## A Medical Drama With a Difference

A DILAPIDATED CAT ambles across the street towards a crumbling tenement block while a landlady with a mouth like a trap door pedals *Onward Christian Soldiers* on her parlour organ. "Ye-ve been cooking herring again, Mr. Finlay," she snaps over her shoulder, "and I'll not have my gentlemen cooking in their rooms. Ye'll have to go."

The setting is Glasgow, 1928, when lodging-houses were stuffed with ungainly furniture, large, ornate vases glowered from the mantelpiece, grim ancestors glowered from the walls, and whisky was twelve shillings sixpence a bottle. The guilty lodger is a penniless medical student, Alan Finlay, who is a refreshingly different addition to the ranks of Dr. Kildare and Dr. Ben Casey. He's impetuous, with a touch of crackpot sentiment, rougher, tougher and spicier than the glossy, white-coated medicos in most dramas about doctors. A. J. Cronin recounted Finlay's experiences in two collections of short stories entitled *The Adventures of a Black Bag*, and *Further Adventures of a Black Bag*. Vincent Tilsley adapted them for television, and they have been filmed by the BBC in a 12-episode series called *Dr. Finlay's Casebook*, which CBC-TV will present on Thursday nights, beginning July 11.

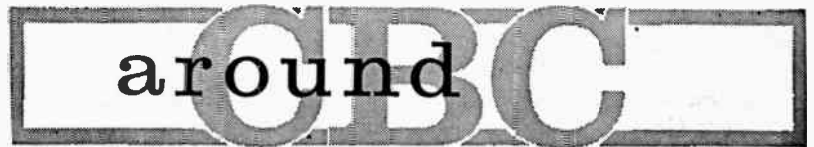
Scottish actor Bill Simpson plays Alan Finlay; Andrew Cruickshank plays the growly veteran G.P., Dr. Cameron; and Barbara Mullen appears as his housekeeper, Janet.

Of all the doctors who have written about their calling, probably A. J. Cronin has made the greatest impact. *The Stars Look Down*, *The Citadel*, *The Keys of the Kingdom*, and others of his best-sellers have been filmed successfully, to reach an even wider public than his books.

BEGINNING SUNDAY, June 30, the CBC will again energize its radio networks on a 24-hour basis, ready to broadcast instructions and information to the public, should any national emergency arise.

The date will mark the re-activation of the CBC's participation in the Emergency Broadcasting Plan, began last year and suspended last fall because of the government's economy program at that time.

Under the Federal government's Emergency Broadcasting Plan, key CBC radio stations will be staffed around the clock, and broadcast on a 24-hour basis. The network connecting these CBC and privately owned stations will be in continuous operation, feeding music in order to maintain network communication between the stations.

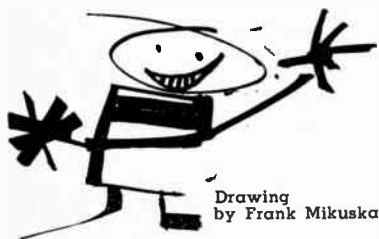
The change also will affect Low Power Relay Transmitters serving about 100 smaller communities. Since these LPRTs are unmanned and cannot be turned on or off at short notice, they will also remain on the air around the clock, broadcasting programs fed over the network.

EDMONTON's Tommy Banks, musical arranger, pianist and orchestra leader, recently filled a two-week engagement with his orchestra at the Mapes Hotel in Reno. Mondays at 10:05 p.m. on CBC Radio, *There's Something in the Air* is heard, with Tommy leading a trio, a "mystery" vocalist, and bi-weekly guest vocalists.

## VACATION TIME

VACATION TIME, a 13-week series of daily hour-long feature programs for younger viewers, began Monday, July 1 at 4:30 p.m. on the CBC television network. The series will originate in six different CBC production centres across the country, with a different origination point every day, Monday through Friday.

On Mondays, the show will come from Toronto, where the program hosts will be Bruce Rogers, Toby Tarnow and Donnalu Wigmore. The Tuesday programs will be produced in Vancouver, where the host will be Norman Young. The Prairies will be the origination point for the Wednesday shows, and the host will be George Knight, with singer Georges LaFleche and outdoorsman Per Holting also ap-

pearing each week. On Thursdays, the programs will alternate between Montreal and Ottawa; Montreal will present a number of features, and the co-hosts in Ottawa will be young teenagers Ann Hodson and Peter Dodson. The Friday programs will be produced in Toronto for the first seven weeks, and from Halifax for the remainder of the season, where the host will be Lloyd MacInnis.

