• I was happy to learn that factual medical programs would be featured on CBC-TV (*Check-Up*, Mondays). But how disappointing the content!

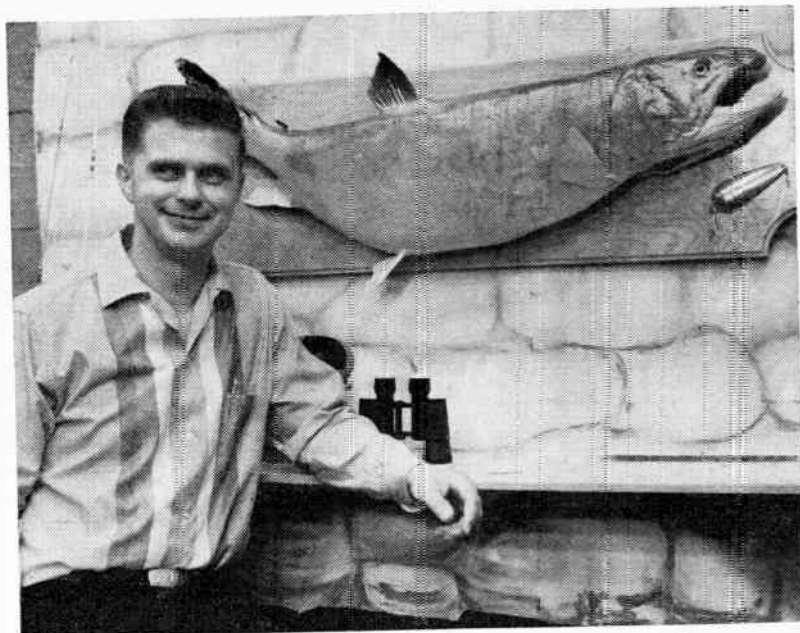

WHERE ARE the fish biting?—That information, almost as necessary to the fisherman as a rod and reel, can be learned by CJLH-TV Lethbridge viewers each Tuesday at 10:30 p.m. on *Sportsman's Holiday*. Jimmy Smithson, in his five-minute regular segment of the show, passes on his fishing forecast, provided with the help of Fish and Game Association officials, and rounds out the period with hints for better barbecuing.

Also on the show are various other features for the sportsman, including, in upcoming weeks, hunting dogs and their training, and tips on big game and upland game hunting. If you're looking for good fishing or hunting in Southern Alberta's outdoorsmen's paradise, be sure to tune in *Sportsman's Holiday*. Don Taylor is host.

A DAY'S FESTIVITIES that start around a breakfast table, and climax in Western Canada's richest horse race will be brought to CBC Radio and Television audiences in Alberta and TV viewers in Saskatchewan, Saturday, August 17.

The 34th annual Canadian Derby, with a purse of \$15,000 added, is to be covered as it is run in Edmonton, 5 to 5:30 p.m. MST. CBXT will originate the telecast for its own audience plus viewers of CBC affiliates in Alberta and Saskatchewan (see schedules in this issue). Also on the telecast will be a flashback to the glittering Derby Breakfast held earlier in the day.

On CBX and affiliated radio stations in Alberta, the Derby Breakfast will be reported live for 15 minutes, 10:15 to 10:30 a.m. MST. The race itself will be covered as well, with Glenn Bjarnason and Ernie Afaganis describing the action for viewers and listeners. Hal Pawson of the Edmonton Journal will be on hand to comment.

Among the horses to watch as the field of three-year-olds circles the 1½-mile course is Brother Leo, which on August 5 won the richest-ever Manitoba Derby. Other entrants come from throughout the nation.

Racers Take Over



Auto race fans will have a feast Sunday, August 18 as CBC-TV presents films from Sebring and Nassau

SEBRING IS A small town in the orange grove country of central Florida. For 51 weeks of the year it is just a sleepy little southern town, but for a few days every spring, it becomes the world headquarters of the jet-set crowd, a centre teeming with life and activity—and the heady excitement of fatal danger.

What makes Sebring such an international rendezvous every year? Auto racing. More precisely, the American Grand Prix of Endurance, a 12-hour grind of men and machines that has become one of the most important venues on the world racing circuit for the finest drivers and the manufacturers of the fastest cars.

The Sebring meeting is the first major event of the year in inter-

national auto racing, and it is important both for the drivers, who stand to gain points towards the annual world's championship, and for the manufacturers, who invest thousands of dollars in the cars, equipment and drivers' salaries in the hope that a win will earn the company prestige and a type of advertising money can't buy.

All the big-name cars—Ferrari, Maserati, Alfa Romeo, Porsche, Austin Healey, Lotus, Aston Martin and Corvette—turn up at Sebring, complete with entourages of drivers, mechanics, managers and other personnel and tons of equipment, all supplied by manufacturers or wealthy private individuals, and all intent on a single object—to win one race.

