One Man Speaks Up

*Against Communism and Other
Forces Undermining the U.S.*

K N B H COMMENTATOR George Todt is a big man in more ways than one. If you have watched his TV program, "In My Opinion," you have already estimated his hulking six-foot-three frame and his 325 pounds. If you've heard him speak in his straightforward extemporaneous manner, you have also sized him up as a very reasonable, thoughtful and sincere person who is tolerant—up to a point. At the point where the United States and/or her citizens get pushed around, Todt's patience ebbs.

George Todt is an active Christian, a member of the Mormon Church, and fully believes that one, in general, should turn the other cheek. However, there are exceptions—exceptions which are prompted by righteous indignation—and in such cases Todt recommends not only refusal to turn the other cheek but beating the other fellow to the punch. Take Communism, for example. This is Todt's major topic, both for his KNBH program and his columns in the Highland Park and Eagle Rock News-Herald. To him, the war against Communism is almost a holy war of Christians against the anti-Christ elements. With weapons like the A and H bombs at Russia's disposal, Todt doesn't think we should sit around and wait to be struck before being struck. Such reasoning was permissible back in the old days when a blow was of relatively small consequence. Now, one blow could conceivably start and end a war almost simultaneously. There would never be opportunity for a comeback.

Fearless

On one of his telecasts, Todt read the Communist oath for his listeners, who responded with generous mail. Often he has received threatening

letters after an unusually severe criticism of Communism.

Probably one reason Todt appreciates the United States is his extended absence from it, both while serving in World War II and later as an exchange student in European institutions of learning—Oxford, Balliol College, the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London and the Sorbonne. Previously he had attended Brigham Young University and University of Mississippi.

Returning to America, after having his eyes opened abroad, Todt began to ask himself questions and to crystallize certain observations. He probed the unpopularity of the U. S. abroad; why nations behaved or allied themselves as they did; why certain leaders came out for certain things; what was happening to our armed forces. These and many similar questions, all of vital interest to the Doakses, were the ones he thought about and eventually began to set down in written form. The Los Angeles Times, May 29, 1951, published a lengthy article on its editorial page. Titled "We've Given All We Can, But Very Few Love Us," it carried Todt's by-line. This and a few other writings attracted so much favorable comment that George decided to write a column. In his first pillar for the Highland Park paper (June 8, 1951) he adopted a friendly style that still carried a pithy punch.

"You can be sure of one thing," he wrote. "My mistakes will all be hon-


est ones. I am not running for anything, and will praise the men of either political party who help restore the unity of the American people. I am entirely bi-partisan in this column and am only for one thing: The United States of America."

Honors

During the two-and-a-half years he has been columning, Todt has received the signal honor of having twelve of his articles included in the Congressional Record (Winchell holds the columnistic record with twenty). Todt's KNBH program came about naturally as the result of writing and speaking extensively on today's problems in more or less the way your astute but unpretentious neighbor would. He obtained his sponsor, Sparkletts, under his own power and knocked on KNBH's door with show and contract ready to go. George still shudders in recalling his first night on camera—a veritable nightmare of hot lights, perspiration, awkwardness. "I fell on my face," he admitted. But now he enjoys his socky ten minutes before the viewers, hopes soon to have more than one weekly stint and also to do radio.

Currently he is extremely active in Pasadena Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution; Veterans of Foreign War, and Hollywood Post, American Legion. He is married to Irene, an Austrian baroness whom he met while studying in Vienna. She has renounced her birthland to become a naturalized citizen of the country which her husband defends so devotedly.

Are TV's Western Stars Slipping?

Dusty Walker tells why he refuses to doff his cowboy regalia for white tie.

RNEXT'S Dusty Walker challenges anyone who claims that the Western star is on the decline. Despite reports that their entertainment fare is on the down-grade, Dusty feels that there will always be a place for the Western star on television.

Dusty, himself, is part of the Western tradition. He's half Cherokee Indian, and was a rancher and cowboy long before he reached fame on television as a singing cowboy. He has more than a nodding acquaintance with horses. He's ridden 'em, raised 'em and broke 'em. He's also the proud possessor of a Deputy Sheriff's badge from Colorado's Larimer Country. His beliefs therefore are not synthetic—there is real basis for his opinions.

"I believe that the good Western shows will survive the blood and thunder stanzas," he explains. "A

Western show, whether it's a strumming cowboy or the deputy marshal-catches-the-bandit kind, has historical value. The music, flavor and heritage of the West will always have appeal. The simple sagas that have come out of the vast plains of the past are wonderous stories. They are a tribute to the courageous pioneers.

"To substantiate my argument, look at the facts. Students of American history in several of the city schools are required to watch the Tim McCoy teleshow. And questions pertaining to the Indian lore covered on this program appear on their final examination papers.

Western Music

"Western music also plays a role in today's supersonic jet age. It will survive over the years. And the refrains of such Western classics as "Home On the Range" will be hummed years after certain hillbilly

and pop tunes are forgotten. Frankly, I detest corny hillbilly and bebop music. I like sweet ballads and good swing music. As for classics—I don't understand them but I enjoy them.

"Aside from my conviction that Western stars offer a cultural contribution to viewers. I have a more personal reason for believing that Western stars are here to stay. I believe in this so strongly that I've rejected enticing offers to doff my cowboy regalia for white-tie and tails. I've been in Hollywood for four years and have done radio, motion pictures and television all because I've been a Western personality. I kinda feel that being a Western star has been my lucky star and I aim to continue wearing boots and my ten gallon hat for a long time. The heritage of the West is here to stay and so is the Western star despite rumors to the contrary."

The Lowdown on Jimmy

Jimmy Stewart, popular motion picture star, turns to radio with a brand new series for NBC. Here are his views on several significant matters.

1. What was the decisive factor in your decision to do a radio series and why did you decide on a Western?

I have always liked radio and have done it whenever possible in connection with motion pictures, so it was natural to do a series when I found one I really liked in "The Six Shooter." There are a great number

of people who have access to radio but not TV. I'm told that radios in automobiles alone number in the millions. Westerns have universal appeal and I like doing them.

2. Have you thought of doing any TV? If so, what made you decide on radio?

Not only have I thought of doing TV but I did one show. My wife and I appeared on Jack Benny's program and she was so good she stole the show from me, so I'm still thinking about TV and watching "Beany" in particular.

3. What, in recent years, has given you the most satisfaction as far as your career is concerned?

Playing in "Harvey." I have always felt a great warmth for the character ever since I first saw it on Broadway and then later played it on the stage with the hope I would eventually do the film. That, and a family that makes career a must.

4. Do you think radio is dead or dying?

Definitely no. Statistics show there are millions of listeners and you can't disregard that. There will always be a big place for radio as there is for movies and television.

5. Do you feel a star can remain a favorite longer on TV than he can on radio?

I don't own a crystal ball.

6. Does your wife have any influence on your decisions about your career? Was she in favor of your doing radio instead of TV?

My wife influences everything I do—she likes radio, motion pictures, and television.

7. What kind of a father would you say you were?

I'm obviously older than my children so I expect them to realize I am more experienced.

8. Do you find it hard to maintain a happy home life with all the pressure of your career? How understanding is your wife about your problems?

My problems are no more strenuous than any business man's. My wife, fortunately, is very understanding.