Producing the shows in widely separated points will enable viewers in one area to become acquainted with distant parts of the country. All of the programs will feature filmed or videotaped visits to interesting locations in and around the cities in which they're produced. In the Vancouver segment, for instance, Norman Young will

take viewers on tours of Vancouver Harbour, Seymour Mountain, and over to British Columbia's capital city, Victoria.

The Prairies-produced shows will be in three parts. In the first segment, Georges LaFleche will serve as the guide on a weekly visit to Winnipeg's Assiniboine Park Zoo; in the second part, filmed sequences will show Per Holting and four boys on camping trips to different places around southern Manitoba; the third segment, filmed in Edmonton, is entitled *Instant Theatre* and shows youngsters acting out roles spontaneously in playlets that they've made up themselves. David Raskin is producer.

Ann Hodson and Peter Dodson of Ottawa will take viewers on a tour of the Rideau Canal, a visit to two children's theatre centres and the YMCA's Red Pine Camp, and on a trip to a Palomino horse farm. In Halifax, Lloyd MacInnis will introduce marine artists Jack Gray and Bill DeGarthe at Peggy's Cove, will talk to weatherman Rube Hornstein, will visit a boat-building works and will provide weekly coverage of the junior guides' training program sponsored by the Nova Scotia Department of Lands and Forests.

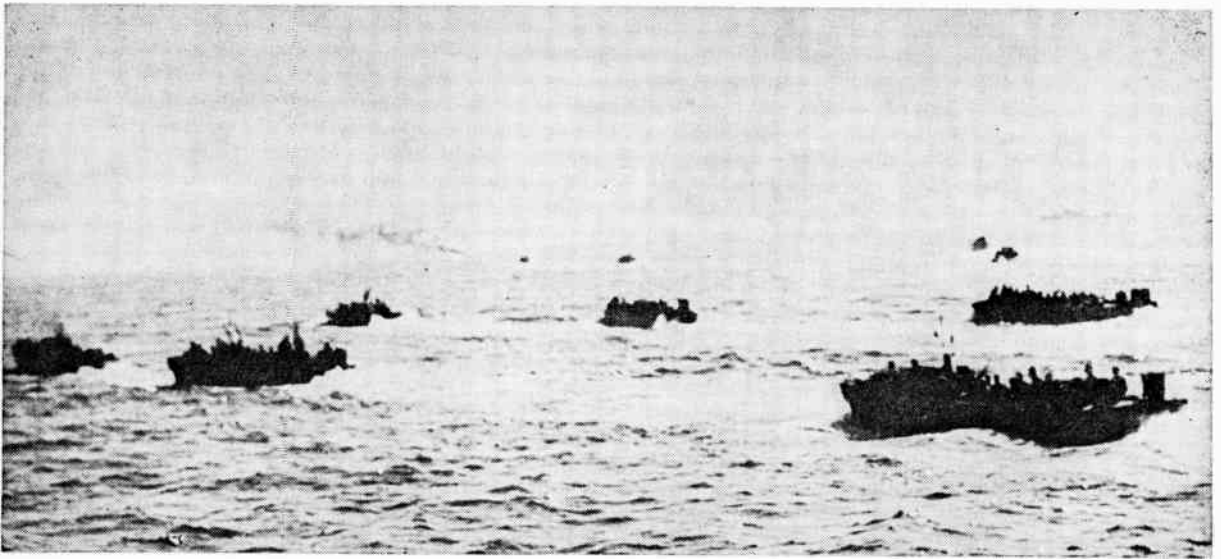

# Canadian Troops Strike at "The Soft Underbelly"

*Peter Stursberg retraces the ground he first covered with Canadian troops invading Sicily during World War Two*

WHEN SIR WINSTON CHURCHILL, Britain's wartime Prime Minister, delivered the words "I cannot tell farther today than to say that it is very probable that there will be heavy fighting in the Mediterranean and elsewhere before the leaves of autumn fall," he knew, as very few who heard him did, that on June 19, 11 days before he made the speech in London, the first group of a slow assault convoy had sailed from the U.K., headed south, and that only two days before, a fast assault convoy had steamed out of the river Clyde, packed to the gunwales with troops, among them the first division of the Canadian Army, headed for the same great rendezvous in the Mediterranean.

Peter Stursberg, well-known CBC correspondent, was on one of those ships, and on Sunday, July 7, at 5 p.m., he will retrace for CBC Radio's *Venture* some of the ground he covered with thousands of other Canadians in that first thrust at the "soft underbelly of the Axis."

