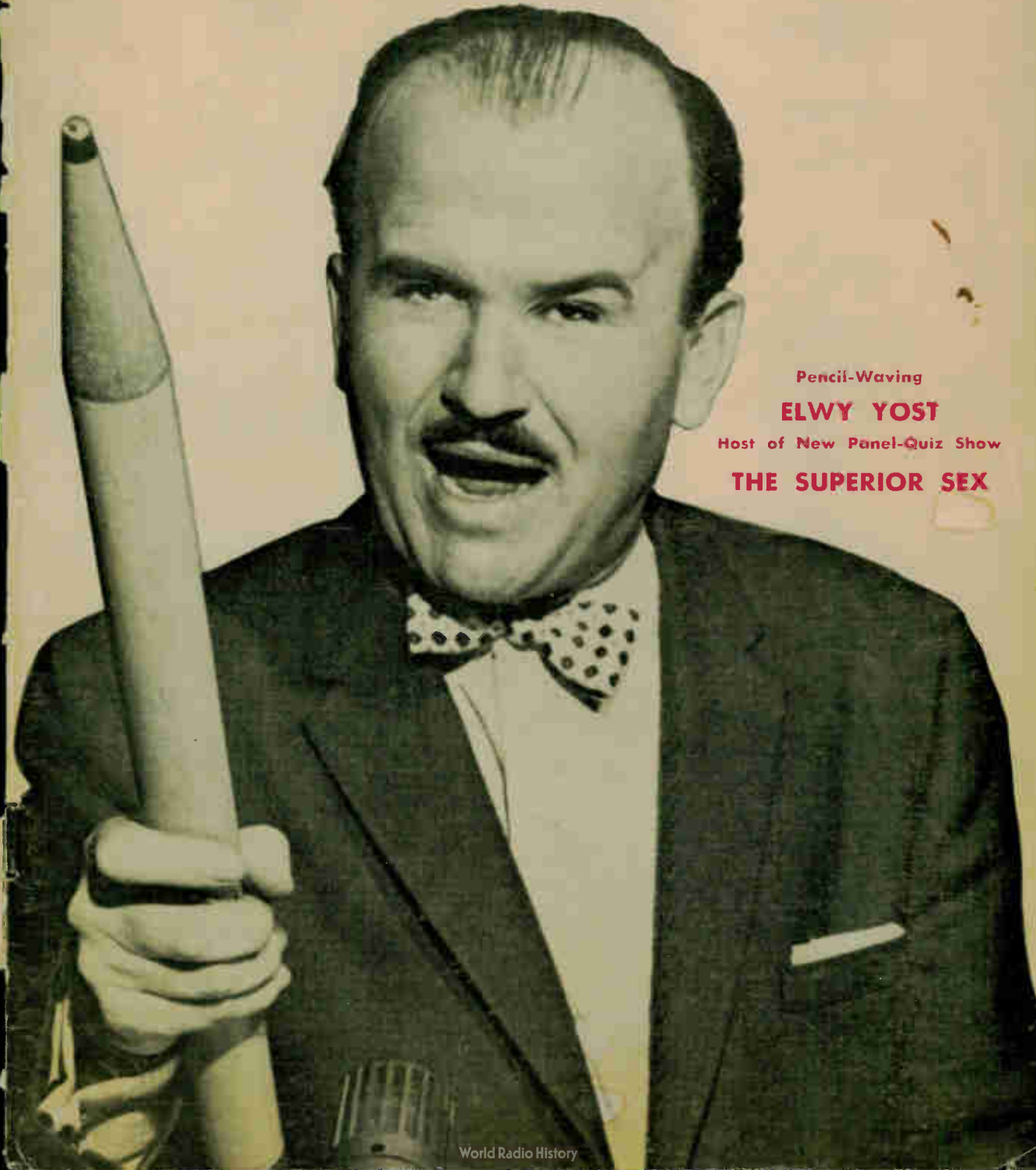

Receives Canada Council Grant

CBC GRAPHIC designer Leo Rampen is now in Europe to do research in production methods with European art film-makers.

