Prairie Profiles

Second of a series by Winnipeg writer-actor Cec Montgomery on the actors and actresses heard on network drama productions from Winnipeg

2. MORAY SINCLAIR

The CBC canteen is not, perhaps, the best spot for an interview, but when an opportunity presents itself you grab it, regardless of location. Enticing Moray Sinclair there with the promise of a cup of coffee was the work of a moment; six generations have had little or no effect on Scottish ancestry.

Once seated I fired my opening broadside. "Okay, Moray," I said. "You know what I want. Let's have it."

Exhaling a cloud of smoke, Moray grinned as he thought aloud: "Trouble is to know where to begin."

"Well," I prodded. "Let's start with radio. When and where?"

My first contact with radio," he replied, "was in 1925 I guess, in Montreal. I was handling publicity for a night club there and the owner suggested I fill the spot as M.C. for the show as well. Stage

experience I'd had, but night club host — that was something else again. However, he persuaded me. The 'hosting' eventually included interviewing celebrities, American and Canadian, and once I got over the initial stage fright I thoroughly enjoyed it."

In 1930 Moray took part in a radio series called *Just Supposin'*, broadcast from the old CKY (later

CBW) studios in Winnipeg. Shortly after this, business commitments caused a lull in Moray's professional career; it lasted for 15 years. In 1933, however, while working with a Winnipeg department store, Moray played the leading role in *Man Born to Be Hanged* for the company's Maskers' Club. This was the year of the first Dominion Drama Festival. The play was entered and it won the regional award. The players moved on to Ottawa — and won again. Then the group was asked to perform in Eaton Hall in Toronto. After this performance the director (Wes McQuillan) was approached by the CBC and the group's *tour de force* was complete when the play was broadcast to the country on a national hook-up.

"The procedure was quite simple in those days," Moray recalled. "—a table with a mike around which the cast sat and delivered its lines."

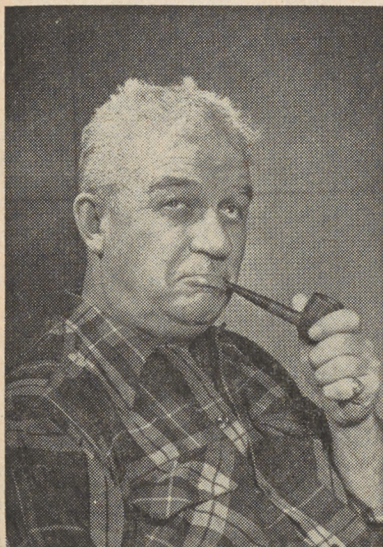
Sandwiched between his many professional duties (he was supervisor of the store's mail order catalogue for 15 years, supervisor of its public relations department in Toronto for two years, and supervisor of its western advertising department) he found time to continue in amateur dramatics. Until the beginning of the war he was both an actor and producer with the Winnipeg Little Theatre, then the department of munitions and supply claimed his services. On leave of absence he wrote and produced *Voices of Victory*, an on-the-spot radio program of interviews with factory workers, and handled the publicity for Victory Loans.

Recently he has appeared on the stage in *Our Town* (which he also produced), *The Man Who Came to Dinner* (in the leading role), *Twelfth Night* (as Sir Toby), and *Do You Remember*, a Rainbow Stage production which grew out of a CBC-TV production.

Since 1952 Moray has acted regularly in radio dramas, and school broadcasts from Winnipeg. He is heard most frequently as Dick Jackson in *The Jacksons and Their Neighbours* on the CBC Farm Broadcast. On television, he has taken part in several plays.

Moray is living proof of the dictum that a busy man gets things done. He is a past president of ACRTA (Association of Canadian Radio and Television Artists), regional vice-president of the Canadian Council of Actors and Artists, Director of the Shoestring Theatre, and owner of a successful public relations and advertising counselling business.

