Education in Poor Taste

• I wish to make public a few of my feelings concerning the program *Check-Up* which dealt with *Pre-Natal Care* (Monday, July 29, CBC-TV).

First of all, in general regard to this topic, many doctors and psychologists of the last few decades have been widely advocating education and open discussions about sex and bringing up children; to my mind, education is essential, but everyone has immediately decided that it should become a public topic. This is wrong. Love between a man and a wife is a most intimate thing. Preparing young people is a responsibility of the parents. If for some reason they feel this isn't possible, or if they neglect this responsibility, then some other qualified person should quietly take over. I realize it would take a few generations to make this type of thing work . . .

Concerning the *Pre-Natal Care* program, I was disgusted by the poor taste displayed. Perhaps it is necessary for a physician to be involved in some details of family affairs; he should respect and understand the fact he is invading to some degree, and he must remain discreetly impersonal and professional. However, on this program, the "family doctor" found it necessary to make a dirty allusion to conception and childbirth. This vulgarity was augmented because it was made by a doctor to one of his patients, because it was made in the presence of other strange men and women of the panel, and because it was made over a public television network.

Lastly, the program doesn't live up to the standard of CBC's educational series. The information discussed was so sketchy and elementary that it was of less value than a few paragraphs of readily-accessible books or journals, or more fittingly, than the things which one's own parents very likely have told one years ago.

CBC Winnipeg Artists Have Work Published In International Magazine

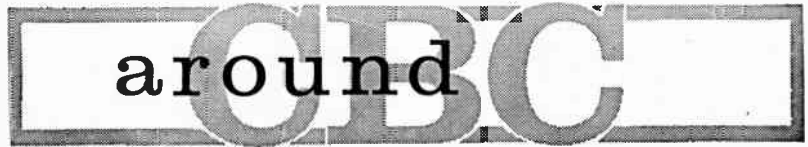
CREATIVITY AND imagination play a big part in the design and presentation of the hundreds of slides that are seen each day on the television screen. These slides introduce and promote programs, and impart important information to the viewer at various times throughout the average production.

Viewers frequently have complimented the CBC's staff of graphic artists on the design of their slides, and recently this recognition has come from an international source. The 1963 edition of *Graphis Annual*, a Swiss magazine circulated among people in the advertising and graphic arts field, has published the work of two CBC Winnipeg graphic artists, Frank Mikuska and Allan Dutcheshen.

Previous editions of the annual have given recognition to the work of these artists and to the other members of CBC Winnipeg's graphics staff, David Strang and Bruce Head. At various times in the past, the work of these four artists also has been accepted for display and publication by the Montreal and Toronto Art Directors' Clubs.

BEGINNING September 8, CBC-TV viewers in Manitoba will see all network programs one hour later than they previously had seen them. That date will mark completion of another step in a project to have all parts of Canada see CBC Television programs at the same hour, local time.

Since the advent of the microwave system, programs originating in Toronto have been transmitted to Manitoba stations simultaneously. Therefore, because of a one-hour time zone difference between Toronto and Manitoba, programs seen in Toronto at 8:00 p.m. were seen in Manitoba at 7:00 p.m. on the clock.

Video tape machines are being installed in Winnipeg to record the network programs for Manitoba. Until the machines are operational in October, the video tape centre in Calgary will record the programs for Manitoba.

Now, network programs will run each weekday evening from 8:00 p.m. to 11:20 p.m., rather than 7:00 p.m. to 10:20 p.m. as in the past. The daily CBC Television News, formerly scheduled at 10:00 p.m. in Manitoba, will be seen at 11:00 p.m. In general, viewers should expect to see all network programs one hour later than previously.

Local programs—that is, programs produced in Winnipeg and Brandon, or syndicated films carried only on these stations—will also be affected, since there will be different time periods available for them. For example: local syndicated films and live productions have usually been seen on CBWT from 10:30 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Many of these programs now will be seen in the week-day period from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The only programs which will not be delayed and will remain at their previous times will be live sports events and news and public affairs actualities.

