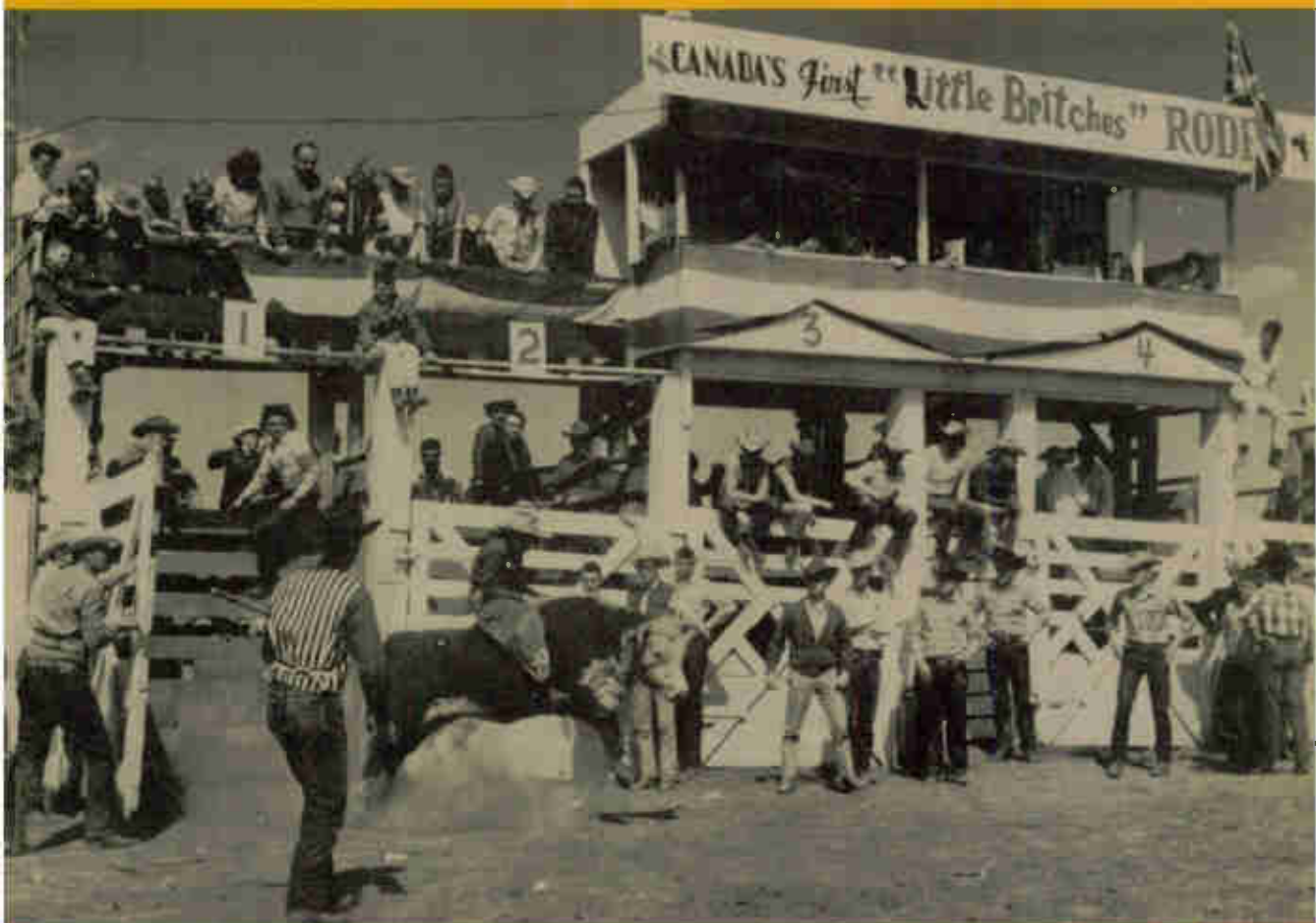

WELL-KNOWN pianist, composer and radio commentator Chester Duncan will perform Sunday, July 14 on CBC Radio's *Recital in Miniature*, four preludes for piano by English composer York Bowen, who died last year at the age of 80.

For many years Bowen was a professor of piano at the Royal Academy of Music, London. A prolific composer of the post-romantic school, Bowen created music with many stylistic mannerisms and qualities akin to those of Rachmaninoff, Dohnanyi and Medtner. His best-known works are undoubtedly his many compositions for the piano, which include four concertos and four sonatas.

Bowen's complete set of 24 preludes in all keys, opus 102, is dedicated to that rather eccentric but remarkable Parsée pianist and composer, Sorajbi.

Recital in Miniature, heard Sundays at 12 noon, is produced by Jeffrey Anderson of CBC Winnipeg.

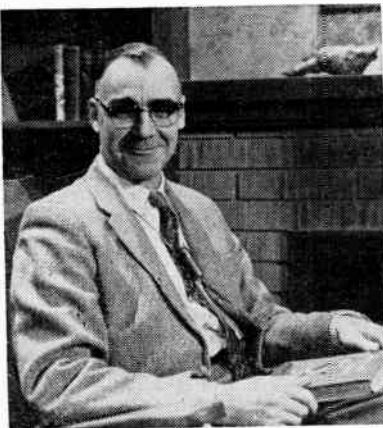
Mr. Wood's weekly quarter-hour program, which is produced by CBC Edmonton, attracted a growing legion of young and not-so-young Alberta viewers over two complete fall and winter seasons and has achieved a similar degree of popularity in Winnipeg since CBWT added the program to its schedule.

In addition to regular newspaper contributions, Mr. Wood has written books and scores of articles which have appeared in Canadian, American, British, and Australian magazines. Over 100 of these articles have been translated for German publication.

Two of Mr. Wood's books, *The Map Maker* and *The Great Chief* won Governor-General's awards for works for juvenile readers.

The Canada Council and the University of Manitoba have, in past years, awarded him research grants to carry on his work.

According to Dr. Helen Creighton, President of the Canadian Authors' Association, Mr. Wood was chosen for the award because his writing teaches youth "the beauty of the written word and appreciation of the outdoors."

Incredible Success of a First Novel

THE INCREDIBLE JOURNEY follows no "formula," but has pushed more pretentious works into the background of the sales picture

PERHAPS PEOPLE are getting tired of each other. That may account for the fact that books about animals, which, aside from sentimentalists, children, sportsmen and the British, have seldom had a large reading public, have suddenly appeared on the best-seller lists. At any rate, adult readers have been passing up the heroes and heroines of Graham Greene, James Michener, Vance Packard and other popular authors to put an unknown writer on top of the heap with her first book, about three unhumanized domestic pets, two dogs and a cat. Alone, they set out on a long, exhausting trek through the northern Ontario bush, which earns them a place of honour among this country's intrepid explorers.