The cost of sending a complete

“works team” to this or to any other international race or rally is extremely high. One of the specially tuned sports cars costs anywhere from \$10,000 up, and that represents only a minor part of the expense involved. The big firms normally send half a dozen or more cars each, and every one of the cars has been specially re-built from the ground up. And when the race is over, even ignoring the possibility of mishap, the cars will be worn out; each one, it's been estimated, will have used up six full sets of tires, two sets of brakes, and will have burnt up 300 gallons of gasoline and two gallons of oil in going through about 1,100 miles and 6,000 gear changes.

The rewards to the drivers and owners are slim when measured in financial terms—although being world's champion driver can mean

The Urge to

KEEP FIT

—It's sweeping the continent:

CBC-TV's *DISCOVERY* surveys the concepts of fitness Sundays, August 18 and 25

PRESIDENT KENNEDY'S much-publicized suggestions about 50-mile walks have provided the inspiration for a good number of stunts and humorous sallies in recent months, but they have also tended to point up a comparatively new phenomenon in North American life: the preoccupation with the subject of physical fitness.

After a post-war period of plenty in which many grew comfortably chubby, perhaps as a reaction to wartime rationing, the North American populace in the past few years has apparently been smitten with concern about its collective waistline. Health clubs have enjoyed an unprecedented boom, exercise instruction sessions have become a part of daily television fare, and books on fitness—such as, for instance, the RCAF 5BX and 10BX booklets—have become best sellers.

A two-part survey of concepts of fitness in the past, and what some of today's experts on the subject believe to be the meaning, value and importance of fitness, will be presented on CBC-TV's *Discovery* on Sunday nights, August 18th and 25th. The scripts for the two programs are by Dave Brock. Producer is Gordon Babineau, and the narrator and interviewer is Bob Quintrell.

The first telecast, entitled *In Corpore Sano* from the Latin phrase "a sound mind in a sound body," begins with primitive peoples and follows through to modern times, summing up man's various attitudes to and awareness of fitness. Today, our awareness differs in two important respects from the past: for the first time in history we are concerned about fitness in a time of peace, rather than being anxious solely to have armies in fighting trim; and for the first time we are attempting to measure fitness, testing those who are considered "fit" and measuring their accomplishments against those considered "unfit."

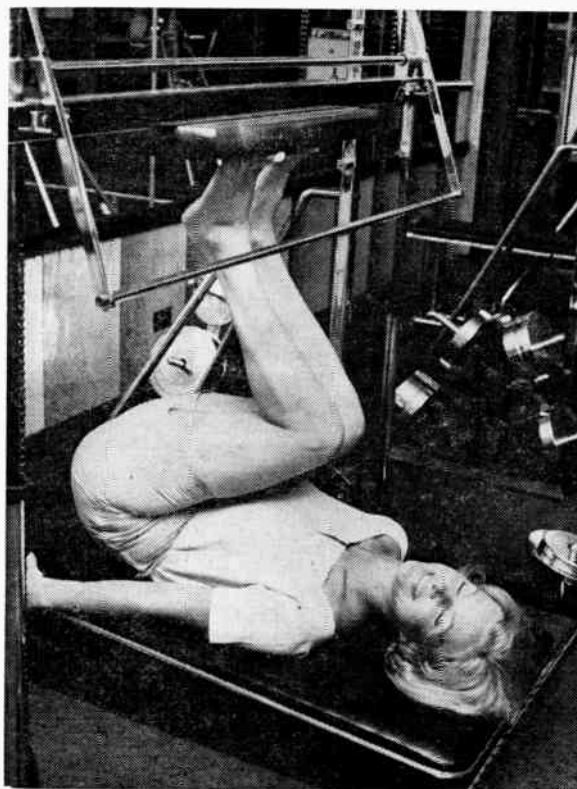
The second program, entitled 5BX, will examine the subject of how fitness affects health and well-being, whether fitness has any bearing on incidence of disease, and how much exercise is necessary or desirable to achieve certain standards of fitness. This program consists mainly of interviews with authorities in the field, and it's interesting to note that there are some widely differing opinions and conflicting views on the subject.

Among those taking part in the programs are:

William Orban, director of the school of physical education, University of Saskatchewan, who originated the widely-used RCAF booklets on exercise, 5BX (for men) and 10BX (for women). In his interview with Quintrell, Orban outlines what the booklets were meant to achieve and why they were instituted.

Dr. Thomas K. Cureton, professor of physical education, University of Illinois. A leading researcher in fitness, he has been testing volunteer subjects for more than 20 years. He expresses his opinion that the 5BX program is only one-twentieth of a proper program and that 20 hours of vigorous exercise is

BROADWAY HOLIDAY on CBC Radio, Monday, August 19, presents a complete performance of the music from a show that was surprisingly unsuccessful.

