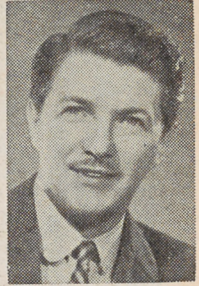

## The Ezra Pound Case

*The journals and letters of the mysterious and "hopelessly insane" expatriate poet, read by John Drainie*



Drainie

**A**N ANGRY old man living in a castle on the Italian Riviera in the custody of his wife writes poetry and carps at injustices real or imaginary with a rebellious spirit that has made him one of the most controversial figures of our age.

His life has been full of sharp contrasts. Born of highly conventional Quaker stock in an Idaho mining town, Ezra Pound grew up a shy, conformist boy, though he is loathe to admit convention flamboyantly in dress, manner, speech and writing. In his thirties and forties he was an important literary figure, leading and discerning new writing. In his mid-fifties he had become the mouthpiece for the obscurities of Fascism as the American Lord Haw Haw. After the war he was arrested on 19 counts of treason, but escaped hanging when psychiatrists declared him hopelessly insane. Four years later the Fellows in American Letters of the Library of Congress awarded him the Bollingen Prize for the best poetry by an American citizen. Released from hospital nearly two years ago as being harmless but still insane, he continues to write, a wiry old mixed-up rebel, mystic and literary leader.

His best period, they say, was 1908-1930, much of which he spent in England. Earlier he had graduated from Hamilton University, Clinton, New York, taught at the University of Pennsylvania, travelled in Europe and begun to set his reactionary course. Finding the American outlook too narrow he settled in England, where Richard Aldington recalls him as "a small but persistent volcano in the dim levels of London literary society."

Everything about him was unusual. He was a bundle of nervous energy, had "exuberant"

red hair over "a pale, cat-like face with greenish cat eyes" (the beard was a later prop), and a high, squeaky voice. His way of living, while not startling by modern standards, frequently made eyes pop. He signed his letters grandly with a seal in Chinese style, and liked to give small dinners, presiding over the stove himself in a flowing dressing gown, and entertaining at the harpsichord afterwards. He knows a fantastic number of dialects and languages old and new and in those days dramatically salted his conversation with them.

Pound held that "literature is the greatest good in the life of mankind," and to this end launched the Images Movement to get rid of "verse-slush and too many adjectives," among other things. He tried every verse form, invented some of his own, and looked round for more. He was generous with his help and advice among the younger writers—T. S. Eliot, Wyndham Lewis, William Carlos Williams, D. H. Lawrence, Robert Frost, Henry James and W. B. Yeats were among his proteges. Though he had little money himself he could always be touched for a fiver when funds were low.

Eventually he tired of "this stupid little island . . . dead as mutton," and escaped to Paris, where he added a large white beret and a flowing tie to his rig and continued to collect proteges. Hemingway went to him with much of his early fiction, he got James Joyce's *Ulysses* published, and sang the praises of Jean Cocteau.

Italy called to him next, and after that he seemed to go off on a tangent. His writing grew more obscure, his rebelliousness wilder

# Radio Ritual For 11,000,000

**BBC's favourite radio serial—  
"The Archers," begins its  
second year on CBC this  
month**

ONCE when Dan Archer, a principal character in the BBC's famous serial about country folk, *The Archers*, mentioned in one of the episodes that he had advertised in the local paper, *The Borchester Echo*, for a farm worker, nearly 200 listeners from all parts of Britain wrote in and applied for the job.

The BBC's Birmingham studios, where the program is produced, had to send replies explaining that the paper was as mythical as the village of Ambridge where the Archers live.

Last fall, however, a *Borchester Echo*, published by the BBC, appeared on Britain's bookstalls—for one edition only—to mark the 2,000th broadcast in this serial story which is followed by nearly seven million people in Britain on five evenings a week, and by another four million in the weekly "omnibus edition."

The first printing of this souvenir edition—350,000 copies—sold out on publication day and large reprint orders had to be filled. Eventually more than a million million copies were sold. The publication contained pictures and articles about the program personalities, a history of the seven-year-old series, an article by co-authors Edward Mason and Geoffrey Webb, and tributes from Britain's minister of agriculture, the president of the National Farmers' Union, and the president of the National Union of Agricultural Workers.

