Stations in the news... Congratulations go out to, among others:
• The Craig family and associates, who have ambitious plans for Channel 13 in Manitoba;

Gord Hume and company, on the launch of CIQM-FM London;

• And the folks at 'Cosy' FM in Chatham, Ontario—especially vp/gm Carl Veroba, whose long-time ambition has now been realized. Much of the information about CKSY-FM came from an enjoyable telephone conversation which renewed our acquaintance with Merv Russell—and we also wish Merv well in his quest for a new FM station in the Saint John-Fredericton area of New Brunswick.

Action in the 'Steel City'... There's been some interesting activity on the Hamilton broadcasting scene.

In our next issue, we hope to have some photos of the new CHML/CKDS-FM broadcast centre. We hear it's 'space age'—which must be even more advanced 'state-of-the-art.' (My first job in radio was as a program operator at CHML in the days when Ken Soble was describing his newly-opened broadcast centre at 848 Main Street East as 'the most modern in North America,' so I'm looking forward to seeing the latest version.) The facility began operations on June 23rd.

In the midst of efforts to line up a story on the new broadcast centre, an interesting note arrived from Paul Hanover to say that, after 41 years at 'ML, the 'ole Mayor of the Morning' was returning to on-air work as morning man at the newly-licensed FM station of CKOC. We wish Paul well in his new (old?) career!

Then, at the CCBA convention in Hamilton, CKOC's Bob Macdonald revealed that the call letters for the new station would be CKLH-FM. The 'LH' honors the late Les Horton, who for more than 50 years supervised engineering operations at CKOC. Bob tells us that Les joined CKOC soon after it went on the air in 1922. He had taken one of the early courses in radio at a technical school in Toronto, and throughout his career worked to increase his knowledge. When he first started at CKOC, the main purpose of the station was to sell radios, so when customers came into Ontario Cycle for a demonstration, Les would often have to go upstairs, turn on the transmitter and play the piano! He remained as chief engineer into the '70s, and although he officially retired at age 70, Les continued to act as a consultant to the station and helped to plan and design the 1978 50 kw installation. He was a member of the CAB 50-Year Club, was chosen Engineer of the Year in 1979, and after his death was honored by CAB as a pioneer of Canadian broadcasting. The choice of call letters for CKLH-FM is a well-deserved, yet unique tribute to Les Horton.

TVOntario Expands... The Phil Stone Report provides a timely, informative look at TVOntario in this issue, as the educational network continues to mature both in coverage of the province and quality of programming. And in the fall, it will expand its French-language programming to a full-time channel. There's also a practical business emphasis on diversifying its funding: TVO's revenue department reports that 38,000 members donated more than \$1.5 million in 1985-86, and project revenue, which comes from the underwriting of major productions by other organizations, exceeded \$3.5 million.

- CBC Corner Brook won the Dave Rogers Award for its feature story Missing Money.

- CFPL London received both the Dave Rogers Award and the Charlie Edwards Award, the latter for a report on a shooting.
- CFRB Toronto was given honorable mention in spot news for its reports on the 1985 tornado in the Barrie area.
- CHUM-FM Toronto took the Dan McArthur Award for Walking in the Rain, a documentary about teen suicide.
- CKSL London received an honorable mention for The Silent Majority, a documentary.
- CKTB St. Catharines received the Sam Ross Award.
- CKVR-TV Barrie won both the Charlie Edwards Award, for its tornado coverage, and the Dan McArthur Award, for its documentary on acid rain, Who'll Stop the Rain.
- CJOH-TV Ottawa took the Dave Rogers Award for Ethiopia—
   A Canadian Mission.
- CFPL-TV London received the Sam Ross Award for Time for Ethiopia.

### stations in the news

#### WESTERN MANITOBA WINS LICENCE FOR CHANNEL 13

Western Manitoba Broadcasters Ltd., operator of CKX AM-FM-TV Brandon, has been licensed by the CRTC to establish a new television station on channel 13. It will be, in effect, a fourth English-language service for the Winnipeg market, with main studios in Portage La Prairie and a news bureau in Winnipeg. The \$4 million

facility is expected to be on-air in October from a new 1100-foot tower at Elie, with maximum power of 325 kw. The new station will be linked to existing studios in Brandon and Dauphin to form MTN, the Manitoba Television Network, with a potential audience of 950,000 people.