One of the things he discovered on that trip back was the origin of the above phrase. According to Sir Ian Jacob (now Director-General of the BBC, but then assistant to Field Marshal Viscount Alanbrooke), whose voice will be heard on the program giving some background on the Casablanca conference and on the Allied decision to attack Sicily, Churchill coined the phrase in August, 1942, in Moscow. He was explaining to Stalin that our in-

attention in 1943 was to attack the southern part of Europe and *then* to go across the channel into Northern Europe, and as he talked he drew a picture of a crocodile on some paper and pointed out that a crocodile has a hard back and a soft belly, to indicate to Stalin that the weak part of Europe was the Mediterranean side and not the channel side.

Except for one day's bitter fighting at Dieppe, the Canadian Army had been kept in the U.K. for the defense of Great Britain against Hitler's threat of invasion. But by the autumn of 1942 the balance of power had shifted, Rommel had been driven out of Egypt, and the Eighth Army and the Americans were slowly but surely pushing the Germans out of North Africa.

The Canadian Army First Division was slated to play an important part in the invasion of Sicily. As soon as they were under way, and notified of their destination, a message from General Montgomery was read to all ships: "I know well the fighting men of Canada; they are magnificent soldiers, and the long and careful training they have received in England will now be put to good use, to the great benefit of the Eighth Army."

Well, they proved him right but they almost didn't get the chance, because of foul weather, the eternal enemy of the sailor. As the more than 3,000 craft of all types steamed towards their final rendezvous on

# The ENTERTAINER

*Sir Lawrence Olivier's  
great performances as  
a down-at-the-heels  
comedian is a highlight of  
this GREAT MOVIES presentation*

SIR LAURENCE OLIVIER has shown that his lean, contemporary style can extract as much tragedy and pathos from a shabby, failed comedian who has been elbowed off the stage as from an ancient king who has been edged off his throne.

In *The Entertainer*, which will be shown in the *Great Movies* series on CBC-TV Saturday night, July 6, Olivier plays Archie Rice, a fourth-rate song-and-dance man still using the same faded blue jokes he started out with decades ago. He's a lecher, and a liar, smothered in debt and ego, always looking towards a bright future which will never materialize — a cheap, sentimental, vulgar fraud.

In Olivier's subtle portrayal, Archie runs the gamut of emotions and tricks of the shallow, seedy little heel with his banal, relentless exhibitionism, snatching need for girls to bolster his sagging vanity, endless boring offstage jokes, synthetic charm, and smirking, sadly empty face. His alcoholic wife is portrayed with distinction by Brenda de Banzie; with Roger Livesey as his father; and Joan Plowright (now Lady Olivier) as his daughter.

When he made the film, Olivier confessed to a "morbid fascination" in wondering whether his own career might have run along the lines of Archie. This was serious speculation, he insists. "At one time," he says, "if someone had offered me a job as a song-and-dance man in a seaside show, I'd have been glad to take it. I'd have called myself Larry Olivier and been as happy as a lark. There must have been something of Archie in me all along. I've always wanted to make people laugh more than I've had the chance to do." There is quite a bit of the clown in him, which may account for his sometimes melancholy look.

Olivier gives a triumphantly real picture of the falsity, the pathos of a music-hall showman on the way out, a peacocking little entertainer who is down but won't accept it. Even in his shabby digs with his family he's putting on an act with knowing smirks, drab jokes and weary gestures. Olivier makes him smudgily likeable at times, but mostly his Archie is a sad, bogus, braggadocio. When, at the end of his history, his aging face stripped of the veneer of buffoonery, Archie acknowledges his humiliation, Olivier's performance has the breath of life. He is Hamlet playing the clown.

The film is based on John Osborne's controversial play of the same name. Its theme is bigger than the plight of the seedy vaudevillian and his constrained family. In them Osborne sees reflected the plight of England today at the end of an old tradition.

There are many facets to Olivier's art, and he enjoys breaking out of the mold into which time and the public have cast him. But in spite of his willingness to try things new, he's a rather private sort of person. He has little temperament, but his shyness is of an intensity most unusual among theatrical people. He's a bit introverted, his friends say, although he will go to infinite pains to make those around him in any sort of gathering feel at ease and important. In small gatherings, which he prefers, his wit is sparkling—he's particularly fond of plays on words with classical references—and he takes a schoolboy pleasure in practical jokes (is easy game, himself), and in passing unnoticed in crowds. He's of medium height and ordinary proportions, dresses conservatively in grey flannel suits and

MODERN methods of diagnosing and treating various illnesses and complaints will be shown and discussed by practising Canadian doctors from across Canada in *Check-Up*, a 12-week series of medical programs beginning Monday night, July 8, on CBC-TV. CBC announcer Lloyd Robertson as host.