Since it was published two years ago, Sheila Burnford's *The Incredible Journey* has been selling like hot-cakes in seven languages, has headed the *Sunday Times* book list in England, has made the best-seller list in the *New York Times*

book review section, and has been filmed by Walt Disney in Ontario with a Canadian cast.

Sunday afternoon, July 14, at 5:30 p.m., CBC Radio presents an interview with the book's Canadian author and Ken Cavanagh, and a reading, by CBC announcer Lammont Tilden, of a chapter from the book.

The Incredible Journey is a warm, sentimental tale about Bodger, an ancient, humorous English bull terrier of breeding who is feeling his years; wheat-coloured Tao, an elegant, aristocratic, pampered Siamese cat; and Luath, a young, wistful Labrador retriever with a red-gold coat. When their master, Jim Hunter, a college professor, departs for a holiday in England with his family, he arranges for his friend, John Longridge, who lives 250 miles east, to look after the pets. Shortly before the Hunters are due back, Longridge goes off on a hunting trip and, through a misunderstanding, leaves the animals on their own in an empty

house. Lost and hesitant, they stand in the driveway. The retriever's instinct tells him that their home lies to the west, and that is where he must go—but not without the other two. He must make them go with him all the way.

So *The Incredible Journey* begins and proceeds across the wild Ontario northland, a hazardous trek. The fall frosts are coming on, the nights are chill. The animals are hungry, and so are the wild creatures they encounter. But somehow the pets press on together.

The three friends have all sorts of hair-raising experiences and near-escapes from death as they plod their way west. What sees them through, for of course the story has a happy ending, is their great affection, loyalty, and understanding of one another, and the fact that they learn to pool their talents. The story preaches no moral lesson, and it has scarcely any plot. It is the animals, themselves, which carry it and hold the

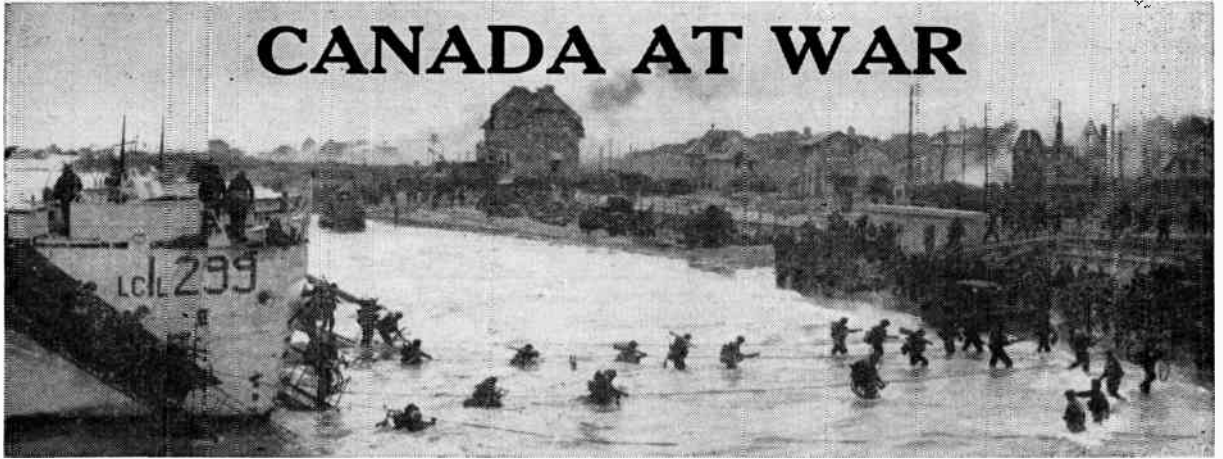

CANADA AT WAR



Back for another viewing on CBC-TV is the National Film Board's distinguished presentation of Canada's part in the decade 1936-46. It will be seen each Saturday afternoon starting July 13

THE SECOND WORLD WAR, as Canadians fought it and experienced it, is recalled in *Canada at War*, a series of 13 half-hour films prepared for television by the National Film Board. The series, the biggest single project ever undertaken by the N.F.B., was first shown on CBC-TV in the spring of 1962, and is being repeated this summer, on Saturday afternoons, starting July 13.

Canada at War deals not only with Canadian participation in the war, but with a significant decade in Canada's history—1936-46, from the first stirrings of Axis belligerence to the dawn of the atomic age. "The thing that struck me most forcibly in those 10 years," says Donald Brittain, the N.F.B. writer who worked as associate producer on the series, "was how Canada matured and began to chart its own independent course in the world."

The films, which covered developments both at the front and at home during the period, have been described as "a nostalgic reminiscence of an era," by Stanley Clish, their producer. The massive undertaking of producing *Canada at War* was only part of a larger plan, hoped to be realized by 1967, the centenary of Confederation, to have a complete record on film of the history of Canada, from the beginnings of responsible government in the mid-1800's to the present. Much material for such a project will, of course, have to be in dramatized form, but for more recent events, documentary films are being used.

Three years in the making, *Canada at War* represents the co-ordinated work of many different N.F.B. experts, working under the direction of executive producer Peter Jones. The task that faced the film editors and producers, when they first embarked on the project, was an awesome one. About 16 million feet—almost 3,000 miles—of wartime film had to be viewed, indexed, catalogued, then the best of it edited and selected down to a total running time of 6½ hours. Some of the film was obtained from news-

reels and from official government film shot by Canadian, British, American, German and Russian cameramen in all parts of the world, but a major portion was culled from an enormous quantity of film stored in a hangar at a disused airfield at Pendleton, 30 miles from Ottawa. This film, ignored and almost forgotten since the end of the war, included material shot by Allied cameramen, plus about 2,500,000 feet of film shot by Germans.

"We knew there was a lot of film (at Pendleton)," recalls Clish, "but we didn't know in detail what it was about." When the N.F.B. decided to prepare the series, the contents of the hangar became the object of a long and exhausting investigation. A four-man team of N.F.B. researchers under William Galloway moved into the hangar in December, 1958, and spent the next 15 months, in a potentially explosive atmosphere of deteriorating, highly inflammable nitrate film.

