Weather Man's Lament

TV's Gene Bollay reveals some interesting facts about a meteorologist's problems . . .

IF YOU THINK you have your problems, pause a moment and consider those of the weather man, who like the mother-in-law, is the brunt of many gags," says KECA-TV's Gene Bollay.

"Sure we make mistakes," he admits, "but more often we are right than wrong. I like to remember my spectacular forecasts rather than my fluffs. But to maintain a happy balance I'll let you in on both.

"My most spectacular forecast was in 1938 when I predicted a storm of such magnitude that it foretold the danger of flood. Laymen were skeptical of my forecast because we were enjoying sunny weather. Fortunately, however, the flood engineers heeded my advice and drained the water from the San Gabriel Dam. Eventually the storm came and so did the flood and if those engineers hadn't taken my advice the damage might have been twice as bad.

"My biggest boner occurred on my first job. In 1936 the Governor of Texas was coming to Pasadena to cheer for the Southern Methodist team at the Rose Bowl. The city was fog-bound and it was my duty to tell the pilot whether to land at the

Glendale, Burbank or Palmdale airport. An official band was also waiting for my decision so that they could hie over to the proper airport and royally welcome the Governor. To this day, I don't know what happened but the Governor ended up in Burbank and the band in Palmdale.

Private Bureau

"These are occupational hazards which I take in my stride. However, there's more to being a meteorologist than giving a five-minute weather report to televiewers. In addition to experimentation with cloud seeding (creating artificial rain) I maintain a private weather bureau in Pasadena which services clients from coast to coast. Utility companies throughout the nation are interested in long-range weather forecasts so that they can plan their operation of peak loads. We provide these weather surveys so that power companies can estimate their coal consumption, or so hydro-electric plants can anticipate peak loads during certain seasons. We serve the rancher who wants his lettuce germinated during a cool spell in the middle of the summer. Even the local newspaper distributor checks with us to find out whether or not protective wax bags will be necessary for the morning paper. Customers are sure to be irritated if they receive wet, sloppy newspapers on their doorsteps.

"The motion picture industry has saved incalculable amounts by checking with us before going out on location. Whatever it is, as long as the weather is a determining factor, our service provides 'insurance' for companies large or small. So you see there's more to this profession than meets the tele-eye.

"Despite its ups and downs, I find my work completely absorbing. Even my little six-year-old, Robert, shares

my enthusiasm for meteorology. As a matter of fact he's already begun his grooming for this profession. He experienced his first rebuff when he reported to his classmates that he and his daddy had made snow in the Antelope Valley. Even though he was hurt when his classmates accused him of fabricating, Robert is determined to join the profession and sing the weather man's lament."

TV's Religious Racketeers

Why don't the stations do something about programs that are using religion as a cloak to hoodwink the public?



to the citizens of this city. Those who claim curative powers over all illnesses and problems are taking advantage of human suffering to fill their coffers. Those who ask for contributions for themselves, and always with a benign attitude, without proper investigation as to where these funds are to go are in the same class as the well-known characters who once held up people with phony oil schemes.

Yet, TV is sanctioning such people whose campaign is one of deceit and hatred instead of brotherly love. The stations may repeatedly claim that the views expressed are not the views of the various television outlets, but the mere fact that they allow such programs on their channels is sufficient to raise more than a few questions. When is this practice going to stop?

Before you take to heart the preachings of a person whose reputation is not clearly defined, whose background in teaching is not open to question, ask yourself if that person is really teaching the word of God and not the teachings of something else. When you're asked for funds, make sure where your money is going. When you're told you can be healed, take time out for proof. Don't let pretty and fancy words told in an emotional manner make you believe that you are really listening to a man of God. And remember—the Godly life is one of humility and love. Better still—remember that the teachings of the Bible should be the basis for any religion program. And not the teachings as freely interpreted to fit some one person's evil designs.

