SPEEDX Business Manager Dave Thorne sends word:

We still have a few back issues of SPEEDX available to those who may be interested. If you see any listed below that you would like, you may obtain them from SPEEDX Headquarters. Price \$1.00 each/any three for \$2.50 postpaid.

July 1971 - (14 copies left) This was the first issue of SPEEDX. It contained a five page report by Dave Thorne and Art Glover on the why's and the hoe's of the founding of SPEEDX. Also contained an abbreviations list, a special bonus item (the first DX pullout centerfold in DXing history), and an article on DXing Antarctica, among other things.

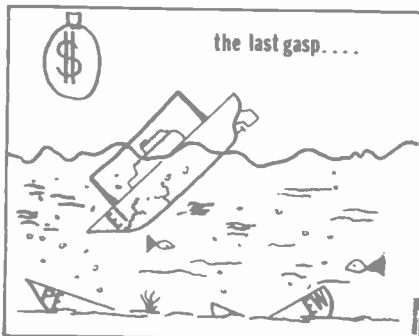
November issue to be last

What'll happen now is anyone's guess.....

COMMENT: One can only hope for an end to such deals where readers are litterally "sucked-in" to magazines that really could care less about them. Perhaps many of those 200,000 subscribers won't make that mistake again...and place their interest & trust into reputable, well-known & established hobby organizations.

F.C.C. on new SWBC rules

Washington DC---The FCC has proposed revising rules for international shortwave broadcast by the general public (our underline), to permit up to 100 frequency hours a day available to all licensees. A frequency used one hour is called a frequency hour. Present rules state that licensees must request the assignment of specific frequencies for transmission during given hours of operation to specific targets.

They also contain a frequency hour table, which varies according to conditions of the sun, the season, or the degree of transmission, by the separately licensed Voice of America broadcasts. VOA is not licensed by the FCC, public (U-S) international broadcasting must be careful not to interfere with it.

The commission said the new rules were spurred by the increase in recent years, of VOA broadcasts. The FCC said the proposed rule would guarantee a minimum of ten frequency hours per transmitter. Interested parties have until August 4th to comment to the FCC. (AP) 21 June. ■

New Things for the Listener

"Latin American Commercials: Guide to Latin Reporting," by Nile Ingelstrom and H. Klemetz. Available from Nile Ingelstrom, Minnebergsvagen 11 S-161, 34 Bromma in Sweden. Cost is \$1.75, but additional 75 cents may cover airmail expenses. The booklet is arranged alphabetically by name of product advertised with indication of which countries the products are sold in. There is also a listing by country and city; stores that advertise on Latin American stations. The list does not include Mexico, Puerto Rico and Brazil. (Item from DAY, CA)

A recording of 30 Interval Signals is available from Finland's DX Club International at a cost of \$2.20. (\$2.50 should cover airmail costs) The 7-inch, 33 1/3 rpm record has interval signals from some of the larger broadcasters such as Trans World Radio, Swiss Broadcasting C. and CBC, down to several Brazilian and African and Asian stations.

Word has it that FDXC is planning another album of interval signals later this year. (From DAY, CA)

Reminiscences

For many years I kept a large stack of QSL cards in my safe-deposit box. Then, about ten years ago, I came to the regretful conclusion that they were no longer of value to me. At that time I was under the impression that the DX sport was as dead as chariot racing- so I destroyed them. Now, many years later, and much wiser on at least two counts, I am thoroughly enjoying a revival of the old interest and am making up for lost time (and lost QSLs). I've logged 94 countries and recently dispatched reports and requests for verifications to sixty six countries over a four-week period.

Going back to that early period of the middle thirties, when I was about 14 years of age, there are a good many fond memories of DXing. The most important attribute as a DXer was perseverance. My equipment consisted of a very small set (manufacturer unknown) and a moderate length of bare copper wire, with an insulated lead-in. Of course, I only dreamed of superior equipment- such sets as Hammerlund and Hallicrafter- and the dream sets of the day, Scott and McMurdo-Silver.

