Reed Browning proves that strange things are happening at home on

"Beat the Record"

YOU CAN never tell what is going on at home. At least that's been the experience of Reed Browning, emcee of KECA's "Beat the Record" program.

What has all this got to do with a radio program? "Beat the Record's" format requires Reed to call home contestants to see whether or not they can out-guess a studio contestant in identifying the name of a record. Although the home contestants are tipped off in advance that Reed is going to call them, their preoccupation with other matters often leads to amusing situations, which throws his show off schedule.

On one occasion the ringing telephone pierced what seemed like an endless sixty seconds of dead air before the home contestant picked up the receiver to answer the phone. A rather harassed Reed asked the woman what she was doing that took so long for her to answer the phone. She accounted for her slow response by explaining that she had been kissing her husband goodbye. Reed helplessly concurred that this was an excellent reason for being held up on the telephone.

On another broadcast, giggling girlish voices drifted into the telephone when a busy mother asked Reed to wait a minute while she cleared the house of a Brownie club meeting before participating in the program. A rather nonplussed Reed ad libbed while the contestant readied herself for the program.

Coping with the unexpected reactions of home contestants would be enough for one emcee to contend with but Reed has other problems too . . . problems concerning studio

contestants. Because the show emanates from a small studio, containing no auditorium, Reed usually acquires his "studio" contestants by wandering into the lobby of KECA's Vine Street studios and asking whoever happens to be about whether or not they are willing to participate in a "Beat the Record" broadcast. Dauntless Reed Browning claims he is probably the only audience-participation program on the air without an actual studio audience.

However, his slightly unconventional format doesn't seem to faze Reed, who has had a wealth of background and experience in broadcasting. Reed was an English major at college. Before graduation he was casting about for a broadcasting job and decided to send records of his voice to such lush and salubrious locations as Bermuda, Mexico City and Hawaii. On the strength of one recording he was hired by KGMB in Honolulu. During his two years there he became known as "Unka Beel" (Uncle Bill) on the All-Hawaii Amateur Hour. Eventually he and his wife, Laurel, whom he met on the Islands, left for the States. His long list of subsequent radio and TV credits is impressive. Some of his outstanding announcing chores include "Philco Hall of Fame," "Breakfast In Hollywood," and on TV the narration for "Crusade in Europe," to name but a few.

Reed is accustomed to the strange ways of radio but he is more convinced that strange things are happening at home. Maybe not so strange to those engaged in the various activities, but strange as far as Reed Browning, emcee, is concerned.

Who is TV's

sidize TV programs (not a very likely thing to happen, thank goodness!) all types of commercials—good, bad, and indifferent—will be around as long as television itself is.

One thing can help ANY commercial. And that is a good announcer. "Pitching a product" on TV is an art in itself. Naturally some men are more proficient at it than others.

Who is TV's best commercial announcer? Probably a better way of asking the question is: Who is YOUR favorite?

From each of the seven stations in Los Angeles we have selected an announcer whom we think represents the very best in his field. Here are the "select seven":

Harry Von Zell

Von Zell occupies a unique role on Channel 2's "George Burns and Gracie Allen Show" in that he is not only the announcer but also one of the featured players. Of course this helps many times as he is able to co-ordinate the commercial within the script itself. Commercials by Von Zell, one of the real veteran TV, radio and movie personalities around Hollywood, are usually pretty easy to take and this additional "gim-

pick" makes it all the more pleasant.

Married in 1925 to Minerva McGarvey, the former boxer and payroll clerk is now a grandfather and spends his spare time ranching on his Encino estate.

George Fenneman

Actually when George delivers a commercial on NBC it's a wonder that the women pay any attention to the cigarette or automobile he's trying to sell. To put it real bluntly, the women are "real gone over George."

Maybe it's his neat appearance, or the perfect use of the English language, or the quiet self-assurance he has about him. At any rate, because of his appearance on the Groucho Marx show, "Dragnet," and the Martin and Lewis radio show, he has built up one of the finest and most respected reputations in the TV-radio world.

In private life, George is married to the former Peggy Clifford, lives in Sherman Woods, and has three children.

