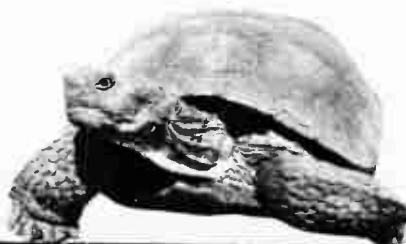

IT'S A *New Life* FOR THEM

THE ONE WOMAN MILTON BERLE can never forget is his mother. She passed away some time back but her influence on "Uncle Miltie" is almost a legend now. The NBC star is beginning a new series of shows with Esther Williams as his first guest. ▶

WET OR DRY. Esther Williams should make a sizable dent on TV. And it is proof that Milton Berle is one of the sharper showmen, that he was first to nab the movie beauty for her TV debut.

And yet, it is even more interesting that Esther and "Uncle Miltie" will hit the screen together because both are finding their careers undergoing some dramatic changes.

Esther was sitting by the pool at her house—dressed in a black bathing suit—looking very contented with life in general and enthusiastic about making her first dip into television.

"I've always had such admiration for Milton," Esther remarked, "that I am very happy to be working with him on this show. I want to be with him because of the wonderful way in which he handles his guests—plus the fact that his ideas are so good.

"I'd been approached before to do TV but couldn't accept offers because of my contract with MGM. Also, I didn't feel that any of the shows suggested were right for me. I had a fear, too, of doing any show 'dry' because I thought people would be disappointed if I didn't turn up wet somewhere along the line. With Milton, though, I'm not worrying. Wet or dry—he'll see that my TV debut will be pleasant and not a harrowing experience.

"I'm also glad to be doing this show because it will be done in color. I had always felt I should do color first, even though many people will see it in black and white. The fact that the executives would see it in color seemed important to me."

Esther's entrance into TV isn't the only change in her life and career. She is embarking on a new kind of work—and is realizing a dream of many years.

"My husband, Ben, and I had long wanted to do a tour with an Aquacade," Esther went on. "We had thought of this some years back. In fact, it was written into my contract at MGM that I could take time off for an Aquacade tour. However, there was no definite time stated as to when I would do such a show.

"Ben and I finally worked out all the details. We plan to go to Europe with our Aquacade show from April of next year to October. I realized

it would be difficult for MGM to consider any picture for me with such a schedule, so I suggested that the studio and I work out a new deal. I am making three pictures in five years for them in contrast to my former deal."

MGM graciously agreed to this new contract although it must have been a painful move to make. Esther had been with the studio for fourteen years and had grossed over \$85,000,000 for them.

Esther, Ben and their children plus a company of 250, will make three tours. The first will be in Europe, lasting six months. After that there will be a tour of fifty-seven cities in the United States, followed by another tour of the Orient. In between and even while she's abroad, Esther will manage to make a few pictures. This is certainly a change for a girl who has always worked in one place.

"I hope to do more TV later—and if possible I may do a few versions of some of the less spectacular numbers I did in pictures. I also want to do a straight dramatic program on TV before I leave for Europe—an all-dry performance," Esther added with a laugh. "Maybe I can subtly convince people that I can do something besides swim. It's not that I have any yearning for an Oscar but I want to do what will promote the longest career for me. I can't go on treading water all my life."

Such is the way the future looks for Esther.

It is equally interesting to look ahead with Milton Berle.

For the last few years, Miltie has been cutting down on the number of shows he has been doing a year. For the first four years he did thirty-nine shows plus the same number of radio programs. He gradually cut this to thirty-six, then to twenty-six, and finally to twenty. He only wanted to make nine this year but then came the decision to do his programs in color and thirteen was the

round figure settled on. His new series of shows will be the first major series to run regularly in color with one star sustaining all of the productions.

"We're going to use guest stars on each program," Miltie said enthusiastically. It was good to see him so relaxed and so obviously contented. Before, he had been on a treadmill, emotionally and physically. He was trying to do too much, but refused to take it easy. Now he's enjoying the change of pace.

"You want to know why I'm happy?" he asked. "Why have I no ulcers? Why I'm not nervous. I can tell you—it's Ruth, my wife. She has really given me a new life."

Miltie will not direct all of his shows now as was his habit before. He will concentrate primarily on the musicals. No two productions will be the same. He'll jump from a satirical comedy to a revue to a straight drama.

"It will be like making thirteen separate pictures but we'll be doing them 'live,'" Miltie remarked earnestly. "We're not trying to do any 'spectaculars.' We prefer to call them 'opening night events.'"

Certainly no one in the business knows more about TV production than Milton Berle. He wasn't the king-pin of the channels for so many years without reason. Today he commands very real respect from those who appreciate all that he has done for television—and from those who know his undeniable talent.

Because of his experience, it was inevitable that Miltie was asked what a comic had to have now if he were to last on TV.

"A TV comic needs style, style, style, style, style," Milton said sincerely and with emphasis. "He doesn't have to depend on a joke but he does have to depend on his own ingratiating personality. Don't forget—a comic has to be liked before he can be laughed at. And to stay on TV week after week he has to become like a member of your family. This is not an easy thing to do either. It takes work, guts, and talent. Let's hope that some of today's new comics remember that."

The "new" Milton Berle is a happy guy, a confident performer, and a man who looks ahead with an attitude of "It's great to be alive." He and Esther Williams have carved out enviable futures for themselves.