*The Archers* has been broadcast to listeners in Britain without a break since January 1, 1951. For the past year it has reached listeners in Canada, New Zealand, Australia, and Jamaica, through the BBC transcription service.

It all began with an idea thrown out by a Lincolnshire farmer at a meeting in Birmingham in 1948 to decide the future policy of BBC agricultural programs. British agriculture, he maintained, might best be served by a serial program on the lines of a thriller, for the farmer's seasonal struggle with the weather and with diseases that attack crops and livestock could be made as exciting as any tale of crime detection.

The Lincolnshire farmer has been proved abundantly right. More than 2,000 episodes and 10 million words later *The Archers* retains a devoted following of listeners all over Britain who take a warm personal interest in the characters.

The listeners also are quick to comment if they detect any inaccuracy in the picture of country

life presented. There were many letters, for example, when Dan Archer was a few days out with the timing of a sow farrowing. But such errors are rare in this agricultural saga. The men who write it spend most of their time with the sort of people they are writing about and they can call on the professional advice of the Ministry of Agriculture and other farming organizations.

An indication of how real *The Archers* and its characters have become to the people of Britain was given on one occasion when a member of Parliament, criticizing the country's agricultural policy, illustrated his point in the House by referring to the financial crisis Dan Archer was then going through. "British agriculture must

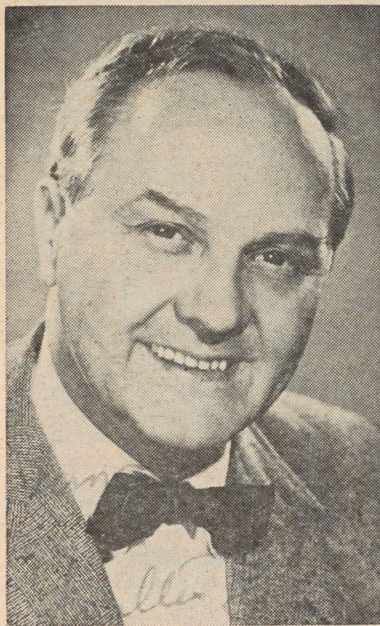
be in a bad way," he said. "Even old Dan Archer is going down the drain!"

## Hip But Not Beat

Nathan Cohen interviews Norman Mailer, author of "The Naked and the Dead," on CBC radio and TV

"IT'S a wicked deal to cut!"

**F**ighting Words producer Cliff Solway was referring to a 90-minute interview Nathan Cohen recorded in New York recently with Norman Mailer, controversial author of the best-selling war novel, *The Naked and the Dead*. With Cohen as a sounding-board, Mailer thought out loud in a fascinating revelation of a rebel personality with ideas. Now Solway has the job of reluctantly whittling it down to a third its size for a *Fighting Words* "special" on CBC-TV Sunday night\* and on CBC radio Wednesday morning.

Solway calls it "a pretty frank consideration of Mailer's own work and the philosophy of the Hip personality." The Hip, Mailer says, is the most important of the rebels against a serious disease in American middle-class society which is depriving it of its inspiration and freshness. Mailer is one of the chief exponents of the Hip attitude. Some people think he spouts a lot of hot air, that his ideas are too far-fetched. Mailer, of course, has answers for every conventional objection. He says that measured against a Hip personality, a Beatnik is a slob whose cult is merely a Bohemian fad. The Hip, on the other hand, is abstract, feels a great sense of moral and social freedom which he has learned to express in his own way. He is a rare type of bird, living by his wits, and may or may not be Bohemian in his dress or mode of living. Mailer's model is a certain type of Negro, as he explains on the show. He goes into great detail about what the Hip thinks and how he revolts against American conformity.