Ministers need to clean their own houses. If they won't do that, then the demagogues and racketeers will continue to flourish; and the hearts of sincere Christians will be pried open to doubt. If the TV stations won't clean up their channels and rid themselves of every religious program which has not been thoroughly checked as to its integrity and background, then you, the public, should refuse to watch those channels.

Don't let anyone use your faith as a means to "take you" for a sucker. Not all men of God recognize the fact that they are the servants of God. Some feel they are more important than He. Only you can clean up the TV stations and the cities of these racketeers who prey on your yearning for spiritual guidance—

MORE AND MORE you begin to see that some TV stations aren't half as interested in keeping the wrong types of shows away from their viewers as they are in getting the almighty buck. One of the best examples of this is the religious program that accentuates the racketeering in the evangelical field.

TV's recent emphasis on fine spiritual programs has been a great move forward. Many fine shows like "Light of Faith," "This Is The Life," "The Christophers," and others have helped immeasurably to bring the Christian principles into truer focus. And they have strengthened the hearts of many who have found that faith is their only answer to a complete and full life.

Therefore, for the sake of those really devout people who are seeking religious guidance, it is a shame

that some stations still will present any kind of show, regardless of its questionable aspects, as long as the dollar bills roll in.

Religion, especially in Los Angeles, has been made quite a racket. Reputable ministers like Bob Shuler, Jr. of the Trinity Methodist Church and others have deplored the disinterest the city has shown in ridding itself of men who are not ministers of God, but who are out to promote a racket to feather their own pockets. No situation can remind us more forcefully of the warning in the Bible; "Beware of false prophets" than the tendency here to let anyone, regardless of his record in the past, come here and hoodwink sincere Christians.

Men who open up a "church" on a street corner or in a building and who rant and rave against everything while offering nothing spiritually are doing a definite disservice

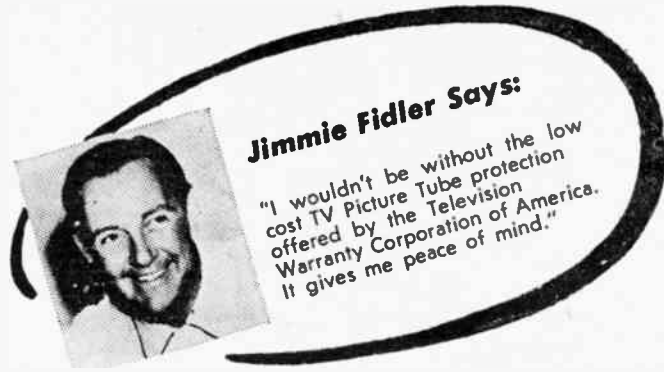

Around TV Row

Paul Coates is becoming quite the TV personality. No sooner does he launch "Confidential File" on KTTV then he turns about and emcees "Our Famous Husbands" on KECA-TV. . . . Burt Lancaster has been signed to guest with Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis on the "Colgate Comedy Hour" kickoff show, October 4. . . . There's still time to enter the "Glamour Grandma" contest on "Your Never Too Old." Shapely grannies send a snapshot of yourself in a bathing suit to KNXT, 1313 N. Vine Street, Hollywood 28, pronto! . . .

KHJ-TV joins the big sister nets in bringing new fall shows to viewers. "Hawaiian Paradise" featuring Alfred Apaka and "Headlines in Action," a fully credited college course in World Affairs are two of their new entries. . . . Dinah Shore and Bob Hope originate their shows in New York, October 6 and November 17 respectively for their "color premieres." The "premieres" will be in the form of dress rehearsals pending FCC approval of standards on which the RCA-NBC compatible color system is based, with the regular broadcast following in black and white. Upon FCC approval, the "color premieres" will go on the air in color.

