A New Door Opens

Hope Emerson has learned what it means to start a new life. And from tragedy and heartache she has found not only an answer to many problems but she has found herself.

THERE IS an old saying that goes: "God never closes one door but that He opens a new one."

Hope Emerson has found this to be a very true saying.

This is a woman with a great heart—and great courage. To look at her you'd never think that anything could throw her off base, but there is a vast amount of sensitivity about Hope. She's the kind of person who gives her heart openly—and is, therefore, subject to all the pain that goes with such warmth and genuineness.

Mother's Death

Some time ago Hope's mother died. The two were practically inseparable. Hope had given her life to Josie, her mother, and so her death was a terrific blow. Suddenly, Hope's life seemed to have ended.

"When mother died I just didn't want anything out of life," Hope commented seriously. "I had never made any move or done anything without talking to mother about it. I looked to her for advice and when she was no longer around to give it to me I felt completely alone. There was only one thing for me to do—to use that loneliness to help me find myself.

"Sure I was bogged down by despair—maybe you call it self pity. I knew my attitude was wrong because mother would not have wanted me to stop living. She would have said, 'Go on, old girl, get busy!' But I just couldn't seem to do anything.

To have to be alone then and face the facts was the greatest thing that ever happened to me.

"I found out about many things—mainly about me. I learned I had to stop thinking of myself and begin to give to others who needed someone. I had lavished all my love on mother. She was gone, but there were those who could use a helping hand.

"During this period of adjustment I tried the usual things—trips, buying odds and ends, anything to fill the days. I even thought of selling my home since I was sure I couldn't live in it. And yet, I found that the trip I took to New York where I did a TV show wasn't my answer. It only reminded me more of mother, especially when I'd go to the places we had visited. I found that buying material things meant little. In fact, my sense of values completely changed in that material possessions no longer mattered. I didn't sell my home—and I'm very happy in it now.

"As so many do, when I hit emotional rock bottom I turned more to my religion. It was there I found my greatest comfort. It taught me I couldn't run away from the situation—or myself. Besides, where would I run?

Turning Point

"Gradually, my outlook and my feelings changed. I think the big turning point was when Ralph Edwards honored me on his 'This Is Your Life.' This awakened me to the fact that there were other people in the world. I had begun to feel there was no one else. This show was something mother would have loved.

It gave me a new desire for living.

"From this show I got the radio program, 'The Cobbs,' which I do with William Demarest. Hank Garson, the director, saw it and decided I was right for the series. Then the producers of 'That's Life' saw the show and I was given a couple of good spots in the revue. It was odd—but both radio and theater, which had been my life for years, came back into my life. The next break was being cast in a good role in 'Untamed' at 20th Century-Fox. So all kinds of new doors began opening—but not until I opened my mind to a new life that had been given me."

Hope still meets lonely days, but she has learned that loneliness is something everyone is sure to find. It is learning to live with it that counts.

"I feel more contented now," Hope concluded. "I feel as though God has opened this new door for me to show me how to live again. Maybe if mother hadn't died when she did, I would never have learned the true values in living. Maybe I would have gone on without searching beneath the surface. I do know now, that a person is only defeated through tragedy if he lets himself be defeated. No matter how dark the road or how rough it may be to travel, there is always something ahead that is bright and full of hope if one will look beyond that one black cloud.

"To find life again is a wonderful thing. I only hope that I will live up to all the blessings I have been given."

*Smash in Radio! Socko in Video!
Now the Shrewd "Sergeant" Has a
Hit in Movies and Here Are Some
Of the "Stars" Who Share Success*

JACK ("Friday") Webb has done it again! After six years in radio and three on TV, he has climaxed his sensational "Dragnet" success with a ninety-minute feature-length motion picture, made in color at Warner Brothers.

About three weeks before the movie was sneak-premiered, your reporter went out to the lot to see Jack, who had a big surprise—a "sneak" of three reels of the movie. It was so impressive and augured of such smash box office that Jack seemed completely off track when he affirmed he was nervous over moviegoers' acceptance of his feature project.

Quickly he explained: "I call making this picture 'The Experiment Perilous' because this is the first time, to my knowledge, that a TV property has been transferred to the screen with the same title, same theme and a lot of the same cast.

"It's to our advantage to have similarity, but we don't want people to say the movie is exactly the same as the TV 'Dragnet'. The main thing that's different is the story. It could

not have been done on TV in less than four half-hour shows—it would take that much time to tell the story properly."