Under terms of a Canada Council grant, Rampen will visit Brussels, London, Paris, Milan, Copenhagen and Amsterdam to study methods and systems used there.

"I'm particularly interested in art film techniques as they might be applied to television," explains Rampen.

Rampen was born of Dutch parents, in Surabaya, Java, in 1928. Like many Dutch parents in Java, the Rampens sent their son to Holland for higher education. Leo attended the Polytechnic Institute in Delft, Holland, and then studied art in Paris. He holds a Master's degree in history of art and archaeology from the University of Toronto.

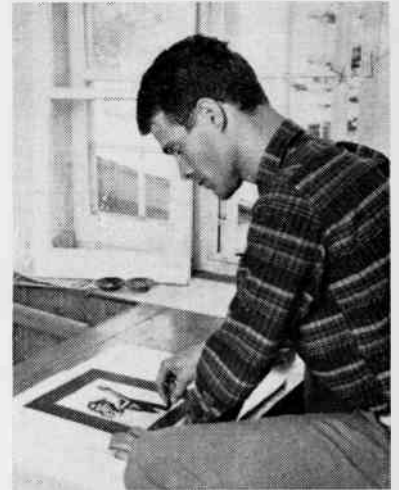
Rampen has created graphic designs for CBC's religious, children's, news and public affairs departments, and animated designs for special inserts in programs such as Explorations.

"Our department is consulted early in the planning stage of a program," says Leo. "A graphic designer, as a visual communications specialist, often plays an important role in the production of a TV show."

Rampen says of the CBC: "It is one of the few organizations on this continent that affords so much

opportunity in the field of graphic design. Because of multiple application of artistic talent, many of our artists get experience in various aspects of graphic design and visual communications technique."

Rampen lives with his wife and three children on a farm at Oak-

ville, Ont. His wife operates the farm, on which they breed Nubian goats.

Leo became interested in English and Scottish country dancing when a boy, and now teaches a dancing class as a hobby.

"TV? I watch it professionally," says Rampen. "It's a visual communications form to me—as well as entertainment."

Jake Makes Her Rain Again

A TIP FOR weathermen in Saskatchewan: It might be to your benefit to include in forecasts for next Tuesday a phrase such as "possibility of rain in some areas . . ." because it *will* rain in Crocus. Jake is going to make it rain in that mythical town, just as he has done in the past. In fact legend has it that he even made it rain in the real community of Fort Qu'Appelle.

This might seem like stretching things a little and it is . . . but just a little. The names are fictitious but *Jake and The Kid* (or any other characters who appear in this famous series which begins on CBC-TV could be anyone who lives in southern Saskatchewan.

For it is a true - to - life factor which has made *Jake and The Kid* so popular in magazine articles, on CBC radio and, up until now, in the odd appearance on CBC television. W. O. Mitchell, who first introduced Jake, the hired farm-hand, and the 12-year-old Kid to Canadians by way of a Macleans magazine article in August, 1942, has often said that Jake is entirely autobiographical.

In Mitchell's words, Crocus "is on that CNR branch line running from Arcola and containing, like the beads on a mail-order necklace, the towns of Brokenshell, Disraeli, Conception and Bluebell. Crocus is not a divisional point, nor is it on the Soo line. But Crocus people (Repeat Golightly, the gabby barber; Miss Henchbaw, the school-marm; Way Freight Brown, the droll station agent; Old Man Gatenby, Jake's feudin' rival; etc.) drive easily to Regina for the fair, to Estevan, or to the border and South Portal in the States. The Brokenshell River runs through

the southern edge of the town, so that rightly it has been called the navel of southern Saskatchewan."

Getting back to making it rain in Crocus, that is the theme of the first episode of the CBC-TV series. Entitled *The Day Jake Made Her Rain*, the story tells of a drought Crocus is experiencing and how Jake solves the crisis. This particular episode was one of the first of the *Jake and The Kid* programs on CBC radio, the series having begun June 17, 1950, on CBC Trans-Canada. It continued as part of the regular radio schedule for the next six years.