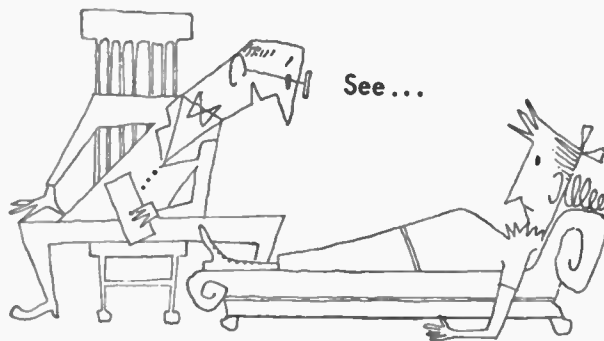

Last Thursday quite by accident I came across a copy of TV-Radio Life tucked under a counter at one of the chain food stores. This is just the guide I have been looking for since I came to California last June. I have found all sorts of TV guides and magazines at magazine stands but have never been able to find anything on radio and have asked several times for them always getting a negative answer. Even the daily newspapers aren't much help in finding worthwhile programs and they never seem to publish a weekly radio log as they do on television. This I can't understand because there are so many more worthwhile programs on radio than on television.

Another thing that has surprised me in California is the lack of good Spanish programs with a population of over 500,000 Spanish speaking people. It would seem that there should be a terrific commercial demand for Spanish programs. In Phoenix, Arizona, where there is an estimated 75,000 Spanish speaking people, there is hardly a station that doesn't carry Spanish programs and there is one all Spanish station which is thriving and growing, and I wish you could hear some of the programs, commercials and dedications. And with the exception of Channel 6 in Tijuana, I

FROM WHERE WE POUND THE TYPEWRITER, there are two flies in the ointment of Ray Milland's new TV (and radio) show. One is the title, "Meet Mr. McNutley." Now McNutley is a perfectly fine name and no offense is meant to any reader bearing it, but why in thunder pile an alliterative prefix to it, making it a tongue-twister?

YOU PROBABLY ARE FULLY aware that persons responsible for dreaming up show names often reach ridiculously far in a brave effort to avoid duplication of a real-life name whose owner might kick up a fuss (especially if the show is a comedy and the name is hence held up to ridicule). Perhaps you recall the fuss the dean of women (I think it was Vassar) made when she found out that "Gildersleeve" was on the air (it happened she bore that moniker). And I've often wondered about a real-life Mabel Clapsaddle and how she felt about Jack Benny's telephone operator named "Mabel Flapsaddle."

AFTER ALL, GENERAL ELECTRIC must be pinning hopes for the new series' success on the name, Ray Milland, and I, for one, think it would be much better to call the show by his name. So the Ray Milland Show may sound like a variety program and so what? If it is all as good as the pilot film I saw the other day, lookers would catch on soon enough that the series is broad comedy, not variety, and I'll bet the already-famous name of Milland would prompt more new listeners to tune the show than the "Meet Mr. McNutley" title!

SO MUCH FOR NO. ONE FLY. No. Two is the equally terrible laugh track which plagued the pilot film from start to finish. I was told that the guffawing had been tuned down for other episodes. Let's hope so, for on the pilot it was so bad that the dubbed-in audience laughter smothered some of the lines. Now isn't that ridiculous?

BESIDES, SOME OF THE PARTS just killing the people in the studio didn't seem particularly funny to me, while now and then I chuckled at something not evoking a big fat rise from the audience. Apparently (and it's to be hoped, if we're going to keep a sane world) the same situations don't have the same effect on different persons—and that doesn't mean I think my sense of humor is any sharper or more exclusive than that of the guests who made the laugh track. My point, mainly, is that people who go to see a show for nothing, and who, preceding the performance, are adequately warmed-up by an announcer whose jokes get them in an expansive frame of mind, usually give freely of laughs; in fact they practically feel obligated to laugh.

THE RAY MILLAND SHOW, if the pilot film is a sample, is going to be funny—very funny. At-home lookers and listeners will find lots to make them giggle, laugh, chuckle, and even guffaw. But if they're like me they'll Page Twenty-six

appreciate the chance to decide for themselves when their funnybones are tickled.