The series is being produced by the CBC in co-operation with the Canadian Medical Association. The subjects to be discussed are allergy, rheumatoid arthritis, chronic cough, backache, cancer (leukemia), coronary heart disease, pre-natal care, geriatrics, anxiety, tension, diabetes, headache, and accidental poisoning in childhood.

John Livingston, who has organized the series for the CBC, says its purpose "is to show viewers how a doctor manages common ailments; to emphasize the role of the responsible patient; to help people take better care of themselves and to use the doctor's time and services to best advantage; and to illuminate for viewers the deductive method of diagnosis."

Each program will have four parts. In the first, a doctor observes a patient, questions him, examines him and prescribes. Then the program host introduces the doctor in question to a panel of laymen, who question the physician about the diagnosis and treatment. The doctor answers the panel's questions. Then the doctor and patient are seen a number of days or weeks later, so that viewers can see how well the prescription worked and what further symptoms appeared. The emphasis in the programs is on the management of the illness or complaint, rather than on its complete cure. Later the doctor and host reappear to examine the importance of the particular ailment.

In preparing the series, a special sub-committee of the Canadian Medical Association public relations committee worked with Livingston, producer Denny Spence, David Walker, supervisor of CBC adult education programs, Eric Koch, supervising producer of CBC-TV public affairs programs, and scriptwriter Alan King. Sub-committee members are Dr. Norrie Swanson, medical director, Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society (Ontario Division), who is series consultant to the CBC for *Check-Up*; Dr. James A. Key, assistant professor of surgery, University of Toronto; Dr. R. A. Dolan, neurosurgeon at St. Joseph's Hospital and Hamilton General Hospital, Hamilton; Dr. A. D. Kelly, general secretary of the CMA, Toronto; Dr. A. F. W. Peart, deputy general secretary, CMA, Toronto; Dr. W. V. Johnston, executive director, College of General Practice of Canada, Toronto; J. Kieren, public relations consultant, College of General Practice, Toronto; and K. C. Cross, public relations secretary, CMA, Toronto.

July 8, *Accidental Poisoning in Childhood*: Participant, Dr. Harry Medovv, pediatrician in chief, Children's Hospital, Winnipeg; consultant, Dr. R. J. Imrie, director of the Poison Control Centre, Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto.

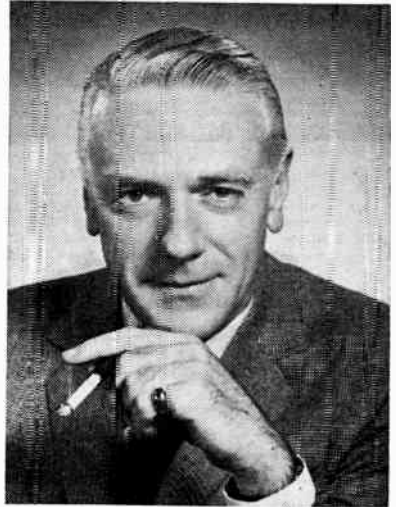

# Repeat Widely - Acclaimed Nature Film

*LAST SUMMER, which has earned enthusiastic praise in its two previous viewings on CBC-TV, is seen again Sunday afternoon, July 7*

EVEN DECKED OUT in natty drip-dry synthetics, pay cheque in his wallet and headed for a night on the town with a cute chick in a late-model convertible that won't be paid for until heaven knows when, the modern young male has nothing on the prairie chicken or its close relative, the sharp-tailed grouse, when it comes to putting on a show to attract the opposite sex. Viewers will see for themselves on Sunday afternoon, July 7, when CBC-TV's *Camera Canada* presents *Last Summer*, a program giving the sights and sounds of the cycle of summer in forest, marsh and prairie, from the coming to

life of birds and animals as the snow melts, to the fall. First presented on CBC-TV 18 months ago, it won an Honourable Mention in the Ohio Awards competition for educational programs last year.

Three prominent nature photographers, Dick Bird of Regina, H. Kenneth Campbell of Peterborough, and Cleveland P. Grant of Wisconsin, and Dr. W. W. H. Gunn, one of the world's foremost recorders of nature sounds, spent several months filming and recording the sights and sounds of Canada's birds and animals for this program. Both Bird and Grant have done filming for Walt Disney.