9. How long does it take you for each of your radio broadcasts? The time you spend on each show?

10. Do you prefer pictures or radio or TV?

Around TV Row

Ray Bolger has signed the Mitchell Boys Choir for his Christmas stanza. His wife, Gwen, has written a special song for the occasion, "I Hope You Have a Merry Christmas." This may all seem a bit premature but the vid-pix goes before the cameras this week. . . . Frank deVol bows out of "Platter-panel" and Johnny Carson takes over the emcee chores. . . . CBS's "Mama" celebrates its 200th performance. The teleplay still has its original cast.

Jeri Boone, star of KTLA's "Frosty Frolics" is studying with Rita Hayworth's ex-drama coach, Bob Paris, to get more dramatic effects in her ice numbers. Pat O'Brien has been appointed Chairman of the National Safety Council's Motion Picture, Television and Radio Committee. Gale Storm and Don McNeil serve as Vice-Chairmen.

When Lucy and her cast flew East for "Dinner With the President," a special hour-long TV program honoring the fortieth anniversary of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, it was the first time Lucille Ball was out of California since the debut of her teleshow.

Arlene Dahl is slated to appear as "Roxane" opposite Jose Ferrer in "Cyrano De Bergerac" in New York. . . . More than 100,000 post cards have been received thus far in NBC-TV's "Dennis Day Contest."

Lou Costello is reported doing very well after his recent collapse. Lou and his partner, Bud Abbott, expect to return to the "Colgate Comedy Hour" on January 17. . . . Lois Collier, of "Boston Blackie" fame, is doing the personal appearance circuit.

Democracy in action was evidenced last week at Gross-Krasne's California Studios when, under the auspices of the State Department, members of the German Press and Broadcasting officials were guided through the lot. The visiting "dignitaries" seemed impressed with American telefilm production. They spent a great deal of their time watching the "Big Town" shooting.

NBC will televise in color the Motion Picture Academy's Oscar Awards presentation in March 1954. But who's got a color set? Even if the sets are on the market early next spring their price will be prohibitive. . . . A Landsberg Landmark

At the preview of "Hollywood Historama," last week, Klaus Landsberg stood off in one corner. He was looking at an old TV control set.

This time, instead of his usual serious face concentrating on some technical aspect, the KTLA boss had an affectionate gleam in his eye and a slight, thoughtful grin creased his mouth.

The reason: the complicated piece of machinery he was looking at was the same set he had built himself back in 1942 at KTLA, and which had been used for several years at the station. It is now on display, along with hundreds of other exhibits of the entertainment industry at the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce.

"The TV Hour"

KECA-TV
Tuesdays, 9:30 p.m. alt.

One of the finest dramatic productions ever seen on TV hit the screens recently in KECA-TV's New York-originated show, "The TV Hour." The play, "Outlaw's Reckoning," was a standout in every department, and this is said in the face of reception that was anything but clear.

This program, which alternates with the U.S. Steel show, was particularly remarkable in that it was a live telecast. Superb use was made of an intricate set, and the props, including horses and stage coach, were handled with outstanding efficiency. The tightly-knit script was both intelligent and dramatically first rate. In fact, the entire show reminded one of the memorable movie, "Stage Coach," and that's about as high a recommendation as can be given.

The performers, under standout direction, were all terrific. Eddie Albert, Jane Wyatt, Lee Marvin, Wally Ford, and Vicki Cummings deserve every superlative in the book for their work. This is the kind of acting seen all too rarely on TV. It is also the kind to make you realize how slipshod are the performances on most shows.

If future telecasts are up to the standard set by "Outlaw's Reckoning," the TV Hour should become a "must" for everyone who likes his television fare adult and mature. J.H.

TV's Progress

Television made additional steps up the ladder of success recently. The big story was color TV and video recording.

However there were other contributions to the industry worth noting. Pioneering in the field of non-commercial educational television, the Hancock Foundation UHF station KTHE (Channel 28) went on the air with experimental programs.

Pay-as-you-see TV (subscription television) gets its first practical try-out this month in Palm Springs. The entire industry will watch the results of the electronic coin box bow.

Television's role as a mass sales training medium was witnessed recently by the San Mateo County United Crusade campaign. A half-hour program was televised to a "captive" audience of 60,000 women Crusade fund solicitors. Step-by-step instructions on how to "sell" the Crusade (similar to Los Angeles' Red Feather Drive) to the people in the San Francisco Bay area, was aired on KRON, which carried the program as a public service.

PICK of the PIX

When all's said and done, there's just one thing we here on the staff expect from you people who pick up this magazine... and that's a dime.

"Ou Our Merry Way." (5) Dec. 4, 10:00. Burgess Meredith is an inquiring reporter who goes about asking an all-star cast the question, "How has a little child affected your life?" The answers to this query form the episodes which make up this picture. Henry Fonda and James Stewart play a couple of musicians who try to rig a talent contest; Dorothy Lamour and Victor Moore are a couple of would-be movie stars; Fred MacMurray is a magician with a proclivity for the con game, and so on.



The movie is clipped off at quite a frantic pace, but I'm afraid things just don't get funny enough, with the possible exception of the MacMurray sequence. Paulette Goddard plays Meredith's wife in this bit of whimsy, and that's what she used to do, too.

"Strange Woman." (11) Dec. 3, 11:20. First released in 1946, this is an adaptation of Ben Ames Williams's novel about a woman in 19th century New England who just can't behave herself. She, Hedy Lamarr, that is, makes men fall at her feet, and among those so prostrated are George Sanders, Louis Hayward and Gene Lockhart. Hedy finally gets her comeuppance, but I'm not going to tell you how, because I don't know how... I didn't stay 'til the end.

"Small Back Room." (13) Dec. 2, 10:30. This is a very well done British thriller about an ex-army officer, David Farrar, who is called upon to find and dismantle a booby trap which German planes are dropping all over England. The difficulty lies in the fact that people always pick up the harmless-looking object and are blown to pieces, making it almost impossible to round them up for purposes of identifying the bomb. The denouement, which shows Farrar suffering from a hangover and trying to remove the firing pin from one of the things, is a humdinger.

"Dangerous Years." (7) Dec. 2, 11:00. This is an inoffensive little picture about juvenile delinquents and the understanding required to straighten them out. Marilyn Monroe plays a small part as a waitress in this, one of her very first pictures, but she gives no indication of becoming the magnificent actress she is today. Indeed, she hadn't even yet learned to keep her mouth open in a perpetual gasp.

"Weddings Are Wonderful." (2) Nov. 29, 11:30. Only trouble is, you wind up married.

EVERY DAY MORE AND MORE PEOPLE in "the trade" are watching acceptance of the Dennis Day Show, slotted on NBC-TV opposite "Lucy." The Day lad is not only talented and versatile, but in Cliff Arquette has one of the best character actors in the business. Day's 12 rating may not look impressive opposite "Lucy's" fat 60 plus, but it represents a significant group of listeners whov'e changed their tune to "I Loved Lucy."

THERE ARE QUITE A FEW WHO hold that TV's impact on personalities is going to be the same as its (and radio's) effect on popular songs. The concentrated exposure makes for a skyrocket-type success. Stars like Jack Benny, Bob Hope, Durante, O'Connor and Bergen have demonstrated shrewdness in holding out for infrequent TV appearances. They'll last longer, both physically and Tvehically.