LOADS OF YOU FANS WILL be disappointed if "Halls of Ivy" hits your screens without the Colmans. I can't blame Mr. Colman for letting the TV chance go by the boards rather than go through the ordeal of making a pilot film. After all, the star and his wife amply proved their talents in the radio version and after all again, everyone knows they can act in front of a camera. For my part, it's more vital to know who would write the "Ivy" TV script. If Don Quinn, fine and dandy, but if not, who? And which producer? Those would interest me far more than simply confirming the Colman talent.

PEOPLE IN THE TRADE ARE eyeing effectiveness of Hollywood's "Lux Video Theatre" origination for straw-in-the-winding. Could mean many more New York dramatic shows moving here. . . . Actor Tommy Cook is now a Marine corporal. He gets out of service next March 3, when he hopes to resume his career. . . . Hal (ex-"Great Gildy") Peary has some hot irons in the fire. . . . NBC-TV plans to plunk Dennis Day opposite "Lucy" on the network, but it isn't certain yet what'll happen locally. . . . Helen Gerald, Los Angeles actress now living in N.Y., appears on Robert Montgomery's TV show September 21 (we'll see it here by kinescope) a week (or more!) later. Her entire role (that of a French girl) will be done, natch, in French.

DIDN'T REALIZE HOW FAR OUT of step I'd gotten while wandering around Alaska until I heard a juke box play "Dragnet." "Just to think," I mused while listening to the tune, "I knew Jack Webb when." "And now," replied my daughter, "he's on the hit parade!"

Der Bingle and Baseball

With the Nation's interest boiling towards fever pitch over the upcoming **World Series**, **KNX-CBS** Radio star **Bing Crosby** will narrate a full-hour feature project report on "This Game of Baseball," on **Friday, September 25** at 7:00 p.m.

A GOLFING GIMMICK

Golf is more than a sport. It's a disease. Once you get the golf bug in your blood it's pretty tough to get rid of it.

There are several disadvantages, however, to this drive and putt pastime. Sometimes it's difficult to find enough time to get out to the links and spend a few hours climbing hill and dale for the little white ball. Also, if you're a beginner, it's pretty discouraging to expend so much energy on just a big hole in the ground, and a clunk of dirt in your puss.



Well, Hollywood is the land of "gimmicks" and the Bing Crosby Research Foundation has some up with one for golf addicts. It's called the GOLFMASTER. With it you can play hours and hours of golf—and not travel any further than your own backyard.

Briefly, it's a "gizmo" (Navy terms for any engineering equipment which confounds the human brain) with a golf ball attached to it by a nylon cord. The backyard golfer (male or female, young or old) goes through all the usual motions—gripping the club just right, taking his favorite stance, shaking the posterior according to custom, eyeing the ball, and then, wham-oo.

The ball leaves the ground (if you're lucky). The attached cord moves a plunger which registers just how far and in what direction the ball would have gone on a regulation course.

Surveys taken by practically every pro golfer in Southern California have proven that the distances recorded on the GOLFMASTER are ninety-eight per cent accurate. The indicator records any type of shot, for any distance, for any type of club used. It shows you if the shot was properly hit with the particular club.

The pro and top amateur golfers, and big name stars, such as Bing Crosby himself, Gordon MacRae, Frank Lovejoy, Jackson Wheeler, and many others, all heartily endorse the product.

If you're at all interested, you can read more of the details on page eight of this issue. The complete cost for the GOLFMASTER, including tax and all extras, is \$19.61. That's not hay, granted. But if you're a golf player, or desire to learn how to play, I think you will find it's well worth the price.

Ask any golfer sometime how many afternoons (or nights on the driving links) it takes to eat up twenty bucks worth of golf. Not very long. The

From all indications, color TV is really taking shape. And it may hit your screens much sooner than most people expected a few weeks ago. At least, Gen. David Sarnoff of NBC said, in part, "In view of the general expectation that compatible color television will be authorized in the near future on a commercial basis, it is essential that steps be taken to integrate color with our present black and white service as soon as authority is granted by the FCC." This sounds very much as though there will be some startling new developments soon. NBC is already planning a series of color TV premieres of some of its top shows, including "Show of Shows" and the Bob Hope telecast. Those who have seen color on television all agree that it is spectacular, brilliant in its sharp tones, and a decided advance over color in motion pictures. This team, who does most of the Four Star scripts and who is now working on four new pilot film plays, has consistently written mature, intelligent scripts. Those in the know still refer to "The Last Voyage" as about the best writing to hit the TV screens in a long, long time.

