• Recently one of your correspondents, (C.A.C., Mailbag, May 4-10), made some uncomplimentary remarks about the *Max Ferguson Show*, which indicated his lack of appreciation of satire. He protests against what he calls loss of all sense of self-respect, decency or discipline.

The function of satire is to deflate self-respect when it becomes pomposity, decency when it becomes sanctimoniousness, and discipline when it becomes authoritarianism. There has been so little true satire in Canada lately that we have come to take ourselves far too seriously. Max Ferguson provides a truly refreshing respite with an amazing versatility and inventiveness of ideas. I hope the CBC will long continue to allow Mr. Ferguson to give us a chance to laugh at ourselves.

Producer David Dortort will alter the format of "Bonanza," to allow Adam Cartwright (Pernell Roberts) to take a bride during the 1963-64 season, thereby ending four years of bachelorhood among TV's most eligible men.

Since the show was first telecast in September, 1959, Ben Cartwright's (Lorne Greene) disparate brood of half-brothers (Roberts, Dan Blocker and Michael Landon) have had occasional romances but most of them ended with a kiss, none at the altar.

Some of filmdom's most fetching young women (Ruth Roman, Inger Stevens, Stella Stevens and Ruta Lee, among others) have appeared on the show, but, in the end, the Cartwrights rode back to the Ponderosa, their emotions scarred but intact, and their sprawling

ranch still lacking the woman's touch.

But, now, with a fifth season upon him, Producer Dortort feels that coming up with an Eve for Adam, the eldest son, will enable the show to take fresh, new directions.

"We didn't arrive at this without a lot of thought," he says, "and this marriage won't be the result of an arbitrary stroke of a writer's pen."

Dortort says the romance will be developed through three or four scripts, that it won't be love at first sight.

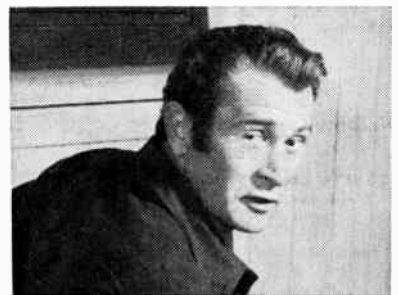
"We will show how romance flourishes most often in real life, how people discover each other's weaknesses and strengths and ultimately find they are right for one another," Dortort added. "We will let the viewers examine this romance under a spotlight so that when the marriage takes place, it will seem the only logical course the couple can follow."

Dortort and casting director William Maybery have scheduled auditions for the role starting this week.

"This will take some time," the producer says. "We're not sure what we're looking for. The chemistry between the two has to be right or the audience won't accept the marriage. I feel like a combination father-in-law and marriage broker."

An Hour with A Hipster

IN RECENT YEARS one of the fieriest and most controversial young American authors, Norman Mailer, has been making as much news with his antics as with his writing — spouting his hipster philosophy, recommending the use of drugs to discover reality, and indulging in comical but childish exhibitionism at press conferences and other gatherings. But when he can be prevailed upon to sit down privately with an intelligent companion and talk in the brilliantly preceptive fashion which has made some of his novels so compelling, he reveals a more interesting, more mature side of his flamboyant personality.

Recently, in New York, this short, muscular man with the curly dark hair and eyes that can look sharp and hooded or dreamy and gentle, recorded a freewheeling conversation with Dwight MacDonald, film critic for *Esquire* magazine (in which Mailer's work often appears), contributor to *The*

New Yorker and frequent writer about mass culture on this continent, a subject over which Mailer has mourned and fumed in much of his writing. Their remarks were prepared for radio by Stephen Vizinczey, and will be heard in the *Venture* series on Sunday afternoon, June 9, at 5:00 p.m.

Mailer and MacDonald discuss the nature of the world, mass culture, how science effects our everyday lives, and related topics, jumping from one subject to another, arguing about this one, agreeing about that, and filling an hour with a fascinating conglomeration of ideas, candid opinions, humour. At one point Mailer reveals a side of his nature which is shockingly different from the picture he likes to paint of himself, but which he insists is real.

"Writers today," he says, "live in a vacuum. There aren't any social or moral dragons left to fight. And a writer needs to feel self-righteous. When he can't and is dogged by too many doubts

about his worth or insight, it's hard to engage in an ambitious piece of work." His ambition, he says, is to "write a really good novel, a big, fat, meat-and-potatoes book. Every writer has a good book in him, but most only get a 10th of it out. A lucky few get out a third."

For several years he's been working on what may be his "dream" book, a novel he says, "as pretentious as Proust's *Remembrance of Things Past*, but won't be as good." He says it will be about "the same thing as my other books are about — the indescribable plague which afflicts western society. In *The Naked and the Dead* I dealt with its manifestations in war; in *Barbary Shore*, in politics; in *The Deer Park*, in sex; in *Advertisements for Myself*, in myself. The plague's by-products are the destruction of faith in our time, the loss of morale, the glut of self-consciousness, and the loss of possibilities through science. I'd like to see us move back to a more earth-bound society. If I were king, I'd first prohibit plastics, because they don't come from the earth. They aren't natural."