Stuart Craig, president of Western Manitoba Broadcasters, describes the new service as basically agricultural, rural and regional. Weekly local production will in-

clude over 25 hours from Portage La Prairie and 11 hours from Brandon. News staff will number 27, with 9 ENG units for regional news. The station will have a budget of \$2.76 million for programming in year 1, and \$1.75 million will go to independent production over the first five years of operation. Opposition to the new station from CKY-TV and CKND-TV Winnipeg was discounted by the CRTC, which noted their 'healthy rate of profitability.' The new station will not, however, solicit local advertising in Winnipeg. Similarly, the CRTC noted that CFRY Portage La Prairie was 'well-established' and 'should not be adversely affected' by the new television facility.

A competing application by Jack R. London, on behalf of a company to be incorporated, was denied. Manitoba Public Television proposed a non-profit, community-based station to provide educational and informational programming. It would have relied on outside studio facilities/equipment. The CRTC found this proposal lacking in specifics regarding programming and financial details, noting that the concept was 'predicated on a high level of community participation.'

### CABLE TV SHOW MARKS OPENING OF CIQM-FM LONDON, ONTARIO

CIQM-FM London began operations on June 1st, 1986, on 103.1 MHz with 14 kw power. Owned by London Broadcasters, the station is located in the City Centre. adjacent to AM station CKSL.

A unique feature of the launch was the telecasting of opening ceremonies on Cable 13, London's community channel. The live broadcast followed a half-hour documentary on the building of CIOM-FM. Production was by Richard Harding, program director of Cable 13, and George Gordon, public affairs director of 'QM.

Described as Canada's first 'AFM' (adult FM programming) station, CIOM has 20 staff members and its \$1 million facility includes three studios, a news production studio, five compact disc players, music computer system and 'the finest portable recording facilities available.'

Personnel includes president/gm Gord Hume; gsm Mark Rogers; creative director Jan White; community relations mgr. Nancy Matheson; and pd Jerry Stevens. Al Gibson is news director, with Andy Oudman and Heather Mitchell as feature newscasters. Major on-air personalities include Sandy Thomson, Dick Williams, Mitch O'Connor and Bob Sutherland.



#### JULY 1st LAUNCH FOR CKSY-FM

A long-standing goal of Carl Veroba became reality on July 1st with the launching of CKSY-FM Chatham, Ontario less than six months after it was licensed by the CRTC.

Now vice-president of operations for CKSY, Carl Veroba was formerly with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in Windsor, Ontario. His associates in the new station include Hank Bruhlman, president, Bob Dietrich and Ruth Beatty. (Bea-Ver Communications, the corporate name, combines the first three letters of Beatty and Veroba.) Also on the board of directors is Margaret Langstrom of the University of Windsor.

The decision of the CBC to relinquish commercial FM frequencies in a number of locations enabled CKSY to go on the air with a minimum of delay, while obtaining a choice frequency. The move of CBEE Chatham to the educational band opened up 95.1, a Class B channel with authorized ERP of 35,400 watts. Bea-Ver not only won the licence (in competition with the local AM station, CFCO, owned by Maclean-Hunter); it was also able to purchase the existing CBC transmitter.

Studios and offices are located at 117 Keil Drive in Chatham. The studios were acoustically designed by consultant Neil Muncy, and equipment was supplied by Pineway Electronics Limited.