Has anyone noticed that the sound on "Robert Montgomery Presents" is, at times, a little off? Or are these ears fouling us up?

The "Topper" series may find itself with a new director if you're to believe all the chatter you hear in town. However, the advance reports on this new program are that the scripts are delightful and that this show should rack up a strong following once it hits the screens next month. Starring Anne Jeffreys and Robert Sterling, Leo G. Carroll and Lee Patrick, it also features Mary Field who plays the role of "Thelma." This talented actress is doing such a fine job in the series that she may be on the show as a regular feature.

Success Story: Jane Powell opened at the Ambassador's Coconut Grove last week. Lots of people were sure she'd never be able to handle that

huge room. Others went to the opening thinking more of Janie's marital difficulties than of her talent. So when she walked out on that floor she faced a hard, tough audience. Well, when she finished some forty-five minutes later the crowd was yelling, stomping their feet, and even crying "Bravo." Here was a courageous but an extremely talented young lady. She was a sensation! All of the TV appearances she made prior to the opening were a necessary build-up perhaps, but she'll be the talk of the town now. Incidentally, she made a charming impression on all of the TV shows on which she appeared. You can expect to see more of her on your channels—MGM permitting.

On Saturday morning, September 26, Monty Margetts and Bill Stulla will produce a children's show and in the afternoon there will be all kinds of bargains to be had at the various booths. The affair is open to the public, so here's your chance to see your favorites. Tickets can be purchased at the church. The spark plug behind this event is the Rector, Reverend Charles Howard Perry. Much credit is due these stars for helping out a worthy cause. You hear so much about the stars when they get into scandals but so little is ever said when they contribute their time and energy to benefit others. It is also good to remind the public that these people have enough real faith themselves to get in and pitch for what they believe in.

Speculation as to the reasons for the Jack Webbs' split is still rife in town. Most people believe that Jack's too-heavy concentration on his work was one of the main contributing factors. But those who know Jack and Julie aren't so surprised since they remember the times before the two almost called it quits. It's too bad to see this happen to a couple as nice as these two. YEAH, I KNOW what's on the cover of this issue of TV-Radio Life. It's a picture of Jack Benny's hovering over his money vault with a mercenary glint in his baby blue eyes.

Pure fantasy, folks. Pure fantasy. But this conception of Jack's penny-pinching habits was drawn up years ago by Jack himself in vaudeville and implemented on radio when he started in 1932. Every year since then Jack has become cheaper and cheaper—the professional Jack Benny, that is.

Only the most gullible person could be maneuvered into the belief that Jack Benny actually buries his financial treasures in a vault beneath his house, or makes it a part of Dennis Day's contract that he has to operate a Benny laundry route to keep his job as a singer on the comedian's show.

Perhaps I impress some people as a bit on the feather-brained side, but I rise stoutly to my own defense to decree that, at no time before I became an official member of the Benny gang did I cling to the thought that "the Boss," in real life, was so tight-fisted that he gave

shoestrings or gopher traps for Christmas gifts.

It is obvious that he has made a pile of money, and probably has had the good business sense to sock a good portion of it away—in spite of the tremendous hunk demanded in taxes of any citizen whose earnings put him in such a high financial bracket.

That, however, is not the point of this dissertation on the King of Comedians.

I have grown to know him as a man who is, by nature, the exact opposite of the character drawn for him in show business.

Jack Benny is generous to a fault—to snag a hackneyed phrase.

His generosity is a thing of the spirit. He could no more change that facet of his makeup than he could beat the wings off a butterfly or cross up a friend.

