IN THE OLD DAYS of radio a show called "Take It Or Leave It" offered winning contestants sixty-four dollars. It was the big hit of the day. Well, it's less than peanuts compared to the new giant quiz show now airing called "The \$64,000 Question."

In a phone interview to New York with quizmaster Hal March, TV-Radio Life got some lowdown on this new program that is fast becoming the talk of the country. The idea naturally came about as a result of the old radio show but it was Louis Cowan who put together this neat, green-backed package.

To an extent, it's a surprise to see Hal March, emceeing this whopperoo. Prior to his advent on the show he was known primarily as an astute comic, having been seen with Imogene Coca and with Tom D'Andrea in the soldier skits. He was, consequently, more than a little amazed to find himself being considered for the emcee spot.

"I didn't even try for the job," Hal said in New York. "There were about 350 people up for the show, including movie and TV stars. It was Walter Craig, advertising executive, who thought of me. He had seen me do some shows about ten years ago and apparently liked what I had done, for he called me in for an interview as to my availability. I told him I didn't get the pitch—that I hadn't done anything like this, but I wound up getting the job. And between you and me, I'm glad I did. This is the most exciting, dramatic, suspenseful thing I've ever done. This is real drama.

"Like the time we had this policeman on the air whose hobby was

Shakespeare. I'll never forget the night he got his earnings up to \$16,000 by answering the question correctly. I was rooting for him—so was everyone in the country. I was as nervous as he was.

"Anything can happen on this show—and probably will. I hope no one has a heart attack or faints on the program, but I may wind up collapsing myself from the sheer suspense.

High Cost

"Some people have asked me how any company can afford such a program. As I understand it, Revlon, who sponsors the show, has set aside about a million dollars a year to give away. If you think they're throwing money away for no reason, the day after the first show was done every department store in New York was sold out of Revlon products. 'The \$64,000 Question' has already drawn such attention that it can become the highest rated program on TV before long. Everybody will be watching it."

You might think that with such a hunk of money being given away the questions asked the contestants would be fantastically tough. This is not actually the case.

"The questions are legitimate—not ridiculously tough," Hal commented. "Of course, they get tougher as the prize goes up, but don't forget that each person chooses his own category.

"About four men, all college men, working under Dr. Bergen Evans, a professor at Northwestern University compile the questions. These are then put into a sealed envelope and deposited with the Manufacturers' Trust Company in New York until show time. The envelope is then

brought to me—and I'm the only person on the show who ever sees the questions.

"Naturally, everyone wants to get on the show. Three weeks before we even went on the air and with only a few lines of publicity here and there over 10,000 applications asking to be on the show were received. Now the letters run about two and three thousand a day.

Contestants

"The chances for a person's being called as a contestant are quite good too. All the applications must be written in and likely candidates are called into the office for interviews. Care is taken so that those with large incomes aren't spotted on the show. Anyone with interesting hobbies—such as the policeman whose hobby was Shakespeare—is given special attention. Once a person gets on the show he starts out by answering questions up to the \$512 question, with the next goal being \$4000—and on up until he hits or misses the \$64,000 question. Each contestant may decide whether, upon reaching the \$8000 mark correctly, he wants to come back the next week to try for \$16,000 or settle for the \$8000. If he misses the following week's question he gets only \$4000. This is the procedure up to the payoff.

"There's only one bad part of this job. I'm going to feel awful when a contestant misses the question that would give him the big money. Talk about a nervewracking business!"

As if Hal didn't have his hands full enough he's also going to do a show in Hollywood for NBC called "The Soldiers" with Tom D'Andrea. He will then commute weekly between Hollywood and New York for his "\$64,000 Question" stint.

Hal can be sure of one thing—he's going to be about the best known personality on TV. Anybody who has a nodding acquaintance with \$64,000 isn't going to be a stranger to us ordinary folks.

The "Boys" Are Back

Those gentlemen of humor, Dave Willock and Cliff Arquette, are around again dispensing with the chuckles and the homey wisdom. But this time they're building all kinds of amazing things.

CARY GRANT heard that Dave Willock and Cliff Arquette were due back on TV this summer so he immediately sent a wire saying. "Now that we know you two are going to be back we're looking forward to a pleasant summer." It was signed Cary and Betsy Grant.

Cary Grant, as you may know, is one of the many rabid fans of these two boys. And their return is the occasion for a good many huzzahs around these parts.

Cliff Arquette, in discussing his long-time on-again off-again association with Dave, said, "Dave and I are like people getting a divorce who still love each other. We're so close we almost read each other's minds."

Dave remarked, "Cliff is like the man who came to dinner and stayed on and on. About six years ago I was doing a do-it-yourself type of show on which I used a guest artist. I got Cliff on once and he became a fixture. We later changed the format of the show to a situation comedy kind of thing."

However, now the two are back again in a do-it-yourself show. This happens to be right down their alleys since both are forever building things. Dave even has a do-it-yourself store.