Can Play on Us



CHECK-UP Monday, Sept. 9, reviews the crippling effects of anxiety tension on a patient

FRED TUPMAN is 51, married with three children, and has been the successful manager of a hardware store for some years. Things looked pretty rosy for Fred until he began getting severe pains in

his stomach after he ate. He lost his appetite, his weight dropped, his memory began to fail, he had no pep, and finally he felt so miserable that he wondered how he could go on, so his wife packed

him off to their family doctor. After numerous tests it was found that Fred didn't have an ulcer, as he had feared, but he did have a bad case of anxiety tension, which seriously threatened his future. His case and how it was treated will be discussed in this week's edition of CBC-TV's factual medical series, *Check-Up*, on Monday night, September 9.

Participants include Dr. G. E. Moriarty, member of General Practice (Medical) of Canada, who lives in Calgary, and Dr. D. C. McKerracher, professor of psychiatry, University of Saskatchewan. The consultant is Dr. W. J. McCorkell, member of the College of General Practice (Medicine) of Canada, and clinical teacher at the University of Saskatchewan.

Polish Job For Toronto's Gem of a Theatre

Toronto discount merchant Ed Mirvish has come to the rescue of the Royal Alexandra Theatre. TELESCOPE focusses on the story, Monday on CBC-TV

VISITING SINGERS and actors have said that Toronto's old Royal Alexandra Theatre has the best acoustics on the continent. And shabby as its Edwardian décor has been for the last few years, most patrons had to admit that the place had atmosphere and an intimacy not possible in larger, more luxurious and more modern theatres. Somehow there was more sense of occasion at the Alex, amidst the flaking gilt and worn velvet, than you would find in most ultra-modern theatres with their vast space and serene décor. And so, when it was announced that this 56-year-old landmark was to be sold and probably demolished, not a few sentimentalists felt very sad indeed.

Then in stepped the 48-year-old owner of a large discount empire in Toronto called Honest Ed's, who had broken practically all of the laws of how to succeed in business and made a fortune out of it. The Alex was not only saved, at a cost to its benefactor of \$250,000, but Ed Mirvish announced his intention of restoring it to its former elegance, so it could continue to house the out-of-town attractions which must by-pass Toronto's O'Keefe Centre, and be a showcase for the National Ballet, Canadian Players, etc.

Not a few eyebrows were lifted by those who knew Honest Ed Mirvish only as the merchant who could come across 50 dozen pairs of old red flannel bloomers in an ancient warehouse and sell them out in a day at 98¢ each. What would the gracious old theatre turn into with the perpetrator of such zany antics at the helm?

But Ed Mirvish is interested in much more than turning a quick buck, as CBC-TV viewers will see on Monday night, September 9, when *Telescope* presents a program about *Ed and the Alex*, with Fletcher Markle as host, and production by Ross McLean.

To observe the several lives of Ed Mirvish, *Telescope* visits his Toronto discount house and nearby "artists" colony, where he has bought a whole block of old houses, painted them in gay colours, and rented them out at cost to struggling artists; and calls on his refurbished Royal Alexandra as the curtain goes up on a big night in Mirvish's life, the opening of a new season in a dramatically restored old theatre, with the Broadway comedy *Never Too Late*. The program will include filmed sequences

directed by Jorn Winther, and live scenes direct from the Royal Alex.

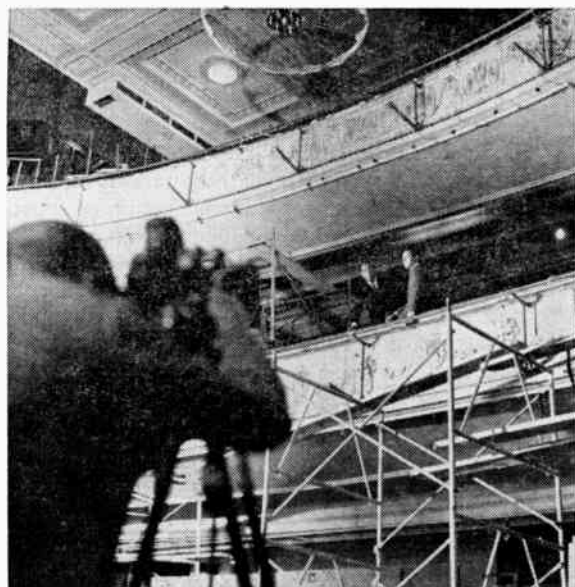
Things have been humming all summer as the Alex went through its rejuvenation. Its 1,525 seats have been ripped out and a good many replaced by more comfortable ones, on a new floor. The first balcony foyer is restored to its original roomy size, as well as the main floor lobby, and an inelegant soft-drink counter is banished. Probably the most dramatic changes are in the second balcony, now called the Museum Gallery. Specially-woven carpets cover its stairway and floor, and its rather grim approach is brightened with photographs of stars who have played the Alex, old programs, and press cuttings recalling the theatre's colourful history. Explains Mirvish: "If you're interested, you don't mind going up all that way."