I think his best friend, George Burns, summed it up best when he was asked recently why Jack continued through the years to command the respect of such a host of loyal theater-goers and set-watchers.

George said, quietly, "Because Jack Benny is a fine man."

He didn't say "Because he is so clever, so witty, or such a master of timing." He said, "Because he is a fine man."

In the relatively short time that I have been associated with Jack in his CBS Radio and Television show, I've been impressed mostly by the gratuitous things he does. By that, I mean the helpful, thoughtful things the man does for those of us who work with him week after week.

Unlike many stars, he feels that everything the various members of his cast do on the show is important. He wants every one of them to do his level best for his own sake as well as his or that of the performance as a whole.

As a specific illustration—Last season I was contracted for ten appear-

ances on Jack's CBS Television show. Two of these didn't materialize during the cycle for the simple reason that Jack quickly sensed at rehearsal that the characters, as written, just wouldn't come off to his satisfaction nor mine. Nevertheless, my checks were delivered as promptly as though I had appeared.

He has frequently done the same for guest stars who have been announced for a show. If they didn't feel right at the opening rehearsal session, and the rewrites didn't work, he would convince them that it would be best to postpone their appearance.

The most meticulous, painstaking performers in show business, such as Ronald Colman and Jimmy Stewart, accept invitations to go on Jack's shows without a moment's hesitation because they know by experience that the material will be flawless, or made to be flawless before air time.

Jack is a worrier. He's a bit like a mother hen with a brood, when it

comes to the welfare of the performers who have come to fame through his efforts.

If Rochester accepts a vaudeville date, Jack worries about Roch's material, his billing and other elements of the engagement. If the troupe goes to Palm Springs for an airshow, Jack worries about their hotel accommodations and any other comforts which he feels should be theirs.

When Jack heard that I was to play an engagement last January at the Sahara, in Las Vegas, with the Modernaires and Gisele MacKenzie, he jumped into his car and drove the long distance to catch our act to see if we were doing well. He was exceedingly generous in his appraisal of our efforts, and he seemed to take a personal pride in the fact that I was putting over my stuff.

Penurious or self-centered people just don't do things like that.

As I said before, Jack Benny is a fine man.

"I can't sing their praises long and loud enough," says Stu. "I had less than twenty-four hours to prepare for my first emcee chore on 'Star Hostess' and the cast, who had been doing the show for almost a year, voluntarily came to my assistance.

"Marion Richman spent all afternoon putting me through the mechanics of what I was supposed to do the following morning before a live audience and a 'live' camera. I could never thank Marion enough for her unstinting assistance.

"Chet Fisher, that he-man vocalist who was responsible for my landing the emcee spot on the show, called me at home that evening and spent hours on the telephone briefing me. That was the first and last time I had the opportunity to monopolize the telephone for an entire evening, without any objections from the dis-taff of the family.

"The following morning, Bill Baker of The New Yorkers, that expert trio on our show, approached me on the set and made me feel right at home. 'Hi,' he said, 'you must be Stu Wilson. I'm Bill Baker. Let me show you the musical cues and what numbers we've planned for today's show. Don't worry about a thing—we'll help you if you get stuck.'"

It's quite obvious why Stu and his gang have such fun on the show. Their cooperation and complete lack of jealousy add that certain something to their party-telecast.

The teleshow is a natural for the sponsor, Stanley Home Products, rival of the long ensconced Fuller Brush firm. Stanley sells its products through home "party demonstration." In addition to entertaining, the program is used to recruit new demonstrators. Part of Marion's job is to interview a Stanley demonstrator who gives a "testimonial" on how those Stanley commissions paid doctor bills or purchased a new car.

Stu keeps his mind on the party fun. He's amazed at the eagerness of TV audiences to participate in games. They love pie eating contests, like

to dress-up a mannequin, play dart games, charades, and musical quizzes. Stu's favorite gimmick is the "trap" routine. Mike in hand, he goes into the aisle and asks unsuspecting visitors loaded questions. The lady who says she would like a fourteen karat necklace gets a string of garden-fresh carrots. The man who admits he would like a power-driven lawn mover gets an honest-to-goodness billy goat. The teacher who is befuddled by Stu's rapid multiplication gag is gifted with a rabbit.

