The News Is BIG Tonight

TV news programs, for the most part, have been distinguished by their lack of imagination, but "The Big News" seems to think it has proved news can be entertaining as well as informative.

RKNXT HAS BEEN slightly ecstatic recently over its half-hour nightly news show called "The Big News." It's the first TV attempt to cover the day's happenings in a big—and often dramatic—way. It's so comprehensive, as a matter of fact, that four men are assigned to the chore: Bill Stout, Gil Stratton, Jr., Austin Green, and Bill Kennedy.

Handling the effort is director Sam Zelman, whose day begins around eight a.m. and goes on until midnight or later. This, of course, doesn't take in the extra phone calls he gets at his home at all hours of the night—usually from people with "tips" on special news stories.

"These extra calls are my own fault," Sam remarked. "I've made it clear I welcome tips from anyone since we're after hot news. And I'll go on taking these calls even though only about one in twelve has anything to it that we can use."

One of the special features on "The Big News" is "Special Assignment," which Bill Stout handles. It is to this department most of the tips come since Bill investigates and reports on such items as the liquor license racket, the comic book racket, and pressure to legalize gambling in Culver City.

Iron Curtain Broadcast

Another significant departure in this KNXT show is the report on news taken directly from the Iron Curtain country radio broadcasts.

"Alexander Ramati has been hired by us to monitor all foreign broadcasts," Sam continued. "During the war he did the same job for the government but after the war he worked on a newspaper. However, his main

interest was still in these broadcasts so he now does the job from his home high on top of one of the canyons. Some days he may not get anything worth while for us but he has scored some notable scoops. For example, we reported on our show, through Alex's work that Nehru would visit China—eight days before a news agency reported the item for the first time. The release of the French General DeCastries of Diên Bien Phu, was aired on 'The Big News' eighteen hours before it was reported elsewhere. The first Nationalist bombardment of the Chinese mainland was covered by us two days before the news was released elsewhere. We also scooped, by five days, the information that Dulles would visit Formosa after the Manila conference. And Attlee's statement on China. Bevin's visit to Japan, and the comasate of the Japanese fisherman sickened by the H-bomb radiation were also heard first on our show.

"Alex, however, doesn't always use what he hears on a Russian broadcast at its face value. If an item sounds of interest he tries to get a confirmation of some kind on another foreign broadcast.

"Some people have wondered why we are doing a half hour show but we feel that at that time of night people are ready to hear the news of the day—attractively presented. It's now a routine with us to get special events covered and on the air within the space of a couple of hours. We're even getting wire photos direct by wire and using them on the air when received.

TV News Dull

"It's our feeling that most TV news shows too little enterprise. The type of initiative used by newspaper's has been absent on the television newscasts. There has been too much plain reading of reports and too much commentary by people not qualified to commentate. We, incidentally, do no commentary at all.

"We have also stopped 'live' inter-

views because too often you get a 'wind bag' who doesn't know when to stop talking. By doing interviews on film we can at least edit the things we don't want.

"As director, I feel very happy to have found four men who know news and yet are good personalities for TV. This is a hard combination to find. TV makes a personality so transparent that it's easy to see through him if he's uninformed. Bill Kennedy, for example, an actor on and off, had been a newscaster for a Detroit station. He was one of fifty we interviewed for the spot on the show, and he got the assignment because he knew news and made a good impression as a personality. Naturally, Gil Stratton, Austin Green, and Bill Stout are tops in their fields, too."

Before you decide all news programs are for those who want to be lulled asleep, try "The Big News." It might even wake you up.

The Lowdown

Color

When Will the Consumer Be Able to Afford Color Sets? How Many Programs Are Shown In Tint? What About Color Studios? Here Is a Rundown on Tinted Television.

COLOR television sets will become a reality for the consumer sooner than most of us anticipate. Networks, set manufacturers, telefilm companies, all those connected with the TV industry are color happy. The countless millions who view the 31,700,000 black and white sets currently in use are also color struck.

A little more than a year ago the FCC approved a compatible color system and thus terminated a state of confusion on the color scene. Since then, colorcasting has taken rapid strides. With competition for an "approved" system eliminated, the networks hastened to settle down to color programming.

In a recent speech, John K. West,

NBC's West Coast head, observed: "Color has taken a definite direction and we have arrived at a point where we know that the developments and promise of color are truly great. In fact, we believe the time will be here, and before very long, when a broadcaster will no more consider broadcasting a program in black and white only, than a motion picture producer would today consider showing a film with motion only and without sound.

