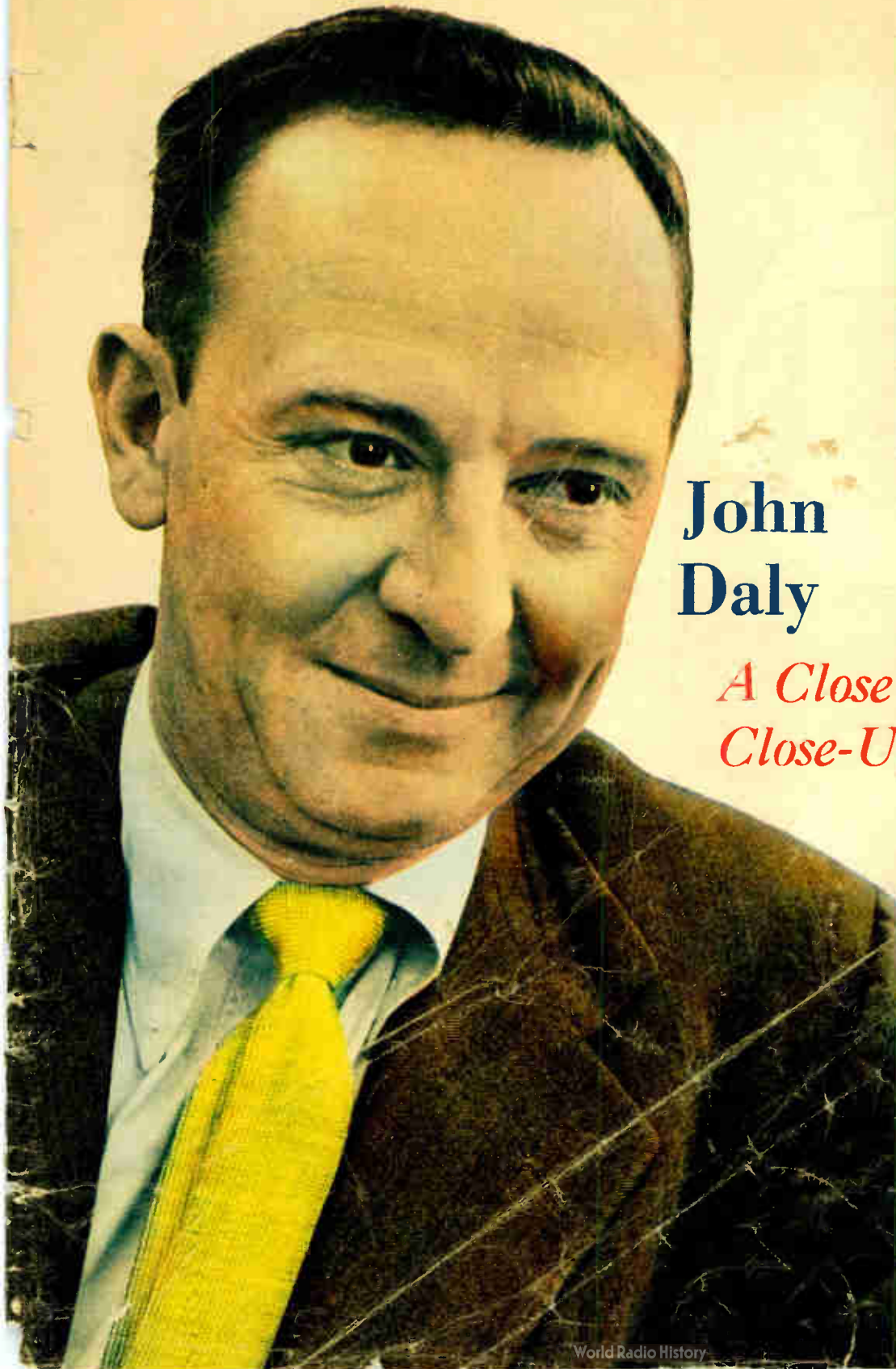

What's Happening To TV?

RONALD REAGAN is currently quite a TV-lite with his host and acting chores on "General Electric Theatre," a CBS-TV feature. His reputation as a stalwart citizen and a more than capable actor was enough to convince General Electric from the beginning that he was their first choice to fill the spot on their new dramatic program. Reagan hasn't let them—or TV—down, that's for sure.

Because Ronnie's opinions have long been respected in this town, he seemed the right person to contact for an honest appraisal of the strides TV has or hasn't made. Also, he has been around the television scene long enough to know what he's talking about.