"Dave and I have been seeing each other constantly since we were last on TV," Cliff said lightly. "We have the same interests, we like woodwork, we like to putter around, we had similar careers on radio, were both students of the Civil War—and we're both men."

Interests

They even like cooking—with a difference, however.

"Dave is the fancy type cook, sauces and the like," Cliff laughed. "I'm the al! night diner type. However, we are different in one way. Dave is married and has five children. I'm still single after having been a two-time loser in this marriage racket." The boys are happy about their new show and hope to

branch out into an even more extensive type of program.

"We'd eventually like to go on film with a show," Dave put in. "We have a lot of crazy ideas but they need film. For one thing, we're always telling each other about our families in the Civil War days and we had thought of doing sequences where we flash back and play our grandfathers and grandmothers—crazy stuff like that."

"Oh, we've got a lot of jokes too," Cliff added, "but we never use them. The humor on our program springs more from the character of 'Charlie Weaver'—and we try to keep him just a nice, clean old man. Really, though, I'm just playing myself when I play 'Charlie'—except that I wear a moustache."

"Whenever Cliff and I do a show, the public either hates us or are rabid fans," Dave went on. "Some people have said, 'What are those two trying to do? What are they trying to put across?' But once they watch us about three times we've hooked them. One critic back east really blasted us a few years ago, so Cliff and I decided to do a show based on this man. And we really planned on bombing him. Our associate producer happened to be a friend of this critic so he told him to listen in on

this particular show. The man said, "I wouldn't watch that show for anything." To which our producer said, "You'd better—the boys are doing it on you." The critic called later to say he had seen the light and he is now one of our biggest boosters.

"We've had some interesting mail too. We got a couple of letters signed by hundreds of people. And we heard of one TV station in Detroit where everyone watched us when we were on—even the janitor. The place practically closed up then."

Family Matters

Along with their current show plans, Dave and Cliff have family matters to concern them. Cliff's son is in New York trying to get a start as an actor. He asked for and got no help from Cliff. As "Charlie Weaver" remarked, "I had to get there on my own and my son can too." Dave had a similar situation. His oldest daughter wanted him to help her get a job at CBS or NBC—but not in acting. Dave said he couldn't do anything so she went out and got herself a job at CBS within one week. She is now with an agency but was married recently, so her career plans have been changed somewhat. Cliff Arquette and Dave Willock are so much alike that it's hard to tell where one leaves off and the other begins.

Is this the time for Johnny?

Johnny Carson is only a guy loaded with talent but he's had a hard time finding the right show. Has he found it now?

IT WASN'T too long ago that a show called "Carson's Cellar" was the favorite of many TV viewers who went in for the different and the unusual. Presiding over the mayhem was youthful Johnny Carson. This program, much to the disappointment of many, disappeared. Johnny later went on again in another show but it, too, failed to last.

If all this had happened to most comics, either they or the network would have given up. But Johnny remained confident—and so did CBS. Both believed the right show would come along. And CBS certainly believed in Johnny, especially after his remarkable pinch-hit job for Red Skelton on short notice some months back. It was after that show that Johnny became the fair-haired boy. Even Red Skelton thought he was great, in spite of the facetious-type "Stay Sick" card Johnny sent him. But Red, of course, was used to Johnny's gags. The two had traded bon mots for some time.

Now CBS has given Johnny his own program—and it is no summer replacement!

New Show

"This new effort is not a situation comedy or a variety show," Johnny grinned. "I don't know what you'd call it—except that it's going to be different each week. For example, on our first program we did a thing called 'Edward R. Farrow's Person to People.' That ought to give you some idea. On that one, I interviewed my family—and I had my three kids and my wife, Jody, on it. My youngsters even got their Social Security cards from that show. I later got thirteen dollars refund apiece from their

earnings when it came income tax time."

Johnny has never become discouraged waiting for the right break. He's done plenty of TV stints in the meantime, including his early morning "Coffee Break" show.

"What was the use of getting discouraged?" he quipped. "I only wanted to do something in which I could feel free and could enjoy, and I could wait for that.

Johnny's family consists of his wife, Jody; Kit, five; Ricky, three; and baby Cory. And it's quite a home! Everything runs with as much confusion as you'd expect.

Hectic Home

The hectic state of affairs doesn't bother Johnny too much—except when he wants to sleep, which he wants to do most of the time.

"But what chance have I to sleep with the kids getting up at 6:30 a.m.?" Johnny moaned. "Every once in a while I manage to sneak back to bed but Jody usually takes care of that by bringing the youngsters into bed with me so I can play with them.

"Speaking of children, I don't believe parents should ever hit them for disciplinary purposes—unless it's in self-defense. I think I'm a pretty good father. At least, I try to be a pal to my boys. I've been playing horsey so much for them that I think I'll go to Republic Studios and get a job as a horse."

Domestically speaking, Johnny is not so domestic. When it comes to cooking, he's great at fixing popcorn.

"I'm definitely no fix-it around the house either," Johnny laughed.

