded, and is now available on Columbia for the thousands who liked Benny's small combos. This week three more intensely interesting chapters from the Goodman story were added. The first is an Extended Play version of four selections from the early forties when **Benny Goodman Presents Peggy Lee**—his band vocalist at that time; second item is an album of twelve killer-dillers of the late thirties and all great **Fletcher Henderson** arrangements of "Honeysuckle Rose," "Somebody Stole My Gal," "Frenesi," "Just You, Just Me," "Night and Day," "Crazy Rhythm," "Stealin' Apples," "Henderson Stomp," "Can't You Tell?" and others with Helen Ward vocals. Finally, to wind up the Goodman saga (or will there be more?) there's another album of a dozen **Eddie Sauter** arrangements of the forties—"Moonlight on the Ganges," "More Than You Know," "Ramona," "Love Walked In," "Tangerine," "Superman," etc.

I can always remember, as a little boy back East, picking (and eating) blueberries. In fact, I would pick a few quarts, sell them to my mother, and then eat all the pies she made. I couldn't lose. This is her recipe, and I hope you will like it as well as I do.

Blueberry Pie

- 1 quart blueberries
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 double crust nine-inch shortening pastry recipe

Wash blueberries. Add flour, sugar and lemon juice, and put into a bowl. Roll pastry for crust 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured board, then turn into pie plate, cutting steam vents near the center. Turn berries into lower shell; then roll out upper crust and place over berries. Seal edges together. Flute the edge of the crust. Bake in a moderately hot oven (425 degrees) for fifteen minutes, then reduce to moderate heat (350 degrees) for twenty-five minutes. Cool on shelf.

One of Channel 5's veteran announcers will be missing this week. And for a good reason. He is going to New York and then Denver for a periodic medical checkup.

This story actually begins twenty-three years ago on a polo field. The KTLA personality had no intention then of becoming an announcer. He wanted to be a doctor. He had finished his pre-med courses and was in his second year at the medical school at the University of Colorado.



Polo was one of his favorite sports. One afternoon in September, 1930, during a match between the University of Colorado and the University of Arizona at the Cherry Hills Country Club in Denver, tragedy struck.

Galloping at full speed, the saddle slipped from the horse of the youthful rider. Like a helpless toy he was flung to the ground. The pounding iron hoofs dug deep into his abdomen. His stomach was ripped wide open.

In six years this young man grew old. For six long, lonely years he endured the torture and deprivation that only the sick and disabled can know.

For two years he was a semi-invalid. Both legs were paralyzed. The doctors told him he would never walk again. But he wouldn't—couldn't accept defeat.

His back yard was bounded by a flat-surfaced five-foot fence. Day after day, he rolled his wheel chair close to the fence. Then, painfully, he hoisted himself upward and, inch by inch, pushed himself with his feet alongside the fence. Slowly the strength came back to the limbs. He was able to walk again.

However, his stomach was still badly mangled. By various operations, he had lost over twenty feet of his intestines. He was unable to eat any bulky foods.

At this time, a special doctors' conference was being held in Denver. A group of about forty surgeons became interested in and studied this unusual case.

Finally, the famed Dr. Charles Mayo performed a colostomy in one of the rarest operations ever attempted. It was a success.

Today this man leads a normal, healthy life. Watching him daily on Channel 5 and on "The Magazine of the Week," one would never guess the tremendous ordeal he went through during those six years.

The main reason people want to lose weight is based on vanity. The girls want to drop ten or fifteen pounds so that they will look trimmer in a bathing suit. The men would like to get rid of twenty pounds in order to eliminate the big bulge over the top of their belts.

This is one of the biggest fallacies in reducing. The true reason for losing excess poundage should be for greater health and longevity.

Regarding my weight-losing campaign the worst untruth circulated by people who knew nothing about my personal life was the tale that this was primarily a "publicity" stunt. This fanciful accusation has no sound basis. My physician ordered me to take off from ninety to one hundred pounds—and as fast as possible.

Many kind folks wrote wishing me luck, but expressing concern over the advisability of losing ninety pounds in ninety days. I discussed this with my doctor, who said that losing weight fast was not injurious to health if you do not overtax your body with vigorous exercises.

The main cause of harmful effects from rapid reducing is overtaxing your strength. The vast supply of energy consumed by carrying a lot of excess baggage on you becomes stored up in your body yelling for action. It burns up a lot of strength to carry fat around.

In my case I wanted to go out and play fifty-four holes of golf or get up a game of softball with some neighborhood kids, or lift some weights.

But my doctor said do one thing at a time. When you're losing weight don't try to do anything else. In all truthfulness going all out on not doing any extra is the advice I follow easiest. I had a good excuse for cancelling all my Sunday afternoon contracting jobs around the yard.

My wife hid the golf clubs, and I loaded up the weights and took them to my nephew's for the duration.

Now however, the exciting TV camera is beginning to make Donald toe the line. He has never missed a TV cue.
