CINCE her early years in Bowmanville, Ontario,


SINCE her early years in Bowmanville, Ontario, Kay O'Neill, CBC morning commentator for Manitoba and Saskatchewan, has always been an ardent horsewoman. At Tuxedo stables near Winnipeg the other day, just as she was about to leave for a canter on Mrs. Lillian Isaac's heavy hunter El Capitan, the Times cameraman snapped our cover picture. "Cappy" stands sixteen-one (16 hands, 1 inch, to you) and is eight years old. He has won many ribbons at Manitoba horse-shows.

Miss O'Neill's life has been a busy one since she came to Winnipeg in May, 1950 (at the height of the Red River flood). Almost before she had unpacked her bags, she was rushed off to Morris, Manitoba, to cover the flood aftermath there. On her return, she plunged into a series of human interest stories about the railway strike, and then had to cover the completion of the great pipeline project bringing oil from the Alberta fields to the Winnipeg refinery. A little later she flew to Churchill, Manitoba, on the shore of Hudson Bay, in an R.C.A.F. Dakota. Last year the Royal Tour was her biggest assignment, and she broadcast morning commentaries and special items from Saskatoon and Regina.

The Manitoba Winter Fair at Brandon has been one of Miss O'Neill's favourite assignments, and one of Miss O'Neill's favourite assignments, and last year a *Times* cameraman caught her in a magnificent rigout of blue jeans and rubber boots, busy at the task of hosing down one of the champion bulls. At Shilo Camp, this intrepid young lady spent some time under canvas in the dead of winter during winter training exercises. During the civil defence "bombing" of Winnipeg, she flew with one of the "attacking" planes over the city—a night flight, much complicated by searchlight beams. Recently Miss O'Neill's morning commentaries have struck a rather serious note, including interviews with the CBC's well-known United Nations observer, Peter Stursberg, and with Dr. Victor Lowenfeldt, eminent child psychologist. Kay O'Neill is a native of Bowmanville, and a graduate of Queen's, where for a time she worked

graduate of Queen's, where for a time she worked on the Queen's Journal, oldest undergraduate news-

paper in Canada. Her journalistic career also included a session with Editor George James of Bowmanville's venerable Canadian Statesman, one Bowmanville's venerable Canadian Statesman, one of Ontario's oldest weeklies, and several years with the Canadian Press in Toronto. In Winnipeg she works in close association with the CBC Talks Department and with Talks Producers Catherine MacIver and David Walker.

In addition to horseback riding, her first love, Miss O'Neill plays a keen game of badminton and takes a general interest in all forms of outdoor sport. In town during the long western winters, symphony concerts, ballet, and theatre attract her,

and she has even been known to put in an evening

and she has even been known to put in an evening or two baby sitting.

Miss O'Neill herself is a rather tall young lady, with medium dark hair and green eyes. She takes her work seriously, and has a quite stern devotion to duty—necessary in view of her heavy schedule of broadcasts. She is heard daily, Monday to Friday, on CBW and CBK, in 15-minute morning commentaries (CBW, 9:45 a.m. CDT, 8:45 a.m. CST; CBK, 8:45 a.m. MDT, 7:45 a.m. MST), and anyone who thinks that is an easy schedule should anyone who thinks that is an easy schedule should try it sometime. Her talks range over many sub-jects, and include interviews with prominent people.

Two New Governors Appointed to CBC

R. J. Fry of Winnipeg Is Western Representative

Two governors of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation have been appointed to three-year terms from April 1, 1952, A. D. Dunton, the chairman of the board announced in Ottawa April 24.

They are Gordon A. Winter, a prominent young business man in St. John's, and Roy J. Fry of Winnipeg, an executive of the T. Eaton Company.

The appointments bring to eleven the number of governors of the CBC, as provided in the legislation enacted at the last session of Parliament when the Canadian Broadcasting Act, 1936, was amended. One of the provisions was to enlarge the Board of Governors from nine to eleven as recommended by the Massey Commission "in order to make it more widely representa-

Prairie Schooner Rings The Bell in Pakistan!

N Pakistan Prairie Schooner from CBC Winnipeg goes over big. In Chicago, they like the way Mozart and Haydn are done at CBC Montreal. The sophisticated "bop" the Ray Norris group does at CBC Vancouver has a warm audience in continental Europe. And the Leslie Bell Singers and Howard Cable of CBC Toronto have their following in South America. All this and more, courtesy the Transcription Service operated by the International Service of the CBC.

Headquarters for the Transcription Service is an office on the ninth floor of the Radio Canada Building, which floor also houses the Latin American section of the International Service. From this office, producer Patricia FitzGerald sets out for CBC centres across the land to record the music that goes into the Transcription Service catalogue. From this office she keeps in touch with Canadian Government missions around the world and broadcasting systems of other countries, to see that the recordings get a world-wide hearing.

Already this year, recording sessions have been held in Vancouver, Winni-peg and Toronto. The coming months see Miss FitzGerald shuttling back and forth between Montreal and Toronto as well as carrying out plans for a recording tour of the Maritimes.

Most of the items in the catalogue are set up as 15-minute or half-hour programs. Each program consists of music and a script telling about the featured artists, arrangers, conductors and composers. The number of programs in the catalogue has grown past the 70 mark since the Transcription Service made its experimental start in 1949. Since September, 1951, new transcribed shows have been added at a four-a-month clip.

The broad plan of the present recording schedule has been mapped to develop a truly varied catalogue. In each group of four programs, an effort is made to include one of serious music, usually recorded by a chamber group such as the Parlow String Quartet or the Winnipeg Strings; one of folk music like Prairie Schooner or a group of selections sung by folk-singer Alan Mills; one "serious," solo recital; and one jazz program by someone like Oscar Peterson or a program of popular music arranged for orchestra by Neil Chotem of Montreal, Eric Wild of Winnipeg, Ricky Hyslop of Vancouver or Howard Cable of Toronto.