A really Hip person, he says, is one who, seeing a fight starting in

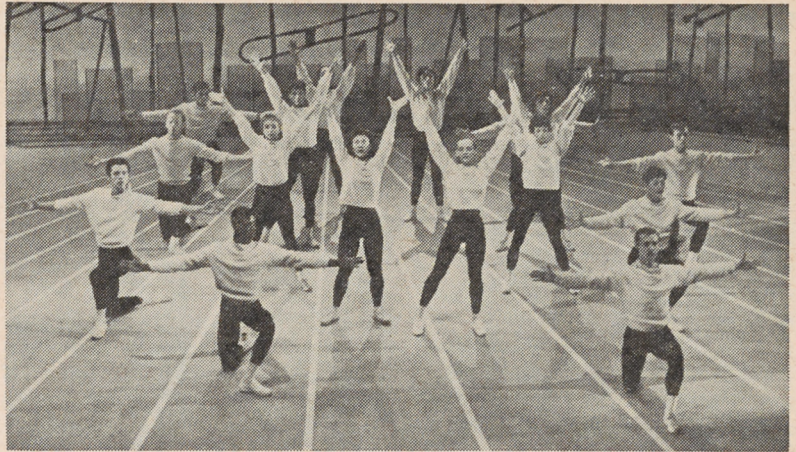

and more bitter, he took to proposing economic reforms, damned democracy and got his knife in the Jews. In 1939 he visited his homeland on a return ticket and raised eyebrows and tempers right and left with his remarks—said the unsettled situation should be laid directly at the feet of bankers and munitions interests, and described the heads of American universities as "pot-bellied, toadying presidents of fat beaneries."

He returned to Italy firm in his belief that Jefferson democracy had had it, and in 1941 began broadcasting dry, rambling Fascist propaganda to Americans from Rome by short wave. A year later he tried to join a group of Americans being shipped home via Lisbon, but Washington refused permission. He continued to broadcast and when Italy was defeated he was arrested and imprisoned in a camp near Pisa, where he wrote his *Pisan Cantos*, part of a monumental, esoteric and argumentative epic regarded by some as his best work, by others as his most absurd. It was this that won him the Bollingen Award.

After psychiatrists declared him insane he was not tried for treason, but confined in St. Elizabeth's hospital in Washington, where, he

said, his only consolation was the knowledge that there were 160,000,000 worse cases outside. He continued to read voraciously and write additions to his large collection of original poetry, and works on literature, music, art, economics, and translations, from the Italian, French, Chinese, Japanese and Latin—and to become an even more controversial figure than before. There were loud challenges in literary and academic circles, newspapers, magazines and Congress when he received the poetry award in 1949, and as a result the Library of Congress discontinued its practice of judging Bollingen Prizes and Yale University took on the job.

The furore had the advantage of reviving public interest in Pound's work, and although he may never be widely read or highly thought of personally, he has emerged as one of the most influential poets of his age. T. S. Eliot said of him: "Pound did not create the poets: but he created a situation in which, for the first time, there was a modern movement in poetry in which English and American poets collaborated, knew each other's works, and influenced each other."

The story of Ezra Pound, from his arrival in England in 1908 until his trial and hospitalization, will be told on CBC Wednesday Night this week in a radio documentary prepared by Bob McCormack from documents, poems, letters and comments by Pound and his associates. "I've tried to be as objective as possible," McCormack says, "to show why he is important in literary circles, and to try to show, through his letters, how he wound up broadcasting for Mussolini."

John Drainie will be heard as Pound. Jim Murray will produce.

a bar, would never forego the opportunity of getting into it. There is nothing passive about him, as there is about the Beats. It is his duty to live up to the full potential of his personality. If he does not, he feels dreadful next day—incomplete. Mailer deploras effeminate passivity in just about everything, especially politics, and as a counter balance seriously proposed Ernest Hemingway for president in the last American election.

Mailer is a great admirer and envious of Hemingway's literary triumphs, and in his recently published *Advertisements for Myself*, a clinical expose of his personal life, writing, ambitions and frustrations, he admits that he longs for Hemingway's crown. It looked as if it might fit when, at 23, Mailer's hard-hitting war story, *The Naked and the Dead*, became a best-seller, and Sinclair Lewis called him "the greatest writer to come out of this generation." His second book, *Barbary Shore*, a complete failure, was attacked as "sex ridden" and full of "loathsome decadence." He had difficulty finding a publisher for *The Deer Park*, his third novel, because of editorial disagreement over certain earthy passages. When it did come out in 1955, after birthpangs that left its author a physical and nervous wreck for a while, it sold fairly well, but its notices were mixed.

In the *New Yorker* Brendan Gill called it "a big, vigorous, rowdy, ill-shaped, and repellant book, so strong and so weak, so adroit and so fumbling, that only a writer of the greatest and most reckless talent could have flung it between covers." Mailer was not ill-pleased. He considered this one of the most perceptive of all its reviews.