This Guy is Devine



ANDY DEVINE is really a busy man these days. Not only is he co-starring with Guy Madison in "Wild Bill Hickok" but he recently took over his new show, "Andy's Gang." This is the successor to "Smilin' Ed's Gang," a program cut short when its creator, Smilin' Ed, died.

Andy was more than surprised when offered the show but excited about the opportunity to work directly for kids . . . he got the nod as a result of his work as "Jingles" on "Wild Bill Hickok."

For a man as heavy as he is (he weighs 285 pounds), Andy manages to be very active. He has been honorary mayor of Van Nuys for nineteen years, serving the community as a combination publicity man and domestic relations counselor. Devoting much time to helping his neigh-

hors, he has even saved some marriages for people in his town.

Andy has a knack for understanding people and his sharp wit has saved many a ticklish situation. An acquaintance tried to commit suicide a few years ago by shooting himself with a gun. He recovered from the wound but was deeply depressed. No one could bring him out of it. Andy visited the man and said casually, "You were never a very good shot anyhow." The man broke up laughing.

Andy indulges in skiing, hunting, skeet shooting, orchid raising, and managing a tavern in Big Bear. He has a hard time making anyone believe he is serious when he wants to be. He blames his voice; "It doesn't make any difference what the subject is—war, politics, economics or gin rummy, the minute I try to tell my views everybody thinks I'm being funny."

He's been an actor for thirty years. He used to play romantic roles at one time, but when sound came in his voice took care of that. A director gave him a chance at comedy. That did it.

He was married in 1933 to Dorothy Irene House. They have two sons, "Tad," and Dennis . . . Yes, Andy has quite a gang of his own.

Lifelines

FIREMEN SLIDING DOWN THEIR poles couldn't hold a candle to the **Meet Millie** cast and crew for jumping into the breach last week and putting a television show on the air after everyone had thought the series was axed. On Friday, as a new program called **Joe and Mabel** was supposed to supplant Millie on Tuesday, the Millie gang received a hurry-up call to telecast.

ELENA VERDUGO HAD HER BAGS all packed for Alaska. **Marvin Kaplan** had booked passage for Europe. Producer-director **Lester Vail** had taken off for New York. **Florence Halop** had taken to her bed—sick.

VAIL PLANED IN FROM MANHATTAN Sunday and the reassembled cast and crew worked feverishly. **Florence** shook her sick bed, but wasn't able to carry the full load of her regular part, so **Bea Benadaret** was written into the script for **Aunt Rose's** role. The whole production was a fierce challenge to which the entire company responded vigorously. Viewers, who had swamped CBS-TV with complaints because **Millie** was going off the air, certainly didn't mind the actors using cue cards in view of the extremely short rehearsal.

IT'S THRILLING TO SEE SHOW BUSINESS people rise to the occasion the way the **Millie** group did. And here's the happy ending: the show will be on for at least thirteen more weeks. I can't accept the reason given for **Joe and Mabel's** non-appearance—that the film strike in New York fouled up the series' production. That hassle was some weeks ago and to my knowledge, no other show has been scheduled and then suddenly yanked at the last minute on that account.

I'M AFRAID I'M THE KIND OF person who wants to believe the good about someone until that someone proves to the contrary. So all right, last week's paragraph about **Frank Sinatra**, reporting on his co-operative-ness at "**Our Town's**" rehearsals, was correct only up to press time. Then the Unpredictable Voice disappointed this cock-eyed optimist by failing to show up for two dress rehearsals. While the rest of the cast stood around waiting and then went on without Mr. S., NBC had to postpone pictures until Monday, when **Sinatra** did show for final dress rehearsal. I can't find out as yet whether or not he did have the sore throat he claimed. But there's not much argument about the show being tops.

KFI IS BEING NON-COMMITTAL about NBC's projected schedule to streamline Monday through Friday programming after the new **Monitor** format. Everyone I've talked with seems in favor of the week-end **Monitor** program which has been rolling since last June. Listeners have welcomed it as a fresh concept in radio and have been elated that the fluid approach to **Monitor's** programming has made for easier and mo'e in-

triguing radio listening.

THE RUB WITH LOCAL NBC OUTLETS going all the way with **Monitor** is that their own commercial programming is minimized. They receive their apportioned share of **Monitor** advertising money, but to them it's not the same as having a regular show sold locally. Proposed plan for the network is to start the **Monitor**-type schedules November 7, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Of course any local station can take what it wants of **Monitor**, darting in and out of the show to service local sponsors. **KFI's Charles Hamilton**, manager of the station, told **TV-Radio Life** last week, "**KFI** will give full consideration to the **Monitor** plan when a definite schedule of **Monitor** is determined."

CBS RADIO, I'VE BEEN TOLD, is mulling similar programming. This, to me, is a very significant development in the industry and one of the most important things to come along since the bars were let down to allow transcriptions on the airways.

WHEN THE \$64,000 QUESTION debuts on radio Tuesday, Nov. 1, it will be a simulcast with the TV show... Actress **Helen Gerald**, who spent a busy summer working steadily in New York, is here vacationing (though I'd venture to say that if the right part came along in Hollywood she'd shake her lazy bones and dabble in a little more work)... I'm glad **Glamour Girl** is coming back on the air with **Jack McCoy**.