Advertisers


"Advertisers will demand color commercials the same as they do in magazines, billboards, window displays, some newspapers and certainly on the label or package for their product. The difference that the spon-

sor's message makes upon the human mind, the difference in impact and remembrance is terrific. And so, we think color television broadcasting will be speeded and advanced by the demands of sponsors for the transmission of their commercial messages in color.

Receivers

"As for color receivers, there is a 19-inch tube being made and used by the industry and there is also the new RCA 21-inch tube which will be ready for marketing early next year. By midwinter there should be many different brands of receivers on the market. Prices of the receivers will be high at first, approximately in the \$900 price bracket. But as tube production is improved and increased

the price of the over all receiver will come down just as it has over the years on black and white receivers. How far down the price will come is anyone's guess but I think it is safe to say the demand for color receivers will force production up and that once reasonable quantity production has been reached a \$500, 21-inch set would be available in about twelve months' time."

Current Market

As we went to press, a survey of the color sets available to the consumer indicated: RCA, 21-inch, \$800-900; (January) Motorola, 19-inch, \$895; Westinghouse, 15-inch, \$595; CBS-Columbia, 19-inch, \$995; and Raytheon, 19-inch, \$995. Practically all other major set manufacturers are experimenting with color and expect to have sets on the market sometime in 1955.

In April 1954, Westinghouse was the first to introduce color sets to the Los Angeles buying public. A Westinghouse executive on the West Coast had glowing remarks to make about the results of the first regularly scheduled colorcast—"Best of Broadway"—sponsored by his firm. The show debuted on CBS-TV, September 15. Immediately following the initial program, Westinghouse retail and dealer color set sales increased.

By and large however, networks so far are more proficient at producing color shows than most manufacturers are at turning out color sets. Commander E. F. McDonald, president of Zenith said, "A lot of color sets are being sold now, but every one of them is obsolete almost as soon as it is sold." There are others who differ with Commander McDonald's viewpoints.

Predictions

By the end of the year a total of November 26, 1954

eighty-two NBC color television affiliates will be equipped to transmit network colorcasts and about 87% of all American families will be within range of the NBC color service. CBS expects to carry seventy-six major color programs on eighty-one stations throughout the nation by January, 1955.

Long before color programming was open to the public, color demonstrations for the trade occurred quite frequently. The first commercial colorcast to emanate from the West Coast was CBS's "Life With Father" on September 7, 1954. NBC's inaugural tint was the Betty Hutton spectacular on September 12. Many of your TV favorites are being televised in color on an irregular basis this season. However, there are several shows consistently being televised in color. They are, CBS's "Best of Broadway," "Shower of Stars," and NBC's "Spectaculars."

Facilities

CBS-TV City has designated Studio 43 as its color studio. Its stage area alone covers more than 12,000 square feet. Foresight and intelligent planning when TV city was built made the transition from black and white to color a matter of only six or eight weeks' work. Both live and film shows can be transmitted in color from Studio 43.

NBC is building a color TV studio in Burbank which will be completed by January. In addition to live and film colorcasts, NBC will be able to televise feature-length Technicolor motion pictures in color if they are released by the studios or independent producers.

KTLA is readying for the color plunge too. They have installed \$35,000 worth of color equipment in their partially completed new plant.

the old Warner Brothers lot on Sunset Boulevard. KTLA expects to start tinted telecasting of a daytime show in November. Other independent stations in this area are more or less adapting a wait-and-see attitude.

With so much concentration on equipment and programming, color TV can't be too far off for Mr. John Doe. Frank M. Folson, RCA president, recently predicted that in his opinion ten million color sets will be in use by 1959. This is certainly in the realm of possibility. Who knows? Maybe it will be international color television in 1960. Nothing seems impossible in this electronic age.

OLD MOVIES -- Who Has the Last Laugh Now?

EVERYONE enjoys good jokes. Some people get paid for telling them. Most of us just seek a smile or a hearty laugh for compensation.

For play or for pay, ever since a TV set became as common as a chair in the American home, a sure bet for a few chuckles would be to say something ha-ha about old movies on TV. As a matter of fact, some industrious student in the field of the social sciences might even be able to prove that the "old movie joke" lasted as long, if not longer, than any of its competitors in the field of funny fads. (Jokes about a person, such as Benny's violin and Maxwell, or Durante's nose would have to be placed in another category because they are personally identifiable.)

End of Era

Alas, however! A great era has come to an end. The "TV movie jokes" will have to take their place in hilarious history alongside the "new look," the "Lambeth Walk," and Tommy Manville's fifth wife.

And who's to blame for this downfall? In Southern California, the accusing finger would have to be pointed in the direction of the officials of KHJ-TV, Channel 9. They are the culprits—and they are proud of it!

