EVIDENTLY anxious to be heard, this Canada goose (right) flew right past the "parabolic reflector" used to record bird sounds for the CBC documentary which will be heard at 8:00 p.m. on CBW, 7:00 p.m. on CBK, 6:00 p.m. on CBX this Sunday night. It even dropped off a feather on the way. Actually, it would have helped more by staying with its brothers 50 yards or so in front of the reflector, and engaging them in conversation. More about this unusual broadcast, which promises to be unique in some ways, appears on this page.

Bird Songs Of Marsh And Uplands

By arrangement with Albert Hochbaum, director of the Delta Waterfowl Research Station in Manitoba, Thom Benson of CBC Special Events prepared a documentary broadcast from bird songs recorded at the station. He used a special parabolic reflector made from specifications obtained from Paul Kellogg of Cornell University, to make the recordings. The program will be heard on Sunday, July 12 (CBW 8:00 p.m.; CBK 7:00 p.m.; CBX 6:00 p.m.)

SUITABLE reflector was eventually obtained from Dr. William Gunn of Toronto, who had had a number of them built to the same specifica-

tions. The parabolic reflector is a large bowl-like affair, 40 inches in diameter, which, in effect, concentrates and reflects sound into a microphone placed approximately 10 inches from the centre of the bowl, and facing it. You do not pick up the sound of the bird (or anything else for that matter) through the microphone until it has been concentrated and reflected from the parabola. This serves to amplify and concentrate even the faintest notes of a bird, so that his song may be picked up strong and clear from a distance of as much as

100 yards. At the same time, other extraneous woodland noises are kept to a minimum.

A point to be remembered, though, is that while you may have the parabola aimed correctly at the bird you want, trilling away merrily, if there is a frog or another bird performing beside him at the same time, they will all be picked up at pretty well the same volume. Sometimes we had to wait for hours for the right conditions. Then, when the birds finally co-operated, (Please turn to page 3)



BIRD SONGS OF MARSH AND UPLANDS

we were as likely as not to find a dozen Harvards in the sky from a nearby training base. Airplanes flying anywhere within five miles completely ruined our chances of picking up bird calls. The parabola seemed to amplify motor sounds to a terrific degree and drown out everything else.

Other difficulties encountered were wind, rain and snow. The weather

was frightful from May 1 right through to June 5. The parabolic reflector cannot be operated when the wind is blowing because the sound of the wind is amplified until it is like a roaring Niagara The best time for the bird calls, we found, was between four and seven in the morning. Not only were their songs at their best at that time, but they were uttered more frequently. When I say "at their best," I mean that the notes seemed to be purer and the song itself closer to the standard melody of each bird; there was less variation in their songs at this time of day.

The big bowl didn't seem to scare the birds at all. One brave little yellow warbler was so taken by the whole business that he flew over and sat right on the microphone to deliver his song. He was, of course, too close. His melody came out as a series of shrill, whistle-like blasts.

No tricks were employed at any time during the recording work, nor will any be used during the program itself. The sounds and calls of the

birds which will be heard on the program are pure and unadulterated and as close as they possibly can be to the sounds one hears in the marsh, prairie and woodlands of Canada.

Some of the bird calls which will be heard are believed to be among the finest ever recorded. This is attested to by Albert Hochbaum, who is one of North America's well-known ornithologists. The love song of the bittern will prove to be one of the surprises of the show. I won't try to describe it, but-well, it will surprise

We recorded the sounds of a great variety of birds - the yellow-headed blackbird who tries desperately to achieve a song, but always ends in miserable failure; the Canada goose whose clanging sound is so familiar to most Canadians living on the prairies; the yellow warbler, whose sweet song fills the air of the woods and marshes during the migratory period; the Baltimore oriole, whose song is probably the sweetest of all Canadian birds; the red-headed duck, whose soft meow-meow is like that of a catbird; not to mention the long-billed marsh wren, the red-winged blackbird, the warbling vireo, the northern yellow - throat, meadow lark, loon, crow, sora rail, robin, flicker, killdeer, swan and many others. .

Encores

TEFF HOGWOOD, host on Encores (CBW 3:00 p.m. weekdays) approaches his daily program as a conversation between himself and his listeners on the general topic of music.

"I'm more or less the same kind of a musician as most of my listeners and I feel we have a lot in common,' he says. "There's little possibility that I'll talk over their heads."

He was brought up in the "shadow" of good music, he says. Among the most vivid recollections of his childhood in England are the trips he made from Hounslow, where he lived, to the centre of London to hear his uncle, a violinist, play in the St. George's Hall Orchestra.