Seat covers in the theatre are now a two-toned red stripe; the general colour scheme is a handsome combination of crimson, off-white and gold; and an opulent-looking chandelier, long languishing in the attic because it was unsafe and repairs were expensive, now glitters over all. Outside, a new marquée offers greater protection from the elements for arriving and departing patrons.

"The Royal Alexandra will be the most beautiful theatre in North America, and one of the most beautiful in the world," says manager Edwin de Rocher proudly.

Feel like exploring Europe? A 12-week series on CBC Radio will give you tips on how to spend less money and enjoy yourself more.

A NEW RADIO series, *Traveller's Check*, offering light-hearted but cool-headed assessments of 12 European countries from the viewpoint of a Canadian tourist, with comments from nationals of the countries concerned, will begin on Saturday, September 7, at 3:30.

Peter Reynolds, who hails from Hamilton, but has been living in Europe for several years, dreamed up the idea with Paul Wright, assistant CBC representative in London. Reynolds travelled to each of the countries concerned to see conditions for himself, and to gather first-hand information.

But the series offers more than just questions and answers and Reynolds' opinions about what the tourist abroad can expect, and not expect. Reynolds has made a collection of pop tunes and folk songs from each of the countries and uses them to punctuate his other material. Each of the dozen countries has its own variety of pop music, and listeners will hear what sort of melodies they're humming here and there around Europe.

About the informational part of the series, Reynolds says: "Ordinary travel literature is mostly a fantasy based on luxury hotels. Yet most people when they travel have to cut whatever corners they can. What I had in mind was a program which could convey an accurate impression of each country, with as much specific information as possible about costs, customs and pitfalls."

The countries to be visited in the series are Sweden, Italy, Ireland, Belgium, Scotland, Holland, Yugoslavia, Switzerland, Austria, France, Germany, and Greece. In company with Ray de Boer, another Canadian freelancer based in London, Reynolds visited the 12 countries within two months during the summer, and gathered interviews with English-speaking residents of the countries about themselves

and their homelands. The two men edited their tapes and wrote the scripts as they moved about Europe, put them all together in the CBC's London office, and then air-expressed the series to Toronto. It contains some delightful and fascinating material.

Sweden, a little off the beaten track of the modern three-week version of the "grand tour," will be explored in the first show, on September 7. In Scandinavia, fortunately, most people in a town of any size can speak English or understand a bit. A safe bet when wanting directions in rural areas is to ask a teenager. Ten-to-one he studies English in school, he's usually eager to help, and thinks nothing of going out of his way to do it.

It's natural for a tourist to want to compare sights, smells, food, dress and customs with life at home, but if he wants things done the way they are at home, he should stay on Main Street and leave travel to others.

In Sweden, as in other parts of Scandinavia, it's possible to travel very cheaply and the most inexpensive accommodation is spotlessly clean. The tiniest house, painted freshly (all paint looks as if it had been applied yesterday in Sweden), and its window ledges bright with flower boxes, is scrubbed whistle clean. And the smell of coffee cake fresh from the big black kitchen stove, served by a smiling, apple-cheeked hostess, is like ambrosia to the weary sight-seer.

The Swedes are a healthy-looking, smartly, but casually, dressed people. They stride out in all weather down Stockholm's streets, looking like an ad for vitamins, head for the open country for long treks at every opportunity (everybody seems to own a hut on a hillside), and take an amused view of the plump, parcel-laden North American tourists gasping on park benches after a three-block hike.

Eating in Sweden is too good for the waistline. Open sandwiches (one restaurant offers 200 varieties) make a delicious lunch with coffee. Their soups are superb, if you're feeling chilled, but if you order à la carte, expect a large tureen-full, not just a bowl. Swedes "shingle" their bread and crackers with butter, insist that cholesterol-frightened tourists will fade away to a shadow and never be able to enjoy life if they don't do the same. They tuck into a groaning table of smörgasbord with wild abandon, and, annoyingly, their waistlines never seem the worse for it. Only the foolhardy try to diet on a visit to Sweden.

