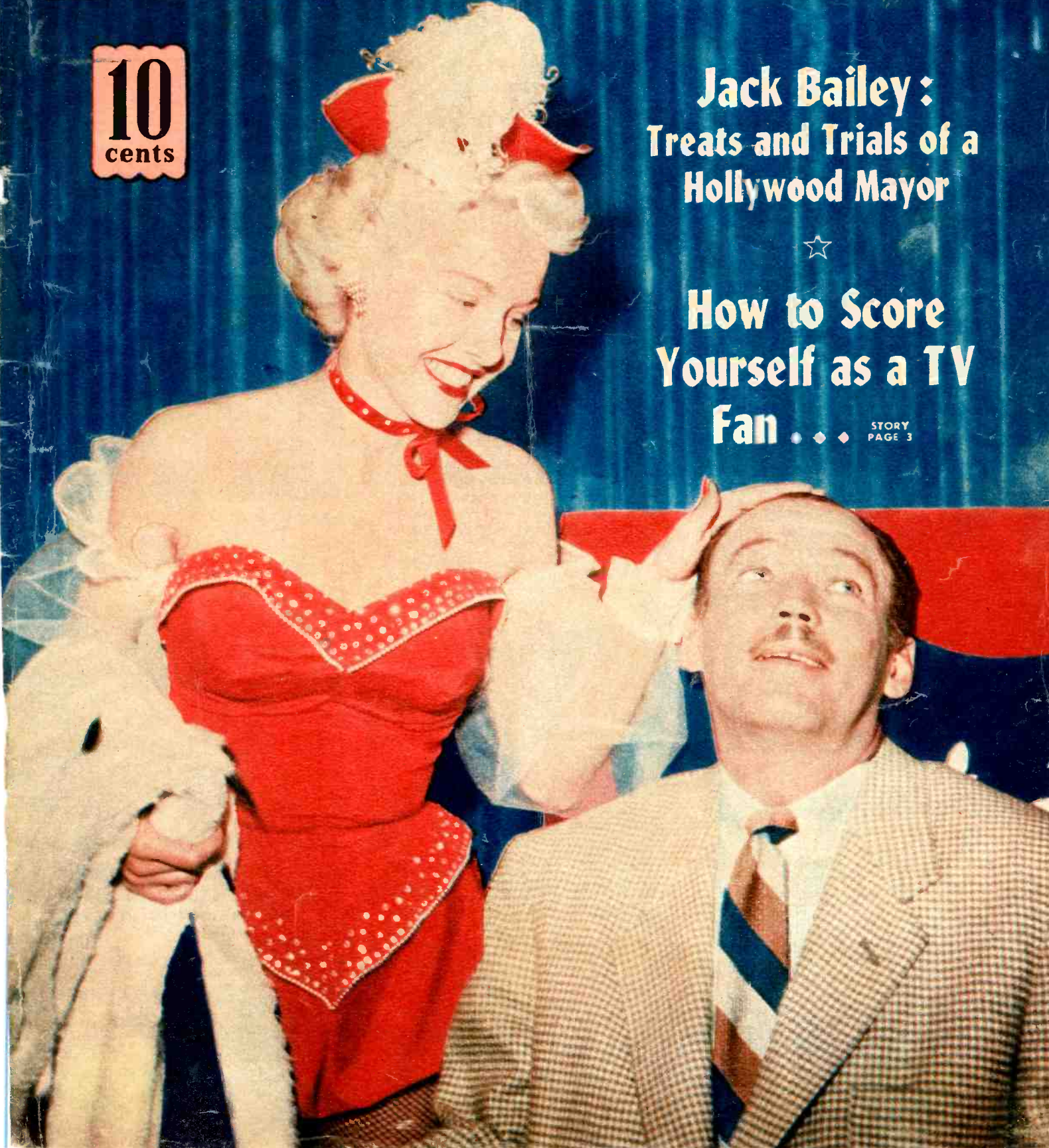

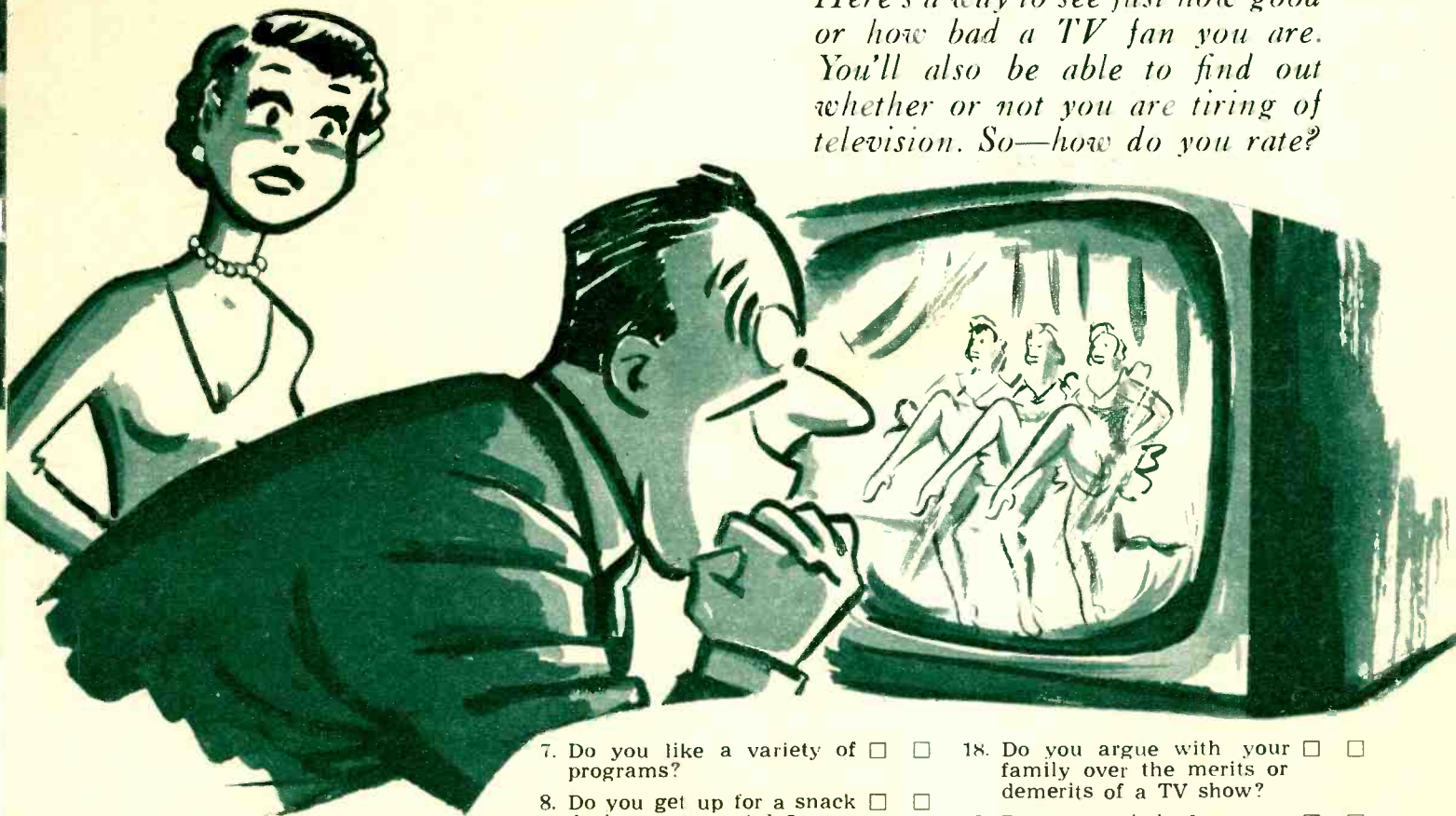

# What Is UHF?

*Is the wonder of electronics going to bring more television to more people?*

**T**HE TERM UHF is being bandied about more frequently every day. Just what does it mean and how will it effect television viewers?

Technically, UHF means the Ultra High portion of the frequency spectrum. Simply, it means more television for more people. When the FCC's allocations of VHF channels (Channels 2 through 13) were depleted they had to approve UHF channels to make room for more TV stations. This made possible the allocation of 2,051 UHF and VHF stations throughout the United States and its possessions.