The first part of the job being finished, the editors then set about their task of selecting the footage they needed for the TV series. Meanwhile, N.F.B. staff writer Donald Brittain was called in, during the summer of 1960, to work with Clish in preparing the 13 programs. Before viewing any of the film, Brittain spent months writing a complete and detailed outline of events during the decade, with particular attention to the war years. He did extensive research, conducted dozens of interviews, culled material from official histories and war memoirs, news reports, army documents and other sources, and worked closely with a number of historians from the Department of National Defence, particularly with Col. C. P. Stacey, O.B.E., who was historical consultant to the project.

When the completed series finally reached TV screens across the country, it met with praise from every quarter, and the long months of work by the N.F.B. crew were rewarded by the wide recognition given to a difficult job well done.

Purcell's Great Opera:

DIDO and AENEAS

The first—and, some say, greatest—opera by an Englishman is performed in its entirety July 17 on CBC Wednesday Night

IT WAS 1689, and Henry Purcell, then in his 30th year, was a successful but frustrated composer. Throughout Europe, everywhere but in his native England, opera was becoming the rage. The vocal flowerings of Cesti and Carissimi were being acclaimed at royal courts and theatres; but English audiences still clung to the old-fashioned masques and plays-with-music, where the songs and instrumental pieces were merely interpolations in lavishly mounted entertainments in which dances, costumes, scenery and “machines” (elaborate stage effects) played a much more important part.

Purcell's frustration arose from the fact that he wanted to compose a real opera, in which the *music* would be the important thing. He had written many works for the stage, but they were all separate numbers, composed to order, and often made to appear ludicrous because they had little or nothing to do with the main action of the plays they accompanied.

But Purcell finally got his chance, sometime during 1689, to strike a blow for music. One of his associates at the Duke's Theatre in London was a dancing master named Josias Priest, who also ran a school for young gentlewomen in the village of Chelsea, which then lay outside London's boundaries, “far away from yon lewd town.” Priest asked Purcell to compose a work, in any form Purcell chose, to be performed by the school's young ladies. Thus it was that an otherwise unknown dance instructor achieved a small measure of lasting fame, as the man who made possible the creation of the first (and, some say, the greatest) opera by an Englishman: Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas*.

The opera's libretto was provided by another of Purcell's theatre acquaintances, Nahum Tate, who, incidentally, was Poet Laureate at the time. Tate drew for his inspiration on the ancient legend of Dido and Aeneas as recounted in the Aeneid, the epic narrative in which the Roman poet Virgil (70-19 B.C.) described the adventures of the Trojan prince Aeneas as he wandered the ancient world after the fall of Troy. Virgil's story, in turn, is said to owe much to the epics of Homer, the Greek poet who lived seven centuries earlier. One of the tales in the Aeneid concerns the visit of Aeneas to Carthage, where love blossomed between the Trojan hero and the beautiful queen of the African city. In Greek mythology, the Carthaginian queen was identified as Elissa, but Virgil called her Dido. In Tate's libretto, both names occur, thus causing the same type of confusion that is engendered in 19th-century Russian novels in which the characters never seem to know their own names.

The story of the opera, as developed over 23 centuries, from Homer through Virgil to Tate, is as follows: Dido has fallen in love with Aeneas, but fears that Fate is against their romance. Her loyal and devoted lady-in-waiting, Belinda, persuades the queen that all will be well, and her sentiments are echoed by Dido's courtiers. But they haven't reckoned with a wicked Sorceress and her attendant witches and goblins, who hate the queen and are plotting the downfall and destruction of the two lovers. The horrid creatures put their unkempt heads together, conjure up a thunderstorm to break up a picnic outing being enjoyed by the court, and then inform Aeneas, through a goblin disguised as Mercury, that the gods command him to leave Carthage. He is taken in by the deception, and is about to sail off with his fleet when Dido appears and accuses Aeneas of deserting her. Moved by her tears, he says he will risk the anger of the gods to stay with her, but Dido, heartbroken to discover that her lover could even think of leaving, sends him away. As the opera concludes, the queen stabs herself and dies in the arms of the faithful Belinda, while the courtiers sing a last lament over her lifeless body.

In an introduction to his work, Purcell described it, in what today would appear to be a less-than-modest manner, as “the perfect opera.” His meaning was that it realized all his ideals in opera composition, as distinct from the unsatisfactory stage works he had had to produce previously. But his phrase, taken at its face value as an assessment, is not entirely inaccurate. Though rather short, the opera

is beautifully balanced, has excitement, humour, pathos, conflict and high drama, and is constructed on a carefully worked-out musical framework. In design and conception it was far in advance of its age, and it long remained an isolated phenomenon, unlike anything else in the English stage repertory. Public taste in the reign of William III was not yet ready for operas sung throughout, and mixed entertainments of drama and incidental music continued to satisfy the public's demand for spectacle for many years after the appearance of the first English opera.

Purcell didn't depart entirely from the theatrical conventions of his day. The scenes in the witches' caves, the "deep vaulted cells" where the Sorceress and her accomplices carry on their evil work, are related directly to the then-popular masques, in which furies, demons and other characters of the underworld often played important parts. These eerie scenes, and others — particularly the thunderstorm scene during which the false Mercury dramatically appears — gave excellent opportunities for the massive and ingenious stage devices so dear to the hearts of audiences and stage directors of the period. They may not have been able to match the effects of Wagnerian music-drama at Bayreuth, but nevertheless their efforts would probably elicit gasps of astonishment from modern audiences. Singers were made to fly through the air, thunder rolled and lightning flashed, demons appeared and disappeared with disconcerting suddenness, and, when required, entire stages could be made to appear engulfed in flames. The opportunities for dancing in *Dido* are less than in most masques of the period, but they do occur, ranging from the stately dances of the courtiers to the frenetic, demonic gyrations of the furies. The masque tradition is also retained in the introduction of grotesque and humorous characters — filthy old witches, and drunken sailors (from Aeneas' fleet) who bear startling resemblances, in conduct and demeanour if not in appear-

ance, to the male chorus of *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

The original autograph manuscript of the opera was lost soon after Purcell's death in 1695, although the complete libretto is still preserved intact. Latter-day reconstructions of the music are based mainly on two sources: a manuscript copy of the score at St. Michael's College, Tenbury, England, and a second copy which has been in a Tokyo library for about 50 years. Both copies date from the late 18th century, and probably represent the opera in an edited form prepared at a later date for the professional stage. Neither copy contains music for the closing scene of the second act, an oversight that disturbs the architectural-like balance and key relationship that Purcell built into the opera. In the many different modern editions that have been prepared over the past half-century, various other works of Purcell's have been burgled to provide substitute music for the scene. In one widely-used edition, prepared by Benjamin Britten and Imogen Holst, the omitted sections are replaced by a trio from *The Indian Queen* (a masque), a chorus from the *Welcome Song* of 1687, and a dance from *Sir Anthony Love*.

