His Secrets Leak Out!

ed appearance, that one would almost think the person involved would sense his impending honor through mental telepathy.

How Joe E. Brown ever escaped knowing he was slated for the full treatment on "This Is Your Life" is still a puzzle to many in the trade. Hollywood was abuzz the Wednesday he was to be Ra'ph Edwards' top "Life." On the day Toots Shor was to be main subject of "This Is Your Life," all the TV and radio biggies in New York had the word. Apparently Toots, who was under the impression that Quentin Reynolds' life was to be dramatized, had been unable to restrain himself from surreptitiously imparting this juicy piece of news to countless confidantes. His mistake, however, was in thinking that he knew, thus spreading the word about the wrong subject.

Many lookers were convinced that Ozzie and Harriet, "in" on the secret of Don Defore's upcoming show appearance, were convinced that the tables were to be turned and that they themselves were to be the chief subjects. Dale Evans couldn't be blamed for feeling that she might be the star when Dr. Norman Vincent Peale made his recent appearance. Dale had been in the know on the Roy Rogers and Dr. I.Q. telecasts... then was asked to help on the Peale program. It was when she saw the number of persons brought in to Hollywood, particularly the members of Dr. Peale's family, that she was certain that the life to be done was not hers. She knew enough about television budgets to realize that flying in such a large number could only be substantiated by producing a guest star appropriate to the persons present.

THERE IS probably not a single man or woman, brought in to appear with a chief subject on NBC-TV's "This Is Your Life," who hasn't experienced a twinge in thinking "Is 'it' going to be I?" Even the people who work on the show admit they often wonder if a skillful trap hasn't been laid for one of their number. For instance, Jim Chadwick, who labors on research and is frequently charged with corraling the principal subject and bringing him to the NBC studio at the appointed moment, admits that he never fails to build to that climax when Ralph Edwards impressively announces — "This is your life . . ." He feels a tinge of excitement rapidly followed by the wondering question. "Would Ralph Edwards do that to me?"

The longer "This Is Your Life" is on the air the more meticulous the Edwards' staff becomes in guarding the secret of "who's going to be on." Researchers, telephoning friends of the star-subject-to-be, resort to aliases in conducting their wire conversations. Often they leave no trace of name whatsoever. The girl who was working on Bebe Daniels' life made it a habit to call the Bebe Daniels-Ben Lyon household asking only for "Ben Lyon" and if informed he was not in, she quickly replied. "Oh, I'll call back." adroitly avoiding any further conversation. If Bebe's life hadn't been "done" very soon on the teleshow, her suspicions about the woman constantly endeavoring to contact her husband might have led to jealous proportions.

There are approximately ten persons working directly on a specific "This Is Your Life" program, all of whom must of necessity know who the subject is to be. Said one of these ten to TV-Radio Life, "Each of these ten will probably tell five people . . . a husband, a wife, two or three friends. Then there are approximately twenty individuals whom we have contacted for show information, but have not asked to

appear on the program (these, of course, are exclusive of the people whom we have flown in to appear on the program). The ones we have contacted without bringing in to Hollywood for the telecast are probably aware of the guest subject's identity, because we have had to ask these people, during the preliminary research, whether, if needed, they would be available to come to Hollywood on such and such a date.

More People

"There are about 100 people working on the stage and in the orchestra during rehearsal. These, of course, know on the day of the show who will hold the center of the stage that evening. The 100 more throughout the country who know the guest star's name are the photographers and fan magazine personnel who must be notified so that coverage of an important guest or accompanying guests may be adequate. It's not difficult to see how the 300 or 400 persons who have to be let in on the secret may multiply to a few thousand . . . all quite unintentionally, but certainly a hazardous business."

As for the press contacts and photographic tip-offs, the Edwards office feels that these are calculated risks necessary to give proper coverage to the program. Letting the studio personnel in on the secret is an imperative risk. For instance, the page boys must be briefed as to whom to expect at the studio, especially the page boy who will escort the about-to-be honored guest to a specified seat.