*What is the difference between VHF and UHF?*

It's all television. As a practical matter for the consumer there is no discernible difference between UHF and VHF pictures on the screen of the receiving set.

*Does UHF have any relation to color television?*

Color Television can be broadcast on UHF or VHF channels.

*Can owners of VHF sets receive UHF stations?*

Yes, if they install a tuning device to their present sets which will enable them to tune in UHF telecasts just as they do VHF programs.

Thus far, commercial channel 22 and educational channel 28 are the only UHF stations in operation in the Los Angeles area. Channel 22 is operated by the John Poole Broadcasting Company and channel 28 is a project of the Hancock Foundation, with studios located on USC's campus. However, channel 28 is open to all educational groups. It is not at the disposal of USC exclusively.

*In what way does a UHF antenna differ from present VHF antennae?*

UHF antennae are much smaller in size and lighter in weight than VHF antennae. Although their location is somewhat more critical than for VHF it can be mounted on the same mast as an existing VHF antenna.

*What about UHF programming?*

KTHE-TV (Channel 28) has regular telecasts for two-and-a-half hours

each evening. The schedule includes a classroom workshop program and a community workshop stanza. Plans are under way for music, art and drama programs. The possibilities of televising the regular school board meetings for major communities in the area are also being considered. Although the public tags KTHE-TV an educational station, in reality it is a community station since it is available to civic groups, such as the PTA and citizen's committees as well as the schools.

KBIG-TV (Channel 22) was in the process of planning their program policy as we went to press. They were considering programming which would appeal to large minority groups such as the Spanish, Negro, and Western elements, or possibly all three.

UHF is definitely in its infancy but if it follows the growth of its sister frequency, VHF, set owners will be tuning their dials from channels 2 to 83 in short order. Many manufacturers have already begun to put all channel sets on the market.

# Good Music

## DOES PAY OFF ON TV!

**G**O THE Doubting Thomases who say that television viewers do not *want* good music . . . to critics who insist the average mentality of television viewers is a dozen years old . . . to those who wonder whether good music can be a success on television, Fred Waring has this to say:

"Our fan mail proves beyond any doubt that the current demand for good music is now stronger than ever before. More and more letters indicate preference for our choice of such selections as 'Nutmacker Suite', 'Rumanian Rhapsody', and so on. Viewers express a strong preference for exciting choral selections like 'Battle Hymn of the Republic', 'You'll Never Walk Alone', and 'So Beats My Heart'.

"If one of our General Electric television shows has a predominance of popular music in the lighter vein, we particularly feel the brunt of our viewers' ire. Our fans request the 'standard' songs for which the Pennsylvanians are best known—the exciting arrangements by Harry Simeone, Hawley Ades, and Roy Ringwald for which we're best known. Does *this* sound like the nation's musical taste is failing?"

Television does, of course, present mountainous problems to a musical organization as large as his; budgetary restrictions disallow the production of many showcases Fred would like to present. Fred predicts that despite prohibitive costs, music on television has just begun to grow. It's much more costly to maintain a show of the Fred Waring calibre

than to offer a weekly drama series—for not only must sixty-five Pennsylvanians be employed "on camera" each week, but Fred cites the fact that behind the scenes are an equal number of people actively concerned with every show. Audio and video technicians, scenic designers, costumers, producers-directors and staffs, stagehands, lighting men, cameramen, and countless other behind-the-scenes technicians are active in every Fred Waring production.

To add to the financial burden, Fred insists on maintaining his own staff of writers, musical arrangers, copyists, and production people. It is his belief that only by having his own "people" may he maintain the perfectionism which has been his trademark throughout the years.

The formula, for Fred Waring, has been a good one. His every performance rings of technical genius and musical brilliance unsurpassed in whatever medium he tackles.

Surrounded by carefully selected people who are all experts in their individual fields, Fred Waring has gathered together a tremendously talented organization—not only for his performing personnel, but for his production and office staff as well.