"The biggest stride TV has made is the more or less establishing of a TV format and the acceptance of the medium now by top creative talent in all fields," Ronnie began during a break in the filming of another GE show. "A great many, in the beginning, would have nothing to do with TV. They had the same attitude as most talent had in the early days of the movies. At that time, only radio people were unhesitatingly willing to embrace movies. Today, look at the roster of people who have done or will do TV—and I don't know anyone who is missing outside of those who have contractual obligations with studios.

"When I speak of a TV format, I mean that at the start no one quite knew what forms of entertainment

would lend themselves to programming. Now there is a pattern—and I don't mean a rut—of giving a variety of entertainment. And TV is now able to do its own experimenting as a new medium and chart untried paths.

"When it comes to dramatic shows, such as the one I'm doing, there has been a constant improvement. Maybe I'm wrong, but it seems to me that a few years ago the first essential the average person connected with TV looked for was the strip type of show—the kind of program where one or two characters ran through all shows. It has only been in the last couple of years that there has been any appreciable acceptance of the anthology type of dramatic fare, such as 'GE Theatre.'

"One thing is certain—TV hasn't

are able to get some top Broadway stars for appearances."

In addition to his TV chores, Ronnie also serves his sponsor in a public relations capacity, and this involves some rather extended tours.

He isn't the only one to be working for "GE Theatre," though, since his wife, Nancy, has also appeared on one of the shows. In fact, Nancy and Ronnie worked together in "The Long Way Around" and it set a new high in ratings for the program.

"I'm busier now than I've ever been," Ronnie concluded. I like being busy, although I'm lazy as anyone. When you're working hard, ideas come quicker and better. Yet, I know there's a point when you get so busy your ideas dry up. I have a constitutional governor on me that will see I don't go that far."

A good many people have given their ideas about how far or how little TV has progressed, but Ronald Reagan has some interesting conclusions of his own.

shown any reluctance to skate on thin ice as far as subject matter is concerned. It has not avoided the controversial subjects at all, and this is healthy."

Ronnie is thoroughly enjoying his chores—and he thinks he's a rather lucky guy.

Good Job

"I have the best job in the business," he said with a wide smile. "For one thing, I have what all actors want—a connection with the production end of the show in my capacity as GE's Production Supervisor. For another important point, presenting the shows as I do as a host doesn't make me lose my identity as an actor because I appear seven times a year in starring roles. My sponsor has set up a schedule, too, so I can still make motion pictures. How many more advantages could an actor want?"

"I have done some of the shows in New York. In fact, when 'GE Theatre' started, the first four were done live back east. Now we're shooting here in Hollywood but will return to New York in the early spring of '55 to do more programs. In a way, I like working in New York and Hollywood, primarily because it helps the show in that we

The Serious Side of

LAUGHS are Joan Davis's business. They always have been. When the "Queen of Comedy" gets a chuckle from her audience that means a job well done and it means money in the bank.

Ever since the age of five, when she did her first pratfall, quite by accident at a benefit show in her home town of St. Paul, Minnesota, the world-famous comedienne has relied mainly on sight gags to evoke laughter.

During her twenty years of stardom, the motion picture, radio and TV comedienne has been asked to perform unusual and sometimes very dangerous things.

Pratfalls have always been the key to the type of slapstick humor for which Joan Davis is famous. Before doing a difficult stunt, the blonde-haired, green-eyed actress may be nervous, irritable and plenty scared. And after the stunt, she may be tired, or even hurt.

However, the before and after effects are not the funny part. It's the pratfall itself that makes the people laugh. And that's Joan's job.

Because of this very reason, the business-like Miss Davis doesn't like to give too much publicity to the dangers of her profession.

"After all," as she says herself, "if people read that kind of material, they wouldn't think the act itself

was very funny then. I would be destroying my own purpose."

Ever since its inception, three years ago, Joan's NBC-TV program, "I Married Joan," has been one of the top-rated, and yes, one of the funniest TV shows on the air. As with any enterprise, however, Joan and her co-workers have learned they must expand and develop if they wish to remain as top dog. Even the greatest of formats, trapped in a stereotyped rut, will eventually lose its appeal and its sponsor.

At the beginning, "I Married Joan" was essentially a situation comedy revolving about the comic anecdotes of Joan and her TV husband, Jim Backus.

Laughs the Hard Way

"We have learned, though," Joan explained during a TV-Radio Life interview at her comfortable three-room cottage at the General Service studios, "that the audience, particularly the children, still laugh the most at slapstick comedy. Sure, it would be much easier for me and everyone concerned, if I could stand in front of the camera, say a few funny lines, and then take my bow. But things don't work out like that. The audience won't stand for it."