WHEN LEONARD BERNSTEIN'S musical version of Voltaire's classic, *Candide*, appeared a few years ago, audiences didn't know quite what to make of it. It wasn't charming and sentimental, like *My Fair Lady* or *South Pacific*; it didn't have the cheerful, happy-go-lucky quality of *Guys and Dolls*; it had none of the contemporary bite and snarl of his later stage work, *West Side Story*. Audiences took some time to make up their minds about just where *Candide* was supposed to fit in the scheme of things, and while they were making up their minds the musical quietly died.

It wasn't exactly a flop—after opening on Broadway in December of 1956 it played a respectable number of weeks there, later (1959) had a fairly long run in London, and was performed by a U.S. touring company—but it wasn't a spectacular success either.

One of the reasons for the show's somewhat cool reception by the public may have been that it wasn't the type of thing that audiences expect from a Broadway musical. It had a good deal of humour, excellent settings, an extremely clever musical score and first-rate performers, but in one major respect it differed from most other shows: Its theme was basically cynical and rather bitter, just as Voltaire's original book had been. One writer called it "the first philosophical musical to come to Broadway."

Candide's lack of success was unexpected by theatre experts, if only because of the imposing array of talents it represented. The libretto was prepared by Lillian Hellman, a dramatist known for such stage hits as *The Little Foxes*, *Watch on the Rhine*, and *Another Part of the Forest*. The song lyrics were written by Richard Wilbur, John Latouche and Dorothy Parker. The work was staged by Tyrone Guthrie, and included in the original cast were Max Adrian, Robert Rounseville and Barbara Cook, all of whom have been associated with highly successful shows. Harold Clurman, critic of the *London Observer*, said: "*Candide* is composed of superior ingredients," and he went on to mention Miss Hellman's "seriousness of purpose" and "the cunning of Bernstein's musical hand." Drama critics being what they are when it comes to music, Clurman was one of the few who realized that most of the musical numbers in the score were subtle parodies of operatic forms and styles. The overture has become a standard work in the repertoires of many symphony orchestras.

A complete performance of the music from *Candide* will be presented this week on CBC Radio's *Broadway Holiday* (Monday, August 19, 9:00 p.m.). Produced at CBC Vancouver by Robert Chesterman, the performance will have tenor Patrick Daugherty in the title role, with soprano Dodi Protero as Cunegonde, baritone Mark Pearson as Dr. Pangloss, Donald Brown as The Governor and Winona Denyes as The Old Lady. The 35-piece orchestra and the chorus will be conducted by Glen Morley.

Candide, in Voltaire's tale, is the young optimist, who, having been taught by his mentor, Dr. Pangloss, that "everything will turn out for the best in this best of all possible worlds," roams the earth searching for the happiness which keeps eluding him. At every turn, he is presented

CANDIDE

There's no end to the driving energy
of Harry Veiner, as 20/20 shows Sunday, August 18

The MAVERICK MAYOR of MEDICINE HAT

HARRY VEINER, 59, is cast in the mould of the traditional Western plainsman. He is blunt and uncompromising, knows nature by her many moods, and can measure a man's intent by the shift of a glance. He is shrewd in business dealings but generous—sometimes extravagant—in personal relationships.

Mention the name of Harry Veiner almost anywhere in Canada, and most people will associate it with the small city of Medicine Hat in southeastern Alberta—a prosperous agricultural and manufacturing centre he has served as mayor for six terms. Through his tireless promotion, and, perhaps to an even greater extent, through his willingness to challenge nearly anyone to any contest from a footrace to a round in the ring, he has put Medicine Hat on the map. He has outraced a horse, Indian wrestled the mayor of The Pas, Manitoba, and challenged Fidel Castro to a cigar-smoking contest (though Veiner never smokes or drinks). Last year he defeated the mayor of Havana, a man half his age, in a sugar cane cutting tournament.

In fact, he thrives on competition and the reassurance that winning brings. His aggressiveness won him a spot on the Regina Roughriders' football team in 1929, and, channelled into the sophisticated world of business, has brought him a far-flung empire valued in the millions of dollars.

A CBC Winnipeg film crew under Peter Kelly spent a hectic period on location shooting a typical 20-hour day in the life of Harry Veiner. The result is *Diary of a Maverick*, to be seen Sunday, August 18 on 20/20.

Starting at 5:00 a.m., the cameras follow the mayor as first, he visits in hospital an 80-year-old European war refugee Veiner met in 1951, brought to this country with his wife, and has since provided a place for in Medicine Hat. He drops in on his china factory which he purchased five years ago to rescue it from going out of business. He drives to his ranch—one of two that he owns, along with ten farms spread over three provinces—and takes over the branding of a calf. Back in town, he handles some matters at City Hall, then drops in on his hardware store, where he can conduct business in six tongues.