Secret Gets Out

Despite the most elaborate safeguards, there have been instances when advance news of a definite guest star has spread through the TV-radio precincts in New York and Hollywood. This news has so dominated the luncheon chit-chat at Toots Shors or the Vine Street Brown Derby, with tongues wagging madly over the upcoming guest's unsuspect-

The night Martha Raye was the center of attraction on "This Is Your Life," Milton Berle was "the gimmick" to get her to the studio under guise of making a color television test with him. Several days preceding the Raye teleshow it had appeared in print that Milton Berle was to be the "This Is Your Life" star. The Edwards office had burned up miles of telephone wire in extensive conversations with the Berle office to complete plans, so if "Uncle Miltie" had any notions that this was to be his night he was entirely within the bounds of reason.

The Martha Raye appearance was a rather hurried substitute for a show about which an irreparable leak had occurred.

to be in show business she can understand me and why things are important to me. She never resents intrusions of show business into our home life. The best thing that ever happened to me was marrying Pixie."

About Marriage: "We did have a couple back home that got married and divorced three times. It really wasn't their fault, though. It was a small town and they kept getting introduced."

On Being a Father: "My children are still in the play-pen stage but once the boys bust through that it'll be like the Maginot Line breaking. Indy, my little daughter, is in nursery school now, so she's not as hard to manage as are Kim and Will. The big job most fathers face, as I see it, is to steer kids in the direction you want them to go. Or, to steer them where you think they want to go so that when they're old enough they can tell you where they want to go."

About Children: "Today, you see so many women out seeing shows and playing cards and stuff. Back home, about the only time you saw a woman on the streets she was on her way to the hospital to have another baby."

"I really don't know much about kids, but I know there's this thing called heredity. It works something like this . . . if your folks didn't have any kids, there's a good chance you won't have any either."

"There was another couple who used to have a kid every year, except this one year they didn't have one and then the next year they had twins. I guess she figures she could take a year off so long as she caught up."

The Inner Thoughts of Herb Shriner

HERB SHRINER was embarrassed. He was caught in a reflective mood.

When asked to discuss anything serious, Herb, who emcees the delightful CBS-TV KNXT show, "Two for the Money," the program that tosses out the dollars with consummate ease, acts as though he had two left feet. He can't help turning a profound statement into a gag. So to get his ideas on life we let him add a touch of humor anyway. The results—well, this is what Shriner really thinks.

The Most Important Thing to Him in Life: "In anyone's life, his work is the mainstay, and so it is in mine. My job is entertaining people. I'm the guy with the built-in impulse. I simply try to do that job as well as I can and try to get others to agree that I've done it well. That's

a neat trick. I might add. I'm interested in a lot of things personally. I have a large family that runs neck and neck with my work. So perhaps the most important thing to me is planning around a family featuring three children and a wife."

He thought of a gag to go with this. It was: "Folks don't seem to get up to go to work as early as they used to. I remember back home we used to get up so early that our clothes were still warm from the night before."

On Making a Marriage Successful: "My wife is behind me all the time. It must be exasperating to be unable to tell a wife what has happened to you during the day. My wife keeps an exact ledger of all financial obligations. She is the financial brains of the family. Pixie—that's my wife—has completely taken on my interests. Since she used

can't always talk back. Consequently, you find a method of knowing when your feelings are hurt and when they aren't. Then you have to decide which feelings you want to work with because you can't go around being hurt all day."

On People: "I remember we had a fellow who got along swell with everybody. He was our local newspaper editor. Actually, he could get anything out of anybody, he had that knack. He got them to tell him things . . . well, what it was, he'd get 'em drunk!"

"In the army we all got along pretty good. We even missed our sergeant. Fact, we missed him a couple of times."

About Keeping Other Interests: "I have a lot of interests—such as foreign cars and harmonicas. I've been holding my own auto shows all over the country, and I'm bringing out a harmonica called 'The Hoosier Boy Harmonica.' It has some unusual twists and I'm trying to revive interest in harmonicas. Oh, I have a lot of serious sides, but it's impossible to explain them, which is why I've never written a book. I really

haven't much to say so I thought I'd mix up that little bit with the rest of the talk so nobody would notice it."

On Harmonicas: "We had a woman back in Indiana who had two teeth missing and yet she loved to play the harmonica. She was just a music lover. She sounded like a kid running a stick across a picket fence."

On What Makes a Person a Success: "This breaks up into different parts. The people in the business world who are successful are the ones who have learned their business better than anyone else. Specialization has made me whatever success I am. I have always searched after craftsmanship, but I admire a lot of different talents. My Dad was a craftsman, a part-time inventor. To be a success on TV, though, is something else again. The most important thing about being on TV is being on TV. It's not like in pictures where a star can be a success and not be in a movie all the time. A television star who gets canceled, though, is an ex-TV star.