He says what he is trying to achieve as a writer "is to be genuinely disturbing, and by this I mean no easy reliance upon material which is shocking or brutal in itself, but rather effects whatever is written about, so that life—which I believe is always disturbing if it is indeed seen—may serve

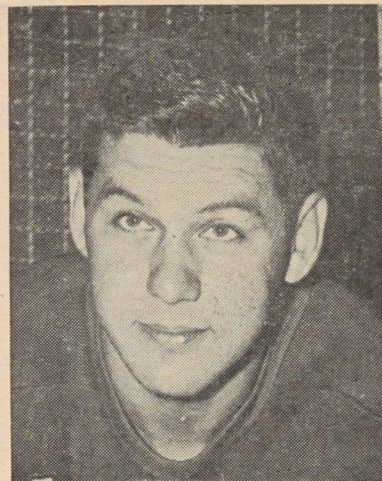
## 6. ALEX DELVECCHIO

One of the better centres in the National League, Alex Delvecchio, has long played in the shadow of the great Gordie "Red Wing," Detroit's supposed one-man team.

But with or without Howe, Delvecchio has demonstrated his ability as a smooth play-maker, the match of any centre in the League on his best nights. Delvecchio's problem over his eight-season NHL career has been his lack of consistency, his inability to sustain his top pace over a long stretch.

Nicknamed "Fats" because he is an easy-going, fun-loving young man, the 26-year-old Delvecchio may carry his carefree attitude into play a bit too often.

Last year, though Detroit finished in the cellar, Alex had his third best season, with 19 goals and 35 assists. He also won the Lady Byng trophy, the award given annually to the player best combining talent and gentlemanly play. Delvecchio spent only six minutes in the penalty box in the complete 70-game schedule.

At 6 foot and 190 pounds Delvecchio is strong enough to weather the heavy going but he prefers to play a fast skating, smooth passing style of game and by-pass the rough stuff.

Alex Peter Delvecchio was born in Oshawa, Ontario, on December 4, 1931, but lives in Fort William. He is married and has three children, the eldest of which is his only son.

Alex's greatest hockey recognition came in his second season when his 59-point total earned him the centre berth on the second All-Star team. In his eight seasons Delvecchio has scored a remarkable total of 378 points on 140 goals and 238 assists. - *Dennis O'Neill.*

A deceased boa constrictor came out of the cooler, and was coiled round the limb of a tree where it rapidly defrosted under the hot TV lights.

A white ibis, secured to the branch of a tree, winked evilly about and sank its beak into Steve Bloomer's hat.

All these things happened in a Montreal TV studio during rehearsals for a program on Africa next Thursday on *This Living World*.

The King, a 400-pound African lion, had been looking for small creatures underneath a chunk of synthetic rock. He rejected his trainer's command and accidentally drew some blood. As there was nothing but thin air between the trainer, master-of-ceremonies Bloomer, the cameraman and The King, the rehearsal broke up for a time. First aid was summoned, and thereafter The King behaved admirably until he spied the ibis. He

then took off in pursuit and got his paws wet in the studio pond before giving up the chase.

The baby elephant was catching a cold in the nose.

The ibis simply furnished atmosphere in the studio jungle, and so did the boa constrictor. The latter has been dead for a month, but the producer, with an eye to saving money, refuses to let go of it.

The producer is Adelin Bouchard and he mounts two shows like this every week for little more than the cost of one show. *The Living World*, with narration in French, is seen on the CBC French-language TV network under the title *La Vie qui Bat* (The Life that Beats). Although it is primarily designed for children, *This Living World* appeals to viewers of all ages. Among the 22,428 letters the show received last month, from 10 provinces and four northern states, many were from adult viewers as well as from students and their teachers. (In the same month, *La Vie qui Bat* received 20,686 letters in French.)

