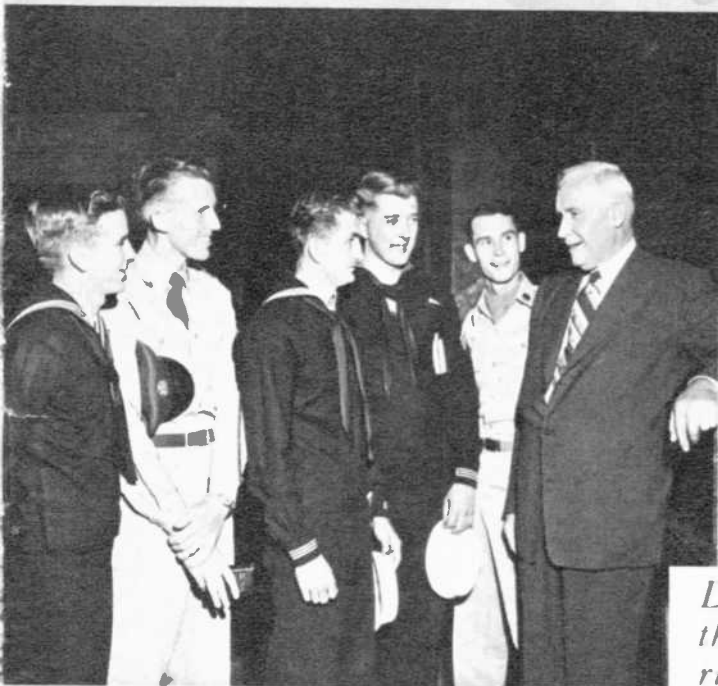

~~It's A Wonderful Life~~

Dr. Charles E. Fuller is the answer to all those who want sincerity instead of hypocrisy in religion. No wonder he is now celebrating his 30th year as a radio evangelist.

THIS MONTH Dr. Charles E. Fuller is celebrating his thirtieth year as an evangelist on radio. His "Old Fashioned Revival Hour" is something of a landmark now.

"It's a wonderful birthday," Dr. Fuller remarked with quiet sincerity. "And bringing the word of God to so many people over the ABC network has been a life so full, so rich, and so meaningful that I can only say I am humbly grateful for every moment of it.

"Many things have changed since I started my radio work. I can still recall my first broadcast over a Santa Ana station. It was a 100-watt affair. The technical equipment was a wire leading to the second floor with an extension going out the window and connecting with a bamboo pole outside.

"I later went to Long Beach and inaugurated 'The Pilgrim's Hour' and finally 'The Old Fashioned Revival Hour.'

"Actually, though, I began broadcasting when I had a church. I had graduated from Pomona College, where I humbly confess I was a star football player. I had never attended seminary because I wasn't thinking of going into the ministry. My first job, as a matter of fact, after graduation was as manager of one of the Sunkist packing houses.

"It was in 1917 that I went one Sunday to hear the evangelist, Paul Rader, speak. I went out of curiosity since I had felt that Sunday was a day to stay home, read the papers, and clean my car. But something happened to me when I heard Mr. Rader. I was almost immediately converted. I then went to Bible School

and finally got my own church. The broadcasting followed a little later."

It was here that Dr. Fuller was asked if a person could be a good Christian and not go to church. After all he had the stay-at-home idea for Sundays himself.

"It is possible but not probable to be a Christian and not go to church" he said. "You see, if you're a good Christian you want to go to church. The Bible, don't forget, advises everyone of the importance of assembling together for worship.

Converts

"I put on 'The Old Fashioned Revival Hour' in the afternoon which gives people time to go to the church of their choice. In no way do I want to interfere with the work of other ministers. That's why I won't even perform a marriage ceremony. My purpose in life is only to pour the word of God into places and to people who have no church of their own, who can't be reached in any other way. And I am glad to say that in the thirty years I have been preaching I have had thousands of converts—to all kinds of churches.

"In one week, for instance, nine young men came to me and said they had listened to 'The Old Fashioned Revival Hour' for a long time and had become so interested they had gone to Bible schools and had since opened their own little churches.

"Another time, in Texas, I was attending a big religious meeting of about 4000 ministers. One of the ministers said, 'Now is a good time to test the power of radio. How many of you ministers have had people converted to your church through Dr. Fuller's program?' I knew I was

on the spot here. What if no hands went up? You can imagine how pleased I was when so many hands went up. I later learned that 2500 ministers had raised their hands.

"I have the Fuller Theological Seminary now to train young people to carry on the work of God. We have fourteen professors at the school, and about 218 students, all of whom have to be graduates from accredited universities and who have high scholastic standings."

Dr. Fuller then had a few things to say about some evangelists who seek personal aggrandizement and who make a mockery of God's word.

Racketeers

"Most evangelists have no responsible group behind them," Dr. Fuller remarked. "Some years ago a group of Christian business men decided to make a corporation for me. And that's how the Gospel Broadcasting Association was born. All of our books are audited by a reputable CPA. And, if anything should happen to me, all the funds would be turned over to other organizations carrying on religious work.

"I cannot understand how anyone can get up on the radio and ask funds for a so-called religious group without first stating the organizational set-up. The public has a right to know just where their money is going and for whose profit. If an 'evangelist' has nothing to hide, why shouldn't he be open about the organization behind him? This is a situation I feel only the radio stations, who allow such people on the air, can correct. But it needs attention."

To which we say "Amen!"

The Intimate Side of Jack Webb

JACK IS NOT ONLY a modern jazz music enthusiast, but also has a hobby of collecting player piano rolls of another era.

WHEN I WAS recently invited to spend the afternoon on a "Dragnet" TV set and to wedge in some conversation with Jack Webb between "takes," I purposely avoided questions which appeared extremely personal. I knew that Jack figured his private life was private. I knew he'd tell me voluntarily what he wanted me to know. And I respected him for the dignity and restraint with which he had handled his personal matters.