If you plan to go there in the middle of summer, don't be misled by pictures of bikini-clad bathers basking on beaches. If you have the courage to don a bikini when everyone else is wrapped in woolly sweaters and leather jackets, then you're hardier than the Swedes! Summer temperatures there are much like those of spring or fall in Canada. And happy is the traveller who goes equipped with enough tweed to drive away shivers, and, of course, a raincoat, for naturally the thing that keeps Sweden so green and lush is rain—usually not the sort of downpour we're used to in Canada, but more of an English drizzle that shouldn't keep anyone from enjoying the sights. Crepe-soled shoes, a suit with a woollen pullover underneath, and a plastic raincoat are more comfortable and less cumbersome than an overcoat and umbrella.

Most visitors to Sweden are content with seeing the mainland, but a trip to the island of Gotland in the Baltic (just an hour by air and you can see it easily in a day, because there's an early plane from Stockholm which gets you there in time for breakfast, and a return flight in the evening) is well worth the time and expense. The island has fine hard-top roads and only one traffic light, which is always pointed out proudly by guides. The capital is Visby, a charming old medieval walled town teeming with roses and ruins, cobbled streets weaving up and down like a game of snakes and ladders. In the quaint town square is a tourist centre located in an ancient timbered building, and buses whisk sightseers around the town and into the countryside at intervals, stopping for a delicious tea at a country inn where the landlord may not know much English, but his cakes speak a language everybody understands.

The Visby harbour, just a minute's stroll from the square, is a colourful spot which attracts camera fans, and locals with gnarled faces and faded blue eyes that have sampled many distant parts of the globe are happy to drape themselves over coils of rope or piles of sails while shutters click. No tip. They're proud. And of course they get a kick out of the tourists' antics.

As one tourist puts it, the real pearl in the shell of travelling is the people. If you see everything there is to be seen in a city, do everything that can

be done, but don't get to know any of those who live there, then you've missed the best. Of course you can't just ring a doorbell and say: "Hi, I'm from Calgary and I'd like to see how you live." But the Scandinavians have special organizations which do that for you, called "Meet the Danes," "Sweden at Home," "Find the Finns," and "Know the Norwegians." No arrangements can be made in advance, but once you arrive in Copenhagen, Stockholm, Helsinki or Oslo, just visit the local tourist information office, tell the official in charge a little about yourself, your occupation and interests, and arrangements, at no charge to you, will be made for you to meet a local family of similar background and tastes. No accommodation is offered, of course, but you will have the opportunity to have lunch, tea, dinner or an evening with some hospitable Scandinavians, to see their home, observe their customs, and ask them about aspects of their country which may have spiked their curiosity.

(Recently Mrs. Maud Brink, a Swede who organized the "Sweden at Home" project, wrote to say that she has moved to Zurich, where she has set up a "Don't Miss the Swiss" program on similar lines. Her office is in the Meise Guildhall near the city tourist office.)

Two Special Parents

ON SUNDAY afternoon, September 8, CBC-TV's *20/20* goes to Prince Edward Island to examine the everyday life of two ordinary people with extraordinary family responsibilities. Art and Joyce Paynter have two families, their own brood of four and a second, part-time family of 20 mentally retarded boys and girls of all ages.

The Paynters are house parents at Sherwood Hospital, a unique institution near Charlottetown which is operated as little like an institution as possible. It features an advanced concept in the care of retarded children. At Sherwood, understanding and affection replace routine and impersonal uniformity. The hospital has one guiding creed: to give its children what others have, and Art and Joyce Paynter are keys to the creed, along with two other sets of people who care for the children with love, patience and good humour, using their own human resources to help their small charges adjust to their disability. In an ultra-modern ranch-style bungalow the children accept discipline and instruction as a natural part of enjoying life.

The Diary of Two Special Parents illustrates this in a highly moving and encouraging film.

EACH YEAR since 1954, British Columbia has been the noisiest football club in Canada. This year the Lions are a team to make a noise about.

Dave Skrien, in two years, has done what no other British Columbia coach could manage. He has the Lions playing heads-up football most of the time and they've either shared or held first place in the Canadian Football League's western conference since the start of the season.

Saturday night the Lions meet the Calgary Stampeders for the second time. There won't be an empty seat in Vancouver's Empire stadium and nearly every living-room in the west should be filled as CBC television begins its coverage of western games.