"As a result, almost two out of four programs are now 'physical' shows. It is by our actions that we must make people laugh."

Because of this, Joan has had to

endure her share of bumps and bruises, splinters and splashes.

As just one example, there was a recent show featuring a chimpanzee. In the story, the chimp inherited a fortune. In order to protect the poor animal from unscrupulous fortune hunters, Joan and Jim took it into their custody until matters could be straightened out. The funny part of the story then revolved about having the chimp at Joan's house.

For hours, Joan rehearsed one scene where the chimp packed a toothbrush in a suitcase. Unfortunately, on one occasion, the chimp bit Joan and took a chunk out of her hand. It was painful and she had to have several tetanus shots. The injury also caused an extra day of shooting.

Joking about the incident afterwards, Joan, in her typical manner, explained, "I wouldn't go to work with the chimp again without a whip and chair."

The story, as seen by millions of TV viewers, was a riot. The whole story, however, wasn't nearly as funny. The same thing—sometimes to a less extent and sometimes much more serious—has happened hundreds of times in the long career of Josephine Madonna Davis, "The First Lady of Laughter."

There are other tricks to the laughing trade used by Joan Davis Pro-

ductions. (Joan is not only the star of her show, she also owns the package, hires the producer, director, writers, and technicians, handles the paper work, and is the boss and "headman" in every way.)

As most writers and actors know, scenes and sequences that sound funny when you first hear them, may not be so funny when you first see them. For this reason each "I Married Joan" show is originally made with three minutes of "extra" film.

"When a show comes out 'all funny,' it's an accident," she explained. "We find very often that a sequence is humorous only to a point. That's when we are able to cut and delete the extra three minutes."

Other Side

In her spare time (that's a good

joke!) she likes to fish and play golf. She is generally recognized as one of the finest fisherwomen in the world.

Her future plans call for a trip to Europe (both business and pleasure) and she also hopes to produce for TV her own package, "Joannie's Tea Shop." Joan would like her daughter Beverly, recently married, to star in this show.

Her favorite vacation spot is Honolulu. However, on her next vacation, Joan is not going to let anyone know where she's going.

"This past summer I spent almost every day on the phone talking business. The next time no one will know where I am, and no one will know me."

Unless Joan assumes a disguise, it'll be the neatest trick of her career.



The Inside Story of "The Telephone Hour"

For music lovers "The Telephone Hour" has long been a "must." Let's take a peek at what takes place behind the scenes of this program.

CARNEGIE HALL is, as most people know, no small-time nickle'odeon. The huge theatre devoted to the best in music is a mecca for those who want to hear the finest musical artists in the world. Now it is the place where NBC's "The Telephone Hour" originates. And each week finds the hall packed with eager audiences who are on hand to hear the world-famous artists who have made this radio show such a stand-out for fifteen years.

There's plenty of excitement on stage, but there's even more going on behind the scenes.

Wallace Magill, producer of "The Telephone Hour" and one of the most renowned musical authorities in New York, is a man with a very real sense of humor. He'd have to have one to deal with some of the problems he encounters with the artists who appear on his show.

Heifetz

"Jascha Heifetz is, of course, associated with many memorable moments—and also a harrowing one," Wallace said in New York. "It was during a broadcast. In the particular composition he was playing there was a pause for a long tutti passage from the orchestra. It was just when the passage had begun that Heifetz broke his E string. Immediately two fiddle players from the orchestra got up and gave Heifetz their violins. But Dave Frisini was the only one who had a Stradivarius, so Heifetz took his. Dave then took Jascha's fiddle, put a new string on it, and returned it to him after the number was over. Heifetz later confessed that it was the first time he hadn't put on a new string before a performance. Then he told us the full story. He was late getting to the rehearsal and was hurriedly driving to the studio. He had to make a fast stop, and his fiddle fell to the floor.

"There is another incident in which Heifetz took part. I was trying to get a novel approach to the program so I asked him to play an encore twice. He said he didn't want to do that so I suggested letting the orchestra play the encore the second time. Heifetz agreed—and one of the moments I'll never forget was seeing this great artist standing on stage while the orchestra played the number just for him."

In dealing with notables of the musical world there is bound to be some temperament—and Wallace

has had his hands full on more than one occasion.