Mery Russell, previously associated with Eastern Broadcasting and Telemedia, has acted as consulting manager in putting CKSY on the air. (He's also involved in an FM application for Saint John-Fredericton, New Brunswick.) Russell considers CKSY fortunate in assembling an experienced staff which includes a number of Chatham natives. Program director is Paul Mahon, from CFOR Orillia, farm director is John Jordan, Jeanine Rose ('Radio Rose') is a sales rep, Mary Anne Lapointe, ex-CFCO, is receptionist, and news director John Anderson is from CKO. The afternoon man and city council reporter is Norman Mann, a mature student who just

#### ROGERS PURCHASE OF CFMT-TV GIVEN CRTC APPROVAL

The purchase of Multilingual Television (Toronto) Ltd. by Rogers Broadcasting has been approved by the CRTC. The only TV station in Canada which is primarily ethnic in programming, CFMT is said to have lost \$10 million since it went on the air in 1979; current debt is \$8 million. It is required to continue to have at least 60% ethnic programming.


A previous application by CFMT to provide a national service via satellite was denied by the CRTC on financial grounds, however it urged MTV 'and other groups' to pursue such a service.





#### ARMADALE WINS HAMILTON FM

Armadale Communications (CKOC) has been awarded an FM licence at Hamilton, Ontario, 40,300 watts ERP on 102.9 MHz.

Competing applications by Redmond Communications and CING-FM Burlington were denied. (CING requested a change of frequency to overcome technical problems on its present 107.9 MHz.)

Armadale, which also owns AM and FM stations in Regina and Winnipeg, will operate in a Group I, pop and soft rock format, targetted to the 35+ audience.

It will allocate \$80,000 a year for local production, and plans to syndicate performances of Hamilton's Philharmonic Orchestra. Another \$40,000 per year will support other local talent, and \$5,000 will be used to develop community programs.

#### HDTV PRODUCTION FOR CBC

A major 13-hour CBC-TV drama project has been produced using High Definition Television. Production of Chasing Rainbows took place at Magder Studios in Toronto. HDTV equipment based on the NHK system and supplied by Sony Corp. was used for the entire production. CBC executive producer Mark Blandford says the the series has the 'crisp look of 35mm film, at a fraction of the cost.'

#### OTTAWA FM BIDS POSTPONED

Four applications for FM in the Ottawa-Hull area have been postponed by the CRTC, pending technical acceptance by DOC. The applications are by:

- Radiomutuel, for a French-language Group IV, pop/rock format, 7,600 watts on 104.1 MHz:
- Radio Nord Inc., for a French-language Group IV format, 7,600w on 104.1;
- Robert K. Whyte of Vancouver, for an English-language Group IV, dance music format, 12,000w on 104.1;
- Standard Broadcasting (CJSB Ottawa), for a Group I, pop/softer rock format, 84,000 watts on 92.1 MHz.

#### OTTAWA TV APPLICATIONS CALL

The CRTC has received an application for an independent television service for Ottawa, and has called for further applications to operate a new English-language station. The deadline is August 15th.

### TWO SEEK TORONTO's 640 kHz

Two suburban stations, CFGM Richmond Hill (1320) and CKMW Brampton (790), have applied to operate on 640 kHz. The frequency allows a maximum power of 25 kw day and night. CFGM proposes a transmitter location at Beamsville, ON, in the Niagara peninsula.



#### CANWEST SEEKS 51% OF CKVU-TV


A July 8 CRTC hearing was scheduled to consider an application to transfer control of CKVU-TV Vancouver. CanWest Pacific Television Inc. would become owner of the station, with 51% control held by CanWest Broadcasting, in turn controlled by Israel Asper of Winnipeg. Messrs. Duke, Klenman and Lyle would retain the remaining 49.9%. Pacific would purchase 63.47% of Western Approaches Ltd., the licensee of CKVU-TV, from the present partners for \$8.2 million or \$92 a share.