BARBIROLI IN REHEARSAL

WHEN IT COMES to orchestral conductors, there are often two completely different opinions—depending on whether one is in front of or behind the conductor. One who wins admiration from all sides, however, is Sir John Barbirolli, one of Britain's most famous musicians, musical director of Manchester's Hallé orchestra and chief conductor of the Houston (Texas) Symphony Orchestra.

This week, in a special television program videotaped by CBC Vancouver, Sir John will be shown in a rehearsal session with members of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, prior to a public performance last November in Vancouver's Queen Elizabeth Playhouse. The program, entitled *Sir John Barbirolli in Rehearsal*, will be telecast on the CBC-TV network on Monday, June 10. From it, viewers may gain insight into the qualities that earn a conductor either the respect or the scorn of his musicians. The entire hour-long telecast will be devoted to rehearsing one work, an *Oboe Concerto in C major* attributed to Haydn, and the soloist will be the well-known English oboist, Evelyn Rothwell, who in private life is Lady Barbirolli. The program will conclude with a complete concert performance of the concerto.

Sir John is not the only conductor who conducts more than one orchestra on a regular basis—with today's rapid travel facilities the practice is becoming quite widespread—but it does keep him busy running two musical organizations at points thousands of miles apart. Each season he opens the Hallé orchestra's season with a few concerts in which he whips the orchestra into shape, then flies to Texas to do the same for his Houston musicians. After a few weeks of concerts he returns to Manchester for more concerts and the traditional Christmas performance of Handel's *Messiah*, then goes back to Houston for the spring season of concerts. Between times he serves as musical advisor to a



British television company and fulfils guest-conducting engagements with many different orchestras.

Like Toscanini, whom he succeeded as conductor of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra in 1936, Barbirolli started his musical career as a 'cellist. He was 11 at the time and made his professional debut at the Queen's Hall in London. Later he played in theatre pit orchestras and cinemas during the silent film era. He came by his profession honestly, for his father and grandfather had both been orchestral musicians in Italy. Sir John's father married a Frenchwoman and settled in London, and it was there, in 1899, that Giovanni-Battista Barbirolli was born. His father's instrument was the

violin, and young Giovanni began studying violin almost as soon as he could walk. The two accomplishments—playing and walking—combined in fact to lead to his career as a 'cellist. While playing the smaller instrument he developed a habit of walking around the room while practising, a habit that annoyed and distracted his teacher-father. To put a stop to this, Barbirolli senior took away the violin and gave Giovanni a 'cello in its place, for not even the high-spirited Giovanni could walk around a room while playing the 'cello.

When he was 12, Barbirolli entered the Royal College of Music and made his first appearance as a 'cello soloist. From the (Please turn to page 19)

Sports Date With A Hockey Star

Former Winnipegger and NHL's all-star right-winger turns radio commentator on Saturday Sports Date

HOCKEY STAR Andy Bathgate certainly isn't letting the ice-melting season go to waste.

A month ago the New York Ranger right-winger became an assistant golf pro at a suburban Toronto course and six weeks ago he became a broadcaster—as commentator and sports specialist on *Saturday Sports Date*, the 150-minute CBC radio show. An-

nouncer Al Hamel is host of the nationally broadcast program.

Bathgate made his début on the show on May 4. *Saturday Sports Date* covers top sports events of the day through live descriptions and reports. The show also features lively popular music.

Handy Andy, as the NHL's all-star right-winger is sometimes called, appears on the show regularly until August when he reports to the Ranger fall training camp.

After his first show, Andy was still in a bit of a daze over his sudden plunge into radio.

Looking for a name athlete to step in beside non-athlete Hamel, the CBC learned Bathgate would be in Toronto throughout the summer as assistant pro to Bill Mawhinney at Northwood Country Club. Bob McLaughlin, producer of *Saturday Sports Date* and a former athlete himself, met Bathgate and with only three days' warning Andy was before the microphone as a member of the CBC sports staff. He had never done any radio work before.

The rangy Winnipeg native is an ideal man to serve as the expert on a sports show because he has played so many sports. He is a professional in two of them, no mean feat in this day of high-pressure competition. In hockey Bathgate has missed the 20-goal mark only once in the nine full seasons he's been with the Rangers. In golf he's no worse than a one-handicap player and has two 65 rounds to his credit.

Bathgate's appearance on CBC radio is perhaps no more unusual than his mere presence in Toronto this summer. In the past six years Bathgate and his family have lived in Vancouver during the summer.

"I just took it easy and played a lot of golf," says Andy. This year, the hours he's spent on the golf links will start paying financial dividends with his job at Northwood.