Temperament

"I've always felt that an artist is temperamental because he's trying to cover up an inadequacy," Wallace said. "Or else he has no respect for the people with whom he works. We on 'The Telephone Hour' haven't the first problem because we don't use people who have no experience. And I also try to know enough about each artist to forestall any temperament for other reasons. When I engage a musician I either call him on the phone first or go to see him at his apartment or take him to lunch. It is at these meetings that I discuss the program I have planned for the artist. I usually make the musical selections myself. Most of the time this system works. Jose Iturbi, however, doesn't like to build programs until the last two weeks—and I've had some difficulty here.

"I have to know my artists well in order to deal with them. Because I try to understand them I haven't had many real crises. One artist did threaten to walk out on me before the broadcast. She was a pianist. I went to her apartment, she agreed to do the program I had arranged, but wanted one substitution made. The number she particularly wanted to do ran two and a half minutes more than the schedule would allow, so I rebuilt the first half of the program to get it in. We were on the air when she called me to the piano and said she had decided she wanted to do the program I had originally suggested instead. I told her I couldn't make a change then and asked her to go ahead with the schedule set up. She did but while Floyd Mack, our announcer, was announcing her encore she got up and walked off the stage. He quickly went into an ad lib to cover up. Believe me, there was some scurrying around then to take care of the extra time with which we were suddenly confronted.

"We have been faced, too, with last minute substitutions due to illness. Grace Moore was to appear with another artist, but after the rehearsal it was obvious the artist wasn't well enough to sing and I told him not to appear. I then went to Grace and asked her to carry the whole show. She went on without a rehearsal and was sensational.

"Then there have been the late arrivals of artists at broadcast times,

not a nerve-soothing thing. Bidu Savao couldn't get a cab and arrived five minutes before the broadcast began. Gladys Swarthout had the same trouble and came in a minute before show time.

Magill makes no secret of the fact that he'd like to see "The Telephone Hour" go on TV.

"I believe there must be a more honest approach to music on TV," Wallace remarked earnestly. "Most people in charge of TV programs don't know good music or how to present it. As a result, there is less good music on the air today than ever before. But have no fear—the public will soon demand it and then the shows will be done with honesty and integrity. We can wait until that time."

Magill then went on to praise announcers Floyd Mack and Tom Shirlev—and to pass a generous kudo to Donald Voorhees, who has been the conductor for years.

But it is to Wallace Magill that the major credit for this show's success must go. He is "The Telephone Hour."

"The Millionaire" could be a sleeper if future scripts can sustain the unusual gimmick. It will take careful handling and extremely good writing to make it land on top of the TV heap. These days a dramatic show has to be really a knockout to make any dent.

Don Fedderson has fooled people before. Maybe with his know-how he can deliver another punch. It's just

that with no set star to identify the dramatic parts of the show, such as he had with **Betty White** and **Liberace**, it will be an uphill climb.

One thing—this is not another situation comedy. That alone should make it worth your attention.

Oh, almost forgot the commercials. They were there all right. And they were greeted with loud laughter by the press audience in attendance. Odd too—they weren't supposed to be funny. J.H.

He's genial, mature, an easy conversationalist; really likes people, has nice teeth and an attractive smile; greenish-gray eyes

This lad should go far . . . as far as his dad has, and maybe even further, for as Jack himself points out, "By getting a break with my own radio show now, I'm fifteen years ahead of where Dad was when he started."

ASKED ABOUT HIS ADULT OUTLOOK ON LIFE and easy grace in conversation, Jack replied that being the oldest of the five Linkletter children (two years older than his sister Dawn), he has been singled out many times to accompany his father when the smaller children have been left at home. He has been to Hawaii twice, has toured Europe extensively, has visited in New York, Milwaukee, and other parts of the United States.

JACK IS SO INTENSELY INTERESTED IN PEOPLE that he has often stood at the corner of Hollywood and Vine for an hour at a time watching the pedestrians flocking past and studying their reactions and expressions. All of this backlog of human relations he has found invaluable when appearing with Art Linkletter as a guest on the CBS "Houseparty" or in conducting his own "Teen Club" on KNX radio Sunday afternoons. For this weekly session Jack has been on his own, with only occasional admonitions and now and then a compliment from his father and mother. Mother Lois is just as important as

Dad Art in giving opinions, because hers are those of the at-home listeners, while big Link's are those of the pro. "Be yourself, be easy, be natural," are pieces of advice which Jack Linkletter has gratefully accepted from his father.

JACK'S MAIN DIFFICULTY IS THAT HIS FATHER is his idol. He thinks him tops as an emcee, so would like to emulate him, but on the other hand, Jack wants to be himself and sound like **Jack Linkletter** . . . not Art. "This is pretty hard to do," observed the boy.