When Ted Reynolds and Bill Good begin description of that game, there should be many questions in the minds of the fans. Will the return of the injured players make that much difference to Calgary. (Calgary had 5 players sidelined for the first meeting.) Can Joe Kapp complete more than nine passes in 25 attempts this time? Did the Lions really find an answer

to Lovell Coleman's powerful running?

The Lions will have nine days' rest prior to this game, the Stampeders only four. This is similar to the relative staleness and freshness of the teams the first time they met, August 26. B.C. won that one, 22 to 19.

There doesn't seem to be any doubt this is the finest of the British Columbia teams. Coach Skrien has balance and depth, both offensively and defensively. Willie Fleming, always dangerous, this year appears to have more freedom with his running and he's been sensational in each game.

One of the brightest additions to the Lions is 23-year-old Peter Kempf, a North Burnaby boy who attended college at Western Washington. He is the Lions' placement kicker, the most accurate they've had in years. He makes a difference.

British Columbia, in the first game against Calgary, showed the same type of tackling the Edmonton Eskimos and Winnipeg Blue Bombers were noted for in their best days. Whenever Lovell Coleman, Earl Lunsford or Ed Buchanan made a run, they were stopped by four or five men. Gang tackling is the secret of many teams' success.

Calgary has relied mainly on the brilliance of their linebackers, Wayne Harris and Ernie Danjean. These two can't carry the load at all times.

If B.C. beats Calgary, it'll be the defensive team that makes the difference. It did in the first game.

National League football is only days away and this week-end CBC television takes its annual look at the training camps of the N.F.L. clubs. Actual game coverage starts September 15.

In addition to these football telecasts on Saturday and Sunday, there is baseball's Game of the Week between the New York Yankees and Detroit Tigers and an interesting film of the 1964 Olympic Games preparations in Japan. Sites of such various events as track and field, boxing, judo, etc., will be visited.

His father had never been a very practical man, had fancy schemes in his mind but they seldom came to much. Fred had quite an inventive bent, like his father, only he was much more practical, and had set his mind on going to college and getting an engineering degree, even if he had to work his way through. But this plan had to be forgotten in order that the home could be held together. Fred and his brother Jack both had to leave school and go to work.

As a consequence Fred has always felt cheated, felt that he had to go out into the world to earn money far too soon, without proper preparation, and he grew up with a sense of being unqualified. None of his early jobs was one for a trained man. He got by on his native intelligence and for a time hoped to take time out to get the education he craved, but somehow it never worked out that way.

The Cross Versus the Switchblade

A minister from the mountains of Pennsylvania has achieved much in combatting delinquency on New York's streets. TRANS-CANADA MATINEE tells the story Wednesday on CBC Radio

FIVE YEARS ago the Reverend David Wilkerson was a Gospel Tabernacle minister in the little mountain town of Philipsburg, Pennsylvania. He had never seen a switchblade. Today he's welcome in the inner sanctums of at least 115 of New York's worst teenage gangs. Where psychiatry, officialdom and ordinary social agencies have failed to make appreciable inroads on adolescent vice and dope addiction, Wilkerson has succeeded remarkably. His only weapons are down-to-earth practicality, and the Scriptures, which he quotes to his hoodlum friends in the "bug" language they understand best.

His career as an unconventional social worker began in 1958, during the trial in New York of seven boys who had stabbed a 15-year-old polio victim and beaten him to death in a park. Photographers were not allowed in the courtroom, but a *Life* artist sketched the desperate, frightened faces of the accused and when Wilkerson saw them in the magazine he was so moved by their obvious loneliness and despair that he decided to go to New York to try to help them.

In the suburbs of the city, he pulled in at a gas station and phoned the District Attorney to ask if he could talk to the boys and try to find out the underlying problem of teenagers like that. "Go home and milk your cows. I'll brook no interference in this trial," he was told. But he persisted, and after his third call was advised to consult the trial judge. He went into court carrying a Bible and, without being intercepted, boldly strode towards the judge's bench. As he approached, the judge suddenly ducked beneath his desk and shouted, "Get him out of here!" Pandemonium broke loose. Only afterwards Wilkerson learned that the judge's life had been threatened several times by gang leaders posing as clergymen.

Kicked out of court, Wilkerson tried other means of reaching the boys, but every attempt was cold-shouldered. Finally he had had so much adverse publicity that his congregation suggested he take a long holiday, and he even began to doubt his own sanity.

