She's His Lucky Charm

They say that behind every man's success there is a woman. In Don Fedderson's case this is more than true.

GO BEGIN WITH, you have to know Don Fedderson. He's the alert gentleman who had the foresight to produce the Betty White and Liberace shows and then went on to carve a further dent for himself as producer of CBS-TV's "The Millionaire."

Now, Don is a success in this business. And he's also well-liked, which is perhaps more important. But if you ask him what was the reason for the way his career has gone, he'd say, "Tido—my wife. She's my lucky charm."

Tido, (her real name is Helen) is considered such a lucky charm, in fact, that Don insists on her being in every "Millionaire" show he films. She just does a walk-on and he hires an extra person so that no one will be out of a job because of Tido's stint.

"Tido is one wife who believes completely in her husband. As she said, 'I have never had any doubts about Don's making good—not from the day I married him. My sisters married wealthy men, but I always told them that my husband would be more successful than theirs would ever be.'"

The relationship between Don and Tido is a wonderful thing to see in this cynical day and age. Here are two people who have found happiness, who have the greatest respect for each other, who are still very much in love. They have four chil-

dren: Monya Lee, 17; Michael, 14; Gregg, 6; and Darr, 2. But as important as the children are to Don and Tido, nothing usurps Tido's role as a wife. She put it this way, "I had Don first."

Rough Days

Don and Tido didn't have an easy go of things when they were first married. He was twenty and she was eighteen—and he was making fifteen dollars a week at the time.

"Don got a raise of five dollars a week after we were married," Tido grinned. "Somehow we didn't think about money so much in those days. We don't now, for that matter, since neither Don nor I feel that money gives you security. I guess such material things didn't matter because we were so much in love. I had a crush on Don when I was fifteen. We were in a school play and I had to kick him downstairs. He was playing a burglar, you see, and I was the lead. After the show I was given a bouquet of roses and I gave him one—to sort of make up to him.

"I'll never forget the day Don gave me my ring set. It cost \$39.95 for both rings—and I still have them. He paid for them on the installment plan.

"I can still remember some of the funniest things about our early married days—like the morning after our marriage. I was all set to show Don what a good cook I was, although I had done little cooking since I had

spent most of my time modeling. I went to the butcher and ordered four pieces of bacon. He asked me why I didn't just get a half a pound. I said I'd come back later for more. I wanted to have only enough for that breakfast. And I also bought just four eggs.

"Don was very patient in those days. We got a waffle iron for a wedding present plus a recipe book with recipes for all kinds of waffles. I gave Don so many waffles that to this day he can't look one in the face.

"Don was working for a Kansas newspaper in the first days of our marriage and he had advanced to the spot where he was making \$150 a week, which was a lot of money in those days. I stopped working when we hit that income bracket because Don didn't want me to work. Yet, I never forgot the days when we had little money.

"I can still remember the time when some friends of ours asked us to join them for dinner. Don only had \$1.50. On the menu were chicken at thirty-five cents and steak at sixty-five cents, so I ordered chicken. Our friends wanted to know why I didn't have steak so I nicely lied, 'Oh, I've had so much steak all week.' Along with this incident I can remember the time Don hocked his watch so we could have dinner out.

"The turning point in our lives came when Don decided to take a job on the San Francisco News—at no salary and on a commission. We arrived in San Francisco to be greeted by a strike. We had no money and we had a two months o'd baby. There were times when we felt like going back to Kansas but we stuck it out. It turned out to be the right decision because from this spot Don became, in time, manager of radio station KYA and also was working for KLAC here in Hollywood."

It was straight on up to the top for the Feddersons after that. After his success on TV with Betty White and Liberace, Don decided to try his hand at "The Millionaire," an idea he had had for over a year. Success

BOB CROSBY was obviously jittery. It was just before his CBS-TV show was to go on. Near him stood his very beautiful and personable daughter Cathy.

"I'm really nervous today," Bob commented. "After all, my own flesh and blood is going on the show."

It was a big day for Cathy too. It was her big chance on the show, but she seemed less nervous.

Cathy came through beautifully on the program and when Bob was relaxed he had a few things to say about his daughter's going into the business.

Cathy's Career

"I'd like to see her in show business but only if I'm completely satisfied she has an honest desire to go into it, a real talent, and an awareness of her responsibility to an audience," Bob said sincerely. "I keep telling both Cathy and Gary, who will be on my show during the summer, that they are indebted to give audiences their best at all times. You can't cheat the people or give them second measures. Once Cathy learns this and once she doesn't feel

she swung in from left field, then I'll be happy to see her in show business.

"There are those, I know, who think it will be a cinch for her because she's my daughter. Well, I had those who thought I was lucky because I was Bing's brother. In a way, being related to someone in show business helps, but in other ways it's a handicap. Cathy went to school in Switzerland recently because she came home with a question for me I couldn't answer. She said she wanted to leave school because no matter how well she might be doing in her studies she got no credit. Everyone thought she should do everything right because she was Bob Crosby's daughter. And if she didn't always do her best there was a good deal of talk. She said she just wanted to go where she wasn't known.

"When she got off the plane at Copenhagen she was met by a reporter who said, 'If you're Bob Crosby's daughter I want a story on you.' Cathy wrote me, 'Even in Europe people know you.' What she didn't know was that the people there had been hearing for years the Dixieland records I had made. They have the rhythm there too." About Cathy's European schooling he only said with a grin, "It was nice to be able to send her to a place I couldn't afford."

Bob then referred to his own experiences getting started—and what

comes that he's no longer a part of it.

"Bob always looks at ease and relaxed," his wife June said. "But he's all nerves inside. He works hard five days a week and on Saturdays and Sundays he just does nothing. He has a calm exterior and yet is surging inside.