He hopes to be able to keep a finger in show business while eking out his higher education. Jack's an all-around lad; has been class president twice; has been elected to numerous honorary organizations; is an excellent swimmer and an eager football player.

Radio in Review

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

"Voice of Prophecy" Anniversary

(On January 29 the "Voice of Prophecy" celebrates its silver anniversary. A special anniversary program will be carried on Mutual-Don Lee and the ABC net-

How many words does a man speak in twenty-five years?

The average person would have a difficult time finding this out, but H. M. S. Richards, founder of the Seventh Day Adventist's "Voice of Prophecy" program, figures that in twenty five years of radio broadcasting he has spoken more than 30,000,000 words, or the equivalent of eight solid months of speaking twenty-four hours a day.

Pastor Richards went on the air in 1929 and has not missed a broadcast since. During his quarter century of continuous broadcasting, this pioneer of radio evangelism has used a stack of scripts forty-four feet high.

Richards will celebrate his silver anniversary on radio January 29, at a giant youth rally broadcast from the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. A special ceremony marking the anniversary will take place at that time.

Today, the "Voice of Prophecy" is heard on 800 radio stations throughout the world. The program is broadcast in seventeen major languages and can be heard by approximately seventy-five per cent of the world's

population, including Iron Curtain countries.

In addition to the broadcasting operations, Richards conducts the most extensive Bible correspondence school in existence, which is offered free to "Voice of Prophecy" listeners. In the past twelve years 161,960 students have been graduated from the North American Bible correspondence school alone. Courses are offered in sixty languages and dialects for all age groups and Braille for the blind. Latest course to be offered by the Bible correspondence school is an Introductory Bible Correspondence Course for Alcoholics.

To prepare his average sermon of 2,500 words, Richards reads the entire Bible through twice a year and the New Testament through each month. He has a private library of 5,000 volumes and averages reading almost a book a day on history, archaeology, religious and political thought, in addition to dozens of current periodicals. He also has written about twenty books and is author of one of the world's longest poems which now has 887 stanzas. He adds a new stan-

za each week and uses the stanza to close his broadcast. Title of the unfinished poem is "Have Faith In God," which Richards has had for more than a quarter of a century.

This week, "X" Label celebrates its first birthday with many new releases, especially in the long-play variety. A subsidiary of RCA-Victor, the label was inaugurated to introduce new talent to record fans and also to serve as an outlet for many fine jazz re-issues of yesterday from Victor's storehouse, and it is in this latter field that "X" has already established itself. In just one year's issuance, no less than twenty-eight of its projected program of one hundred long-play re-issues of jazz classics have appeared on the market. Known as "Vault Originals," they're invaluable to the new collector and "musts" for the experienced one who would safeguard his breakable platters.

Covering the jazz scene as they do, they represent the best works of names like blues and boogie pianist Jimmy Yancey, trumpeter Rex Stewart, Jimmie Lunceford, Ben Pollack's Orchestra that included Benny Goodman, Benny Moten's Kansas City jazz, and Eddie Condon's Hot Shots. You'll also find Johnny Dodds' Washboard Band, The Original Dixieland Jazz Band, Jelly-Roll Morton's Red Hot Peppers and the early jug bands. Fletcher Henderson and his Connie's Inn Orchestra, Wingy Manone, Mezz Mezzrow, Jean Goldkette, King Oliver, and early shouters of country and urban blues. Cab Calloway's first band, The Missourians, The Washboard Rhythm Kings, Earl Hines' piano solos, Sidney Bechet's New Orleans Feetwarmers, as well as Charlie Johnson's Paradise Orchestra. Trombonist Tommy Ladnier, the almost forgotten Teddy Hill band of the swing era, New Orleans Rhythm Kings, McKinney's Cotton Pickers, and many others. These are now available at either long-play speed and if you've an ounce of nostalgia left, get an earful of your favorite jazz great of yesterday from the original masters.

Next time you visit your record shop, stop and listen to some of these "X" Vault Originals. Reprocessed with high fidelity equipment, Bix's horn sounds more brilliant than when he sparked the Goldkette band, Lunceford's early discs do not seem dated, and teen-ager Goodman was blowing 'em with Pollack as good as he sounds today. Congratulations, "X," for a great series! . . . A.M.

Bill's Corner

This should be the year the Los Angeles Angels 'land' in first place . . . with John Hol-'land' as the new president, and Clarence Row-'land' now executive vice president of the parent Chicago Cubs.