When I told him how I felt, he replied that he felt he owed this to his ex-wife, Julie London, and to his two little girls. I also sensed that he owed it to Dorothy Towne, the girl he was planning to marry, and to Jack Webb himself.

This Jack Webb is quite a man. I first knew him in the old "Pat Novak" days and later when he came to Hollywood. He was struggling then, searching for a formula, working his inventive brain overtime to come up with an idea that would pay off.

Shortly after he married Julie London, I visited him in his small rented bungalow near City College. It was a tiny three-room affair, in keeping with Jack's modest earnings. Now his way of living may have changed commensurately with his success, but to me he is just the

same affable Jack he was before fame.

He hasn't changed toward people, but rather, people have toward him. Immediately a man is an outstanding success, he becomes the target of monetary demands, gossip, jealousy, even expose in confidential-type magazines. Naturally some inconvenience and invasion of privacy are to be expected but with a star nowadays, at least in the case of Jack Webb, the prying and interference can snow-ball into alarming proportions. "I've been torn seven ways this last year," Jack exclaimed. "It's a wonder this thing," jerking his thumb toward the "Dragnet" set. "gets on."

Despite everything, however, "Dragnet" has gotten on—on radio, TV, movie screen. And despite all his work and worry, Jack has found time for a private life and the quest of happiness with a slim attractive ex-model named Dorothy Towne.

Asked what his idea of a real glamour girl was, Jack told me "Dorothy Towne. I like the way she dresses . . . very plain, straight lines, neat. What do I see in her? Why am I attracted to her? I like her cleanliness . . . her fastidiousness . . . her great interest in everything around her. She's mighty interested. She's not an intellectual but she's extremely well-read. She has a good mind. Can she cook? Yes, she can.

She makes the best veal scallopini."

Something you'll never catch Mrs. Jack Webb in is slacks. "The man should wear the pants," Jack stated vehemently. "But toreador pants are okeh."

His Wardrobe

Jack himself dresses very modestly. He wears a \$40.00 watch, doesn't believe in expensive jewelry. "I had a more extensive wardrobe when I was an announcer in San Francisco," he confessed. Currently he has five suits, a tux, four sports coats; nine pairs of dark gray flannel slacks which he uses on "Dragnet," two dozen blue shirts which he wears on "Dragnet," six black knit ties, likewise, a dozen pair of gray socks. For his leisure hours he has eight or nine cashmere sweaters and six sports shirts. He does practically all his own shopping.

He still goes to bed between nine and ten at night except on Saturday night, when he stays up to hear some good jazz or have some quiet fun. He gets up every morning at seven, roused by an RCA radio clock. This will be news to Dick, but the program which awakens Jack is Dick Whittingill's. Jack has a TV set in his bedroom, equipped with remote control, and sometimes he watches television before falling asleep. "But I can't watch a movie," Jack confessed. "I get stuck with it

and have to see the end. Next day I suffer."

He doesn't take any setting-up exercises; doesn't take any exercise at all. "I do a lot of walking on stage." He has a \$100 bet with Writer Dick Breen that if the doctor were asked, he would say that walking is better exercise than swimming, but "He won't believe my doctor," said Jack.

His usual breakfast is one egg, bacon and toast. He used to eat a big breakfast but doesn't anymore. His favorite breakfast is hot cakes, eggs and bacon. He drinks one cup of coffee at breakfast and two on the stage . . . both of them before noon. Three cups a day are his limit. He says he can tell if he has had four . . . he can't go to sleep that night. He has a cup of tea at four o'clock . . . drinks lots of water. "eight glasses a day." He smokes two packages of cigarettes a day when he is working. When he is not working he smokes from three-quarters to one pack.

Health

Jack still goes to the doctor every six months for a checkup, but asked how often he goes to the dentist he said "That's where I'm lax." Asked if he went to the chiropodist or any other specialist he said "Nope." He doesn't take any vitamin pills . . . he's allergic to B1. He has excellent vision . . . can read a typewritten page nine feet away.

His favorite dish his mother fixes for him is French fried potatoes. He is worried about his weight, never weighed so much . . . 175 lbs.

He'll be thirty-five in April. From his business manager he gets an allowance of \$25 a week and he never carries more than \$30 or \$35 with him. He's healthy . . . in fact he considers his good health his greatest asset.

Next most important factor in helping him achieve his goals is his disregard of hard work. "I don't mind it," he claimed. "If you love what you're doing you'll do your best." On the other hand he feels that impatience is his greatest fault. He's trying very hard to quell this enemy.

Before Jack's first marriage broke up he had bought a house in Encino. After the divorce he bought another house out in Coldwater Canyon . . . "Because it had a projection room and I thought I could use this in the business." But now he has gotten rid of both. Of late he has been renting a small place in the Valley near the Disney studios. He plans to continue living near his work, even though married.

No doubt about it, Jack Webb, is predominately engulfed in his work . . . the hours he keeps, the food he eats, the amusements he enjoys, all merge with his career activities. Saturdays and Sundays are the only days he has any opportunity to get away from the studios. Often Sunday is devoted to taping his radio show. If he isn't working on the weekend he likes to stay home quietly or go to a football or baseball

game. He watches television between eighteen and twenty hours a week. Asked what his idea of real leisure was, Jack promptly replied, "Just sitting . . . anywhere!"

He has no interest in hunting or fishing. "I don't like to destroy life in any form . . . that's why I don't fish . . . that's why I don't hunt, but I don't frown on it in others."

Cautious

Jack is a careful driver . . . has never had an accident. He's been stopped by police four times and has gotten three tickets in his career . . . all of them preceding his advent on "Dragnet." Last year his name appeared in the papers as being a traffic "pinch." Jack said he was not driving the car, was just riding with someone else but because he was there the newspapers played it up and made it appear as though he was the driver. It made a better story. His pet peeve when he's driving is to have total strangers wave and call out to him in heavy traffic and expect him to neglect his driving to wave and talk back.