Upon the heels of his film baptism, Jack left no doubt as to which of the two mediums, TV or movie, he considered more difficult. "TV, due to speed and the limited money," was his rapid rejoinder.

Compared with the fast clip of television where, perforce, a police-file case becomes a script, then a TV film in a matter of days, making the motion picture "Dragnet" was extremely leisurely. Richard Breen, the capable writer who scripted for Jack way back in the old "Pat Novak" days, was allowed forty days for his writing, but really wanted more. Shooting, editing, scoring and dubbing plus preparation consumed the major portion of the summer.

The Poser

"While a good script works in any medium—radio, television or pictures, one problem arose with the movie and this one was different from any I'd encountered on TV," Jack confessed. "In pictures you don't play for intimacy, while in TV you do. In fact, in some pictures like those in Cinemascope, there's practically no intimacy at all left."

But a problem like this was greatly outweighed by Jack's movie budget, a lush \$650,000 which made the \$28,000-a-piece TV "Dragnets" look meager.

"We also employed some new technical things in the movie," Jack continued. "Things we'd never had the time or money to use before. Main one was a new type of 'crab dolly'—its big advantage is its compactness and maneuverability. You

don't have to tear lights down if the scene doesn't look good."

Perhaps the most important similarity between the TV-radio "Dragnet" and the motion picture is the cast. Surrounding Jack in the movie are the familiar Ben Alexander, Stacy Harris, Virginia Gregg, Georgia Ellis and several others. Jack considers these actors and actresses as insurance—"insurance for me—performer insurance—and insurance for the entertainment."

Always Liked

Though Jack has employed many of these performers in a variety of roles, he has yet to receive a complaint from a fan who has objected to seeing a performer more than once or in a variety of roles. "This is a great tribute to their ability," Jack stated.

Naturally for everyone's sake as well as his own, Jack wants the movie to be a hit. "Will it help the rating of the TV 'Dragnet'?" was a question he answered with a grin: "It won't hurt it!" Financially, success of the picture can be important to him because he "owns a little more than half."

At present Jack has no plans to make a sequel to the movie "Dragnet." "This picture is the culmination of the 'Dragnet' property," he affirmed with simple finality.

"But if the picture is just successful, it doesn't prove anything. It has to be a tremendous success," Jack said earnestly. "If it is tremendously successful, it takes us out of the TV-movie engagement and flirtation stage on to the marriage."

"I'M NOT A Career Girl"

Says KTLA's Lovely Anita Gordon

▲ KTLA's ANITA GORDON has been in show business practically all of her life. Although she still believes in working at her career, she has decided that success with her home life and with her family are far more important than success on the stage.

CAREER girls, especially those who are successful in show business, are pretty much envied by their fellow females. They appear to have everything that a girl should want—fame, a few bucks in the pocket, and plenty of attention.

However, the life of a career girl is not always filled with bouquets, bows, and beaux. At one time in their lives they must make a decision, a vital and difficult decision. They must decide which comes first, their public life or private life.

Anita Gordon, current singing star of KTLA's "Bandstand Revue," and one of the leading career girls in show business ever since her childhood appearances with "Our Gang," made up her mind at the beginning of this year. With her, a career comes second, and her home life comes first.

Ever since the age of fifteen, Anita has been one of the top vocalists in the nation, appearing with Ray Noble's band and on big-time TV shows such as Ken Murray's "Coke Time" with Eddie Fisher and others too numerous to mention.

As little as six months ago, while

in New York City, she was at the pinnacle of her career.

"I remember when I changed my mind. For two weeks, I lived alone at a hotel in New York. My husband and I had been separated and were in the process of getting a divorce at that time. I became more homesick than at any time in my life. Suddenly I left everything and came home to try and patch things up. I had finally learned I wasn't a career girl."

As a result, Anita and her husband, Dale Sheets, never got the divorce. Today, they and their three-year-old daughter live a happy, normal life in their North Hollywood home.

With show business in her blood, Anita couldn't completely quit so she signed a two year contract with KTLA, and renewed her spot as top vocalist on "Bandstand Revue."

Even career-wise Anita has no regrets today. "I'd much rather be a big fish in a small pond than a small fish in a big pond. Back in New York no one ever knew who I was. Here, in Hollywood, as a result of 'Bandstand Revue' I feel much closer to the people."