Born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, in 1900, Moray moved to Norway House (which had been established for the Hudson's Bay Company by one of his ancestors) when he was about one year old. When he was 17 he entered the Royal Military College at Kingston, graduating three years later. He then joined the R.C.M.P., serving in Regina and Vancouver. He resigned to enter the advertising business in Montreal in 1924. What happened from that point on has just been told.

Wayne and Shuster Return To Radio—CBC and BBC

To Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster, North America's top television comedy team, Toronto has always been home, and they don't want to leave it. That's why they're so delighted with an agreement they've reached with the CBC, which will assure their participation in Canadian television for the next five years. "We hope it's an affirmation of our faith in the future of TV in this country," they said in an interview. "Perhaps it will start a trend . . . other Canadians may see that the grass at home is pretty green."

Robert McCall, CBC supervisor of variety, shares their enthusiasm: "We are pleased to be able to arrange for the continuation of a major program in the variety field over the next five years. It is encouraging to know that we are now getting to the point in Canadian show-business where we can hold talent of this calibre on the basis of Canadian audience interest and commercial support."

Wayne and Shuster will appear in a series of "specials" starting this fall—their 22nd year in show-business. They won't follow any format, but will experiment in new directions, and hope to widen the scope of TV as a comedy medium. Their contract with Ed Sullivan runs for another year, so they'll be playing for laughs on U.S. television, too, from time to time. Summer plans include golf for Frank and sailing for Johnny and a possible trip to England. They've been invited to do two spectacles for British television, but haven't said a final "yes."

Britons will, however, hear Wayne and Shuster in their "original" form during Canada Week (May 30-June 6) in Britain. A special half-hour show to be presented this Monday on the Trans-Canada radio network (10:30 p.m. on CBW, 9 p.m. on CBK, and 8 p.m. on CBX) is one of several CBC radio programs to be carried on the BBC.

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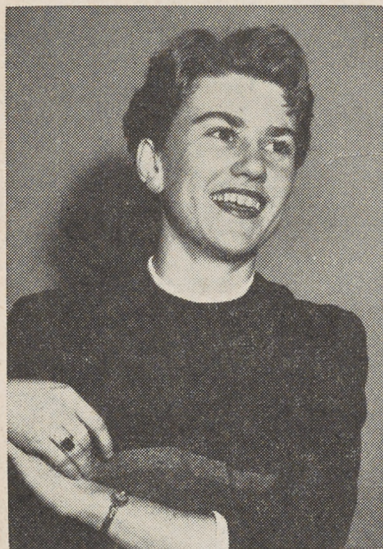
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Meet Brenda Cordwell . . .

"Coffee Break" Girl at CJLH-TV

Short in height (5'1") and long in experience (nine years in broadcasting), Brenda hosts both the weekly *Hoyt's Home Guide* and the *Coffee Break* period of the daily *Stage Seven*. She is also seen extolling the merits of many products, from soft drinks to ladies' shoes, on local TV commercials.

Brenda started her career as librarian and women's commentator at radio station CFAC in Calgary, then moved to the promotion department at CKWX in Vancouver for one year. She has been with CJLH-TV since it opened in 1955.

She recalls as highlights of her career interviews with singer Igor Gorin, comedienne Anna Russell, and conductor Sir Ernest MacMillan. The "greatest thing that ever happened" to her was winning an award for the best character actress in the 1958 Alberta finals of the Dominion Drama Festival. Brenda has been active in amateur theatrical groups, including Calgary's well-known Workshop 14 under Betty Mitchell (who will be interviewed on *Trans-Canada Matinee* this Friday—see page 30) for 16 years.

Acting is not Brenda's only outside interest. A rabid sports enthusiast, she possesses nine bowling trophies (which she insists were not gained in major competitions); she is secretary of the Southminster Church choir, and her greatest desire—to travel—will be partly satisfied this summer when she spends two months in Europe.—*Babs Pitt, promotion manager, CJLH-TV.*

Who'd be dictator? Kwame Nkrumah, of course.