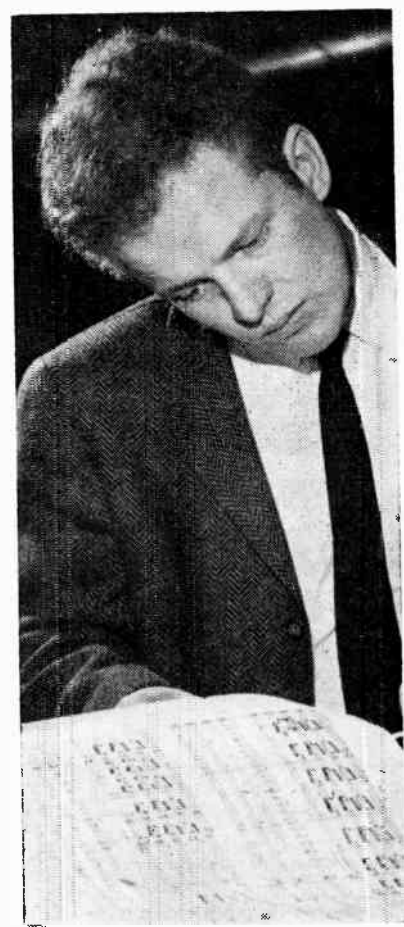
Another example of Purcell's careful attention to musical form in *Dido* is the fact that in each of the three acts there is one aria built on a musical device called "ground bass," in which a theme in the bass line is repeated over and over again with unceasing regularity, while the main melody, in the soprano line, floats and soars above it. The most outstanding aria of the type in the opera, and one of the best-known of Purcell's vocal efforts, is "When I Am Laid in Earth," more familiarly known as "Dido's Lament," which occurs in the closing scene.

On *CBC Wednesday Night* this week (July 17), a complete performance of Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas* (in the Britten-Holst edition) will be presented, beginning at 8:30. The performance will have been recorded at the Stratford

(Ont.) Music Festival on the previous Sunday, during a concert which marks the tenth anniversary (Please turn to page 9)

of the Stratford Shakespearean Festival. Taking part will be the American soprano Adele Addison, as Dido; soprano Elizabeth Benson Guy, as Belinda; and baritone John Boyden, as Aeneas. Contralto Patricia Ridout will be heard as the Sorceress, and minor supporting roles and chorus parts will be sung by the Festival Singers of Toronto, with the National Festival Orchestra supplying the orchestral accompaniment and harpsichordist Greta Kraus providing continuous support. The performance will be under the direction of Elmer Iseler, a Toronto conductor who is permanent musical director of the Festival Singers and is a music teacher at Northview Heights Collegiate in Toronto. Iseler's first major appearance on CBC was in 1956, when he conducted the CBC Symphony Orchestra and the Singers in a radio broadcast of music by Vaughan Williams and Stravinsky. Since then he has appeared frequently on CBC radio

and television programs and in public concerts in Eastern Canada as a choral and orchestral conductor.

Adele Addison made her debut in 1948 in her home city of Boston and has since become established as one of the leading sopranos in the United States. She has appeared often with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and this summer will be soloist with the New York Philharmonic, Cleveland and Chicago symphony orchestras, among many other engagements. On her recent tour of Russia, last spring, she was accorded one of the greatest ovations ever given a foreign artist. One of the most interesting works presented at last season's Stratford Music Festival, Lukas Foss' *Time Cycle*, was commissioned for Miss Addison by the Ford Foundation.

Elizabeth Benson Guy began her career in Halifax, but she has made her home in Toronto for some years. She has appeared in operatic roles on radio and the stage, but her main interest has been in concertizing, and she has given recitals in many parts of Canada.

Her most recent CBC appearance was in a *Celebrity Concert* on CBC Wednesday Night, June 5.

John Boyden will be returning to his home ground for the concert. Born in Woodstock, Ont., he was brought up in Stratford, where he studied voice with Gordon Scott. Noted as an outstandingly talented singer by no less an authority than Elisabeth Schwartzkopf, he was enabled to continue his studies at the Royal Academy in London, Eng., on a scholarship fund raised by Stratford residents. He has recently toured Canada, the U.S., and Europe, where he was acclaimed in Vienna and at the Spoleto Festival.

The Festival Singers, organized in Toronto in the fall of 1954, have appeared at the Stratford Festival on three previous occasions, in 1955, 1956 and 1958. The National Festival Orchestra is made up of instrumentalists who are resident in Stratford for the summer, and who take part in workshop sessions and concerts through the season as well as providing orchestral accompaniment.

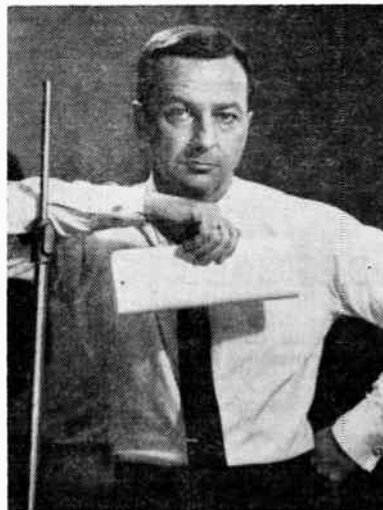

ONE OF THE most remarkable advances in Canadian sports has been made by a lanky, bespectacled member of the Toronto East York Track Club team.

Bill Crothers is a name to be reckoned with and this Saturday as he performs on CBC Television at the Canadian Senior Track and Field Championships in Saskatoon, people coast-to-coast will be able to watch one of the world's finest in action.

Crothers, a team-mate of the illustrious Bruce Kidd, worked in the shadow of his more famous associate for almost two years. During the past winter, as all sorts of minor injuries befell Kidd, Crothers began to move forward into the spotlight. His sensational winter season was climaxed by his outdoors run at the United States Amateur Athletic Union championships. Crothers ran the year's fastest time for the half-mile — 1:47.6. It was the third fastest time in world history.