Actually, from a business standpoint, the twenty-four year old vocalist couldn't have picked a better local show to be on than the Sunday night KTLA program.

With Channel 5 bossman, Klaus Landsberg, heading the production, a great effort has been made to improve the caliber of "Bandstand Revue." More money is being spent on guest stars and showmanship for this show than any other on KTLA. As a result, both Anita and the rest of the regular cast, including Leighton Noble and his orchestra and the McDonald Sisters, have risen in popularity.

Although the "belle of Bandstand" has come home to stay, she still has big ambitions in the show business world. She would like to do a film show whereby she could combine her singing, dramatic, and musical-comedy abilities.

No matter what the future holds in store for lovely Anita she has learned the most important lesson in her life.

A successful career is a wonderful thing, but it will never take the place of a happy home.

"Medic"

"Medic" is truly a fascination, informative, drama-documentary series.

The basic theme of the program is the never-ending struggle of the medical profession for the preservation of life. The series is filmed on real-life locations, dramatizing actual medical cases. The opening stanza, "White Is the Color," was filmed at the Los Angeles County General Hospital. Actual doctors and nurses made up a large portion of the cast.

"White" concerned a young pregnant mother who was afflicted with leukemia. However, she fought the fatal disease long enough to give birth to her baby.

The cast underplayed their parts to perfection. Had they done otherwise "Medic" would have become melodramatic. Richard Boone was a convincing and thoroughly professional "Dr. Konrad Styner"; Beverly Garland, a brave and sympathetic patient, and Lee Marvin an understanding husband.

Creator James Moser (formerly associated with "Dragnet") has scored again. Producer "Tony" Miner and director Bernard Girard delivered a laudable production. Victor Young's music was well integrated and appropriately subdued.

NBC's "Medic" is one of the most absorbing and adult programs ever to enhance the video screens. M.R.

TV-RADIO *Lifelines*

FLUSHED WITH HIS "TOAST OF THE TOWN" Zanuck-salute success, Ed Sullivan is eagerly prepping a couple more salutes. The first, on October 3, is to honor *Lucy* and *Desi* as they start their fourth tele-year (Monday evening, October 4).

VIVIAN VANCE AND BILL FRAWLEY ("The Mertzes") will accompany the Amazons to New York to appear on the show, which, it is rumored, will place the emphasis on "live" TV (though there will be a few film clips shown).

IT IS EXPECTED THAT SULLIVAN will cite *Lucy* and *Desi* as showbiz champions, the climax of the affair being a banquet scene at which champions from other walks of life (*Ben Hogan?* *Rocky Marciano?*) laud the "I Love Lucy" stars.

SULLIVAN'S OTHER BIG PITCH will probably be another general Hollywood picture-industry telecast saluting several studios. It, too, like the Zanuck story, will be pitted against an NBC-TV "spectacular."

CONSIDERABLE BETTING IS GOING on about *Mario Lanza's* showing up for his first Chrysler extravaganza with the *Harry Jameses*. I hear tell that even his closest associates are keeping their fingers crossed that he'll appear. This big boy, whose normal weight runs around 225 pounds, was pushing 300 when he started dieting like mad for his video stint. On a high protein diet—steak once or twice a day, fresh fruits and vegetables, black coffee and NO starches, he dropped twenty pounds the first week. He now hovers around 240.

MY PRIVATE OPINION IS THAT Mr. Lanza would be smart to show up for his scheduled TV chore. He already has, shall we say, a variable record in pictures, which, goodness knows, can lose plenty dough when a star fails to report. In TV it's pretty hectic to be left wondering, especially when there's a definite delivery date for the telecast—or else!

CONFLICTING STORIES ARE BEING peddled about NBC-TV comic *Paul Gilbert's* demise from the screen in his series, "The Duke." One side says it was caused by Gilbert's inability to wrest a firm commitment from the sponsor and the other says it's because sales of *Toni* weren't up to expectation. Sponsor tried to supplant Gilbert with *Claudette Colbert*, but she (bless her heart!) put down her pretty foot on doing the commercials. So *Bill Cullen's* "Place the Face" has received the nod. Gilbert, still under contract to NBC, expects to go into the movie sequel of "So This Is Paris." I think we'll find him on TV again but am not too surprised that this show folded as it seemed to me from the start that "The Duke" was too cluttered to pull solid audience response.