Half of *Last Summer* deals with the broad-leaved forest of southern Ontario, and was filmed and recorded at Rondeau Provincial Park, on the shores of Lake Erie. Among the animals and birds it features are the white-tailed deer, the white-footed mouse, the chipmunk, red-headed woodpeckers, black-capped chickadees and the towhee. There are also shots of small animals such as the painted turtle, the garter snake and eastern Canada's only lizard, the blue-tailed skink. The program follows the development of these creatures from the spring to the fall.

## Children's Films For Sunday Viewing

*TIME OUT for Adventure*, a new series of weekly hour-long children's programs, begins Sunday, July 7 on the CBC-TV network. The series will consist of action and adventure films from Britain, specifically designed to attract younger viewers. Each week's program will be introduced by Michele Finney, the 13-year-old hostess of CBC-TV's afternoon program for children, *Razzle Dazzle*, during the past two fall-winter seasons.

IN THE WORLD of Grand Prix auto racing, there are few old men. "Old," in the language of the dare-devils who pilot their screaming, high-powered packets of steel about tracks and road circuits at 150 miles per hour, means anyone over 30.

But there has been one notable exception: Juan Manuel Fangio, an Argentinian who didn't break into the big-time class until he was 37, went on to win an unprecedented five world championships in seven years, then retired in 1958 as an almost-legendary figure in racing circles.

Among racing drivers, Fangio, or "the Old Man" as he was called, was regarded as the greatest of them all, head and shoulders above the competition.

This Sunday, as part of CBC-TV's *World of Sport*, a short film entitled *Tribute to Fangio* will be shown. It captures some of the chilling danger and adventurous aura that makes racing what it is.

## CANADIAN TROOPS STRIKE

(Continued from page 5)

July 9, D minus one, the weather, which had been hot and cloudless, changed drastically. A heavy gale blew up and it seemed that this whole gigantic effort would be turned into an unbelievable disaster at the last moment. As the ships rolled about in the heavy seas, the hearts of those lucky enough to be blown about above decks went out to the troops so closely packed below, suffering the agonies of sea-sickness. The wind was blowing from the northwest, down the coast of Sicily, and the surf on the beaches would be terrific. The sun went down and the wind, if anything, grew stronger. And then, with barely 1½ hours to go before zero, the miracle happened. The wind dropped, the white horses disappeared, and the swell went down to a manageable level so quickly that it was almost unbelievable.

The island of Sicily, a large triangle sitting just about in the middle of the Mediterranean Sea at the toe of the long boot of Italy, has its western tip only 90 miles across the shallow Straits of Sicily to Cap Bon in Tunisia. A train-ferry across the Straits of Messina connects the eastern tip with the Italian mainland, and the southern tip, 70 miles across the Straits of Sicily from the Island of Malta, was where the Canadian forces landed on July 10, 1943, on the beachhead at Pachino at a couple of spots called "Roger" and "Sugar" respectively. In some part due to the gale of the night before (apparently it led the naval advisor of General Achille D'Havet, commanding the 206th Italian Coastal Division, to

assure his chief that landings were impossible that night) the landings were achieved with comparative ease and first objectives were accomplished quickly.

The Italians seemed to have lost all heart for resistance, and the last waves of Canadian troops coming ashore were met by streams of Italian soldiers cheerfully surrendering and offering to help unload. Then they started to move inland along the broken-down Sicilian roads that straggled tortuously through the rugged countryside, and to men who had trained in the clear, temperate air and the icy waters of Scotland, the Sicilian sun hit them like a blowtorch. They fought their way inland under a blindingly hot sun, choking on the limestone dust that was breathed down their throats and coated their skin, making them look like rows of tired grey ghosts. They were bitten by sandflies and every other type of insect; and they found that they were in a country where the only water had sometimes to be brought from as far as 20 miles away.

Soon, they met the *real* enemy: Field-Marshal Kesselring's crack 15th Panzer Grenadiers and the Hermann Goering Division, among others. They fought their way up the east coast of Sicily and the waiting world became familiar with the names of Modica, Ragusa, Vizzini, Valaguarda, Assoro, Leonforte, Agira, and Adrano. For their participation in these actions the Canadian Army won high praise from both their allies and the enemy. On August 10 they were relieved of operational responsibilities and moved back to a concentration area on the Catanian plains, where they rested and prepared for the forthcoming assault on the Italian mainland.