As you view the games over KHJ-TV, when not at 'beautiful' Wrigley Field, I'm certain you'll find that the new boss is making every effort to fulfill his promise to Angel fans to field the best possible team. On my channel 9 show the day his appointment was announced. Holland said Los Angeles' fans deserved a pennant winner, and he would attempt to get any player that manager Bill Sweeney felt could help toward the championship.



Certainly Clarence Rowland knows what the Angels need in the way of talent . . . and he, too, has vowed the club will be vastly improved in 1955. In his new position, you might say Rowland is in the driver's seat, and can steer the Angels into the title.

John Holland, though new to Los Angeles, isn't a newcomer to California, having been president of the Visalia club from 1946 to '48. And, he's no novice in baseball. Some men are born with a silver spoon in their mouth, Holland was born with a bat in his. His father bought the St. Joseph, Missouri team shortly after John first saw the light of day in Wichita in 1910.

In 1918, the Hollands moved to Oklahoma City where they purchased that club. It was with this club that the new Angel president got his baseball start, as a player for 2 seasons . . . until it became completely evident he couldn't hit the curve ball. His father started him literally from the ground floor . . . to make sure his knowledge of the national pastime would be complete.

Holland put in a full day with the groundskeeper before the game and in the concession department during the game. From this he moved up slowly until he was his father's aide. John assumed the presidency of the Oklahoma City club when his father died in 1936, and retained that position until he sold his interests in 1942.

During his early baseball years . . . Holland traveled with the club, and became close to his predecessor, the late Don Stewart, who had a club in the same league. He credits Stewart with teaching him a lot about the game, and is fervent in his praise of the man who occupied the position he has taken over.

Although he didn't disclose names, Holland declared at his announcement luncheon that he felt Des Moines, his club until he moved up to Los Angeles, had four or five players who

might well fit into his plans for the Angels. Able to make his own deals, Holland, however, said he would not confine his trading activities to the Cubs' organization. And he has already started negotiations with several clubs for talent.

You'll like the new Angels boss, John Holland, more every time you meet him over channel 9, and you'll appreciate his efforts to give Los Angeles its finest team in years. The KHJ-TV telecasts this summer promise to be the best ever . . . as director Don Patton has already started planning for the 1955 campaign.

TV Reader's Digest

The diversified material packed between the covers of the "Reader's Digest" is being adapted to television in the new ABC-TV series. The opening stanza, "The Last of the Shooting Sheriffs," was based on an article which appeared in the magazine in July, 1950.

"Sheriffs" was the story of "Jim Roberts," a shooting sheriff of the old Western tradition who is brought out of retirement by the leading citizens of an Arizona town, in 1927, to prove that his courageous exploits were authentic. The townspeople eagerly awaited the arrival of their new sheriff, but were bitterly disappointed when the elderly man arrived astride a slow-moving donkey. Their alleged hero wasn't even wearing a holster. He carried his shooting irons, wrapped up in an old cloth bag.

Instead of boasting of his exploits, old "Jim Roberts" told of the necessity of maintaining order in the wild West and explained that he wasn't proud of the men he had to shoot. He further added to the disillusionment by admitting that his being fast-on-the-draw was highly overrated.

But "Jim Roberts" regains the respect and enthusiasm of the townspeople when he apprehends some bank robbers by being slow-but-sure-on-the-draw.

Veteran actor Russ Simpson was outstanding as "Jim Roberts." The supporting cast also did a commendable job. "TV Reader's Digest" has a limitless source of material and viewers have the right to expect unusual and different dramatizations in the new series. "The Last of the Shooting Sheriffs" offered an unexpected twist, and got the program off to a good start.

The only jarring note in the program was the over-long commercials, delivered in stylized tones by host Hugh Reilly. M.R.

confess that we haven't had too many embarrassing moments because we have a fine panel that displays very real intelligence and good taste at all times. We just see to it that embarrassing things don't happen. Often I've had the most difficult choice of cutting off a line of questioning that could be lots of fun but that is touchy. When such moments occur I either touch my ear, a signal that we're on dangerous ground or I say, 'We have only about a minute left.' On a few occasions I have risen from my chair and then the panel knows something is really getting hot.

"There have been those, too, who have said I give clues to the panel. I have no fundamental bias for the panelists and I don't give clues. I have long ago learned that it is impossible to please everyone because some people say I'm too rough on the panel and others say I'm too easy on them, so I just go along as best as I can. However, the panel knows the decisions I have to make about whether to give a 'Yes' or a 'No' answer to a question that has stumped both the contestant and the panel are final ones—and that they're stuck with whatever I say."