EACH FALL IT'S THE CUSTOM to kick off the new shows with preview parties ranging from cocktail affairs to elaborate sit-down dinners (at risk of sounding blase, I've attended so many of these functions in the past fourteen years that I can predict exactly what there'll be to eat, depending on which hotel the clambake is held). NBC-TV knocked itself out with a

poolside post-show buffet after the Hutton screening... there was an Ed Sullivan shindig, a going-away party for Tennessee Ernie... a preview of *Ray Milland's* fall show at The Statler at which Milland didn't appear but wonderful *Hans Conried*, who stole the first teleshow, did... a screening of *Ray Bolger's* fresh format at the Beverly Hills, with Ray almost dancing for joy over revisions in the series (the fellows were of one opinion—that luscious *Marjie Millar* and pert *Christine Nelson* were the nicest improvements)... and everywhere one went he could immediately stir up a batch of hot conversation by asking "What did you think of *Betty Hutton?*" or "Do you think 'Medic' will go over big?"

VISITOR AT TV-RADIO LIFE office the other day was actor *Dick Raymond* and his actor-dog *Irwin*, who has the distinction of being able to get into producers' offices faster than people. *Irwin* merely walked into Producer *Albert McCleery's* office, held out his paw to *McCleery* and was told, "The job is yours." *Irwin* has been on "Hit Parade," "Toast," and "The Web," is paid a minimum rate equal to five lines of dialogue.

Will Color TV Be The Big Difference?

Now that the tumult and shouting have died and the captains and kings departed, maybe we can stagger off to a quiet corner and ponder the relative dust raised by Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town" Zanuck salute and NBC-TV's Betty Hutton color special.

First we have the ratings, believe them or not. Trendex for New York, Chicago and Philadelphia was Sullivan, 34.4, Hutton, 16.6; Hooper (average) Sullivan, 34.7, Hutton, 17.7.

But that's not all the story.

Your reporter saw the Hutton show in color at NBC-TV, where small-screen sets were installed. They should have pulled a real surprise and run the show on some of the new 21-inchers!

Hutton was the greatest in color. She turned in a magnificent performance and worked herself to the bone every second. No wonder she collapsed after the sign-off!

Color Good

The color was good. There were only a few incidents in which reception was imperfect and I'd be willing to wager that the fault wasn't in the color but in the old receivers. If you had read the report of my Max Lieb-

man interview in which he said he was using masses of color to work against other masses rather than here and there bright splotches, you would probably have taken the same keen interest in witnessing this master-producer's exquisite handling of color. A rare treat.

You people who saw the Hutton show in black and white missed all this thrill. But even with Betty Hutton, who herself was spectacular, the Liebman production viewed without color must have fallen way below the mark. True, the music was original and two or three of the numbers were exceptional. But the plot was typically thin—the usual Boy meets Girl, Boy loses Girl, Boy gets Girl. The formula just isn't enough to hold lookers' interest (as proved by break-down of share of audience which dwindled as the show progressed), for lookers are growing more and more discriminating and choosy even though they do get their teleshows amidst the com-

forts of home and without price.

Right now it seems that "originals" for TV may not be the answer. Very expensive and risky. Too much money to plunk into a one-time shot. *Leland Hayward*, who, until his illness forced his resignation, was set to produce thirteen color specials, refused to consider anything but proven properties. He figured to take the time and money spent in developing an original and used them to TV-adapt and polish an established property.

Lots of Money

After all the money (conservatively \$200,000) NBC-TV spent on the Hutton show, Ed Sullivan can justifiably glow over the impact of his Zanuck telecast, which cost him about \$35,000 (and the studio, it is rumored, about an equal amount for the film clips). Sullivan's show had big names, intriguing film clips, pleasant pace, and Hollywood glamour. (Also, though we like him, too much *Tony Martin* who flubbed conspicuously more than once.)

As explained previously in *TV-Radio Life*, "Toast" and the Hutton

ALBUM OF THE WEEK: "Les Brown at the Palladium" (Coral) is just what the title implies—an in-person visit to Hollywood's famous night spot during an engagement there by The Band of Renown in September, 1953. Here's the Les Brown aggregation at its best in a live, public performance, with no restrictions on the length of the solos, and with the stimulus of a large and enthusiastic audience. Les personally introduces and closes this great dance showcase and the hour and a half of music contained on the two twelve-inch long-playing records definitely stamps this band as one of the greatest in America today.