PEOPLE ARE TALKING ABOUT the way "Dragnet" is being humanized. "Friday" and "Smith" are actually smiling and exchanging small talk. Last week it was good to see Peggy Webber turning in one of her excellent performances as wife of the hijacker wanted by police.

PEOPLE ARE TALKING ABOUT John Daly's talking too much on "What's My Line?" It doesn't make much difference whether the panelists are or are not tipped off before the show if Daly is going to spill the beans and toss clues right and left.

PEOPLE ARE TALKING ABOUT how much better Bob Hope's latest TV show was than the one before, even though Fred MacMurray fluffed all over the place. One of Bob's best lines: "You can't blame Truman for not wanting to go back to Washington—you know how it is in a big city when you don't know anybody!"

ART LINKLETTER PLANS TO DO

"People Are Funny" for TV. It will be live. Starts fall of 1954.

PAST FEW WEEKS THERE'S BEEN a terrible hullabaloo over some TV advertising for vacuum cleaners. Clean-up campaign is now under way. Now that subscription TV is about to get a test again in Palm Springs—with Telemeter holding sway—comments from readers about pay-as-you-see television are of even more interest. One person wrote in about this system: "With it, TV will deteriorize, good plays will disappear, good comedians won't be seen." This is completely untrue. Bear in mind that subscription TV would not preempt other shows. It would be on one channel and a person could see it or leave it alone. Instead of TV's deteriorating, it will benefit greatly by the presentation of standout, top ranking programs at present unavailable to viewers because of the high cost involved. Another reader says, "Hope it never comes—they'll start with twenty cents, then rob your purse." It won't rob your purse any more than it would be robbed if you went to a movie of your choice. Liberace is now very, very hot across the country as a result of his filmed shows. Blase New York is solidly on his handwagon.



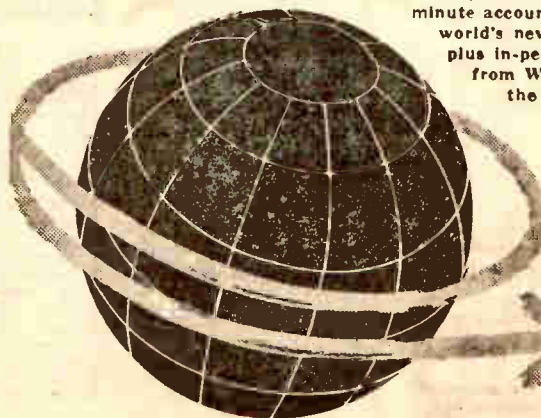

Exclusive Interview

Carroll Alcott, veteran reporter and world traveller, whose news analysis is heard on the CBS Pacific Coast network daily at 5:30 p.m. (Monday through Saturday), has just returned from a fact-finding tour throughout the Far East. Alcott, once the Orient's most listened to newscaster (and that includes the Japanese who tried to assassinate him) gave TV-Radio Life these capsule opinions:

KOREA: No one in authority believes war in Korea will break out again. This despite the belief that the communists will stall the Korean peace talks indefinitely—may even turn that treaty into another Austrian agreement. And no one expects East-West agreement on that one for years.


MANILA: Pro-Americans elated over Magsaysay victory for presidency of the Philippines. This because Magsaysay is an open admirer of the United States, and has promised to eliminate the corruption and graft which so riddled the previous Quirino regime.

INDO-CHINA: Seven-year war against communists looks bleak because France unable to replace losses in Foreign Legion. Germans who enlisted in Legion to escape war criminal trials now have learned that all is forgiven, so are returning to Germany. These are hard core of French Legion; lieutenants, sergeants and corporals.

MALAYA: Despite British victory claims, war with infiltrating Red guerrillas continues. Seems no end to this discouraging pattern in western world's greatest rubber source.

JAPAN: Average Japanese-in-street still against re-armament. In large cities, some Japanese merchants getting cocky and indifferent about giving Americans service. However, in more provincial communities, where American dollars have more value, merchants very anxious for trade of American GI's. Overall picture—great majority of Japanese still in favor of Americans.

CAL IS CLEAN!

The daily press and particularly LIFE magazine have been raising a big stink lately over harness racing and the many rackets connected with it.

Because of a few two-bit union leaders, some power-hungry politicians and money-happy shysters, the trotting game as a whole has suffered a black eye.



Nothing was said in the articles about corruption on the California turf. But don't think the boys didn't try.

"They were out here for three whole days digging into our records and asking all kinds of questions. They didn't find out anything. They couldn't, because California is 'clean!' That's the way Bernard Kearney, retiring general manager of the Western Harness Racing Association, explained it to me on a visit this week to Hollywood Park.

"The article in LIFE certainly hurt the sport. I wanted them to use the same story, but to use it a different and better way. Why couldn't they have pointed out the good parts about California, and then put in all the bad parts?" Kearney asked.

"Unfortunately, nice stories about nice guys make dull copy," I replied.

"They tried their best to pin something on us out here but they couldn't do it," Kearney repeated. After eight years of hard work, shared equally by the other members of the Western Harness Racing Association, he spoke like a man who had just passed the final test—and with honors.

Although the "crusade" against harness racing was aimed specifically at operations surrounding the track, there were implication, but no facts, that the races themselves were not on the up-and-up.

Roy Shudt, official track announcer who also can be heard every racing night over KMPC calling the feature event, had something to say on this subject.

"In all the years I've been associated with harness racing I have never heard or known of a race being fixed," Roy said.

If anyone would have some "inside dope" on the trotters and pacers it would be Roy Shudt. A former sports reporter and commentator, he called his first harness race back in 1941 at Saratoga. He travels all over the nation, hitting eight different tracks during the season.

Oddly enough, the meet at Hollywood Park is the only one he can-

Wrestling Is My Business

One of our friends in Pomona sent a clipping the other day from a Victoria, B.C., newspaper which told a story that saddened me. I believe the news will also sadden the hearts of countless wrestling fans who remember the unpredictable, hot-tempered Indian, Baptiste Paul, known to most of you as Chief Thunderbird.

The article stated that the bell has finally quieted down the antics of the popular wrestler and that his wrestling days are over. He has been "set down," as the wrestlers call it, by his doctors due to an infection from an injury.

While Chief Thunderbird may not have been the greatest wrestler to ever pull on a pair of tights, he certainly crowded first place for being the worst tempered of the clan. And he definitely was one of the most colorful men in matdom.

He would climb into the ring in full Indian regalia, carrying spears, tomahawks and what-have-you. He would toss souvenirs like eagle claws and elks' teeth to the spectators. It was nothing to see him grab up a tomahawk that he had placed in the corner of the ring and chase the referee and his opponent around the arena and into the dressing room. Oh, he was a tough one—but the fans always had their money's worth when they went to see him wrestle.

The mighty warrior of a twenty year professional wrestling war is philosophical about this unfortunate cir-

stances in daylight. All the rest are run at night.

After eight years of struggling, harness racing at the beautiful Hollywood track has finally come into its own. The daily crowd averages between 5000 and 7000 people, with Saturdays jumping to 15000 horse-and-money-happy-customers. The weekly "take" amounts to over three and a half million dollars, with each bettor averaging about seventy bucks apiece.

When you first visit Shudt in his booth overlooking the whole track, you feel certain the guy has gone off his 'rocker.