I had a girl friend during part of this time, and she and my father concluded that anyone who wished to stay up all night listening to a radio was simply out of his mind. For this reason, I decided to keep the raptures of DXing largely to myself. I didn't even offer to share the enjoyment of receiving mail from distant places with these non-believers. Then, I went on a fairly long vacation and, anticipating this, I wrote for a few verifications in my father's name, and requested replies be directed to that name, at his office. One morning he arrived at work to find a colorful card and a very pleasant personal message from a chap who operated a small transmitter in a grass shack at Suva, Fiji. From that time on, until his early death, my father approved wholeheartedly of my strange nocturnal antics.

I remember corresponding with VK2ME, Sydney, and VK3LR, Melbourne, both shortwave outlets. I don't recall any New Zealand shortwave stations but I do remember the broadcast band stations 1YA, 2YA, 3YA, and 4YA. The signal strength of the shortwave transmitter in Bandoeng, Java was so great that it could be heard 300 feet from the receiver. I remember the great thrill when I first heard the shortwave stations at Singapore and Kuala Lumpur.

Signals from Japan were exceptionally strong. I corresponded with a great many stations in this country but the only call letters which come to mind now are JDAK. The Russians had a shortwave outlet at Khabarovsk, Siberia with call letters RV15, operating, I think, on 4215 kcs.. This was not difficult to log but it was virtually impossible to verify. Undaunted, I wrote to the station and- surprise of surprises- some eight months later I received a letter from Moscow verifying my report. The letter and envelope paper were pathetically poor. The typing had been accomplished on what must have been one of the first ten typewriters ever made, and the poor chap who used it had the most minimal knowledge of English. Still, this verification did much to establish that I was a serious DXer.

England had a series of stations using calls in the GS series (GSA, GSB, etc.). In response to listener reports it would send a picture postcard of Big Ben, but NO verification. German stations used calls in the DJ-series (DJA, DJB, etc.) and responded readily with QSL cards, program schedules, and a subscription to a magazine, "Germany and You". The Vatican station was HVJ, and it sent a pleasant verification card with a photograph of the area. The outlet in Rome was 2RO. Not only did it verify, it undertook to educate you with the Italian version of the war in Ethiopia. Madrid had station EAQ, and I recall this as an extremely difficult logging. Once accomplished, it won for me not only the QSL but extensive materials on all the principal cities in Spain. There was also a station then at Hilversum, Holland which, I believe, was operated by Phillips. It responded promptly and completely to listeners' reports.

And, among additional recollections, the outstanding reference of that day was a DX magazine entitled "RADEX". I wonder if any copies of that publication are still in existence - or how many present day DXers recall it?

I am sorry to report that there was no ANARC REPORT in the June issue of SPEEDX because the April ANARC Newsletter, which normally arrives late in May, was not received until after the first of June. The May issue has not been received as of the date of the preparation of this column.

SPEEDX'S ANARC APPLICATION - This column mentioned sometime ago that SPEEDX had applied for full membership in ANARC. The application for membership came up for a vote by the ANARC member clubs in June. The voting deadline was June 30, 1972. I should have some news on the outcome in my next column. As a part of SPEEDX'S application for membership, sample copies of SPEEDX were mailed to all of the present ANARC representatives of member clubs.

RADIO CALIFORNIA - U.S.A. - The ANARC clubs will at the same time vote on an application for ANARC membership by Radio California - U.S.A. This club has been in existence for fourteen months and has published fourteen issues of NEWSLETTER & SWL GUIDE, their monthly bulletin. Annual dues are \$5.00, and they currently have a membership of 70. The bulletin is printed by offset and appears to be primarily short-wave broadcast oriented.

ANARC CONVENTION - July 14-16 * The 1972 ANARC Convention will begin at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, July 14, and run through noon on Sunday, July 16. The Colonial Hilton Inn at Wakefield, Massachusetts, has been selected as the convention site.

The convention committee has planned seminars, panel discussions, guest speakers, equipment demonstrations, prizes, and much more for DXers of all interests. And, many prominent DXers have already announced plans to attend.