RCA's "X" label continues its parade of long-playing re-issues of yesterday with the spotlight on Jean Goldkette's Orchestra of the late twenties when its personnel included Bix Beiderbecke, Frank Trumbauer, Eddie Lang, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey. Great big-band jazz versions of "Clementine," "I'm Looking Over a Four-Leaf Clover" and "I'm Gonna Meet My Sweetie Now" are just a few of the highlights of this item.

"King Oliver's Uptown Jazz" is another collection of 1929 recordings by one of the first great jazz trumpet men on record. Made when Oliver played in New York's Harlem near the close of his long reign, "New Orleans Shout," "Freakish Light Blues," "West End Blues," and the others are not the greatest things The King ever recorded, but they're still great when considered in the light that he was playing with a strange band and adapting his free-wheeling style to their written arrangements.

"Mezz Mezzrow's Swing Session" is another interesting insight on the jazz of 1934 and 1937 when these eight recordings were made with a big band composed of both white and Negro musicians. Mezzrow, like Beiderbecke, loved jazz and formed his bands with ability the requisite instead of color. Certainly no greater personnel was ever gathered together than when Mezz's famous clarinet led Kaminsky, Carter, Freeman, Kirby Oliver, Obrien, Higginbotham and Webb in these great jazz recordings.

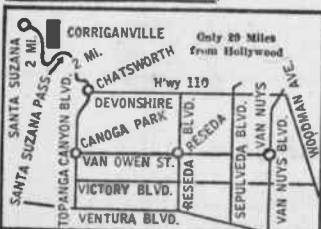

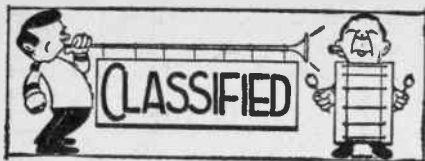

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

This is definitely the time and season for the new shows to put in their appearance. In the past week several programs either made their debuts or returned to the channels for the new season. Some were impressive, others not so much so.

The "Ray Milland Show" for CBS is a decided improvement over last year's "Meet Mr. McNutley." While Ray still plays the same role, he is no longer a bumbling buffoon as he was last season. His role makes more sense and he has a good deal more dignity. On the whole, the show was a smooth production but with one drawback—its sudden switch in characterization and plot from a comedy angle to a dramatic one was too abrupt. However, if what follows this first effort is as good as the first one "The Ray Milland Show" ought to get a good following. Mary Field did an exceptional job and Hans Conreid was, as usual, a stand-out. Milland and Phyllis Avery were charming and Lloyd Corrigan was effective. **Capsule comment: Entertaining.**

CBS also unveiled "The Best of Broadway," and, for our money, this is a winner. This was like seeing real theater in your living room. With Helen Hayes, Frederic March, Claudette Colbert, Nancy Olson, and Charles Coburn in the cast and with "The Royal Family," long a Broadway classic, as the vehicle, this one couldn't miss. It was an exhilarating experience—a real joy. Next on the line-up for this show is "The Man Who Came to Dinner" with Monty Wooley in his original role. It seems a very wise bet to take established plays instead of originals. And you, the public, will really benefit. Here, at last, is the answer to the persistent cry for important theatre on TV. **Comment: A hit.**

This column thinks Reavis Winckler, Dick Moore, and all the guys at KTTV are great people. We also like Frankie Laine and Connie Haines but we cannot get enthusiastic over "The Frankie Laine Show" that made its debut last Sunday. Frankie sings well and so does Connie, but since this is on film surely some production values could have been incorporated. To have the stars sing in front of a plain old backdrop not only looks cheap but completely lessens interest in the numbers. Even the best singers—and Frankie and Connie are fine performers—need some kind of production behind them. A little imaginative setting will help this show a lot. We could only stay for half of the show so this review is based only on the first part. Apparently, the format, however, was about the same in the last half. This program can attract a big audience. But it's going to need a rejuvenation job. **Comment: Let's try again.**

Not that it matters but the Tunnel

had a great time cooking up a few odds and ends on Mike Roy's show on KNBH. Genial Mike was most patient with this department's lack of familiarity with TV cooking. He even ate the dishes. This last is added in case Mike missed a few days on his program because of illness.