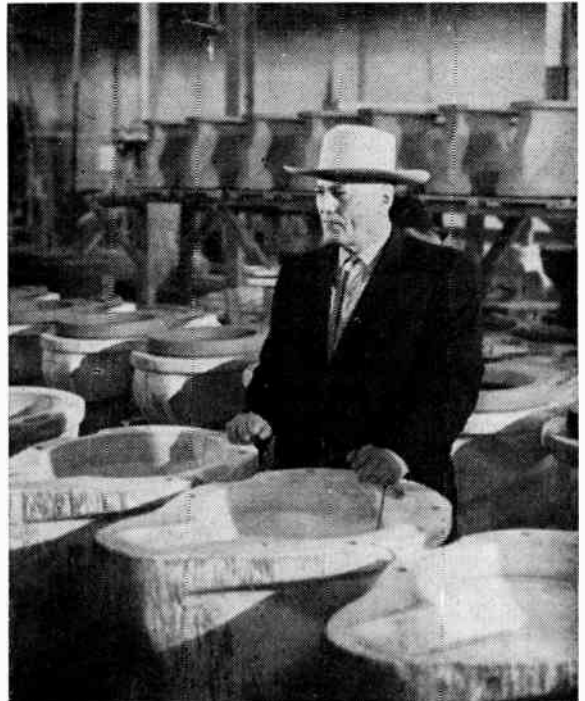
After lunch he drives to Brooks, Alta., to check

on his farms there, then returns to the city for another of the numerous banquets his position requires him to attend—this one, a teenagers' gathering. The day ends with a twist contest, the mayor competing enthusiastically alongside youngsters one-quarter of his age.

Although the years are beginning to tell, Veiner's remarkable physique still gives him the energy to stand up to almost any amount of exertion and, after four or five hours of sleep, bounce back for more the next day.

The script for *Diary of a Maverick* was written by freelancer Lyal Brown, himself a Medicine Hat native. While describing the boundless energy and vast scope of this rugged maverick of a man, the script gives insight into the powerful motivation that drives him on to always be a competitor, and always a winner.

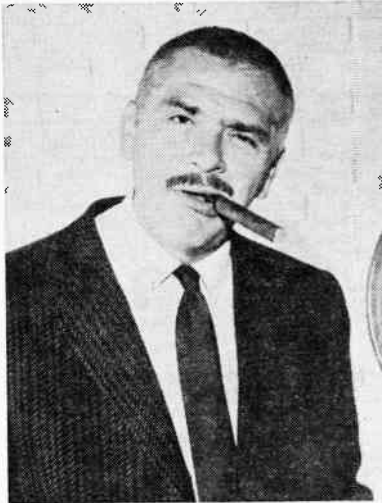

But, despite a series of staggering misadventures in which he is consistently swindled, robbed and otherwise taken advantage of by his fellow men, Candide clings to his naive Panglossian doctrine, believing that the fault for his mis-

Great Movies:

The Tragic Life Of Vincent Van Gogh

LUST FOR LIFE, the film dramatization of Vincent Van Gogh's turbulent and tragic career, is this week's offering on CBC-TV's *Great Movies*, Saturday, August 17. Based on the biographical novel by Irving Stone, the film stars Kirk Douglas as Van Gogh, Anthony Quinn as his friend, Paul Gaguin, and a supporting cast drawn from both British and U.S. acting ranks.

Van Gogh was born in 1853 in Holland, the son of a Calvinist pastor. He didn't consider painting as a career during his early life, working instead as a teacher and preacher. It was when he went to live with his art-dealer brother in Paris that he first took up painting seriously, and joined the revolt of impressionist artists against the slavish obedience of academic principles which was then current.

After Paris came the phase of his life that brought him greatness, insanity and suicide. He went to Arles in the South of France and loaded canvas after canvas with flaming, brilliant colours.

It was during this period that he cut off his own ear in a fit of remorse after threatening Gaguin with a knife. In and out of mental hospitals and always under a doctor's care, Van Gogh continued to paint until he shot himself to death at Auvers-sur-Oise in July, 1890, at the age of 37.

fortune must lie within himself rather than in the philosophy of optimism.

Finally, however, Candide becomes utterly disillusioned, and at the end of the story he has learned the terrible lesson that awaits all perfectionists: That improvement must start from where we are now. The only way to live is to try to make some sense of life, to forsake deep and difficult philosophies and return to simplicity; thus ends this parable of innocence lost and wisdom found.

Another difference is the break-down of farms into many small plots spread apart over the countryside. This adds to the problems of working the land efficiently, but much of this tradition has been handed down from generation to generation.