Of course, we are talking about the tremendous impact that regular Channel 9 movies have had on Los Angeles ever since they started in September.

Here are the facts behind the latest fad in flicker fare:

The film division of General Teleradio Inc., which is a majority stockholder of the Mutual Broadcasting System, purchased a block of thirty films from the Bank of America. General Teleradio made these movies available to independent stations throughout the country. In Los Angeles, the Mutual outlet, KHJ-TV, got first crack and grabbed it.

The thirty top-rate movies originally cost a grand total of 45 million dollars to produce. Although "old" to Hollywood, the films had never been seen before on TV.

From the very beginning, the results were amazing. Nearly three million people watched the first movie, "The Miracle of the Bells." During the five consecutive nights more people had seen "The Miracle" than any single motion picture in the history of Los Angeles. Indeed, a TV-movie "miracle."

Brain Speaks

As Mr. John Reynolds, general manager of KHJ-TV, explained, there were many reasons Channel 9 decided to go all-out on the new idea.

Strange as it may seem, money was not one of them. "Actually," Mr. Reynolds stated, "we would make more money by scheduling regularly sponsored programs as in the past."

There are only two actual breaks during the showing of the film. With one commercial before and one after the picture, this allows for a total of six sponsors. A full weekly schedule on the Channel 9 Movies costs each sponsor approximately \$2,500. When fully sponsored, the local station can make a little money (after all that's its business) and still give the people at home plenty of good entertainment.

The number one reason Channel 9 has devoted so much time and money to its movie programs can be explained in one simple word: prestige. Judging from the mail and comments we have received, Channel 9 has certainly achieved this objective.

Finally, although the officials of the Mutual-Don Lee outlet must plead guilty to destroying the "old movie" gag routine, they haven't stopped chuckling. The only difference now is that the loud laughter has turned into a sly, satisfied smile like the cat who just swallowed the cinematic canary.

Color Follow-Up

Several weeks ago we wrapped up the feature, "The Low Down On Color," which appears in this issue on pages four and five. Since that article went to press there haven't been any radical changes on the color scene, other than an acceleration of sales promotion to make the public aware of the color television sets on the market.

Color television is experiencing many phases, but an interesting off-beat tangent is the profound statements one can read practically any day of the week. Network executives are full of opinions when it comes to expressing their views on color televisions. Here are excerpts from a few recent statements made by those who are "in the know."

Harry Ackerman, vice-president in charge of CBS-TV programming here, predicts that one of every six video sets will be a color set by Christmas 1955.

Sylvester L. Weaver Jr., president of NBC, says: "Once you've seen color on your home TV screen, it's my humble prediction that you'll want to see all programs in color, regardless of content."

On November 4, **Frederic Wile Jr.**, NBC vice president, told members of the Los Angeles Advertising Women, Inc., "The day is coming when we will have world-wide live TV in full color . . . Color TV is on its way to becoming the most effective means of selling goods, services and ideas ever devised."

There is a rather conflicting opinion on color television by **J. E. Brown** of the Zenith Corporation as reported in Holland's Tunnel. The pros and cons on color television are many but there's one thing that's certain, if and when the sets are priced for the average man's budget, color television sets will become as prominent in the living rooms of America as black and white sets are today.

"Little Schoolhouse" certainly merits recognition and honorable mention along with the other programs you mentioned. Ask most any child in any home who watches TV in the morning. It's on Channel 11 at 11 o'clock, Monday through Friday. How could it have been overlooked? It is worthy of real support, and I can assure you we parents are behind it wholeheartedly.

Some were of the opinion that Ruthie was a decided asset to the Berle telecasts and that Uncle Miltie is going to miss the pert little mother-to-be on his program. They felt he should have realized her value and managed to keep her in the script between now and February, when Ruthie's baby is due.

OTHERS EXPRESSED THE OPINION that Berle couldn't be expected to revamp the part in deference to Miss Gilbert's condition and that perhaps a new face might be a nice change. Ruthie has kicked up such a fuss it looks doubtful that she'll land back on the show in a big fat hurry once her child is born.

THERE WERE NEVER PROBLEMS like this in radio, and, I might add, it takes something like this latest hassle to make a person realize again how cleverly the Lucy-Desi baby situation was handled for TV. Of course, Desilu, which filmed its shows, stopped about three months before the Arnaz laddie advented. Berle does his program "live," which precludes this "out."