CBS-TV took a bunch of reporters down to Del Mar recently and for a very charming reason—to talk to Betty Grable and one Harry James. Betty, as you probably know, is making her TV debut in CBS's "Shower of Stars"

program. She's in the same extravaganza as Mario Lanza. And, naturally, Harry is on the show too. This, however, is not his TV debut. When Betty was asked how she felt about doing television at first she said, "I debated for a long time. I reasoned that if the first thing I did on TV were bad, where would I go from there? However, when I was given a chance to work with Harry on the Chrysler program my doubts disappeared. Also, we're going to sort of be kibitzers on ourselves on the show. Harry had such a ball doing his TV show a while back that he helped to sell me on the medium. Some people have been surprised that I decided on a 'live' telecast first since I'm so used to working in pictures, but I felt 'live' was more challenging—at least as far as I was concerned."

Betty then reiterated her long-standing attitude about drama vs. musicals. "If anyone had asked me to do a dramatic show on TV I'd have turned it down flat. That was my big fight at 20th. I didn't want to become a dramatic actress. I can still remember when Mr. Zanuck wanted me to do the part of 'Sophie' in 'The Razor's Edge.' My only comment was that after the suicide scene for Sophie, people would expect me to re-appear as a mermaid in a musical production number."

With all the big shows opening, the Grable-Lanza offering ought to be a stand-out. Even if Lanza doesn't show up. It's a cinch Betty will do a great deal better than she and Harry did picking the nags at the track for us naive souls of the press. However, handicapper or not we'll take the Grable-James team any day.

Many top TV, radio, and motion picture stars are set to appear at a benefit at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Hollywood this coming Friday night, September 24. Connie Haines and Mr. and Mrs. Preston Foster will head the TV star roster. Looks like a big evening of entertainment and a chance to see your favorites in person. Come on over!

show were in direct competition in the East. Here, to receive the Hutton spectacular in color, we had to look at 4:30 p.m. (a bad time), while Sullivan came on as usual at 8:00 p.m. No local ratings are yet available, but they should prove most revealing and interesting.

Significant aspect of the Eastern ratings was that the two competing telecasts started out ten points apart and ended twenty-six points apart. In other words, action bogged down on the Hutton show, so lookers flipped over to see what was doing on "Toast" and stayed with it.

Is an hour and a half too long to sustain a telecast which hasn't made the script the thing? Can color TV, despite all the fabulous amounts being spent on it, hope to compete with black and white so long as there are only a few scattered sets throughout the country? What would have happened had there been more color receivers and had both shows been in color? Is color going to make a Big Difference? (It hasn't in good motion pictures.)

Maybe when we get two or three more extravaganzas under our belt there'll be some answers. E.B.

Certainly the four series between the two arch cross-town rivals were so tense, exciting, well-played and replete with baseball thrills as to satisfy the most ardent rooter and avid baseball fan.

My hope is that you, as followers of our teams and our KHJ-TV telecasts, enjoyed this '54 season as much as I enjoyed being a part of it, having the privilege of coming into the homes of hundreds of thousands of you who watched baseball on Channel 9. Many of you I have written to; others I have talked to at the park, and some I have talked to on the phone. To all of you, my thanks for your many kindnesses. Thanks, too, for your criticisms. They also helped.

One final comment on baseball. Monday, September 13, in a combined effort with KFSD-TV in San Diego, KHJ-TV televised the play-off game from Lane Field in San Diego, over Channels 9 and 10. Our director, Don Patton, his assistant, Dick Holst and I teamed with KFSD's technicians and cameramen and San Diego sportscas-

ter, Sig Smith to cover the games for both stations.

Some of you following our telecast of the game said, "I told you so! Lyle is really a HOLLYWOOD fan!" May I repeat what I said in my very first column of the year in TV-RADIO LIFE and reiterated many times since. I AM a Star fan—AND an Angel fan.

If you were closely associated for several years with the fine men and women who are components of the Los Angeles and Hollywood baseball organizations, would you not be hoping for their success? Against out-of-town opposition, I hoped they both would win. You know my feelings when the Stars and Angels play each other. I wanted both teams to win, and neither to lose.

I had, before the San Diego-Hollywood telecast, conditioned myself to be strictly factual in the reporting of the "big game." That was BEFORE I got to San Diego. Once there, I was slowly, but surely, "un-conditioned." Nobody in San Diego was accepting this contest matter-of-factly, and not one there was averse to making the invaders aware of it.