#### Other stations in the news...

- CHUM Toronto, since 1957 Canada's pioneer rock station, has changed to a softer, 'golden oldies' format. It has also discontinued its influential CHUM Chart, published for 1,512 consecutive issues. Rock changed CHUM from a stuggling daytimer to one of radio's great success stories, but in recent years it has been outrocked by CHUM-FM, CFTR and CFNY.
- Rock is 'in' on the Niagara frontier, where CJQR-FM became HTZ-FM ST.
   Catharines as of June 27/86. 'Hits' hopes to capture much of the 80% of Niagara's 18-34 age group that has tuned to Buffalo and Toronto rock stations. According to Peter Shurman, president of Standard Broadcasting, the company ascertained two years ago that its country format on FM was 'futile' and duplicative.
- Highlighting year-long 60th anniversary celebrations of CKNX Wingham, an Open House Weekend and re-union of former employees was held June 15th.
   The station went on the air Feb. 20/26.
- Ocean Pacific Broadcasting Inc., licensee of CIOF Vancouver, has applied for a change of ownership structure, which would bring in Monarch Broadcasting of Alberta as 30% owner. Don Hamilton and Henry Gourlay would retain 30%, Ronald Longstaffe 10%. Licensed for 50 kw on 1040, CIOF is expected to go on the air in the fall of 1986.
- CFJP-TV Montreal, scheduled to begin operations on September 6, will be available throughout eastern Canada via Telesat's Anik C3 Ku band satellite. Seven rebroadcast stations have been licensed to carry CFJP's Télévision Quatre Saisons (TQS), and future expansion plans include Rimouski, Carleton and Moncton, NB.
- Applications for FM rebroadcasters in British Columbia include: Skeena Broadcasters, ex-CJFW-FM Terrace, at Houston (3 kw on 105.5), Smithers (50 w on 92.9) and Burns Lake (4.5 w on 92.9)...
   Seabrook Broadcasting, ex-CKAL Vernon, at Armstrong/Enderby (140 w on

98.7 MHz)... CBC, ex-CBU Vancouver, at Creston (57 w on 100.3 MHz)... Radio Station CKPG Ltd., ex-CIOI-FM Prince George, at Quesnel (220w on 103.3)... and Twin Cities Radio, for Quesnel (175 w on 94.9), where some programming would be originated for the Twin Cities FM group.

- Twin Cities Radio has been given CRTC approval to switch its AM and FM formats:
   CFJC Kamloops becomes a country music station, while CFFM-FM goes to softer pop/rock.
- The CRTC set a deadline of July 21 for new FM applications for Brockville, ON, where it recently denied a proposal by Eastern Ontario Broadcasting (CFJR).
- Memorial University of Newfoundland Radio Society, licensee of carrier current station CHMR St. John's, has applied for a student FM station, 50 w on 93.5 MHz.
- Gooselake Broadcasting Co. has applied for AM at Kindersley, SK (1 kw day/250w night on 1210 kHz). Programming would be partly from CJYM Rosetown.

HAD YOU HEARD?... Hal Kelly, who starred as a sportscaster for Jack Kent Cooke at CKEY Toronto is retired. Like his idol. the late Ted Reeve, Hal has had to battle rheumatoid arthritis. He now spends his winters at Dunedin, FL, where the Toronto Blue Jays train, and his summers at Eganville, near Ottawa... Loretta Sullivan joined Bob McAdorey and Elaine Loring on the Global TV entertainment team... Robin Williams, who for many was the best thing on this year's Oscars telecast, discovered acting while a political science student at college... Many years ago, Toronto had a burlesque theatre called the Casino, and for some time the house singer was Robert Alda (who passed away recently). Alda had a small son who comedian Phil Silvers would often send out onto the stage in the middle of the singer's big number. That child was the Alan Alda who went on to great heights in show business, particularly with MASH, from which he is reported to have earned \$5 million a year... Macleans, quoting the CRTC, says that in the mid-1960s Canada had only four country music stations; today, there are 75... With a record \$91 million spent on TV/movie production last year, Ontario is the largest production centre in North America after Los Angeles and New York... Steven Harris, whose 20 years in broadcasting includes a spell with the CRTC, was named vp, broadcasting, for Maclean Hunter and president of its Key Radio subsidiary... Peter Worthington, the colorful author, columnist and political pundit, airs commentaries at 7am and 8am on CHFI Toronto... Other CBC veterans taking early retirement: Larry Palef, Harry Brown and Warren Davis... Another resignation was that of Fraser Kelly, once of the Telegram and CFTO Toronto, co-anchor of CBLT's Newshour... John Harris has departed community affairs at CISL Richmond-Vancouver. Following a 2-month tour of Europe and Asia, he is setting up his own public relations and marketing shop... Women can now join the Moncton Men's Press Club; after 36 years, it voted to accept female members... Sheelagh Whittaker, CBC vp of planning/corporate affairs, told a committee of the Ontario legislature that U.S. stations account for 33% of Canada's total English-language television audience, CTV 29% and CBC 24%: of the shows available to this audience (6am-2am), 71% are U.S... Samantha Taylor, host of CBC's Video Hits, was born with a most colorful name: Myroslav Lastivka Lydia Luciw... Moving from Montreal: Kevin McGowan, to CFRW Winnipeg as morning man; and Stephe Anthony, ex-CKGM, to Q-107 Toronto...