Dick Lane

When Dick Lane stands next to an automobile, slams his hand on top of the fender, and then exclaims: "This is where we are going

COMMERCIALS take a beating on television. They are abused, laughed at, ignored, and even turned off completely by the irate public.

Not all commercials. Of course not. Many are as entertaining and enjoyable as the show itself. And more often than not, the commercials pay off for the sponsor.

Some of them are pretty punk though. No doubt about that.

But unless the United States adopts the same policy as Great Britain and has the government sub-

to separate the men from the boys!" —brother, you know he means it. That's exactly what versatile Dick has done on many occasions—separated the men from the boys.

In show business ever since the age of sixteen, Dick is constantly being requested by sponsors on KTLA. Currently, he's handling the commercials on the Spade Cooley Show, "Roller Derby," and Wrestling."

Dick has been with KTLA since 1942, and he and his wife and two children live in Beverly Hills.

Dennis James

Always recognized as one of the best emcees, and, one of the best dressed men on TV, Dennis James has been recently acclaimed for his handling of commercials, especially his cigarette pitches on Herb Shriner's "Two for the Money."

Daily he can be seen on Channel 7 on "Turn To A Friend." He was TV's first regular sports commentator on both studio and remote pickups; the first emcee of a video variety show, and TV's first and probably best-known wrestling reporter in the East.

Gene Baker

This Oregon-born announcer on

the Mutual-Don Lee and KHJ-TV "Queen For A Day" program, made his radio debut back in 1926. Over the past twenty-seven years he has literally done everything in the business, including a season as soloist with a symphony orchestra and a starring role in his own musical show.

The "Queen's" pitch man is married to the former Nancy Keith, and lives in Northridge with his five children.

Jackson Wheeler

There are very few men, if any, who could do the job that Jackson Wheeler does, night after night, on KTTV. He's been at his job, five days a week, for over six years now—without a vacation.

A news reporter, sports reporter, emcee and special events man for Channel 11, he is primarily known for his late movie shows. He has actually been on the camera for over twenty-eight hours a week, for as many as seventy-one different sponsors. Sometimes it's difficult to make one sponsor happy. Think of the problems that Jackson has with his almost unbelievable list. For quantity in commercials, Jackson is undoubtedly the number one man in Los Angeles. Imagine what he could

do if he could really concentrate on just one product!

An outstanding student at Stanford University, and one of CBS's top announcers for many years, Jackson joined KTTV in January, 1949. He and his wife, Thelma, have three wonderful children.

Jack Narz

Undoubtedly one of the fastest rising young announcers in TV today is Jack Narz. Jack got his first big break on a local station with KLAC-TV. He still does the commercials on Betty White's "Life With Elizabeth."

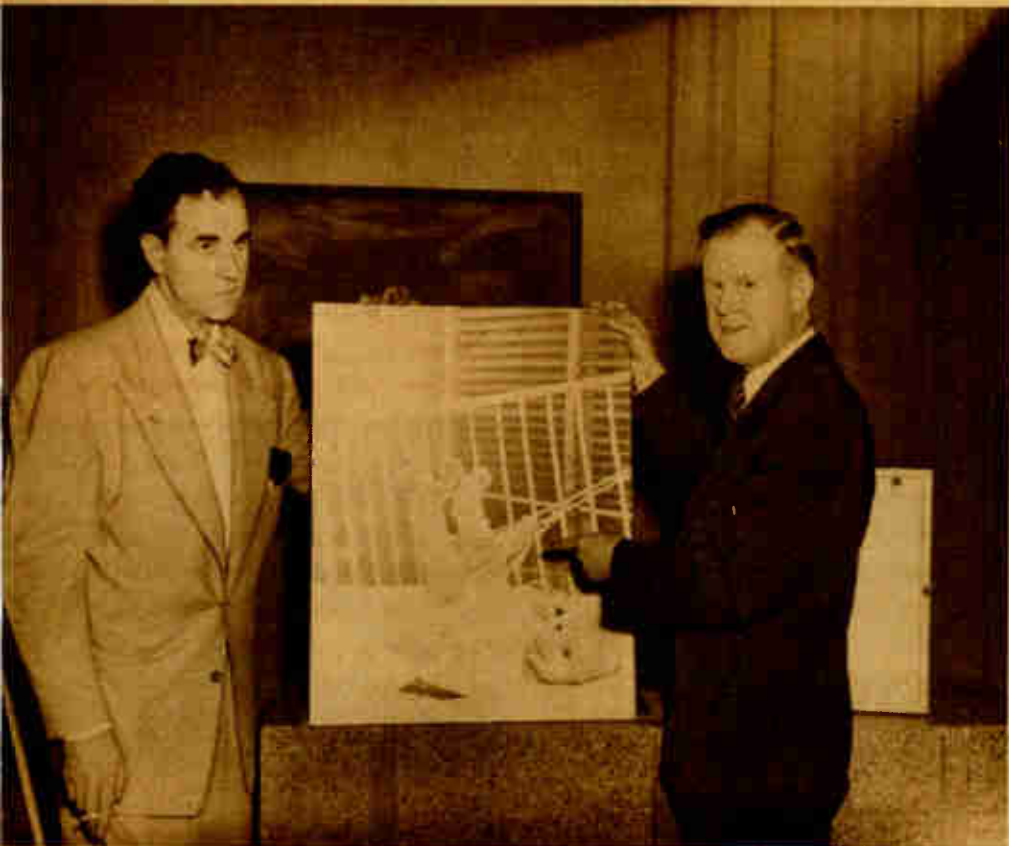
On the networks Jack has really hit the commercial jackpot lately, doing "Space Patrol," "Place the Face," "Claim to Fame," and others. He also handles beer commercials on KTLA's "Frosty Frolics."

