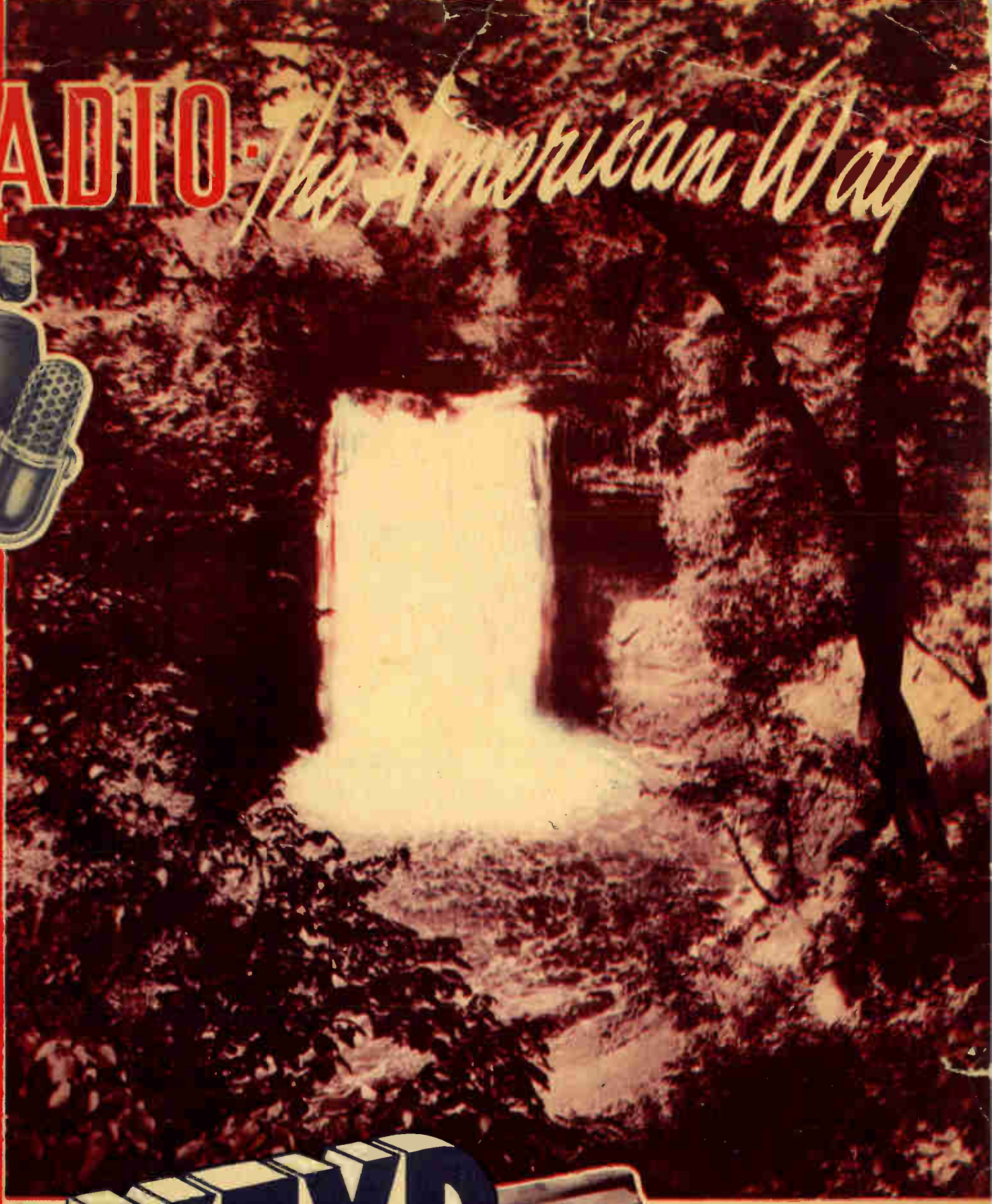

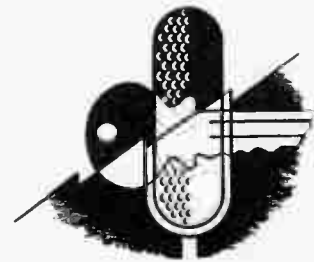

World-renowned artists contribute their share of talent. Highlight of the two hour broadcast is "Community Rostrum" and interviews with outstanding civic leaders. New worlds of sound are experienced by deserving, handicapped people as **keyd** presents them with monthly gifts of hearing aids on their "I Hear Music" broadcasts. Listeners' letters recommending these persons win the hearing aids plus weekly cash prizes.