Ironically, when one of the United States' largest national magazines was covering the A.A.U. meet, it neglected to mention Crothers' brilliant performance.

The East York runner was undefeated in the winter season at 1,000 yards and has suffered only two losses in nearly a year, one of them a couple of weeks ago in the

BOY'S DREAM FULFILLED

Wattie Dixon's dream was about a saddle, "a good roping saddle, not really fancy with sterling silver, just some tooling; a saddle like that would come to a couple hundred dollars—it might as well be a couple million." Wattie is an Indian, a member of the Stony Indian tribe; he's 14, and he lives in the Eden Valley, in Alberta's foothills, where the Highwood River flows down from the high ranges of the Rockies and out to the plains to join the Saskatchewan River system. Wattie's home is the Eden Valley Reserve; some 30 families live there, and Wattie is related, by marriage or blood line, to all of them. For as long as he can remember, Wattie has been riding the Valley, green with the lush grass of the foothills, and for almost that long, he has wanted a saddle. "The hard ridge back of a pony is an unkind thing; with Wattie, its either bareback or borrow someone's saddle. If only he had a saddle for his horse . . ."

Wattie Dixon's dream, and how he sets out to make it reality, is the subject of Sunday's edition of *20/20* on the CBC television network. The half-hour film, a gently touching and understanding look into the mind and heart of a young Indian boy, has been prepared at CBC Winnipeg by producer Peter Kelly, with a music score by Eric Wild. Script and narration are by the well-known Canadian author, W. O. Mitchell, creator of the *Jake and the Kid* stories and many other tales of Canada's West. The passages quoted above are taken from Mitchell's script, which quietly underscores the action that was filmed on location in Alberta.

The film includes scenes of Wattie's home life, some of the ancient dances and customs of his tribe, the beautiful country in which he lives, and, as a climax both to the film and to Wattie's young life, his participation in the Little Britches Rodeo, with youngsters competing in bareback and saddle riding, calf roping, steer riding and chuck wagon races, garnering bruises, bloodied noses, and memories to last a lifetime.

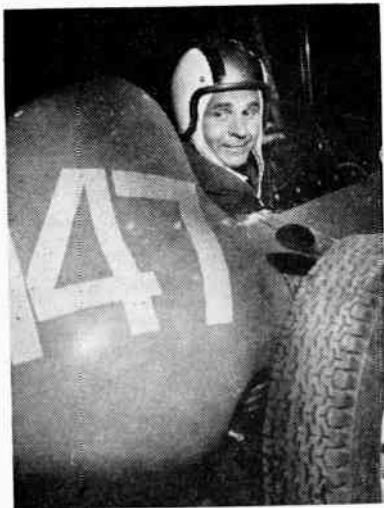
Beethoven - Chopin Series on 'Explorations'

PERSONAL OPINIONS of two great composers—Beethoven and Chopin—held by their contemporaries and by three present-day men—will be offered in three CBC-TV programs beginning Wednesday, July 17, on the *Man in a Landscape* series of *Explorations*.

The two composers contrasted sharply in many ways, but had some important elements in common.

Beethoven was a great, shaggy man, uncouth, unkempt, unchivalrous, gusty, bad-tempered and arrogant. He would "spit out of a front window, use the candle-snuffers for toothpicks, hurl eggs that were not to his taste at the housekeeper . . . and shake off water from his soaked hat upon the hosts with whom he had come to dine." But in spite of it, he was loved and idolized. His music and ideas intoxicated not only their creator but all who came within range of their power and beauty.

Chopin, on the other hand, was fastidious, foppish, elegant, delicate, graceful, womanly and incapable of achieving a mature emotional relationship with a woman. He was never bohemian. He was neurotically scrupulous and proper, making a fetish of clean linen and perfect grooming. He was a bit of a social climber, but fitted into aristocratic society with complete ease. Some called him morbid, sickly, bleached, unhealthy, slip-slop and a sweet caramel pole. Others, including thousands of women and many men of importance and taste, worshipped at his exquisitely shod feet. When Schumann first heard Chopin perform, (Please turn to page 25)

attention of the reader without let-up. That so simple and moving a tale of love and trust should rise to such heights of popularity in an era when stories of vice, weakness and heartlessness are the rage, is both curious and encouraging. The book won the Canadian Library Association's 1962 medal for the best children's book in English. But it is its vast adult audience which has made it a best-seller.

The three animals are based on actual pets owned by Mrs. Burnford, her husband, a Port Arthur pediatrician, and their three teenage daughters, but the adventures in the book are imaginary. Bodger's real-life name was Bill. He was Mrs. Burnford's wedding present to her husband. The dog lived 15 years and was much loved.

Once, when Bodger got into a fight, the Labrador (real name: Ramie) saved him. Tao (in real life, Simon) was a present for Bill at Christmas. The three were inseparable. When they felt like a little kitchen-thieving, Simon would leap on top of the frig., where goodies were kept, and toss them down to the other two.

When Bill grew too old and blind to make his own way, the others took him walking and hunting, and always steered him away from obstructions and traffic.

Simon and Ramie are still alive. Simon can open any door in the house, by standing on his hind

feet and turning the handle with his paws. The Labrador is not as handy, so when Simon sees Ramie waiting hopefully in front of a closed door, the cat opens it for him.

Mrs. Burnford is an attractive woman in her mid-forties, vivacious, charming, and extremely shy. Her eldest daughter, Peronelle, says: "My mother is very retiring. For instance, she was asked to go on television and she refused because she thought she wasn't pretty enough. She's sturdily built, and her hair is going a bit grey, but she's very attractive. She's a thoughtful sort of person. She loves duck-hunting and is a wonderful shot." She is also keen on sailing, hunting mushrooms, rocks, and stars; flying a plane, puppeteering, and all forms of theatre.

Mrs. Burnford was born in Glasgow, educated in Edinburgh and Harrogate, and in her youth spent some time in Germany, France and Spain. During the Second World War she joined the VAD and drove ambulances. She met her husband when he was at Cambridge, and moved to Canada with him 14 years ago.

Before her book was published she had written only a few articles, short stories and poems for *Blackwoods*, *Punch*, and other magazines. A literary agent who read one of her short stories in *Blackwoods* and liked its humour and clever style, wrote to ask if Sheila Burnford had any other writing for sale. Mrs. Burnford wrote back to say she did have something, *The Incredible Journey*, which she had written to while away the time when out duck-shooting with her husband and the Labrador. The agent sold it immediately.