Oh, I don't mean we weren't shown every courtesy and aided in every possible way in preparation for the telecast by the Padre personnel and the members of the KFSD-TV Staff, but everyone in the border city was bent on shellacking our local representatives in the PCL. If one has any fighting spirit, civic pride, loyalty to friends, he's bound to react just like I did. He's gonna fight back a little, isn't he? Especially when your co-telecaster and the Mayor of the city of San Diego start chiding you.

So I let it be known via the air waves that Bond was strictly for the Stars in that play-off game. Had the Angels been in the position of the Hollywood team, my reaction and actions would have been the same. I couldn't have sat there like a bump on a log and not rooted for them either.

Be that as it may, the play-off game and telecast was a wonderful experience, and enjoyable even though I was disappointed because one of my teams lost. The Padres are worthy champions, Frank "Lefty" O'Doul, a wonderful fellow and a great manager. San Diego should well be proud of the 1954 PCLA Pennant winners.

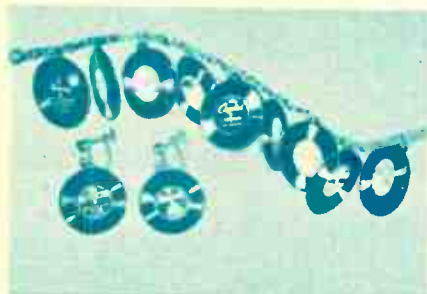

"Today"--TV of Tomorrow

THE VOICE on the other end of the line said his name was Dave Garroway. "How was 'Today' today, Mr. Garroway?" we asked.

"Today" was great today, just as it was yesterday, and we hope will be tomorrow," Dave replied.

So as not to confuse our readers today, tomorrow, or any day about "Today," we were talking to the famed NBC-TV emcee about his new TV show. Although Garroway has been doing "Today" for over two years back East, the show is brand new to West Coast viewers. At the time we talked to Dave via long distance he and producer Mort Weiner were making preparations for the coast-to-coast hookup.

"What's so hot about Today?" we asked.

"It's unlike anything you have ever seen," Dave answered. "As Mort expresses it, 'Today' is TV's first national newspaper. Every half hour we do a regular news broadcast and in-between we do feature stories. Every part of the program has some tie-in with current news. We cover sports, personalities, oddities, disasters, in fact anything that makes news. We go anywhere to get a story and we show it either live or on film. With a budget of \$35,000 a week we have the opportunity to get some excellent material."

"Will this be another kinescope deal for the poor West Coast?" we asked, pessimistically.

Hot Kine

"The program will be seen in the San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego areas. As far as I know, you will see a 'hot' kine. We start our show in New York at eight o'clock in the morning. NBC-TV picks this up at five o'clock in California and makes a hot kine of it, ready for presentation three hours later at eight o'clock. This was done so that the clocks would show the same time, that is from eight to nine.

"Actually, the program in New York is three hours long, but except for last-minute news flashes, each hour is pretty much the same. We repeat the same features here because we realize that most people will not watch for three hours, and for the most part we have a new audience each hour."

"Some newspapers and magazines are screaming because programs such as 'Today,' they say, are killing their circulation. Why would a woman buy a paper or magazine when they can see it for free on TV?" we queried.

Dave's answer: "I believe we have just the opposite effect. When people see a feature story on 'Today,' they want to read more details about it. This they can get by buying a newspaper or magazine."

"Will there be any entertainment, such as musical numbers and comedy routines?" we asked.

Peace

"No. There is no entertainment at all," Dave replied.

"On another subject for a moment, Dave, which we know you are interested in: some TV entertainers, such as Milton Berle have stated that the old vaudeville approach on TV is dead. Shows, particularly musical-variety shows, must have a story line, they say, or some other twist to hold the public's attention. Do you agree?"

"Yes. One hundred per cent. I have always believed that the old vaudeville approach was useless on TV. On all my programs I have tried to use unique production in presenting various acts. Even on 'Today' we have what you might call a story line. I'm the guy around whom all the stories revolve."

One final question: "Do you have any secret ambitions?"

"Yes, I do," Dave replied, seriously. "My sign-off signature, as you know, is when I raise my hand and say 'Peace be with you.' I'm not doing that to be corny. That's my ambition: For myself and for all people to find inner peace and happiness."

On that peaceful note, the phone call ended.