With a little more "security" behind them, Jack and his wife, Mary Lou, have really concentrated on a family life during the past five years. They have three sons, ranging in age from one to five years, and are expecting another child next month.

A Doctor in Every Living Room

A PERSON who invests a few hundred dollars in a TV set certainly gets his money's worth after a while. He gets movies, the biggest sporting events, top dramatic shows, excellent variety shows, and lots more. If you actually had to pay for these events the figure would be quite fantastic.

Why, it's even gotten to the point where the TV viewers can now save money on doctors' bills. KTLA, Channel 5, can be thanked for this.

Ever since July, 1953, the local station has been featuring a program called "Ask Your Doctor." As a public service feature, there are not even any commercials to contend with.

No Complaints

Ordinarily you would think that the various MD's in Los Angeles would complain vigorously against giving away free medical advice on the air. After all, doctors have to

study many years and pay off a lot of their own money for an education before they can even begin to cash in on their original investment.

There's no such problem in the case of this program however. It has the full sanction and co-operation of both the Los Angeles County Medical Association and the California State Medical Association. After seeing and hearing the show, you can readily understand why the local medics have not yelled "robber!"

From Top to Bottom

Each week one specific subject is chosen, such as pre-maternal care, arthritis, eye, nose, throat and chest disorders, etc. Any and all types of medical disorders are susceptible to discussion, providing that the details are always in good taste and not objectionable in the average living room.

Each week a different panel of doctors who are specialists in the topic are on hand to give their ad-

vice. As Gil Martyn, moderator of the program, explains: "The entire program is handled just as if it were taking place in a doctor's office. We are merely bringing the consultation room into the living room."

Although the doctors will answer the many phone calls made directly to KTLA during the program, at no time do they give specific remedies or treatments to specific persons. To the individual who suffers from the ailment under discussion, they suggest that he ask his own doctor what should be done.

Naturally, on such a program as this, it is inevitable that some subjects are pretty delicate and personal and would be described by some touchy people as "not very nice." Oddly enough, however, during all the time "Ask Your Doctor" has been on the air, not one single person has phoned or written complaining about the subject matter.

Comply With Complaints

All letters sent to KTLA asking for advice on a certain medical ailment are forwarded to the Medical Association. None of them is discarded.

The difficult and excellent job of co-ordinator for this entire program is handled by Mr. Bill Tobitt. Although it may seem offhand to be almost impossible for a TV newscaster to be a moderator on "Ask Your Doctor," Gil Martyn, who originally started on the show, found himself very much at home. He was the ideal choice to translate the complex medical terminology so that the laymen could understand it.