In most ways, Jack Webb's conduct and tastes are as simple now as they ever were. His greatest extravagance, if ever, will be nice paintings . . . possibly Rembrandts or others of the Dutch school.

Jack's acquisitive and brilliant mind admittedly falls short in only one important regard. He can't remember dates, places and times. A word of warning to the new Mrs. Webb . . . Jack says "I am the worst on anniversaries!"

SOME PEOPLE might accuse us of flag waving," said Bill Burrud, producer-creator of "Assignment America."

"But there's nothing wrong with our kind of flag waving," he continued, "it's mighty constructive and informative. The premise of "Assignment America," is simply that under our principles of government, our nation—past, present and future—will always be a land of opportunity.

"Assignment" is designed to portray the very heart of the American way of life. It delves into the human side of the American scene and brings forth dramatic stories of its people, places and things. Each assignment brings to life, by documentary film, some important facet of America, stories of new frontiers such as advancements in the field of aviation, uranium mining, rocket research and dozens of other new frontiers that are opening the way for future generations.

"In addition to new frontiers, 'Assignment America' also covers reports on everyday occupations like the telephone operator, newspaper reporter, teacher and the thousand and one jobs that are vital to America. No matter what the vocation. It has a place in the jigsaw pattern that

makes America what it is," Burrud explained.

Liberal Education

Bill and his production staff—Rick Spalla, Reed Bingham and Milas Hinchaw—are constantly probing and delving into research for an interesting feature. It's a liberal education for Bill, his staff and the viewers. Features on unusual occupations are by far the most interesting.

An occupation that reached its peak in '49, old-time gold prospecting, is being revived today. "Assignment America" sent a camera crew into the vastness of the Mojave Desert to bring back the exciting story of the new prospector, the uranium miner. The program documented an actual search for uranium from the primary aerial strike to the ultimate mining operations. It was a story of Geiger counters, separators, and ultra violet rays.

Another of the many high spots in "Assignment America" was the stanza devoted to supersonic speed. "Horizons Unlimited" was the story of four of the fastest pilots in the world and the planes they fly. Films of Jimmy Verdin's record breaking flight were shown. Verdin is holder of the F.A.I. 3 kilometer world's speed record.

KTTV, owned and operated by the Los Angeles Times, co-operates with "Assignment America," giving it carte blanche. When "Assignment" did a story on the newspaper reporter, it chose Tom Towers of the Los Angeles Examiner as the subject. Speaking of editorial freedom, you can hardly top that.

"Yes," Bill reiterated, "'Assignment America' is a flag waver. We wave the flag for the jet pilot, the uranium miner and the man with the common-place job because they are all part of America. And when it comes to selling America, we're drum beaters personified."

Lifelines

IT WAS "SURPRISE, SURPRISE!" last Friday for Minetta Ellen, radio's "Mother Barbour" who was celebrating her eightieth birthday anniversary Monday. At 11 a.m. the "One Man's Family" cast assembled in the American Room of the Derby to wish her many more anniversaries. She's been on the show for twenty-three years.

IT WAS LIKE A GATHERING OF THE CLAN to see some of the actors and actresses who've played roles over the years. Mary Lou Harrington, just a smidgen of a girl when she joined the cast as "Joan," told me she's being married in May. Marvin Miller, Vic Perrin, Barbara Fuller, and Virginia Gregg were among those congratulating "Mother Barbour."

WHEN I TOLD VIRGINIA WHAT A SUPERB job she did as the distraught, drunken widow of the movie, "Drag-net," she assured me she'd worn no make-up. "I managed to look that way by hard work," she laughed. "Dieted and lost five pounds in three days so I'd look emaciated. Then I wore new contact lenses for hours more than I should have to make my eyes red, got about four hours' sleep, barely ran the brush through my hair and that's how come Jack Webb took one look at me and decided I'd do just the way I was."

I AM AMAZED MORE READERS HAVEN'T complained about the delayed kinescope of "Masquerade Party," which is being shown here two weeks after the New York program. There is absolutely no excuse for making us put up with Christmas and New Year's remarks half a month after the holidays have come and gone. Let's have some action on this to reduce the lapse to at least one week!

INTERESTING LUNCHEON DATE RECENTLY was Ron Randell. Ron, born in Australia, was taking time off from film and TV duties in London to make his first visit to Hollywood in a year. (Before going to England, he lived here for nine years and did pictures for Columbia.)

RON IS ACTING AS HOST FOR THE British-filmed television series, "The Vise," shown in the United States over eighty-nine ABC-TV outlets. A James Mason type, Ron displayed the cordiality, wit and alertness which no doubt made him such a popular guest-moderator for the British version of "What's My Line?" He told me that this Goodson-Todman package for which BBC has the franchise is at the top of the heap among British tele-viewers. It follows the American format, even the regular moderator resembling John Daly. Ron, who had served as a panel member, was suddenly called in to act as moderator when the head man's wife became seriously ill. To sign off the show in a little different manner, the former Hollywood actor blew a kiss at the audience. This gesture was considered so unconventional it grabbed headlines in British newspapers, even crowding Churchill off the front page!

The young girls and London ladies were unanimously in favor of the osculatory compliment, but some viewers considered it vulgar and very, very distasteful!

RON SAID THERE ARE ABOUT 12,000,000 viewers now in the London area, but since BBC is as yet uncontested monarch of the field, television has much greater importance, relatively speaking, than it does in this country. Over there it is not a question of "Did you see Sullivan last night?" or "Did you see Comedy Hour?" but "Did you watch television?" The British are much more relaxed about their presentations. They have no commercials, as you know, and conform to no strict time schedules. As a result, if one program finishes, say five minutes before the half-hour, an announcer appears to inform lookers, "There will be a brief interlude," and then the screen goes blank. Ron thinks that when commercial television enters the field next Fall there will be closer adherence to the kind of pattern we all know in this country. Ron has been asked to moderate one of the first American shows on the new commercial television system. This will be the British adaptation of Garry Moore's "I Have a Secret."