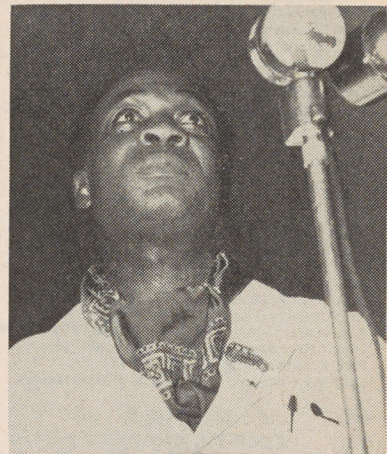

In its report on Ghana this Wednesday, *Close-Up* studies the development of what Nkrumah has called "the African way of doing things." That of course means a good look at the Ghanaian people.

They're a happy, smiling people, the 5,000,000 Ghanaians. It shows even in the names they give their buses. Not Downtown or Acrosstown or Don Mills or Main Street or Belt Line . . . not in Ghana. (Please turn to page 15)

Who Makes a Good Panelist?

"Fighting Words" producers have made some unexpected discoveries

THE AUDIENCE never knows when a verbal explosion will occur. It's the unpredictability of *Fighting Words* that explains why a simple-format show has not only survived six-and-a-half years on television and radio, but has grown steadily in popularity as a thinking man's half-hour. Sometimes chairman Nathan Cohen is caught in lively cross-fire as soon as the show starts; at other times the discussion works up slowly to eruption point. Or maybe there'll be no bang at all, but an even-tempered, fascinating presentation of opinion and revelation of personality.

Many people have wondered whether *Fighting Words* is completely spontaneous. The answer is a decided yes. The four guests on each show aren't told beforehand what the topics of conversation will be. There is no rehearsal.

Cohen believes in keeping to the background as much as possible, letting the conversation run along freely. He drops quotations in mid-stream and substitutes others to maintain the flow of conversation, or lets the discussion of a single quotation continue for the whole half-hour, if it's particularly stimulating. New, fresh faces appear on the show each week. There are no regulars, but some favorites have been invited back for another session.

What type of person makes a good panelist? One capable of quick, spontaneous thinking and expression, who won't monopolize the conversation, but isn't afraid of being candid. If one tends to drown out the others, or misinterpret what they say, Cohen moves in quickly, and has, on occasion, bluntly ended the conversation, leaving the gabby person holding his bag of words in mid-air. Cohen says: "The annoying thing is knowing that a panelist has some decided and interesting

views on a subject, and not being able to get him to say what he *really* thinks." When that happens, Cohen sometimes tries a bit of subtle teasing to get him to speak out.

For some strange reason, most women make poor *Fighting Words* panelists. Cohen and producer Cliff Solway are far from anti-feminists. They want to have women on the show, and in trying to find the ideal type they've invited all kinds to take part—young and old, beautiful and plain, smokers and non-smokers, lively and quiet. But, with the exception of Charlotte Whitton, Dr. Hilda Neatby, and one or two others, feminine panelists suddenly become inhibited when the show begins to roll. "It's no reflection on their ability," Cohen hastens to assure. "It's just something psychological. Many of them have been very successful TV performers on other shows."

To keep *Fighting Words* as topical and fresh as possible, guests aren't chosen until a few days before showtime. Solway and Cohen sometimes select quotations for the show first, and then look for people who might approach the subject vigorously. Or they'll select panelists first, and then use quotes that might elicit lively opinions from them. Nobody has ever refused an invitation to take part.

The research involved in *Fighting Words* is considerable, and Cohen and Solway do it all themselves. Each week hundreds of letters arrive with suggestions for quotations or guests, and discussions of issues raised on the show. Every letter is read and answered. This mail is of a very personal kind, and is one of the things Cohen and Solway like best about the show. Listeners appear to be from nearly all stratas of society, and are all loyal and articulate.