"I'm helpless, mechanically speaking. I couldn't even engineer a light bulb into a socket. Once I tried to fix the typewriter. I had the thing all apart and was surrounded by springs and keys and parts until three in the morning. I finally took the mess down to the shop the next day to get it put together.

"But I am good at financial management. There's only one trouble. Jody spends her allowance before I can borrow it back. She tried to take care of the finances once but after a while I finally decided it was best for me to handle them. It was the lesser of two evils.

"On the whole, we're pretty easy-going people. Sure we have some delightful arguments but we simmer down fast. Still there are some types of people I can do without—like those who say to me at a party, 'Be funny, Johnny.' They should be boiled in oil. I like to entertain but I don't like to be dared to be funny. Another peeve is the guy who takes all night telling an unfunny joke and constantly interrupts with 'Sure you haven't heard this one?' Finally, I yell, 'Yeah, I heard it' and change the subject. Then there's the charming character who always is comparing the quality of your TV set with his. You want to throw the set at him after a while."

Don't be surprised if these pet peeves of Johnny's find their way into his show. He tries out most of his ideas on Jody first, but she likes everything he does. As she says, "Johnny was always funny—even in college. He was the campus wit. That's what attracted me to him in the first place."

And so Johnny Carson marches on with confidence. As he says, "I hope we can make the grade this time, but I'm all set in case we don't. We have it fixed so we can convert our program into something like wrestling at the drop of a hat. I'll be the referee and the musicians and others in the cast are taking calisthenics just in case."

We've got an idea Johnny will stay around this time!

Carl Bailey Gets Around

CARL BAILEY made his first personal appearance with his mother and father nearly forty years ago, on September 18, 1915, to be exact. He doesn't remember saying much at that time, but he's said plenty since.

Carl isn't one to believe in the turntable, mikeside routine to the exclusion of personal appearances. This would be too stationary a life for the roving Bailey. The affable six-foot-ten disc jockey-emcee exudes warmth and friendliness with his big grin. It's no wonder that Carl's services are in demand. The minute Carl is through with his early-morning KBIG ainer, he hops into his jeep and rides helter skelter from the transmitter-studio down the rugged Catalina terrain to meet a group of visiting dignitaries. No matter what the occasion, you name it and Carl has presided over the festivities.

"My personal appearances have run the gamut of everything from explaining the magic of one of the early tape recorders to a classroom full of wide-eyed first graders, to the breath-taking experience of stepping

onto the stage of the Hollywood Bowl before a tremendous crowd for a special Memorial Show conducted by the disc jockeys of Los Angeles," explained Mr. KBIG.

"I have personally appeared for drawings of everything from groceries to automobiles. I've given away over thirty new cars for one large chain of service stations in the past five years. I've done so many high school and junior college shows that I've lost track of the actual number of such appearances."

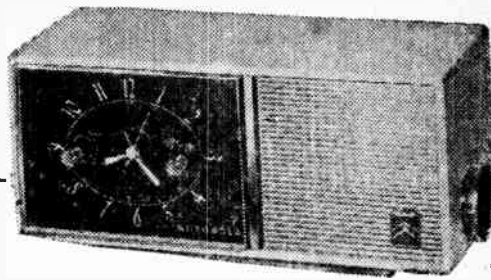
Diversification

Carl's radio appearances have been made from every conceivable spot—night clubs, ballrooms, store windows, street corners, storm-lashed piers, standing on top of a jeep doing a description of a motorcycle race, to crawling on hands and knees through the passages of a submarine, or scrambling down ladders into the depths of some Navy vessel. He's awakened at dawn to climb a hill-top for an Easter Sunrise Service, or stayed up half the night emceeing some jazz concert. During the war years he spent a great deal of time with Army Hospital groups, bringing a little musical cheer to the patients.

KBIG decided to make life easier for their roving disc jockey and they've supplied him with a rolling studio neatly tucked into a Volkswagen from which he's been able to originate remotes from the Pan-Pacific, Shrine and Long Beach Auditoriums, and various county fairs. During July and August, Carl is taking his Volkswagen studio to the San Diego County Fair, Del Mar, Corona del Mar and Long Beach for remote broadcasts.

Meeting the public is one thing but answering their barrage of questions is another. Invariably people ask Carl, especially if he's seated, are you really six-foot-ten . . . or do you really broadcast from Catalina? Do you actually have buffalo come near your studio on the hilltop in Catalina . . . do you live on Catalina all year round . . . do you like Catalina in the winter when it's quiet? Carl's answer to all these questions is YES.

When asked what was his most interesting public appearance, Carl found it difficult to answer. "Guess," he said, thinking aloud, "I just love to get out among people. And I really enjoy all my public appearances, but the biggest kick I had was getting some little first graders to sing 'My Country 'Tis of Thee' while I secretly recorded it. You should have seen their little faces light up with delight and surprise when I played it back for them."