In between times, Ron has completed twenty-six "The Vise" telefilms with another thirteen scheduled to go. He enjoys his telefilming in London. The company producing these films specifically for consumption in the United States has use of all of London MGM sets and properties, which gives the film tremendous resources.

QUICK BOUQUET TO "LUX RADIO THEATRE'S" presentation of "Island in the Sky." I think Dick Powell and crew were more effective on radio than they could have been on TV because imagination of the listener had free rein.

PUT BITE ON ROONEY TO THE TUNE OF \$10,000! That's what Peggy, the chimpanzee, is reported to have set back production on Mickey's "Hey Mulligan" NBC comedy. The chimp lost her temper when they tried to put shoes on her tootsies and showed her feelings by biting The Mick's hand. He had to get tetanus shots and hold up the film. No more monkey business, Mickey states.

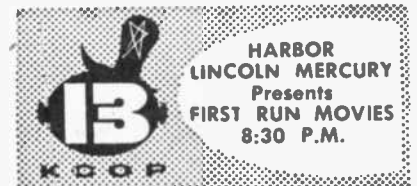

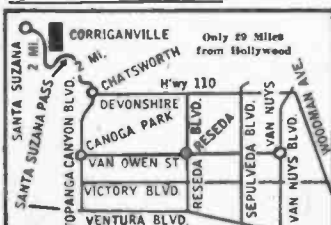

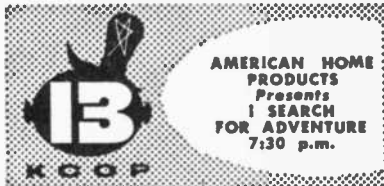

Pick of the Pix

I don't want the following laudatory reviews of TV first runs to give anyone the wrong idea . . . I still dislike nearly everything.

"Passport to Heaven." (13) Jan. 25, 8:30. This is an American made version of the German classic, "The Captain From Woepenick," and while not as effective as the original, it is certainly worth seeing. Laid in the Germany of 1906 (I think this modern version puts it in the Germany of the thirties), the picture tells the true story of an elderly ex-convict who has spent the majority of his life behind bars, and his efforts to obtain a passport, without which he cannot get work, and which he cannot obtain unless he has work, a contradiction which soon has him completely bogged down in a maze of officialdom and red tape. Finally, in desperation, he purchases an army captain's uniform, commands a squad of soldiers and takes over the small town of Koepenick, government officials, treasury and all. It is only after he discovers that there is no passport office in Koepenick that he abandons his masquerade and becomes the object of a nation wide search. The film is savagely hilarious in its parody of bureaucracy and the Prussian system, a satire that is all the sharper because of the picture's compassion for the poignant little man at the mercy of the rubber stamp. Albert Basserman is superb as the captain, and Eric Blore, as the mayor, is excellent.

Don't miss this one either, however, because it is a mighty good little comedy. Dana Andrews is a psychiatrist, Lilli Palmer is his wife and receptionist and Louis Jourdan is an artist who disrupts both their lives.

He is a light hearted meddler who manages to convince Miss Palmer that she thinks of her husband only as a provider and father, and Mr. Andrews that he thinks of his wife as a drudge. This conflict threatens to destroy the marriage, which seems to be Mr. Jourdan's intention, inasmuch as he has more than a passing interest in Miss Palmer (it doesn't go beyond passes, however, and alas) but things are set right before there is any permanent damage. The picture was first released in 1947, when I saw it, and I remember it for several comedy sequences and some bright dialogue. I hope my memory is not playing me false, as it did with "The Senator Was Indiscreet." The three principals do a neat job, I might add.

"Panic." (13) Jan. 27, 11:00. Here is one of the better postwar French pictures, and I trust that Channel 13 will not emasculate it in the editing as it did "Children of Paradise" a few weeks ago. A woman is murdered and the murderer plants her purse in the apartment of Michel Simon, a quiet, reserved man who is feared and disliked by the townspeople. He is immediately suspected of the murder and nearly becomes the victim of a lynch mob before he manages to clear himself. The picture is most effective when it is examining the central character and his reasons for setting himself apart from his fellow citizens. His love affair with Vivian Romance, the sweetheart of the real murderer, is strange, indeed, in its frustration and hopelessness, and I think the scenes between them, together with those of the townspeople in a lynch panic, are examples of director Julien Duvivier's best work. Michel Simon, whose talent has in the past eluded me, gives his most memorable performance, and the luscious Miss Romance is as luscious as ever. I only hope the subtitles will be visible.

"Syncopation." (5) Jan. 23, 7:30. Jackie Cooper is a musician and Bonita Granville his girl in this further version of the birth and growth of jazz. Miss Granville is born down south where she first hears "trouble music," the American Negro's only method of complaint fifty years ago (while I am happy that jazz was born, I am happier that its creator now has access to more formal and conventional processes of justice). She brings the feeling and memory of this music to the north, where she and Jackie Cooper help to make it accepted by just about everyone. The thin story line is incapable of carrying the picture through its time span from 1908 to the present (the picture was made in 1942), but there are some jazz greats in the film, as well as Adolphe Menjou, Tod Duncan and Robert Benchley and maybe that'll make it worth your while.

Next week I hope to have some turkeys to write about . . . it's much easier.

A couple of really excellent character actresses have been kept very, very busy of late. Elizabeth Patterson and Mary Field have been many years in this acting business and can outperform nine out of ten actresses seen regularly in movies and on TV. Recently, producers have "discovered" their talent and they've been jumping. Miss Patterson just did "Willy," "Superman," "Studio Seven," a show with Charles Coburn, and many others. Mary Field has gone from one TV program to another, with continued appearances at Revue Productions her main stints. Seems that Revue considers Mary the girl with a hundred faces. She can fit into almost any kind of part and always does a bang-up job. When she was called to Revue again recently, she asked which face she was supposed to be this time. It's good to see these two working so much because TV can use good performers. Hope Emerson is another who is going to be seen more on television. She just finished two for Danny Thomas' "Make Room for Daddy." Here is another actress who doesn't know how to give a bad performance.