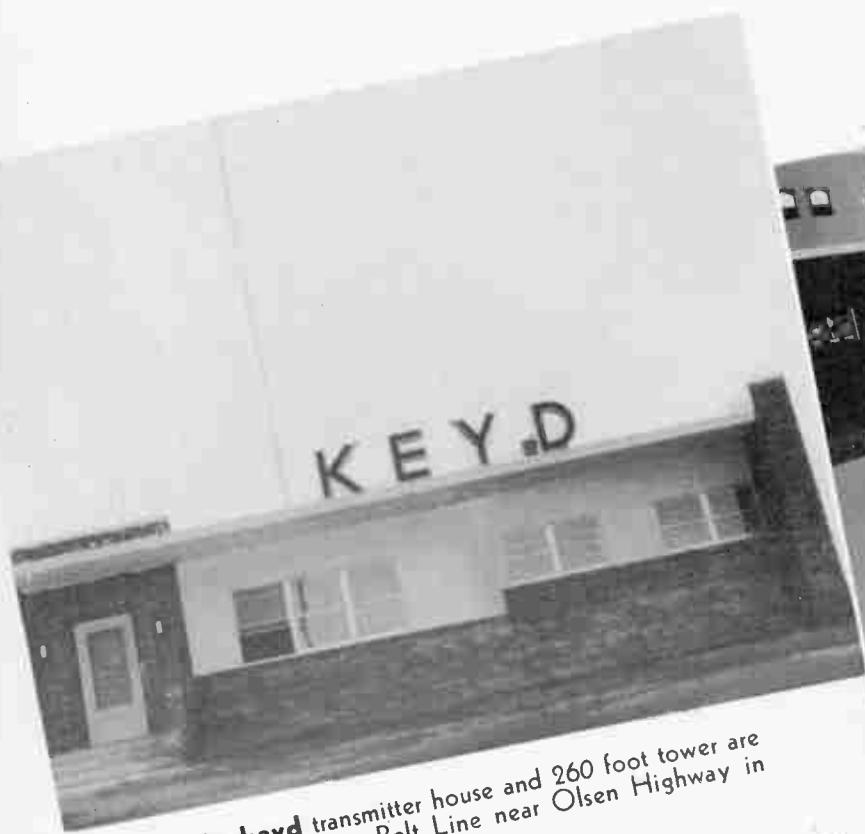

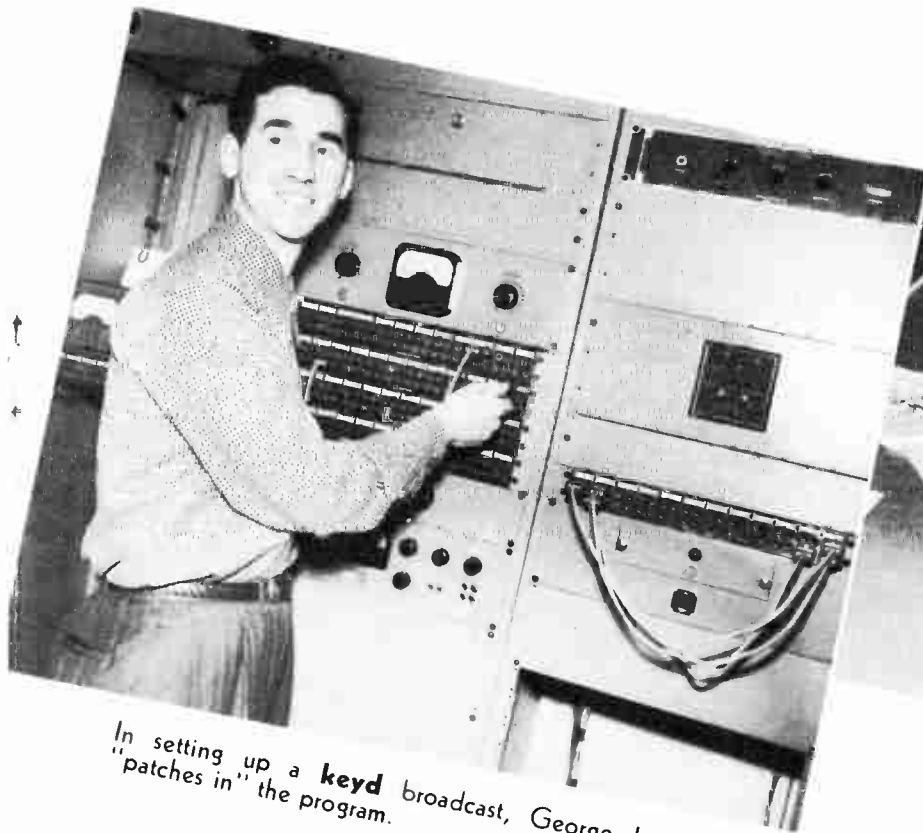

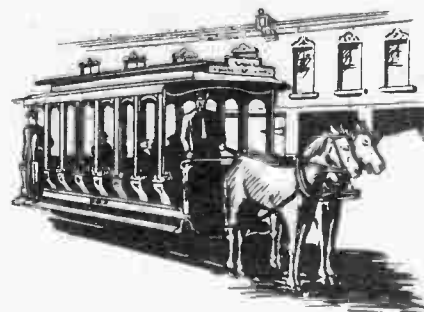


Minneapolis in 1870 was a thriving infant with growing pains. Compare this photo with the ones on the following pages depicting the city of today.

This hexagonal block tower of Fort Snelling was one of the important early landmarks of this early mid-western military reservation. The fort was built in 1819.