WALLY KOSTER stood at the soda fountain, idly playing with the dummy sodas provided by props. Joyce Hahn sat in the *Hit Parade* audience seats and worked on a big tapestry; it showed two brightly coloured ballet dancers. Phyllis Marshall talked to one of the cameramen.

"We're lucky to have Wally Koster as emcee and singer," said producer Peter Macfarlane. "He's versatile. He sings opera one week — if you like to count *Porgy and Bess* as opera — and next week he sings a song made famous with 17-year-olds by a 17-year-old and called *There'll Never Be Another You*."

In the studio below the control room Wally absent-mindedly sucked on a straw. Then startled, he hurriedly dropped the soda glass. A stagehand looked at him spluttering.

"You better spit that out Wally," said the stagehand. "It's paint."

"Spit it out!" said Wally. "I like it." — But he left the studio for ten minutes.

"Like I say," said Peter Macfarlane. "We're lucky to have Wally Koster. He can sing songs to please the whole family."

Hardest part of a musical show like *Hit Parade*, according to Mac-

farlane, are the transitions between numbers. This is particularly so on the alternate *Hit Parades* which use a circular set with cameras coming in from any angle.

A huge imitation package of the sponsor's product — taller even than Koster ("I've heard of Kingsize, but this is ridiculous") — slid down out of the flies.

"Dolly in on that," Peter told the cameraman. "Tighter . . ." The package completely filled the screen, with Wally in front of it. "You'll just have time to shift those props behind it."

Other problems are solved a little cynically, like the time Wally had to rid himself of a bunch of milkshake cannisters.

"Drop 'em on the floor in disgust," said Peter.

"The Crewcuts did that three weeks ago."

"They did? Then we're repeating it by popular request."

Cross Canada Hit Parade first began on CBC-TV four years ago. It had two young producers, Stan Harris and Peter Macfarlane. Har-

such plays as *The Iceman Cometh*) and Janet Blair in musical comedy.

"This was wonderful experience in showing me just how people of that stature could handle a show without benefit of elaborate staging," Peter said. "The experience has been very helpful in working with *Hit Parade* in the round where the performance depends entirely on quality with little help from staging."

After the show, Peter talked a little about hit parades and rock 'n roll. "The original Hit Parades, pre-Rock 'n roll, contained good ballads competently sung by trained adults. And adults as well as the younger set listened to them. But then the early teen-agers and even younger groups became an economic factor. With them came rock 'n roll with its hypnotic rhythm and simple words. What's more, the teen-agers wanted to hear teen-agers singing the songs.

"Adults, naturally, found little to interest them in rock 'n roll or the teen-agers who sing it." Peter went on. "So we find a complete split in the record industry: the 33 $\frac{1}{2}$ rpm's coming packaged in elaborate albums, and the cheap 45 rpm's for the kids. Naturally, this posed a problem for hit parades in Canada, in Britain, and in the United States where they were originally born. How could a show designed to survey the record industry appeal to both age groups?"

"In the United States no solution could be found. It looks as if

this year is the last for the program, after about 25 years on radio and TV. In Britain a *Hit Parade* type program is still going but the effort to combine both tastes on the one program is obviously causing difficulties.

"It seems to me that Stan Harris and the CBC have found the only way to handle the situation—that is, alternate the programs between the two types of music: albums one night, records the other."

This still leaves a problem on record nights: how to fit rock 'n roll into a TV show. "The only variation in a lot of rock 'n roll songs," Peter went on, "are the recording gimmicks like echo chambers and multiple recordings, and vocal tricks, rumbles and screeches, groans by the singer. This type of rock 'n roll we can't handle on TV. Either it's technically impossible, or it just won't go across as music. On the other hand we can handle novelty rock 'n roll numbers like *Pink Shoelaces* and melodic rock 'n roll; that is, songs which might well have been written in some other popular idiom.