"Cathy is the same way. She's also security-conscious. She's leery about buying anything. I have tried to tell her that since she wants to go into show business she has to spend more money than the ordinary person does. There are certain things she has to have. It's the same as the experiences Bob and I had when we started going on the road with the band. We were always put in the most expensive rooms in hotels while the others in the band got regular rooms. We couldn't get anything like that."

Bob Crosby is, of course, a success. He's not starving. But he's practical—and he is also considerate of his fellow performers.

When he decided to use Cathy and Gary on his show this summer he was especially concerned that everyone know why he made this move.

"Joanie was going to be out because of her baby," Bob remarked, "and I didn't want anyone to think Cathy and Gary were going to take

her place. They're not. Cathy is going back to school anyway and Gary has his own career plans in the fall.

"Besides, it was Cathy who brought Joanie to my attention in the first place. She had heard her sing on a local show and told me that I ought to use Joanie on my program."

Carol Richards got on the show when Joanie was on her honeymoon. The original idea was for Carol to stay on only during Joanie's absence but she did so well that Bob made a spot for her. And, naturally, The Modernaires have a key role on the show. So, as you can see, this is no one-star program. Everybody gets his kicks here.

Bob's show is a hit because of the friendly feelings between the company, because of his own un-starrish attitude, and because he has an instinctive feeling for what makes a hit TV program. As he says, "It takes honesty on TV. I like to think of television as an X-ray camera. If you're phony it shows up like a sore thumb. You have to be for real to last on TV."

At that moment Cathy passed by, her face wreathed in smiles. Bob looked at her, and then said, "There's a lucky girl. I think she has talent and her mother and God gave her a beautiful face. What more could any girl want?"

he had to understand as Bing's brother.

Bob's Career

"I don't know whether being Bing's brother helped me or hurt me. I just know that none of that bothered me particularly. I knew Bing was one of the best-loved people in show business. I could never hope to attain that stature. But when people said to me, 'You don't sing as well as Bing,' this did bother me. I wasn't trying to copy my brother. Bing, of course, helped me constantly—but in round-about ways. He never deliberately helped me. He didn't want to give me a crutch, in other words.

"I think I've done about everything there is in show business. I recently did a straight dramatic show on 'Climax,' which was about the only thing I hadn't tried."

"I have learned that audiences are never different. You hear that they are, but it's not so—it's the performers themselves who can be different. People will always react the same way to a good show, but you can't expect them to do nip-ups over a mediocre, sloppy performance."

Bob takes his work very seriously. He has no actual un-realized ambition. The only thing he wants to do is to get enough security, financial security, so he can relax. He is fully aware of the precarious future that belongs to anyone in show business and he wants to be certain his family will be taken care of when the day

BIG AND SMALL TALK ALONG TV-RADIO ROW this week: The fat ratings (in the forties) which "**\$64,000 Question**" is pulling—and how shrewd of the producers to keep up the suspense from week to week! . . . The rousing welcome given **Fess Parker** from youngsters along the line of march in the opening Disneyland Park parade. He equalled **Disney's** applause. . . . The shoving around and standing in line to which the press was subjected on preview day—the rides were closed down from 3:30 p.m. until 6 and that put many a reporter and photographer in a bad spot to catch stories and shots. . . . The exciting and ambitious TV plans for Fall, including NBC's hour-a-day colorcast, to be beamed afternoons for the home-setters.

IT SEEMED A SHAME THAT AFTER some TV press had been brought in from distant cities for the Disneyland Park opening that they couldn't get a decent chance to see what they came for. I understand that a visit to MGM studios was also disappointing. But **Warner Bros.** helped remove the sting by planning a fine affair at which reporters saw telefilms being shot for all three segments of the ABC-TV-Warner Bros. new series. After watching the "**Cheyenne**," "**Casablanca**" and "**King's Row**" casts at work, three of us were fortunate enough to capture **Paul Stewart**, director of the latter, for our luncheon companion. He amused with stories of early-day radio (at the then-phenominal wage of \$75 weekly), with how he won an audition by reading a **Heywood Brown** column and how he helped **Orson Welles** get onto radio for the first time, at WLW. Paul, himself, was in the original "**March of Time**" cast. A sensitive actor. You can expect fine direction from him on this series. Also look for tall, dark and handsome **Clint Walker** of the "**Cheyenne**" series to be a favorite, especially with the ladies.

"**SVENGALI AND THE BLONDE**" may be the bomb of all time," shrugged its producer-director-writer **Alan Handley**. "But on the other hand it may come off. I'm hoping so."

HANDLEY HOPES SO FOR SEVERAL REASONS. To do a TV "special" of the classic "Trilby" is his own idea and one which he has had to sell to the network. It will be the first original "spectacular" since the much-discussed **Betty Hutton** "Satin and Spurs." All the rest have been adaptations of well-known stage or musical comedy successes.

"**SVENGALI AND THE BLONDE**," on a summer budget of only \$75,000, will be done in black and white, July 30, NBC-TV, 6 p.m. If it pans out there will be a gleam in Handley's eye to colorcast it next Spring . . . an interesting

project, to say the least! Still another reason for hoping the **Trilby** teleshow will win applause is Handley's backlog of four other specials which he hopes to stage this coming year.

AFTER BEING TIED DOWN for three years doing **Dinah Shore's** semi-weekly television series, Handley is experiencing an extremely varied season under contract to NBC. The minute the curtain rang down last summer on his final assignment with **Dinah**, Alan hopped the "Ile de France" for Paris. "We sailed on **Bastille Day** . . . they celebrated all the way over!"

FINDING PARIS LESS EXCITING than on his previous visit, he picked up on the spur of the moment and zoomed to Greece, which had been tipped as the coming spot for tourist activities. Handley promptly fell in love with the country. Even took a crowded boat, on which he remained the only un-seasick passenger, to the island of Mylonos, and there discovered charming, picturesque and thoroughly enchanting people and surroundings.