WILD RUMORS WERE AFLOAT last week that Sid Caesar was ready to throw in the sponge right now on his solo TV efforts. As we go to press, NBC-TV Hollywood, which obtained a statement for us from New

But it's a shame the way Southern California viewers have to sit still and watch, in black and white, shows which are emanating right here in color. This is shabby treatment which, I am afraid, is going to retard local sales of sets. Understand the technicians are really working to improve kinescopes of color shows, which might be the answer.

At the informal press affair the Swayzes gave in their Beverly Hills Hotel bungalow, John Cameron "just happened" to have one of the games with him and happily explained how it revolves around a world map and poses questions about one of the five zones into which the map is blocked off. Strictly grown-up entertainment, but could be fun. Swayze even provides a sort of "answer book," to help with playing the game, but it's to be presumed that the players wouldn't need this crutch if they were avid watchers of the noted newsman. 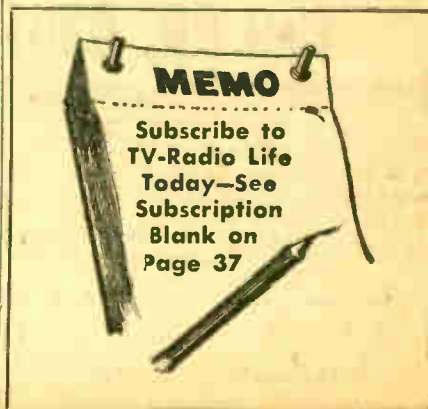

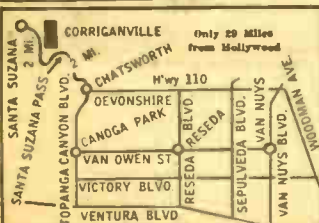

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

At times you get some very interesting criticisms of TV by talking to the youngsters. They don't pull any punches. Recently, a group of kids were talking and the following were their opinions: "I like 'Lassie' a lot and I think she's a wonderful dog, but they don't let her do enough. I know she's smarter than she seems to be on TV. Now, **Rin-Tin-Tin** does all kinds of tricks. You suppose he's smarter than Lassie? Oh well, I like both shows" . . . "I used to watch 'Lone Ranger' a lot but not any more. The scenery looks too faked. And besides it's always the same" . . . "My favorite show is 'Disneyland.' I wouldn't miss that for anything."

Seems that the youngsters have several good points—especially about "Lassie," which still happens to be a choice show as far as the tunnel is concerned. The dog should be used more—and none of the warmth and honest picturization of family life would be lost. This program still deserves special commendation, though, for the adroit way in which it puts forth some little lesson in each show. It was especially interesting to see it tackle the subject of how much children should expect parents to understand them. As Tommy Rettig said in one scene, "There seems to be a special kind of understanding for parents and another kind for children." His insistence that his mother give him a real reason for saying he couldn't do something was quite enlightening. Of all the shows, this one seems to depict more honestly the relationship between child and parent—and it solves the problems of the child without becoming mawkish or ridiculous.

There was quite a speech made by **J. E. Brown, Chief Engineer of the Zenith Radio Corp. in Chicago recently.** With all the furore about color TV, with all the many claims, with all the companies promising this color set and that color set, Brown took out the air from the balloon and faced a few facts. He bluntly said that **not many color sets were being sold and for good reasons.** According to Zenith's distributors, he said, people weren't buying them because: (1) The price is too high; (2) Sets are extremely difficult to tune and to keep in adjustment; (3) Service costs are much higher than for black and white; (4) People now know that any color set they buy today is already obsoleted by new developments. And these views

Have had several calls from irate viewers about the item in this column concerning the abuse of a chimp on the "Topper" show. One woman even agreed to start a fund to get the chimp away from its trainer. Not a bad idea. . . . Las Vegas is still booming with TV names. **Peter Lind Hayes** and **Mary Healey** were in town, as were **Frank Sinatra, Lillian Roth, Ben Blue.** But the Sahara was doing great with the one act with no TV connection—**Esther Williams** and **Ben Gage.**

NAFBRAT sent along an extensive booklet called "Children and Television—Some Opinions." It was a collection of views of educators, psychologists, critics, and psychiatrists on the effect of TV on children. It was a very thorough study and some of its findings were interesting. **Walter P. Armstrong, Jr.** Chairman of the Criminal Law Section of the American Bar Association said: "The writers of crime 'thrillers' must take much of the blame for teen-age vice. It appears these grew out of TV and radio thrillers and gangster-story comic books." **Dr. N. J. Vincent,** sociologist said, "A crime drama may have a moral as a direct suggestion, but indirectly (it might) suggest that the criminal was caught because of his one stupid blunder," **Dr. Martin Grotjahn,** psychiatrist: "I consider the excessive listening and viewing of television programs as harmful in any case, whether it is primarily concerned with the description of crime or otherwise. In my experience based on the complaints of psychiatrists, psychoanalysts, and worried parents we can observe the development of a new style of living which I call in want of a better term 'television living.' This is characterized by the assumption that we do not do our living ourselves any more but that, so to speak, 'We are lived' by the television screen. . . . Frequently TV children are at a complete loss for any spontaneous imaginative activity and later in life they do not develop their own individuality." **John Crosby,** noted critic: "The only solution as I see it is for the networks to produce their own kids shows and allow no others on their networks. Codes are useless. You can get some such ruling that one knifing is all right but two are all wrong. The networks simply have to assume full responsibility for what is becoming an increasingly grave civic problem."