Gil studied pre-med at the University of Denver and had two years of medical school at the University of Colorado before he decided to be a newsman. Since he has to "bone-up" each week on the subject under discussion, after twenty-three years Gil discovered that he was back at the same routine again — studying medicine.

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Around TV Row

Spike Jones had better keep his eye on zany Hawthorne, who initiated a one-man band on his KTLA ailer. Hawth plays the Hogantwanger, Trombunny, Banjoraff and a Fiddle-diddle. . . . Reverend James McClain, the original quizmaster of radio's "Dr. I. Q." programs, takes a leave of absence from his clerical duties to emcee the televersion of "Dr. I. Q." on KABC-TV.

Anita Colby replaces Arlene Dahl as hostess on the "Pepsi-Cola Playhouse." . . . Fred Allen's new format really isn't new. He used an applause meter on his old "Stars of Tomorrow" radio program. Comparison of meters is more apropos than comparison of formats. The highly perfected electronic device he now uses on "Judge For Yourself" compared with the earlier applause meters is like putting the latest jet plane next to the Kitty Hawk.

Catch Kaye Ballard, formerly featured with Spike Jones, in her newest, "Great to Be Alive" at the Las Palmas. The young comedienne has a bit of the Marsha Raye in her. Many of you have seen her talents on the Garry Moore or "Stork Club" telecasts. . . . "Up for Adoption," Kathy Godfrey starrer, never hit the videolanes. Stanza was dropped because of complications. In lieu of "Adoption" Kathy makes her network debut in "On Your Way," a quiz show with John Reed King.

Bob "Buffalo Bob" Smith of "Howdy Doody" will not accept any product for sponsorship which is not deemed wholesome for youngsters. Soft drink sponsors have tried unsuccessfully for a period of years to latch on to this kid show. . . . Shirley Thomas, NBC's Hollywood correspondent, is contemplating a televersion of her radio ailer.

Ed Sullivan originates his February 14 telecast from Hollywood. His St. Valentine's stanza will be built around MGM's 30th anniversary. . . . "Annie Oakley," KTTV's new Western saga is a welcome relief for sagebrush viewers.

Ray Bolger is slated for a return engagement at the Sahara upon completion of his current telefilm schedule. . . . Jim Backus's answer to 3D and TV is color radio.

As we go to press the Godfrey-CAA situation remains status quo. Godfrey refused to comment on the recommendation that he be grounded and the Washington Bureau of the CAA was giving the matter very careful consideration. It seems as though everyone has been gunning for Mr. Godfrey of late. Last week a syndi-

cated columnist and fellow CBS-TV star devoted his entire column to blasting Godfrey. That Julius LaRosa incident really started the ball rolling. Godfrey has always been criticized for antagonizing people. However, it appears as though this antagonism has become more prevalent since Godfrey's operation. Could there be any relationship between the two? M.R.

Palladium Schedule

Let's hope some local TV station can do a few remote telecasts from the Hollywood Palladium during the next few months. The famed dance hall, located in the heart of the TV-radio world, has a great list of dance bands coming up.

Harry James is currently filling out a five-week engagement. On Friday, January 29, Ralph Flanagan and his dance band open a four-week engagement. Freddy Martin follows for four weeks beginning February 26. After Freddy, comes Jerry Gray and his Band of Today.

KNXT formerly had "Palladium Party" on the air, and the various local stations have done a few special events from the Palladium. If enough of a compensation can be made to headman Sterling Way, we feel sure some arrangements could be

made. What Welk did for the Aragon Ballroom in Santa Monica, certainly these big-name bands should be able to do the same, and more, for the Palladium in Hollywood.

Jack Benny's comic mastery was felt every moment he was on camera on his recent telecast. Benny had Liberace as his guest and his material was built around the musician.

Stanza concerned Benny playing his violin at a Liberace concert. Liberace played it straight, too straight. Even his famous smile was kept to a minimum. The exaggerated play on candelabras and white tie and tails was a funny bit, made even funnier by Benny's nuances.

Benny and Liberace hammed it up with "September Song." After their "performance," Liberace paid Benny his musician's fee . . . \$1.80 per hour.

Granted Benny's writers have written funnier scripts but somehow this "quiet" stanza brought out the best in Benny, however Liberace will never make a straight man. M.R.