WHEN HE RETURNED LAST FALL,

he had what he terms the "rare privilege" of working under **David O. Selznick**, directing live portions of the "Golden Light Jubilee" telecast. Even now he considers this association one of the greatest thrills of his already thrill-packed life.

NEXT HE DID A "PRODUCER'S SHOWCASE" from New York. "Then I paid for my sins. I had to do the Academy Award nomination telecast," Handley describes this assignment as one which he felt from the first was not a showmanly telecast, but which, amazingly enough, reaped a tremendous rating. He has already been assigned the job of directing next year's nomination show.

FROM THIS HE SKIPPED EAST to live for three weeks with the **Ringling Bros.** company in preparation for directing a spectacular of the Spring debut of the circus from Madison Square Garden. He learned a whole new lingo and saw an altogether different side of life.

ON THE RECENT "WIDE WIDE WORLD" insert from Tijuana, where over 10,000 Mexicans assembled for a television cut-in starring **Cantinflas**, Handley was at the controls again. With his wealth of artistic and musical background he found the primitive Mexican handwork and arts especially intriguing when putting together this segment.

HE HAS BEEN WORKING ON HIS SVENGALI show for months . . . has **Vic Shoen** as musical director and his dream cast includes: **Carol Channing**, **Basil Rathbone**, **Ethel Barrymore** as narrator, and **Franklyn Pangborn**. He considers Miss Channing, "a very good actress," has given her one song and has incorporated another number. Three of the sets will be in color.

HANDLEY REALIZES HE IS STAKING a lot on this July 30 telecast. He's

thereupon smiled brightly on Don and his family.

Tido is perfectly content being just Mrs. Fedderson. She said succinctly, "I have always been so much in love with Don I have a full and happy life. I take no credit, though, for what he's done. I don't know why he calls me his lucky charm. I only know we have fun together and we have respect for each other. I know the best things will continue to come to him. I have always refused to hold negative thoughts—even when things were rough. Somehow I could always look around me and see others who were far less fortunate than I. This reminded me of the story my mother told me of the boy who cried because he had no shoes until he met the boy who had no feet."

Tido is Don Fedderson's lucky charm because she has always been right behind him, encouraging him and believing in him. And—because nothing has ever mattered more to them than the love they have for each other. All marriages should be like theirs!

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

Everyone has by now had his say about the press preview of **Disneyland** and everyone seems to agree that as a showing for the press, it was a bit of a mess. But let it be said that **Walt Disney** has created a real magic wonderland at **Disneyland**. It is a mecca for kids, an imaginative and thoroughly remarkable undertaking. Nothing should take away the credit from Disney for this park. Now for the press side. It's true that the members of the so-called Fourth Estate got in for free, as did their families. It's true they dined for free, got rides (?) for free.



But a preview is usually designed to give the press a thorough chance to see what goes on. Reporters went to the **Park** to write about the rides, the concessions, the facilities, the **Park** itself. This was an utter impossibility. In this columnist's case, I took three youngsters. We arrived at one-thirty in the afternoon and left at eight-thirty. During that time we got on the **African river boat** ride and on the **Autobon**. We stood in line for three-quarters of an hour to take the **Mark Twain** steamboat and just as we got to the gate, we were told there would be no more rides because of the TV show. Okay, so many others were disappointed, too.

It was impossible to get on any of the rides at **Fantasyland** because of the long lines. Most of the features in **Tomorrowland** weren't ready. As for the dining part, we stood in line for an hour for dinner and a half hour for ice cream. It was incredible that

practically all of the **Park** was roped off a half an hour before the TV show and during the program. Naturally, some arrangement had to be made to clear way for the telecast, but this wasn't the best way to handle the affair.

On the whole, then, I still believe **Disney** has a gold mine, that he invited far too many people for the premiere, and that I will have to go back again sometime if I'm to get any idea of all the things **Disneyland** has to offer.

As a last thought, it wasn't nearly as unfortunate that the press got properly shoved around. It was far worse that so many excited youngsters had to go home seeing very little.

Warner Brothers unveiled its new TV series at the studio recently and the entire affair was beautifully managed. Here are a few candid observations: **Clint Walker**, who stars in "**Cheyenne**," is going to be a very popular guy once the series is released; great care is being put into each of the three segments — "**Cheyenne**," "**King's Row**," and "**Casablanca**"; **Anita Ekberg**, who stars in "**Casablanca**," is going to be plenty hot; **Paul Stewart**, who directs "**King's Row**," is going to deliver a corking series of shows—this man knows how to direct as well as act; **Warner's** is taking longer to film its series than most TV shows take but the time will probably pay off in better productions; the studio isn't kidding about going into TV—it's in with no holds barred; this will be another sock hit for **ABC**, which releases the program in September.

The **Wally Cox** ruckus at the **Dunes** in **Las Vegas** shouldn't be such a surprise. With all the hullabaloo, most people have forgotten that before **Wally** was a TV hit he was a night club flop. It's surprising, though, that the **Vegas** spot didn't check into his act more before he was hired. When **Wally** got another week's trial, many were slightly amazed, considering the statements issued when he was fired. The only comment this tunnel has to make is that in view of the fabulous prices paid performers in **Las Vegas**, it certainly behooves them to deliver some hefty material. Nobody should me paid \$11,000 a week, as **Wally** was given, unless he is prepared to come through with an act worthy of that sum.

Most people are still wondering what the **MGM** TV series will consist of. At least, the out-of-town press who visited the studio for some information about the television plans came away completely uninformed. Perhaps it is too soon for anything definite to be consummated, but there ought to be some kind of news for a series as important as this one should be paid \$11,000 a week, as **Wally** was **MGM's** TV entrance is concerned is that **Leslie Peterson** is in charge. He certainly knows his TV and radio so

he'll probably come up with something of note.