In the fall of 1953, Mitchell adapted *The Day Jake Made Her Rain* for performance at the Saskatchewan Arts Board Drama Workshop in Valley Centre, Fort Qu'Appelle. At the time, Saskatchewan had a three-week dry

spell but when the audience left the theatre at the end of the performance they ran smack into a rainstorm. Did Jake *really* have a hand in it? Mrs. Burton James of Seattle, who directed the production, went home in a state of perplexity.

For the CBC-TV series, Murray Westgate plays Jake, 13-year-old Rex Hagon is The Kid and Frances Tobias is Ma. Producers for the series are Ronald Weyman and David Gardner.

What kind of a person is Mitchell? Space doesn't permit us to go into his background but if you missed CBC-TV's *Close-Up* interview (Pierre Berton asking the questions) Tuesday, June 27, watch the television series of *Jake and The Kid*. Just by observing Jake's actions and personality, you'll know more about Mitchell.

The Predatory Female

WOMAN is really the huntress and the one who does the wooing in the battle of the sexes, according to the theory George Bernard Shaw illustrates in his little masterpiece, *Village Wooing*, a witty drama which he described as a "comediottina for two voices." David Gardner produces it Sunday night as the final offering in the current CBC-TV series *General Motors Presents*.

The hero in this two-character vignette, a writer for the Marco Polo series of *Chatty Guide Books*, is pestered during an ocean voyage by a talkative shop-girl who won a prize in a newspaper contest, and is taking her father's advice to live like a wealthy woman for a few months. Shaw labelled them only as A and Z, perhaps to suggest playfully that although they are poles apart intellectually, they are ideally suited emotionally. Their conversation is typically Shavian — trivial, serious, mischievous, funny, not-so-funny, paradoxical, playful.

Shaw wrote the play on board the CPR ship *Empress of Britain* when he and his wife were taking a luxury cruise on the Mediterranean in 1933. It was first produced in the Little Theatre in Dallas, Texas, the same year, and was presented in England the next year by Christopher Fry in the Pump Room at Tunbridge Wells, with two famous performers as A and Z: Arthur Wontner and Sybil (now Dame Sybil) Thorndyke.

"I'm astonished at how contemporaneous the play is," Gardner told us. "Nothing had to be even amended, and we used every word. Basically it's a comedy, a great human comedy—crackling with wit, but underneath, almost fatalistic in

The Way of the INDIAN

Aspects of the Indian question will be revealed in this 13-week series on CBC Radio



WHEN THE white man first came to this continent, it was not to an uninhabited land. Long before the first European ships dropped anchor off the eastern coast, another people had come out of Asia across the Bering Strait to hunt and fish in the forests and lakes of what we now know as Canada. The way of life they brought with them has long since been displaced. But their descendants live among us today.

Many Indians have found their place in our society. Some of them pursue important professions with distinction. However, most of Canada's more than 185,000 Indians live on or near "reserves," of which there are some 2,200, large and small, throughout Canada. Their life is rarely the happiest blend of the old and the new.

Over the years, anthropologists, sociologists and journalists have discussed at length, both in print and on the air, what they have called the Indian "problem." Whether there is a problem or not, there certainly is an Indian "question"—indeed, numerous questions, for all of which there are diverse answers. *The Way of the Indian*, a series of 13 documentary programs on the CBC Trans-Canada radio network, poses many of these questions and suggests answers to

some of them. The series begins on Tuesday, July 4. It will be heard weekly throughout Canada.