Point With Pride

. . . to Paul Douglas and Nina Foch's performances in "The Rise of Carthage" The two gave a most convincing portrayal as the insecure, unhappy (though wealthy) couple who eventually learned that happiness comes from within. "Carthage" was an off-beat script encompassing both dreams and reality.

. . . to Robert Ellenstein's magnificent portrayal of Mannie Balestrero in Robert Montgomery's "Case of Identity." The actor's sensitive performance of a bewildered musician who was falsely accused of theft was one of the best pieces of acting ever seen on this stanza. The script was based on a true story, which was reported in Life magazine several months ago. Actor Ellenstein really lived the role.

Let's hope TV producers begin making full use of her many talents.

The limitations on censorship on the movies will be felt by the TV industry, for the two mediums are so much alike. Don't be surprised if a good many of the bars are let down on TV shows. We've heard a lot of complaints about the canceling of the fights last week and the substitution of the **General Motors Auto Show**. It's the men who have complained naturally, but their main beef was that the show was nothing but a sustained commercial for General Motors products with **Arthur Godfrey's** splicing an added thorn. The station may have felt that there was interest in the new cars, as

there certainly is, but there's no denying the fact that the show was primarily a commercial. There is a matter here of good taste.

Roddy McDowall has been making some excellent appearances on TV recently, his latest being on "TV Sound Stage" and on "Medallion Theatre." He has done such creditable work that it's to be hoped he will be kept even busier on the TV circuit. The young man has plenty to offer in the acting line.

There's been some question as to the effects on the "Topper" show of the impending blessed event in the **Anne Jeffreys-Robert Sterling** household. Since they play the charming ghosts on the program, complications could conceivably arise. But from all we have gathered there are enough shows ahead to take care of the situation. At any rate, it's good news for **Anne and Bob** and it only makes their marriage even more complete.

"**Top Banana**," as probably most of you know, was a Broadway hit that satirized **Milton Berle**. As a movie—which is an exact replica of the stage show—it isn't as funny but it's still an amusing satire on TV and **Uncle Milties**. **Phil Silvers** is, of course, great, and why hasn't he been on more TV shows? This guy could hold up a show all of his own. If not a regular series, why not at least some frequent guest shot appearances. This is a funn—ny man.

Jeanette MacDonald's **Cocoanut Grove** opening was a success from most angles. She still has that indefinable charm and her lovely voice will always be a delight. **The Grove** should do top business these next weeks. As for **Jeanette**, she has made a few TV appearances and it's hoped she will do more. She would nicely grace any show.

TOPS IN ALBUMS: Heading the list are eight selections from the soundtrack of "**The Glenn Miller Story**" (Decca) that are the closest sounds yet to this great band of yesterday. Recorded by the **Universal-International Studio Orchestra** conducted by **Joseph Gershenson**, "In The Mood," "String Of Pearls," "American Patrol" and the other bits of nostalgic Miller provide great listening for the sentimentalist . . . and wait'll you hear "**St. Louis Blues March**" by a forty-five-piece brass band! . . . **George Lewis**



leads his famous **New Orleans Ragtime Band** through a sextet of tunes in the Dixieland mood for his first album on the **Jazz Man** label. "Ice Cream," "Down By The Riverside," "Doctor Jazz," "A Closer Walk With Thee" and "When The Saints Go Marching In" are given longer than usual treatment, but we liked what we heard. However, the topper is **Lewis' own "Burgundy Street Blues,"** with its chanted words by **Monette Moore** describing scenes of old **New Orleans** against **George's** superb low-register clarinet.

Best IN SINGLES: **Frank Sinatra** (Capitol) leads the way for the week's best platter with "Young-At-Heart," a lovely ballad with intelligent lyrics and unforgettable melody you'll be humming once you've heard it—and just about **Sinatra's** best on this label.