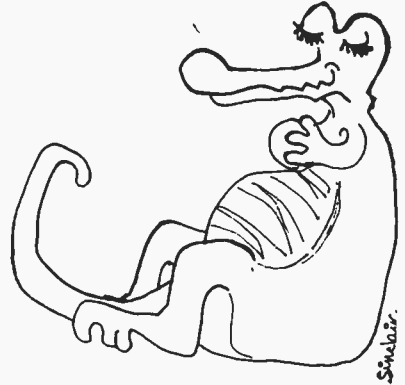

A Visit to

Leacock's 'Mariposa'

WHEN HUMORIST Stephen Leacock, in his *Sunshine Sketches of a Small Town*, created the mythical town of Mariposa, most everybody knew what he had used as a model: His own town of Orillia, Ontario. Leacock never admitted that there was any direct connection between the real Orillia and the fictional Mariposa. In fact, he stated categorically, in the preface to the *Sunshine Sketches*, that "Mariposa is not a real town," and that's about as plain a statement as you're likely to get on any subject.

But it's pretty hard to take Leacock's statement seriously when you size up the fictional characters of Mariposa against the real-life citizens of Orillia. The town's undertaker in Leacock's time, for instance, was Horace Bingham; Mariposa's undertaker was named Golgotha Gingham. The actual Big Jim Smith, hotel-keeper, emerges

in fiction as Josh Smith, hotel-keeper; barber Jeff Short becomes Jefferson Thorpe, reporter Russell Hale of the *Orillia Packet and Times* becomes a Mr. Hussell of the *Mariposa Newspacket*; Canon Green of the Church of England came out as Dean Drone of the same denomination. Oh no, there's no mistaking where Leacock got his inspiration. Mariposa is, or was, Orillia of a half century ago.

When the *Sketches* first appeared, as a serial in the *Montreal Star* in 1912, some Orillians suddenly stopped speaking to Stephen Leacock. To many, he was an eccentric, anyway, a local boy who had gone off to college and had become an educated oddball. Orillia saw him every summer, when he spent his holidays at his white-stucco, rambling home on the shores of Brewery Bay, resting up from his winter labours as a professor of economics at McGill University. He cut a comfortable if unimposing figure—a stocky, rumpled man with a battered straw hat on his shaggy head and a twinkle in his eye, swapping yarns with the

loungers who hung around Smith's Hotel or Jeff Short's Barbershop.

Today, Orillia is about twice the size it was in 1912, and a lot of things have changed. To many, the town is now best known as the site of an annual folk-song gathering that pays tribute to Leacock's influence by its title: The Mariposa Folk Festival. Leacock's summer home is now a museum, a literary shrine where visitors can re-live a bit of the past.

This week, CBC-TV's *Telescope* will pay a visit to the old and the new Orillias. In the program, to be seen on Monday, August 19, host Fletcher Markle will introduce a study in contrasts—the present-day town, lively with young folk-music buffs, and the Mariposa of yesterday, recreated through reminiscences with old-timers and through readings from Leacock's writings. The readings will be given by actor John Drainie, whose characterization of Leacock is said to be so accurate as to be almost uncanny.

The filmed program was directed by Gerry Richardson. Ross McLean is producer of *Telescope*.

IT WILL BE many years before Canada's triple crown of horse racing reaches the stature of a similar venture in the United States, but for Canadian owners the combination of the Queen's Plate, Prince of Wales Stakes and Breeders' stakes is a worthwhile goal.

Compared to the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes, Canada's triple crown is a mere pittance, but each year the purses grow and the day definitely is not far away when the Canadian money prizes will be on a par with those south of the border.

This week CBC Radio and Television bring their audiences the second leg of the Canadian edition—the Prince of Wales stakes at Fort Erie. This is the 35th renewal of the event—which in 1960 was combined with the other two to make Canada's big three.

Carrying a \$25,000 added purse, the Prince of Wales is the mid-summer classic of Canadian racing. The Queen's Plate is billed for late

Eskimos: Past, Present and Future

EVEN IN THESE days when radio and television facilities link the world electronically in seconds, there are still some peoples in remote areas who rely on the age-old method of story-telling to keep a breast of happenings in the "news." Among such groups are some of the Eskimos in Canada's vast northern territories, who continue to depend on the art of story-telling not only to learn of recent developments but to preserve the history and legends of the race.

Their tales ring with the horrors of bitter weather, of the exploits of great hunters, and of famine which has compelled whole families to leave their homes.

On a repeat telecast of a *Camera Canada* program, to be seen this Sunday afternoon, August 18, one of the Eskimo story-tellers, George Annanack, tells of one of the terrible famines of the past and of the migration it induced, a migration that ended 50 years ago and resulted in the founding of the George River Eskimo settlement near Ungava Bay.

Today, the Annanacks are pioneers of the true economic and

social revolution in the North. They were the first Eskimos to organize a co-operative, and how it started and how it works is the subject of part of the film, made by Crawley Films Ltd. for the CBC. After the story of the past (the starvation) and the present (the co-operative) the film shows something of the Eskimo's idea of the future, which the Eskimos think our cities represent. The film shows the reactions of three Eskimos who have gone south to Montreal and Ottawa to see how the white man lives.