Lifelines

BY THE TIME YOU READ THIS, it'll probably be all over with Mrs. Kreitzer and the "\$64,000 Question." But right now, as we go to press, speculation is pretty hot. Will she "go whole hog" or will she take her \$32,000 and call it quits?

I POLLED A GROUP OF TV FANS and here's what they thought: two-thirds said if they were Mrs. Kreitzer, they'd settle for the \$32,000. It was explained to them that according to TV-Radio Life's accountant, the income tax bite on \$32,000 would be roughly \$10,000, while tax on \$64,000 would be almost \$29,000. For the net difference of \$13,000, the majority felt it wasn't worth risking a chance on the \$64,000 question. But here's the big laugh: all but one of the persons quizzed were of the opinion that Mrs. Kreitzer would take the chance. Reasons: Since winning the \$32,000 question, she had received lots of encouraging mail; help of an expert on the big question is an important factor; in the old days of the "\$64 Question," the hard question was always the one for \$32 . . . the program felt it was bad psychology to bring the contestant right up to the winning line and then have him or her go boom, so same formula probably applies to the "\$64,000 Question"; it would be smart of the program to have a winner, for this would heap more valuable publicity on a show which so far has grabbed more space than any other this summer.

AT THE LUNCHEON PARTY CELEBRATING Jack Owens's twenty-five years in showbusiness, Jack recounted the highlights of his career from the time he worked at KFH, Wichita, for \$13.50 a week until he left "The Breakfast Club" to settle in Southern California. One of his lowest spots was that unemployed day in Chicago in 1932 with fifty cents left in his pocket. Jack debated spending the money for something to eat or for a movie. He chose the picture, stumbled onto a radio station in the theater and was hired.

ONE OF HIS BIGGEST SURPRISES WAS thinking he'd have no trouble landing a big job here because he was "tenth most popular singer in the country" while on Don McNeill's program. Imagine his amazement when Jack found out that at that time "The Breakfast Club" wasn't aired west of Denver! Nobody here did flip-ups at mere mention of his name, but despite this, Jack proceeded to build and build and I can sincerely say it was a joy to see him and his handsome family honored at his silver anniversary affair.

NBC-TV HAS ANNOUNCED A STAGGERING list of bigtime telecasts for the coming season. In addition to the Mary Martin-Helen Hayes show and the Frank Sinatra starrer, there'll be a color special based on "Heidi," the Macy Thanksgiving parade, world pre-

miere of the new American operas, "Griffelkin" and "La Grande Bretechez." On the 200th anniversary of Mozart's birth, "The Magic Flute" will be presented. Sadlers Wells will do "Sleeping Beauty" and there'll be repeats of "Amahl and the Night Visitors" and "Babes in Toyland."

ADDITIONALLY, I WAS INTERESTED in the emphasis on world figures and affairs. The July 17 telecast, "Meeting at the Summit," focusing on the Geneva huddle of the Big Four is typical. Rise of Communism will be screened later under the title, "Nightmare in Red." Hitler's story will be presented. "Young India" is now being shot in color in that country. Austria will receive similar treatment and Russia will be viewed inside-out. It is in concepts like these that television portends its full significance. From where we sit, next season in TV looks like the greatest.

IT WAS LIFELINER SITTING AT luncheon in The Derby last week with Hal March and Tom D'Andrea when Gus, the maitre d', buzzed up to Hal to remind him he couldn't stay in the main dining room in sports shirt. Rather than retreat to The Record Room when we were so comfortably settled where we were, I suggested that a jacket be lined up from one of Hal's friends in the not-so-fussy Record retreat. Gus didn't have to go that far. A waiter volunteered his snappy checked coat, which, though pretty over-powering on March, saw him (and Derby rules) safely through.

I HEAR THAT LAUREL AND HARDY have signed to do two ninety-minute pictures which may possibly land as specials on NBC-TV.

STATE OF THE TV WORLD: Struck me particularly strongly t'other day, when these adjoining headlines appeared in Variety: "20th (Century-Fox studios) To Sell Vidpix to Theatres Abroad" proclaimed one of the stories. The other announced, "33 Top Rank (J. Arthur) Pix on U.S. Teevee Market." Not only TV pictures and movies are doing a criss-cross, but U.S. and Britain.

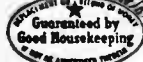

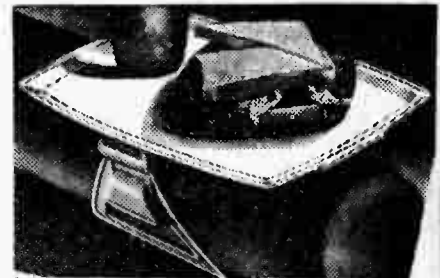

POLPETTONE ALA ROMANA

- 1 Lb. ground beef
- 1 Lb. ground pork
- 1 Tbsp. parsley—minced
- 4 Tbsps. Chef Milani olive oil
- 2 Eggs
- 2 Hard cooked eggs
- 3 Tbsps. grated cheese
- 1/4 Lb. Jack cheese—minced very fine
- 2 Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 Cans mushroom sauce

Mix meat, eggs, cheese, parsley, salt and pepper. Pour 2 tbsps. olive oil in a baking dish. Put 1/2 meat mixture into it. Cover with Jack cheese and the hard boiled eggs, sliced. Cover with rest of meat mixture and form into a loaf. Brush with rest of olive oil to the top of the loaf. Bake in 325 degree oven for 1 1/2 hours. Serve sliced hot with mushroom sauce piping hot.