Months of painstaking research have gone into the preparation of this series. To give as accurate a picture as possible, the Outside Broadcasts Department of the CBC obtained the co-operation of experts. Recordings of authentic Indian music from all parts of Canada were made available by the National Museum of Canada. The young Canadian anthropologist, Rosalind Murray, M.A., is responsible for much of the research, and Dr. Douglas Leechman, F.R.S.C., is adviser and writer. Assistance was also given by the Canadian Indian-Eskimo Association, the Indian Affairs Branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, superintendents on reserves across Canada, and many individuals who know our Indian people

well. Most important of all, the Indians themselves have given their wholehearted co-operation. John Robertson, the producer, travelled the length and breadth of Canada with a tape-recorder, visiting Indians at work and play, at home, in school and church, in office and factory. Listeners will thus have ample opportunity to hear Indians from all over Canada—in cities, towns, on reserves, and in the north country—express their views.

Dick Halhed, organizer and supervisor of the series, says: "I hope these programs will, to some extent, contribute to a better understanding of these Canadians and to an eventual happier way of life for them all. I hope the day will come when Indians will be able to refer not to the way of the Indian but . . . with satisfaction . . . to the way of all Canadians."

its working out of the battle of the sexes. The man and woman in it are Shaw's typical male and female. They appear in *Candida* and *Pygmalion* with only a degree of difference. In *Candida* she is the strong one, and in *Pygmalion* it is perhaps Higgins who is the stronger. But in *Village Wooing*—which was written after the other two—Shaw more or less equalizes the sexes. He offers us perhaps his final thoughts on the battle of male and female, and they are most succinctly put."

Gardner is sure some woman must have come along to disturb Shaw's writing on board ship as the girl does in the play. He says "it's the story of girl meets boy and drives him mad. Then boy meets girl and doesn't recognize her. Then boy meets girl equally, and Shaw shows the growth of their mutual respect as their relationship gradually adjusts without destroying their individuality. The play's strength lies in its exchange of ideas. Its great charm lies in its salty honesty. A and Z lay their cards on the table about each other, and by the end of the hour they are down to something almost universal in its analysis of the responsibility of male and female in a close relationship. Shaw seems to say that woman makes something of man but man dictates the pattern. He sees man as a romantic pessimist, and woman as a realistic optimist."

Gardner goes on to say that "the play could easily have begun with act two. Each act has a kind of unity and shape in itself, while

being part of the progressive relationship of two people. We've attempted something Shavian in the last act. Shaw was a man of the theatre and knew its magic, and we've worked up to a magic moment at the very end of the play, an electric moment when two people meet — not a sexual meeting, and yet it is, too, in a way — but more a magic moment of truth, the spiritual consummation of a relationship."

In Anne Morrish, who plays Z, Gardner says he finds echoes of Eliza and Candida. He told us that several people, after seeing the video-taped performance, said they couldn't imagine anyone else ever playing the role. Gardner says William Hutt plays A with great

charm and wit with a Shavian edge. Hutt is just back from London, England, where he appeared in the Noel Coward play, *Waiting in the Wings*. He leaves soon for New York to play the lead in the new Coward musical, *Sail Away*, which opens on Broadway in the fall.

India and the Commonwealth

Explorations Features the Colombo Plan

How We Are Helping Asia

THE PROBLEM of helping 600 million poverty-stricken Asians to achieve a decent standard of living and maintain their new-found freedom, along the lines they choose themselves, is being solved with a stroke of genius known as the Colombo Plan. The remarkable thing about it is that it is based on partnership rather than charity, on simple understanding rather than any complicated set of rules, is entirely practical, unfettered by a lot of red tape, and has no central direction other than from the Consultative Committee which meets annually.

The idea for the Colombo Plan evolved when the Commonwealth foreign ministers met in Colombo in 1950 to consider what they could do to ease the heavy economic problems of south and southeast Asia. Aid, they wisely

decided, was not to be wholesale, but was to fill the gaps in local projects.