. . . **Jane Russell, Connie Haines, Beryl Davis** and **Della Russell** blend voices but good for the modern spiritual "Make A Joyful Noise" (Coral). Singing as though they really enjoyed it, the gals could have a hit if it gets a break on the juke boxes. . . Watch out for **Georgia Gibbs' "Somebody Bad Stole De Wedding Bell"** (Mercury). Calypso tempo'd by **Glenn Osser, Her Nibbs** belts out the lyrics with full voice on this catchy melody. In direct contrast, it's a whispery **Georgia** on the reverse for "Baubles, Bangles And Beads" and quiet listening. . . **Louis Armstrong** (Decca) revives "The Gypsy" in good style to excelent backing by **The Commanders**. It's pretty hard to beat the combination of **Louis' asphalt baritone** and his soaring trumpet, and the **Armstrong fans** are legion, so how can anyone ever say anything bad about **Satchmo?** . . . A.M.

Five days before telecast time, rehearsals are always pretty sketchy affairs, so Miss Merman and her guest, **Mr. James Durante**, were feeling their way through their lines.

JIMMY IS RECOGNIZABLE ANY-TIME, but I doubt that many would have known the great songster on this day. She wasn't done up in a glamour manner. This was plain old work and called for work clothes—grey and

white pullover sweater, grey slacks, red flat-heeled shoes. Miss Merman's auburn hair, dressed with the usual fluffy pompadour in front, was skinned back behind her ears and tied into a pony tail. She wore very small pear earrings, her wedding band, a beautiful yellow-gold watch bracelet, and tinted glasses.

EVERY NOW AND THEN SHE CHEWED gum abstractedly. Her only wrap on this pouring-down-rain day was a short red coat.

"I LOVE RED!" SHE ENTHUSED when Lifeliner asked her which color she would most like to wear for color television. Her second choice is pink—on the beige side. Some of the clothes she wears on TV are from her own regular wardrobe, like the mink she wore on "Comedy Hour."

TELEVISION NOT ONLY FITS MISS Merman like the proverbial glove, but it dovetails into her new life as Mrs. Bob Six, wife of the Denver air tycoon. "I'm through with Broadway," she said with finality. "You have to stay where your husband is if you're going to make a happy marriage." From here on out, Miss Merman will allocate her career between TV and pictures. Immediately having wound up her "Colgate" chore, she and her husband are vacationing in Hawaii. Then she comes back for another "Comedy Hour" next month, followed by her part in the movie, "Showbusiness." Mr. Six tries to fit his busy schedule into his wife's activities and

KECA Becomes KABC

Effective February 1, radio listeners in the Greater Los Angeles area henceforth will hear the call letters, KABC, when they tune to 790 on their dials. These are the new call letters for the American Broadcasting Company's owned and operated Los Angeles-Hollywood station, known for the past fifteen years as KECA. The change in identification is to more closely associate the station with its parent network—ABC.

KABC has been carrying ABC network programs since January 1, 1936, and was purchased outright by the network on August 1, 1944, but continued under the call letters derived from its previous owner, Earle C. Anthony, until the present change.

Hereafter, therefore, when listeners think of "America's Town Meeting of the Air," the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts, the commentaries of Walter Winchell, Chet Huntley and others, the music of Paul Whiteman, and scores of other favorite network programs, as well as the many popular local personalities such as Bill Davidson, Paul Masterson, Art and Doty Todd, Reed Browning, Nancy Holme and Elroy "Crazy Legs" Hirsch, they should bear in mind that they are to be heard on the local radio station identified by the call letters, KABC.

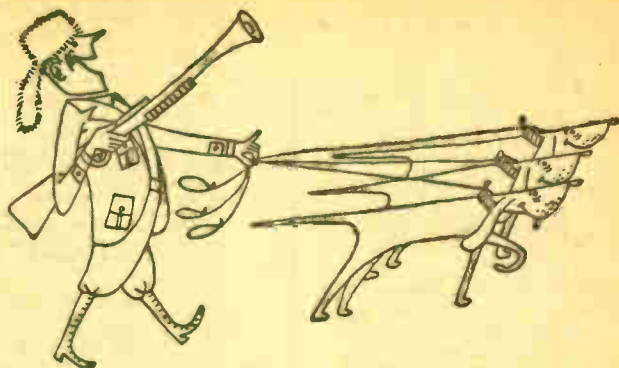

ELROY "Crazy Legs" Hirsch is more than a nice fellow with a big smile. He's more than a great football player. He's a guy with a lot of guts. He's also a radio announcer with a great future in front of him.