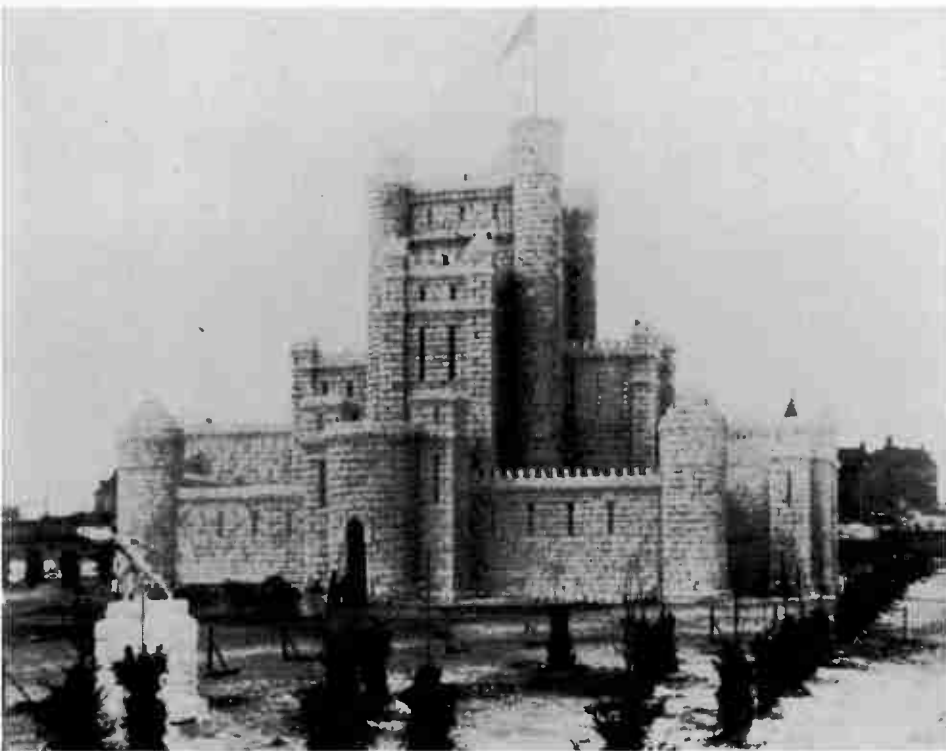


Cities THEN

As far back as 1886 they were building ice palaces for the now famous St. Paul Winter Carnival. This one is a marvel of architecture and workmanship.

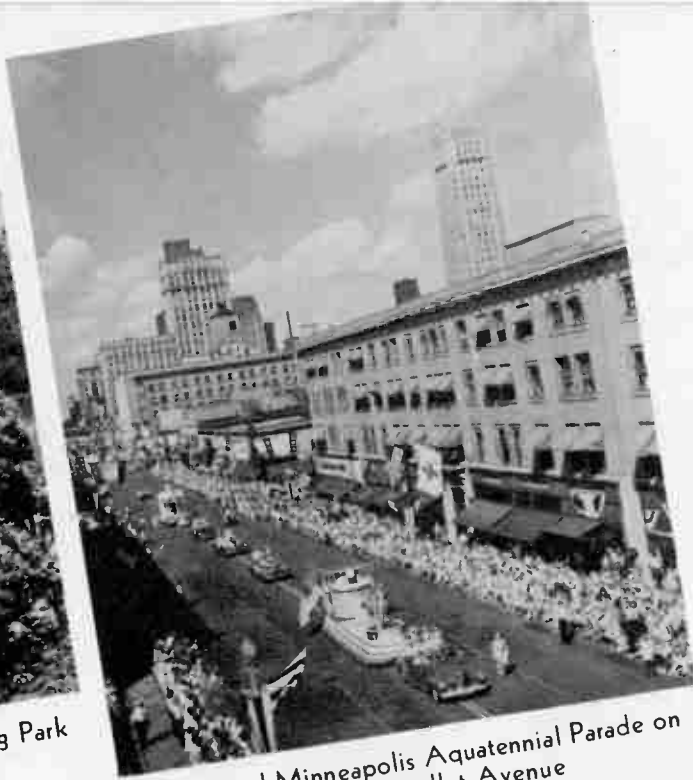
The first bridge to span the upper regions of the "Father of Waters" was this suspension bridge from the village of St. Anthony to Minneapolis.