AT THE FANCY LUNCHEON AT the Beverly Hilton to celebrate National Radio and Television Week, the head table had a big-time line-up including **Dr. Lee de Forest**, who received a standing ovation. **Ronald Reagan** was very pat as emcee, **Paul G. Hoffman** predicted that there would be a boom in "second set" TV sales "if the networks keep on putting big shows against one another" and **Art Linkletter** cracked that he had a new show, "Retire for Life—if you know your name you'll get an oil well!"

Bob Finkel can take a deep bow for his initial chore of directing and staging an **M&L** epic. Veteran **Ernie Glucksman** kept the production at top level and bandsman **Dick Stabile's** musical backing was, as always, the finest. M.R.

Off Lens (Personalities)

Dan O'Herlihy

That old devil, "type casting," the bugaboo of many a fine film actor in the past years, is on the run today, according to **Dan O'Herlihy**. And the reason for this healthy change, the actor asserts, is television.

O'Herlihy points out that when he was first cast as **Robinson Crusoe**, for which role he was an **Academy Award** nominee in the recent **Oscar** derby, friends were full of warnings. They told him that after giving out with so colorful a characterization, he would be typed as a bearded character for the rest of his film career.

"But no such thing has happened," says **Dan**. "I am continually offered different roles—from a riverboat gambler to a heroic lover, an American tourist in Mexico to a gartered knight. This I owe, I feel, to the work I've done on TV, to the variety of roles I've had the good fortune to play for the video viewer."

On television **O'Herlihy** has been seen in recent months in poignantly romantic and heroic veins on the top live shows, **Climax**, **Lux Video Theatre**, and the **U.S. Steel Hour**, among others.

An interesting point about **O'Herlihy's** career is that he has not yet won the girl in any of his movie roles, yet he has been the romantic victor in every one of his television appearances. Another unusual fact is that **Dan** has worn a total of 25 sets of beards for his movie roles. He has yet to don whiskers on television.

"Television offers any actor a chance to expand his performing muscles and to demonstrate his versatility," **Dan** assures us. "It encourages 'offbeat' and fresh casting concepts. Never before have actors been afforded such opportunities to demonstrate their ability to play radically different roles. Television has been in this respect the greatest boon for actors and a tremendously valuable testing ground for the motion picture industry."

Because the East Coast remains on Extended Daylight Time through the five-week period between September 25 and October 29, we viewers on the West Coast are going to be subjected to slightly confusing time schedules.

Inasmuch as the networks will operate on the Eastern Daylight Time premise, Standard Timers are going to have to watch TV-Radio Life's logs very closely.

Generally, film and kinned shows will be seen at their normal times. For the most part it'll be the live shows that are affected by the four-hour difference in time.

On KNXT, for example, the entire group of live programs normally seen from 7:00 a.m. through 2:00 p.m. is being moved back to the 6:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. time slot. All programs in that time block will be seen one hour earlier beginning with Panorama Pacific at 6:00 a.m. and ending with On Your Account at 1:00 p.m.

The 1:00-2:00 p.m. slot left vacant by this shift will be occupied by feature films for the five-week period.

Other temporary changes include: What's My Line, 6:30 p.m., and Lassie, 7:30 p.m., both on Sundays. Person to Person moves to 6:30 p.m. and Adventures of Champion goes on at 7:30 p.m., on Fridays.

Gillette Fights will be televised on NBC one hour earlier (Fridays, 6:00 p.m.). The NBC Spectaculars will also be seen one hour earlier than their usual time, which means 4:00 p.m. for the Monday Producer Showcase

and 5:00 p.m. for the Saturday or Sunday Specs.

If the television industry doesn't do something about this mess the American public might go back to reading and other diversions. Books, records and hobbies aren't subject to daylight and standard time schedules.

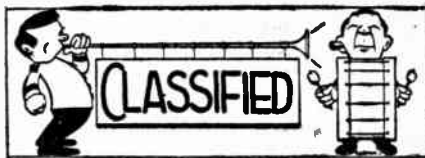

Tops from the sound tracks this week is "Oklahoma" (Capitol) with its all-star cast from the Todd-AO film spectacular that includes Gordon MacRae, Gloria Grahame, Gene Nelson, Charlotte Greenwood and Shirley Jones. From the opening overture through its rousing finale, this is recording of the highest calibre and fidelity, exactly as it is performed on the screen. Listening to these great Rodgers and Hammerstein hits again, one can easily understand why "Oklahoma" with its record of 2248 continuous performances remains to this day one of the all-time great musicals.



Turning Back the Clock to the 30s (if we might inject a reminder for our 8:45 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. daily KFI radio programs) "The Best of Fred Astaire" (Epic) offers eleven great songs introduced in pictures of that era by this master

showman. Although Astaire's voice will never be a serious threat to concert singers, he knows how to blend taste, intelligence and emotion with his singing. "Foggy Day" . . . "They All Laughed" . . . "Cheek To Cheek" . . . "They Can't Take That Away From Me" and the others are truly "the best of Fred Astaire," with some fine tap dancing thrown in for good measure. . . .