As the sun moves across the sky and listeners in Europe turn off their radios to go to bed, the CBC transmitters at Sackville, New Brunswick, turn their attention to Latin America. Then, in the small hours of the morning by Canadian time, programs go to Australia and the Antipodes.

However, it may come as a surprise that through the CBC Transcription Service Canadian embassies and trade missions abroad are boosting the work of Canadian musicians and composers. Our diplomats abroad jumped at the

chance to exploit this new version of the diplomatic note and there was a quick response from foreign audiences and broadcasting systems.

The Transcription Service catalogue reads like a miniature Who's Who of music in Canada. We find composi-(Continued on page 6)

Three Contest Series Conclude On Network

Winners In Nos Futures Etoiles, Singing Stars, and Opportunity Knocks, Share Honours

When Rudolph Bing, general manager of the Metropolitan Opera Company, is in Montreal the end of this month for a "Met" performance, he will audition two young Canadian singers brought to his attention when they won the latest series of Nos futures etoiles, the CBC French network talent program. They are Margaret Kerr, Toronto mezzo-soprano, and Jonathan Vickers, tenor from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. Both are studying at the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto, They were two of 40 who were selected from 141 singers from across Canada to take part in the series. They plan to use their prize money of \$500 each to help pay for singing lessons. Besides the cash award, each gets a 26-weeks' engagement on the CBC French network.

These young winners are experienced performers. Miss Kerr, who was born in Toronto in 1925, has been studying voice for seven years. Now she's concentrating on opera. She sang the title role in the CBC Opera Company's production of Bizet's Carmen, and the role of Maddelena in Verdi's Rigoletto, produced at the Royal Conservatory. She has also sung with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Her plans for the summer include working up her repertoire for a recital in the fall, and keeping house as Mrs. Harold Lawrence).

Vickers, 26, has studied voice on and off for eight years, but only during the last two as a full-time student. He has given a number of recitals in Western Canada, and in the east under the auspices of the Ontario Department of Education. He was a soloist in the performance of Messiah broadcast from Toronto last Christmas.

Two other young singers walked off with substantial prizes recently-23year-old soprano Marguerite Gignac of Windsor, Ontario, and 24-year-old Robert Savoie of Montreal, winners in the Singing Stars of Tomorrow contest. Now, adding to their good fortune, they are off on a concert tour of Ontario and Western Canada with Rex Battle, conductor of the Singing Stars orchestra. They expect to fill 17 engagements before the end of May.

As first-prize winner, Miss Gignac's award was \$1,000, and Savoie, whose voice was judged best among the male contestants, won \$750. other finalists, each of whom received a \$500 scholarship, are mezzo-soprano Joan Hall, 23, of Winnipeg; and baritone John Dunbar, 25, of Victoria. Contestants were not judged on voice quality alone. They got marks as well for diction, ability to handle languages, interpretation and style, musicianship, rhythmic sense, technique and personality.

Next month CBC Dominion's Opportunity Knocks completes its fifth broadcast year, and on June 30 its summer replacement, the Winner's Show, goes on the air to feature the first-prize winners of this season's three contest series-William Blaine Williams, baritone, Angela Antonelli, soprano, and the winner of the series now in progress. Williams, a Hamiltonian, . and Miss Antonelli, from Guelph, Ontario, are studing voice in Toronto.

tender ones that require heat, such as tomatoes, should be held in warm quarters for another month.

2. "Hardening off" is a necessary treatment to prepare plants for outdoor living. Holding plants in a cold frame for ten days or so, decreasing the water supply slightly, and gradually exposing the plants to wind and weather is the standard method of hardening.

3. Cloudy weather before rain is ideal but if not available do the work in the late afternoon and early evening.

4. Plant slightly deeper than depth in plant boxes.

5. Set in moist soil. If possible water bed 24 hours in advance. Filling each hole with water and letting it soak in before setting plants in place is a good practice.

6. Set plants firmly pressing soil downward on the roots but without squeezing the stem.

7. Water box of plants a few hours before transplanting. Never remove plants from dry soil.

8. Pinch back snapdragons and similar plants at setting out time.

9. Tomatoes should be set in warm soil. Use sturdy plants not yet in flower. Don't plant too deeply.

10. The best cabbage plants for early use are ones that have been transplanted at least once and have a good ball of earth on each plant. These will provide earlier heads than plants grown in a frame and not transplanted.

11. In hot sunny weather give plants temporary shading after setting out.

12. In dry districts mulching around plants with finely divided rotted manure and peat will help keep soil moist and cool.

Next Season's Met Operas Announced

In Montreal recently, Rudolf Bing of the Metropolitan Opera announced plans for the 1952-53 season. The Saturday-afternoon performances of the "Met" have been broadcast across Canada and the U.S. for many years. For the next season, starting early in November, four new productions are being planned. They are Verdi's La Forza del Destino; Puccini's La Boheme (in English as well as in the original Italian); The Rake's Progress, Igor Stravinsky's first full-scale opera, with libretto by W. H. Auden; and Moussorgsky's Boris Godounov with English words by John Gutman-as it was first written and not in the Rimsky-Korsakoff version usually heard.

Operas to be heard from the "Met" next season will also include Don Pasquale by Donizetti, La Gioconda by Ponchielli, Lohengrin by Wagner, Samson and Dalila by Saint-Saens and Tosca by Puccini. All of these will be revivals which have not been heard at the "Met" for some years.