### New Sunday Feature

MINSTREL MELODIES sung by Britain's George Mitchell Singers, who for many years have delighted audiences all over the world, will be heard on CBC Radio Sunday afternoons at 1:30, beginning July 7. Transcribed by the BBC, the 13-week series also features Tony Mercer, bass; John Boulter, tenor; Dai Francis, baritone; with George Chisholm and His Jazzers, and Alan Bristow and his orchestra.

The George Mitchell Singers' outstanding success in BBC TV with the *Black and White Minstrel Show* was crowned by the award at Montreux in 1961 of the Golden Rose, the top prize at the first annual international contest in television light entertainment. To this was added a special Silver Rose, offered by the international press. Fresh honours awaited them at London's Victoria Palace Theatre, where they opened with their smash hit in May, 1962, and later took it on tour through the British Isles and Australia.

## 'In a Manner of Speaking' Returns

ANOTHER long-time favourite of radio listeners will return to the air this week. It's the series entitled *In a Manner of Speaking*, in which actor-writer-director Hugh Webster reads from and discusses poetry, drama and other literary works.

The series, which had a two-year continuous run on CBC Radio from 1960 to 1962, will return on July 7, and will be heard throughout the summer on Sunday afternoons at 1 o'clock.

Hugh Webster became interested in the theatre fairly late in life, comparatively speaking. Perhaps because he *wasn't* born in a trouper's trunk, he has devoted himself to his art with even greater zeal than do many of his fellow actors. The son of a Scottish bar-

rows-maker, he came to Canada with his family in 1948 at the age of 18. During his first few years in this country he worked at many different occupations — office boy, hydro lineman, truck driver, labourer in a steel warehouse, taxi driver—and meanwhile, starting in 1949, pursued a part-time career in amateur dramatic productions. During the winters of 1949-50 and 1950-51 he reversed the order, studying acting full-time at Stern-dale Bennett's studio in Toronto and working at a variety of part-time jobs to support himself.

In a Central Ontario Drama Festival production in the spring of 1951, he won compliments from the adjudicator, Esse Ljungh, and during the following summer he did nine assorted roles with the International Players in Kingston, Ont.

By the time he got back to Toronto in the fall of 1951 the idea of making acting his lifetime career was firm in his mind. He picked up a few roles on CBC Radio during the winter, then organized his own summer-stock company for a season of plays in Oakville, near Toronto. The fare offered was exciting but not good box-office, and the company went broke, whereupon Webster returned to Toronto, borrowed \$50, and got married.

In the fall of 1952, CBC Television was launched, and things began to open up for Hugh Webster. Soon he became one of the best-known and most-in-demand of

# Sounds of London

## 'Round the Clock

THE SOUNDS OF a typical day in England's capital city will be heard on *Radio International* at 8 p.m. Monday night, July 8, in a *Portrait of London*. The program doesn't follow any one Londoner around the old city or try to make the listener feel like a Londoner. Rather, it paints London as the expatriate might remember it, illustrating its wide variety of activities, of which the Londoner is unconsciously aware even though he may seldom be involved with them personally.

The program begins with a voluble, harassed bus conductor urging his work-bound passengers to "pass right along the bus,

please," then goes on to observe the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace, which symbolizes the reawakening of the city. As the day progresses, the food market in Soho comes to noisy life and a rich mosaic of accents is heard haggling over prices and quality of the goods that will later cater to the inner Londoner, from kippers to caviar.

A street band wanders by, perhaps a little out of step but cheerfully determined to make up in volume what it lacks in skill. Visitors make their way to the Zoo in Regents Park, clutching bags of peanuts and eager small-fry. Orators importantly mount their boxes in Hyde Park to tell the nation where to get off.

In the cool dimness of London churches, men and women pause for reflection; tourists experiment with their voices and overcome dizziness in St. Paul's high Whispering Gallery. Others gape their way through art galleries, or relive, with delighted shivers, the gory history of the Tower.

Evening slips into London, trailing long shadows. Listeners drop into one of Soho's ethnic restaurants where the food is superb and the bill surprising; they move on to Covent Garden for the ballet; sample the warm friendship in a Chelsea pub; and then take a quiet stroll along the Embarkment in the soft, damp air, while tugs toot fussily on the lapping Thames, and Big Ben keeps the hours with solemn deliberation.