I had just completed a tour in Australia and decided to head home instead of detouring for a vacation in Hawaii. Something told me to hurry home. "I was back in sunny California just two days when I got a phone call from Mr. Landsberg telling me he was ready to go ahead with the 'Crystal Tone' program and asked me if I'd like to co-star with Orrin Tucker. We did our first telecast five days later. That vacation in Hawaii will have to come some other time.

"There's one point I'd like to stress, however, I don't want anyone to think we are trying to buck Lawrence Welk's band. We are not. The bands are entirely different."

There are some who will argue the point whether Tucker and Welk, both on Channel 5, are in competition with one another. Welk has built up a legion of fans over the years of telecasting on KTLA but his former champagne lady, Roberta, also has her own very loyal and large following. Whether the combination of Linn and Tucker will sway viewers to the Crystal Tone camp remains to be seen.

Welk has his bubbling champagne musical signature; Tucker a special section . . . xylophone, vibraphone, celeste, chimes, bells and two pianos . . . to create the crystal tones. Both bands have talented sidemen.

Regardless of how you feel about the subject it can be said that there's ample music on KTLA to please most everyone's taste in music.

The vivacious Roberta is not only happy in her professional life but she's joyous about developments on the personal side of life. During the past few months, with the exception of some TV and public appearance commitments, she's been enjoying life and literally on the first vacation she's had in the past eight years.

"When a girl flits around the way I had to when I was touring with the bands she doesn't have an opportunity to form lasting friendships or relax and have any fun. It's work, work all the time," commented Roberta. "But I've been enjoying life for the past several months and at the same time I've acquired a much needed rest."

TV-Radio Life has received several letters asking about the ring Roberta wears on the third finger, left hand.

"No, it isn't an engagement ring," Roberta replied in answer to our in-

quiry. "It's a friendship ring from a person I'm very fond of."

"The Intruder." (5) July 17, 7:30. This is a TV first run of an excellent British film that has just finished playing an engagement in a Los Angeles theater. Ex-Colonel **Jack Hawkins** returns home one evening and interrupts a thief in the midst of his villainy. The thief turns out to be **Michael Medwin**, a soldier in Hawkins' old outfit, who runs away when he thinks Hawkins is telephoning the police. The rest of the picture is concerned with Hawkins' search for Medwin, and his mounting interest in the reasons for the soldier's choice of crime as a civilian occupation. The film contains flashbacks to the army days as Hawkins contacts some of his old buddies in an attempt to find a lead, and the contrasts between the various individuals' army and civilian lives prove to be quite interesting, and, in several instances, humorous. The trail ends, of course, and the reasons for Medwin's defection are explained, but not until "The Intruder" has proved itself an engrossing and entertaining picture. **Dennis Price** and **George Cole** round out the cast, while the directorial credit goes to **Guy Hamilton**.

"Norman Conquest." (13) July 19, 8:30. Another first run, and also British, but it's not nearly the caliber of the first mentioned, I'm afraid. "Norman Conquest" is **Tom Conway's** name in the picture, you see, and I think it's a pretty shoddy pun. (9) July 17, 8:30. **Barbara Stanwyck** is a famous pianist who has contracted tuberculosis, so she grudgingly goes to **David Niven's** sanatorium, but he can't make her stay in bed and get well. Suave **Richard Conte** happens by, takes her to Monte Carlo, where she becomes desperately ill and David has to haul her back to the hospital. There, she gets better and marries David and the only reason I mention this movie is that Miss Stanwyck took a bad fall the other day and I hope she's better.

In the scene where Ethel Waters fires the gun, she points it straight in the air and lets go. Now, wouldn't the bullets go into the ceiling? And wouldn't the police have noticed this with only casual investigation? Of course, if they had there would have been a much shorter show. Oh well, just thought it might be interesting to drop this little tidbit. They do call such boners dramatic license, don't they?

Understand that some people are going around printing stories about DAVY CROCKETT'S not being such a hero after all—the real DAVY that is. I certainly don't think this is fair—especially just after I got my coonskin hat.

They loved the recent argument Milt Smith, the San Diego third baseman, had with umpire Al Mutart. As it raged, Mutart finally drew a line on the ground and said, "Smith, don't you cross that line," and then the man in blue retreated. Smith leaned over the line as far as he could without falling over it, but didn't cross the line.