But he was determined to try to help teenage delinquents, and so he went out to look for them. When he was walking along a New York street one day, Tommy, president of the Rebel Gang, sidled up to him and said: "Come on over and meet my boys." Because he was "that preacher guy who got kicked outa the murder trial and the cops don't like him," he was accepted by the gang. Then the Grand Gangsters invited him to their dirty, back-alley den, where the stench nearly floored him, but he went in anyway and they talked to him freely about their problems. Dozens of other gangs began seeking him out.

With them he found a world entirely new to him, with its own language. Soon he, too, was referring

Says Mirvish: "I hope that many people will come to appreciate what a gem they have in the Royal Alex." And he adds: "With modern methods applied to a field that I think is hidebound by tradition, there's no reason why it shouldn't become very profitable. I want to make the theatre more interesting and exciting. The theatre should have all types of entertainment, as long as it's on a good level. We should try to get all kinds of people into the theatre. Particularly we should try to get young people, since they're tomorrow's audiences. I don't mind subsidizing the theatre for a year or two. It's not a business where I can make big money; but it should be on a good business basis if it's to survive. I'm not looking for a quick killing here. In any venture anticipate the worst and work for the best. I figure even if I lose \$1,000 a week for the first year, what's that? Fifty thousand dollars gone."

Mirvish has gone about improving the Alex fairly cautiously, to avoid offending veteran patrons of the

old theatre. "It's a funny thing," he says, "but at my store I figured what the customers needed was wide staircases, so I put them in. But they still use the narrow ones."

However, most of his other schemes have paid off handsomely. "I have a knack for bringing the business in," he explains. "I have a knack for finding out what people want and getting it for them." When he opened his discount house in Toronto 15 years ago, it was the first in Canada. He has succeeded by doing the exact opposite to the other merchants he competed with. He stays smack in the middle of town, turns thumbs down on credit, refunds, and exchanges, offers no services, no parking facilities, has an unlisted 'phone, doesn't open until 1:00 p.m., and uses wacky advertising and unconventional sales antics to cram the customers in. He'll hire anyone to work in the store no matter what their age, colour, language, appearance, or physical handicap, as long as they can do the job.

"With a name and public image like ours we really don't have to worry about what anybody thinks," he says.

By that time he was fairly well versed in French and Russian, and had begun to concentrate on learning German. In a few months he was sent to Germany as an exchange student. While there he had lessons in Hebrew and became interested in Dutch, Norwegian and Danish.

The following year he returned to England and began to explore the Eastern European languages. He wrote to Radio-Prague and Radio-Warsaw and received enough literature to teach himself Czechoslovakian and Polish. His next step was to one of the most melodious of Slavic languages, Serbo-Croat, which is common to Yugoslavia.

During his last year in England his German teacher tutored him in Swedish and Icelandic and he received help in ancient Greek from his Latin teacher. While studying these he taught himself Spanish. Before he returned to Canada a year ago he corresponded with Radio-Bucharest, which started him on his study of Roumanian.

Having this flair for language study, it was no problem for Ian to learn Italian on his two-week return trip to Canada on an Italian ship. Presently he is teaching himself Gaelic and is constantly brushing up on his other languages by reading, corresponding with pen pals through Europe, and searching out people of various nationalities to talk with. If he feels he is becoming rusty in one language, he takes a week off for concentrated study, and soon is as fluent as ever.

Following an interview on a Maritime television station last January, he had a 'phone call from an official of the Department of External Affairs, who asked him to take entrance exams for Canada's foreign service after he has graduated from university. He is happy about the suggestion but wants first to do some graduate study in France and Germany.

Besides languages, Ian enjoys tennis, swimming, chess, bridge, and during his senior year at high school was publisher and editor of a French-language newspaper.