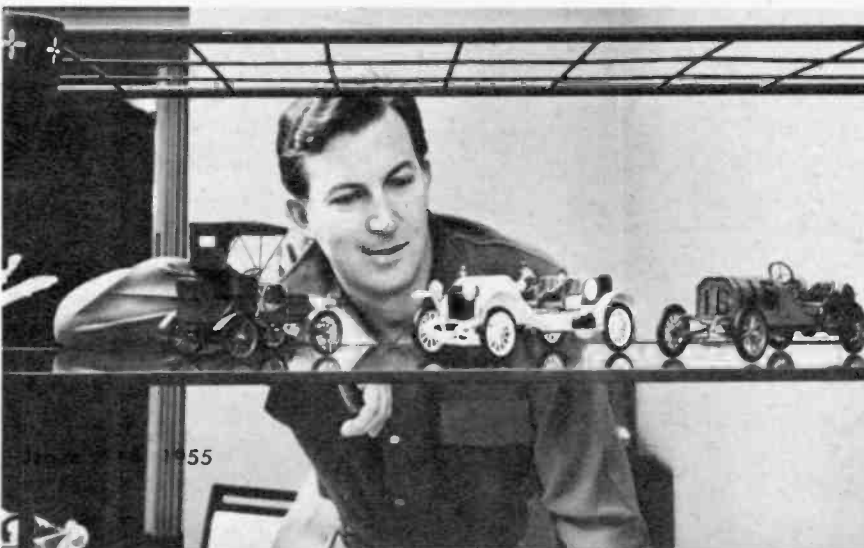
"I just go through life looking for

the good things, and I could be satisfied with a lot less success if it weren't that I just plain old appreciate the good things. I like to own good records, cameras. I like to have a good dinner out, to see the best shows. I like quality but not quantity. Material possessions don't rule my life, even though I enjoy them. In the army I had only a duffle bag in which were all of my possessions, so material things never bothered me too much as a result. I learned from that experience not to let 'things' rule me."

On Success: "This fellow I remember got to be real famous out our way. He found a nickel in a potato. Folks'd come from miles around to look at him. They'd point at him and say, 'There he is!'—and he was too. But fame is such a fleeting thing. One day, his wife cut up the potato for soup and he just lost out. He never could get back up again. He tried hard, though. He found a potato with six cents in and another with three cents, but he never did amount to anything after that."

And so there are Herb Shriner's beliefs. It's just that he can't help finding something funny in life.

comments with film. The guest stars add a lot too."

Movie Stars

It was at this point that George veered off into a discussion about the movie stars he admires — and doesn't admire.

"Among the most genuine stars is Joan Crawford," George went on. "She's the warmest and most gracious lady I know. Cesar Romero, Fernando Lamas, Dorothy Lamour, Betty Hutton, Brian Donlevy, and Van Heflin are also tops with me. The most honest star in the world is Broderick Crawford. Then there's Jane Wyman who started out as a dancing girl and wound up with one of the biggest hearts in Hollywood. She is sincerely loved by producers and by studios.

"Bill Holden is another favorite of mine, but I think Humphrey Bogart is the top boy of them all. As for the ones I like least, you can have Stewart Granger, Joseph Cotten, and Henry Fonda.

"For my money, Stewart Granger has no right to be a star. Fonda made no great impression on me one day when I was to do a tape interview with him at the Biltmore when he was opening in 'Mr. Roberts.' The theatre had set up the deal and I was to be there at 7:30. When I walked in, Fonda and the cast were

finishing a rehearsal. He started to walk to his dressing room when I said, 'I'm George Fisher, Mr. Fonda, and I have a tape interview to do with you.' Fonda looked at me for a while and then said, 'Are you sponsored?' I said I was. 'What do I get paid?' Fonda then asked. I replied, 'I'm afraid—nothing.' I never pay my stars for interviews since it's publicity for them. With that Fonda said flatly, 'I wouldn't even do a show for my mother if I weren't paid for it.' And with that I said, 'Thank you,' and walked out.

"Cotten had the same attitude. He told me he never did any radio work unless he was paid \$5000 for it.