George Freese, the new Hollywood third baseman, was telling about his younger brother Gene, with the Pittsburgh Pirates. Gene at 21 has little rookie respect for National league immortals like Stan Musial or Roy Campanella and the many other standouts in the league. Young Gene will heckle "Hey, Musial, don't lose your glove" and come forth with brash statements to anybody who wears an opposing uniform. Since Gene is a rookie and might do better without inciting the enemy, manager Fred Haney finally came up to brother George one day and asked him to talk to the rookie, brother to brother. George admits that his talk had little effect. "He's irresponsible," he says, "but he's going to be a really great ball player, and I'm glad for him."

Funny part of the story is that Fred Haney himself broke in under Ty Cobb as the freshest rookie in baseball. The story is that Haney hit a home run one day when his Detroit team was playing against the great New York Yankees. It wasn't a big blow, but it was Fred's first. As he stood at his third base position the great Babe Ruth came by. "Well, you big monkey," taunted the brash rookie, "You're only 49 ahead of me now." Ruth said nothing, but when he came to bat that inning he hit one of the longest home runs ever hit in old Navin field. One pertinent comment on the "We need more characters" complaint is that baseball wouldn't tolerate some of the real old-timers, whose disregard of training rules was of such proportion that they moved from club to club with a "too hard to handle" label. Most of today's players are a clean living, family type whose exploits may be more orthodox—but chances are we're seeing faster and better baseball because of it. Carol and I use the same philosophy in our marriage—and it's the kind of thing that has to break you up. You can't stay mad in the face of that routine.

Sharing

"Of course, I have another system. When I sense an argument coming I go in for a very dramatic sick scene. I'm quite proud of it. However, this breaks me up before it does Carol. There is still another gag, though. When Carol gets mad at me, I borrow a page from 'Dragnet' and go into dialogue like this: '7:30, Saturday night, Carol got annoyed with me.' This works wonders.

"Carol and I do share all things. I'm such a windbag I tell her everything when I get home. This prevents any sulking, a habit a husband can indulge in heavily and with disastrous results. But it's almost a daily event in our lives to sit and discuss what happened to each of us during the day. I go in for no investment spees without consulting Carol. I have to—because she keeps the books and knows what the financial status is more than I do. I have two secretaries, but with Carol I have three and she supervises the other two.

"I think it's important for a wife to have a tangible job in her marriage. That's why I like it when Carol helps me. She used to be a legal secretary so she is quite sharp in handling any details for me. Yet, she never wants to get involved in my show business life. She won't even let me introduce her from the audience. She is, however, very concerned about my leaving her name at the door so she can get into the studio. Once she tried to come in and when she told the guard her name was Mrs. Jack Bailey, he said, 'That Bailey sure has a lot of relatives.' I

now make double sure she is to be admitted.

"When Carol and I began life together she had a good job and I did the housekeeping and the cooking. And I made it as comfortable for her as possible to keep on working. She double-crossed me, though, in that she up and quit her job one day. So I started on a round of positions—and fought each one out. As a result of such experiences, Carol and I sort of grew up together. And our moments of stress and trial only convinced us of the importance of another guide in our life and a guide that should be present in all marriages—a spiritual faith.

Faith

"Our spiritual faith has brought us closer together. We are a team. I don't believe that an entertainer's wife should just stay home. She should be at her husband's side in all he does. I feel the same way Will Rogers did when he was once asked to be a toastmaster at an affair. He replied, 'I'll be glad to be your toastmaster for \$5000, but I would have done it for you just out of friendship if you had also asked Mrs. Rogers to be present.'

"Only through a spiritual awareness can a man and wife find that necessary closeness together. A life not based on faith is one headed for trouble. The fact that the wife may be of one faith and the husband of another makes no difference. That's a technical thing. But both must have faith in a Higher Power, Someone to whom you can turn over all the insurmountable problems that arise. It's the old idea of letting go and letting God, of being the vice-president to God's presidency.

"Carol's and my life has been the victim of 10,000 little worries, just as is the case with any family and we have found that most of the things we worried about never happened. There is a God planning things for us before we ever arrive on the scene. And He's going to do the best for us—whether we understand it or not.

"With faith a marriage can last—because marriage is one of God's most blessed of institutions. Once faith enters your life self-centeredness should go out and it is the selfish attitude that has wrecked many a marriage."

Maybe it seems odd to hear a gagger like Jack Bailey talking in this way, but you have to admit one thing: his ideas have worked for him. This is a man who has not only found happiness in marriage but he has also found peace of mind in his life.



Jack Bailey and his wife have certainly found a happy marriage. And what they believe in should be of help to any couple trying to find the answer to marital bliss.

Radio Has A Blockbuster!

Something new has hit the radio horizon and it's the buzz of the business.

ABOUT THE only thing that won't be covered on NBC's new radio show, "Monitor," is a course on how to train fleas — and don't be surprised if even that gets on sooner or later.

"Monitor" is the spectacular answer to TV competition. It's a continuous flow of entertainment and information every weekend from eight a.m. Saturday to midnight Sunday. It takes full advantage of all the resources only radio can provide—mobility and immediacy. It covers every possible subject from a broadcast of a cricket match in London to a listen-in on a George Gobel warm-up before his TV show begins. And it even includes segments of such TV hit programs as Gobel. Comedy, drama, music, theatre, films and records all get the going-over on this exciting new show.