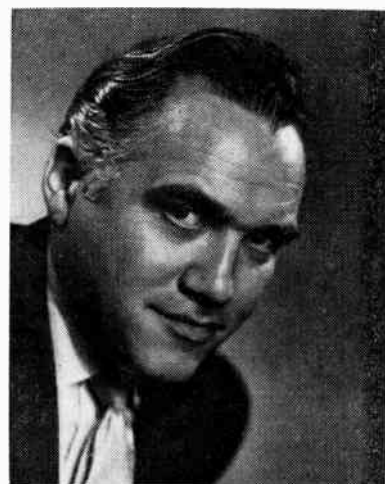

British Jazz Bands Have a Ball

BEFORE THE George Webb and then the Humphrey Lyttleton Bands were formed in the late '40s, there had been a dismal lack of New Orleans style and Dixieland jazz in Britain. But once the Lyttleton band got into its stride it sparked a revivalist movement among jazz enthusiasts. Musicians saw the possibilities of breaking away from their groups and forming their own jazz bands and combos, and started branching out in all directions, until now Britain has some of the best traditional-style jazz groups in the business. Many of them appear in *The Jazz Band Ball*, 13 programs of "trad" jazz transcribed by the BBC, to be heard on CBC Radio Saturday afternoons at 3:00, beginning September 7.

Terry Henebery, who produced the series, writes that "Its styles are many and varied, but all come under the general heading of what has now become an accepted trade mark of this music—'trad.' It's an entirely British phenomenon, but its roots are firmly in the music of New Orleans and Chicago of the '20s and '30s.

"Some of the performers' names will be familiar to listeners in other countries through the artists' commercial recording successes — for example, Acker Bilk and his Paramount Jazz Band, Kenny Ball's Jazzmen, and the Chris Barber Jazz Band. Other bands, despite the dearth of publicity which normally accompanies successful recordings, are nonetheless widely known and accepted for their musical ability. For instance, the Chicago style of Alex Welsh and his band, the Django Rheinhardt-inspired Diz Disley String Quintet, and the highly individual piano stylings of Lennie Felix.

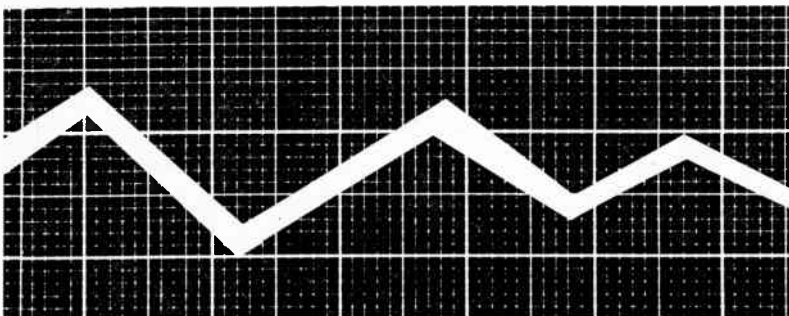

Repeat Stratford Ode In Poetry and Music

THIS WEEK *CBC Wednesday Night* will open with *Twelve Letters to a Small Town*, a suite of poems and music for voices and instruments by poet James Reaney and composer John Beckwith. Production is by John Reeves. It was scheduled for presentation in June and then postponed. Commissioned by the CBC, it was first performed on a Wednesday Night in July, 1961.

Reaney recounts the history of his boyhood home town, Stratford, Ontario, the sleepy little place which became a thriving international arts centre but which, when the poet knew it first, was an embryonic amoeba of a town where life took its time about rolling on, where meals were triumphantly solid, like the townspeople, and its kinship to its illustrious namesake was about in the same relation as a dowdy, impecunious gentlewoman to her colourful cousin, the Earl. Then, after decades of modest life, the ladylike country bumpkin suddenly blossomed into a cultured charmer attracting thousands to her salons from all over the world.

Readers in the *CBC Wednesday Night* performance will be Bruno Gerussi, Hayward Morse, Billie Richards, Beth Lockerbie and Peg

Dixon. Adding musical texture to the words will be John Beckwith, piano and harmonium; Robert Aitken, flute; Peter Acker, guitar; and Roy Cox, oboe.

Twelve Letters to a Small Town will be heard at 8:05. At 8:45 there will be transcribed music from festivals at Lugano and at Mount Orford, Quebec. to a neighbourhood as a "turf," to a fight as a "jitterbug," and to narcotics (for most of the gangs were badly addicted) as "H," "Horse," "pot" or "tea." It was a desperate, frightening world, he found, where a small, drug-addicted child referred sadly to the monkey on his back, and where a 12-year-old girl was an experienced prostitute. Wilkerson saw that many of these young people came from fairly prosperous homes, not necessarily broken ones. Miserable and guilty, they waged a constant battle against drug addiction, alcoholism, gang wars, and the ever-present, ever-threatening need for "kicks."