The registration fee is \$12.00 which includes the Saturday night banquet and Sunday breakfast. A check for this amount or a money order payable to "1972 ANARC Convention Committee" should be sent to: Steve P. d'Adolf, 16 Westgate Drive, Apt. 201, Woburn, Mass. 01801.

Single rooms are available for \$18.00 plus tax, and double rooms (two in a room - two beds) are \$11.50 plus tax per person. Room reservations should be made when registration fees are mailed, but all payments for rooms will be made by guests at checkout. Room reservations will close June 30 (unfortunately prior to the publication date of this issue of SPEEDX).

The Colonial Hilton is just off Route 128 and is easily accessible by car. Airport limosine service is available to and from Boston's Logan International Airport. The Colonial Hilton may also be reached by bus or train; full details will be supplied to each registrant.

ANARC COUNTRY LIST COMMITTEE - Ron Bruns is heading a new ANARC committee whose goal is the drawing up of an official ANARC country list which will be accepted by and used by the member clubs. Ron has contacted representatives and section editors of the clubs, and the response indicates that many feel that now is the time to again try to come up with a universal country list. The committee is made up of 16 DXers who represent a good cross section of interests and clubs. It is Ron's intention that the list be ready for presentation at the ANARC Convention. "CLUBS FOR THE DXer--PART II"

Last month I went into some of the shortwave clubs that are available to the DXer. However, there is still another type of club that appeals to a good many DXers. These clubs are different in that they are not sponsored by a group of DX hobbyists, but rather by large international broadcasters. Also, these clubs may not actually be "clubs", but rather weekly programs put out by the broadcaster.

Well, why does a broadcaster bother having a DX program, club or both for its listeners? The most probable reason is that these stations are generally more conscientious and responsive to it's overseas audience. It is their wish to attract a large audience with a wide variety of programming that will appeal to most anyone.

Many of the stations with DX clubs have only one requirement that must be fulfilled in order to become a member and that is to send in a specified number of reception reports in a given time to the station. (These reports obviously are of value to the station) Upon completion of this prerequisite, you are usually given a club number, certificate and maybe a souvenir. Some stations that do this are: Radio Canada, Radio Prague and Radio Australia. These stations many times send out a regular bulletin to it's members. On the other hand, many stations, notably HCJB, Ecuador, only carries a DX program weekly offering tips and loggings from other DXers. There are also some stations that offer both--a weekly programme and a club (including a bulletin). I would like to give a brief run down on some of the popular stations and their DX activities and what they have to offer. *(NOTE: Time and membership requirements subject to change.)

**RADIO PORTUGAL--Must send in 5 reception reports and at least 2 log-sheets each month. Members can receive awards for DX achievement. Has DX program under various names; on the air Mon./Tues 0745, 0830, 1400, 1830, 2100, 2300, 0215, 0315 & 0400 GMT.

**RADIO CANADA--Must send in 5 reports. No time limit. Member receives certificate, membership card and number, pennant and lapel pin. "Radio Canada Shortwave Club" on the air every Saturday at 2124 and 2316 GMT. Not too much tips though.

**HCJB, ECUADOR--No club, but has DX program hosted by Clayton Howard; called "DX Partyline" On Monday at 0030 and Tuesday at 0300 and 1930.

**RADIO NEDERLAND--Doesn't have a club, but does have one of the best DX programs on the air in "DX Jukebox" which can be heard on Thursdays 0642, 0812, 0942, 1442, 1842, 2012, 2142, and on Friday 0212, 0512 GMT.

**SWISS BROADCASTING CORP.--Carries the excellent "Swiss Shortwave Merry-Go-Round". Can be heard on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of each month. Times are: 0137, 0407, 0707, 0852, 1107, 1322 GMT. Has a very good format.

**RADIO NEDERLAND--I failed to include the fact the Radio Nederland also has written material concerning DXing and transcripts of their numerous course on DXing, propagation, etc.

Thses mentioned are only a small sample of the many clubs and programs on DXing that are meant for the benefit of the SWL. Try one or two of these clubs and listen to their programs. I think you'll like 'em!