"In my opinion, people like these just aren't pros. A pro is one who gives his level best to everyone. Pat O'Brien is a real professional. He only turned me down once on an interview. I asked him to do my KCOP show one Sunday and he said, 'Not that Sunday. Any other Sunday. I'm not going on opposite Jack Benny!' Benny happens to be on at the same hour as I am.

"My wife has been of great help to me on my 'Let's Go Hollywood' show. She has acted practically as my secretary. Even when she was pregnant she was working right along with me. The girl who comes on at the opening of my show was her idea, as a matter of fact."

YOU WANT to know why I left CBS where I had been motion picture editor for several years and why I started my own TV show on KCOP?" George Fisher asked bluntly. "Well, I don't mind telling you.

"I had been under contract to CBS for a long time. Then one day I was offered a five minute deal, five times a week, to do my Hollywood gossip on TV at 10:45 p. m. over KNXT. I was to get \$150 a week for this chore. I did it for about four weeks and then I couldn't take it any more. So I sent a wire saying I was resigning.

"Before I made this decision I talked it over with my wife, Mary Anne. After all, she was pregnant and I did have a responsibility to my family so this was a move I felt she should be in on. She agreed with me.

"I'm doing everything on 'Let's Go Hollywood' on KCOP that I always wanted to do. I used to have to talk for a half an hour when I was on radio but now I can illustrate my

Pix from Six

As you sit at home in a comfortable chair and watch the smooth progression of TV programs on your screen, you're pretty unusual if you stop to think about how it's done, or who does it. Matter of fact, before I got into TV myself, these questions hardly occurred to me—except, of course, when the screen blanked out, or the image dissolved at the moment when the hero was about to dispose of the villain forever.

Even so, it didn't cross my mind to wonder: What sort of man is behind all this? What kind of person is capable of bringing together the cameras and shows and directors and announcers and buying and selling and

everything else that goes into this strenuously complicated business we call TV?

Here at Channel 6, we have an unusual answer to this question in the unusual personality of one Julian M. ("Julie") Kaufman, XETV's general manager. Like many of the most successful men in TV, Julie is young—37. And for the responsibilities he has handled, Julie has been "young" all his life. He himself believes his biggest distinction probably lies in the fact that at the beardless age of 17 he was the youngest publisher of a newspaper in the United States, and at a (neatly shaven) 35 was the youngest station manager of a major-market television station.

Julie stands about 6 feet, is slim, athletic, and—with a touch of silver threading his close-cropped black hair—handsome enough to be on instead of behind Channel 6 television.

His athletic build is no accident. Julie is a frustrated professional baseball player. (This news came as a complete surprise to your reporter, who had to dig deep indeed for this tidbit!) Admonished by his father that he could never make an adequate livelihood playing baseball, Kaufman still writhes when he thinks of the \$75,000 bonuses now being paid to young players. His interest in sports has not been in the least dampened by this miscalculation. Julie positively glows when he speaks of his golf game: "On a clear day, and with the wind at my back, I can get into the 80's."

But his real enthusiasm is reserved for television. "The best 20 years of my life have been spent in the last 7—in TV," Julie says unhesitatingly. A "Young Turk" of Television, Julie is one of the best known TV executives on the West Coast, with a career that includes various assignments at WTCN-TV in Minneapolis, KGO-TV in San Francisco, KPHO-TV in Phoenix, and a year with XETV here in San Diego.

Julie has been fortunate not only in business but, even more important, in love. His stunning wife Kitty is an ex-Conover model and TV luminary in her own right. Kitty has had her own popular programs on KPHO-TV and—interestingly enough—appeared on the very first show of a Channel 6 competitor, KFMB-TV, some six years ago. And just to make TV a real family affair for the Kaufmans, Julie and Kitty have a blonde bombshell of a daughter named Nikki, aged 10, who has made several TV appearances. Your reporter wonders if there perhaps isn't a spectacular dynasty in the making here at Channel 6!

The Executive Kaufman is offset and balanced by the Scholar Kaufman. Julie received national recognition when BROADCASTING Magazine published his exhaustive article on management guidance for stations in a medium-sized market.

Just to prove that theory can be put to practice, we have the record of

success at Channel 6 since Julie took over the management dugout of the San Diego area's only independent TV station. Julie believes the team's batting average this year will set the pattern for the future: "Film shows like 'Mr. District Attorney,' 'The Cisco Kid' and countless others," he reports, "have proven their popularity over the so-called network spectaculars and there is nothing to impede their continuing progress."