If New Orleans Jazz died that night in 1917 when they closed its Storyville, George Lewis and His New Orleans Stompers never heard about it. Listen to these boys go on Volume 3 of a Blue Note LP and you fans who love that Deep South Sound will be in your glory, and looking for the first two discs. Listening to "Mahogany Hall," "See See Rider" and "Walking With the King," you somehow get the feeling that if New Orleans Jazz is dead, somebody forgot to lock the gate . . . for here it is again, as alive as the day it was born. . . . HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

TV turned out a noble job in its production of "Our Town." The Producers Showcase offering was a stand-out from every direction and it was possibly the best thing ever to be done on television. At least, it ranked, in this columnist's mind, along with such notable stalwarts as Peter Pan and the Ford 50th Anniversary Show. "Our Town" has always been something of a classic in the American theater but never had it seemed as effective as it did on the NBC production. It is a play that delves into the lives of ordinary people with the most intimate of detail—and TV, an intimate medium itself, was the perfect showcase for the Thornton Wilder play. Frank Sinatra was just about perfect as the stage manager. His relaxed, easy manner was the ideal balance for the more emotional moments. He seemed in complete command at all times. It is said that Frank didn't show up for all the rehearsals. Well, if this is so he showed up enough to deliver a fine performance. Eva Marie Saint was not only charming, she also gave further proof that she is one of our finer young actresses. Seldom has any actress projected such sensitivity and such warmth as did Miss Saint. Paul Newman, however, was the one weak cog. He seemed wooden and actorish next to Frank and Eva Marie Saint. His attempt to appear young was generally unconvincing since he somehow had the idea that all young fellows react to emotion with tears. His weepy performance was simply artificial. Ernest Truex and Paul Hartman were, as usual, excellent. Delbert Mann, director, and Fred Coe, producer, finally showed what TV can do—and they deserve all possible bows.



Loretta Young made her first appearance since her long illness at a party recently given by her close friend, Helen Ferguson. Loretta looked very well, considering her terrific siege. She seemed tanned and there was that Young sparkle in her eyes. She was very anxious to get back to work but, wisely, she was making no move to return to her show until the doctors said she could. As she put it, "There's no point in my rushing into anything now. I've learned that I have plenty of time and that when it's right for me to start work again I'll be back in front of those cameras." Loretta, who is one of this town's most genuine and likable people, was very grateful for all the letters she received from fans and for the efforts of other stars who pinch-hit for her while she was ill. It's good to know that Loretta will soon be back because she has been missed. And everyone is hop-

ing that she will not again get back into the pressure and tension that are dynamite to any performer on TV.

To go back to Our Town, several letters have come to this desk begging someone to make a change in time for the Producers Showcase shows. This is indeed a logical gripe. Who can see a production here at the ungodly hour of 5 p.m.? Half of the people aren't home from work yet. And if they are most of them are busy preparing dinner. It is a bit stupid of thinking that persists in giving top drawer productions to the West Coast at a ridiculous time. After all, we're as TV conscious here as New York is—and just as anxious to see good shows as is the Big City. The emphasis on pleasing New York, on making it the focal point of attention is shortsighted and may wind up seriously affecting the number of viewers for such productions on the coast. With all the promising shows coming up, something should be done—and fast—to rectify this situation.

Anna Maria Alberghetti and her family tossed an Italian dinner at Abruzzi's restaurant to announce their signing with the Colgate show. They will do five productions, Martin and Lewis will do five, and the rest will be spectaculars. It is evident that NBC is out to take some of Ed Sullivan's ratings, and it's going to be quite a fight. Ed has recently plugged two lousy pictures on his show—"The Girl Rush" and "Gentlemen Marry Brunettes." The latter picture, starring Jane Russell and Jeanne Crain with Alan Young and produced by Robert Waterfield, is just about the worst picture ever made. It is so bad it made "The Girl Rush" look good. Ed had better screen his films before he goes out on a limb and plugs them. He can lose a lot of audience that way. Anyway, whatever you do and regardless of Ed's plug, stay away from "Gentlemen Marry Brunettes."

The Great Gildersleeve TV show finally hit the channels after quite a delay. It's an amusing little effort, one that won't tax your energy or powers of concentration too much and can give you some laughs. It's not the most exciting effort but it is pleasant enough entertainment. Willard Waterman carries on in the style that made him famous on radio, and Barbara Stewart and Stephanie Griffin add curves to the proceedings—plus some talent.

According to all advance reports, the Du Pont Cavalcade show of October 4 will feature a play that has drawn raves from those who have seen it in rough cut. Called "Toward Tomorrow," it deals with the life of Dr. Ralph Bunche and his grandmother's influence on his career. It is said to be inspiring, highly emotional, and TV at its best. It is, incidentally, the first show with an all-Negro cast, outside of Amos 'n' Andy—at least to my recollection. Anyway—catch it.

KNXT's Cavalcade of Records Proves a Point

There's no security in being a musical "crew cut"—there's just as many "long hairs."

ON SUNDAY, September 25, Station KNXT, already known for its high quality (and quantity) of educational programming, added yet another cultural plum to its video basket when Cavalcade of Records premiered on Channel 2 at 4:00-4:30 p.m.

Featuring the "whiz kids" of the musical world, Ethel Longstreet and Leo Kepler, as co-moderators, the program has set about the melodious task of presenting on television classical and semi-classical recordings and the composers, conductors and artists who have made them possible.

"All very well, but what kind of an audience will this type of show have?" a few have asked. "Long hair" stuff. Strictly for egg heads," a few others have quipped half-suspecting, perhaps, that there was a gap in their reasoning through which they could push a grand piano.