James Fleming, veteran newsman and commentator, is executive producer and from the control console at NBC Radio Central in New York are direct lines to all important news

centers in the country, overseas circuits to foreign news capitals, connections to every NBC television studio, the news rooms of NBC-affiliated stations in 200 cities, a vast stockpile of tape recordings, a battery of playback equipment, the use of one of the world's finest record libraries, and a bank of TV monitors. On tap, too, are vignettes from current Broadway hits or from a newly previewed motion picture.

Wide Range of Subjects

A typical hour on any weekend might include the following: the first segment of a trip through Paris; a dramatic highlight from a current Broadway hit or a movie; live or taped appearances by people at the top of the news that weekend; comedy of all types; an "exclusive" which might be a dive with the atomic-powered submarine, the Nautilus, or firing a rocket at White Sands or visiting Birdland, New York's mecca of jazz; a behind-the-scenes visit with a top star of Broadway or Hollywood; plus basic news, time, weather, sports, and local features.

Star Hosts

The show is done in four-hour segments with prominent radio and television personalities at the helm serving as communicators. Dave Garroway, Jane and Goodman Ace (radio's famous "Easy Aces"), Bob and Ray (the satirical comics), Leon Pearson, John Cameron Swayze, Clifton Fadiman, Red Barber, Allen Funt (he of "Candid Camera" fame) are among those who take charge of the four-hour spots.

One of the most unique technical features of this interesting new undertaking is the Radio Central itself in New York, which Fleming calls "a listening post of the world." By merely pushing buttons, the communicator is able to establish live two-way communications both overseas and in this country, or even a round-table discussion involving several correspondents a ny where in the world. The communicator is seated at the control console which provides twenty-four different sources of monitoring, foreign and domestic. At his disposal are trans-Atlantic telephone and overseas broadcast circuits, special broadcast lines and long-distance telephone lines for communication within the United States.

The fact that "Monitor" also picks up some of the top television shows is of real interest. Instead of throwing the public a mammoth undertaking like this only as competition to TV, it is recognizing and giving attention to the competing medium.

"Monitor" is really something different for radio. It is so unusual it isn't bound by time limits. Each of the features is presented in the length of time best suited to the material itself instead of being stretched out or cramped into arbitrary time periods. As a result, the content can range from a one-line gag to a twenty-minute sketch.

One thing is sure—this program will cover so much that no one will ever have time to get bored. There's only one troub'e—who will take time out to go to bed on weekends?

Jovial, rotund Buddy Hayes is the latest addition to the Lawrence Welk entourage.

▲ **ALTHOUGH BUDDY HAYES HAS HAD** a wonderful background in jazz he aspires to play with a symphonic orchestra. To achieve his goal Buddy is studying with Professor Hermann Reinshager, whom he claims is the foremost bass teacher in the United States. Buddy's debut as a longhair would be a far cry from his Les Paul multiple recordings and standard Welk waxings.

SMILING, stocky Buddy Hayes is Lawrence Welk's new bass player with the impish personality that pleases the viewers.

Buddy hails from a musical family of six boys and four girls. Mother Hayes was a singer and pianist. His father was a trumpet player with John Phillip Sousa and Arthur Pryor. At one time in his career senior Hayes found himself touring with the great Madame Schumann-Heink. In addition to his musical talents, Poppa Hayes was also an expert piano tuner and Madame insisted that he and he alone tune her piano before each concert. When Buddy was quite young the Hayes clan formed a vaudeville act and a family band and toured the eastern states.

Eventually Buddy decided to leave the family hearth and try his talents in the wide music world beyond his home state of West Virginia. Joining Larry Funk's band in Kansas City, Buddy's fellow musicians included Vaughn Monroe on trumpet and Helen O'Connell, vocalist. Before joining Welk, Buddy had played with some of the top names in the business . . . Harry James, Red Ingles, Joe Venuti and Stan Kenton.

Musical Family

Within a few weeks after joining

the Welk family, Buddy became a TV personality and the influence of television was felt immediately. "I went marketing for my wife one day," Buddy explained affably, "and imagine my surprise when some ladies in the market tapped me on the shoulder asking, 'You're the new bass man with Lawrence Welk, aren't you?'"

"This Welk family is fabulous. It's a wonderful organization. The lack of regimentation and the spirit of cooperation which predominates is slightly terrific. Welk makes every member of the band feel important individually as well as an integral part of the organization.