He is alone in front of the mike, with his binoculars focused below, and he's muttering to himself: "Mr. Green, Mr. Green, Mr. Green. Judy Bell, Judy Bell, Judy Bell. Ambassador Dex, Ambassador Dex. Gloria Brewer, Gloria Brewer, Gloria Brewer."

No, he's not spotting people in the audience below! He's just concentrating on the colors of the horses and memorizing the names. When he starts his famous chant: "Here they kum!", and then gives the post-by-post account of the race you can readily understand why they call him the "Voice of Harness Racing."

cumstance. He says "I am thankful to 'The Great Guy Upstairs' that he gave me a body which could stand the punishment."

And punishment he had—as do all wrestlers. During over one thousand battles in the ring, Bapti, as he is known to his friends, has had both arms, a leg and his ankle broken. He bears an ugly scar on his right arm which he received when a losing opponent bit him and infection set in.

In the boxing ring, before he turned wrestler, he had both of his hands broken plus a cracked rib. He is almost proud of his badly cauliflowered ear which Ed "Strangler" Lewis gave him in their first meeting back in 1935. Bapti claims that the Strangler taught him a valuable lesson in wrestling that night.

Chief Thunderbird created a lot of interest wherever he went. When he appeared in London, England, garbed as usual in headdress, war paint and the trimmings, he wowed them. According to the column, "It was hard to say who derived the most pleasure, Bapti from the sight of London, or London from the sight of Bapti, although he frightened a couple of children, brought up on Western Films—almost into hysterics."

He likes to remember such occasions as the time he arrived in Manila by plane. "The natives called the Clipper the Thunderbird," he said. "So when I stepped off the plane in war paint and feathers and announced that I was Chief Thunderbird, they thought I was pretty important. In Manila I stopped traffic."

"Bapti, as with so many Indians, was a versatile and wonderful athlete. Jon Hix featured him in "Strange As It May Seem" in the 1930's when he won eight letters in eight sports at the Tacoma Indian School in Washington. The sports were baseball, football, soccer, basketball, lacrosse, track, boxing and wrestling. He ranked being a chieftain of the T'sartlip Indian Band, but, until now, has not had the time to devote to their benefit. Now he is spending his time looking after the interests of his people, directing the building of roads and other improvements on the reservations.

He is a colorful and interesting fellow, both in and out of the ring, but I feel sure that we will hear more of him before he goes to stand before "The Great Guy Upstairs," as he says.

This is, naturally, very gradual—sometimes almost imperceptible. I feel I must have undergone a change in many, many ways.

When I listen to my records of fifteen years ago and listen to my records today, I cannot believe it is the same person. To me, when I listen to the records of fifteen years ago, my voice sounds cold and hard and almost metallic. Today, when I listen to a song that I have recorded, I feel that something comes through—something that speaks more of understanding and kindness and I hope more thought for other people.

I am very grateful for the fight I had to make and for the good things of life I am now enjoying."

Barbara shops the four major department stores — May Company, Broadway, Bullocks and Robinson—in downtown Los Angeles for new items. The buyers in the various departments are always eager to show her their latest merchandise. Fortunately the long-limbed Barbara (she's five feet eight inches in stocking feet) likes shopping. She scurries through the stores, notebook in hand, five days a week. She admits it takes stamina and a strong pair of feet as well as a firm determination to refrain from buying everything in sight.

"The department stores carry a 1001 items," says Barbara. "Fortunately there's never a dearth of merchandise to show televiewers. As a matter of fact at times it's difficult to select the five or six items we show on camera. I try to have a wide range of products to televise—something for the man of the house, the small

fry, a new household gadget and, of course, some appealing feminine item.

"The merchandise is the star of this show. I'm merely coincidental," smiles Barbara. "I simply display it, explain it and tell where it can be purchased. I test all the products used on the show. "Sometimes gadgets become camera shy and I become all thumbs. On one occasion, just before airtime, I was double checking a tube of paint. You can imagine my surprise when it squirted all over my face. This was exceeded by my embarrassment when the camera focused on me while I was busily engaged in whipping the stuff off my face."

Barbara got her hankering for merchandising while attending college; and participated as a fashion co-

ordinator at North Western University's fashion shows. During a European tour she made all the fashion shows, as she claims purely for her own edification. Style-minded Barbara hopes some day to manufacture low budget dresses with high fashion features. And maybe branch out into fashions for problem figures. The tall and fat girls are first on her list. How CBS radio tackled

"The Wetback" Problem

RADIO needs guts. It needs programs such as the "Feature Project" of CBS.

Periodically, usually about once a month, producer Stuart Novins picks a vital topic and devotes a full-hour program to it. One Sunday morning early in April, the American public heard such a program. This is the story of how it was done.

It was called "The Wetbacks," a hard-hitting, on-the-scene report from both sides of the Mexican border, which the broadcast described as America's "wide open back door."

Novins headed the field team that gathered the material. With him from New York was Don Kellerman, a "Feature Project" reporter; Jack Beck, West Coast news director for CBS radio; and reporters Bob Ferris and Rod Voigt, assistant director of Press Information.

On the day of departure, Thursday, March 18, every member of the team was on his way to being an expert on wetbacks, the Mexican border, illegal immigration, Imperial Valley agriculture, and the problems of the Border Patrol.

They camped at El Centro, sixteen miles from the border towns of Mexicali and Calexico, and headquarters for the Border Patrol, the Imperial Valley growers association, the farm labor union, the packing house union, and all the other elements involved in the story.

Work Begins

The first day's work began. While Kellerman, Ferris and Voigt made recordings Stateside, Novins and Beck were over on the Mexican side of the border making the first of a series of attempts to establish contact with forgers who would supply false papers and with smugglers who would transport illegal immigrants through Border Patrol roadblocks and

check-points. The results of these cloak-and-daggerish operations, which went on during the entire five-day stay, lent an important and authentic element of surprise and drama to the broadcast.

At night the entire team gathered in Kellerman's room and played the day's tapes. One of the tape records had had a loose connection and half the stuff done from an airplane was lost. When all were played, everyone looked unhappy. The first day gone, only about five minutes of useable tape "in the can," and a deadline a week away!

Despite the scanty first day results, it had been profitable. It had been a day of orientation in the field.

On the second day, Kellerman, Ferris and Voigt recorded interviews with field hands, growers, packing shed owners and workers, and city and county officials. Beck and Novins continued their "underground" operation on the Mexican side of the border.

Five Long Days

And so it went for five long days. During this time, Ferris accompanied patrolmen in the seizure and questioning of a smuggler; Kellerman participated in a train check; Voigt, Novins and Kellerman trailed a "wetback" as he infiltrated through Border Patrol check points by a series of taxicab hops from town to town; and Beck worked with hired Mexican operators on that side of the border.

The team worked as much as eighteen to twenty hours a day and returned to Los Angeles exhausted, sunburned, dirty and with twenty-four fifteen-minute reels of tape, and six half-hour reels.

Several weeks later the entire nation heard "The Wetbacks" on the air.

Yes, radio needs guts. And it needs such men as these to carry it out.

GO ATTEMPT to talk about our parents, better known to the public as George Burns and Gracie Allen, isn't half as easy as it sounds. So if we kind of ramble, don't blame us. In a way, our parents are rambling sort of people.