Cavalcade of Records' co-moderators put their shoulders to that task with the following figures:

Last year, approximately \$200,000,000 worth of records were sold to the American public. **EXACTLY HALF OF THAT WAS SPENT FOR CLASSICAL AND SEMI-CLASSICAL RECORDINGS.**

During the same 12 months, that same record-buying public bought more admissions to concerts and other musical events than they did tickets to the ball park. In short, there are just as many musical "long hairs" as there are musical "crew cuts" . . . those who feel it "isn't the thing to do" to enjoy the "Three B's" (Bach, Brahms and Beethoven) might stop to note that there are just as many who find pleasure in the classics as there are who get a kick out of "popular" recordings.

The point is this, say Ethel and Leo: most lovers of classical compositions also have a sizable collection of popular discs. There are far fewer "rhythm and blues" fans, however, who have so much as one classical recording in their collection.

Ethel and Leo explain it this way: literally hundreds of "pop" records are based, almost note for note, on themes taken from compositions written hundreds of years ago. Proof of the pudding is the list of "pop" records which have hit the best-seller bracket, a few of which are listed below with their classical derivations.

Explanation

How, then, ask Ethel and Leo quizzically, is it possible to like one and not the other?

One reason, they say, is the fact that each new generation (the so-called teen-agers) are looking for "music of their age." Something that's differ-

ent. A music that's theirs and theirs alone. So they reject the "universality" of the music of the past and latch on to the melodies and lyrics of the here-and-now, which often are spiked with emotionally vicarious gimmicks which in turn are backed by mammoth promotional campaigns.

Another contributing factor is that people are "afraid" of the classics. Being (generally speaking) more abstract, they take more thought. Being subtle, they take time to love and to understand. And strange titles and difficult-to-pronounce composers don't help matters either.

Yet withal, there's a place for the musical long hair alongside the musical crew cut in this day and age, insist the show's moderators. What's more, if there's a trend, it's in the direction of the shaggy-haired music lover.

But whatever the current ratio of musical hair-dos, one thing is sure. Anyone—teen-agers included—who thinks long-hair music is for old fogies, will do well to listen to the classical versions of the pop records listed below. They may discover that they have been keeping house in the vestibule of a beautiful musical mansion.

Last year KNXT was named the sole private organization to be honored with an Outstanding Achievement Award by the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council

for its role in promoting traffic safety though the program.

I'm sure reader O'Brien will find this program very "interesting, informative and useful," to use her own words.

Radio in Review

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

Signals Straight

The news-gathering efficiency of the KNX News Bureau was stepped up during the past few weeks with the installation of Sigalert—a direct contact between the bureau and the Los Angeles Police Department.

The purpose of Sigalert, according to Jack Beck, news director, is to permit the broadcasting of special news reports, instructions and alerts concerned with freeway traffic tie-ups, fires, flood conditions, smog invasions and the like. Routine police calls do not come over the Sigalert installation, which includes a receiver and a speaker, taping equipment and a buzzer-light alerting system.

The Sigalert installation is completely automatic. If the editor on duty is out of the bureau for a moment and a Sigalert bulletin is transmitted at that time, the tape recorder records for rebroadcast the message from the police dispatcher at the moment of reception.

The bureau editor can then assign a reporter on the basis of information, transcribe to a bulletin form, or remove the tape and use it for broadcast purposes.

So far Sigalert has been used by the police department only to spread news of the smog alerts of a few weeks ago.

Author Thomas

It's been a long time since CBS newscaster Lowell Thomas has penned an adventure book. Last week, how-

ever, his "Great True Adventures" hit the bookstands.

The anthology represents a reading adventure with such greats as Lawrence of Arabia, Julius Caesar, Napoleon, Antoine de Saint Exupery, Major Jim Corbett, Benvenuto Cellini and Thor Heyerdahl. These are the men who have become map changers, and history changers, from Joshua's mission to Jericho to the voyage of the Kon-Tiki.

In his introduction to the book, Mr. Thomas recalls an advertisement that his friend, Sir Ernest Shackleton, the polar explorer, had placed in London newspapers in 1900:

"Men wanted for hazardous journey. Small wages, bitter cold, long months of complete darkness, constant danger, safe return doubtful. Honor and recognition in case of success."

Thomas, an adventurer of note himself, feels that mankind has learned that it is adventure that will preserve the human race. Based on his past literary efforts, it's almost certain that his "Great True Adventures" will make interesting reading.

ABC's New Programming

A bold departure in radio scheduling will soon be launched by American Broadcasting Company when it introduces its concept of fluid programming in late October.

The network plans to offer nightly, Monday through Friday, two and a half hours of specialized fare, split into half hour segments. Each segment will be woven around a specific theme which will be presented for twenty-five minutes, followed by five minutes of news.

People in the news, places in the headlines, events of great and lesser importance occupying the world and sections of it will be grouped into their appropriate divisions. Working titles of these segments will be "Off Beat," "A Better Tomorrow," "The World Around Us," "Events of the Day," and "Sound Mirror."

Thinking of the network is decidedly along the line of NBC which recently introduced its streamlined Monitor program for week-end listening and which plans to expand this format to cover 80 network hours of daytime broadcasting, Monday through Friday. ABC believes that its segmented idea will be a "welcome contrast to the 'round-the-clock music programs of stations which have turned their transmitters almost completely over to record players."