"In future," Peter concluded, "we intend to use singers who have experience and stature in the popular field to take the place of the gimmicks. There'll be our own local people, of course: Joyce, Phil and Wally have long since proved themselves. And we also plan to have people like Dorothy Collins, Johnny Desmond, Julius La Rosa, and Sarah Vaughn. In this way we are sure we can cope with the split personality of the record business and keep *Hit Parade* a popular show."

U.S. Variety Series To Star U.K. Comic

One of Britain’s top TV comedians and recording artists replaces Milton Berle on Kraft Music Hall this Wednesday.

Dave King will be featured in a comedy-variety show which will spotlight a guest star each week. The regular cast will include a group of six girl dancers and a mixed chorus of eight.

King is the first foreign personality in American broadcasting to be signed as the star of his own TV show without any previous TV appearances. He was recently introduced to U.S. and Canadian viewers as guest on the *Perry Como Show*.

He started his career as a music hall variety entertainer in London, won national acclaim with his first BBC-TV appearance in 1954, and had his own TV series, *The Dave King Show*, from 1955 to 1957. During that time, the comedian made his debut as a singer and dancer, and soon was recording on both British and American labels.

His records were quick hits, and in a short time he led the English hit parade and was fifth in the All-World Top Twenty. He has appeared on the London stage, headed a variety bill at the London Palladium, and starred in *The Dave King Show* at the London Hippodrome.

King was born in Twickenham, near London, in 1929. His hobby

is collecting books on the American Indian, and he and his wife—ex-dancer Jean Hart—have named their two daughters after Indian tribes. Cheyenne is two and Kiowa is one.

Scripts for King’s show on the Kraft Music Hall will be by two English writers, S. C. Green and R. M. Mills, whom King is bringing from England.

King will be seen on the Wednesday night Kraft Music Hall spot until September, when Perry Como will take over his half-hour and the Bat Masterson period which follows it. Buses there have names such as these:

Young No. 2 Girl, Fear God and Do Right, Canary Bird, Love Thy Neighbour, Envy No Man, He Who, And Such Is Life, Say What You Like To Me, I Believe In God, Zorro, Still Zorro, Still Zorro No. 2, Serve God And Shame The Devil, Keep Smiling.

And fishing boats . . . not Mary Lou or Sally or Miss Canada or Adventurer III . . . They call Ghanaian fishing boats Sea Never Dry . . . or Wave Lay Low . . . or Think of Yourself.

The people who use these buses and boats have been free since March 6, 1957—the day British rule ended and the Gold Coast became Ghana. The Nkrumah sort

of independence is the only kind most of them know. For the time being at least, Kofi Busia and his opposition party attract no great following.

Every problem Ghana has is candy-coated by the sweet stuff of freedom.

"Troubles?" one young Ghanaian told me. "Of course we've got troubles. But they're *our* troubles."

(*Close-Up* had its own troubles in Ghana. We failed, despite the help of diplomats, government ministers and officials, and top-rank journalists, to obtain an interview with Prime Minister Nkrumah. We cooled our heels—"Any day now; maybe he'll see you tomorrow"—for a week before we finally got face to face with Nkrumah. The following Wednesday he said; four days later. Cameras were set up in the courtyard of his castle home, ready to shoot anytime he could spare 20 minutes, when we were informed that the prime minister was still too busy. He remained "too busy" until we left Ghana.)

The methods the government uses in meeting Ghanaian problems are what Opposition Leader Busia protests—methods which recall Nkrumah's warning in his autobiography.

"For a newly independent nation," he wrote, "even a system based on social justice and a democratic constitution may need backing up, during the period following independence, by emergency measures of a totalitarian kind."

Totalitarian, says Busia, is precisely the word for Nkrumah's tactics. Nkrumah would probably call it nation-building. And, on the surface, neither Ghana in general nor Nkrumah in particular is greatly concerned. The government goes right on expanding public education, developing its airline and steamship company, building harbours, opening a law school and a school of journalism (Africa's first), attracting industry . . .