Rugged Schedule

Not many people know that "What's My Line?" was handed to John Daly as a result of his news show. Doing the program and his many radio shows does, of course, keep Mr. Daly quite busy.

"This is a typical day for me," John went on. "I catch the 8:18 or 9 a.m. (depending on how late I was up the night before). I arrive at my office around 9:10 or 9:45. At eleven I go to the news room and make up the first editorial dummy for the show that night. Then I come back to the office and 'administrat' the many details. Usually, at lunch I am called upon to make a speech for some poor, unhappy souls after which I check the film to be used for the essay part of the show. I go back down to the news room at 5:45 or six and stay until the show is done. Three nights a week, if I'm lucky, I catch the 7:45. Mrs. Daly meets me at the station, and we have dinner around 9:30.

"One week not long ago I went home for dinner on Monday. On

Secrets of "Line"

"Everyone wonders about the embarrassing moments on 'What's My Line?' While we've had a few squeaks here and there I have to

Tuesday I had to stay in New York for a business dinner, Wednesday I remained in the city, Thursday I was in Omaha for a speech, Friday Mrs. Daly came in and we went to a social affair. I'm usually home Saturday night but I have, on occasion, had to stay in for a speech. I don't know why so many want me to talk so much. On Sunday I usually stay home until it's time to leave for "What's My Line?"

"My wife, Kit, her real name is Margaret, has become quite accustomed to this rather hectic schedule of mine. In fact, she has no complaints at all because when we were first married sixteen years ago I seldom got home before midnight with the job I had then. Now, since I do get home at times for a 9:30 dinner she views the whole thing very generously.

Family Life

"Kit is a most wonderful and understanding wife. She has had no part of radio and the TV world. She has no professional touch at all. Con-

sequently, I hold her opinions of my work in high regard—and she offers some very candid ones. So do my children—John Neal, sixteen, John Charles, thirteen, and Helene Grant (whom we call Buncy), nine.

"The boys go to school at Andover but when they are home they are completely frank about my work. When I ask them, "How was the show?" they come up with things like "You weren't too bright in one place on "What's My Line?" tonight, or, if they're discussing the news show, they'll comment on such items as the film clips not being so good."

When John is home he's usually playing tennis with his close friend, Wes Gallagher of the AP. "Wes almost always beats the daylight out of me," John commented. The rest of his free hours are spent reading.

He has few hobbies—except for a basic interest in automobiles. He likes the big, powerful ones. He'd even like to do some racing but he has no time. He is extravagant about

one thing—linen shirts. He can't resist them.

He is definitely no fix-it.

"I blew myself to a set of the finest tools you ever saw," John laughed, "and they're in the prettiest box. I had it open once to see what was inside—period. I have little talent in the mechanical area which makes Kit very happy, because when she sees me trying to fix something she gets quite upset.

"Otherwise, I'm easy to get along with—I think. I like to feel I'm even-tempered. I have to be pushed very far before I get nasty. I once had a red-headed Irishman's temper but I've learned to control it. I'm not even inclined to be moody. Why, I haven't even been near a psychiatrist in my life."

John is naturally a favorite person with the panelists on "What's My Line?" and he has his own candid views of those with whom he works.

"Dorothy and Arlene are extremely capable," John said. "They're intelligent, nice people. Dorothy has more of a tendency to play for the achievement of the goal—guessing the person's occupation. She organizes her approach to that end. Arlene is apt to be less interested in identifying the job and more interested in the side play, in having fun. Bennett is like Dorothy in his approach while Robert Q. Lewis is like Arlene in that he relaxes and has fun."

If you were to ask the panelists what they think of John Daly, they'd probably say, "There's a great guy." That about sums up the way everyone feels about Mr. Daly.

On the following day back in Los Angeles (after doing her usual morning TV show at the KTTV studios) she rushed downtown to attend a luncheon, at which she was named "The Woman of the Year" by the Los Angeles Times.

Who said the life of a school-teacher is dull and monotonous?

Mothers' Clubs

Although Mrs. Hempel and her husband, who is also the vice-president of a real estate and insurance firm, have been kept busier with their TV and extra-curricular activities than they ever imagined, the thirty-three year old ex-model says, "I wouldn't trade the experience for anything."

In addition to her TV show and a periodic bulletin which she distributes, Mrs. Hempel devotes a great

deal of her time to various Mothers' Clubs which are located throughout the Los Angeles area. Approximately 1500 mothers are active members in these clubs.