From all appearances at this stage, the Coast Guard DING reference will be an extremely valuable ute-chasing tool when it is published this fall. A real bonus now looks likely in the form of a special section devoted to CG emergency/distress monitoring prepared by a veteran DIXer who has specialized in this field (would you believe nearly 12,600 hours in his log covering maritime assistance operations?)

The research project directed at digging out CG station addresses for the "directory" section of the handbook is also progressing rather well, although as might be expected, some areas are covered more thoroughly than others. To present a sort of progress report, as well as pinpoint the deficiencies, the following tabulation indicates the percent of "completeness" estimated at this time:

As you can see, there are some regions requiring additional research. SPEEDXers wishing to earn some membership credits by filling in the remaining "holes" may learn of the specific details needed from their area by contacting SPEEDXTRAS. From this point on, it's mostly a question of running down exact addresses of CG stations already in the files by name and call sign.

In addition to this master "directory" and the aforementioned distress monitoring text, the completed handbook will also include schedules of all regular CG transmissions (AM and SSB only), vessel roster with call signs and base, off-shore stations, frequency lists, special networks, and moreall cross-referenced into the master directory. When completed, we will have still another example of what can be accomplished by a group effort.....and remember, when this reference is published, it will be offered for sale with proceeds earmarked for funding HAP!!!!

From the Observation Deck

* The following comments are those of the editor and do not necessarily constitute official opinions of SPEEDX, its officers, or staff:

"Imitation is the most sincere form of flattery" as the saying goes. If this old saw is true, then SPEEDX should indeed feel flattered.

In the short span of a year since SPEEDX' emergence, several of the somewhat different ideas we advanced have found their way into other DX groups:

The premise that there is something other than sheer volume upon which to compile personal achievement statistics (originally advanced through the SPEEDX Sweepstakes) is observed to be gaining favor elsewhere with increasing emphasis now being placed upon transmitter power in several club bulletins.

According to the grapevine, the governing body of at least one other SWL organization is toying with the "earned-credit" membership concept pioneered by SPEEDX.

One or two column formats, once found only in SPEEDX, are now duplicated to a degree in other publications.

There have been several overtures hinting at the possibilities of merging SPEEDX with some of the other major clubs. The argument usually advances "mutual benefits", although these have never been adequately defined.

Yes indeed, when it's all added up it would seem SPEEDX has been uncommonly successful in fulfilling the initial prospectus of offering something other than the "sameness" which had become a stereotype for most SWL organizations. We who were there at the beginning can surely claim a measure of responsibility of being at least partially instrumental in bringing some new thinking into the hobby.

Preceding these remarks you have read Gene Moser's report on SPEEDX/HAP. The success experienced so far with this program is truly amazing!....but the really baffling thing about it is that during the 70-odd years since Marconi shot his first transmission across the English Channel (it is assumed SWLing in some form followed immediately thereafter), no other group set forth on such a venture. Sure, there have been occasional one-shot can-shaking appeals aimed at benefitting a particular individual SWL upon whom some misfortune had fallen (and these remarks are in no way intended to belittle such efforts), but I'm talking about a broad-scale, long-term, continuing program intended to introduce SWLing from scratch to large numbers of disabled persons. It seems downright incredible that in all those years nobody added up the two rather obvious facts that: 1) SWLing is one of a very few hobby activities that is tailor-made for the handicapped, and 2) by organizing the collective efforts of a club membership, some might large and worthwhile undertakings can be accomplished. SPEEDX PUT IT ALL TOGETHER IN JUST A FEW SHORT MONTHS!! We now have a fully-implemented, permanent, self-sustaining, and successful "Handicapped Aid Program" in operation!!

What has HAP got to do with the aforementioned "imitation" proverb? Just this:

At the upcoming ANARC convention in Boston, a very small delegation of hard-working, dedicated, non-mogul-type SPEEDXers will be representing the HAP. The purpose of this mini "lobby" is to acquaint the SWLing community with the program and to solicit the assistance of other clubs and individuals in supporting it. These spokesmen will be fully equipped with a number of ideas and suggestions on how other organizations might cooperate with SPEEDX on this.