Some observers say they are not concerned that government news-

MUSIC ON RADIO

By DR. BOYD NEEL, *Dean, Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto*

On Saturday* there is a concert which is announced as commemorating the 150th anniversary of the birth of Mendelssohn. As Mendelssohn was born in 1805, I imagine that this must have been recorded in 1955. Anyhow, it is given by the Gewandhaus Orchestra of Leipzig, with which group this composer was intimately associated for much of his life. Leipzig has always had important musical connections—the home of the famous St. Thomas School, the Gewandhaus Orchestra, the Conservatory of Music, on the faculty of which at one time both Mendelssohn and Schumann were to be found simultaneously, and the

Planning the Post-News Talks

Dorothea Cox and Lou Miller are constantly on the alert for good material for CBC radio's most regular talks series

Dorothea Cox, program organizer for radio's *Post-News Talks*, shuffled through some papers on her desk. "Well," she said, "we heard recently of a man now in Montreal who has been teaching Shakespeare to African natives. We've asked our Montreal people to look him up about doing us a post-news talk. It seems the Africans found certain plays quite incomprehensible—their custom of arranged marriages for instance precluded any understanding of Romeo and Juliette. The Montreal people themselves suggested a talk on the new jet airliners spanning the Atlantic, soon maybe in less time than it takes to get to the airport.

"Then again we heard of a specialist in blood groupings coming to Toronto," Miss Cox went on. "His main interest lay in a new development in this field: tracing ethnic groups through their predominant blood groups. A local doctor mentioned him to one of the people in our department. Here's another: We heard of a Canadian in London going to Warsaw in a few weeks so we suggested to the CBC people in London they ask him to keep post-news talks in mind."

This wide range of subjects is typical of the post-news talks period. So too is their topicality. "I try to schedule ahead three post-news talks each week for *CBC Times*," said Miss Cox. "But I also leave one night blank each week so we can fit in any talks which are essentially topical."

The Talks and Public Affairs Department has various methods of hearing about suitable speakers.

A research assistant in Toronto keeps an eye on the look-out for people with a story. Scripts and tapes are sent in unsolicited. CBC Bureau and staff members in London, the U.S. and elsewhere send in suggestions, as do freelancers like Gladys Delmas in Buenos Aires, and William Stevenson in the Far East. Best of all, listeners themselves quite often send in suggestions as to what they would like to hear.

"We try particularly to get views on controversial subjects," Miss Cox said. "For instance, we had a stinging talk by a visiting professor about our universities which caused something of a stir."

Sunday night following the national news CBC radio carries another talks spot — *Our Special Speaker*. "We differ from post-news talks, I think, in that word 'special,'" said Lou Miller, organizer of the series. "Post-news talks can carry off-beat material, travel talks *per se*, commentaries and so forth, the main restriction being that they are interesting and well presented. We aren't so broad. In general, we fit our speakers into one or more of three categories. There's the nationally or internationally known name. Other people, for instance, have said what Bertrand Russell is saying on the hydrogen bomb. But Russell's name is now so prominent we have carried talks by him.

"Secondly, lesser names could qualify if they have some specially interesting thesis, though a thesis with public significance. For instance, we recently broadcast a talk by a young doctor who was

Wind Players Find Biggest Challenge In Small Music

The woodwind quintet probably demands more from performers than any other musical form. Each performer is virtually a soloist; yet the need for group sympathy re-mains. More, the wide range of tonal colour in a woodwind quin-tet adds problems not faced by, say, a string quartet.

But the greater the difficulties, the greater the rewards in over-coming them. And this challenge is the main reason the members of the CBC Woodwind Ensemble formed themselves into a group. They have been successful in their response to that challenge.