In the first place, they are quite different in temperament. Daddy is usually very calm about things. He seldom gets upset. On the other hand, Mother is nervous. All she actually thinks about is her script—and she's a hard worker. You should see the two of them when they're working. Daddy is usually in one room trying to write a script while Mother is in another room learning lines. She learns them in such a thorough way because they are difficult. After all, everything she says is said backwards and this takes some concentration. I always thought it was odd that with all of her concentrated study she can't remember a script at all after she's done the show.

(Aside from Ronnie: Maybe she's good at learning lines but she's a little absent-minded at times. You have to face that, Sandra. Like the day she called me at home and asked me what she went to the store to buy. I had to find the note she'd written to herself to tell her.)

Daddy, though, has the worst memory. He can't remember names at all. He still calls Ronnie Ronnie Burns. He only recalls the full names. We have had the same handy man for eight years and Daddy still can't remember his name.

Good Parents

Ronnie and I have, of course,

wonderful parents. When we were younger they allowed us freedom as individuals, and yet they brought us up in the right way. Mother was the stricter disciplinarian. She saw to it that Ronnie and I were home at a definite time from dates and she made us do our home work. We also had our household chores. One of mine always struck me as rather peculiar—I had to straighten out the fringe on the rug in my room every Saturday morning.

I think I had the most difficult time trying to get Mother to let me wear levis and shirts. She hates messy and sloppy people and wanted me to look more feminine.

(Aside from Ronnie: She wasn't too happy with the outfits I went around in either.)

Daddy didn't worry much about how we dressed. In fact, he seldom worried at all. If anything really serious came up, he would step in, but most of the time he figured Mother was doing okay.

Daddy was more inclined to see the humorous side of things. He has always been the one with the sense of humor. Mother can be funny when other people are around. Daddy's humor is a little of the sarcastic type.

(Aside from Ronnie: Like his crack at me. He calls me "Cock-eye" half the time. He does enjoy a good laugh, though. Not that he can't get plenty mad at times. Whenever you're argu-

ing with him, he'll say, "Be quiet!" and that ends the argument. I think he is the most annoyed when somebody walks in front of the TV set when he's watching a show. Our help was quitting quite regularly because he'd bawl them out when they got in front of the TV. He and Mother are real television fans. They watch all the shows and get something out of even the bad ones. Their favorite program, however, is "The Burns and Allen Show." At least, that's what they say.

(Daddy has sure been understanding about my career, though. I had thought I wanted to be an architect but changed my mind and am taking a Cinema course at USC now. I work in the summer at the studio as a cutter and Daddy has seen to it that I learn the business in a fundamental manner.)

Sandra's Marriage

I had no career in mind—so I gave Daddy and Mother no problems there. I just got married. And now I'm going to have a baby.

(Aside from Ronnie: I'll never forget the night you eloped. About three a.m. when you hadn't come home Daddy and Mother were really in a state. Then at five when you called to say you were married you'd have thought the end of the world had come. They called Jack and Mary Benny and asked them to come over and everyone sat around in a state of nerves. I finally went to bed.)

Mother and Daddy

When I came home everyone was lying around on couches with a headache. It wasn't that they objected to my husband. It was just that they thought I was too young to get married and that I wasn't sure enough of what I was doing. Now they're used to it all and are heartily in favor of it. I can still remember how nervous I was when he took my old car. He's the worst driver. And he's the luckiest man alive. It's a wonder he doesn't have accidents every day. I guess the only reason he has come out unscratched is because he drives so slowly that even if he did hit a car there wouldn't be much damage.

(Aside from Ronnie: Mother isn't much better—but she hates to drive so she seldom does. But, really, Sandra, we've been lucky kids to have a mother and father like ours. Everybody may love them—but not quite the way we do.)

Learn to Dance for Free On TV

Frank Veloz can make a dancer out of you even if you think you can't dance.

ANYONE can learn to dance, if he can walk," says KTLA's dance impresario Frank Veloz.

This is rather a broad statement but Veloz speaks authoritatively. His chain of dance schools throughout the country boasts

of thousands of successful students.

Mistakes

"Having a fixation or mental block that you cannot dance is the biggest mistake anyone can make," Veloz advises. "Dancing is no more than a sense of balance and we all inherently possess balance—otherwise we couldn't walk.

"There are some people who insist that they have no sense of rhythm and therefore can't dance. I don't believe this. Rhythm cycles are too functional a part of our daily living. Everything we do is governed by rhythm. We all have our own distinct rhythm which is characteristic of our individual personality. It exists in varying degrees and it's as tangible as a piece of pie.

Progress

"Once we get over the mental block and the 'I've got no rhythm' barrier, learning how to dance is easy because the student can relax and his ability to learn increases tenfold. Once he learns basic dance steps he can concentrate on overcoming such idiosyncracies as favoring one foot, toeing-out or straddling in duck-like fashion. When we overcome these peculiarities and attain proper posture we're on our way."

Dancing Bores

There are some, of course, who

make ridiculous spectacles of themselves on the ballroom floor.

Discourteous dancers are ballroom bores. The smoking dancer not only becomes a fire hazard but fills his partner with a fear that she'll be branded for life. Emotional dancers who are overwhelmed by the romantic lyrics of a song only embarrass everybody else in the room. The pleasure of dancing can be ruined by the enthusiastic male who crushes his helpless partner in a deathlike grip. And nobody is more unwelcome on a dance floor than the athletic couple who cavort as if they were out on a football field.

"These ballroom bores are usually egocentrics," Veloz said, "I have seen extreme introverts become extroverts of the worst order after they've learned how to dance. Dancing instills confidence but there is such a thing as carrying a thing too far. However, dancing lessons aren't solely for introverts. Eight million people spent \$100 million dollars last year for dancing lessons. More people learned how to dance in 1953 than went to college. If eight million people can learn how to dance, surely, you, too, can learn how to trip the light fantastic unless you go out of your way to become the exception to the rule."

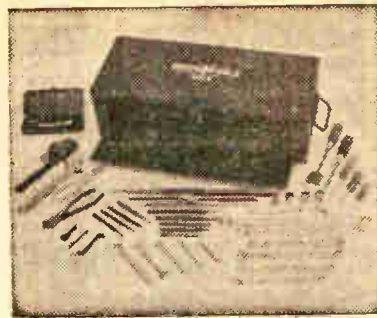

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

One of the questions being asked these days is "What's ahead for the 'Comedy Hour' next season?" With Jimmy Durante and Donald O'Connor out of the fold and doing their own shows and with Eddie Cantor's having pulled out, this leaves only Martin and Lewis apparently set. Abbott and Costello are reported to be among the missing too. So far the only plans for the new season include several full-length musicals, such as "The Comedy Hour" did with "Anything Goes." But losing such an impressive array of talent could mean considerable shake-up in the production end. In fact, there have already been some notable changes in that line. From the way it looks here, "The Comedy Hour" is quite a question mark. And whether or not it can continue among the top with all the changes is something to ponder over. It will be interesting, at any rate, to watch the developments here.

Liberace is getting a lot of publicity and he's doing very nicely financially, thank you, but just what will be the results of some very questionable publicity campaigns? In all of the major "breaks" in magazines, the way "Lee" has been treated is anything but complimentary. Okay, so, as one article said, there is an effort to build him as a "character." But just where are the dignity and good taste you expect to find? Maybe we're naive but it does seem that Liberace should seriously question some of his publicity—and those who are handling it. He's too decent a guy to be made the object of ridicule. Perhaps it is all paying off now, but how long will it continue to pay off? When will the public get fed up? Much is being expected of "Halls of Ivy" on TV so there had better not be a let-down. To the producers—leave the farce to lesser efforts that never had anything to begin with.