How the outlook on radio has been changed, even these past few months! Necessity has driven the medium to exciting, creative action.

Next to the broadcaster, Old Bob Kelley in this case, the most important men on the football telecasts will be the cameramen. That's right—cameramen!



Football is the only sport I know of where the fellows on the cams must know as much about the game as the participants. In boxing, any Sam Sissy-pants can get on the camera, and follow the two men in the ring. He doesn't have to know anything about the sport.

Same thing in wrestling, tennis, etc. But go into an \$850,000 package such as Les Mullins and Burgermeister beer have in the pro football telecasts this year, and you'd better have some men on those cameras who know the game.

Naturally, the director is important. But unless the cameras follow the ball, he's powerless. A great director like KHJ-TV's Don Patton, for example, can pretty well guide the camera on a baseball game. Not so in the split-second sport of football.

The fellow on the cam must know the formations . . . he must penetrate

the mystifying faking of the Bill Wades and follow the ball . . . it ain't easy, believe me.

It's pretty ironic then that a sponsor can spend hundreds of thousands of dollars to telecast football games, and the whole success depends on two or three cameramen who are earning maybe thirty-five bucks apiece.

A rather paradoxical business!

Meanwhile, back at the ranch, we've just wrapped up another season of Major League broadcasts over the West Coast Mutual-Don Lee Network. Thanks, too, to the great gang at KHJ and Mutual-Don Lee, headed by sports director Tony LaFrano, Norm Smith, Betty Hill and the boys in the recording department.

This fall, we'll be doing some work for John Brodhead and Norrie West's Sportsvision, Inc. These are the people who film the college football games all over the country that you'll see on TV.

The operation is an incredible one. For the thirty-minute Big Ten highlight show, for example, here's how it works: Entire game films of the four top Big Ten games each Saturday are flown direct to Los Angeles late Saturday night.

They're picked up at the airport and rushed to the Sportsvision lab on Highland Avenue in Hollywood. The films are developed; then Mother Brodhead gets out on the splicing machine and cuts the best six and one-half minutes from each of the four games.

This is put together, sent down for a print, and by now it's about 10 a.m. Sunday morning. The script writer, who in this case happens to be yours truly, next writes a play-by-play narration to the film.

A couple of hours later, Tom Harmon saunters in to add the voice narrative to the Big Ten highlights. So by one o'clock Sunday afternoon—less than twenty-four hours BEFORE the games started on Saturday—it's all set to be shipped and screened on TV stations all over the country.

Who says football is ALL fun?

Something new? An adult-type Western? Judge for yourself as you view NBC's fall series, "Frontier," tense saga of

Mud, Sweat and Tears

THE WHOLE story was there in one single, poignant sentence: "This man and wife built a sod house, and when it was done she wept, and tried to pull it apart!" Writers Mort Fine and Dave Friedkin discovered the sentence as they were poring over old documents in the public library. The writers were busy on research for Worthington Miner's new NBC-TV program, "Frontier." Combining the drama of this sentence with the history of Omaha's founding by a lone couple, the "Frontier" scripters came up with a pilot film for a series which debuts this week, September 25, sponsored by Reynolds Aluminum in the place where "Mr. Peepers" formerly aired.

"Frontier" gives promise of being one of the season's most interesting anthologies. As Miner himself stated, "We are trying to find how much drama there is in the truth." For its stories of the West, "Frontier" will draw upon all the land from the Mississippi to the Pacific, and all the time from 1750 on. The pilot film, which will probably be viewed the fifth or sixth week, tells the story of a courageous couple who almost failed to hold their own frontier after it had been established. Several of the stories in the series will deal with California . . . some will dramatize the winning of Oregon.

Big Story

One story upon which the writers stumbled will require two telecasts to tell. It is the saga of a great French swordsman who came to this country to amass sufficient funds to promote a revolution in France and to re-seat the monarchy. By gaining control of 200,000 square miles in the Dakotas and the river frontage, this man made one hundred million dollars in a year and a half, and by his manipulations nearly drove Chicago bankrupt.

In another of the series, the story of Colonel Shivington will be dramatized. He is the leader who took a group of 300 militiamen in the 1870's and massacred 300 Cheyenne.

ROUGH AND TUMBLE BRAWL

in the mud of a Nebraska storm is exciting and typical of the action to be packed into this NBC-TV series aimed at both adult and juvenile viewing. ▶

Fine and Friedkin have relied heavily on the Los Angeles Public Library for background material in scripting "Frontier." This library, which is a depository for government documents, and UCLA, which has an excellent Americana department, have been sources of valuable information.

"The West was built by many people," Fine and Friedkin point out. "An important part in this country's frontier was played by women and children," producer Miner adds.

For a long time Miner has had it in mind to produce "a different kind of Western." In the first teleshow of the series, scheduled as "Paper Gunmen," some of the elements of the generally accepted type of Western will be included.

Background

Miner has never been a great fan of Westerns . . . in fact he is an Eastern product who didn't set foot in California until 1929 when he came to Los Angeles to produce "The Front Page." At that time the to-be Mrs. Miner was playing in the same production in New York City. She came West for their wedding, which occurred in a little house near the

intersection of Cahuenga and Highland Avenues in Hollywood. "I've been so busy working out at Hal Roach Studios on 'Frontier' that I haven't had time to see whether the house is still standing," Miner said regretfully. "I think it is . . . it was near the Bowl where the two streets join, and I don't think it was removed for the freeway."