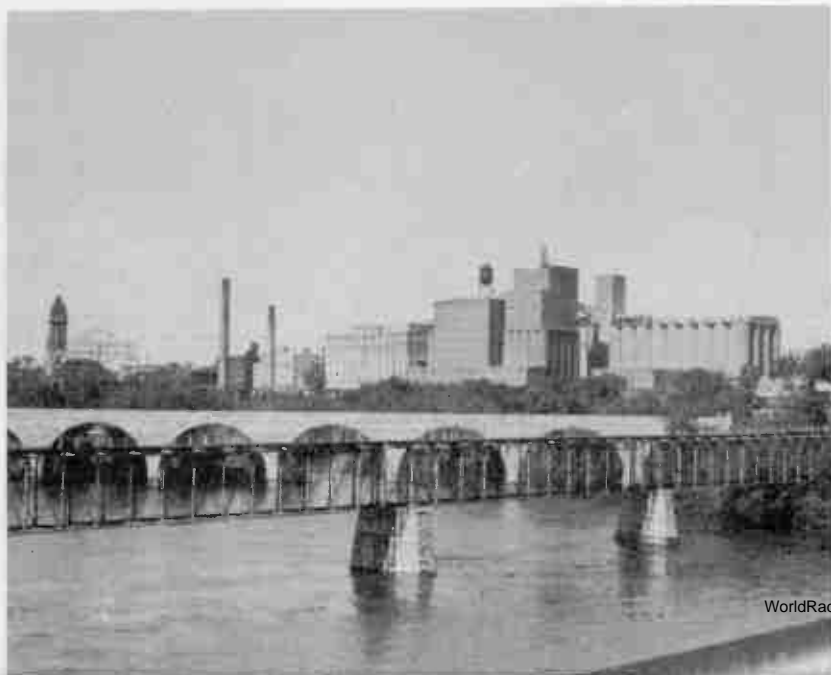

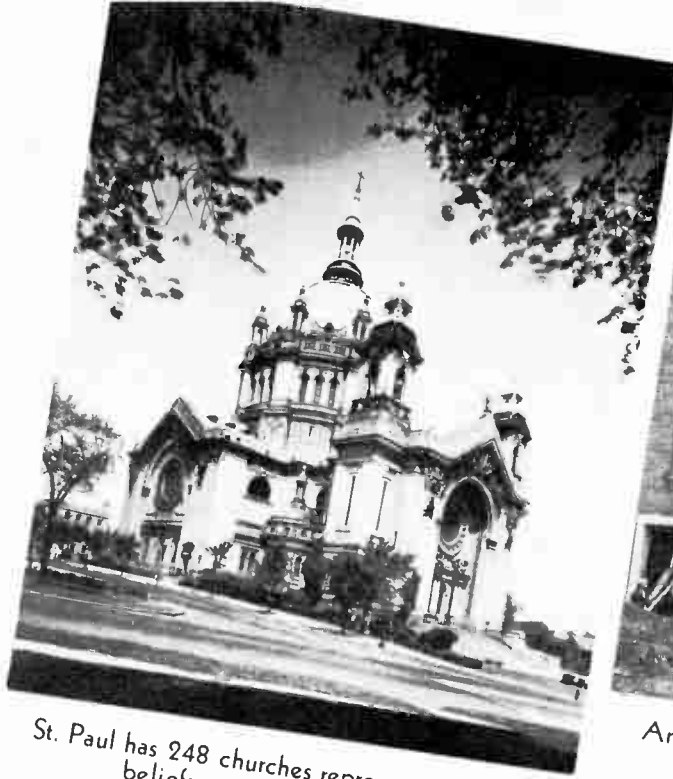

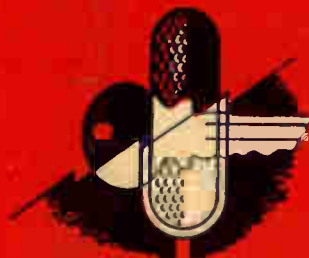