"Life With Luigi" may again hit TV. If it does, Vito Scotti had better be cast again as "Luigi"—that's if the Italian newspapers in the country and the vast majority of Italians have

anything to say about it. They feel that Scotti, who played the role on the last brief run, more truly represented the Italian. They have a lot of argument on their side.

When the FCC does reach a decision on subscription TV it will not necessarily mean that Commander McDonald, Jr., of Zenith, will leap in with Phonevision. He has already stated that it would be folly to begin the service without an abundance of top product from the motion picture studios since he feels that new and good pictures will be the backbone of any subscription TV. The studios, however, have so far not relented in their attitude. Maybe when they get a smell of the added revenue possible to them through subscription TV they'll change their feelings.

Remember all the fuss that was made by set owners when a big championship prize fight was blacked out to home viewers and channeled into theatres at fancy prices? Well, the Marciano-Charles fight was kept out of the homes and put into theatres. Moral? The public can complain all it wants but the boys in charge of such events aren't going to miss a chance to make a few extra bucks—not even if it alienates the very public they are trying to "win over." And don't let them give the old herring about TV's cutting down on their gate. They'd have a packed house even if the fight were carried into every home.

In what was probably the most spectacular opening night at the Coconut Grove in years, TV really showed how it can develop new stars. The occasion was Eddie Fisher's local night club debut. Eddie is a product built entirely by TV and by records. A young kid, with plenty of warmth and sincerity and really outstanding talent, he climbed into the upper brackets for sure with this show. Introduced by Eddie Cantor with sentiment dripping all over the place, Eddie nevertheless went on to completely captivate the star-studded crowd which included satellites Marie Wilson, Ethel Merman, Johnny Ray, Betty Hutton, and many, many luminaries of the film world. Also on the bill was Will Jordan, a rather good mimic who got his start on Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town." Noteworthy, too, was the Hightower dance act. But it was Eddie's night—and if TV can build this kind of personality, it can certainly build others! One general complaint about the Grove shows—there are too many acts. Hit 'em with the headliner.

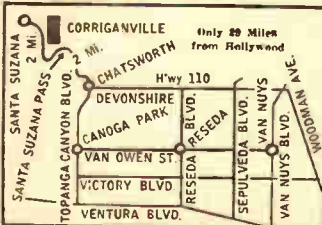

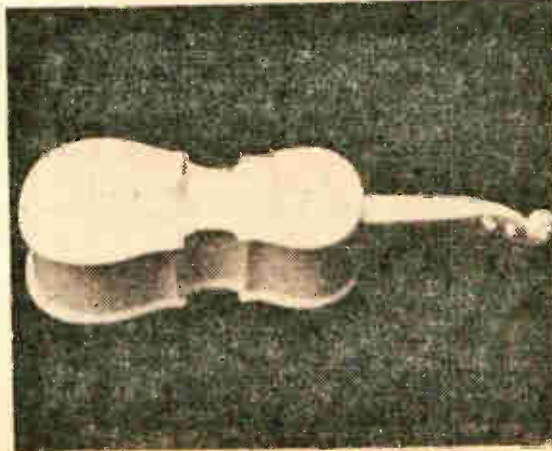

"Rembrandt." (13) June 27, 8:30. As the famous Dutch painter, Charles Laughton is here given ample opportunity to caper and grimace, and he makes full use of it. Elsa Lanchester plays the mistress who sticks with him through thick and thin, and is finally made an honest woman of at the end. The film is refreshingly frank and captures, I think, the full flavor of the master's life and times. This is a motion picture and lasts an hour and a half.

Brundige: Yes.

Fan: Then, sir, does this not mean that the correct name is Wrigley Field, not BEAUTIFUL Wrigley Field?

Brundige: That is a technicality.

Fan: You didn't answer the question.

Brundige: May I explain this slight discrepancy?

Fan: Were you told to add the word "beautiful"?

Counsel Don Stewart: Point of order. As president of the Los Angeles Baseball Club I consider any conversation between the witness and my organization as confidential.

Fan: Then I'll put it another way. Do you, sir, consider the park "beautiful," or do you say that because you're compelled to by the management?

Brundige: I consider it among the five most beautiful baseball parks in the nation.

Counsel Don Stewart: Point of order. I think, Mr. Chairman, my client could justify his position if granted a few minutes for uninterrupted explanation.

Chairman: Mr. Brundige, you may take as much time as you wish.

Brundige: May I say first of all that Wrigley Field, unlike Little Eva, didn't "just grow." Millions of man



hours have been poured into the development of Wrigley Field to make it one of the most attractive sports structures in the nation.

Park Superintendent Jim Williams and his staff work 12 months each year to maintain the park. There is no "off season" for them. Why, they even grow their own grass at Wrigley Field for re-sodding at worn spots on the infield and outfield.

Naturally this, plus the man hours spent by the clean-up crew after each game, creates a staggering figure for park maintenance. This is a source of constant concern for Asst. Treasurer Howard Lorenz and his aide Bill Heymans.

George Goodale, publicity director, isn't much to look at, though there's a lot of him to see, but the job he does for press, radio and TV is pretty outstanding. Recently a major league owner visited the press room, and remarked that "the Chief" is the most efficient press agent he's seen in baseball.

Though the public never sees Britt Sims, he has a maintenance job, too. He feeds all us free-loaders, and tends to the many little trifles that "pop" up in each game, while we are tied to our chairs in the press box. To us, he's a beauty in disguise.

Of course, the most beautiful part of Wrigley Field is quartered in the tower—Mrs. Minnie Lohman, secretary to President Don Stewart. Her responsibility is to smooth over the rough tempers sometimes apparent when fortune forsakes the club afield.

To answer your question, I do think Wrigley Field and everything about it is "beautiful."

Chairman public: Do you, sir, really mean everything you just said?

Brundige: I do.

Chairman: I now pronounce you man and park.

Counsel fan: No further questions.

Brundige: Point of personal privilege, sir. With the chair's permission, I would like to continue referring to the park as "BEAUTIFUL Wrigley Field" on my KHJ-TV telecasts of the baseball games.

A HOLLYWOOD gossip columnist, always on the lookout for sensational news, could conceivably start this feature off in the following fashion:

"Molly Bee, fourteen-year-old singing sensation, has a boyfriend.

"Joanie O'Brien, the fastest-rising young vocalist in the business today, has a boyfriend.

"Bucky Tibbs, the thrush who recently hitched herself to Thomas Mitchell, also has a boyfriend—and it's not her new hubby.

"The strangest part of the whole story is that all three gals have a crush on the same guy!"

An even stranger part of the story would be that the columnist would be telling the truth—except for one small item. The "boyfriend" involved in this triangle of the thrushes would be one Mr. Cliffie Stone, the headman of KCOP's "Hometown Jamboree."

Cliffie Stone—The Rock

And who could blame the three little gals! It was Cliffie who discovered them. It was Cliffie who gave them their first big break on

TV and radio. It was Cliffie who nursed them along; took care of their business affairs; kept their little noses from sticking too far in the air (a state of affairs which, unfortunately, has happened to many a promising youngster); and who today has three of the best—and nicest—girl singers performing regularly for him each Saturday night at the El Monte ballroom.