Asked to explain her confident writing style in her first book, Mrs. Burnford said: "I suppose it's the advantage of starting late. I have read voluminously all my life—since I was five—and know what kind of writing I like to read. So I patterned my own writing on that. Also, in *The Incredible Journey* I write about things I know—our own part of the country, and our own pets."

Hancock's "In Trouble" For Another Season

BEFORE HE BEGAN work on his new series of half-hour television programs, entitled simply *Hancock*, British comedian Tony Hancock paid a visit to the United States, to see for himself what was going on in the world of American TV. One night, while wandering aimlessly down a street in Los Angeles, he encountered a man who had obviously had one too many. As the man wove uncertainly along the sidewalk, Hancock recognized a fellow human being in distress, and immediately went to his assistance.

"The outcome," reports scriptwriter Godfrey Harrison, who was with Hancock, "was hilarious. The drunk didn't want to be helped, but Tony was determined to help. In no time I was watching what might have been a big scene in a comedy show."

That's the sort of thing that happens to Tony Hancock from time to time in real life; and it's the sort of thing that happens continually in the *Hancock* programs, to be seen on the CBC television network on Friday nights throughout the summer. Hancock is depicted as the lonely little man who would like to put the world right but whose efforts are always ineffectual or misunderstood; a dreamer whose dreams can never materialize; the man standing quietly on a street-corner, minding his own business, who suddenly finds himself embroiled in the most inane and difficult situations, against his will.

In the 13 programs that make up the series, Hancock finds himself in many different situations, but he always comes through with his customary brilliant bumbling. In one episode, for instance, he witnesses a bank robbery, makes no attempt to stop the getaway, but then — Walter Mitty-like — imagines himself to be a hero.

international meet at Toronto when the two men he topped in the U.S. A.A.U. meet came back on a heavier track to edge him out.

Crothers is only one of many fine Canadian performers who'll star in the national championships.

The one question mark at press time was Bruce Kidd — who has been out of action for a month because of a foot injury that may end his career entirely. Kidd finished a badly-beaten third in a race in California one month ago and it was then his heel injury came to light publicly, although he had written friends about it a couple of weeks before.

There is much speculation today that Kidd has overdone his running and training and has finally broken down, as many predicted he would several years ago when he startled the track world with his sensational times at 15 and 16 years of age.

The absence of Kidd from the Canadian track and field scene would certainly be a blow to this country's international prestige, but to take up the slack there are performers like Crothers and Nancy McCreadie, the fine young shot-putter and discus thrower from Brantford, Ontario.

he was beside himself with joy. "Hats off, gentlemen, a genius," he cried.

Both Chopin and Beethoven were brilliant pianists. Both were restless, passionate, emotional. Both fought a crippling physical disability for many years. With Beethoven it was deafness. The sound of the glorious music that came from his fertile brain faded for him as his hearing diminished, and the last years of his tempestuous life were spent in a whirling, frustrating void of silence. But from within he plucked the sounds of his imagination—boldly triumphant or disturbingly tender—and blended them into the rich music the world now treasures, and which he never heard himself. He was defiant to the last, the poet of heroism.

With Chopin it was tuberculosis which haunted him for 30 years and finally killed him. But his worst bouts of illness drew from him some of his best works. All his music reflects his personality in its shadings, subtle or flamboyant—his debilitating disease, his insecurity, his great need for love but inability to return it, his strange combination of sophistication and childishness, and his longing for his homeland, Poland.

Drama and Comedy For 'Summer Fallow'

TWO DRAMAS by Miller and Margaret Stewart, well-known writing team specializing in rural Canadian, historical and nature subjects, will be presented in CBC Radio's *Summer Fallow* series on Monday nights, July 15 and 22, at 8:30.

In the first, titled *The Incredible McNab*, they dip into the social history of Upper Canada in its colonizing phase. The play is based on the deceit, villainy and petty tyranny that accompanied the attempts of that picturesque nobleman-reprobate, the last Laird McNab, to establish the feudal clan system in Renfrew County in the 1820s and 1830s.

Producer Larry Gosnell says the story is authentic Canadiana. The Stewarts say they are sorry to report that McNab lived and sinned as described, and that the settlers were as unduly patient as the play indicates. They also regret that, in the face of the adage "Crime does not pay," the old renegade survived, after his Canadian misdeeds, until his 83rd year, living in France on an allowance from his wife he had deserted some 40 years before. He had two Frenchwomen

living with him at the time of his demise.

The July 22 play, *The Warlock of Polecat Portage*, is a comedy. Gosnell says that although it concerns the same general period and areas as *The Incredible McNab*, the resemblance ends there, and it is in no sense a sequel.

It's about the social relations between indigenous Indians and a pair of Scots settlers — as they *might* have developed in rare cases. Any implication that this comedy is based on fact is vigorously denied. It concerns the frustrations that beset the fictional piper and distiller of Laird McNab, one Rory Gilfillan, in his efforts to become a squawman. "Plainly," says Gosnell, "this is a libel on our industrious and abstemious pioneer ancestors and our cousins, the noble redskins." But it provides a lot of chuckles which more than soften the prods of the fun-poking.

'Assignment' From Britain

DURING THE last half of July, CBC Radio's *Assignment* will be broadcast from a different part of Britain each night for 10 occasions, beginning on Monday, July 15, at 7:35. Host Bill McNeil, on an extensive tour of the British Isles, will be reporting from Scotland, England, Ireland and Wales.

Early on his tour he will offer a present-day picture of the Island of Barra off the West coast of Scotland, the ancestral home of the Clan McNeil. He will interview the Chief of the Clan, McNeil of McNeil, and attend a Ceilidh there.

In Wales the 17th annual Eisteddfod will be the subject of a special report illustrating the fine voices and music of the land of the leek.

From Wales, *Assignment* moves on to Stratford-on-Avon in England, where the directors of the world-famous Shakespeare Festival will be heard discussing this year's productions and the theatre's tradition in Stratford. And there will

Donald Harron:

Comedy for 'Matinee'

ACTOR DONALD HARRON of Toronto, who is currently in London, England, starring in the West End production of the Jean Kerr play, *Mary, Mary*, in which he also played on Broadway, will be spotlighted in *Trans-Canada Matinee's* sporadic summer comedy series on radio, Tuesday, July 16, at 2:03 p.m. (2:33 p.m. on CBX). Harron will reminisce about his arrival in Britain early last January during the winter power cuts — a reminiscence involving a wide variety of accents in the telling.