Bathgate first developed an interest in golf as a youngster in Winnipeg. "I was raised near a golf course and did a lot of caddying," he says. But it wasn't until six years ago that he became really serious about the game.

In addition to golf and hockey, Bathgate tried other sports while in school but his trick knees made it difficult for him to engage in sports where he had to do a lot of running. His knee caps slide up into the lower part of his thighs when he runs. This condition has forced him to wear knee braces when he's playing hockey but the braces haven't stopped him from becoming one of the game's superstars.

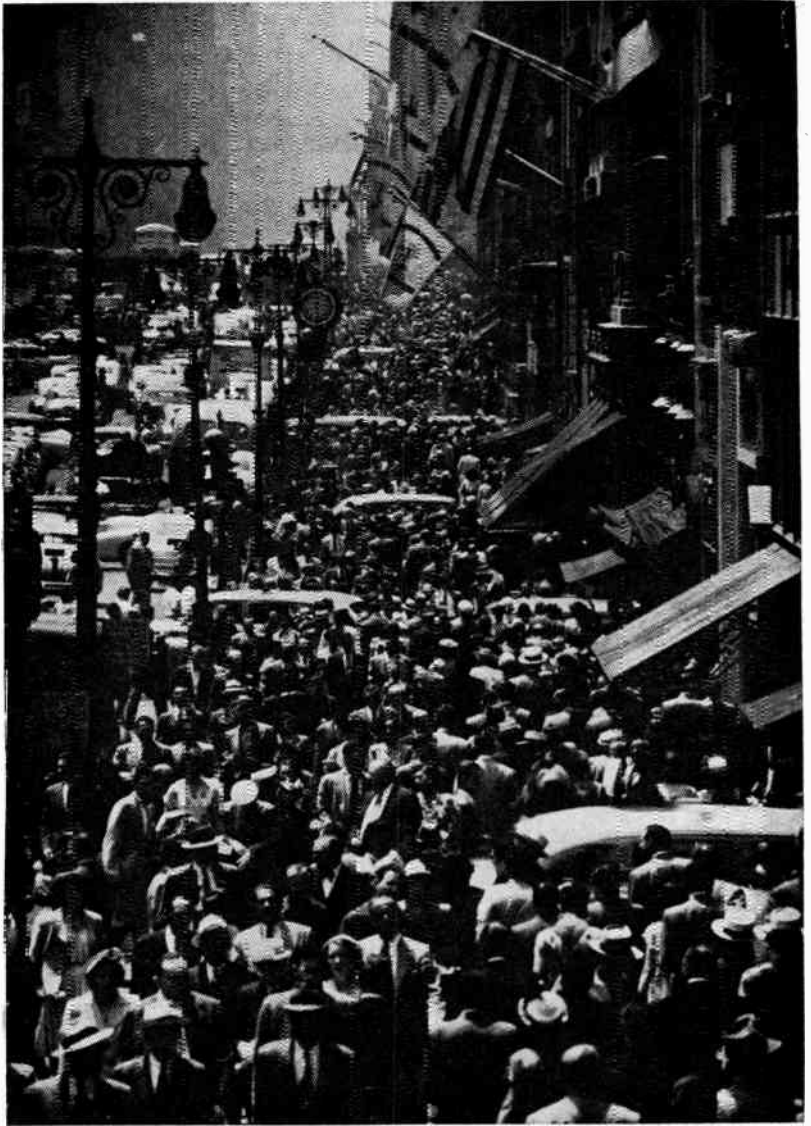
When the knees and advancing years finally force Bathgate to give up hockey, which he hopes won't

AT THE UNITED NATIONS it has been said that "in the end the womb may prove more dangerous than the bomb." Certainly overpopulation is making thinking men think harder, desperately harder. It took us most of our history to reach our first population billion. But the way the population is growing, we add this number of people every 13 or 14 years—three new babies are born every three seconds, two million every week. If this rate continues, in 600 years there won't be *standing-room* for the world's population. Even in 100 years the earth will be uncomfortably crowded. As it is there isn't enough food to give half the present population proper sustenance for good health. In 40 years there will be twice as many people around as there are today.

In the aftermath of the industrial revolution, with medical and technological advances offsetting natural controls, the human species experienced an increase so explosive that grave doubts began to be held about the adequacy of future food supply. Because new medicines and treatment have wiped out many killer diseases (in India in 1901 about a quarter of all babies died in their first year, but nine out of 10 survive

today), the death rate has been lowered, prolonging reproductive life, but not reducing the birth rate. Is there a limit to world population? Is man quickly reaching the point where the population growth will exceed the possibility of economic growth and he will destroy himself? Most biologists regard this aspect of human ecology as the most critical problem of our time.