In last week's **Lifelines** column by **Evelyn Bigsby**, **Worthington Miner's** new show, "**The Challenge**," was mentioned. This is definitely the answer to the need for something provocative and thought-provoking on TV. It's full of dynamite. And yet if it sells it will be a surprise. This one looks as though it could be too hot for TV and yet it's something the public should be allowed to see. All sorts of bows go to **Miner** and **NBC** for having the courage to make this film.

Joan Bennett's daughter, Geraldine Brooks, has been dallying with an unsavory character who starts things off by dying in Miss Bennett's Balboa home. Joan tries to hide the body, but her deception is discovered by a group of blackmailers, headed by James Mason, who attempt to shake her down. James falls for the beautiful Joan, however, and finally winds up extricating her from the mess. The picture was shot at the actual locales concerned in the story—Balboa and Los Angeles—and the whole affair has an atmosphere of detached reality which distinguishes it from the run of whodunits.

"Outpost in Morocco." (5) July 31, 7:30. George Raft is an officer in the French Foreign Legion and becomes enamored of the Arab chief's daughter, Marie Windsor. The chief is planning war on the Legion, however, so you can see that Marie suffers a conflict of loyalties. Anyway, there is an attack, the garrison is beleaguered, natch, and everybody is getting pretty thirsty when there is a cloudburst. Those Legionnaires plan things mighty carefully, I can tell you. Well, Raft performs heroically, of course, but he doesn't get the girl... as he actually says at one point, "It'll never work... you and I come from different worlds." If they don't like it here, why don't they go back where they came from? The film was shot in Morocco and director Robert Florey has mercifully concentrated on action and scenery, all of which is quite enjoyable.

"Journey Into Light." (13) Aug. 2, 8:30. This 1951 release makes a soap opera attempt to examine a man's religious redemption and I'm afraid that people of religious conviction will be more offended than heartened by it. Sterling Hayden is a minister whose alcoholic wife interrupts his services

one Sunday morning and as a result Hayden is obliged to resign. His wife then commits suicide in a fit of dipsomania, and, Hayden, spurning the offers of sympathy and help from his former flock, degenerates into a skid-row bum. He is just about through as a man when he is redeemed by his love for Viveca Lindfors, the blind daughter of a slums preacher. Miss Lindfors is a good actress, but she has little chance to prove it here.

"Secret Behind the Door." (9) July 30, 9:30 a.m. Joan Bennett, again, and still mixed up in violence and intrigue. She marries Michael Redgrave, only to discover that he has a morbid interest in murder and might even be planning hers. She runs away and then goes back, for some reason, but I'm pretty sure she's alive at the end. This is the second run of a first run.

"Lady Chaser." (7) Aug. 2, 2:00. Funny title, eh?

This Week in TV

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

"Great Churches" Scores

"Great Churches of the Golden West" celebrates its 200th telecast July 31. These remote telecasts originate from churches representing the six major Protestant faiths throughout the the city.

Since the program's debut, KTTV has taken its viewers to 160 different churches. (Services from some of the larger churches have been televised on three or four occasions.)

Reverend Clifton E. Moore, narrator of the series, says reaction to the program is deeply gratifying. He cites the group of polio patients at the Rancho Los Amigos who are in accord that the Sunday service they all want to watch is the "Great Churches" telecast. Many elderly people who can't travel to church have expressed their appreciation for these services.

"Great Churches" has received letters, unsolicited funds, awards and many other accolades for their fine program. And it looks as though 200 is just a passing mark in their long and expected years of future telecasting.

Bible Appeal

Those who saw "Toast of the Town" last week have had an opportunity to react to the appearance of Mrs. Catherine Kreitzer, of the "\$64,000 Question" fame, reading Bible passages on a variety show.

Ed Sullivan plans to have Mrs. Kreitzer return as a regular guest on "Toast" starting in October. Sullivan explained: "Mrs. Kreitzer is a warm, earthy person and I feel her presence on the program, reading passages from the Bible, will be of great spiritual value to the country. We certainly can stand more knowledge and teachings from the Bible during these confused times and I'm happy to be able to afford her this opportunity."

Viewers are the ones to finally judge whether Bible readings are incongruous on a variety show. Apparently Sullivan doesn't believe there is any conflict.

AFRA Clamps Down

Last April TV-Radio Life covered the controversy of "free" TV appearances by actors to plug their pictures. The lid was taken off the boiling pot when Frank Sinatra refused to appear on an Ed Sullivan show to plug "Guys and Dolls" unless he received compensation. Frank was not in the mood for any trade deals. As a performer he

felt he should be paid for his personal appearances.

AFTRA, the radio-TV union for actors, has finally taken its first step to clamp down on actors making gratis appearances on TV shows. Rules and regulations governing such appearances are being prepared by the national board. The union feels that if an actor appears free on TV, whether it be live or film, he is depriving another actor of a job.

It's reported, however, that AFTRA may follow the action of the SAG (Screen Actor's Guild) insofar as actors who own interests in pictures are concerned, and may grant such waivers.

How this new ruling will affect current "plug-my-picture-for-free" TV appearances will be anyone's guess, for the plug tie-in is natural and obvious with or without compensation.

Cox Comes Through

The Wally Cox incident was finally unsnafued last Wednesday night. Via direct report from the Dunes Hotel, we covered Wally's crucial appearance, July 20, which determined whether or not he would be re-instated to fulfill his four week contract with the Dunes.

Wally, as you undoubtedly know, was fired after three performances because his act flopped with a resounding thud. Letters, wires and phone calls poured into the Dunes protesting the management's action. They decided to give Wally another chance and let the audience be the judge. Ballots were issued to the guests before show time last Wednesday and after his two evening performances there was a total of 962 votes cast, three-to-one in favor of reinstating Wally.