Quite naturally, the interviews were loaded with plugs, but Al did manage to get newsworthy items from his guests as well as play a record or two. On the musical side Al played Martin's waxing of "I'll See You In My Dreams," and Young's recording of the theme song from "High and the Mighty," and "When I Fall In Love."

Gannaway's writers, David Gregory and Hal Levy, supply him with enough material to keep the program from falling into a monotonous plug-type interview show. M.R.

Off Mike (Personalities)

Legend of Betty Crocker

Betty Crocker, one of the most fabulous personalities on radio, could well lay claim to the title of America's Sweetheart. Among the millions of letters she has received have been a dozen marriage proposals. She regrettably tells suitors that her career comes first.

As reported in the Woman's Home Companion, the facts and legends behind the career of Betty Crocker—a symbol used by General Mills, Inc., to represent it in all its dealings with American women—are extremely interesting.

This famous young woman, who started out as merely a signature in 1921, is a product of millions of hours of effort by thousands of people. It has cost \$50,000,000 to make her what she

is today. It takes a staff of forty-five women, twenty-four of them home economists and one a TV commentator (Adelaide Hawley), to play her role.

Under her name she has distributed billions of recipes, millions of pieces of silverware, conducted the longest continuous home-service program on radio. She keeps five modern testing kitchens, equipped with seventeen ovens, busy all day every day. She has entertained Dwight Eisenhower. And quite incidentally, she has sold more flour and flour products for her sponsor, than any other saleswoman in history.

For the first three years Betty Crocker remained only a signature on letters answering such queries as "Why doesn't my cake rise?" and, "How long do you knead dough?" In 1924 she acquired a voice for a new gadget that was fascinating people all over the country—radio. She started over WCCO, Minneapolis with casual chats about food preparation, and soon inaugurated the Betty Crocker Cooking School of the Air on many local stations throughout the country. Women listeners who completed all the recipes were "graduated." The school's alumnae grew to a staggering 1,130,009.

Betty Crocker had a signature and a voice. The next step in her growth was acquiring a face. In 1936, on her fifteenth anniversary, Betty Crocker sat for her portrait. Artist Neysa McMein worked from photographs of twelve women then on the Betty Crocker staff. The portrait, which is known to millions of women and which has inspired a dozen proposals, is of a slender brunette, her hair swept softly back from her oval face. She has blue-gray eyes, a full mouth, a hint of a dimple in her chin.

In 1948 Betty Crocker was ready for something new—television. Adelaide Hawley, a gracious and famous radio personality, became Betty Crocker. Two home economists from the Minneapolis kitchens were assigned to New York to prepare the appealing cakes, biscuits and pies for such TV shows as Vallant Lady, The Lone Ranger and The Bob Crosby Show.

Recently Betty Crocker announced the most ambitious undertaking of her career: a search for the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She has devised a homemaking test which will be given, like College Board examinations, to high school seniors throughout the country during 1955. The national winner will receive a \$5,000 scholarship, a diamond-studded pin and a three-month country-wide tour.

How about taking a trip with a football team? The team is the Los Angeles Rams, and if you were going along to be the color man on the Rams vs. Giants game in New York's Polo Grounds this is what would have happened:

You arrive at International Airport in Inglewood on Friday. Most of the players are already there, and they mill around in the lobby anxious to get on the United Airlines chartered plane. About ten minutes to nine, you're allowed through the gate. You grab a seat in back with Bob Kelley, who'll televise the game coast-to-coast, over KHJ-TV, Channel 9, as he will the Bears game in Chicago on the 28th.

The Rams' players sit in the front two-thirds of the plane. Bridge addicts like Jack Dwyer, Bob Boyd, Don Paul, and Tom Fears grab the front club compartment and immediately deal 'em.