IT COSTS ABOUT \$3,000 a year to keep a man in prison, not counting capital costs. But it takes only \$300 to keep a man for a year, and, in the process, turn out a useful member of society.

St. Leonard's Half-Way House is Canada's first privately-operated rehabilitation centre for ex-convicts, and has been in existence just over a year in Windsor, Ontario. Sunday afternoon, June 9, CBC-TV's *Heritage* series presents a program about this experimental approach to the problem of helping young men who have served prison terms to take their places in society. In addition to scenes shot there, the program includes remarks by the Rev. T. N. Libby, an Anglican clergyman in his early thirties, who founded the house; his assistant, Father James; and the Reverend R. L. MacDougall, S.J., of the Catholic Rehabilitation Centre in Toronto.

St. Leonard's Half-Way House is patterned after Dismas House in St. Louis, Mo., which was founded by Father Charles Dismas Clark and was the subject of a recent film, *The Hoodlum Priest*. St. Leonard's Half-Way House is named after St. Leonard's House in Chicago. Its founder, Father Libby, believes that many younger criminals without families, when released from prison, could make a better start at carving out places for themselves and keep out of trouble more easily, if they had somewhere temporary to go where they would not be coddled, but where their particular problems would be understood and their attempts to go straight encouraged. Before opening the centre Father Libby thoroughly studied the operation at St. Leonard's, Chicago, where 78 per cent of the men it has helped have reformed.

Half-Way House in Windsor isn't an institution, or a place of

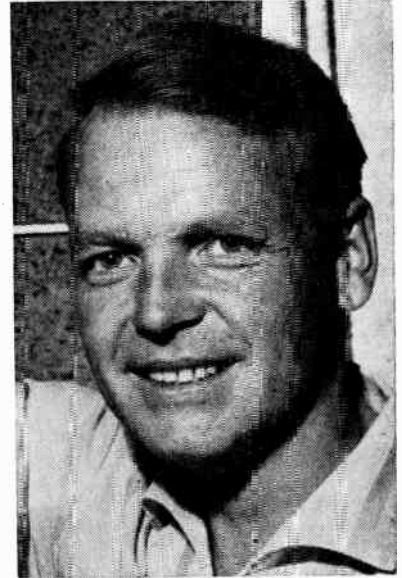

College he went into the professional world of the orchestra, playing in Sir Henry Wood's Queen's Hall Orchestra and later with the Beecham Orchestra at Covent Garden and the Alhambra Orchestra for a season of Russian ballet. Then he found himself attracted to chamber music, and at the age of 24 founded his own group, the Barbirolli String Orchestra. For the first time he took up the baton, and immediately realized that this was to be his career. At this time he changed not only his musical plans but his name as well, substituting his Italian given name with its English equivalent. His upbringing had made him thoroughly English, and the only traces of his Italian heritage were to be found in his sympathetic approach to Italian music and his love of Italian food.

For a number of years Bar-

birolli worked with a variety of orchestras in England, carefully learning the craft of conducting; then, in 1933, he undertook a task that was to establish his reputation, and one that he was to repeat, with great success, a decade later. In 1933 he accepted the post of conductor of the Scottish National Orchestra, and he found that organization in very poor shape, in terms of morale and standard of performance. In three years Barbirolli nursed the orchestra back to health and made it into a fine and proud musical ensemble. His stay with the Scottish National Orchestra was important for another reason as well, for the oboist in the orchestra was Evelyn Rothwell; they were married in the mid-1930's. By 1936 Barbirolli had achieved such stature as a conductor that he was offered the post of chief conductor of the famed New York Philharmonic Orchestra, one of the plums of the conducting world. He accepted, and stayed with the Philharmonic for six

years, but when war came he wanted to return to England. He finally achieved his object in 1942, when he visited Britain to fulfil some guest-conducting engagements, then stayed to become permanent conductor of the Hallé orchestra. Beset by the problems of wartime—shortage of manpower, bombed-out concert halls, lack of time for preparation of the music—the Hallé had almost collapsed as a musical organization. Calling on his experience of 10 years earlier, Barbirolli set to work rebuilding the orchestra, and by his determination and inspired leadership re-established the Manchester group as one of Britain's finest ensembles. In 1949 he was knighted, and the following year was awarded the Royal Philharmonic Society's gold medal for his service to music. In the past 20 years he has been continuing his work with the Hallé, taking the orchestra on tours of Britain and the continent, and guest-conducting leading orchestras in all parts of the world.

The Los Angeles Dodgers and Chicago Cubs provide the action in this week's baseball bill of fare on CBC Television's "Game of the Week" series and if present indications are any criterion . . . the Cubs won't play "dead" in Wrigley Field on Saturday.

For years the Cubs have grown accustomed to being in or very close to last place in the National baseball league but in the past couple of years a great deal of the "deadwood" seems to have been weeded out.