"Yellow Jack," seen recently on "Producer's Showcase," was a stirring effort from start to finish. Jackie Cooper was a real surprise as "O'Hara," and Dane Clark finally got a part he could do something with. This production proves that there's nothing wrong with TV drama that a good script, good acting, and good directing can't cure.

Treasure Island Productions, with Joe Kaufman in a top spot, has been working on a TV series starring Robert Newton called "Long John Silver." When Disneyland played "Treasure Island" recently in two parts there

were some hard feelings. Can't understand why anyone should object to Disney's showing "Treasure Island" before "Long John Silver" got out. What an advance build-up Disney's production can be for this new series. Incidentally, hear that Robert Newton has been giving the company a good deal of trouble with temperament and what-not. Too bad if this report is true because Newton is really a fine actor—when he wants to be.

Still more fireworks about subscription TV. Six organized groups of movie theatre owners filed an opposition with the FCC opposing Zenith's request for immediate authorization of subscription TV. Commander E. F. McDonald, Jr., president of Zenith and the man behind Phonevision, wasted no time in answering the charge. He pointed out that a number of motion picture theatre owners have already applied to Zenith for franchise to operate Phonevision in their localities, when and if it is approved by the FCC. McDonald then went on to say, "To a large extent, subscription television will be making new customers for entertainment which will not only be a bonanza for producers and performers but will also make new customers for theatres. Consider the spectacular success of Liberace as a theatrical drawing card after he was made famous by television." He also made another important point: "It (subscription TV) will hurt some small theatres, just as every new business development hurts somebody, but that is all. No amount of home entertainment will satisfy the urge to get outside the home for an occasional fling. There will always be people who prefer seeing good movies and grand opera in the theatre."

The Statler is bringing in George Gobel for three weeks this month—and the hotel will probably have to add on a few dozen rooms to hold those who will pack the Terrace Room to hear the comedy sensation of TV. This is quite an occasion for George because it was at the Statler that an NBC executive first saw him and signed him to a contract. Little did that exec or Gobel dream how much that contract would mean. No wonder George is happy to return to the Statler.

Looks like TV audiences are growing up. A couple of weeks ago "I Search For Adventure," the program which won one of TV-Radio Life's Distinguished Achievement Awards, did an African show. The women in it were, in accordance with their custom, unadorned from the waist up. Producer Jack Douglas didn't know how audiences would react to this, so he was especially gratified that the station only had three calls in protest. When a documentary show like this can honestly present its subject, regardless of any controversial features, and get audience acceptance things really are looking ahead. Congratulations to Douglas.

Radio On Guard

(TV-Radio Life brings you an exclusive story on "Sigalert," the new device developed to alert the public in the event of a disaster. "Sigalert"

will be officially introduced to the public when the Southern California Broadcasters Association convenes on January 20.)

Just as Radio has been the foremost means of communication in normal times so is it preparing to be the nation's first line of defense in time of emergency. And leading the nation in establishing an entirely new concept in guarding the public against impending disaster or guiding the public after disaster has struck are the radio stations banded together in the Southern California Broadcasters Association. This new concept is known as "The Sigalert" and it already has been critically tested and adopted by several Los Angeles stations.

In simplified terms, "Sigalert" permits the instantaneous use of the carrier waves of Radio stations to light warning lights, sound sirens, activate special receivers that will voice instructions to police, fire departments and civil defense workers, alert industry and shipping and finally over their regular receivers and on the very programs to which they are listening instruct the general public, including motorists, what to do to protect themselves. This entire operation is made

possible simply by pressing buttons at civil defense centers.

About a year ago, Colonel Richard Lynch, civil defense director for the city, approached the SCBA requesting some plan by which radio might be used to alert the public in time of emergency. The problem was turned over to Loyd Sigmon, vice president and assistant general manager of KMPC, and chairman of the SCBA engineering committee.

Sigmon went to work on the drawing board and in the engineering laboratory and nine months later brought forth an entirely new concept and mechanism in communications which he labelled "Sigalert."

The important feature of "Sigalert," apart from the fact that it offers instantaneous control of warning apparatus and immediate contact with radio audiences, is that it can operate wholly independently of commercial power and telephone lines all of which might be destroyed either in a bomb attack or other catastrophe.

In one "Sigalert" test, warning apparatus located in Bakersfield, 125 miles distant was activated over the KMPC carrier wave simply by pressing a button in Civil Defense headquarters in City Hall, Los Angeles.

Five Los Angeles stations—KFI, KNX, KFWB, KFAC and KMPC—have volunteered to become a part of the "Sigalert" system and are receiving permission from the FCC to install and operate the necessary equipment.

It is anticipated that eventually the entire nation will be tied together via radio with the "Sigalert" system. Thus radio designed for your pleasure is dedicating itself to your protection. That is why the Southern California Broadcasters Association advises: "When the sirens blow, turn on your radio."

Pat is also the young lady who stuck by the Finn twins all during their "hunger strike." Sure, she collected the laurels and applause—after the courts ruled that the Finn twins had to be compensated by the Government for confiscating their p'ane. But for many months, Pat fought alone for the men and the ideals which she believed in. That's the time when courage and loyalty is really tested—when you stand alone.

Two fine, young men—Lauro Salas and Don Jordan—also stood alone on Thursday night: in the ring of the "new" Olympic Auditorium. The fight itself was a thriller. I think Don Jordan (Roger Leighton, my good friend and Lauro's manager, please forgive me) deserved to retain his State Lightweight title. The margin of victory was a seventh round knockdown (as I saw it) from a powerful right cross of Jordan's.