And by the same token, this reporter has yet to see anything that is going to impede the progress of Julie Kaufman, a frustrated ballplayer who is knocking down fences in the big time of television.

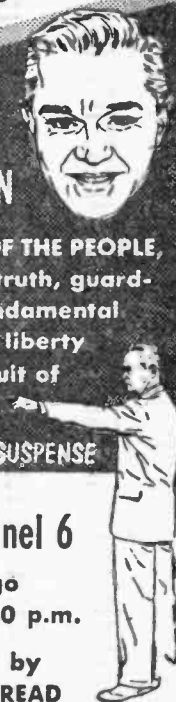

Off Lens (Personalities)

"Medic" Bombshell

There was a tense, grim atmosphere on the "Medic" set where they were shooting "Flash of Darkness." This special episode, depicting the work of a medical unit after an H-bomb disaster, will be seen on NBC-TV (KRCA) February 14.

In presenting "Flash of Darkness," the series deviates from its usual format on behalf of the Civil Defense Office. Val Peterson, Federal Administrator of the CDO, does the closing narration on the program, which is an intense appeal to Civil Defense Workers. Mr. Peterson also intends to use prints of the film in several Civil Defense Centers across the nation in an effort to further alert the people for the need of volunteers.

Serving in an advisory capacity on the film is Dr. Stafford Warren, who heads the medical school at U.C.L.A. and is a leading authority on radiation and medical consequences of nuclear weapons.

During a break in the shooting, star Richard Boone stepped away from the

glare of hot lights, wiped his perspiring forehead, looked at his "blood-stained" shirt and arms and slowly commented: "This is close enough to the real thing for me. 'Medic' can't possibly cover all the effects of such a disaster. But just from the medical standpoint, it's enough to alarm anyone. Our story stresses the inadequate preparation and insufficient supplies to cope with such an emergency. When there isn't enough plasma and drugs to alleviate suffering and you have to let those who've been contaminated by radiation die, some of them in agony, it's a pretty grim situation."

Let's hope the "Medic" episode on the hypothetical H-bombing of Los Angeles will influence the population to replace apathy with activity.

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

It's always interesting to meet a personality at whom you have taken a crack. **Bill Ballance**, CBS radio's funster and man-about-the-dial on "Matinee," was in the "tunnel" some time ago. At the time I said I thought his humor fell a little flat. So I decided to find out what there was about the man that made him one of radio's top personalities. Well, he's doing okay. He only does twelve shows on radio a week—but no TV.

"For some time CBS was a little possessive about not wanting me to do TV," Bill smiled. "In fact, I only did two hours of TV in 1954—and they both came on the last day in the year. I can do more television now, I'm glad to say. Not that I don't like radio. I do—but I often wish the medium would use more audacity and that it would be a little more aware of the changes in things. However, I think it will pick up the cudgels and start fighting back soon.

"My favorite chore on the air is interviews. I'm always nervous before the interview but I relax completely during it. I try to do as thorough a research as possible about the guest star beforehand so I don't act like a jerk with my questions. And I have never yet gone on the air with an interview without talking to the guest ahead of time."

When it was pointed out to Bill that some people think he is rude and too flippant with his stars, he looked surprised and added, "I am indeed sorry if I have ever given that impression because I wouldn't dream of being rude to any guest." And he looked at this columnist with a sly grin. "Maybe that impression is given when I am trying to get something out of a person who won't give.

"As for humor, I like the unusual twist—the trick ending. My kind of

joke is 'Home cooking is where a man thinks his wife is.' All I can say is that if my cracks fall short, I am entirely responsible since I write all of my material. I have yet to find humor that appeals to all audiences. The people at my afternoon show, for instance, react entirely differently from those in the evening.

"Some day I hope to have a show where I can do what I feel best qualified for—monologues as an emcee on radio or TV. That's the kind of work I did in Chicago."

Bill is actually a serious-minded person. He is an authority, for one thing, on the Civil War, and started his collection of Civil War literature in 1936. So far he has about 300 books on the subject. He also discovered in 1948 some stereoscopic pictures done by **Matthew Brady**, a Civil War photographer. He found them hidden way in the back of a **Penny Arcade** in Denver and bought the bunch for five dollars. He also owns weapons and sabers from the Civil War.

All right, that's another side of Bill Ballance. I may not get all of his humor but he's a darned interesting guy.