Accents have been a Harron specialty ever since he was seven, when he used to entertain his parents with dialect jokes. Perhaps his best-known role has been that of the young Jewish man in the Broadway production of Paddy Cheyevsky's *The Tenth Man*. He won fine reviews, "but after *The Tenth Man* on Broadway for a year," he says, "it appeared I was going to be permanently cast in Jewish roles. I loved the part, of course, but nobody wants to be

type-cast. And now the Jean Kerr comedy makes the break complete."

London critics are agreed about Harron's impact in *Mary, Mary*, but differ in their assessment of his acting style. "Donald Harron's antics are really hilarious," raved one, while another remarked acidly that "Mr. Donald Harron needs to be told that it is not necessary to try to act the very furniture off the stage; with a somewhat more restrained style he would do much better."

Last summer Harron won ecstatic reviews for his performance in *King Lear* in New York's Central Park. "They were the best audiences ever," he says. "It was so good to be away from all those blue-haired ladies from the Theatre Guild." He's a veteran of the Stratford Festivals, Ontario and Connecticut; Hollywood (appeared in the film, *The Best of Everything*), radio and TV on both sides of the border; several New York plays, including Terrence Rattigan's *Separate Tables*, Christopher Fry's *The Dark is Light Enough* and *A Sleep of Prisoners* (in the latter play the author cast him, himself), and, last season, in *Everybody Loves Opal*; and in London productions

such as *A Streetcar Named Desire*, with Vivien Leigh.

Nudging 40, Harron still has a boyish, almost unlined face, a wide range of expressions and gestures, and a deceptively casual undergraduate manner, but he takes a long time to relax with people. "I never had to struggle to get anywhere," he recalls. "That's partly the trouble. The only struggle has been inside me, trying to prove to myself that I was the kind of actor I wanted to be."

As a freshman studying philosophy and English at Victoria College, University of Toronto, Harron played the lead in a campus production of Chekhov's *The Proposal*, and the play won the college drama award. In 1945, after RCAF service as a bombardier, he continued his interrupted college studies and began his stage career with Dora Mavor Moore's Village Players. During one of their productions, actor-playwright Fletcher Markle spotted Harron and asked him to act in a CBC Radio summer drama series; after that he was a frequent CBC performer, as well as one of the mainstays of the *Spring Thaw* revues.

During a 1950 holiday in England, Harron tried his hand at writing scripts with some success, and landed a job in *A Streetcar Named Desire*, followed by his Broadway debut in *A Sleep of Prisoners*. He returned to Canada when CBC-TV began, as actor-writer.

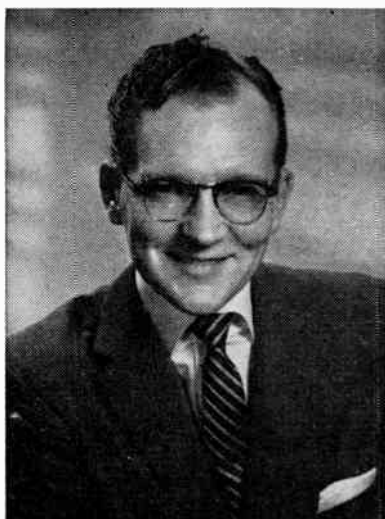

Watch Your Language!

Steve Brodie has devoted his career to promoting good usage of the English language

TO MOST OF US, words are just necessities—sometimes useful things that enable us to express ourselves freely and easily, at other times bothersome obstacles that impede the flow of ideas. But to W. H. "Steve" Brodie, words have been a life's work, a hobby, and an abiding passion.

As CBC's supervisor of broadcast language for 25 years, Steve Brodie was responsible for the standard usage and pronunciation of English employed by announcers across the country, and was also in charge of the training and coaching program for announcers. In addition, he edited a number of instruction booklets on pronunciation and usage, and, apparently not having quenched his thirst for English in the normal line of duty, he also wrote columns for CBC staff publications on the intricacies, oddities, and occasional absurdities of the language.

Although he was the man chiefly responsible for the standard of English heard on the air, Steve Brodie rarely took part in broadcasts himself during his quarter-century with the CBC. There were notable exceptions to this rule, however: his CBC Wednesday Night series entitled *The Well of English*, first broadcast in 1949, elicited a flood of mail from interested listeners and was repeated the following year in answer to many requests.

Since his retirement a year ago, Brodie has taken a more active role in actual broadcasting. During the fall-winter season he was heard in the East every Monday on CBC Radio's *Audio* with a short talk called *Watch Your Language*. This week, he begins a new series of broadcasts about the English language and some of its peculiarities. To be heard Sunday evenings at 10:15 beginning July 7, the

series is entitled *Living Words*. It replaces *In Reply* for the summer.

Christened William but nicknamed Steve since childhood, Brodie was born and educated in England, served as a captain with the Indian Army in the First World War, and came to Canada in 1922. He took a teaching post at Ashbury College in Ottawa and remained there for 15 years before joining the CBC in 1937. During his teaching days he acted with the Ottawa Drama League, taking part in the Dominion Drama Festivals. Since his retirement he has been catching up on his reading—everything from whodunits to Shakespeare—and has been toying with the idea of producing a book which would contain a collection of his views on English pronunciation, spelling, grammar and idiom, culled from his 40 years as teacher and student of the language.

His views on some points might surprise some students of the language. He loves the English tongue but has no patience with those who adopt a pedantic approach to it. "The teaching of English must move with the times," he has said. "The great thing is to be clear." He advocates the use of "like" as a conjunction instead of "as," claiming that "it is a much stronger word," and plumps for the dropping of "whom," pointing out that the objective pronoun "is a museum piece that doesn't appear anywhere except in school grammar books."

He is encouraged by what he regards as progress in English usage, and maintains that the standard of spoken English is higher today than it was a generation ago. "I think it has definitely improved. More people are more interested in good speech now than they used to be, in being clear and articulate."

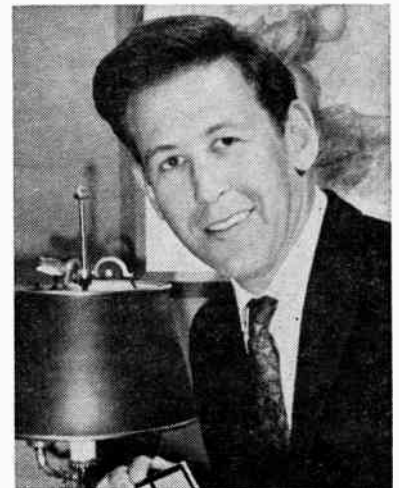

he reports on the Henley Regatta, and on the beautiful, rolling country of the Cotswolds.