Encores is essentially a personal thing with Hogwood, and many listeners have said they like the show because of his contagiously enthusiastic interest in the music he presents.

This enthusiasm leads him to seek devious ways of kindling audience interest. Among other tactics, he sometimes attempts to humanize the older composers by pointing out their personal characteristics and depicting through colourful sketches the periods in which they lived; plays the most intriguing selections from their works and identifies them only at the conclusion; admits his own ignorance about certain works, composers and artists, and invites listeners to send in any information they have. It is his enthusiasm, too, that leads many of his listeners to believe that what he says is written out beforehand. He prepares his ideas but never writes a script.

2,000,000 Canadians Saw Coronation TV

THE CBC has released audience rating figures showing that more than 2,000,000 Canadians saw the CBC's television coverage of the Coronation. Viewers in Toronto and Montreal went almost solidly for the CBC's coverage of the historic event. During the afternoon CBLT in Toronto and CBFT in Montreal had an average total audience of 1,500,000. As the evening wore on, more and more sets were tuned to these two stations until the total number of viewers passed the 2,000,000 mark. The figures were based on an average of six people watching the sets in more than 300,000 homes in the CBLT and CBFT areas. The total CBC network TV audience for all of Canada would have to include about 8,000 television homes within range of CBOT in Ottawa and the thousands who viewed the Coronation on sets placed in more than 100 schools in the Ottawa and Hull areas. No estimate is available of the many millions who saw the Canadian production in the U.S., where the NBC and ABC networks carried the first two hours of the CBC's telecast. The figures don't take into account the many thousands of Canadians who watched repeat telecasts of highlights from the original Coronation program.

Lustgarten Series To Be Repeated On T-C

The following report, by Lionel Simmons, is from Radio Times and may not be reprinted without permission.

T the beginning of the last war, A a man called Brent Wood, a BBC disc-jockey-was asked to undertake the important ask of countering the anti-British propaganda broadcast to the United States by the infamous William Joyce (Lord Haw-Haw). The invitation was not so unexpected as it would appear, for Brent Wood was no ordinary disc-jockey. He was a man with a double life and a dozen names: by day, a successful young barrister working alongside English legal luminaries such as Hartley Shawcross and Maxwell Fyfe; by night, a talented broadcaster who under various aliases was equally willing to take a small part in a play, spin a disc, entertain in children's programs, or write a radio script. His real name was Edgar Lustgarten.

In the knowledge of Lustgarten's "double life" it is easier to credit the remarkable one-man performance which made his series Prisoner at the Bar one of the broadcasting events of 1952 in the U.K. (By transcription, the series was presented on CBC Dominion last winter, and now it is to be heard again on CBC Trans-Canada, on Tuesdays (CBW 8:30 p.m.; CBK 9:30 p.m.; CBX 8:30 p.m.) starting July 14 and continuing for seven weeks).

On the BBC, the series was pre-ceded by a single "experimental" program designed to determine whether one man talking about a famous crime could hold the attention of listeners for a full half-hour. Lustgarten rose to the occasion by introducing a new and effective technique: in telling his story he acted the parts of judge, accused, witnesses and counsel,

Lustgarten, now in his middle forties, was born in Manchester . . . As a barrister, he never ceased to be acutely conscious of the drama of the law, the tense atmosphere of the court as the rival advocates battled to prove the guilt or innocence of the accused. It was perhaps for this reason that he sought relaxation in the lighter atmosphere of Broadcasting House, Manchester. As a broadcaster his assignments were many and varied; as a radio writer he was equally-and sometimes unexpectedly -versatile. That eminent barrister, the late Sir Patrick Hastings, would doubtless have been surprised to learn that Lustgarten, who sometimes acted as his junior, was the writer of songs like Something Must Be Wrong about Love and I Gotta Croon the Blues.

The war over, Lustgarten became a senior talks producer of the BBC's overseas service, In his spare time he wrote a novel, A Case to Answer, which became a best-seller, and in due course resigned to concentrate on writing. Within a few months he had established an enviable reputation as a writer specializing in crime. But the boyhood ambition fulfilled only left him with an urge to try something new. In 1950 he launched the popular BBC television series In the News and has been its editor ever since.

Prisoner at the Bar added his name to that select list of people who have made radio reputations by merely talking in front of a microphone.