Narrator for the program entitled *The Annanacks*, is actor Lloyd Bochner. Producer-director is Rene Bonniere.

necessary every week to achieve and maintain fitness, which he feels is directly related to good health. Dr. Cureton has found that it is necessary to keep up strenuous exercise to maintain fitness; he examined the famous athlete, Jesse Owens, 15 years after his spectacular wins in the 1936 Olympics and found that, after years of sedentary life, Owens showed no physical indications of ever having been an athlete.

Dr. G. R. Cumming of the children's hospital in Winnipeg, author of a number of articles for the Canadian Medical Association Journal on how exercise affects the heart, gives what is perhaps the most conservative point of view on the program on the benefits of exercise. Athletes don't live longer than

others, he says, and his studies have shown that there is little difference in the incidence of heart disease between those who live active lives and those whose lives are sedentary.

W. G. Brandreth supervisor of physical education for the Vancouver school board, responsible for the introduction of new approaches to physical education in Vancouver. One of the elements of the new system is "free play," in which exercises are improvised by children on equipment (climbing ropes, pipe mazes, etc.) provided by the schools; the students are free to do whatever they want, within limits set by the teacher.

The programs will include demonstrations and discussions of such physical-philosophical concepts as Yoga and Judo, and film footage of mass calisthenics demonstrations, including some memorable sequences from German films of the 1930s.

on other international circuits as well.

On CBC-TV's *World of Sport* this Sunday, August 18, filmed coverage of this year's Sebring race will be shown, along with film of another auto racing event in the south: the Nassau Speed Week. The two half-hour films graphically portray the excitement of high-speed competition and the daring and skill of the men behind the wheels.

The Sebring meeting proper, aside from warm-up and trial runs, includes a number of different races, but the major event is the 12-hour endurance race held on the last day of the meet. Run on a 5.2-mile course laid out on a former airfield, a course that includes five 90-degree turns, a hairpin curve and two S-turns, the race is a contest against the clock, with the car that travels furthest in the 12 hours being declared the over-all winner. Other prizes are awarded, such as the coveted Index of Performance, on the basis of complicated formulae of engine size in relation to miles travelled and other factors. The race begins with a "LeMans" start, in which the drivers line up opposite their cars, then, on a signal, sprint for their machines, leap in, start up and roar away, jockeying for position. From then on, it's a steady grind of hour after hour of highspeed driving, interrupted for pit stops, for gassing up, tire replacements and driver changes. Most teams have at least two drivers per car, but one entrant in this year's race drove his Triumph throughout the entire half-day without relief; by contrast, the Corvette team included no fewer than five drivers for each car.

The other race event to be seen on film this Sunday presents another array of the world's finest drivers competing in the 250-mile Nassau Trophy Race, the major event in the annual Nassau Speed Week. Run over the tight curves and demanding turns of the 4.5-mile Oakes Field Race Course in Nassau, the race carries a top prize of \$5,000, and is only part of a week-long program that includes a number of subsidiary races and other events.

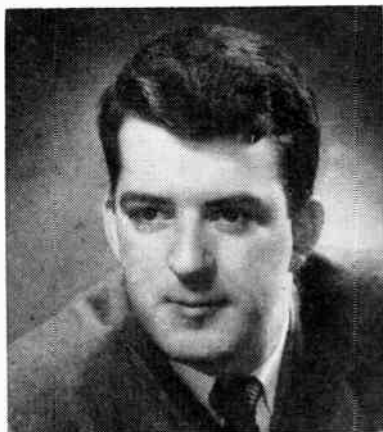

TV Sets

Are Their Teachers

A PROGRAM about educational television in Italy will be heard on CBC Radio on Tuesday morning, August 20, at 9:45 (9:30 on CBK and CBX). Originally broadcast in the *Soundings* series last March, the half-hour program was prepared in Italy by CBC producer Gary Plaxton, who also does the interviews and narration.

The Italian television network, RAI, broadcasts a complete course of instruction to thousands of secondary school pupils in remote areas of the country, from 8:30 in the morning until about 4:30 in the afternoon, six days a week through the normal months of the school year. The project is called *Telescuola*—television school—and for many children it is the *only* schooling in small, remote villages where there is little or no opportunity to attend a real school. Primary schools are located in every village, no matter how tiny, but these provide education for only the first five grades. Children from nine to 14 (to which age school attendance is compulsory) do not have schools available in many parts of the country.

Telescuola was begun in 1958, and employs the finest teachers that can be found. The curriculum is that of a normal Italian secondary school: science, mathe-

tics, Italian, French, English, Latin, technical education, music, art, physical education and religion. Throughout the country, children gather in small groups at the 2,500-odd TV viewing centres, called *posto di scuola*, each one supervised by two adults who look after homework assignments, send in reports on progress, and generally act as liaison between *Telescuola's* centre in Rome and the scattered groups of students. These adults are not usually qualified teachers, but are interested persons who are keen on helping out with the program.