Because of higher hotel costs, luncheons of the Broadcast Executives Society are now \$18 for members, \$22 for guests... CBC legal reporter Vicki Russell is a graduate lawyer... Now handling the \$850,000 CJCL Toronto account is a relatively new ad agency, White & Grissom... For TV Guide, Joan Collins, Linda Evans and other television lovelies were asked to choose their favorite TV males: Miami Vice's Don Johnson won out, with Tom Selleck of Magnum P.I. second... Named CBC-TV national spot sales rep is Don Ioi... The newest A/V sales tool for member stations of the Radio Bureau of Canada is titled, Radio Works for Drug Stores... The Toronto ad agency Durkin, Rodgers & Battaglia moved to 481 University Ave., #502...

One of Canadian TV's outstanding success stories is the animated

series, The Racoons, which earned big ratings during the past season and will be on the BBC as well as CBC-TV this fall. There is also a merchandising campaign that sees The Racoons logo on toys, books and clothing... Back in the 1950s, Ed McMahon was a circus clown on TV's The Big Top ... Shelley Long, costar of Cheers, will appear with Bette Midler in the film Outrageous Fortune. It's directed by CBC expatriate Arthur Hiller... John Bartrem, vp, sales, CJAD/CJFM Montreal, left to become sales manager for CKOY/CKBY-FM Ottawa. Now vp's are sales managers Barry Tomlinson at CJFM and Ed Cliff at CJAD... Standard Broadcasting, through its Yorkville Studio Centre subsidiary, is reported to have increased holdings in MMC Video One Canada Ltd. from 25 to 51%. MMC is a national distributor of pre-recorded home video cassettes... Canadian actor Kelly Proctor, who appears in the TV mini-series Amerika, comes by his talents honestly: his father is veteran actor/announcer Frank Proctor; his mother, talented actress Diane Nyland Proctor... The ACTRA TV Awards, renamed the 'Gemini,' will be presented in early December at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre... THE BROADCAST EDUCATION ASSOCIATION OF CANADA will hold its 1986 Professional Development conference Oct. 30 to Nov. 2 at the Sheraton Villa Inn in Vancouver-just prior to the joint convention of CAB and WABE. Brian Antonson is BEAC/ACER conference chairman... The weekly budget for Miami Vice is reported to be \$1.4 million... Private broadcasters on the board of Canadian Press are CHUM's Fred Sherratt, Claude Blain of TVA Montréal, and Jack Schoone, Eastern Broadcasting... New directors of CARAS, the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences-which with the CBC co-produces the annual Juno Awards-are: Bill Henderson of CHILLIWACK; Don Kollar, RCA/Ariola; Gerry Lacoursiere, A&M Records (chairman, Juno nomination and voting committee); and Donald Tarlton, Donald K. Donald Productions. Retiring from the 16-member board are: Stan Kulin, WEA Music; Norman Perry, Concert Productions Intl.; Joe Summers, A&M Records; and John Watt, director of the Film, Sound Recording & Publishing Policy Division, DOC. Watt continues on the advisory board... During the 1985-86 fiscal year, the CRTC collected total fees of \$33.5 million. Chairman Andre Bureau estimates that for 1986-87, \$39 million will be collected, plus \$15 million from the telecommunications sector, for a total of \$54 million. The CRTC now processes about 4,000 licence applications a year, compared to 1,803 in 1977-78...