On Sunday afternoon last week, if you had attended the All-Pro Bowl game, you would have seen a terrible, almost tragic incident. Elroy caught a pass. (He's been known to catch a few in his time). He was tackled, hard and clean. His head bounced off the hard gridiron turf like a rubber ball.

A brain concussion almost ruined Elroy's career many years ago. Although it never completely stopped "Crazylegs," it has never ceased bothering him. The latest on Sunday, which was the final game of the season for Elroy, kept him on the bench.

On Sunday night, and Monday, there was some speculation in the daily press that the injury might end Elroy's career.

On Tuesday, during a two-hour TV-RADIO LIFE interview, the greatest end in the game today told us the details:

"I remember catching the pass. After that, everything went blank. Then I remember sitting on the bench. I saw that I was sitting in the Coliseum. I wondered what I was doing there. I saw some white jerseys on the field, and I wondered what they were doing there because I didn't recall ever having played a team in white jerseys.

"The next thing that came to my mind was the front of the house my wife and I recently purchased out in Van Nuys. I could see every minor detail. It was almost as if I could reach out and touch it. Then a lot of things, all mixed up, ran through my mind." Elroy smiled and joked when he told us these things. It was serious when it happened, though. And it still is.

The All-Pro Bowl game MAY be the last time Elroy Hirsch will ever don a football uniform. The reason? Oddly enough, it's not because of the injuries to his head, although his wife and parents want him to quit because of that. The big reason is RADIO. It's his job with KABC as a regular member of the ABC staff that may end his grid career.

"I'm in California for good now. The only way they'll get me to go back to Wisconsin, or any place else, is in a coffin. I've bought a home out here, and I intend to live here permanently," Hirsch explained.

"If, and it's a big IF, I can make a real success of myself as a radio announcer, and feel that I can make a good living at it, then I'll quit playing pro ball. After all, I've had eight years of playing professional football and it's about time I settled down to some-

thing with a future. I love the game, but I don't want to coach.

"The next five or six months will tell whether or not I go back with the Rams next season."

That's the final, complete and last word on Elroy Hirsch. The famous number 40 has always wanted to be a radio announcer. His big break came last year. Glenn Davis was originally scheduled to do a sports show on KABC. Glenn, however, left for Texas where he got interested in oil wells.

They asked Elroy to take his place. This past summer "Crazy Legs" signed a full-time contract with the ABC outlet. During the past year alone, the tall, lanky blonde has improved tremendously as a sportscaster. His five o'clock program over KABC is one of the most listened to sports programs in the area—especially for the going-home automobile crowd.

Elroy is also adding some new features, such as items on skiing, bowling, fishing, etc., in order to get the interest of the entire family, and not just the "major sports fans."

So don't be surprised if Elroy Hirsch does not suit up next winter when the football season starts. The Ram's loss will be Radio's gain.