One of the most spectacular bombs ever laid on a spectacular was dropped with a reverberating thud on the last **Max Liebman** show starring **Judy Holliday**, **Dick Shawn**, and **Steve Allen**. Only Steve emerged unscathed from the debacle of very bad material. Here again you find argument for good writers because without them no one, not even a person with **Max Liebman's** production know-how, can deliver a good show. The public apathy about these super-spectacle shows is certainly increasing these days—and who can blame them?

It will seem odd not to see **Howard Wormser** around the TV scene. He's been such an integral part of the growth of television. His announced resignation from **KTLA** was quite a surprise. Wherever Howard decides to go next it's a cinch he'll carry with him a lot of expert publicity knowledge. He deserves much credit for doing a difficult job with outstanding results. Good luck!

Odds and Ends: That's no laugh track you hear on **Bob Cummings'** show. It is an actual reaction from a "live" audience. In fact, **Bob** tells me, the laughs were so loud that they had to be toned down. Jean King, as Mrs. Rousseau is known professionally, started out in local radio six years ago. At that time her program was aimed mostly at the opposite sex, and it was thought that masking her identity made her honeyed tones still sweeter and more appealing. Now, however, between seventy-five and ninety percent of her audience is comprised of women. Jean wants to be able to talk gal to gal with them and she feels that with disclosure of her real life identity "as a perfectly respectable married woman with a couple of kids" she will be able now to "talk about teen-agers . . . about a home, and about domestic problems. I've just about exhausted the possibilities of talk about me, my garden, my seventeen cats and six fish."

Besides enlarging her field of verbal material, Jean also feels that her area of sponsor possibilities will be broadened by the revelation of her identity. Her time on ABC-Radio, Monday through Friday, has just been increased to cover the period from 10:30 to 11:45 p.m. This hour and a quarter will be sold to participating sponsors. Jean feels that it might be difficult for a bankroller of her show to picture the illusive "Lonesome Gal" selling such mundane things as tires.

Beans Spilled

In the beginning the "Lonesome Gal's" identity was kept a pretty firm trade secret, until a national magazine saw fit to spoil the fun and give Jean's real name. Little by little the secret has leaked out, and though there are thousands of her listeners unaware of her personal status, Jean was amazed to receive so many holiday greetings saying words to the effect, "Give my love to your husband and two lovely children." One lonesome sailor wrote, "Even though you're married, give my love to your husband and tell him I'm only kiddin' when I say I love you."

Jean's greatest personal problem by far has been the results of her secretive air personality on her two children; Patricia, now fifteen, and Fargo, thirteen. When the youngsters have happily bragged to their companions, "Our mother's the 'Lonesome Gal'" they have been greeted with disbelief that this saccharine-tongued siren could be a mother. 

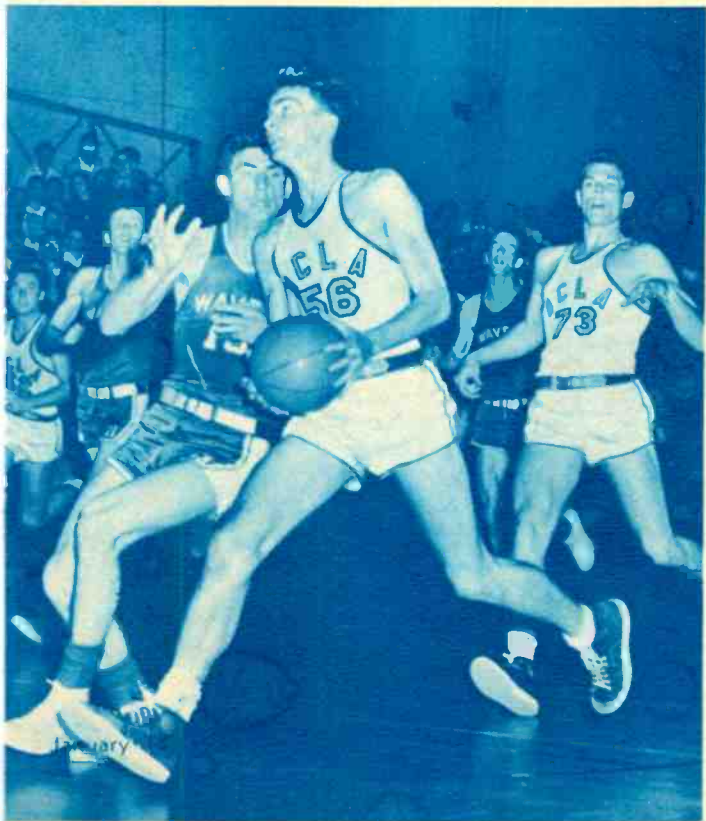

DOWN ON EAST 71st ST. in New York in a four story brownstone apartment lives Arlene Francis. And this is the same as saying, "New York's living doll hangs out here."