And through the night, while most of London sleeps, a cheery, saucily independent Cockney army begins to refurbish the city. Charwomen get down on their knees to wipe the day off office floors, and truckloads of fresh fruit and vegetables roll into Covent Garden market to the same cries that have echoed through the cabbages and strawberries for centuries. The first light crouches along the rooftops. Milk bottles clatter; springs creak as thousands of early-birds heave themselves reluctantly into a new day; kettles begin to sing, and with a "cuppa char," London girds itself for another look at what the world has to offer.

## Variety Shows For Summer Months

TWO OF CBC RADIO'S most popular daytime variety shows, *Chuckwagon* and the *Tommy Hunter Show*, will be taking summer vacations, being replaced, beginning July 1, with musical and variety shows featuring some top CBC Radio personalities.

In the 12:15 to 12:30 daily time period, three different shows will be heard through the week, reflecting the same country-and-western theme that marked *Chuckwagon*. On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, the featured artist will be tenor Bobby Hill of Montreal, in a quarter-hour of songs and ballads. The two remaining time periods will be devoted to Western music played and sung by Stu Davis of Edmonton (Tuesdays) and folk music by the team of Reg Gibson and Jim Pirie (Thursdays).

The summer replacement programs for the *Tommy Hunter Show*, in the 1:15 to 1:45 time period, will feature Shirley Harmer, Gordie Tapp and Maurice Pearson. ## Broadcast Material Of New Writers

EARLIER THIS SEASON, the CBC announced a contest open to Canadian writers under the age of 30. The purpose of the contest was to stimulate new writing, to discover hitherto unknown authors and poets, and to bring their work to the attention of the public. Material submitted was to consist of short stories and poems never before published.

Program organizer Robert McCormack has described the response to the contest as very encouraging. "We received a surprising amount of really good writing from points across the country," he says, "and particularly from western Canada." At the time of writing, it is impossible to know whether a new Hemingway or Auden is lurking under the stack of manuscripts piled in McCormack's office, but even on the pres-

ent evidence the results seem to have made the contest well worthwhile.

The competition was organized on two "plateaus." All the material submitted is read and appraised by McCormick and producer Weldon Hanbury. The best is accepted, paid for at usual broadcast rates, and will be presented on a series of weekly half-hour radio programs to be heard Tuesday nights at 8:30.

Early in September, a panel of judges consisting of McCormick, Hanbury, Robert Fulford, reviews editor of *Maclean's* magazine, and Eli Mandel, Canadian poet and professor of English at the University of Alberta, will assess the broadcast material and select the best short story and best poem or group of poems.

The item chosen will be re-broadcast on the final program in the series, and the two winning authors will each receive an award of \$500 in addition to the standard broadcast fees.

## Agenda Expands Summer Coverage

THROUGH THE summer, radio's *Agenda* will be expanded to a half-hour each week and will be heard at a different hour—Friday night at 8:30. The July 5 and 12 broadcasts were recorded at the Conference of Learned Societies held at Laval University. The broadcaster on each occasion is Elspeth Chisholm, and the producer is Barry Toole of CBC Montreal.

The topic of the July 6 program is *The Future of Canadian Confederation*. Miss Chisholm will interview René Levesque, Quebec Minister of Natural Resources; Professor Donald Smiley of the political science department, University of British Columbia; Professor Jean-Riel Cardin, Industrial Relations Department, Laval University; and Professor Kenneth Rea of the economics department, University of Saskatchewan. Participants were attending the meeting of the Canadian Political Science Association. The program will also include comments by Professor Alexander Brady of the political science department, University of Toronto, recorded during a question-and-answer session at the meeting.

*The Academic and Politics* is the subject of the July 19 program. Those heard include Professor Paul Lacost, faculty of law, University of Montreal; the Honourable Walter Dinsdale, M.P. (Progressive Conservative), former Minister of Northern Affairs and Natural Resources, and former professor of political science at Brandon College, Manitoba; Professor Michael Oliver, political science department, McGill University, and President of the New Democratic Party; and John Stewart, M.P. (Liberal), now Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister for External Affairs, and former professor of political science at St. Francis Xavier University. The material for this program was recorded at the meeting of the Canadian Association of University Teachers.

**Opera and Recital  
Are Musical Highlights**

TWO MUSICAL PROGRAMS comprise the major portion of this week's CBC Wednesday Night, July 10, on radio. At 8:05, the Canadian String Quartet will be heard in a 55-minute broadcast which will include the world première of a CBC-commissioned work by François Morel; and at 9:00 there will be an hour-long program of excerpts from Leos Janacek's opera *The Cunning Little Vixen*.