Steve Bloomer, a sandy-haired, blue-eyed commercial artist, has an engaging manner which makes personal friends of his viewers. Much of the appeal of the show must also be attributed to its special format. Bouchard and script-writer take natural history out of the classroom, and as far as possible into its natural setting. And here they disclose, with visual impact and a minimum of formal instruction,

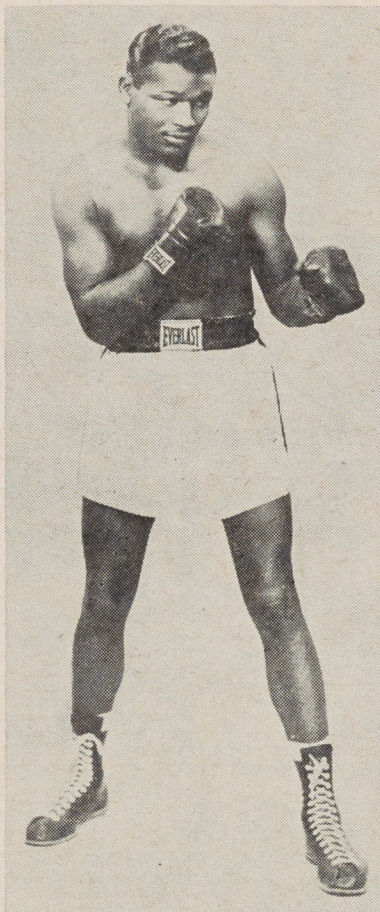

### MUSIC ON RADIO

By BOYD NEEL

ON Sunday morning the Vancouver String Quartet plays Respighi's second string quartet, which is generally known as the *Quartetto Dorico* on account of the composer's use of the Doric mode for the opening and main themes of the work. Respighi wrote two string quartets, the first in 1907 and the Doric quartet in 1934. This latter quartet is probably the more played of the two and the music is continuous, although divided into the usual four sections. There is frequent use of 7/4 and 7/8 rhythms and the finale is a kind of Pas-sacaglia built out of the main theme.

We don't, as a rule, hear much of Respighi's chamber music, which is apt to be forgotten by a public saturated with "Pines," "Fountains" and "Festivals," but in his quieter moments (and they were many) Respighi wrote some very beautiful music and I feel that his chief claim to posterity will be through works such as the third suite of *Ancient Airs and Dances*, the *Violin Sonata*, the *Botticelli Pictures* and the chamber opera *Maria Egiziaca*. In these works the composer shows us a side of his musical nature which one would hardly guess at from the huge orchestral symphonic poems.

Being a violinist himself, Respighi always wrote well for the string instruments and it was while he was principal violist in the opera at St. Petersburg that he met Rimsky-Korsakov, who was to be the big influence in his life. The classical modes always fascinated him and, besides the *Quartetto Dorico*, he wrote a *Concerto Gregoriano* for violin and a *Concerto "in modo misolidico."*

On Sunday the Winnipeg Symphony concert includes Ravel's

*Rhapsodie Espagnole*, one of the most wonderful examples of orchestral colour in the whole of music. It has been said that all the best Spanish music has been written by Frenchmen and there is a certain amount of truth in this; although whether such a work as the *Rhapsodie Espagnole* is exactly what a Spaniard would rank as "Spanish" music is open to question. We know that Ravel described his *Bolero* as "orchestral effects without music" and he might well have described the *Rhapsodie Espagnole* as "orchestral effects with music." Probably his finest writing for the orchestra is to be heard in this work and the ballet *Daphnis & Chloe*. In fact the theatre always brought out the best in Ravel and there are few more delightful operas than *L'Heure Espagnole* and *L'Enfant et les Sortilèges*. Regarding his operas, it

is interesting to note that Hauptman's play *The Sunken Bell* continuously fascinated him as an operatic subject and he was working at it up until the first world war but he never completed what might have been a very striking work. Respighi, however, used the same story and produced a magnificent opera from it, which was produced at Hamburg in 1927 and had a great success for many years after that.

Incidentally, it was Respighi who hit on the ingenious idea in his last opera *Lucrezia* of having the plot narrated by a singer seated in the orchestra pit, with the action done in mime on the stage, rather in the fashion of the Monteverdi operas of the 17th century. This is an idea which might well be exploited again by modern composers.

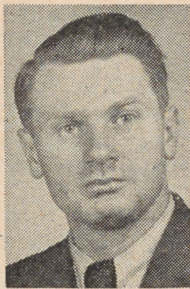

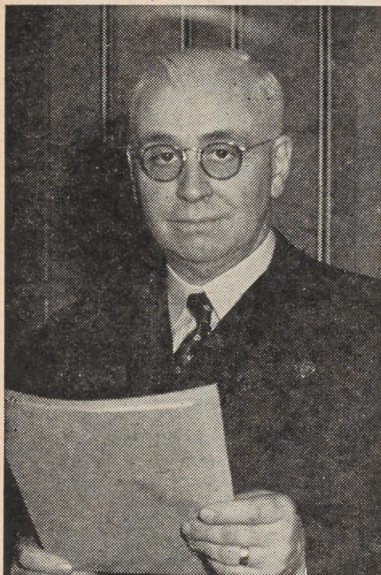

secrets of the great spectacle of life outdoors.