The question will then be just how far the rest will follow in SPEEDX footsteps when the direct material benefits are to be harvested by individuals who at this moment probably never heard of DXing; rather than accruing to their own group(s).

THE FIESTAS OF ECUADOR

The holidays of modern day Ecuador, like those of most Latin American countries, are a direct result of the Spanish conquest of Latin America in the 16th century. The Roman Catholic religion of the Spaniards, which predominates in present day Latin America, gives rise to about half of the holidays while events surrounding the arrival of and fight for independence from the Spaniards give rise to the other half. Many holidays, particularly the religious ones, are celebrated jointly with the rest of Latin America. Others, like Quito Day or National Independence Day are uniquely Ecuadorian.

Ecuadorians have, however, added their own touch to widely celebrated holidays. They spice up the Carnival festivities, for example, by hurling balloons filled with water or wine on the party goers from balconies and rooftops. Other truly Ecuadorian touches, such as costumes, music, and folk dances, are still important parts of Andean holiday festivities although the modern day leisure time activities like boating, sports events, and travel are slowly displacing the old traditions.

One Ecuadorian tradition that is sure to be around a while is that of thoroughly disposing of the old year, El Año Viejo, before ringing in the new. A man-sized, stuffed figure, formally dressed, is placed at the head of the table and accorded the highest honors throughout the evening. But, at the stroke of midnight, his reign ends abruptly. El Año Viejo is rushed to the street, soaked with kerosene, and set ablaze. Having thus rid themselves of the past, the celebrants turn their attention to the New Year.

New Year Festivities are only the beginning, however, as the following list shows.

R. CANADA ASKS HELP IN ECLIPSE STUDY

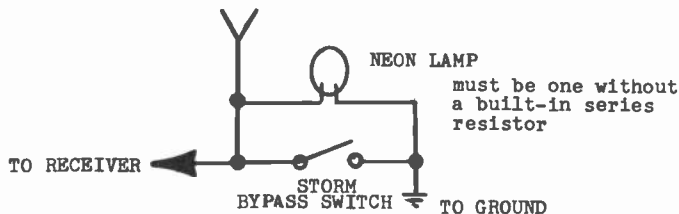
On July 10, a solar eclipse will occur with the path of totality falling very near to Radio Canada's Sackville transmitter site. Since this provides a unique opportunity to study the effects on ionization densities as ionizing radiation from the sun is blocked by the moon, Radio Canada is asking listeners to monitor and report on reception of specific frequencies. All desiring to participate are requested to listen between 1900-2200 on special frequencies which will be announced in the Radio Canada Shortwave Club program beginning two weeks prior to the eclipse. As a special incentive, an Eclipse Study QSL will be issued to all who participate.

ARE YOU GROUNDED?

The snap, crackle and pop of static on the tropical bands is a sure sign that summer and its thunderstorms are back. These noisy storms, as my son calls them, pose a definite threat to DXers. The lightning that accompanies these storms need not strike your antenna to cause damage although that too is a possibility. A near miss or a bolt that hits nearby power lines can be just as deadly as a direct hit. You can avoid damage to your set by taking just two simple steps as a storm approaches. These are:

- Ground your antenna directly-disconnect antenna from set if feasible
- Unplug your set

Why not check your antenna hookup right now to be sure you are adequately protected against a possible lightning strike. If your antenna is not equipped with a lightning arrester or similar device, why not take a few minutes and install a simple but effective protective system such as the one below copied from Radio Nederland's booklet "Give Your Antenna Some Air" It might save your rig someday!

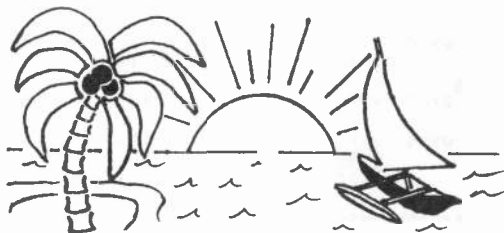



the government.