With youngsters like Ken Hubbs and Ron Santo coming through both at bat and in the field, the Chicago Cubs are now in the lofty (for them) position of fifth place in the standings, only 5½ games behind the front-running San Francisco Giants and 3½ behind the second-place Dodgers.

As in years gone by, the experts have once again chosen the Dodgers to win the National League pennant and like the Cubs, the Dodgers are going to have to get lots of help from their young players. The likes of Ron Fairly and Frank Howard just to name a pair, must produce this year if the "Angelinos" are to win the senior circuit pennant. To date both are doing well and should they hold up, the Dodgers have fairly sound pitching and could win.

In contrast to the fine Los Angeles pitching . . . this is the department where the Cubs must improve vastly if they're to hold out much hope of . . . ever winning another NL pennant. Their last incidentally was way back in 1945, when they lost in the World Series four games to three to the Detroit Tigers. Right now, the Cubs have only a couple of reliable pitchers

Luck Of The Irish

CANADIAN-BORN Tommy Reilly, internationally - celebrated harmonica virtuoso, is featured in *The Luck of the Irish!*, an Irish romp transcribed by the BBC with Rose Brennan, Joseph McNally, The Four Ramblers, Ted Heath and the orchestra, Dermot Buckley and Canadian compère Gerry Gibson. The half-hour series will be heard on CBC radio on Sundays for 13 weeks at 8:00 p.m., beginning June 9.

Especially for the series Ted Heath's Band has been augmented by strings from some of London's greatest orchestras, with Maria Korchinska on harp.

Rose Brennan, born in Dublin on New Year's Eve, is known to many through her recordings. Joseph McNally from Ballymena studied in Dublin with Dr. Vin-

cent O'Brien, the teacher of John McCormack. McNally is known through Ireland not only as a singer of opera, oratorio and folk songs, but also as a popular recording artist. At one time he sang with The Four Ramblers, a comedy male voice quartet founded several years ago. Dermot Buckley, a Dubliner living in London, plays the part of Paddy in *The Luck of the Irish!* Producer Maude Hamill hails from Cork. She has searched the whole repertoire of Irish popular music. Her selection for the series has been arranged by one of London's most brilliant orchestrators, Ralph Dollimore, who works regularly for Ted Heath and other celebrated London artists.

Tommy Reilly is a second-generation Canadian. Grandfather

Reilly emigrated from Ireland to Canada many years ago. His son went to Britain to be trained as a bandmaster at the famous military musicians' school of Kneller Hall. Later he returned to this country, where, as Captain Reilly, he became known as an orchestral conductor and founded an harmonica band which his son, Tommy joined. There Tommy developed his self-taught technique and soon became the band's star soloist.

When Tommy was 16 his father had to go to Britain, and the boy went, too, taking the opportunity to tour the Continent with hardly any money and no introductions, and supporting himself mostly by filling concert engagements in Switzerland, Belgium, France and

CHAMBER MUSIC

ONE OF THE interesting developments in Canadian music in recent years has been the growing interest in chamber music among an ever-increasing segment of the public. This interest, manifested in part by the number of permanent chamber music ensembles that have sprung up within the last five or ten years, is welcomed by many performers, for, while orchestral music forms the staple fare for most musicians, it is in the realm

of chamber music that the greatest individual satisfaction can be found by the player.

Through its many broadcast presentations of music for smaller ensembles and soloists, the CBC has played a part in bringing the enjoyment of this particular type of music to a growing audience. This week, CBC radio continues its efforts in this regard with the institution of a regular weekly series of chamber music broadcasts, to be heard on Sundays at 6:30 p.m. The concerts will originate in points all across Canada and will feature many different groups comprising some of the country's finest instru-

mentalists. The first broadcast, to be heard from Montreal on June 9, will be given by an ensemble consisting of Charles Reiner, pianist; Mildred Goodman and Gilles Bailargeon, violinists; Otto Joachim, violist; and Walter Joachim, cellist. They will play the *Piano Quintet* by Bohuslav Martinu.

The second program in the series, on June 16, will feature the Toronto Woodwind Quintet in the *Kleine Kammermusik*, opus 24, by Hindemith, and *La Cheminée du Roi Rene*, by Darius Milhaud. The third, to be given by the Desser Trio of Toronto, will include Beethoven's *Serenade*, opus 8.

into it in a program featuring interviews filmed in England with Sir Julian Huxley, a biologist, and the late Sir Charles Darwin, a physicist who died a couple of weeks after the film was made. They discuss aspects of the population problem which, no doubt, their grandfathers talked over when they met and corresponded about a century ago. Also on the program are Dr. David C. Fowle, head of the biology department, York University, Toronto; the series consultant, Lister Sinclair, who conducts the interviews with Sir Julian and Sir Charles.

Humanity the Cancer

Nature takes care of over-population in the animal kingdom, with parasites, predators, failure of resources, over-eating, over-grazing, over-fishing. But man is paying for his greater intelligence by digging his own grave. Humanity has become the cancer of our planet.