"Mr. Peepers", of course, had revised his act. The previous material that flopped so miserably was an old act he had used at the Greenwich Village Vanguard four or five years ago. Wally's revised act was a satire on himself. Facing the audience with a bundle of newspapers under his arm, he read the "small print" telling of his firing and had a pretty chorus girl show the guests the egg he had laid.

He said he had visited the other night clubs to see what had been wrong with his original act, and while on his tour he picked up some sage advice. Mario Lanza advised him not to show up at all, and a fetching chorine suggested that he don a croupier apron and manage one of the tables for the hotel.

Whether the Dunes will press their \$25,000 misrepresentation suit against the William Morris Agency, who booked Wally into the Dunes, is at present a nebulous point.

There's no doubt, however, that Wally Cox is back at the Dunes to fulfill his four-week's engagement because the guests voted him back in.

It looks as though "Climax!" is determined to scare its viewers during the hot spell and make them forget about the temperatures. First they gave us "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" now they have "Frankenstein" on tap... Cathy Crosby has put her schoolbooks down for show biz training. Instead of returning to school in Switzerland next term, she'll be on the road singing with a name band... Latest of NBC's daytime colorcasts is the "Howdy Doody" series which will be beamed in tint starting September 12.

If Roy Rogers appears vague these days it's because his production company has initiated "compressed" technique and is filming four scripts simultaneously... Sidney Miller must like the other side of the camera, he directs his fourth telepix for the "Damon Runyon" series... Marion Ross is due for more appearances on "Front Row Center" when she finishes her "Proud and Profane" movie stint.

The incomparable Victor Borge has been signed by CBS. Agreement includes two special, one-hour, typical one-man performances as well as guest appearances on other net shows... Dinah Shore kicks off her Fall opener from Flint, Michigan, at the Flint-O-Rama where they expect a crowd of 150,000 people.

One of Milton Berle's colorcasts next season will be a satire written by Gore Vidal in which Berle will be starred with Tallulah Bankhead. It'll be directed by Cyril Ritchard. Berle's ideas on what constitutes a good TV program have certainly changed... Someone finally got the "Range Rider" off his horse. Jock Mahoney has been made an Honorary Member of the Commander Amphibious Group Four, U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

If you want to hear some solid Dixieland music be sure to catch Bob Crosby's "One Night Stand" on "Climax!" August 4. Story is based on a true-life incident of a former Bobcat. Bob, incidentally, "imported" six ex-Bobcats for the "Climax!" stint... Parke Levy, who doesn't like the water, received a sail boat from his wife appropriately titled "The Bride." Maybe Parke will start writing about his wife instead of his mother-in-law in his "December Bride" series.

Garbo on TV? It Could Happen

Hard ridden horse operas and other tired movie sagas now coursing across the nation's TV screens may soon be turned out to permanent pasture.

Garbo, Harlow, Janet Gaynor, Wally Berry, John Barrymore and other screen greats of past and present may appear in motion picture classics on TV screens as the possibility loomed this week that release of old pictures on shelves of major Hollywood film studios may not be too far distant.

Impetus for such speculation took a step nearer reality with the announcement of purchase of Howard Hughes' RKO by General Teleradio for \$25,000,000 (and that's cash!). Nearly 600 old RKO pictures will be released for TV showing.

Major studios have been sitting firmly on the policy of withholding old pictures from TV screens presumably on the basis that a TV-viewer who can command an array of top pictures by the flick of a dial will hardly turn out for screenings of new pictures at neighborhood theatres.

Availability of RKO product for TV is the first break in the solid line of Hollywood majors against release for TV. Whether this factor will cut any ice with MGM, Warner's, Columbia, 20th Century-Fox and others may be classified as crystal-gazing.

Buys Other Property

However, the hard facts are that Thomas F. O'Neil, General Teleradio president and head of Mutual Network, has long championed the idea of films on TV against the live programming of NBC, CBS and ABC. It was O'Neil who recently plunked down \$1,500,000 for Roy Rogers and

Gene Autry films for showing on KHJ and WOR in New York. Over a year ago O'Neil bought forty foreclosed pictures from the Bank of America, establishing a policy of showing one picture every night for a week's run. This has paid off in no uncertain terms—or, "the proof of the pudding is in the profits." And that should be a potent nudge to any profit-minded movie maker.

What About Pay TV?

Another angle that might bestir movie-makers is the growing awareness that TV, rather than hindering box office appeal of pictures, can also serve as a gimmick to stir TV fans from their easy chairs in the direction of theatres. Hollywood promotion men are fast catching on to the sales value of teasing TV viewers by exhibiting clips of about-to-be-released pictures on major telecasts.

Also in the realm of crystal-gazing is the effect of General Teleradio's policy on pay television. Final returns on whether or not the American TV fan will pay for entertainment on his home screen are not yet in, according to polls and other discreet inquiry now score. But whatever the final result on this debate—one thing's for sure: audiences will pay to see their favorite stars, whatever the vintage, as may be seen from attendance of Garbo's "Camille" now playing in Los Angeles area neighborhood theatres.

And it just might be that a chain reaction from General Teleradio's proposed release of RKO pictures may eventually bring Garbo to your home screen. Stranger things than that have happened in TV!

Notes to You

Fuel for the fires of nostalgia were provided this week with the availability once again of many unusual and historic long-play records on the Heritage label. The whole series arrived on the market just in time to program many of the selections on our new NBC Network program, **TURN BACK THE CLOCK** (KFI, 3:30-4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday).

Heritage is to be commended for its variety and quality of the selections, many available for the first time. For instance there's "TRYOUT"—a series of private rehearsal recordings and actual performances by KURT WEILL (piano and vocal) and IRA GERSHWIN (vocal), features songs from "ONE TOUCH OF VENUS" and "WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?"