The programs are not always as hazardous as Thursday's, Bouchard insists, and Bloomer, who once performed before a captive audience of 128 squirrels, agrees. But he has also appeared with pumas, leopards, bears, lynxes, and a 300-pound buck which Bloomer describes as the most dangerous of all.

Usually the accidents which occur are relatively minor. Like the time the owl fainted when someone hooted instructions through the studio talk-back. Or the day a young deer jumped out of the studio compound and singed his hocks in a small campfire.

The African program was videotaped so that Bouchard and his crew could go on location early this month at his summer camp near St. Donat, 85 miles north of Montreal. Following the seasons, they will film the winter fight for survival of animals viewers saw earlier in their summer environment. Bouchard has two reasons for leaving the studio. One is his desire to provide as much realism as possible and to film Bloomer and Provost in the midst of the scene they are discussing. The other reason is a matter of pure economics. Bouchard finds that available stock film is often not the kind

# Music Down Under

*A 91-year-old Australian composer-conductor looks back on his personal contacts with great artists of the past*

ONE of the most fascinating personalities in Australia's musical work is a zestful 91-year-old composer-conductor, Alfred Hill, who reminisces about his eventful life in two editions of *Project '60* on CBC radio this Tuesday night and next Sunday. He tells of the exciting musical circles of Leipzig, where he was a student in the late 1880's.

As a violinist with the famed Gewandhaus Orchestra he played for two years under such famous conductor-composers as Brahms, Edward Grieg and Max Bruch. In a lively re-creation of that stimulating milieu, he recalls a memorable performance by Clara Schumann of her husband Robert's piano concerto. As a member of the audience he heard Brahms play his own C Minor Trio. He describes one of the great milestones of musical history—the first performance of Brahms' Double Concerto for violin and 'cello with the composer conducting from his original manuscript.

Though famous as a conductor in Australia and New Zealand,

Alfred Hill is best known as a composer. He has written seven operas, two symphonies, seven concerti, a Mass and hundreds of minor works. His *Welcome Overture* (a reversal of Hadyn's *Farewell Symphony*) has convulsed audiences all over Australia—the players come on stage in order of importance, beginning with the harpist, who is the least expensive, and ending with the conductor, the most expensive, who can stay only a few minutes because he has to fly to South America to keep another engagement.

As with most Australian musicians his works have been influenced greatly by his love of the aboriginal music of the "outback." One of his most beautiful and evocative compositions, *The Moon's Gold Horn*, will be heard in Canada for the first time on *Project '60*.

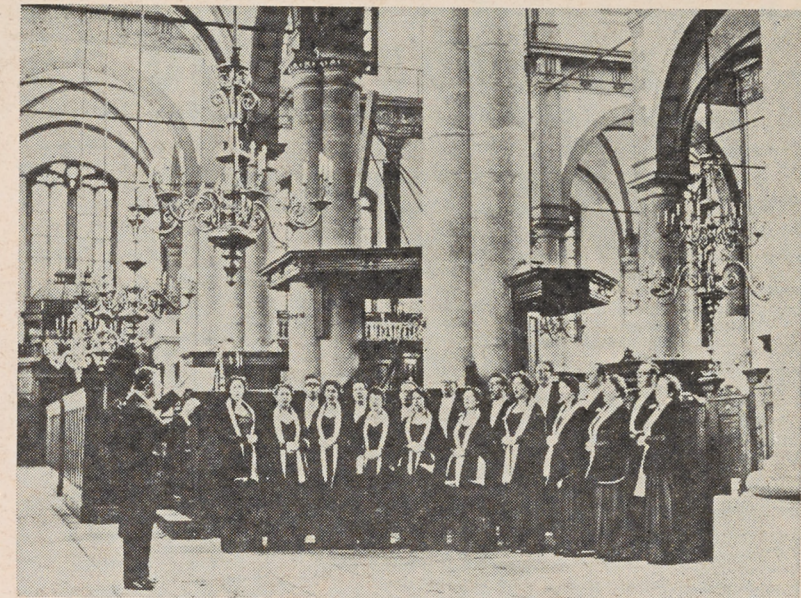

**THE NETHERLANDS CHAMBER CHOIR**

**Dutch Chamber Choir on CBC**

CBC Wednesday Night this week presents the famed Netherlands Chamber Choir in its North American debut. The concert is being presented in association with the Faculty of Music, McGill University. The broadcast will originate from McGill's Redpath Hall.