The members are all principals of the CBC Symphony Orchestra —Gordon Day, flute; Perry Bau-

man, oboe; Abraham Galper, clari-net; Eugene Rittich, French horn; and Nicholas Kilburn, bassoon. For the past three years the group has been giving occasional concerts but this is the first season of regu-lar concerts as a group on CBC

great publishing house of Breitkopf and Hartel. The most celebrated of all the directors of St. Thomas School was, of course, John Sebastian Bach who held the position from 1723 to 1750. This is probably the most famous music school in the world, at which several hundred boys between the ages of 10 and 19 receive a free education. About 60 of these boys are special musical scholars who are given the most comprehensive musical training to be found anywhere today.

The Gewandhaus Orchestra, which we are to hear on Saturday, takes its name from the building in which it plays - the ancient Cloth Hall of Leipzig. The present building, which somehow survived the Second World War, is considered to be one of the few acoustically perfect auditoriums in the world. At the Mendelssohn commemoration concert we can hear the Concerto for Two Pianos

and Orchestra in E major. Mendelssohn wrote two double piano concertos, of which the one in A flat is heard occasionally at concerts. I have never heard this concerto in E, however, and cannot recollect ever having read of a performance before, so that this should be something of the utmost interest to all lovers of this composer.

On Sunday evening (CBC *Symphony*) I see that *Les Biches* by Poulenc forms part of a ballet program. This was one of Diaghilev's most famous ballets and is full of fun and games. *Les Biches* is an idiomatic French term and means in fact *The House Party* and the ballet is just an amusing get-together of the various guests at a weekend party in the country. Towards the end of the work, Poulenc for some reason quotes the finale of Mozart's *Prague Symphony*; why, I have never discovered, unless in the very first production there was some special piece of stage business connected with this. I can remember seeing the ballet very soon after it was first produced in the 1920's, but cannot recollect any business of this kind.

In the same concert we are to hear three dances from John Weinzweig's ballet *Red Ear of Corn*, which dates from 1949 when it was produced at Toronto's Royal Alex during the Canadian Ballet Festival and was commissioned by the Volkoff Ballet of Toronto for performance at the Festival. This ballet is based on an old Indian legend, the Red Ear of Corn.

THE BAIT was the oldest in the world, and they swallowed it whole—the biggest practical joke in scientific history. Because their progress lies in doubting precepts, scientists are usually hard to hood-wink. But someone, whether man or woman is still open to conjecture, pulled off an enormous scientific hoax that was unexposed for four decades, and must have given its perpetrator many a laugh.

The scene of the crime was an innocent-looking gravel pit at Piltdown, Sussex. Between 1907 and 1911 workmen dug up bits of bones which they handed over to Charles Dawson, a local solicitor and amateur archaeologist. He and another scientist, Smith Wood-

The newspapers had a hey-day. Darwin's Missing Link! they shouted. England's Oldest Citizen Solves Scientific Puzzle! A century ago this year, Darwin had shown the horrified Victorians that both man and ape had descended from a common ancestor in the remote past, and here was the missing link in the chain of man's descent! Scientists descended on the Sussex gravel pit like locusts, and more bones were uncovered. A motley assortment they were, indicating that man in his early form was far from a pretty sight. There was a jawbone resembling that of an orangutang, thigh bones of something that looked like an extinct elephant, and bits of skull and

TOURIST GO HOME. Some Canadians are past masters at the art of losing money and alienating tourists. There's the service-station operator, for example, who reluctantly sells you his gasoline and whose washrooms are incredibly dirty. There's the restaurant owner who serves such "Canadian" menus as New England boiled dinner, Kentucky fried chicken and Virginia ham. And there's the roadside coffee shop that serves indifferent coffee from cracked cups to the blaring noise of a juke-box. No wonder tourists go home and vow never to come back. The National Film Board of Canada has just produced a film privately for the Canadian Tourist Association designed to encourage Canadians' hospitality toward tourists. Marion McCormick, the CBC's morning commentator in Montreal, reports on the film.