In the 10 years the Colombo Plan has been in effect, Canada has contributed more than 300 million dollars worth of aid in equipment, services and materials. These have gone into such projects as the huge Warsak Dam in northwest Pakistan near the mouth of the famed Khyber Pass, which began operating early this year; the Kundah hydro-electric project south of Madras; the Shadival power station near Lahore, Pakistan; the 20,000-kilowatt Goal Para power station in East Pakistan; and Ceylon's Institute of Practical Technology. But our contribution, amounting to about a cent a day for every person in Canada, is just a drop in the bucket compared with what the

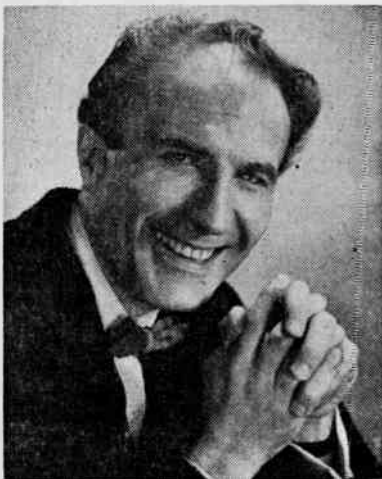

Asians themselves are spending on improving their lot.

Countries participating in the Colombo Plan have designated July 1 as Colombo Plan Day in tribute to the many achievements of this imaginative, humanitarian program of co-operative endeavour. A review of the plan and its accomplishments will be presented on CBC-TV's *Explorations* Wednesday night two and one-half hours earlier than usual, in a National Film Board feature titled *Ten Years from Colombo*. To prepare the film NFB producer Donald Fraser visited numerous Asian countries for an on-the-spot survey of noteworthy projects. The script for the program was written by Charles E. Israel, and edited by Dennis Sawyer and Rejeanne Charpentier.

At the last meeting of the Consultative Committee of the Colombo Plan, held in Tokyo in November, heartening progress in the Asian countries involved in the Plan was reported, but the many problems remaining to be solved emphasized the continued need for external resources to supplement those of the developing countries. Between the annual meetings of the Committee, a Council meets three or four times a year in Colombo. Most of its members are on diplomatic missions there. The Council guides a small Bureau which keeps records of the various projects and supplies information to interested people.

The Colombo Plan involves the development activities of 17 countries in south Asia. The progress of an aid project is simple and direct. Officials in one of the countries decide which of all the projects they are undertaking or would like to begin would benefit most from Canadian help. Usually they send their request through the local Canadian High Commissioner or Ambassador, and when it reaches Ottawa it is assessed by advisers and ministers. The cabinet approves

each capital project. Occasionally it is impossible for Canada to fill requests immediately. Once when the Prairie Provinces were at the height of oil exploration, Indonesia sent along a request for 12 geologists. Only two could be spared at the time.

Most of the equipment we provide is Canadian-made, and most of the personnel we send to Asia is Canadian. One of the most important things about the plan is that each project is a co-operative one between the donor country and the receiver country. If a Canadian scientist or technician goes to Laos, for instance, the Laotian government will provide him with a house and pay his living expenses, and a Laotian under-study will work with him to learn his technique so he can carry on the work after the Canadian goes home. And when an Asian comes to Canada to study, such as a Thai dentist, his home government gives his wife an allowance while Canada looks after him here—pays tuition fees, travel expenses, and provides room and board. Asian countries under the Plan are expected to help other Asian countries whenever possible. For example, Nepalese trainees go to India to study medicine, navigation, physics and other subjects. And Singapore has given courses in customs administration to two officials from Nepal.

The work of the Plan is divided roughly into technical assistance and capital aid. Technical assistance means sharing with underdeveloped countries the modern knowledge and skills of the more developed

countries. Personnel may go from Canada to Asia for projects lasting from a month to several years. Asians may come to Canada to study our techniques for varying lengths of time.

About 50 Canadian experts — teachers, advisers and organizers employed directly by the Plan administration, may be working in Asia at any one time. And there are many others hired by contractors to build dams, schools, etc. There are usually around 200 Asians studying in our universities under the Plan, and learning techniques and systems in Canadian offices and plants.

Although only about three per cent of Canada's contribution to the Colombo Plan is in the form of technical assistance, that part involves a good deal more official time and paper work than sending a couple of million dollars of wheat under capital aid. Capital aid also includes sending such gifts as locomotives to India and Ceylon, and aerial survey crews to help Indonesia, Pakistan, Ceylon, Malaya and countries of the Mekong Valley to study how to preserve and exploit their natural resources.