Miner now finds himself waxing enthusiastic along with his writers when a wonderful new story of the West crops up. To abet the producer's enthusiasm, Friedkin and Fine have given Miner a very fancy silver belt buckle, which he wears now and then.

Mort and Dave need no particular prodding to go overboard on the new teleseries. As former scripters of the "Gunsmoke" radio show they have already become indoctrinated. "After we read the story of the man and wife who had built the sod house," said Friedkin, "we had to turn around and do a lot of research on building a sod house."

"Yes," interpolated Fine. "I took my wife to see the sod house which was made afterwards, for the television film, and ever since she saw it she hasn't beefed once!"

IT WOULD be difficult to explain to a bereaved person that tragedy and comedy are closely related, but this is a basic fact."

So commented Alfred Hitchcock, celebrated director and master of suspense in motion pictures, who is now entering TV with his series of films for CBS-TV called "Alfred Hitchcock Presents."

Those who have followed the work of this director know he has always managed to combine tragedy and comedy. In his picture, "Rear Window," the laughs followed the chills, and in "To Catch a Thief" he neatly mingled suspense with guffaws. He intends to follow much of the same procedure on TV.

Tragedy vs. Comedy

"I shall never forget the impression made upon me one evening at a theatre in New York," Hitch went on. "The only decoration on a green velvet curtain across the stage were the masks of Melpomene and Thalia, tragedy and comedy. So close were they together that part of the embellishments were entwined. Shakespeare brought these two muses together in some of his plays in the Elizabethan period. His comedies ranged from the farcical to the tragi-comedy, the latter called comedy only because the denouement is not tragic.

"In some modern fiction, too, you'll note that humor has been mixed up with such things as graveyards. Stories about ghosts, eerie shadows, and wails are often given comic overtones."

Hitchcock's material for TV will range from the classic to the modern pulp. To present his tales in the best way he has worked out a very exact format.

Because of the time element in which he will have to tell a story for his TV series, he will have no time for any counter-plots. So his plots will follow a straight line.

"Occasionally, we will tell a story in retrospect," the master of suspense remarked, "and I hope there will be many times when the O. Henry or surprise ending will be used."

Fables

In Hollywood circles, Hitch is noted for his droll wit. He was regarded as quite a humorist before he ever came here from London and Europe where he had established a reputation as director par-excellence with such pictures as "Thirty-nine Steps" and "The Lady Vanishes."

Hitch's humor is usually directed at himself. For some time he was almost a legend as far as his gastronomic prowess was concerned. Such stories were credible in view of

his 290 pounds, but, of course, now he is about 100 pounds lighter. One New York interview started the fable that Hitch ate only beef steak and ice cream in America because he lacked the confidence in the ability of American chefs to create other dishes. He admits this was a culinary canard.

About his eating, Hitch has said, "I am not really a heavy eater unless you mean that I am heavy and I eat."

Hitch is an ideal director in that he never raises his voice. His quiet authority, however, and his technical know-how make all stars respect him.

He despises exercise and finds his diversion in sudden changes of scene. His wife, Alma, who works with him on all his pictures as writer, adviser, and general assistant, has always shared his love of travel. They also have a daughter, Pat, who is married.

When Hitch is in Hollywood he lives in a beautiful Bel-Air home. The house is shared by two dogs, Edward IX, a cocker spaniel, and Mr. Jenkins, a Sealyham. The place is modern, which lends itself to communal living, about which Hitch says, "We all just pig here together."

When it comes to making pictures, Hitch has one philosophy: "The most important task of the director is to keep his audience awake. You ask them to look at a square frame for hours at a time. You've got to put something in there to keep 'em looking."

What Alfred Hitchcock will put on your frame will not only keep you awake—it will keep you on the edge of your seats.

Acting Can Be DANGEROUS!

RICHARD WEBB, who stars in the title role of the Screen Gems telefilm series, "Captain Midnight," believes in sparing no effort to insure realism in his acting. Since a large portion of his telefilms feature jet aircraft, Webb felt that he should get some indoctrination in their use and flying characteristics.

Webb holds a commission as a major in the Army Reserve and is a civilian pilot, so the 146th Fighter-Bomber Wing at the California Air National Guard at Van Nuys was able to offer their cooperation with the use of their two-place T-33 jet trainers. However, before anyone is allowed to take a jet ride there are a number of procedures on which he must be checked out in addition to complex technical data of the aircraft itself. Dick Webb tried them and had himself a few thrills and chills.

1. One of the vital jet indoctrination items consists of a simulated flight in an altitude chamber which not only teaches use of oxygen equipment, but gives the student an opportunity to learn the symptoms of *hypoxia*, or the lack of oxygen, at high altitudes. Webb entered the altitude chamber through a heavily reinforced steel door. Lack of pressure inside at simulated altitudes up to 40,000 feet demands a chamber which is strong enough to withstand the tremendous pressure differential from outside atmosphere.