You sit alone with Kelley but not for long. The stewardess comes around and asks if anyone wants a snack (this is before lunch or dinner). You go for a snack. It consists of one ham sandwich, one turkey sandwich, one cup of strawberry pudding, and one glass of milk. This is a snack? Pretty soon the sports writers and broadcasters seated in the back of the plane begin going forward—cradle in beside the Rams' players, and get a few quotes. You see the seat next to the head coach Hampton Pool is open. You move in.

"Off the record, coach and just between us . . ." you begin. And it will be off the record. You'll never use this on the air. Pool tells you he has set up a defense to stop the optional passes of Kyle Rote and Frank Gifford . . . that he has defended Giant end Bob Schnelker, who's already caught eight touchdown passes.

Moments later, you're back in your own seat asleep, sleeping through the stop at Denver. Fifteen minutes before you arrive at LaGuardia Airport in New York City you awaken. You left Los Angeles at nine in the morning. It's now 9:33 at night New York time. Of course, three hours are lost because of the time change. All sixty-four passengers try to get off the plane at once. It's silly, because there is a fifteen minute wait before the bus leaves for the Concourse Plaza Hotel. Owner Dan Reeves of the Rams invites you and Bob Kelley to join him at the highly-publicized Toots

Shor's for a late snack. (You also had lunch and dinner on the plane.)

Reeves ordered. And you sample delicious New England Boiled Beef and horse radish. By midnight it's time to hit the sack.

On Saturday morning you drop down to Bill Brundige's room. Brundige does the play-by-play on the Giant's game while you handle the color. Checking the spotting boards, making notes for the pre-game lead, calling potential guests for half-time interviews consumes a couple of hours. Then everybody's on his own . . . to take a bus tour around town, the boat trip which circles Manhattan, or join Reeves and Kelley for lunch at an obscure Chinese restaurant. My choice? I don't care for Chinese food, but after all Reeves is an expert on New York. You can't go against him.

The next day you have lunch with the team at ten in the morning, then take a taxi to the Polo Grounds a couple of hours before kick-off time.

Comes 10:50 a.m., Los Angeles time, and you're on the air for Burgermeister. On the seventy station network, is KHJ, Los Angeles. You "spot" the Giants for Brundige, while Kelley is handling the transcontinental telecast. You also come in from time to time with comments about the ball game, not to mention the pre-game and half-time air-work.

After the game, down in the press lounge, which is usually reserved for writers following Leo Durocher's New York Giants' baseball team Brundige says: "I thought this was one of our best broadcasts today."

"You're right! You were really great."

Brundige blushes, then adds, "I thought you did one of your best jobs this afternoon."

"I always quit when I'm ahead."

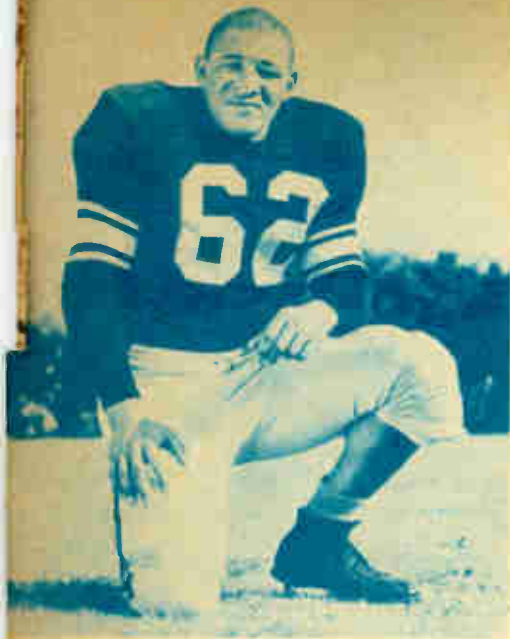

AFTER A YEAR OF TV ---

What?

Ray Bolger has learned a good deal about TV and that may explain why his show has a rather new look. But he has one idea that makes him unique in these days of one-man "epics."

ONE YEAR ON TV is equivalent to a four-year course in college," Ray Bolger beamed. He had lost none of the enthusiasm and vitality that were typical of him last year. This guy's a glutton for work!

"I've gone through about every phase there is in TV," he went on. "Last season we began with an audience for our pilot film. Then we switched to three cameras and finally one. Now we're back playing before a live audience and darned glad we are."

Switch to "Live"

"I've always felt that a comedy show especially should be done before an audience in order to get a more natural response. I never cared much for the laugh track used last year so I wanted the switch made. Now we have a perfect set-up. We in the company get the vitality we need from a live audience and we get the chance to edit and re-do mistakes on film. While our KABC-TV program is presented live, it is released on film—very complex but pleasant state of affairs."