One of the largest projects Canada has undertaken under the plan is the Warsak Dam, which is making it possible for vast areas of Pakistani land to be irrigated and made arable. A most important aspect of the project is that it has trained and made skilled workers out of the 10,000 Pakistanis who worked on the construction, many of them formerly unskilled nomadic tribesmen. Now they will be able to undertake projects in other parts of the country.

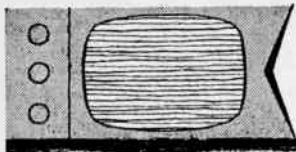

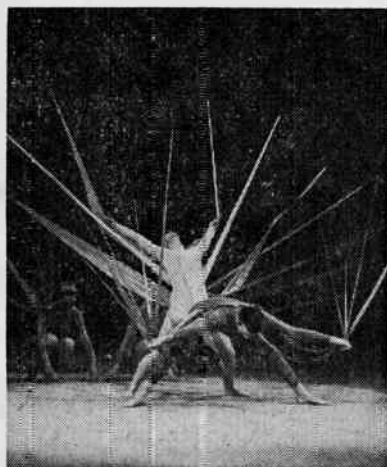

Enthronement of the Archbishop

A SPECIAL BBC-TV film of the Enthronement of the Most Reverend Arthur Michael Ramsey as the 100th Archbishop of Canterbury will be seen Saturday, July 1, on CBC-TV. The Enthronement address by Dr. Ramsey and portions of the rest of the ceremony will be heard Sunday, July 9, on CBC Dominion radio's *Church of the Air*.

The Enthronement ceremony—Tuesday, June 27, in Canterbury Cathedral—followed tradition in enthroning the new Archbishop twice; once in the Archbishop's chair by the Archdeacon of Canterbury and then later in St. Augustine's Chair (which is made from the marble of the Purbeck Hills of Southern England) by the Dean of Canterbury.

Dr. Ramsey succeeds Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, who retired May 31 and is now Lord Fisher of Lambeth. The new Primate of all England was nominated by the Queen on January 19 and later elected by the Greater Chapter of Canterbury, headed by the controversial dean, Mr. Hewlett Johnson. Dr. Ramsey was confirmed recently in St. Paul's Cathedral.

Nominated to succeed Dr. Ramsey as Archbishop of York—a position he held since April 25, 1956—is Right Reverend Frederick Cogan, Bishop of Bradford. Dr. Cogan was a professor of New Testament at Wycliffe College, Toronto, for seven years before returning to Britain in 1944.

To Canadians, Dr. Ramsey is probably best remembered as the Bishop of Durham when he was at the Queen's right side throughout her Coronation at Westminster Abbey in 1953. Tall and broad-shouldered, Dr. Ramsey virtually dominated the Coronation ceremony with his venerable appearance and scholarly stoop.

In the fall of 1959, he preached sermons in Quebec City at Christ Church Cathedral and St. Matthew's Church when he spent a week as guest of Quebec's Archbishop Philip Carrington, now retired, during a three-week lecture tour of North America.

Dr. Fisher, who was born in Cambridge in 1904, looks considerably older than 56; to many people he seems a big, jovial Friar Tuck. He has upheld a family tradition of Christian ministry and high intellectual qualities. Both his grandfathers were clergymen and his father was a mathematics dean at Cambridge and president of Magdalene College while Dr. Ramsey was there.

Dr. Ramsey was one of Dr. Fisher's pupils at Repton and Cambridge and was ordained in 1928. After two years as a curate in a Liverpool parish church, Dr. Ramsey became subwarden of Lincoln Theological College from 1930 to 1936; lecturer in a Boston parish church from 1936 to 1938; vicar at St. Benedict, Cambridge, from 1939 to 1940; canon of Durham Cathedral and professor of divinity

at Durham University from 1940 to 1950; Fellow of Magdalene and Regius professor of divinity at Cambridge from 1950 to 1952, when he was nominated to the See of Durham where he remained until his translation to York in 1956.