Fred feels that television still has a long way to go—but he expresses complete amazement at the improvements the new medium has achieved during the past three years. His own show has been the setting for many experimental devices. And since Easter Sunday, 1950—when The Fred Waring Television Show first



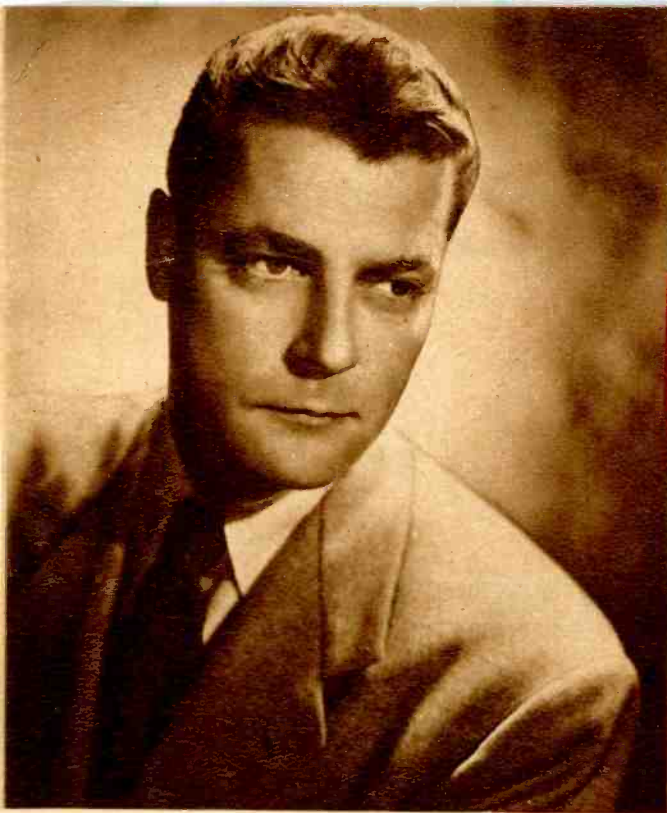

went on CBS-TV for General Electric—many of TV's most exciting "firsts" have enjoyed their debut aided and abetted by the Pennsylvanians.

"All television needs now," Mr. Waring says, "is a chance to grow normally by itself. And if the things we have learned in the last few years are any criteria, TV as an art medium will soon become a sound reality."

But his millions of devoted fans across the nation insist that the Fred Waring Show, perhaps more than any other, has indeed already established the fact that TV has already grown up. And Fred Waring, more than any other individual in music, has been responsible for this maturity.

## "Facts Only"

**F**RANK GOSS has a rather unique distinction. He's one man in the broadcasting industry who's glad the postman doesn't ring. His unbiased reporting leaves little ground for sincere, or even crank letters, from the listening audience.

Frank's popular two-a-day newscasts have an average 6.1 rating. And there is a decided reason why people tune in to Frank Goss. He doesn't color the news; he delivers it straight, straight as an arrow. Independent thinkers who abhor pre-digested news keep their radios set on KNX for "Frank Goss and the News."

But the newscaster's job is no cinch. Take a look at the problems Frank faces.

"First, CBS has a rigid policy regarding its newscasters—no editorializing—that's left for the commentators," Frank explains. "For broadcast purposes we have no personal opinions. A news item can be the epitome of facts but a slanted oral interpretation may change the entire meaning of the story. We must not editorialize with 'shaded' voices. Even such terrifying news as the POW atrocities in Korea must be told without emotion. It takes a great deal of will power to rule out feelings when reporting such news. This may make us seem like robots,

but robots don't have to exercise will power."

### Lead Story

Because many of the news programs are back to back, especially in the morning, the CBS news staff tried to avoid using the same lead story on each of its newscasts. Only when a news story is of utmost importance does Frank duplicate the lead item. However, even when he finds it necessary to use the same lead he employs a different approach to the story.

Frank claims he can't take all the bows for his popular news program.

"The unsung heroes are not on mike," he advises. "They are the competent news writing staff, which culls all the items from the wire services and rewrites the news. Their unbiased scripts are so letter-perfect that I seldom have to edit any of them.

"Even the tapes they insert from our overseas correspondents are factual reports. With such an objective writing staff how can I miss?"