Arlene is one subject on which everyone seems to agree—everyone just plain old likes her. The star of NBC's "Home" and the bright, gay panelist of CBS-TV's "What's My Line?" is probably the busiest woman in New York, for she also does a radio show for ABC and a program for Mutual. In between her many activities she drops quietly into the role of Mrs. Martin Gabel, mother and housewife.

It was in the housewife role that we found her. She had come roaring into her apartment around 5:15 in the afternoon after having gone through a typical day at work which begins around 7:45 a.m. and ends around 5:30 or 6:00 at night. Her one free day is Saturday during which she luxuriates in domesticity.

Home

Come for a tour through her house first. On the first floor you'll find the kitchen, the dining room, and the outdoor terrace. On the second floor are the living room and library. Another flight up takes you into the guest room and her bedroom; the

top floor is her son Peter's hang-out and the servants' quarters. The apartment is furnished with a mixture of antiques, modern, and contemporary. Among the notable landmarks are a portrait of Peter done by Claire Trevor and a huge Toulouse Lautrec original in the living room. The latter had just fallen before Arlene had come home and there was considerable excitement about it.

Arlene manages to have a private life—although it's a bit of a struggle, particularly now since her husband is not only producing one of New York's better plays, "Reclining Figure," but is also playing in it.

"With careers running rampant all around us," Arlene quipped, "my husband and I just never discuss career at home. Oh, we're interested in each other's work but that's about as far as it goes. When we're as busy as we are, we are more inclined to organize our life well. You'll find none of this 'We'll do it tomorrow' business in our home. However, we see each other so little now that we almost have to make dates with one another. I'm usually in bed by eleven at night, Martin doesn't get home from his show until after midnight, he gets up after I leave in the morning, but we do manage to have dinner together with Peter around 5:30 or 6:00 at night. are the only times I can stay up late—and really spend some time with my husband.

"This is the first time this sort of thing has happened to us. But the most important thing is that we are able to be with Peter when he comes home from school. I stay with him until he goes to bed. However, his schedule is almost as full as Martin's and mine. With his many school activities and sports he's quite busy.

"I wouldn't recommend this kind of schedule for any married couple. You certainly have to be level-headed and free of temperament to get along with this set-up. But, fortunately, both Martin and I like our work. I find 'Home' a real pleasure, and I've acquired some interesting ideas for my own home—such as decoration schemes, discussions about children, and the like. I even started to do oil paintings after it was a subject on 'Home.' However, I could never do a still life of anything. I'm too highly geared for that. I'd have to do an 'active life.'"

Arlene freely confesses that she's of the domestic nature. And from what you see of her at home you'd agree she does all right in this score.

Domestic

"I'm very domestic, although I'm not a Mrs. Craig," Arlene laughed.

"I'm at times as meticulous as that famous character from 'Craig's Wife,' in that I go around seeing if there is dust on furniture. I have a house-boy but he just became a father so he hasn't been entirely here. Incidentally, I'm the godmother.

"I must say I relax easily at home. Some people expect me to go around the house looking the way I do on 'What's My Line?' but I assure you I have no objection to appearing without make-up when I'm home. I have to wear it all day so I can't wait to scrub it off when I get home. Before I was married I had planned to do all the right things—like getting up in the morning around six, putting on my make-up, donning a glamorous frock, and preparing breakfast for my husband. I'm afraid I was dreaming a little too much.

"Yet, I have always tried to be reasonably stimulating in conversation with my husband. So I relax at home—that doesn't mean I fall apart mentally. I'm a strong believer in keeping alert for one's family, just as much as one does for friends. And I have found that once you make the effort to be interesting at home it becomes second nature to be sure you're never boring—or bored.