The facts speak for themselves. Although the three girls are still very young (Molly, 14, Joanie, 17, Bucky, 24), they have been with Cliffie and his "Jamboree" gang for a total of ten years (Bucky for five years, Molly for three, and Joanie for two years.) It's not very often you find this in show business, especially with newcomers who become successful.

And it's not because the girls haven't been offered other opportunities. Molly, for example, after her record hit of "Tennessee Tango," and after several guest appearances from New York, which went coast-to-coast had several attractive offers thrown her way. Nevertheless, she preferred to come back home to California and stick with Mr. Stone. During the week she appears regularly on Pinky Lee's daily TV show.

Joanie O'Brien now also has her hands loaded, doing a daily network show over CBS-TV with Bob Crosby. It's a full time, five-day-a-week job which is giving her recognition as one of the top female vocalists in the nation. Every Saturday night, however, viewers can still see the blonde-haired beauty going through her paces on the hour-long "Hometown Jamboree."

Profiles

Off stage, the three little lassies are very likeable, very normal, and quite happy-go-lucky. Of course, they have their serious moments (as we

all do), but generally, when together they are laughing or joking about something.

Bucky, the eldest, is looked upon as a sort of "second mother." Joanie and Molly, still in their teens, are constantly chaperoned by their own mothers—two charming, easy-to-talk-to women who sort of "double-up" in their capacities as parents and providers of transportation and other miscellaneous jobs.

Bucky is the "live one" of the three. She's always in there with the wisecrack, the distorted facial expression, and the mimicking antics. She's an extrovert.

Little Molly ("I'm as tall as Bucky now") is pretty much the same way. Without being obsequious, she looks up to Bucky, and also tries to keep up with her, in jokes and in gestures. Though young, Molly is show business personified. She lives it, she breathes it, she looks it. She will probably never change.

Joan, on the other hand, (at least during the times we have seen them together) is the most reserved and quiet of the three. Though basically an extrovert like the others (a singer of songs cannot be otherwise), there are moments, as in the ballads she sings, when a pensive glance or a slight smile make her seem older than she actually is. In addition to her fine, natural voice, and wholesome appearance, this may be one of the reasons she has gone so far in so short a time.

Little Molly has only one complaint about her two companions. (And it's not a very serious one.)

Says Molly: "Look at how long their fingernails are! They won't let me grow mine that way. I have to keep them short."

Reply Bucky and Joanie: "We don't want Molly to grow old—like us!"

FOR some time daytime TV has been staggering along on an inept and uninspired basis. There seemed to be the idea that only morons watched TV during the day. But then NBC suddenly decided that daytime viewers were anything but moronic and deserved something different, something constructive, something good. The result was "Home," which stars Arlene Francis.

The idea for this hour-long, five-day-a-week show was Pat Weaver's. When he first joined NBC this was one of his initial projects. He felt that daytime programming would support a show of some substance

Is "Home" the Answer to Radio's Soap Opera

Just when everyone thought that daytime TV was on a par with radio's much-maligned soap operas, along came Arlene Francis and "Home" and everybody sat up and asked, "What's happened?"

related to the things women are most interested in — their homes, their families, and themselves. It has since turned out to be entirely different from anything on the channels since it is not a soap opera, it is not an audience participation or panel type show, and it is not a variety show.

Okay, so what is it?

Its subject matter is useful service — the presentation of the new and the good in Fashions, Beauty, Home Decoration, Architecture, Food, Family Affairs, Entertainment, Gardening, and Shopping News. On one show Arlene Francis took the company to Texas to do a show on Texas cooking, barbecue style, southwest fashions, and dancing. Another time, "Home" presented a feature called "People who knock at your door." The first guest, naturally, was a Fuller Brush Man. Still another feature was "self defense for women" in which roving editor Estelle Parsons suggested precautions to take when women are alone in the house or on the street. Even history got a fair shake on the show when a program based on an historical theme was presented.

Women have already indicated they like "Home." Mail has reached the 50,000 mark and many letters say in effect, "I don't have time in my busy mornings for entertainment, but 'Home' does give me so much of value that I have rearranged my

figure out how she manages to do so much and always with such congeniality. Others who work with her are Eve Hunter, fashion and beauty editor, Poppy Cannon, food editor, Will Peiglebeck, gardening editor, our own Mary McAdoo from KNBH who delightfully handles features here from KNBH, and Sydney Smith, home decoration editor.

Since "Home" is given a full-scale

network presentation, there are naturally problems. The main one is doing an hour-long show five times a week based on prepared material. This is not a format show. Each day's program must be planned in advance, not only in the regular sense of television production but also in the sense of magazine production. This combination of publishing and television deadlines takes some doing. The problem has been considerably eased by the fact that members of the staff are experienced both in publishing and TV.

"Home" is further proof that the public will "buy" a solid show. The only reason it has settled for the mediocre in daytime TV is because that is all it's been given in large doses. In fact, this one is so good that even the commercials sound interesting.

HIS program is something that television cannot duplicate."

This is the way that Bob Kintner, president of the American Broadcasting Company, described the spectacular radio series, "The World We Live In."

The radio adaptation, which began on April 8, is based on a series of articles printed by LIFE magazine. ABC radio did a similar thing last year, devoting an entire series of radio programs to LIFE's articles on "Our Modern Heritage."

Imagination Gets "Play"

The current series of "The World We Live In" is an amazing example of what radio can and should do to entertain and educate the public. In every respect it is a tribute to the industry.

A large and excellent cast tells each episode in dramatic form using a fine balance of comedy, tragedy, and narration. The sound effects of such diversified things as earthquakes, glaciers, and large pre-historic animals give the program additional authenticity.

The main scientific facts, of course, are based on the LIFE articles. The vivid radio script, however, was specially written for the occasion.

Undoubtedly the greatest advantage that the radio adaptation has over any other medium attempting such a large-scale series is the amount of imagination that is left to each and every listener. Radio can "play" with the imagination more than other means of mass communication.

Incomparable Cast

Producer-director Sherman H. Dryer, two-time winner of the Peabody Awards and long known and recognized as one of the top programming men in the industry, fully utilized this freedom while describing such panoramic phenomena as the forming of continents, the wonder of the air we breathe, the story of the pre-historic beasts, the ever-changing face of the earth, and the drama of evolution. Charles Penman capably

handles the commentary.

The scope is so unlimited and fantastic that it must be heard to be believed. Because of the vastness of the subject matter, it is a type of program in which radio has a decided advantage over TV.

It is not too costly to produce the sound effect of an earthquake or a glacier moving. But imagine what the same would cost to have a visual effect! Magnificent spectacles such as these constitute only a small portion of each program.

Two other startling facts concerning "The World We Live In":


It took over three billion years to make.

And the "stars" of the show are the greatest and most unusual ever to be heard on radio: the earth, the sea, and the air.

Confessions of A TV Director

Ted Post is one of the most capable of all TV directors. But what are his reactions to stars? And how does he handle performers so they don't get temperamental on him? Here are a few of his problems.

WHEN you talk about the best in TV directors, you immediately think of Ted Post, who has directed many of Screen Gems' pictures for "Ford Theatre" and who has worked for Schlitz Playhouse. "Waterfront," and—well, you name a major filmed show and he's probably been at the helm at one time or another.