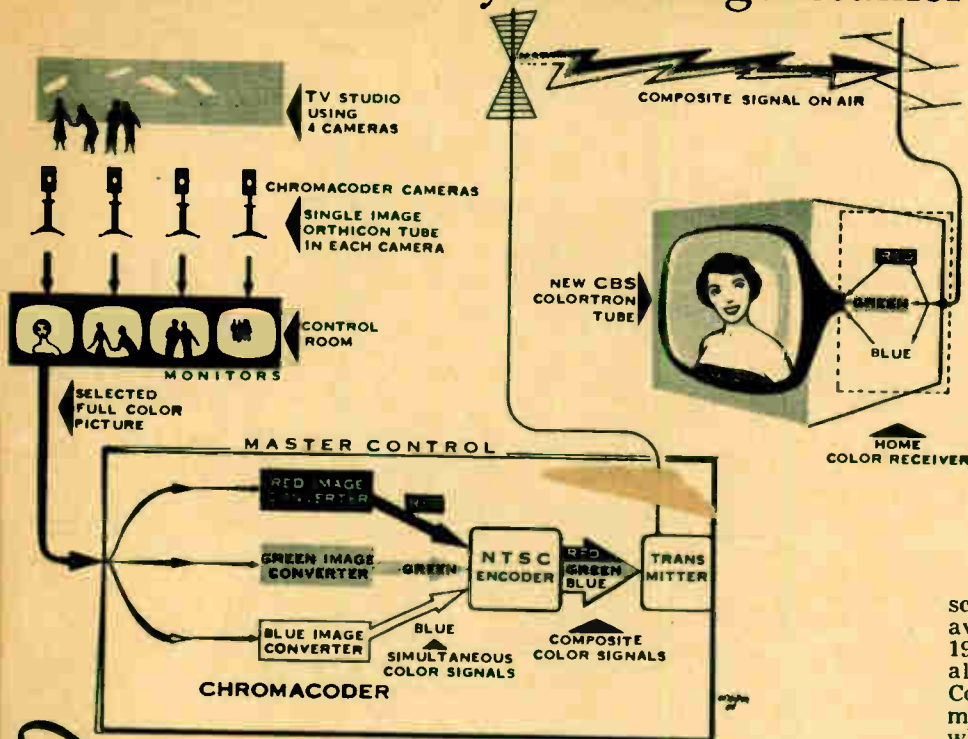

Don't Let Color TV Scare You!

Color Conclusions

A sufficient amount of small-screen color TV sets will not be available to the public until late 1956 or 1957. The high price will also be pretty tough to knock down. Color TV sets cost much more to make than the regular black and white machines, mainly because there are twice as many tubes and three times as many parts.

The price will come down, but just as in the case of black and white sets, it will take several years. If you have your heart set on buying a color TV set in either two or four years from now, you had better count on paying somewhere in the \$1,000 bracket.

And that will be for just an 11½-inch screen, and possibly a little larger. However, when you ask questions about 21-inch to 27-inch color TV sets, even the experts themselves cannot give definite answers. Big-screen color TV for general consumption, according to the experts, is still at least five years away, if not more.

CBS-TV estimates that its CBS-Columbia color set will cost thirty per cent more than equivalent black and white sets by 1956.

Whatever happens to color TV in the future, your present black and white set will never be obsolete. TV shows transmitted in color can also be picked up, even with clearer images, on black and white screens.

So don't think you are wasting money on your present TV set. And if you are thinking of buying a new or better black and white set, don't let color TV scare you away.

When color TV comes along at a price the average family can afford, it will be another wonderful stride in TV history. But black and white TV, just like black and white motion pictures, are with us now and always will be.

TELEVISION set owners are worried. So are men who make and sell TV sets.

What's worrying them? The answer: a TV set.

Sounds funny, doesn't it? But it's not a laughing matter. It's a dollar and cents matter.

It's not just any ordinary TV set that is causing all the problems. It's a COLOR TV set.

For months now several TV manufacturers have been boasting loudly and long how grand and glorious their color TV sets are. They have given special demonstrations. Newspapers and magazines have been filled with facts and data about how TV color works, when TV color started, where TV color is being experimented on, who is making TV color click, and why TV color is the thing of the future.

Color Sickness

Shouldn't all this chatter about color TV make everyone happy? Unfortunately, it's making everyone sick—even the people who are working on the project at this very moment.

It's making approximately twenty-seven million people sick who now own black and white sets. Naturally, they are beginning to wonder if their present sets will be obsolete when the golden era of TV color comes around the corner.

It's making some 105,000 radio and

TV dealers in the United States plenty sick because people are afraid to go out today and buy a black and white set.

What is the story on color TV? When is it coming? How much will it cost? And how will it effect black and white TV?

Color Background

To begin with, there is no doubt that great and tremendous strides have been made in the development of color TV. The co-operation among the various TV manufacturers, after some initial confusion, has been a magnificent story of what American businessmen and engineers can do when they work together, and not against each other.

Back in 1950 the Federal Communications Commission approved a non-compatible color system. This means that for color TV the present black and white sets would have become obsolete.

Three years later the National Television System Committee, with the approval of the major TV set manufacturers, recommended that a compatible system be used. That's the way the matter stands today.

Approximately 50,000 fifteen-inch color TV sets (actual size 8¾ inches by 11½ inches) can be produced this year, at a cost of about \$1,000 apiece. In other words, less than one-half of the dealers in America will have just one set for demonstration purposes during the coming year.