Rarely, if ever, does anyone in the audience object to this tomfoolery. Stu and the cast project a magnetic feeling of "let's all have some fun." And what's more they do on "Star Hostess Party."

Is Censorship Stifling TV?

Joan Shawlee, TV's most startling purveyor of good feminine lure, lowers a few booms in this one. What TV needs is more sex appeal.

TV IS GETTING to be so homey that it is losing sight of the need for glamour and sex appeal. The public, you know, can get very bored with seeing things that remind them too much of their own lives. After all, TV is still an escape medium."

Joan Shawlee, tall charmer who purveys sex appeal so provocatively on the Bob Hope "Colgate Comedy Hour" show, wasted no time in getting to the point. And what's more she seems to have logic behind her words—she did one bit with Bob in which she displayed plenty of curves and feminine appeal—and television began clamoring for more. All of which would seem to prove that what she has is a mighty handy product.

"As long as sex is sold with good taste and a little comedy and isn't shoved down people's throats, what's wrong with it for TV?" Joan asked honestly. "And I'm keeping in mind that television is primarily a family medium. Being a mother myself and a happily married wife, I am as conscious of the need for wholesome entertainment as anyone could be, and I am not at all recommending that TV should ask for censorship. Yet, the argument for adult appeal has its merits. Children shouldn't be allowed to watch shows after a certain hour—and it is in those late evening shows that television could bring forth something a bit more intriguing than homespun corn.

"However, I don't look for any changes in this direction. If anything, TV has been even more conservative these last few months. While I have never gone in for any kind of cheap vulgarity in the way I dress or in the things I do on television, I have been amused by the fact that I have had to be sewn into every dress I've worn—to make sure that no curve is too predominantly revealed.

"TV will never go as far as the movies have in exploiting sex—and perhaps this is understandable. You'll

not see any provocative bedroom scenes on your set and you'll note there are no drinking scenes. As for personalities, Marilyn Monroe as a type, in my opinion, would never get by on TV.

"When a girl is being considered for a part on a telecast, there are usually five people who have to pass on her. I've always gone to auditions dressed conservatively—unless I happen to know the people involved well. I know of one gorgeous girl who came to a station for an audition dressed in a revealing sun suit with a little cleavage. She was turned down at once, even though those who passed on her knew she would never wear such a costume on the show. She was just too sexy a type—period.

"In contrast, when I went to Paramount recently, to see Bob Hope about a part in his next picture, 'Mr. Casanova,' I wore a one-piece off-the-shoulder pedal pusher outfit that took care of the figure department all right. No one gasped or seemed shocked. In fact, Bob cracked, 'Man, dig that crazy nervous tailor job!'

Going to Paramount gave Joan two thrills. She got the part and the gateman said to her when she asked for a pass, "Say! Aren't you Joan Shawlee, the TV star?"

"I really flipped when that wonderful man said that to me," Joan laughed.

Joan got her start with Bob in a rather surprising way. A friend of hers who had been set for a Colgate show wasn't able to do it because of a conflict in commitments so she asked Joan if she'd do it for her. Joan naturally agreed. She only had a bit with Bob on the show and it was cut at the last minute because the program was running too long. However, Bob liked her work and asked her back. That set Joan on her way. Since then she has worked on the Abbott and Costello, Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis shows in addition to about 14 TV films.

Joan, who is Swedish and a won-



derful cook, spends her spare time at home reveling in domesticity. She's one of the most enthusiastic people you ever met who has never had a sick day in her life and whose favorite pastime is sports.

About her outdoor activities she said with real pride, "I guess I'm about as well-rounded an athlete as you can get."

She doesn't have to limit that item to athletics.

Yes, sir! She has plenty of what TV could use—if it would ever open up its big, brown eyes and grow up.