Technically, these are not of hi-fi quality, but rather were recorded prior to the opening of the shows in the privacy of the composers' studios. As such, they are unique to the point of overlooking any flaw in the recordings, for they were recorded so that the producer could have some idea of the music.

"GERSHWIN PLAYS GERSHWIN" is another Heritage LP which is historically priceless, giving one pause to re-evaluate the original songs of George Gershwin through his own delightful piano interpretations. Memories of "Oh, Kay!" (1925), "Lady Be Good" (1924) "Tip Toes" (1925) become a living reality once again, as does the actual speaking voice of Gershwin with Fred and Adele Astaire singing and dancing on these private recordings of the roaring 20s. . . . Other LPs in this composer's series spotlight the songs of W. C. Handy, Harold Rome, and the very funny Comden and Green all singing their own musical successes.

"IF I'M ELECTED" is a nostalgic panorama of our times, with the actual voices of our Presidents—and their opponents—from 1892 to the present, beautifully tied together by the narration of JOHN CARRADINE. Again, as is to be expected, many of these early recordings were crude waxings from speeches in political campaigns, dinner speeches, etc.—but one gains a clearer insight into the political aims of each and what will happen "if I'm elected." —A.M.

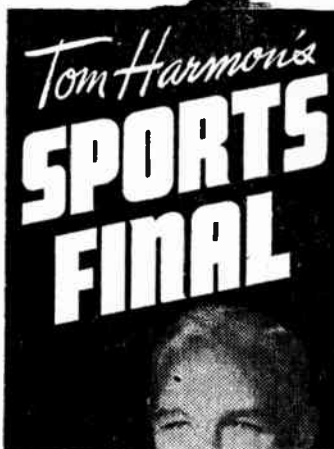
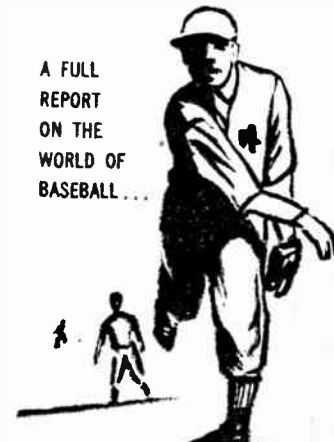
11:15 p.m., 11:30 p.m. and 11:45 p.m.—the final stanza concluding at midnight.

Jim's Corner

When you say a football game is being "simulcast," the average radio or TV listener thinks: "Sounds like a real technical bit. What's it mean?"

I bring it up now because Bob Kelley will be doing several simulcasts of Ram games this fall, with the radio portion being aired over Mutual Don Lee and KHJ. The first is the Ram-Pittsburgh Steeler meeting from Portland, August 6.

Frankly, you don't have to be a mechanical whiz like Mutual Don Lee's Sports Director, Tony LaFrano, to know what a simulcast is.

It's just what it sounds like . . . the radio and television call of the game being done simultaneously by the same man. Take Old Kel, up there in Portland, on August 6, for instance. (In fact, I know a few people who would like to take Old Kel up to Portland—and leave him there.) Kelley's call of the game will be the same for fans tuned to TV sets or to KHJ radio. Naturally, there are problems.

In the early days of sports telecasts, it was a fad not to "talk too much." In fact, these were the orders from upstairs to the sports announcers.



"People can see what's going on," they were told. "They'll get insulted if you explain to them what they're seeing."

Of course, these front-office geniuses overlooked a matter of human psychology. Go out to the Coliseum some time when 100,000 fans are watching Notre Dame and USC play. When they leave the stadium, these are the first to buy newspapers and find out what happened, or turn on their radios to listen to a summary of the game.

The point being, you can't tell people enough. Some years ago, before the coming of the glib Bill Brundige, people used to watch baseball games on TV, but turn the audio down, and listen to Kelley's radio call. They wanted more details than the television announcer was giving them.

Getting back to football, Kelley says he'll follow the same principle on a simulcast that he would if he were broadcasting the game only for radio. Plenty of yak, in other words.

"When I did a simulcast of the Ram games about three years ago," Old Kel explains, "I handled it that way. And we never got a single kick from TV fans for talking too much."

"I'm convinced you can't talk too much," he added. "Oh, maybe you can in boxing where there are only two men, and the viewer can see every punch. But football is a little different. I've been broadcasting pro-games for seventeen years, and I'll admit even with my spotters, O.W.L. and J.P.H., it's impossible to see everything."

Isn't there any disadvantage to a simulcast, in comparison to separate calls for both radio and TV?

"Yes," Old Kel concedes. "There's one thing you can't do when you're being heard on radio, too. You can't say, for instance: 'That's Tom Fears flanked wide at the lower left corner of your screen.' That would be needling the radio listeners a little."

Anyway, football isn't far away. It's the Rams and Fort Ord with Bill Welsh, July 30 on KHJ, then the season really gets rolling when Kelley heads to Portland for the Ram-Pittsburgh simulcast, August 6th.

And I was just kidding. I hope they don't leave him there.

fully aware that the time element is a tricky one . . . that when the zero hour comes, "ready or not" . . . the telecast must go on. "But when you see the hands of that clock moving around, and when that hard lump of fear gets ahold of your heart, you look out from your place in the control room and you get a certain sort of feeling . . . a feeling that this show is going to jell. Even your very fingertips seem to have electrical impulses going out from them. This feeling is worth all the ulcers in the world!"

EVERYBODY seems to love Betty White. You'll get few arguments on that. Everyone believes she has talent. And this poses a natural question—just why, then, has her TV career been as erratic as it has?

Her "Life With Elizabeth," seen locally on KTTV, has been popular throughout the country. It almost reached hit proportions—but didn't quite make the golden circle. Her NBC-TV show of last year had large audience appeal and then it was canceled.

And everyone kept right on asking, "What's happened to Betty? Why isn't she on TV?"

As for what's happened to this really delightful girl, Betty had a few answers herself.