He doesn't miss. Frank's lack of mail and high rating is a tribute to his direct, unbiased radio newscasting.

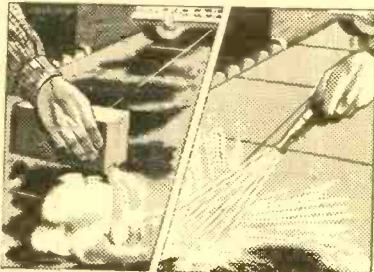

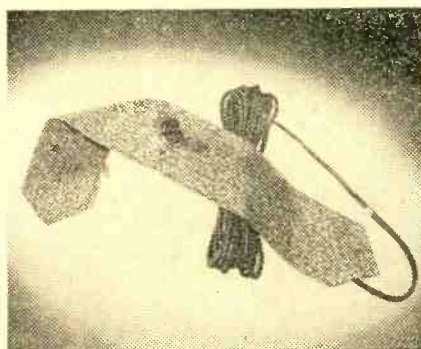

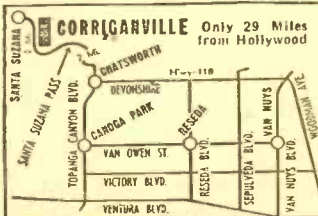

This is one of that genre of British musicals which depend almost entirely on music hall jokes of hoary vintage, chorus girls of same, and a saccharine romance between the two most improbable juveniles in the world. The "plot" has to do with an island kingdom dominated entirely by women, and their reaction when a plane manned by men (sounds logical) crash lands in their midst. What follows then beggars description, so I won't try.

"The Second Woman." (5) Feb. 12, 10:00. Here is another fairly recent release about a fellow, Robert Young, whose dog is murdered, rose bush is poisoned, Ming vase is broken, and house is burned down, but he, the glibble fool, just thinks he's having a run of bad luck. Betsy Drake knows better, however, and finally convinces him that someone is out to get him. He fakes a suicide, she is nearly run over and there is generally a deuce of a time before the mischief maker is finally brought to book. Miss Drake is the "Second Woman" in Mr. Young's life. The first one came to an unseemly end. So did the picture.

"Sleep, My Love." (9) Feb. 7, 9:00. Don Ameche is just a no good guy in this one. He tries to drive his wife, Claudette Colbert, mad and then kill her, and except for the timely intervention of Robert Cummings, he might have succeeded. The reason for Ameche's homicidal bent is that Miss Colbert wants to leave him and he's annoyed at her goings and Cummings.

One person counted five commercials before the program she was watching was resumed. Okay, so these "spots" help pay the bills, but can't they be spaced in a more logical fashion?

The show that seems headed for the big hit group is "Life With Father." Everywhere you go you hear people commenting about it and especially about Leon Ames. Leon, as you may know, won TV-Radio Life's Distinguished Achievement Award as the best new personality, and he is creating a following that is tremendous. He's the most interesting new person on TV—that's for sure. Anyone who has seen him in pictures shouldn't be surprised at his success, for he has always been a top actor.

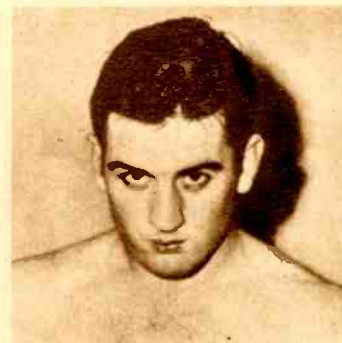

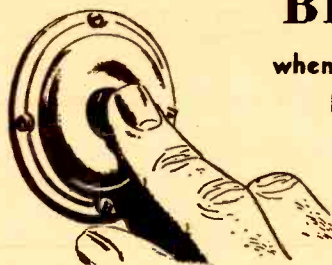

# Are These Stars

*There are signs that seem to prove that all is not well with the careers of these stars. Are they really slipping? If so, can they climb back up?*

**I**T'S rather common knowledge that TV has an enormous appetite when it comes to talent. Few performers seem to be able to withstand the onslaught of too much familiarity breeding too much contempt. When you take a look at the stars who were once top-rankers and see where they are now, you really have to believe that either TV audiences are not loyal or else that TV stars take too much for granted.