2. For training purposes, Webb regulated his oxygen flow to increase with altitude. Most of the oxygen equipment in operational jets is automatic, thus relieving the pilot of that responsibility. Breathing oxygen under pressure is a learning process which is exactly opposite to our normal breathing cycle. Inhaling oxygen under pressure is involuntary and a conscious effort must be made to exhale.

The rate of respiration must be kept slow and steady, even under emergency conditions. Too rapid breathing may wash the normal carbon dioxide concentration from the lungs. This depresses the respiratory center, taking away the will to breathe and if continued, could cause the pilot to black out.

3. *Hypoxia*, or insufficient oxygen, is particularly insidious because the condition overwhelms the pilot before he realizes it is upon him. Symptoms are giddiness, a great sense of well being, and loss of coordination terminated finally by complete blackout.

When the oxygen supply is restored and the student revives, he has no recollection of having passed out and immediately continues what he was doing before losing consciousness. As a result of experiments such as these, it is now mandatory for all military flight personnel to use oxygen beginning at 10,000 feet, thus giving a comfortable margin of safety.

High speeds attained by our jet aircraft have created new problems



in bailing out. After the canopy is ejected, the pilot is blown clear of the airplane with an explosive charge that sends pilot and seat spinning into the sky. While some lap belts have an automatic opening device so that the seat may be easily pushed away, others require that the pilot unfasten his belt manually and push clear of the seat before opening his parachute.

When Webb finished the many tests he said, "I wouldn't have missed it for anything, but I hope I don't have to repeat it too often." Aside from some slightly sore neck muscles, he suffered no ill effects from the ride.

And all for that extra bit of TV realism.



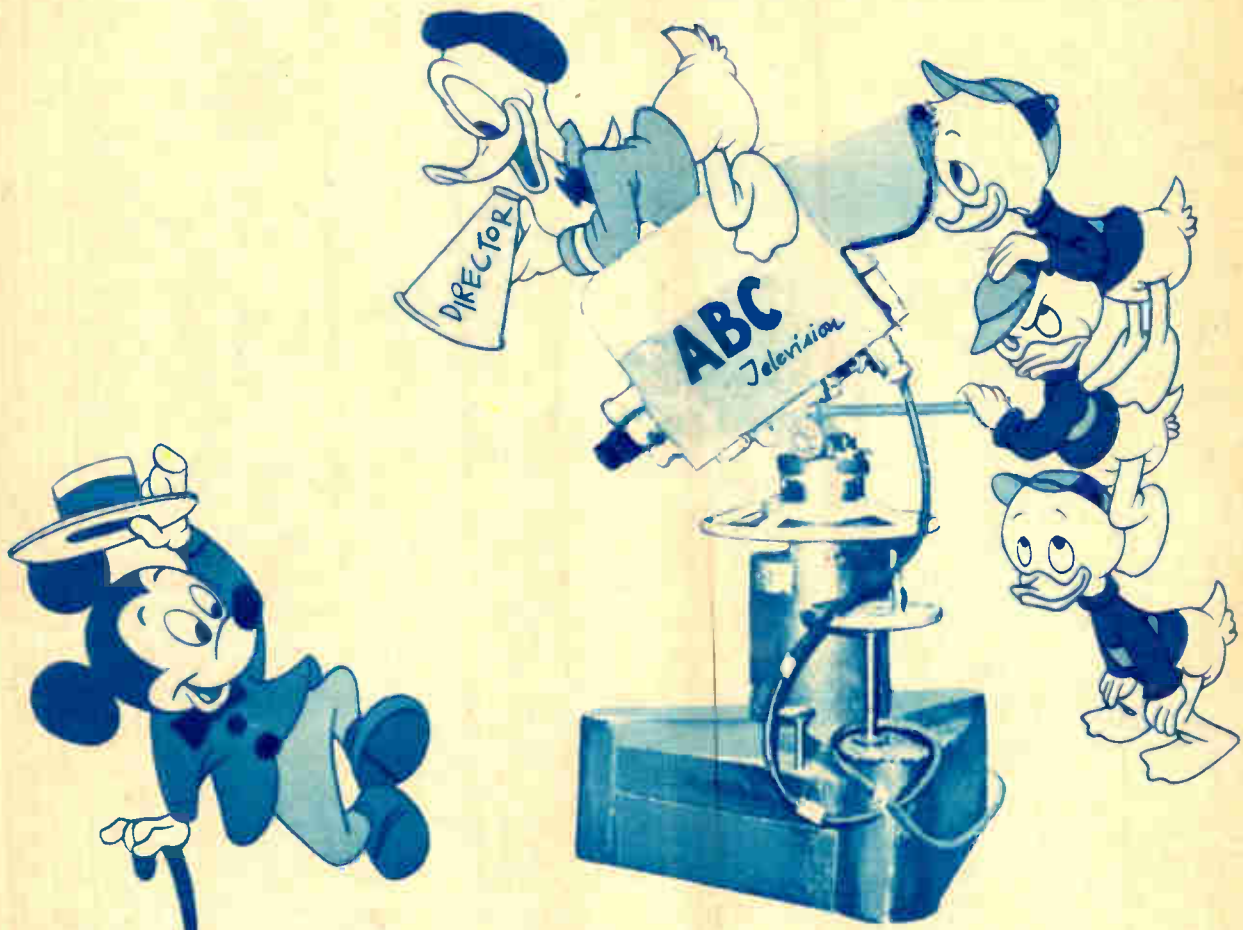