However, Lauro, the former Lightweight Champion (of Mexico) and "the whole world," not only put up a smart and courageous battle, but he proved to all concerned that he has

definitely "come back." I don't think a re-match with Jordan would be wise now, but Lauro is ready for any man (except Carter the Champ) in his division. Those boys who were taking Jordan at 3 to 1 must have had a few anxious moments Thursday night.

There are also some interesting TV angles behind the Salas-Jordan fight, which was not seen by home viewers. It was the first fight under a new Olympic-Channel 13 policy: to televise the preliminaries and a "first main event"—and then to "black out" the "second main event."

There are two opposite schools of thought on this new approach. (1) TV fans are being cheated and (2) TV has "spoiled" boxing and this idea of only showing part of the program will draw more cash customers. The proof: 6500 people attended the Jordan-Salas match—which is the largest "TV crowd" the Olympic has had in a long time.

Of course, one of the major factors behind the good attendance was the fine promotional job of Jackson Wheeler and George Putnam of KTTV. Wheeler is now officially co-manager of Jordan and Putnam has "adopted" Salas. The whole story of why Wheeler bought 50 per cent of "The Champ's" contract is one that I will go into at another time. Putnam also pulled a "first" on this 11 o'clock news show on the night of the fight when he showed films taken at the Olympic less than an hour before air time.

Wheeler, Putnam and Hank Weaver of Channel 7 ko'd another ancient TV custom: they "cross-plugged" the fight and each other on Channel 7 and 11, and the Olympic Card was actually seen on Channel 13. The KTTV men appeared on Hank's Saturday night show from the Hollywood Legion, and Putnam and Wheeler, in turn, praised Weaver on their shows for his co-operation. It's good business to know your competitor, but it's silly and stupid to ignore him.

His Secrets Leak Out

(Part 2)

Ralph Edwards tries to keep his guest stars hush-hush, but it's not as simple as some believe

YES, THERE have been leaks of the top secret—leaks so damaging that the Edwards' staff has had to rustle around at the eleventh hour to line up a substitute. During approximately 100 telecasts beamed over the past three years there have been three instances in which the cat was let completely out of the bag.

It was a little over a year ago when Ralph Edwards and his staff went to New York to do some color telecast experimentation. Tallulah Bankhead had been chosen as subject of the first "This Is Your Life" program to emanate from New York. During the course of preparations, she overheard her secretary talking frequently with one of the show planners and guessed the secret. Subject Martha Raye, whose "life" was in the preparatory stages, was rushed to quick completion to fill the gap.

The first big leak on the Ralph Edwards' program was Ann Sheridan. She discovered she was to be a "This Is Your Life" guest by seeing an exposed note on the desk of Ross Hunter, producer of her then-current motion picture. It was a communication about show details addressed to the late Al Paschall, producer of "This Is Your Life." Miss Sheridan immediately called her publicity office and told them that she was aware of the plan. This disclosure happened within practically hours of Miss Sheridan's scheduled appearance. The Lillian Roth film (first re-run) was rapidly slotted into the void.

The third leak was on the projected Joe Louis program. It happened when a New York columnist, who at that time wasn't familiar with the show's format, thought in all sincerity he was plugging the program and Joe Louis when he announced that Louis' life was to be done the following Wednesday on TV. A friend of Joe, who had been aware of the upcoming appearance said to himself, "It's bad, the news is out, it's too late now to do any-

thing about it," so he promptly called Joe and post-mortemed with him. It was only then that Joe, who hadn't seen the item, learned what had been scheduled for him.

Other Brushes

The Ralph Edwards' office also has a sneaking hunch that recent preliminary preparations to research Joan Crawford's life were discovered by the actress, who is said to have seen an exposed note from her maid to her secretary, stating that Al Paschall had telephoned. That was all Miss Crawford needed to convince her that she was in the running for the big surprise.

When shows fall out with a terrible crash, the "This Is Your Life" staff endeavors to make quick substitutes in the same category as that of the discovered guest star. In other words, a show business figure is rushed in to take the place of a star . . . a schoolteacher for a schoolteacher, etc. When Joe Louis' projected appearance was spoiled, Eddie LeBaron, owner of the Washington Red Sox, was substituted. At any given time there are enough personalities being researched and under preparation in the Edwards' office to adapt hurriedly for the next program.

With all those who think they know who the guest is going to be, and are right, and all those who think they know, and are wrong, notwithstanding, each Wednesday night Ralph Edwards manages to emerge with a real heart-warmer of a show.

This will probably be news to the eminent emcee himself, but he has one small admirer who watches the show hopefully each Wednesday night. He's five-year-old Robert Chadwick, son of the aforementioned Jim Chadwick and the program's publicity agent, Mrs. Chadwick (Sue Clark). As soon as the program goes off the screen, Master Robert never fails to comment dejectedly, "You know that Ralph Edwards . . . he never does my life and never any of my friends!"

It isn't easy to be Mrs. George Montgomery, "Missy's" and Jody's mother and a glamour star of TV, but Dinah has the answer to

"Really, George built the house in Palm Springs because he felt TV was a very tense medium and that I needed to get away from

it. Let's face it," Dinah said levelly. "George and I can't go to many parties and work the next day. I try to talk over the noise of the conversation and over the orchestra. I breathe in all that cigar smoke and then I'm hoarse the next day."

It's a quaint Hollywood custom that any Hollywood entertainer who shows up at a party as a guest is invariably expected to perform. Dinah usually comes through with six or eight numbers, which really puts a crimp in her warbling for the following day's TV activities.

"TV has put a whole new light on this party business," Dinah emphasized. "There is lots of rehearsal three hours of it Monday three hours on Wednesday, and on Tuesday and Thursday, the show days, from ten to four-thirty. I tape my radio show on Wednesday."