Most of the gangs, he says, began as church groups, then degenerated. A drug pusher would filter in and introduce drugs to one or two. The habit would spread. After 15 intravenous shots of a drug, says Wilkerson, a gang member would be hooked for life. Some boys he has known will take as many as 15 shots a day.

In the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of New York, one of the roughest parts of the city, Wilkerson began working towards creating a home where boys and girls in trouble could find guidance in an atmosphere of discipline and affection. He recruited volunteers and enlisted financial help from individuals, foundations, churches and other organizations, and Teen Challenge soon opened for business in an old mansion in Brooklyn. Its aim: to serve young people of all creeds and colours who are members of teenage street gangs or have been in difficulty with the law, and to rehabilitate boys as they leave jail or are placed on probation.

Wilkerson's phenomenal success in dealing with his new parishioners—alcoholics, thieves, murderers, prostitutes, drug addicts—has resulted in rapid expansion of his facilities. There are now five city centres for Teen Challenge work, in Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas and Miami, as well as in Brooklyn; five more are to open soon, and the New York headquarters is branching out into a new 125-bed, \$500,000 centre for rehabilitating addicts—mentally, socially and morally.

Not long ago Teen Challenge acquired a 200-acre dairy and garden crop farm in the rolling Pennsylvania countryside, east of Harrisburg, where city delinquents whose closest brush with agriculture has been illicit cultivation of marijuana in vacant lots, can work, study and be rehabilitated. Most of the money to buy and equip the farm was provided by W. Clement Stone, Chicago philanthropist and president of the Combined Insurance Companies of America. Another major benefactor in the project is Walter Hoving, chairman of Tiffany's.

Boys arrive at the farm after going through the ordeal of withdrawing from narcotics. There they have to work hard—learn to farm, tend cattle, perform ordinary household chores, and attend school for part of the day (courses in reading, writing, English, music, American history and speech). They are all encouraged to continue their education after they leave—many of them have been high school drop-outs. Courses are also given in mechanics, art and agriculture. "And we try to teach them the basic good manners they need to get along in society," says Wilkerson. He hopes the farm will be self-supporting eventually, with an income from the 80-head dairy herd and cash crops of some \$50,000 a year. Superintendent of the school is the Reverend Frank Reynolds, who has a degree in agriculture. Arthur Graybill, former owner of the farm, stayed on as manager.

Wilkerson reports that 80 per cent of the young addicts who have come under the care of Teen Challenge for any length of time have stayed withdrawn from drugs. "We try to isolate them from drugs for one year and follow up for two," he says. "We also motivate them to go back to their neighbourhoods with confidence. Half of the workers in the New York headquarters were once addicts. We aim at deliverance rather than suppression. We believe in the restorative value of good hard work. Our boys don't eat if they won't work."

Imogene Coca Shivered into Comedy

IMOGENE COCA, star of CBC-TV's new comedy series *Grindl*, first became a comedienne because of a cold rehearsal stage and an oversize overcoat.

Her gyrations while putting on the overcoat to get warm, made her look like a floppy rag doll, and so amused nearby stagehands and fellow players that revue producer Leonard Sillman put her in his *New Faces of 1934* production.

Sad-eyed Imogene will debut as *Grindl* on the CBC television network on September 12. *Grindl* is an itinerant domestic who finds her work as a maid involves her in a variety of unusual and amusing situations.

Imogene was born into show business. Her father conducted the pit orchestra of a Philadelphia vaudeville house and her mother worked with Thurston, the famous magician.

Her first dramatic role was in a school play in which she acted the part of "an evil germ." She later became a singer, acrobat, and ballet dancer in vaudeville.

After the overcoat incident and her "discovery," Imogene fell in love with actor-singer-pianist Robert Burton whose family were also show people. The two became inseparable and early in 1935, after borrowing two dollars for a license, they were married.

Imogene's early married years were lean and her parts few, but friends encouraged and helped her get occasional bookings which prepared her for television.

In 1949, the rubber-faced comedienne teamed up with Sid Caesar and won a permanent role in the TV musical revue. *Your Show of Shows* on NBC. A seven-year contract followed and Imogene found the success and money she strived for during her years of poverty.

With the death of her husband and her mother in the late 1940s,

the unhappy Imogene drove herself to perfect her art and prepared a night club act for Las Vegas. The act was a success but Imogene was still not content. She turned to the stage as a further challenge and toured with the play *Janus*, later starring in the touring companies of *Thurber Carnival* and *Once Upon a Mattress*.