THE HOUSE THAT BARRIE BUILT. For the past month, Barrie Clark has been describing the joys, wonders and pitfalls of building a house. Today, the house is finished, but there remains decorating and landscaping without which it cannot really be said to be complete. teeth that were unquestionably human, and very ancient. Either the jaw belonged to the skull or it didn't. No fossil apes had ever been discovered in Britain, so the jaw and skull *could* be part of the same ape-like man. Some sceptics refused to be taken in. Monstrous skullduggery, they declared, and looked at Charles Dawson with grave suspicion. But more senior scientists hailed the "Dawn-man" as a great discovery, and set the age of the bones at between half-a-million and a million years old. If learned men accepted them as authentic, why should the rest of the world assume there had been any monkey tricks? The Piltdown Man was in, and Dawson rested on his laurels until he died in 1916. It was reported that in his last illness he talked incoherently about a skull, though through proprietary interest or guilty conscience, no one knows.

For many years the story of Piltdown Man turned up in university classrooms around the world as an important discovery in the theory of evolution. But in the early 1940's a new evolutionary theory was brought forward which did not require the missing link, and the Dawn-man didn't seem so important. In 1949 an analysis of the fluorine content of the Piltdown Man fossils showed that they could not be earlier than the Upper Pleistocene, or great ice age. The Piltdown Man was on very shaky legs. Then in 1953 the original specimens were shown to a group of leading palaeontologists at a scientific meeting at the Natural History Museum in London. The

scientists went to work on the bones with advanced modern techniques, and the Dawn-man was shown to be a complete fraud, a bundle of unrelated bones doctored to look old. Some cranial bits were definitely human and very ancient, but the jaw was believed to belong to a chimpanzee-like ape, the teeth had been artificially abraded, and various chemical tests proved that someone with a sense of humour and a clever knack for bluff had had himself a bit of fun at the expense of the rest of the world and the advance of science.

Maybe the prankster had tried one on for what he intended as just a brief fling at fooling the egg-heads, and then found his joke had run away with itself.

Most signs point to Charles Dawson as the culprit, or at least an accomplice. But because he isn't around to defend himself, writer James Bannerman feels the proof can't be considered conclusive.

Mr. Bannerman has been digging through the fascinating story of Piltdown Man, a whodunit of first rank, and has put together an exciting and amusing documentary for this week's CBC Wednesday Night. His research has extended to the records of various learned societies, newspaper stories, and a most entertaining book, *The Piltdown Forgery*, by one of the scientists who exposed the fraud, Dr. J. S. Weiner of Oxford University.

radio. The members have worked together in a number of other orchestras.

In the past composers have not written a great deal of music for woodwind quintets. In recent years, however, the standard of instrument construction has risen markedly, and so has the standard of performance on them. This has attracted more interest by composers in this field. Perhaps another attraction for modern composers is the challenge provided by the wide tonal variety of this type of group.

There's one puzzling question about a woodwind quintet—one of its instruments, the French horn, is brass. "The French horn acts as a mediator between the low bassoon and the next instrument above, the clarinet," says French horn player with the group, Eugene Rittich. The instrument also very often provides a foundation for the other instruments.

The inclusion of the French horn in the woodwind quintet goes back at least as far as Mozart. Mozart was particularly interested in the French horn through his friendship with a remarkably fine horn player, Leugeb. In addition to his inclusion of horn parts in woodwind quintets, Mozart also wrote a number of horn concerti,

thereby helping to popularize the instrument. The CBC Woodwind Ensemble's next concert, this Sunday morning, will feature Mozart's *Quintet in E major*.

The Ensemble will give two more concerts this summer in which the principal works will be: *Quintet*, op. 52 by Spohr (June 21); *Youth Suite*, op. 32 by Janacek (June 26, on *Concert Hall*).

Spohr, the German composer (born in Brunswick, 1784, and died in 1859), wrote a great deal of music including eleven operas and ten symphonies. Several performances of works by this now seldom-heard composer have already been heard this year—the centenary of his death.