Exercise and very little party-going are two of Dinah's precepts. Add early bedtime, usually 10:30 p.m., and eight full hours' sleep. Dinah has a silent switch on her TV set so that George, who often retires

somewhat earlier, is not disturbed with her television viewing.

Meals

Good simple food is another "must" at the Montgomery menage, and a still more important requisite is that the family be together both at breakfast and dinner time. "We eat a big breakfast," Dinah explained, "juice, eggs and bacon. I eat a steak or hamburger for lunch. With all that rehearsal, a little mixed green salad couldn't do the trick. For dinner we always have a roast or other meat, plenty of green vegetables and fruit desserts, except for George, who can take anything, even thick chocolate pies. When Missy gets home from school, instead of the usual cookies, I always have hot soup ready for her."

Even eight-months-old Jody, the Montgomery's adopted son, sits in on the eight o'clock breakfast. "He gurgles, spits and coos while he watches us from his highchair," Dinah said. Nobody at the Montgomery house worries particularly about dieting. George is too active with

his acting and furniture-making career, and Dinah has had to diet only once in her life . . . after Missy's birth. She's now five feet five inches, weighs 128 pounds and has a twenty-three and one-half-inch waist. "Not bad?" she asked.

Dinah has help; two secretaries, personal maid, cook, and a nurse for Missy and Jody.

Just as meticulously as Dinah regulates her physical well-being, she tries to control her emotional and mental states. "I refuse to be worried about little things," she announced. "Little things used to nag," she confessed. "Of course everybody has his ups and downs. I try to keep my disposition on as even a keel as possible. George has his moods but he always has a wonderful sense of humor, and Ticker (Ticker Freeman, Dinah's accompanist) is just great. He never worries."

No Problem

If anyone has any doubts about whether Dinah would choose her career or her family life, should any conflict arise, he might as well know that Dinah's career would go down the drain like jello with hot water on it. "I don't want this show business to affect Jody or Missy," Dinah said earnestly. "I must never be too busy for my husband and children. That's why TV's so great. You can stay put. As soon as I get off the air I come home. I'm here when George gets home. We make dinner a real occasion. I think dinner must be fun. We always discuss what Daddy and Mommy and Missy did during the day.

"I've never had to make an important decision between my career and my family. So far the only time the question arose was when Missy was sick and I was supposed to go on a junket. I did give up the trip. Of course I'm the kind that believes the show doesn't have to go on. Neither do I think that I should let the show be a bore, nor should it get me up . . . that is, high-hat."

Dinah thinks George is "a very sweet fella." Dinah seldom blows her top. When she gets piqued about anything she's more liable to sulk. Asked whether George or she make the first reconciliation advances after a spat Dinah said, "he makes it very easy on me." Referring to the maxim that a married person should never go to sleep without making up after a tiff, Dinah said, "Our little differences never last until time to go to sleep."

Spiritual Welfare

Spiritually, Dinah makes every day a series of small prayers of thankfulness and supplication. As yet she and George have not affiliated with any one church. She, of course, is Jewish, and George comes from a combination Catholic and Lutheran family. Dinah feels a certain reluctance about worshipping in public, perhaps understandably so, because fans could conceivably intrude on her devotions, but she is also well aware that Missy's spiritual growth requires the same attention as the other facets of her life. Lately Melissa has been asking her mother and father about going to Sunday school. George and Dinah are giving the question serious thought.

By the time this is in print the Montgomerys will have moved into their new Beverly Hills home which George himself designed and for which his furniture factory has turned out all the handsome cabinet work. Dinah and George, Missy and Jody will be enjoying the sprawling modern dwelling which skirts a gracefully shaped swimming pool. Missy knows how to swim, but Dinah intends to put a fence around the pool. Those who have seen the flowing clean lines of the Montgomerys' new home and have become acquainted with the equally practical yet beautiful outlook of the household's mistress feel that the charm of each will be reflected in the other.

(EDITOR'S NOTE) "Johnny Carson's Coffee Break," seen on KNXT on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 8:55-9:00 A.M., has been called by many "the biggest little show on television." Certainly it is one of the most whimsical, the most delightful portions of early-morning television fare to be found anywhere on the dial, but as delightful and as well-accepted as the program is with viewers, it has created problems for its star Johnny Carson. When quizzed on this subject, Carson sat down at a typewriter and provided his answer in the form of a mythical conversation between Carson, the psychiatrist, psychoanalyzing Carson, the patient, about the problems of conducting...

THE SCENE: THE OFFICE OF DR. ERIC VON CARSON, PSYCHIATRIST... PH.D.; LL.D.; LSMFT... THE DOCTOR IS TALKING WITH A PATIENT... IN ONE CORNER OF THE OFFICE SPREAD ON THE FLOOR ARE 15 OR 20 COPIES OF TV-RADIO LIFE MAGAZINE. (THE DOCTOR CAN'T AFFORD A COUCH). IN THE INTERVIEW, "DR." WILL DENOTE DOCTOR AND "P" WILL DENOTE PATIENT.

DR: Your name, please.

P: Johnny Carson.

DR: What is your occupation?

P: I'm in (HESITANTLY) television.

DR: You mean you're on television.

P: In... on... What difference! I have a problem, doctor.

DR: Good... lie down, please.

P: No thanks. I've read all the issues.

DR: Oh, all right. What is your problem?

P: I seem to have a closed-in feel-

ing... You see, I have a morning TV show on KNXT... exactly five minutes long... It's called "Carson's Coffee Break"... on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 8:55 and...

DR: No commercials please. What is the nature of this program?

P: It's what's left of Omnibus after taxes. After I do the commercial I have only three minutes left.

DR: What can you do in three minutes?

P: That's the problem, doctor. I'm getting a feeling of insecurity... KNXT tells me the fan mail is getting so enthusiastic, the sponsor may want to go to six minutes next year. WHAT WOULD I DO WITH ALL THAT TIME????