Dr. Ramsey is the ninth Archbishop of York to be translated to Canterbury and the fourth in the last 200 years. He is known in ecclesiastical circles as a moderate high churchman and has a reputation for brilliant and lucid theological writing.

One of his aims is to seek union of the world's Christian churches, even though he is aware of the serious difficulties which would emerge in joining with the Roman Catholic Church.

Earlier this month he said: "We must press on with the work of Christian unity. It can be done. I mean to do it, both in general and in particular. But if you look on the Church of Rome as a complete system standing against ours, there's a very big gulf because their system is an absolutely complete one, allowing for the existence of no other church in the world at all."

One of the last official duties which Dr. Ramsey performed as Archbishop of York was the June 9 marriage of Katharine Worsley to Prince Edward, the Duke of Kent, in York Minster, the first royal wedding in the medieval cathedral since 1328.

Have We More Than Five Senses?

WHEN WRITER Henry Comor and producer Jack Vance of Toronto decided to put together an hour-long program for CBC radio on extrasensory perception, they placed an advertisement in the personal columns of 12 Canadian daily newspapers. They hoped the replies would contain enough examples of ESP to fill out an hour. That was a year ago.

Today in the office of Comor and Vance, there are 60 hours of taped recordings by Canadians who vouch that they have perceived something without the use of the known senses. Also on file are close to 2,000 letters, written by other Canadians who tell of similar examples of psychic phenomena. The idea of a one-hour program has mushroomed into an actual series of 30-minute programs, which begins this Friday night on the CBC Trans-Canada radio network.

Preceding the start of the series will be two rebroadcasts of the original 60-minute program. Entitled *Introduction to ESP*, it will be heard this Sunday on Trans-Canada radio.

"When Jack and I decided to go ahead with our idea, we weren't sure what to expect," says Comor. "We didn't even know whether Canadians, in general, believed in ESP. The results of the advertisement have been fantastic. While we thought we might receive somewhere in the neighbourhood of 100 replies, we were sure that at least half of them would be from cranks. But, although because of time we cannot prove all the stories, we believe that only a tiny percentage of the replies are fabrications."

Comor, until now, had been a noted writer and actor, appearing in many CBC productions on both radio and television and writing others as well as magazine articles of varying subjects. Although he still does some acting and writing, he is becoming known as an expert on ESP.

The search for examples of extra-sensory perception has produced such interesting results that Dr. Joseph Banks Rhine, founder and head of the parapsychology laboratory at Duke University, N.C., and one of the leading experts in the world on ESP, has agreed to narrate part of the series and act as technical consultant. Dr. Rhine's wife, Dr. Louisa Rhine, and Dr. J. G. Pratt, assistant director of Duke's parapsychology laboratory, will also be heard during the series.

Dr. Rhine and his colleagues have turned down other offers from American networks to do programs but agreed to the CBC series because he thinks this is one of the most ambitious ever attempted.

"I still can't get over the response we've had, says Vance. "People from within a 100-mile radius of Toronto drive to the CBC studios to record their stories.

The Toronto crew for *ESP* has received help from 25 CBC and

private radio stations across Canada in taping the stories from the actual people involved. The contact work and interviewing in the area around Toronto is being done by actress Jill Showell (Mrs. Comor) while Elizabeth Barry is responsible for the area outside Toronto (the rest of the country), getting tapes, setting up recordings and looking after the huge cross-file catalogue of information as it comes into the Toronto office.

Comor and Dr. Rhine have broken ESP down into four basic sections: *telepathy*, communication of mind to mind; *clairvoyance*, perception of an object or an event; *precognition*, perception of an event in the future; psychokinesis, using the mind to exert will over matter.

"We'll use more than 100 stories, told by the Canadians involved, during the series," says Comor. "In getting these people to tell their

experiences, we used our own technique in Toronto. We set the people in the proper frame of mind by telling them to relax and explain what happened and that we'd record their stories later. Most of the time we were taping their voices that first time. That way we got the most natural and unacted result and the people didn't mind at all."