The RAI, which is a state broadcasting system similar in structure to the BBC in England, is completely responsible for the broadcasting end of the operation. The Italian ministry of education, for its part, organizes the groups, provides the supervisors, and supplies free text books to the children.

Jenny's Accent—Actors in Harvey Hart's production of *Roots*, by Arnold Wesker (recently taped for next season's *Festival* series on CBC-TV), had to acquire Norfolk accents for their roles. This created a problem for Vanya Franck, who plays Jenny Beales. When she played the same role in a Crest theatre production in Toronto last season, the accent was "north England"—so she had to "unlearn" that one before tackling the part in its original Norfolk setting.

Serenade From a Cabbie

You may never have had a serenade from a cab driver—but then the chances are you are not a TV producer. Impromptu auditions are all part of the day's work for Norman Sedawie, producer of CBC-TV's Parade.

"Whenever anyone finds out you are a TV producer," he says wryly, "he goes out of his way to impress his talents on you."

"All those stories Hollywood puts out about stars being discovered in unusual situations are usually a lot of bunkum," Sedawie explained. "At least, it rarely happens to me.

"But if I came across a good singing cab driver, I'd use him."

Producers are also the targets for proud mothers, aunts, neighbours and, in fact, almost anyone who knows a supposedly-talented individual.

"Everyone thinks of himself as a talent spotter," said Sedawie. "I can't count the times I have been begged to hear some child whose dotting parents think they are raising another Shirley Temple."

Then there's the struggling artist who calls up the producer and invites him to watch his act at a local night club.

In one such situation, Sedawie found himself being lavished with attention when he arrived at the club. He was given a front row seat, had all the songs and comedy material directed straight at him, and even had his name mentioned several times in the act. All this was more than a little embarrassing, says Sedawie.

That's one reason why Sedawie prefers to be Mr. Anonymous. He tries to see new talent at night clubs, coffee houses and in revues, but he never warns them he is coming and he tries to melt into the crowd when he gets there.

ONE OF THE best-known and best-loved figures in Canadian broadcasting will have a whole hour to himself on Wednesday night (9:00-10.00) to tell about his life, his work, the great events he has lived through, and the great men he has observed. With vigour, wit, clarity and charm, J. B. McGeachy looks back on forty years of journalism.

James Burns McGeachy arrived in Canada at the age of 14 and settled with his parents in Saskatoon. They had emigrated from Glasgow, Scotland, to explore the great possibilities offered by the Canadian west. Life was not too easy in those early years and the cold (sometimes 40 below) confounded the elder McGeachy. However, they survived and grew to like Saskatoon. That was almost 50 years ago and since then, J. B. McGeachy has emerged as one of the most familiar voices and writers in Canadian journalism.

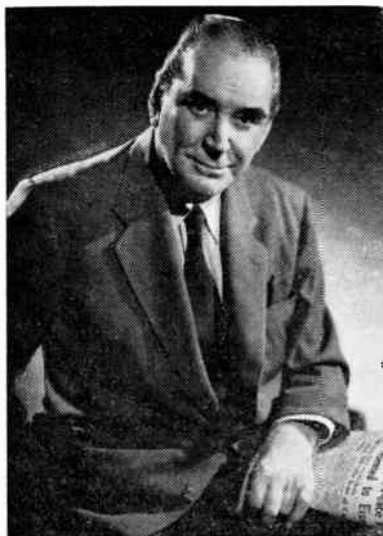
Readers of the *CBC Times* will probably know him best as moderator of the quiz show, *Now I Ask You* or as a news analyst on *Week-end Review*. Others will recall his wartime commentaries from the BBC in London, which he con-

siders some of the most memorable broadcasting moments. Many others think of J. B. McGeachy as a pungent columnist for *The Financial Post*; and a political and social satirist, as his book *A Touch of McGeachy* illustrates. It is all these facets of Mr. McGeachy's personality and career that we will examine on the *CBC Wednesday Night* program.

When we first approached him about it he said: "I'm astonished to find myself the subject of a radio biography, but it sounds like a very pleasant experience." Life itself seems to have been a pleasant experience for Mr. McGeachy. He studied classics in school and entered the University of Saskatchewan at the age of 15. He won an Alexander MacKenzie fellowship in modern history which took him to the University of Toronto. From there he won a Proctor fellowship to continue at Princeton. Then, he says, he was supposed to go on to Oxford on a Rhodes scholarship but he'd already decided by that time to give up academic studies and try his hand at writing. He soon found himself back in Saskatoon working on the *Star Phoenix*.

He has had some enviable assignments in his forty years in journalism and has met many of the great people of the age: Churchill, Roosevelt, Sifton, and John Dafoe. He'll tell about his experiences with them on the program. McGeachy is a master story teller and raconteur, by the way, and listeners will enjoy his wit and honesty.