Perhaps the best way we can explain how these Mothers' Clubs operate is to print an unsolicited letter which TV-RADIO LIFE received several months ago. It was from Ruth H. Portello of Canoga Park, and in part it read:

"... I'm glad to know that you plan another story about 'The Little Schoolhouse,' and I shall be watching for it.

"There is an unusual extension of this show, which I believe, has more than a little merit. That is the Mothers' Clubs, which convene solely for the purpose of discussing our common parental problems with an eye to uncovering sound, sensible solutions.

"Approximately every two months all mothers in a designated area are invited via 'The Little Schoolhouse' to meet and compare notes with Mrs. Hempel. There are no dues, no officers and no hoopla in connection with these meetings. Personally, I seldom get very interested in women's group activities, so I was somewhat surprised when I attended the San Fernando Valley meeting and came away with a feeling of time well spent.

"In a broad sense, it seems to me that 'The Little Schoolhouse' produc-

tion, without avowed intent and certainly without recourse to pedantry, is really doing something to promote mutual understanding and respect between teachers, parents and young children."

Mrs. Hempel receives no payment for these extra services. In fact, she loses money.

Active Not Passive

The whole idea for "Schoolhouse" really started four years ago when a friend of Eleanor's complained that her two-year old son had nothing to watch on television. An accredited elementary school teacher, Mrs. Hempel drew up some plans for a TV show. It took time, but her husband finally got the right people interested in the program.

In contrast to other children shows, the KTTV star believes that "the children should take an active part in the program, and not just a passive role."

Occasionally, this theory has some minor repercussions.

"I remember one time," Mrs. Hempel smiled, "when I was showing the children how to cut some make-believe grass with a pair of scissors.

"After the show one of the mothers called me. While watching the program, her son got ahold of some scissors and then started to look for some suitable grass. He couldn't find any, so he decided to cut the next best thing—his young sister's hair!"

What Do You Really Know About The Weather?

MARK TWAIN penned one of the lasting axioms of all time when he quipped that "Everybody talks about the weather, but no one does anything about it." But to me, it seems that he omitted one very important point: Though the weather has been a favorite topic of conversation since the days of the Egyptians, people really don't know very much about it.

Take the simple matter of all those who watch when I forecast the weather on Channel 2 five days a week. How many really know what the terms mean that we weathercasters must use to present the facts accurately? They may sound like simple, garden-variety type words and phrases, but they all have quite definitive meanings. If you learn to understand them, it may help you to enjoy keeping up on weather conditions as presented on television. Here are a few definitions that will be of help to you:

U. S. Weather Bureau—The federal

bureau made up of fourteen district weather offices around the country that issue state forecasts four times a day. These state forecasts are then relayed to 329 local weather stations where they are modified in light of up-to-the-minute local information.

Short Period Forecast—A forecast covering expected weather for the next forty-eight hours only.

Intermediate Range or Extended Forecast—The prediction of general weather expected during the next five days.

Long Range Forecast—Can deal only with expected weather trends for the coming month.

Colder — Maximum or minimum temperatures that will be at least five degrees less than they are at present.

Much Colder—temperatures that will be at least ten degrees less than the present temperature. Warmer and much warmer, of course, mean the reverse will be true.

No Change or Little Change—Means less than a five-degree change from present temperatures.

Cloudy—The sky will be more than seventy percent covered with clouds.

Partly cloudy—The sky is expected to be from thirty-seventy percent covered.

Fair—The term means that no more than thirty percent of the sky will be obscured by cloud formations. Clear, naturally, means cloud-free.

Likely and Likelihood—The terms are used to qualify predictions for conditions that are more than twenty-four hours in the offing. They mean that the probability of the prediction being true is high but not altogether certain.

Slight chance—Means that there are less than four chances in ten that the forecast will be correct. Even chance or just chance means that there are from four to six chances in ten that the prediction will become reality. A good chance is a sixty to eighty percent likelihood that the forecast will come about.

But of course, if you're at all in-

terested, you're bound to look heavenward on occasion to see what the countenance of old Mother Nature forbodes. Though the U.S. Weather Bureau information as supplied on television is far more reliable in the long run than your own guesses, still the guesses are fun and if you'll follow a few simple rules-of-thumb, you may be right as often as you're wrong. Here they are:

1. If a rising wind (and accompanying clouds) come from the South, rain may not be far away.

2. The earlier the fog turns off, the more likely the day will remain fair, at least in summer.

3. If it's raining and the wind shifts to the West, there's a good chance that things will clear up.

4. When the sun breaks through late in a cloudy day, it may turn cooler.

5. A ring around the moon may mean rain.

6. Sharp "horns" on the moon often precede windy weather.