Morel's *String Quartet No. 2*, the work receiving its first performance, is one of a number of chamber works commissioned by CBC for presentation on radio this year.

Janacek's opera-fable was composed between 1921 and 1923, five years before the composer's death at the age of 72. Its inspiration came from an unlikely source—a newspaper serial that appeared in a daily paper in Janacek's home city of Brno, capital of Moravia.

The opera is set in a series of short scenes and interludes, and describes the adventures of a vixen and her contacts with humanity, especially the relationship she established with a forester. In the tradition of the fable, all of the many assorted animals in the story are given voice and personality, and play important parts in the opera. The story of how the little vixen was caught, escaped, and at last was shot by a poacher she was teasing may seem unlikely material for an opera, but it appealed to Janacek for

its charm and humour, and also because of its implied affirmation that death cannot touch undying nature. In the opera's closing scene, as the forester lies in the woods musing on the past, a little cub trots into view, a cub that bears a striking resemblance to its mother. The vixen is dead, but she lives on in her children and their children.

Janacek had a Schweitzer-like reverence for life that extended down to the smallest, most insignificant forms of animal life. When he began to write the opera he withdrew to his home on the edge of a forest in Moravia, taking his music sketch-books with him. In the books he jotted down not only the musical curves of everyday talk around him but the exact pitch and rhythm of animals' cries. When, in the opera, the vixen kills a strutting farmyard hen, Janacek turns a scribbled note of a hen's cackle into a complete musical scene.

This evocative quality is heard throughout the score. In the opening bars the scene is set graphically in the music: a forest murmurous with life, insects dancing in the warm haze, sunlight glinting through leafy branches. With the same loving and accurate ear, he presents the forest creatures: the vixen, sprightly and affectionate; her handsome fox; the lumbering badger; frogs and grasshoppers; and the forester who lives closely among them. In the opera the human and animal worlds are deeply involved with each other, and overlap one on the other.

*The Cunning Little Vixen* will be heard in a new English translation by Norman Tucker, and will be broadcast by means of BBC transcription. It will feature soprano June Bronhill as the Vixen, Neil Easton as the Forester, and Kevin Miller as the Fox, with a number of supporting roles. The Sadler's Wells opera chorus and orchestra will be conducted by Colin Davis, and the program will be introduced by the English music critic and writer, John Amis.

Sequences filmed and recorded in western Canada include members of the gopher family, prairie dogs, ground squirrels and birds that nest away from the water, such as the western meadowlark and the horned lark. They were filmed near Brandon in the Delta marshes, and in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Included in the film is the mating ceremony of the sharp-tailed grouse, often incorrectly referred to as the prairie chicken. The real

prairie chicken is the pinnated or square-tailed grouse, but the species are similar in many respects. The mating season for the male grouse in the film begins in spring when the birds return from winter migration. They settle on their dancing grounds on the Canadian prairies, and each morning and evening the males gather for conferences before the actual mating ceremony, which is an elaborate one. Once the ceremony begins the male spreads his wings elegantly and his tail becomes prominent. The birds really do dance, and at the same time chirp out a come-hither to the female, a succession of low, intense, hollow sounds which carry for miles around and are similar to a drum chorus. When they hear it the hens drop everything and hustle off to the dance area. If they like the strutting, prancing males, they stay. The mating season usually lasts until early summer.

Benson and Dr. Gunn have also worked together on other CBC programs, including *Voices of April*, which won an Ohio Award in 1961, and *Birds of the Forest*, which, in 1955, won an award offered annually for outstanding documentary programs by the Italian Newspapers Association, and presented at the same time as the Italia Prize.

### CAESAR SALAD

- 1 cup bread squares
- 1 head romaine ( or whatever  
lettuce available)
- $\frac{1}{8}$  tsp. dry mustard, black  
pepper, salt
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup grated parmesan cheese
- 3 tbsp. olive oil
- juice of 1 lemon
- 1 coddled egg
- 3 or 4 anchovy fillets cut up

Prepare lettuce, break into bite size pieces. Dry well. Rub salad bowl with clove of garlic. Into saucepan put some oil and butter and a clove of garlic. Brown bread squares to make croutons. Put lettuce into salad bowl. Add mustard, pepper, salt and cheese. Mix. Sprinkle oil and lemon juice over salad and fillets. Mix again.

Allow a fresh egg to sit in boiling water for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mins. Break egg over salad and mix salad until all trace of egg disappears. Just before serving add croutons and toss lightly.