On the program he talks with Paul Fox, associate professor of political science at the university of Toronto who has known McGeachy professionally for several years. To him and to his friends Mr. McGeachy is known as "Hamish." They chat about Mr. McGeachy's career, the people he has worked for, how he got his first big promotion, what the early days of journalism were like in Canada, the influence of the press in forming political heroes, how the Social Credit movement in Canada got started and McGeachy's part in it, what principles guide him as a journalist, and his experiences in covering one of Canada's most important Royal Commissions.

Steel Bars Don't Make Newfoundland's Salmonier Prison

STORIES ABOUT convicts trying to break out of prisons are fairly common, but it's not often that one hears of criminals trying to get into jail. Yet that is reportedly the case at one Canadian prison, and the report comes from a prison official.

The institution in question is the Salmonier Prison Camp in Newfoundland, an experimental "open prison" that is 25 years old this year. The "man bites dog" story about the criminals who yearn for incarceration is attributed to Otto Kelland, assistant superintendent of the Newfoundland Penitentiary, with which the Salmonier camp is associated, who stated that he knows of at least two repeaters whose main reason for breaking the law was to get back to Salmonier and away from an environment that held no hope nor prospects of steady work.

The Newfoundland camp is perhaps the only Canadian prison where there are no locks, bars, cells or guns but where escape attempts are rare. In the past 20 years more than 1,000 prisoners have served time at Salmonier but only 15 have tried to escape. All but one of these were recaptured, and under the camp's rigid admission rules, this meant they were barred from returning. The lone exception was a U.S. soldier transferred to the farm from Newfoundland Penitentiary, where he was serving a sentence for forgery. He made a break, but it's never been discovered whether he got away or died in the woods while attempting the escape.

The idea of the prison camp was first conceived by Gerald Byrne, governor of the Newfoundland Penitentiary in the 1930s. Superintendent W. F.

Case, who succeeded Byrne in 1944, expanded and enlarged on the original concept. The primary idea was rehabilitation, but it was also seen as a means of relieving the already heavy congestion at the main prison in St. John's. First-offenders arriving at the penitentiary usually are offered a transfer to the farm after spending a comparatively short period at the prison.

For the first couple of years the prison "annex" consisted of a number of railway cars on a siding, and prisoners were employed in clearing brush from the railway right-of-way. Later the prisoners worked in other locations, clearing and draining bogs in order to reclaim land for farming.

About 18 years ago the camp found a permanent home when the site was moved to an island in Gull Pond at Deer Park, a provincial game reserve. The present camp consists of two main dormitory buildings, a combined staff house and quarters for the wardens and other personnel, and a central dining hall.

There are now about 100 prisoners at the camp. During the summer months their main occupation is farming—they raise enough vegetables and livestock to supply both the camp and the penitentiary. In winter, they saw logs and plane lumber for the camp and main prison. In either season it's no place for a rest cure, with heat, black flies and mosquitoes in summer, snow, sleet and bitter cold weather in winter.

The Salmonier experiment has proven so successful that preliminary plans have been made by the Attorney-General's department for another camp on Newfoundland's west coast.

On Baseball Game of the Week

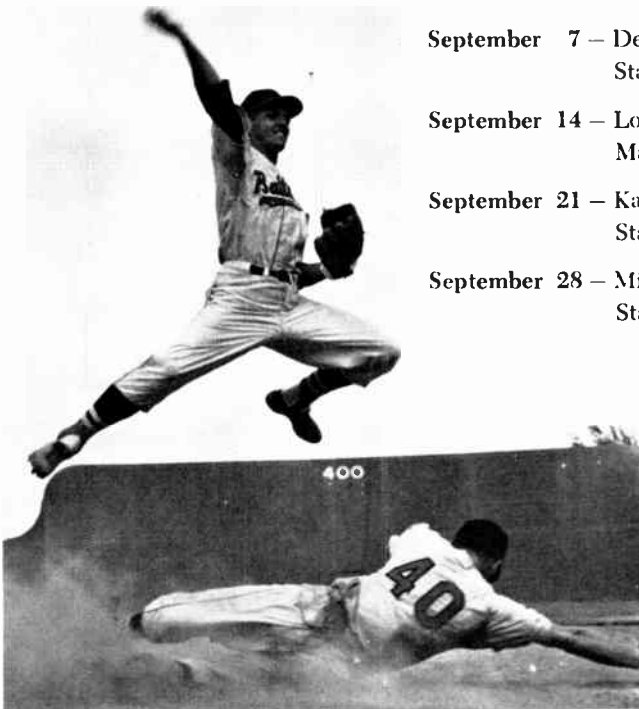
WITH THE Major League baseball schedule coming to a close, CBC-TV will continue to carry the Baseball Game of the Week on World of Sport, Saturday afternoons.