Locally, Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca, television stalwarts for years, seem to be losing much of their popularity. In fact, national ratings show that this team—and the show itself—has done a nosedive. There were attempts this year to change the format of "Show of Shows," and, in some respects, the efforts were successful. But the program has not climbed back up enough to its former status to warrant much enthusiasm.

The reason behind this decline is apparently that audiences have tired of the very same routines and the same types of comedy that once made Caesar and Coca a household byword. The most gifted performers in any medium—and certainly these two are gifted—could not continue to find good material week after week. There is only so much that any

comedians can do. Have Caesar and Coca scraped the bottom of the barrel?

These two stars, however, have not lost any of their great talent. They can still keep their hold on the public if they will do less and not appear quite so often.

The same is true of Red Skelton. Red's new shows for CBS-TV have, in some instances, given this great clown a chance to do the kinds of comedy that made him so very popular at one time. But too often he had had to struggle through material that was anything but inspired. And no star can survive bad material for long. If Red would veer away from his stock characterizations occasionally and reveal a little of his dramatic talents, perhaps he could regain his audience, for his talent is there. But Red is one person who doesn't know the meaning of defeat so don't count him out yet.

Ina Ray Hutton may continue to draw crowds to the theatre for her TV show, but she has lost out considerably where it counts—with the viewers who sit at home and keep the channels tuned in. Ina Ray is a victim of the new lack of interest in just plain old vaudeville shows. As a personality, she is no longer as

vital and as electric as she was in the past. She has been seen so often that again there is nothing new for her to offer. However, she has been a fabulous success story on TV. Few stars have held such a large fan following for so long a time. That she appears to be fading is, therefore, not as surprising as it seems.

Spade Cooley is another who has suffered because of the lack of interest in vaudeville-type programs. Spade has always been one of the hardest workers on TV. Even now he is trying to do the best possible each week. He tries to get the biggest names for his show. And he tries to please his audiences. But TV fans get to the point where they tire of formula—and Spade has, of necessity, had to stick to formula. Whether or not he can breathe sufficient new life into his show is something only time can prove. He, too, did much towards making TV a favorite pastime, but TV has grown so greatly that what was once popular is now no longer acceptable.

One of the most notable declines in popularity is that suffered by the wrestling programs. While they still hold interest for many; many fans are now turning away in disgust. Even the most naive finally had to admit that wrestling was more of

a dramatic event than a sporting event. And the various wrestlers' "acts" and "performances" got to be a bit too obvious and cloying.

Wrestling played its big part in helping to launch TV. It was a fabulous fad. But most wrestling programs are still operating on the theory that what was good enough two or three years ago is still all right. That's like saying that a 1920 car has as many improvements and modern advances as a 1954 model. If wrestlers aren't to fall flat on their faces and stay on that mat, they'd better go back to a startling premise—play the game honestly.

Marie Wilson was for some time the buxom beauty of TV—the most interesting new personality. But "Irma" has gone through so many changes and so many ups and downs that not even Marie's ample assets can do much any more. It still has its loyal viewers but there is a notable lack of excitement about the show. Marie is a provocative personality and an amusing performer, but what was once an entertaining show deteriorated into a far-fetched caricature. "Irma" needs more than a new room mate now. It needs a rejuvenation job.

Milton Berle is another who has

had his ups and downs. While he is gaining in some respects, he is also far from the great star he used to be. Miltie has done about everything there is for him to do. He can't surprise any more. It's almost like hearing a person tell a joke. Somebody in the room is going to give away the tag before the guy telling the funny gets to it. Miltie ran things his own way for a long time. Now he is apt to find he has run himself right down the ladder.

There are others who show signs of losing ground. Lawrence Welk is still very popular but some of the rabid enthusiasm that once greeted him is leveling off. Roberta Linn has never quite managed to enjoy such terrific popularity on her own show as she did when she was with Welk. Liberace may not be the sensation locally that he once was but he is now the red hot favorite across the country since his films have been released. "Lee" will do all right for some time yet.