"I'm frankly very despondent about the situation," says Sir Charles Darwin in the program. "The increases going on at present have clearly got to stop. We've got to discover some way of prohibiting or preventing the increase in numbers. We don't want to return to the old three system of pestilence, famine, massacre, but can we devise some humane way in which we can do it? I've talked a good deal about this subject in many places, and candidly my

main motive is that I am profoundly pessimistic about it, but I hope that by advertising my pessimism someone may come along and make a useful contribution to it."

Lister Sinclair asked Sir Charles whether he thought it would be possible for a man to colonize other planets as a solution to the over-population problem on this one. Sir Charles replied that he thought that "the exploration of the other planets is one of the most exciting things going on now. However, you can write it completely out in connection with this picture, because there are at present 140,000 people more on earth every day. If we are going to solve this problem of population increases by sending them to another planet, that means that every single day, year in and year out, airships carrying 140,000 people have got to be set off from the earth, with us saying goodbye to them and telling them we don't want them back."

A Simpler Life

Sir Julian points out that the big science of the future is going to be human ecology, the science of the relations between organisms, in this case humans, and each other and their environment. "We have a limited number of resources. Food is, of course, basic. Then minerals, then power resources, and so forth, and just sheer space, and there's what I like to call enjoyment resources. Man can't live entirely in an office doing work all the time.

He's got to have some enjoyment apart from his work, and a great many people can't find sufficient enjoyment in ordinary recreation, going to the cinema or watching a baseball game. They want some time or other to go off and have some contact with nature, and live a simpler, more rewarding life."

Inevitable Dictatorship

It's been suggested that industrialization might help to overcome some hazards of over-population for a while. Sir Julian discusses the economic fact—which seems obvious but not many have cottoned on to it—that "if you want to industrialize a backward country with a lot of people in it, say India, you've got to put a great deal of purely financial capital in and a great deal of human capital in, in the shape of skills. If too many babies are born, too much of that capital and those skills will be taken up in looking after them, and there won't be enough for industrialization."

And, too, there won't be as much of that freedom which more and more people are coming to cherish. Sir Julian warns that "as you get more and more people living with greater and greater difficulty on the resources of their habitat, you have to have more and more regulations. Over-population leads directly to more regulations and eventually, if you aren't careful, to authoritarianism and more or less dictatorship. It's inevitable."

Obviously something has to give. Will it be man?

correction. It's a large house in the downtown area which looks like any other house in the block, and duplicates normal living conditions as closely as possible. The men staying there have jobs and pay rent. The housemaster is a middle-aged ex-convict. Father Libby is the executive director.

He began his work at Half-Way House with hardly any money or backers, but in the last year he has acquired the financial or moral

support of nearly every group in the city, including organized labour. At first he encountered some hostility when residents around the area where he proposed to set up the centre objected to having ex-convicts in their midst, and petitioned the city council to interfere. But their case was thrown out of court when Father Libby explained that no hardened criminals or any who had committed serious offences would be staying at the centre.

While they are living at Half-Way House, the former convicts are referred to as guests. Few rules are laid down for them, and they are not required to attend services in the basement chapel unless they want to. All they are asked to do is hold their jobs, pay room rent of \$2 a day (which includes board) and keep out of trouble. "St. Leonard's Half-Way House is not competing with the John Howard Society," points out Father Libby. "We are simply providing temporary shelter and aid which would not otherwise be available."

Dismas House in St. Louis is named after the thief who was crucified beside Jesus and was redeemed by Him. Of the more than 1,200 former convicts who have been sheltered there and helped to find jobs, all but four have gone straight. Father Clark, who founded the place, is a small, quiet-spoken Jesuit priest, the son of Irish immigrants, who ran wild in his teens and was straightened out by a Jesuit priest. For 22 years he has been making friends with criminals and ex-criminals. He is interested only in the man, not the crime. He doesn't preach religion to the men he works with, he lives it, and they respect him for his ideals. They trust him with all sorts of confidences, even plans for nefarious activities, and he never rats on them. "Pray hard, Father, we got a super-market all set up," they'll say. He'll try to make them see that the super-market job is only, if they pull it off, short-term success, and then, if he's convinced them, he'll set about helping them find jobs and keep out of further mischief. If he hasn't convinced them, he'll try again next time. But he won't tip off the

super-market that a raid is expected. He has a most realistic approach to the criminals and ex-criminals with whom he comes into contact, and no illusions about them. "I know guys who'll shoot their own mothers, and take bets on which way they'll fall," he says. "They ought to be kept in penitentiaries." For the others he has infinite understanding, talks to them in their own language, offers them a chance to acquire respectability, is "family" to them until they find their feet, and if they stumble, he's there to assist them when they come out of jail.