Do Comor and Vance believe in ESP?

"We can't prove a thing from the stories we have," says Comor, "but if such things as telepathy, clairvoyance, precognition and psychokinesis do exist, these stories probably demonstrate these phenomena.

"The possibility of exploring this field is intriguing," says Vance. "For instance, what is luck? Is it just that or is it a sixth sense; a form of extrasensory perception? If ESP does exist, and that's what Dr. Rhine and his colleagues are trying to find out, can we develop it to benefit mankind?"

Apparently, judging by the stack of letters and miles of tape which Comor and Vance have collected, many Canadians are wondering whether or not ESP is fact and if it isn't fact, what is the answer.

Now the Whole Continent's Laughing

ONE EVENING 20 years ago, a Boy Scout troop in Toronto rocked with laughter as two of its members acted out a comedy routine before it.

Now, the whole North American continent is laughing at those same comedians — Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster—as their first filmed series, *Holiday Lodge*, begins on the networks throughout Canada and the United States.

Canadian audiences long have enjoyed the humour of Wayne and Shuster, from their radio show days, which started with hints for housewives, to the polished one-hour programs they have been doing for some seven years on CBC-TV.

They have been no strangers to Americans either, having appeared more than 30 times on the Ed Sullivan Show, but this is their first regular program on American TV. Canadians will see the show five days in advance of the American release.

In *Holiday Lodge*, viewers will notice a slight change in the Wayne and Shuster humour. This is their first situation comedy series, and although it presents an opportunity for their brand of satire, they will not write their own material.

The comedians have been offered TV series since their first appearance on American television. All were turned down until they saw the script for *Holiday Lodge*.

"We just couldn't see how literate slapstick comedians, as we like to describe ourselves, could fit into a situation comedy," they say. "In *Holiday Lodge* we can see possibilities for satire, and we're working them in."

They feel they don't have time to write the *Holiday Lodge* scripts. "Let's say we're re-writing them," says Shuster, "and even that's a change for us."

The format of *Holiday Lodge*, as conceived by writers Hal Goodman and Larry Klein, has Wayne and Shuster as recreation directors at a swank lodge at mythical Lake Holiday, California. Playing the hotel's receptionist and Wayne's girl friend is curvaceous Maureen Arthur. The rest of the cast will change every week as new "visitors" arrive at the hotel.

Maureen Arthur has been the feminine foil on TV shows with some of the top comics in show business, among them Garry

Moore, Ernie Kovacs and Steve Allen.

The change-over from live to filmed TV is described by Wayne and Shuster as almost frightening.

"We have to change our gestures and our mannerisms. For that matter, we're even changing our personalities to a degree," says Shuster.

"There are too many people involved in a TV show for us to state categorically that we're going to have the best show on the air," Wayne says. "But we have great faith in Seymour Berns, our director, the film cutters, the wardrobe people and the makeup men. They all know what they're doing. Sometimes we're not sure."

POTATO SALAD

- 5 or 6 medium potatoes—cooked
- 1 medium onion (chopped)
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 egg
- ⅓ cup water
- ¼ cup vinegar
- 1 tsp. salt
- Pepper
- 1 tbsp. sugar

Melt butter in frying pan. Add onion. Cooking until glassy (not brown). Add vinegar and water and bring to a boil. Peel and slice potatoes. Add seasoning. Make a well in potatoes and put in 1 raw egg. Quickly add hot liquid mixing well. This salad is served slightly warm.

CUCUMBER SALAD

- 4 medium cucumbers
- 1 tbsp. salt
- 3 tbsp. vinegar
- 2 tbsp. sugar
- 1 chopped green onion
- 3 tbsp. salad cream (or more)

Peel cucumbers and slice as thin as possible. Sprinkle salt and vinegar on them and let stand for about 1 hour. Drain. Add onion, salad cream, sugar. Serve with main dish.