"I think I enjoy TV more this year than I did last. It is certainly less of a harrowing experience to me. And being a Broadway guy, I love that business of coming up to opening night—each Saturday when we do the show. That's a big incentive, a big thrill to any performer."

Changes

Several changes have taken place in the Ray Bolger Show this year. For one thing, the old title of "Where's Raymond?" has gone. Betty Lynn and Allyn Joslyn are no longer in the company—but only because

of the change in format. And Ray's character itself has changed.

"I made the changes in the title and in my character because I felt that I should be better identified with the public," Ray said. "I was too fey last year, or so I thought. So romance has been brought more into this season's programs to make me a bit more human. We've also added more singing and dancing—and simply because our mail asked for that. I have talked to Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly and they have said that no matter how much dancing they did in a picture, most of the public wanted more. I can remember doing 'On Your Toes' on Broadway. I must have danced about an hour in an hour and a half show—and people still said, 'You didn't dance enough.' So I hope we're meeting this public half way now. However, I can't dance all the time. I have to breathe occasionally, and I've never learned how to put taps on breath."

"Of course, doing the dances and working in as much music as we do, present problems that no dramatic show ever encounters. We only have time to make one show a week—in fact, we're pressed to do that at times. We couldn't do what we do if it weren't for the people in the company: Sylvia Lewis, the choreographer; Earl Hagen, musical director; Maurice Kelley, choreographer; Claudio Guzman, set designer; and, above all, our wonderful director, John Rich."

"Nothing seems to throw this gang—and they're all full of ideas for dances, music, and even costumes. Once we needed a costume for Sylvia. We couldn't find what we wanted

and we had no time to have one made so Sylvia got a leotard, put a few sequins on it, added a piece of silk, and we had a terrific outfit."

How He Views Himself

Ray's attitude towards himself is, of course, one of the main reasons his show should catch on. And it's also why he isn't worried about people seeing too much of him.

"I'm not trying to win any Academy Award each week," he said with a smile. "I'm not trying to top myself. I'm thinking of making others look good—and the regulars in the company like Marjie Millar, Christine Nelson, Richard Erdman, Sylvia, Charlie Cantor, and Maurice Kelley help a lot. I look on it this way. People invite us to their homes and they want to meet new friends once in a while, so we give them new characters. I don't want to be the one-star show. I have had that and I am not interested in it. When you get pretentious and try to be something you're not just to take over a show, the audience catches up with you fast enough. And they get bored with you."

"I'm only as good as the people around me. I once had a story written about me which said that all I needed was a backdrop. I wrote the magazine and said, 'But somebody had to make that backdrop.' One of the biggest changes, in fact, in this season's shows is they center more on the problems of other people and less on mine. That should be typical of human nature, I guess. Anyway, it's lot more rewarding."

If only some stars we could mention felt like this! What a pleasant thing TV could be then!

It Pays to be A Humanitarian

Johnny Grant, KMPC deejay and emcee of NBC-TV's "7 to 8," didn't want it that way, but he found it to be true.

HIS thing called "Humanitarianism" gets knocked around as much as an opponent of Rocky Marciano. Some pseudo-Good Samaritans have as much heart as a piece of cold ice; their eyes are really focused on their own egos and on the next day's newspaper. Others are as solid as Gibraltar and as warm as Marilyn Monroe.

Johnny Grant (no relation to the metaphoric Marilyn) happens to have a 4.0 rating with the G.I.s—and teenagers that means he's tops.

Why will someone go out of his way, even make sacrifices, to help someone else? In most cases, the answer is a simple one: because the person who makes the outward sacrifice in return receives inner happiness.

This was the motivation behind Johnny's junkets to Korea, Europe, Alaska and Panama—150,000 miles of travel, all to help bolster the service man's morale. Except for per diem expenses, the thirty-one-year-old deejay has never made a dime on the deal. As a matter of fact, many a time the short, stocky comic-emcee has had to contribute money to some cause or even pay some performers out of his own pocket.

The Pay-Off

As fate would have it, though, today, after four years of entertaining G.I.s and also helping various teenage organizations, Johnny's humanitarianism has paid off for him.

When NBC-TV brought "Today" to the West Coast (seen from 8 to 9 every morning), it was also decided to add an hour to the program from "7 to 8" with a local angle. Fred W. Wile, Jr., vice-president in charge of programming, began his hunt for the

Pacific Coast's Dave Garroway. The production of "7 to 8" had already been put in the capable hands of Joe Thompson.