The 18 members of the Netherlands Chamber Choir include some of Holland's most distinguished singers, all of whom appear regularly in oratorio and opera, with orchestras, or in broadcast recitals.

The Netherlands Chamber Choir was formed in 1937 by its present conductor, Felix de Nobel. Born in Holland in 1907, de Nobel began his musical career as a concert pianist following studies with Hen-

drik Andriessen and at the Amsterdam Conservatory. He was for some time the pianist of the Amsterdam Chamber Music Society and one of Europe's best-known accompanists. In recent years he has become well known as a commentator on musical programs on radio.

from the opera "Halka" by Stanislaw Moniuszko, performed by members of the Warsaw State Opera and the Berlin Symphony Orchestra conducted by Miszyslaw Mierzejewski. Composed in 1847, "Halka" is considered Moniuszko's greatest work. It has been performed over 1,000 times in Warsaw alone. The composer is the great figure in Polish music between Chopin and Paderewski.

Holland is proud of its "Nederlands Kamerkoor" and frequently sends it abroad as "cultural ambassador" of its homeland. In recent years the choir has appeared at the Edinburgh Festival (where it was described as "one of the most enjoyable and rewarding events in 1951), at Sainte Chapelle in Paris ("a delight for the ear"), the European Choir Festival in Vienna ("a moving experience"), and the Sagra Musicale in Perugia, Italy.

Following its Canadian broadcast concert from Montreal, the choir will begin an extended tour of North America where its reputation has preceded it in the form of several fine recordings.

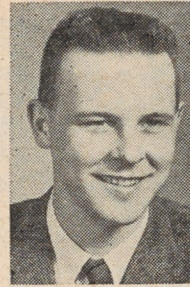

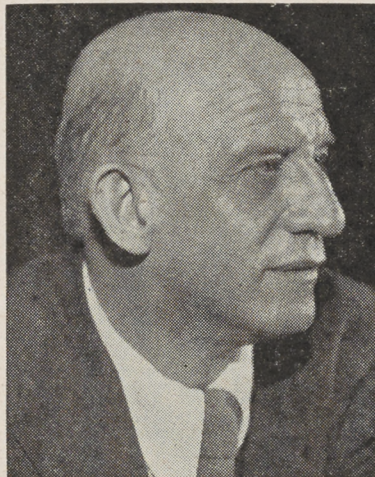

as the gadfly to complacency, institution, and the dead weight of public taste. It is, I believe, the highest function a writer may serve, to see life (no matter by what means or form or experiment) as others do not see it, or only partially see it, and therefore open for the reader that literary experience which comes uniquely from the novel—the sense of having one's experience enlarged, one's perceptions deepened, and one's illusions about oneself rendered even more untenable. For me, this is the highest function of art, precisely that it is disturbing, that it does not let man rest, and therefore forces him so far as art may force anything to enlarge the horizons of his life. It is my hope that the body of the work I have done and intend to do will fulfill that purpose in its own small way."

Mailer is at work on another book which he says "will be the proper book of an outlaw, and so not publishable in any easy or legal way."

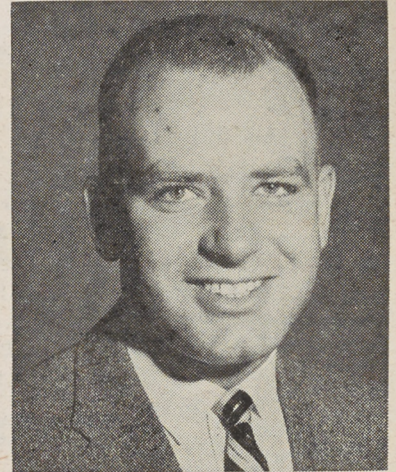