International Concerts

TWO series of concert programs designed to reflect contemporary European and Latin American interests in music, past and present, have been prepared by the CBC International Service for the Trans-Canada network. One is heard on Friday nights (W-7:30 p.m.; K-10:00 p.m.; X-9:00 p.m.) (starting July 10), the other on the CBC Wednesday Night program (W-9:30 p.m.; K-9:30 p.m.; X-8:30 p.m.) (starting July 15).

Many of the transcriptions have been supplied by radio organizations in Germany and Austria with which the CBC International Service collaborates in its shortwave broadcasts. These include the North West German Radio in Hamburg, RIAS (American sector) Berlin, Radio Frankfurt, Radio Muenchen and Radio Wien. These organizations have recorded performances by Europe's most distinguished artists and orchestras, as have their brother organizations in other countries of western Europe and of Latin America.

The job of selecting from all the recordings which have reached the Radio Canada Building in Montreal from these sources has fallen to Hel-

mut Blume, staff member of the McGill Conservatorium who also arranges and introduces The Story of Music on CBC Trans-Canada on Saturday afternoons. In picking and choosing, his aim is to provide Canadian listeners with a balanced impression of the music which is being performed at present in other countries by the leading musical groups and soloists. He is avoiding music which is readily available in Canada on regular commercial records, so that the programs will present a predominance of music which would not otherwise be heard by Canadians at

Preliminary work on the programs was done by the various foreign-language sections of the CBC International Service. They obtained lists of transcription available and arranged for shipment on tape or disk of those tentatively selected.

A great variety of music has become available to the CBC this way, including little-known works by Beethoven and other great composers of the past, contemporary orchestral and chamber music, and chamber operas. Special efforts have been made to get material from European music festivals such as the Bonn Beethoven Festival and the Cologne New Music Festival. A recording of last year's Beyreuth Wagner Festival performance of Tristan and Isolde is one of the major items under consideration.

The most mystifying offer came from the Cologne Festival, which listed as available two lecture-recitals called Music Concrete and Elektronische Musik. At the time of writing these records hadn't arrived in Montreal and nobody would venture an opinion as to what concrete and electronic music are all about. Inevitably there have been complications in the job of getting such a large number of recordings across the Atlantic, Also, technicalities of obtaining copyright clearances and arranging for royalty payments have produced a fat file of correspondence relating to the project.

In one instance it was necessary for the CBC to send blank tapes overseas in order to obtain copies of certain transcriptions: one of the Austrian stations wanted to contribute to the CBC's projected series but could not spare any of its own cherished tape.

School Broadcast **Organizer Reports**

452 Programs Heard In Prairie Region, October to May

N a report covering School Broadcasts heard in the Prairie Region between October 6, 1952, and May 29 last (30 weeks), Fred Laight, CBC program organizer for school broadcasts, shows 452 programs broadcast - 226 originating in the West (Prairie Region and British Columbia). Of the western programs, 148 originated in Manitoba, 16 in Saskatoon, 41 in Alberta, and 21 in British Columbia. Included in the total are 190 broadcasts of the CBC series Kindergarten of the Air, and 36 National School Broadcasts.

Broken down, the western programs showed 122 talks, 57 drama, and 47 music; 39 of the talk programs were in French, produced by Jean Charles Chapais, former French producer at Winnipeg, now at CBC Montreal.

Drama programs, though less numerous than talks, consumed more time and involved more personnel. There were 31 half-hour and 13 quarterhour plays, with 132 hours rehearsal, and 18¾ hours air time. Actor-per-formances totalled 198. Thirty-five individual actors were heard.

CBC Wednesday Night.-The CBC Wednesday Night program was five years old in 1952, and at the close of the 1952 season had presented 900 hours of varied programs

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of July 5, 1953 July Chores in the Garden.

- 1. During July the last cultivation of the garden should be made to clean up weeds and leave the soil in good condition for the balance of the season
- 2. Don't cultivate during August when the cutworm moths are laying their eggs.
- 3. Summer cultivation should be shallower than spring cultivations. Plant roots are now extended between the rows and likely to be damaged by deep cultivation.
- 4. Check plants for insect pests and plant disease and take appropriate control measures.
- 5. Hill potatoes just enough to protect tubers against sun scald and disease spores. Heavy hilling is wasteful of soil moisture.
- 6. Prune tomatoes to limit crop to what plants can mature.
- 7. Prune dahlias and sweetpeas by removing lateral shoots, if larger flowers on longer stems are desired.
- 8. Sow pansy seed in a frame to provide vigorous young plants for next spring. Young plants winter better than old ones.
- 9. The North American Lily Show is being staged in the Royal Connaught Hotel, Hamilton, Ontario, July 17-18