DR: There, there, Mr. Carson. I'm going to give you the word-association test... I'll mention any word and you say the first thing that comes to your mind. Now: Mother.

P: Marilyn Monroe.

DR: Chair...

P: Marilyn Monroe...

DR: Apple...

P: Marilyn Monroe...

DR: Kiss...

P: Me...

DR: Hmm. Mr. Carson (PAUSE) perhaps we should try some questions about your personal life. Are you married?

P: Marilyn Monroe...

DR: Now cut that out!... Are you happily married?

P: Yes, doctor.

DR: Was there anything unusual about how you met your wife?

P: Yes. We were introduced.

DR: Any children?

P: Yes... 3 boys. Kit, Ricky, and Cory.

DR: Do you feel that you are a good father?

P: None of the children has been in reform school.

DR: What do you like to do for relaxation?

P: Sleep.

DR: Do you consider yourself attractive to the opposite sex?

P: I don't exactly stop traffic, but I've been told I have nice teeth.

DR: Do you consider yourself a well dressed man?

P: I have the only pair of seer-sucker spats in town.

DR: Mr. Carson... I'm going to give you an injection of a drug, sometimes referred to as truth serum... (THE DOCTOR GIVES THE DRUG). You will fall asleep and then I'll put some more questions to you... (PATIENT FALLS ASLEEP).

DR: And now, Mr. Carson... I want you to think carefully... take your time in answering. I assure you that your answer will be held in the strictest confidence. What great happening do you feel has caused you this feeling of insecurity that grips you. Tell me... what is it that upsets you...

P: (FUZZILY)... Rheingold is here!



Comedian Peter Donald panel-emcee of ABC-TV's "Masquerade Party" was dead serious when he explained why:

It's Funnier NOT To Be Funny!

VERSATILE Peter Donald of "Masquerade Party" was one of the first TV masters of ceremonies. He started in 1938, when TV was still in its infancy.

PETER DONALD was perfectly sober when he said it.

The emcee of ABC-TV's "Masquerade Party" was nursing his first drink in Bob Olin's comfortable cocktail lounge located on Sixty-first street in uptown Manhattan.

He repeated his statement to the TV-Radio Life reporter:

"That's right. You heard me correctly. As the panel-emcee of 'Masquerade Party' it's much better for me when I'm *not* too funny."

Offhand, this seemed like a pretty silly statement. After all, the thirty-seven year old star of Broadway, radio, and television has always been regarded as one of the top comedians and impersonators in the business.

Before his present assignment on "Masquerade," he was probably best known from coast-to-coast as the multi-voiced story teller on the radio show, "Can You Top This?" which just finished a spectacular fourteen-year run. He made even a dud sound delightful.

Basically, he performs the same function on the ABC-TV show. As the middleman between the masked mystery and the puzzled panel, the British-born redhead has to keep the show alive, moving, and entertaining. It would seem to be a perfect spot for Peter to display his comical talent. Why then does he purposely restrain himself?

"It's really very simple when you analyze it," Peter continued. "The funnier other people are, the better it is for me. I don't want to tell too many jokes, or hog the spotlight, be-

cause then I would get in the way of the show. My job is to make the whole program, and everyone on it entertaining."

The former "Ajax Cassidy" on the Fred Allen Show had several other interesting comments to make:

"Do you know who the real star of 'Masquerade Party' is? It's the make-up man. 'Masquerade' is one panel show in which the physical action is very important. And certainly the masks and costumes which the guests wear—and, incidentally, they spend hours, sometimes even days perfecting them—are very vital to the show's popularity. For one half-hour program as much as \$500 to \$1500 is spent just for make-up."

Except for some general staff meetings, there are no rehearsals. And the "mystery guest," who makes a brief appearance on the preceding

week, is strictly "top secret" stuff.

"I remember the time we had a pink horse on the show. It was a fantastic costume. I said the pink horse would return next week.

"All during the next week, wherever I went, people hounded me with the question: 'Who is the pink horse?'

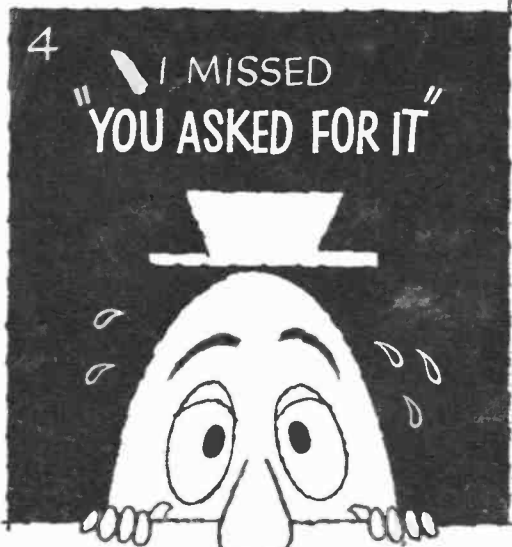
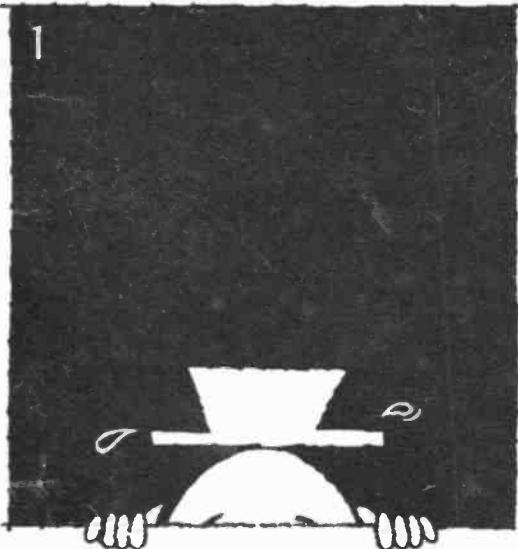