"The most devastating thing to any marriage, or so I believe, is nagging

of any kind. The more you complain the easier it becomes. Now, I'm not any paragon of virtue in this respect. I've made the mistakes all wives have made—perhaps a few more. But I do try to guard against nagging. Besides, who wants to be miserable? That's for psychiatrists and analysts—and I've never been near one.

"I have the kind of make-up where I can take a lot of pressure, not bring it home with me, and unwind easily. I usually read to Peter at night—and I enjoy some of his books as much as he does. And then if I feel in a 'going out' mood I'll march off to a midnight movie—that's when I don't have to get up early the next morning."

Her Son

There's no secret that Peter is Arlene's pride and joy. He goes to the Hunter Elementary School, a school for mentally advanced children.

"I hope he's no genius," Arlene said with motherly pride, "but he is very alert. Right now I'm working on his biography. The school asks parents to do this as a guide in instructing him, but now I want to get it done for my own sake.

"My family and I really enjoy life. I can't even think of a real low moment in my life. Life is a dream. As you can see, I'm the pollyanna of my set. And I'm not frustrated at all—except for one thing. I'd like to be in a hit play. I've only been in one—"The Doughgirls."

"Maybe I can explain myself in this way—most women love to go shopping for clothes. I've a tremendous wardrobe because I need one for my shows, but when I go shopping I go mad in the housewares department buying for the house. I never quite make it to the dress department."

Are Radio Detectives Ridiculous?

These are fighting words to Richard Denning who has a thing or two to say on the subject.

▲ **"IT CAN'T BE MY FOOTPRINT,"** exclaims Richard "Mr. North" Denning to Barbara "Mrs. North" Britton, "or can it?" The private-eye series, which never loses sight of entertainment value, is heard weekly on CBS radio.

THIS IS a loaded question to throw at any actor, especially one who is engaged in playing the role of a private eye on radio and television. But blond, tall, handsome Richard Denning, star of "Mr. and Mrs. North," was quick with the answers.

When queried as to why private eyes usually appeared smarter than

the police in solving cases, our "Mr. North," of CBS radio and KTTV television, blithely replied, "It's like any other profession. Those close to it can't see the obvious. Sometimes it takes outsiders with a fresh approach to stumble on a clue. This is no reflection on the police department and their wonderful staff of detectives. The extremely clever private eye is merely a device to enhance the entertainment value of a script.

"As far as the 'Dragnet' underplaying-type of formula is concerned, I believe it's merely a temporary trend. It's certainly different and in some instances startling but an endless diet of underplaying becomes tiresome.

"The documented dramas have their place in radio programming, but an over-abundant crop of shows based on this premise would take the pleasure out of listening to detective dramas. The truth as portrayed in documented-type programs can become pretty dull and even sordid at times, but the imaginary detective script played with a light touch will consistently have wider audience appeal.

"The private eye format serves more than one purpose. It relaxes as well as entertains listeners. The private eye's pretty and clever accomplice, be it wife, as is the case in "Mr. and Mrs. North," or a secretary as in other shows of this category, is a definite asset.

"Take Barbara Britton, for instance, who plays my wife Pam North. She is supposedly the typical housewife with leisure time on her hands. Rather than idle away this time she helps her publisher-amateur-detective husband — that's

me—solve the crime cases that just happen to come our way. This is a far better occupation for a radio wife than whiling her time away with bridge.

"If you think private eyes fall into a rut by becoming cynics, you're right. But they wouldn't be in the business of detecting if they were not suspicious of everyone and everything. A trusting soul never made a good detective.

Radio vs. TV

"I play 'Mr. North' in both radio and television but strictly for argument sake, and to corroborate my argument that radio detectives are not ridiculous, I think an identical script can be enacted better on radio than on TV, if you have a tight video budget. There is more leeway in radio. The imagination can carry listeners any place and anywhere in response to oral suggestion. But in TV the producer must think of the cost involved to build a set and other visual aids to establish a mood in a play.

"Radio does not have the mechanical limitations fostered upon television, and because of all these reasons the average detective script fares far better on radio than it does on television. (If my TV sponsor reads this, it's purely a hypothetical argument.)

"If anyone accuses radio detectives of being ridiculous I'll argue the point. The popularity of this format speaks for itself. Private-eye series are entertaining, relaxing and a permanent fixture on radio. Other trends in this broadcasting field crop up from time to time but we private eyes seem to go on forever and there's nothing ridiculous about that."