Completing his tour of Britain, McNeil will go to Northern Ireland — by the ferry service from Scotland—to visit Belfast and Londonderry.

Although he will be in London, of course, his two weeks of reporting or Assignment are intended to represent life today in the provinces of Britain, the many points of interest around the country, so his impressions of the capital will have to wait for airing another time.

Will 1,600 Lose Their Homes In the Cause of Progress?

SOUNDINGS visits the proposed site of the Columbia River development, Thursday, July 18

"THE VALLEY OF INDECISION" is how one resident of the High Arrow Lakes area of British Columbia describes his part of the province, near the U.S. border, about 200 miles east of Vancouver, where for years residents have been awaiting a decision on the placing of dams and storage lakes for the Columbia River Power Development.

Will the valley be flooded in a few months and will they have to leave their homes, or will it be worthwhile to put in a garden or build a garage? Little problems like these may seem inconsequential in the large-scale view of the plan and its probable benefits, but to valley residents the decision on the dams is like the sword of Damocles.

The argument over the plan has centred around a number of points. Most Canadians outside the part of B.C. to be affected have heard more about the question as it relates to the development of power, and more about its political angles, than about its other aspects. But among residents of the valley, the prime concern is sociological: the effect of the flooding, if the High Arrow plan is accepted and a high dam is constructed, would be to raise the level on the Arrow Lakes some 43 feet, forcing 1,600 people to leave their homes and settle elsewhere. Some of them take the view that the dams mean progress, and they are prepared to pull up stakes. Others, to whom their land and homes are dear, are digging in their heels and resisting the idea of having to put down roots elsewhere. For younger people the prospect isn't too formidable, but the older folks are nearly all for staying put where they feel at home.

A conservationist says, "the flooding of High Arrow will have destructive effects on sports fish and all forms of wildlife in the area. (Also), only two per cent, or some four million acres, of the B.C. land-mass is really suitable for farming, since this province is mostly mountains, forests and rivers. With rapid urbanization going on, a great deal of this acreage is being lost each year. In my opinion we can't afford to lose one single acre unnecessarily, especially just to provide water storage for American generators downstream."

Roughly a third of the power potential of North American rivers is in the Columbia. It is a glacial-melt river rising in Columbia Lake, 2,650 feet high in the Canadian Rockies in southwestern B.C., some 100 miles from the U.S. border. It flows north for about 170 miles, reverses to swing west and south in a horseshoe called the Big Bend, then rushes southwards through the beautiful Arrow Lakes district to the U.S.-Canadian boundary near Trail, and moves across the border at an elevation of 1,300 feet. It winds through the state of Washington and empties into the Pacific near Astoria. Although only one-third of the river's length is in Canada, the drop is 1,358 feet in that part of the course—but the river has no Canadian dams.

Lawrence Nowry, Vancouver freelance writer and broadcaster, visited High Arrow Valley recently to talk with many of those whose homes and farms would be flooded if the plan were to proceed with the building of three major Canadian dams. Nowry found differences of opinion, but, not unnaturally, many residents are still hoping that the decision will revert to the McNaughton Plan, which would dam the Mica and the Murphy, but leave the High Arrow Valley untouched.

Gift of Appreciation for Farm Forums

Radios provided so that impoverished farmers in India could benefit from a program such as Canada's *National Farm Radio Forum* have brought return gifts of handiwork from the recipients

RECENTLY in Toronto, Albert Smith, farmer from Sutton Junction, Quebec, was presented with a hand-carved statuette by the director-general of All-India Radio B. P. Bhatt.

The ceremony, held during the visit to Toronto of Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference delegates, and attended by the CBC president, J. Alphonse Ouimet, marked a milestone in a "hands-across-the-sea" project through which farm communities in Canada have helped farm villages in India. Through the *National Farm Radio Forum*, a combined project of the CBC and voluntary rural organizations of 23 years' standing, farm villagers in India have been provided with specially-constructed radios to take part in their own forum program.

As in Canada, farm neighbourhoods in India follow the program format — "Read, Listen, Discuss, Act." A village elder, one of the ever-increasing number of Indians who have learned to read and write, chairs the forum and starts by reading a pamphlet describing the program which the villagers have assembled to hear over the loud-speaker of a radio donated from Canada.

Next, they listen to a program advising them of solutions to everyday farm problems. After a discussion, the villagers decide upon a course of action, which the village elder records in the minutes of the forum.

Ten years after the farm forums had established their success in Canada, UNESCO undertook to study the project for the United Nations and to report upon its possibilities for other countries. A pilot project followed in the Bombay State and showed that the educational benefits of the Canadian forums could be extended to village farming life in India.

With this fact established, Bob Knowles, National Supervisor of CBC Farm and Fisheries Broad-

casts, addressed the delegates to the National Farm Radio Forum in 1960. In the discussion which followed concerning the shortage of radios in India, a representative of a Prince Edward Island Forum suggested as an action project that each of Canada's farm forums might undertake to supply an Indian village with a radio complete with public address attachment.

The proposal was forwarded and accepted by All-India Radio.

The reply came back that a number of the Indian villages which would receive a radio would want to reciprocate through sending some handiwork as a gift from their village to the Canadian forum supplying their radio.

The presentation this week marks the first such exchange. Albert Smith represented the Sutton Junction forum, the first to provide a radio for an Indian village.

The radios must be made to suit broadcasting wave lengths in India, to withstand the climate and to operate on batteries. Each transis-

tor-type radio made in India with public address attachment costs about \$110.

The handiwork from India presented to Mr. Smith of Sutton Junction came from the Dakhine Mundamuhan forum, south of Calcutta, India. The carving depicts a scene from Indian mythology in which the goddess of fertility embraces a tree and causes it to burst into flower.

The statuette was selected for its symbolism of the feelings of the Dakhina Mundamuhan forum for the gift of the first radio provided from Canada. As with all those donated, the radio bears a plate naming the Canadian forum which presented it.

The Canadian forums transplanted to India are flourishing in the thousands of farm communities in that heavily-populated country. In six months last year, 90,000 letters were mailed by Indian forums to their program headquarters asking for solutions to farm problems.

The transplant will soon outgrow the original Canadian program. Within two years, 100,000 Indian forums will be operating. Last year, 60,000 rural people took part in Canadian forums.