A young, quiet, yet enthusiastic man, Ted has achieved real fame in TV. Recently, he was nominated for the best direction of a TV show. He lost by one vote. He has become one of the most-in-demand directors in town and has had the distinction of megging more star names than any one else.

All of which sounds like delightful gravy. But he has his problems too.

"I'm a star-struck guy," Ted commented, "which may explain why I have practically no trouble with actors and actresses. I feel like being at their feet. When directing, I try always to consult not only the stars but the other players as to their feelings about scenes. I think that if you get their views, if they have the idea you're working together as a team, you have little or no trouble with them. In other words, I try to be a co-worker, not an autocrat.

"However, I don't like actors or actresses who rationalize when they're unprepared or who are afraid to attempt new things. You seldom find such types among the really experienced professionals, but you do run into them among the bush leaguers, the amateurs. I've only come in contact with such amateurs, though, about twice in the forty-seven shows I've directed.

"I've especially enjoyed working with Irene Dunne, Ida Lupino and Howard Duff, Richard Conte, Joanne Dru, Ann Harding, Edmund O'Brien, Ward Bond, Ellen Drew, and Paulette Goddard."

One star said, after his first TV stint, that he'd never do another show for television, but after seeing what

Ted Post did for him in the finished product he has called Ted almost every day since asking to do further shows with him. And Ida Lupino, a director herself, called to tell Ted that she and Howard had never enjoyed working in a picture so much because he had made them feel so much at home.

"Naturally, in this business you have to compromise and occasionally surrender your principles, but the trick is learning when you're surrendering so much you sink. I believe any director, or any man for that matter, must please himself artistically and must not lose that identity that sets him apart from other individuals.

Ted's problems as a director also embrace scripts, budgets, and time. The most time he has ever had to film a show was on a pilot he made recently for Samuel Goldwyn, Jr. It took four days instead of the customary three days because the picture's leads were two children who weren't allowed to work over specified lengths of time.

Ted has done both live and filmed TV—and he prefers film.

"I like film better because you have more control over what you do. I still remember with horror some of the live TV dramatic shows I did. In one called 'C.I.D.' with Wendell Corey, Signe Hasso, Jayne Meadows, the show was great up to the last forty seconds. Then the villain, who was cornered, was supposed to make a lunge through a door to escape. So what happened? The door, which was to have been left open, wouldn't budge. Wendell had to do some fast ad-libbing and a prop man had to open the door. But the show was ruined.

"Another time David Niven and Nina Foch were to do a very dramatic story. The day before the show was to go on the air the cast and I got the script—and we roared. It was that terrible. We finally decided to turn the whole thing into a comedy. It turned out to be a comedy. I

teacher of drama at Columbia University, Long Island University, New York High School of Performing Arts, a director at the Actors Studio with Elia Kazan. He started TV in 1950 when Sidney Kingsley, with whom he had been working in the author's play, "Darkness at Noon," called CBS and suggested the network give Ted a job as director and writer. Ted was interviewed the next day and signed at once. He did many of the "Danger" shows and then went to NBC to direct "Armstrong Circle Theatre" plays. After that he did "Chesterfield Presents," "I Cover Times Square," and then came to Hollywood and to his current assignments.

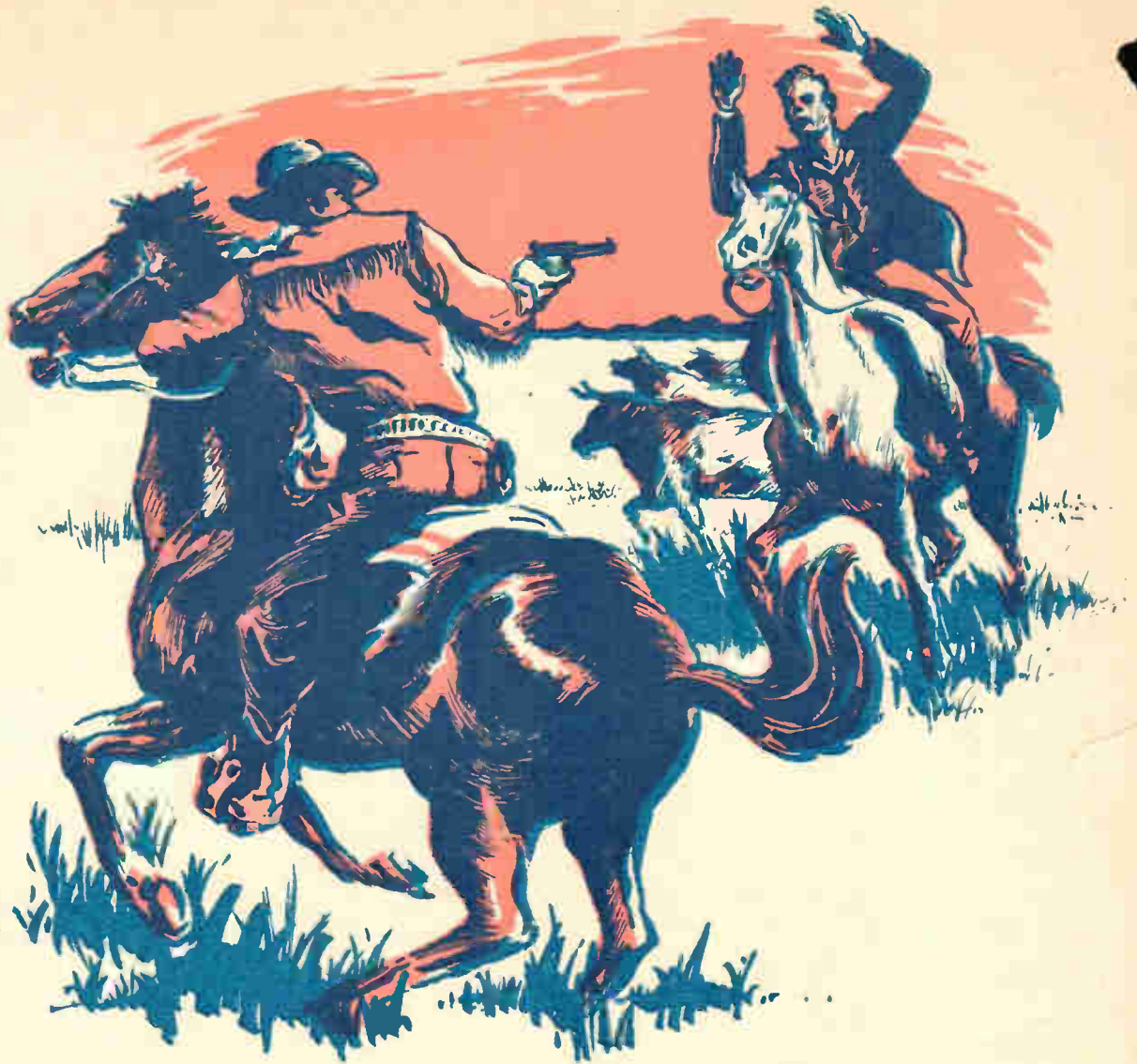
Ted is married and has two children, Laurie Margaret and Robert Charles. His wife, Thelma, is quite a person too. She had an M.A. at Columbia University at nineteen and was an authority on dietetics before her marriage.

He has only one complaint about the love of his life—directing: "Now that I'm 36," he laughed, "nobody can call me a boy genius any more."