Father Libby of Windsor is following in his footsteps, and although Half-Way House is too young an enterprise for any significant statistics, its record indicates that it will be just as impressive as its namesake in Chicago or Dismas House in St. Louis.

and the Royal Jester—will be played by Johnny Wayne. The play will be produced by Norman Sedawie and directed by Harvey Hart.

Like every real fairy-tale, *Many Moons* begins with the magical words "Once upon a time . . ." It goes on to relate the story of a little princess who becomes ill "from a surfeit of raspberry tarts" and of her father's attempts to make her well again. The only thing that will cure her, thinks the princess, is to have the moon for her very own. When he hears this, the king sets out to find how he can get the moon for her. He calls in his sage advisors, the Wizard, the Mathematician, the Lord Chamberlain, and each in turn tells him that it's impossible to bring down the moon from the sky, and each goes into infinite detail in explaining just *why* it's impossible. As he sees his daughter growing weaker and weaker, the king becomes disconsolate and discouraged, but then help comes from an unexpected source when the court jester suggests a novel and unusual solution.

A FEATURE of CBC Wednesday Night on June 12 at 9:15 will be a 45-minute BBC radio program titled *Henry of Anjou*, produced and compiled by Nesta Pain from letters, anecdotes and reminiscences of those who knew the king and worked with him, among them Giraldus Cambrensis, Walter Map, Peter of Blois and Arnulf of Lisieux.

Miss Pain points out that "Henry of Anjou" is a controversial figure. Historians tend to regard him as one of the greatest of English kings who did more to order his kingdom and establish a rule of law than almost any other. Admirers of Becket, on the other hand, incline to think him a wicked and impious ruler, the savage persecutor of a saint. In fact he was an intriguing and contradictory character.

"He was an intellectual devoted to sport; a soldier who loved and worked for peace; a restless, energetic man who exhausted all the members of his court by never sitting down except when eating or

astride a horse; but a man who would spend hours, even days, in court administering justice, following with passionate interest some curious or complicated case and arriving at a just conclusion.

"He was a rough, tough, violent-tempered man who could yet be curiously gentle. And like all men of this stamp he made enemies — such as Giraldus Cambrensis, the Welsh historian, who has little good to say of him. But he also made faithful and loyal friends, and their quality did him credit. St. Hugh of Lincoln, for instance, was a close friend. Yet at the end Henry died in disillusion and loneliness, deserted by almost all whom he had loved.

"This program paints a portrait of Henry II in the words of his contemporaries, men who were attached to his court and knew him well; who liked or disliked him, told anecdotes about him, laughed at him, complained of him, and were moved to pity by his deeply tragic death."

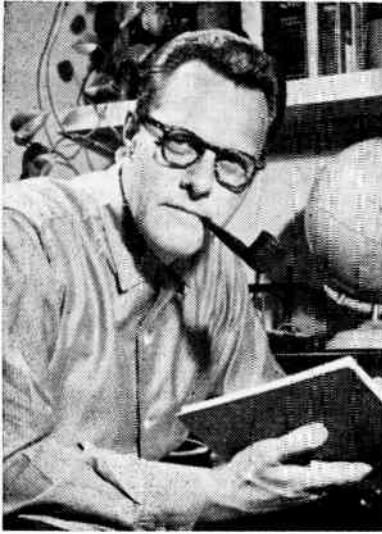

Germany. The wandering minstrel was in Germany when the Second World War broke out. He was promptly arrested and spent the war in a prison camp.

In England after the war he found it difficult to continue his career until he gave a Festival Hall performance of a work written especially for him, the Spivakovsky *Concerto for Harmonica and Orchestra*. That brought an invitation to perform on the BBC, and he's been a regular broadcast artist ever since, playing both serious and pop music. He has made many records, and annually makes several foreign concert tours. He has played with nearly all the major European symphony orchestras.

Reilly also composes, and has written music for films and played in several productions. He recorded the featured harmonica music for *The Sundowners*, and *The Navy Lark*. Several eminent composers have written music especially for him, including Dr. Gordon Jacobs, Malcolm Arnold, Matyas Seiber, Graham Whettam, Vilen Tausky, Fried Walter and Karl Koper.

wasn't Wright, it was wrong. His architecture was stimulating; his pronouncements were sensational; his personal life was scandalous. But he survived long enough to outlive not only the public's criticism but most of his critics; like Michaelangelo and Christopher Wren, he lived into his 90th year, and he was active and outspoken to the end.

Wright's career, creations and philosophies will be studied on this week's edition of *The Twentieth Century* (Sunday, June 9, on CBC-TV). Narrator Walter Cronkite terms it "the story of one man's battle against what he called America's 'lust for ugliness'." The story is told through filmed interviews with Wright himself, still photos of some of his early influences and creations, and films of his best-known architectural works, which include the S. C. Johnson Building in Racine, Wisconsin, the Guggenheim Museum in New

York, Tokyo's Imperial Hotel and many other fascinating buildings and dwellings.