New Show

"During the summer at least I'll be on the new NBC panel show in New York called 'Make Your Connections,'" Betty said warmly. "And this is a real thrill. Goodson-Todman, who produced 'What's My Line,' are producing this one. I'm still dazed by the fact that they asked me to be on the panel. They had seen my NBC show and decided I was right for this new program. However, I didn't want to spend the summer in New York, so they agreed to let me fly back and forth each week to do the show. This means I'll fly to New York on a Wednesday and fly back Thursday night, but I don't mind. I love planes anyway."

Whether or not this show stays on after the summer hiatus is still problematical. But even if it does Betty may not remain with it because of other plans being worked out.

When Betty was asked for a comment about her ex-NBC show she smiled, "I love it. This is the kind of program I want to do. The people at NBC were simply wonderful to me, but no network can keep a program on indefinitely without a sponsor.

"I certainly place no blame on NBC,

but it is true that the show was moved to different times so much that it was hard to build a steady audience. Each time we moved we had to build an audience again."

But even with such obstacles, the program still had a good rating and was very successful as far as audience reaction is concerned.

"When the show was over I was just lost," Betty went on. "For months I had been complaining to Don Fedderson, who has been responsible for the breaks I've had on TV, about wanting a vacation. Well, it wasn't long until I went in to him and said, 'Don, I don't ever want another vacation.' He said he'd record that statement for future use.

"The weeks after the show wound up were frightful. I'd been so used to being on the go every minute that I couldn't adjust myself to having time on my hands. Gradually, though, I realized I needed a rest and I decided to take it easy. This feeling lasted about three weeks and then I got itchy again. I can't wait now to get back to that hectic routine—and in another daytime show, I hope.

"During this layoff NBC had a few other ideas for shows for me. One was an audience participation kind of program but I didn't want to do it because I just don't feel comfortable

doing this type of show. It's not in my line. Now, there are some good things in the offing and I'm keeping my fingers crossed. I may continue doing 'Life With Elizabeth' and I may not. Frankly, I'd like to try something different now since I've made so many 'Elizabeth' films."

Private Life

There's not much change in Betty's private life now. And there's still nothing new on the romantic horizon for her. She's playing that department with caution.

"About the only change in my private life is that I've had difficulty getting used to so much spare time," Betty remarked with a wide grin. "I'd be out on a date and would catch myself glancing at my watch. I used to have to be in so early early in order to be ready for my TV show the next day. It took me a while to realize I could stay out a little later now that I had no show to rush to. I found I could also make engagements a week ahead—something I'd never been able to do before. These changes were indeed pleasant, I assure you."

So—this is what has happened to Betty White. The future looks very good for her. After all, you can't hide a talent and a personality like hers for long. Only the best should and will happen to this Miss White girl.

Don't Be A Witch Hunter

If you're seeing Communists under every bush, hold on to your hats. Don't think that you can do a better job than the FBI.

GHERE'S NO WAY to tell if a person is a Communist, so don't assume anyone is on mere hearsay. In short, don't be a self-styled vigilante!"

Such were the challenging words of Richard Carlson, who plays Herbert Philbrick on KTTV's exciting "I Led Three Lives."

In this day when it's common practice to *think* that someone is a Communist this is sobering advice. And it does not come just from Richard Carlson. It comes from Herbert Philbrick, who had worked for the FBI and from the FBI itself.

Who Is A Commie?

"In our show," Dick Carlson went on, "we make Communists simple people. For example, on one program a man who was a market operator turned out to be a Commie. We have learned there are no set rules by which to judge a person a Communist. The Commies are much too clever to be catalogued by any set of characteristics. We are even careful that no one particular race is set up as a Communist type.

"So what do you do if you *think* someone is questionable? Well, Herbert Philbrick found the answer to that. He was on the Junior Vestry of his church and he began to question the extra-curricular activities of certain lay members of the church. He contacted the FBI who then, after investigation, asked him to work for them as an under-cover agent.

"Naturally, not everyone is going



to be thrown into such a position. The FBI and Philbrick both feel that if you suspect someone of being Communist then you go to the head of the organization, if he's a member of a union or some such organization, and present your facts. If this gets you nowhere, then your best bet is to contact the FBI office. But under no circumstances should you go around spreading the rumors that so and so is a Communist—unless you have proof that can be backed up under the most merciless kind of investigation.

"Put don't let anyone kid you that the Communists are no longer a vi-

tal issue. A friend of mine said recently that he didn't consider 'I Led Three Lives' as valid since there was no longer a Communist party. *This* is completely untrue. It is just, according to Herbert Philbrick, that the Commies have gone underground and have thereby made the work of the FBI twice as difficult.

"Fighting Communism is no tea party. It is a fight for the FBI—not for rumor mongers. We hope that through 'I Led Three Lives,' people will ask themselves 'Would I like to be called a Communist?' And then treat their neighbors with the same consideration."

THE PUBLIC is like a fickle woman; an entertainer has to constantly figure out how to fascinate his audience." This was handsome Dick Contino's reply when he was asked if audiences in various parts of the country differed, and what comprised his most ardent fan section.

Dick, who recently started a live television show, believes that his appeal is fairly universal, though when pressed he will also admit that he is the target of many a girlish crush, love notes and sometimes threats. Recently a young lady in another part of the state, who was convinced she was deeply in love with the nimble-fingered squeeze-box player, threatened desperate measures if he failed to meet her on a San Francisco street corner.

"The heart is a tremendous thing," Dick stated seriously. By this he ex-

plained that he gives each fan or problem his sincere, individual attention. He has never made it a point to laugh off even a crackpot message because he feels that it is truly important to the sender.

Mature

According to young Contino he is playing better than ever before in his life. He backs up all of his instrumental know-how and technique with something he didn't have eight years ago when he blazed into the spotlight on Horace Heidt's youth discovery program. This important but elusive asset is an understanding of his audiences . . . their moods and their responses to his music.