Symphony

"As far back as I can remember music has been part of my life and my ambition is some day to play in a symphonic orchestra. I've been studying with Professor Herman Reinshager, foremost bass teacher in the United States, and I feel that everything I know musically I owe to the professor. Studying under him is pure inspiration. Currently, Dr. Reinshager is dean of the bass section of the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

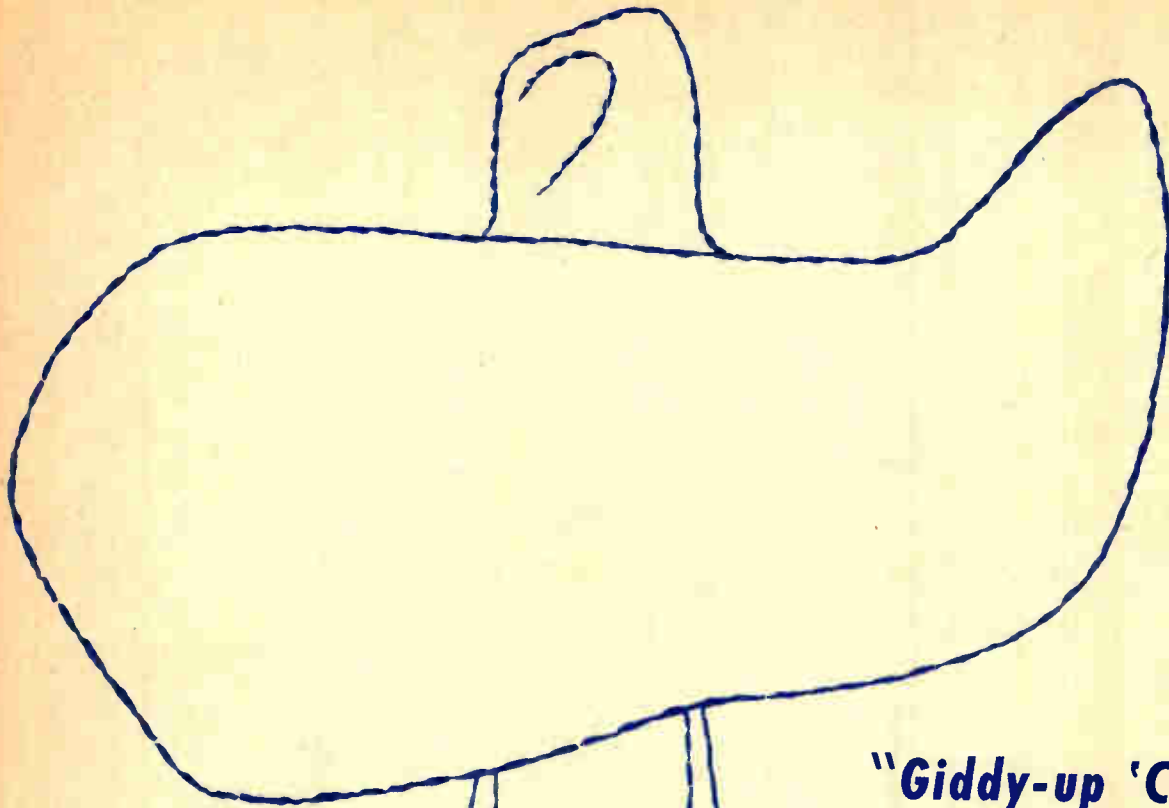
"On the lighter side, I thoroughly enjoy George Gershwin's 'Rhapsody in Blue,' particularly Paul White-

man's rendition. Whiteman certainly gives it wonderful production. As a youngster he was my ideal and I could think of no one I'd rather listen to than Pops with Teagarden, Venuti and Crosby in his aggregation. 'Rhapsody' is the most elevating number I've ever heard and I've heard them all. I thought so at fifteen and I still think so today.

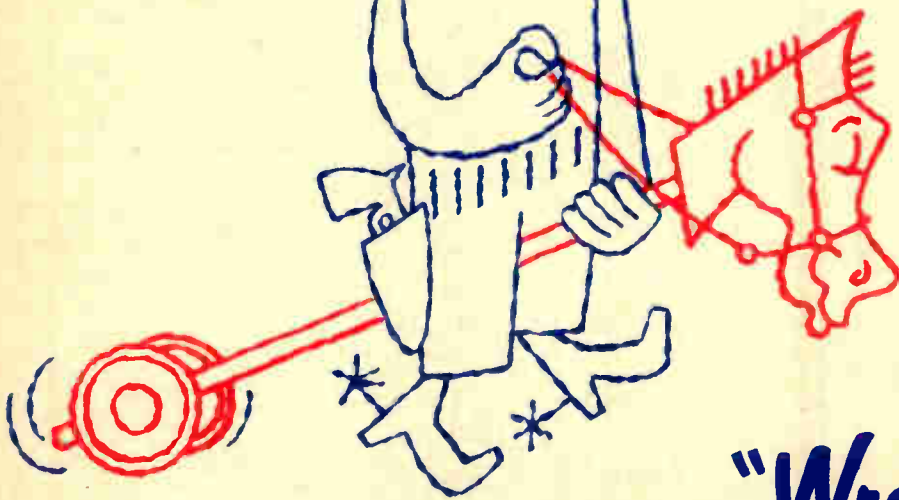