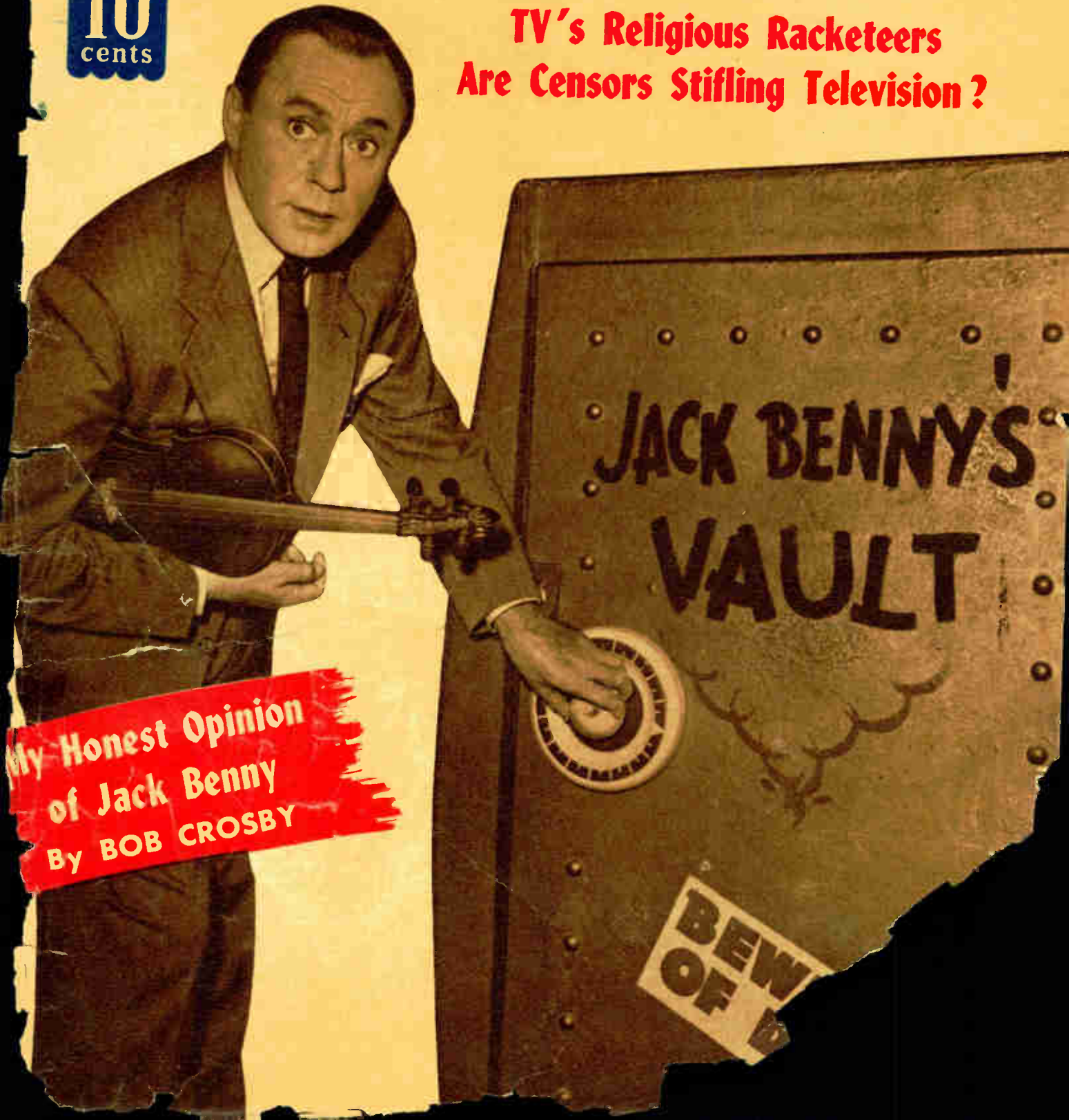