The name Wright gave to his main concept was "organic architecture," a style that was meant to blend into and complement its surroundings. A house should not be built on a hill, he maintained, but should seemingly grow out of a hill. One of the most famous examples of this idea is the Kaufman house at Bear Run, Pa., which is nestled into a hillside among willow trees with a waterfall running right under the building. Wright was of the opinion that most of the architecture of the past 500 years was ugly and pretentious, and he set out to change the course of architectural design. Perhaps the most characteristic of his designs were the low, rambling dwellings he built in the American mid-west that established a tradition called "prairie architecture." But buildings that hugged the contour of the land weren't his only interest; although he detested most existing skyscrapers, he drew up plans - never to be completed - for a towering structure for Chicago that would have stretched a full mile into the sky, with 528 stories.

Born in 1869 in Wisconsin, the son of a minister and school teacher, Frank Lloyd Wright developed the idea of being an architect very early in life. He studied civil engineering at the University of Wisconsin, then became an assistant to architect Louis Sullivan in Chicago. By the turn of the century, Wright had completed his first independent commission - a private home - and had begun to establish the styles that were to revolutionize 20th-century architecture. Married three times, he won the enmity of society by his casual attitudes towards marital morality; but in the last two or three decades of his life he gradually became accepted, by public and architects alike, as the "grand old man" of American architecture. Even by his 90th year Wright had not mellowed appreciably, but the rest of society had, and thus his opinions were taken not as outrageous shockers but as slightly unorthodox philosophies.

Commonwealth Concert



JOHN AVISON

MASSEY HALL in Toronto on Monday, June 10, will be the scene of a special Commonwealth Concert, presented in honour of the delegates attending the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference. (The concert will be recorded and broadcast on *CBC Wednesday Night*, June 12). Taking part will be the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, soprano Lois Marshall and the CBC Symphony Orchestra, conducted by John Avison.

The program will consist of works by Commonwealth composers: *Festival Te Deum*, by the late Ralph Vaughan Williams of Great Britain; *Santiago de Espada Overture*, by Malcolm Williamson of Australia; *The Ascension*, by Canadian, Godfrey Ridout; *Akinla*, from *African Suite*, by Fela Sowande of Nigeria; *Aotearou Overture*, by New Zealand composer Douglas Lilburn; and *Horoscope*, by Roger Matton of Canada. The program will conclude with Sir Ernest MacMillan's arrangement of *God Save the Queen*.

Lois Marshall, who suffered a serious childhood illness, turned to music as an outlet for her high spirits and creativity. She entered the Royal Conservatory of Music at the age of 12. Miss Marshall had already established an enviable reputation in Canada before her Naumberg Award-winning appearance at New York's Town Hall in 1952. Since then, she has become recognized as one of the great singers of our time. Apart from having sung with the world's major orchestras, she has toured Europe, the Soviet Union, Australia and New Zealand.

The Toronto Mendelssohn Choir was founded in 1894 by the late Dr. A. S. Vogt. The choir was disbanded in 1897 only to be reformed three years later to become one of North America's great choral groups, a position it maintains today. The Mendelssohn Choir has had a series of distinguished conductors, including Sir Ernest MacMillan (1942-57). Walter Susskind, conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, is its present director.

John Avison is the regular conductor of the Vancouver Chamber Orchestra and has done much to encourage musicians and composers in Canada's Pacific region. Mr. Avison studied at the Universities of California and Washington, and in New York at the Juilliard School of Music and Columbia University. He also studied with Paul Hindemith at Yale University. Apart from his conducting activities, he is well-known as a pianist and accompanist.

The CBC Symphony Orchestra was founded in 1952 by Dr. Geoffrey Waddington with the purpose: "to give the CBC the opportunity of presenting music not usually found in regular symphonic programs." The orchestra has given hundreds of concerts in broadcast series since its formation. The CBC Symphony has

3 cups rhubarb
3 cups sugar
1 lemon
3 oranges
½ lb. sliced almonds

Cut up rhubarb in small pieces. Grate the rind of the oranges and lemon and then juice them. Mix all ingredients together and cook for 30 minutes. Add almonds and cook for 5 minutes more. Put into sterilized jars and seal.

pioneered in the presentation of unfamiliar works by Canadian and foreign composers. It has also served as a showcase for many young Canadian soloists. Outstanding Canadian conductors have directed the orchestra as well as those from other countries including Sir John Barbirolli, Sir Bernard Heinze, Pierre Monteux, Josef Krips, Sir Malcolm Sargent and the late Sir Thomas Beecham.

During 1962 and the early part of 1963, Igor Stravinsky made four visits to Toronto to conduct the orchestra in special radio and television broadcasts and to make numerous recordings of his own works for Columbia Records.