The only way for TV stars to remain popular is to keep up with the changing tastes of the public—and the new demands. It's no gravy train any more. If the audiences have grown up, why shouldn't the performers acquire a few needed grey hairs too?

**N**OT LONG ago, Jack Bailey, cordial emcee of KHJ-TV's "Queen for a Day," and now holding down the main spot on "Place the Face," emerged from under an avalanche of votes to find himself Honorary Mayor of Hollywood. From that moment on, Jack has assumed all the aspects of a harried, woe-begone civic official.

"Why, you know," Jack began, "one of my first official duties was to start practising the use of scissors. I

One lady even wrote me, enclosing two letters sent to Eddie Cantor, and said that Eddie had not opened her letters and would I take them to him and make him read them.

"Such are a few of my pressing duties. But to take a somewhat serious tone, I ran on a platform of 'No politics' and my duties as mayor were really over when I was elected. My job was to get the dimes for the

Kiwanis Club charities—with the votes. And I owe much of my present success to the Queens' Club. This organization is made up of women who have been Queens on 'Queen for a Day.' # Let's Talk Television

*Movie-Host Meditates On His  
Favorite Conversation Piece*

**PAUL KNIGHT IS A VETERAN** of experimental television. He faced his first TV camera fifteen years ago. Emoting in those days before "crude" TV cameras was pretty hectic, and Paul found it quite distracting making love to a TV actress wearing purple lipstick and green makeup on her cheeks.

**S**OONER or later most conversations turn to the topic of television. Newcomers to the marvelous medium are a bit awestricken by TV's rapid advancement, but a veteran like myself becomes a little inured to it all," states Paul Knight, host on Channel 13's "Owl Movies."

"I've been associated with the medium since 1939 in various capacities. During TV's infancy, talent and crew formed a closely-knit family circle. Our TV family would swap ideas envisioning the future of this newest means of communication. These ideas were all in the realm of possibilities then, but they have crystallized with the passing of years. We foretold coast-to-coast television, the transmission of color on TV screens and video tape.

"I am not a professional prognosticator, but I'm willing to go out on a limb and predict that within eight to ten years television will employ the third dimension. Far fetched? I don't think so, I believe I've been around TV long enough to know how far it can advance.

#### **Experimental**

"If I sound like an old timer it's because I started emoting in front of

a TV camera fifteen years ago. The Zenith Corporation maintained a stock company then solely for the purpose of experimental telecasting. If TV actors think they have it tough now, they should have been around our makeshift studios in those days. Today, TV actors give letter perfect performances. We did not live up to such high standards. I'm not making any apologies, but we had many distracting problems with which to contend. The lights on our sets were extremely hot. Frequently an actor's face was bathed in smoke while emoting because the natural oils in his hair were being cooked by the intense heat. The early cameras were so crude an actor had to use outlandish makeup. It was rather disturbing making love to a green-cheeked, purple-lipped actress. As a matter of fact, it was nightmarish.

"In 1941 I joined Philco's experimental station. It was the second commercial-licensed outlet in the country and the first NBC-TV affiliate. The proud city of Philadelphia boasted 600 seven-inch sets thirteen short years ago. Our programming consisted of soap operas, variety acts and dramatic skits. Remote schedules included football, ice shows, boxing and wrestling. Of course, our cover-

age did not meet today's requirements, but we were heading in the right direction.

#### **Relaxed**

"My tense, anxious moments before a camera have since been replaced by my host duties on the 'Owl Movies.' We show the classics and try to get a good caliber of pictures worth seeing again. I don't irritate viewers with unnecessary chit-chat, or break into the film with unrelated interviews or trick them with integrated commercials. Some viewers resent integrated commercials, while others are amused. Our aim is to show a picture of merit, and not a host who has to appease viewers with his shenanigans because of an inferior film. Our sponsor's trademark is the thrifty Scotchman and in alleged Scotch tradition we economize with verbiage. The essence of brevity stamps our commercials.

"Returning for a moment to my prognosticator status, I predict inter-oceanic television will be an accomplished feat within the next few years. If there are any doubting Thomases among you, let me know, and I'll be glad to discuss my favorite subject. As I said before, sooner or later most conversations turn to the topic of television."