When Dick was doing so much to keep morale high in the Far East by entertaining his buddies, he learned to program his numbers according to the atmosphere surrounding the men. "If I was playing for some fellows I knew were going to try to take a hill the next day, and I knew that probably one-third of them would never come back, I always started off with a bang, played 'Lady of Spain' or some other lively number. 'White Christmas' or songs like that were for the fellows who were back from the combat lines," he recalled.

When Dick came back from his overseas duties in January, 1954, he was determined to get out on the road and make good in re-establishing his career. He first played in Vancouver, B. C., then came back to the Mocambo, one of his last stands before he shipped out. These appearances were followed by a cross-country tour lasting thirteen months. He also went into the Las Vegas Flamingo at \$5,500 a week . . . almost \$2,000 more than he was receiving for appearances before serving overseas. In fact he turned down a three-year deal with the hotel which would escalate his earnings to \$10,000 a week the final season. Instead, he hopes to be rating the \$10,000 weekly *before* three years. His new television show, which he is fervently hoping will soon go coast to coast, is another step toward his very ambitious goals.

Improvements

Dick is now playing a Soprani accordion which is his own special Contino model. This model is being sold retail. Dick's \$2,700 instrument, however, has some special features . . . reinforced bellows, special reeds, and light-weight inner construction. "The manufacturer incorporated some of my ideas in this Contino model," Dick explained. "One of them is an air rod instead of an air button. When I am playing I can release air from the accordion without having to take my hands from the keys. My model also has forty-three keys instead of forty-one . . . A E flat and B natural have been added to the treble." This new accordion supplants the \$2,200 one which Dick has been playing ever since he gave up the original \$400 instrument on which he first played. The lifetime of one of his accordions is only six

months. He practices two hours daily, plus all of his appearances.

What many of Dick's fans do not know is that he is an accomplished pianist. He is doing quite a bit of piano playing and singing in his new routines. He is also very skilled with drums including bongo; clarinet, saxophone and several other instruments. Unlike Liberace, the twenty-five-year-old Dick does not care for fancy clothes. He prefers to perform in casual and sports things.

Currently he is living at home with his father and mother, married sister Josephine and her husband and their nine-months-old Mary Ann, his younger brother Victor, who has just completed a hitch in the Navy, and small brother Peter.

Though Dick is the romantic type and attracts attention from ladies all the way from middle-age down to teen-age, he is still looking for someone to be Mrs. Contino. He has more or less come to the conclusion that his ideal girl will not be a professional entertainer. He wants a wife who will settle down to raise a big family. He also adheres to the Old World idea that the husband is master of the house. "I think most women prefer it this way," Dick said. Meanwhile, until he finds "Miss Right" Dick will continue pursuit of the fickle woman known as "the public," trying to find out ways and means of pleasing and fascinating her. "Of course," he said, "I'm still in the process of learning how to fascinate. There are performers like Hope and Durante who have gotten the American public to fall in love with them. When you can do that you're home free!"

NO, LOVELY JOAN WELDON did not compete in the California relays at Modesto, California, last May, but high jumper Ernie Shelton of the University of Southern California did and he came away with "jumping" honors.

LONG, SULTRY, summer Sunday afternoons have but one connotation for Sam Pierce . . . master-minding two-hours of CBS' "On A Sunday Afternoon" on radio.

Sandy-haired Sam confesses that he's pitching for the vast Sunday listening audiences, who are constantly on the move roaming the highways. The radio veteran has devised a potpourri of informal music, songs, news flashes, ball scores and safety messages.

"I try to keep the program varied musically too," Pierce comments. "Radio audiences are extremely discriminating. They know their music, and they know it well. We try to build our music around a story, using a news event, personalities, seasons or special occasions. Presenting about forty songs, interspersed with the other facets of the show, and showcasing them differently is quite a challenge. I glean ideas from news-

papers. This goes back to my early newspaper training. Before entering the radio fold, I worked for a news service agency.

"Personalities always offer splendid material around which to build a show. Noel Coward's recent Las Vegas debut inspired a script built around his medley of songs. The old 'Porgy and Bess' Company now touring Europe with 'Opera Blues,' an array of Johnny Mercer and Harold Arlen tunes suggested the idea of a Mercer and Arlen segment for our show. Fortunately, Johnny Mercer happened to be in town and was able to appear as our guest.

Cast

"'On A Sunday Afternoon' has such a wonderful cast that it's an incentive to find the right spots for their talents. Byron Palmer is a great singing host. He handles his singing and narration with equally pleasing results. Joan Weldon is not only pretty but she sings like a bird. As far as the Pied Pipers are concerned, here's a sextette that has no peer. Then we have Lud Gluskin and his twenty-five piece orchestra and the well-rounded personality of Tom Hanlon who handles the sports news. This is radio! This is live radio where we do a show without the benefit of tape editing. I've been in the broadcasting industry for twenty-four years and live radio has an appeal and excitement all its own.

"The biggest kick I get at the end of a good broadcast is the feeling that we've another one under our belts. This feeling of gratification lessens the stress and strain of writing and producing a live show and gives me the necessary lift to come back and tackle the next show." (In addition to "On A Sunday Afternoon," Sam also produces "Amos 'n' Andy Music Hall.")

Credits

A mere glance at Sam Pierce's credits is enough to convince anyone that this man really knows his radio. He's been associated with many top network shows and Sam has worked with practically every name in the entertainment registry. Paris has a special appeal for him, and the one program that he recalls with deep affection is the former airer "This Is Paris" which he taped in gay Patee. While in Paris he also wrote, produced and co-directed the Maurice Chevalier series. Someday he hopes to return to Paris and film a TV series.

In the meantime the native Californian is staying pretty close to home where he can handle his CBS