CTV will celebrate its 25th anniversary October 1st... Canada is increasingly important to U.S. broadcasters. For example, the three major U.S. networks—CBS, NBC, and ABC—and the Disney pay-TV Channel, each have Ottawa-based lawyers... The *Toronto Star's* Sid Adilman also had this bit of incidental information: CFMT-TV Toronto is perhaps the only TV station in all English-speaking Canada whose cafeteria has an espresso machine. The only other one is at Maison Radio-Canada in Montreal, where the cafeteria also serves beer and liquor!... At last count the Sports Network had the most pay TV subscribers of any service in Canada with 864,170. MuchMusic was second at 788,923, and the combined First Choice/Superchannel movie service third at 620,396. MuchMusic is said to be the only profitable pay

channel in Canada, with First Choice reaching the break even point. The Life Channel has just under 500,000 subscribers. One of TLC's new fall shows will see Shirley Solomon as host-she was formerly a contributing host of CTV's Lifeline... One of our very favorite people, the talented and warm CBC spokesman, Cec Smith, took early retirement at age 57. Cec, director of press relations, was always a pleasure to deal with and he'll be sorely missed... KROQ-FM Los Angeles was sold by Mandeville Broadcasting Co. for a record \$45 million—the largest price paid for a single FM station in the U.S. The previous high was \$44 million paid for another LA station, KJOI-FM... Clint Nickerson, producer on CITY-TV Toronto's CityPulse, was married to Melane Peffes, CKO executive producer of feature programming... Jim Fleming, the one-time broadcaster who became a Liberal cabinet minister, is now with Public Affairs International. Located in Toronto, he advises on public policy developments in the province of Ontario... BT's March/April issue had a story on the only on-site private radio broadcasting facility at Expo 86: CKNW/CFMI-FM New Westminister. After Expo, the studios will remain as part of an exciting new urban development... It's reported that N.V. Philips, the firm that makes half the TV tubes in Europe, will spend \$350 million converting its plants around the world to FST—the squarer TV tube that is suppose to give a wider viewing angle, fewer reflections and 'a more pleasing picture.'... The Ontario Arts Council, which has presented our weekly radio interview program, Arts in Ontario since October, 1975, is making budgetary changes and will no longer underwrite the program after August 31st. Stations that carry the show are invited to contact us if they wish to make arrangements for it to continue... 'Pop and Rock Harder' is the format adopted by CHTZ-FM St. Catherines; it was previously country (as CJQR). Eric Samuels, from FM96 London, is pd, and Paul Morris, from CHUM-FM Toronto, is md... Also given CRTC permission to switch from country: CJAX-FM Edmonton, now soft rock and '60s-'70s music...



Newsman Ian Brownlee rejoined CKEY Toronto... Ralph Benmergui, host of CBC Stereo's weekend show Night Lines, is a Ryerson grad. He took over the all-night show from Ron Robinson, who returned to book publishing... Linda Spalding, promotion director at CFMO-FM Ottawa, reports the station's fund-raising activities for 1985 came to a most creditable total of \$126,683... Canadian corporate advertisers spent \$814 million on air time in 1985 to advertise on national television-plus \$100 million to produce the commercials... Feminists are seeking strict new regulations that would ban sexual stereotyping on radio and TV; they also want quotas to force broadcasters to hire more female executives... For his work as Lieutenant Bert Samuels in the TV series Cagney and Lacey, Toronto actor Al Waxman was made an honorary member of the New York City Police Benevolent Association... More honors for CKND-TV's Tramp at the Door: two gold medals at the Annual Houston International Film Festival... When colleagues suggested that Walter Cronkite, 69, be the first journalist to go up in NASA's space shuttle program, Cronkite retorted: 'To tell the truth, I think that right now it's sort of a race between NASA's getting the shuttle's plumbing fixed before mine wears out.' ...