Wile, of course, was familiar with the work of Johnny Grant, the popular KMPC disc jockey. But it took a personal meeting (and a few good words thrown in by such friends as Bob Hope) to convince Wile and others that Grant was the right man for the difficult job. The headman on the one-hour early-morning show had to be a combination emcee—comic—interviewer—newscaster—and nursemaid.

"The Most"

Almost unconsciously, Grant's work with the G.I.s and teenagers had given him this necessary background. Whether he wanted to or not, the bachelor from Goldsboro, North Carolina had finally capitalized on his humanitarianism—some of the biggest names in Hollywood wanted the same job that Grant now has.

Johnny agrees that his new TV assignment is "the most."

"Five years ago, after my first brief try at TV, I was one of the first to go back to radio. I was, and still am, plenty happy with my deejay show on KMPC, but I thought I would never be interested in TV again—until this opportunity came along.

"At first, I wasn't really sure in my own mind whether I wanted it. However, the more I thought about it, the more I knew I had to have it," Johnny explained.

For a guy who came to Hollywood seven years ago with nothing to his name except five letters, the dynamic deejay has done a little bit of all right for himself. "Sure, I'm lucky," Johnny said. "I'm working full time

at what I've always wanted to do, and I'm making good money for it. But I'll never stop entertaining G.I.s or helping out someone in the business, whenever I can, wherever they want me.

"When I was in Korea one time, there was a young soldier assigned to our group. Everytime we'd move, or request something of him, he used his favorite expression, 'I'm with you.'

"That's exactly how I feel now if anyone asks to help the G.I.s or teenagers. 'I'm with you,' I tell them."

Thousands of servicemen (who remember and write to him from all over the world), plus his many TV-radio followers, feel exactly the same way about Johnny Grant.

Dr. Herman Harvey's "Psychology on TV" is another milestone for KNXT and educational TV.

TV's NEW APPROACH TO

Sex

SEX SELLS. For proof, just look at the advertisements on billboards, in newspapers and magazines, and yes, on television with all its pretty pitchgirls.

What has this got to do with Dr. Herman Harvey's new program on KNXT called "Psychology on TV?" Plenty.

If one man has ever had the opportunity to capitalize on sex—and in a very refined and legitimate way—it certainly would be Dr. Harvey. The assistant professor of psychology at the University of Southern California started his series of lectures last month. It is the third venture of both USC and KNXT whereby students and non-students at home may receive college credit for courses on television. The first, of course, was award-winning Dr. Frank C. "Shakespeare", Baxter.

No Birds 'n Bees

An experienced clinical psychologist and research scientist, as well as a skillful teacher, the thirty-five year old Harvey was given the opportunity to bring psychology on a grand scale into the average American living room after very extensive screening tests. The subject matter: human behavior—all aspects of human behavior.

As a result, when Dr. Harvey talks

about the sex life of human beings he can't evade the subject and talk about the birds and bees. He not only can't—he wouldn't.

"In my lectures I do not intend to hide or distort any facts. I will not refrain from making certain comments merely because they are not nice. As a teacher and psychologist such a policy would be against all my principles. The course I am giving on TV is exactly the same as the one offered by the University," Dr. Harvey explained.

The Saturday morning lectures cover the gamut of human emotions and experiences. Naturally, sex is certain to rear its proverbial head. However, since Dr. Harvey is not conducting a marriage or pre-marital course, he is mainly concerned with sex as a conflict of human behavior. Contrary to bar and parlor talk, sex is one of the minor drives in man's struggle for existence and self-expression. But it is a powerful drive in every human being. (Just ask the advertisers).

What outlets must man use to satisfy this drive? What conflicts arise? Which are the right, and which are the wrong outlets? These are the problems that Dr. Harvey, as any good psychologist, analyzes and criticises. Steering away from sexual deviations (this is not a course in

abnormal psychology), Dr. Harvey is not afraid to discuss such subjects as masturbation and the Kinsey Report. (Did you notice, when Dr. Kinsey's report was a number one topic in the nation, how radio and TV stayed clear of the controversial book?)

No TV Star

As a respected "authority" in his field, Dr. Harvey, who is married and has a three-year old daughter, certainly has the chance to speak more bluntly and truthfully about the complexities of human nature than any man on TV today. But he won't sell sex, per se.

"My main purpose in doing this series on KNXT, is to enlighten as many people as possible and to create interest in psychology," Dr. Harvey explained sincerely.

"Naturally I am deeply grateful and pleased at the tremendous opportunity this TV course offers. Although I shall certainly do everything in my power to be informative, and yes, even a little entertaining, I certainly have no ambition to become a television star.

"My main purpose on this TV show is to give prestige to the profession of psychology. I intend to spend the rest of my life as a professor of psychology, not as a TV performer."
